Hoax

Three teens detained for bomb threat

By MARILYN POWERS Staff Writer

Three juvenile males are in a detention facility at Post, Texas, today after allegedly calling in a bomb threat to Pampa High School during the noon hour Monday, according to Pampa Police Lt. Kenneth Hopson.

Two 911 calls were received Monday by Pampa central dispatch concerning the threat. The caller said that "people are going to die" and that "a bomb is at Pampa High School," according to Pampa Police Lt. Fred Courtney in a news release.

Emergency services personnel, including police, Pampa Fire Department, and Guardian EMS Ambulance Service, responded to the call. The school was evacuated for between 30 minutes came in, Dispatcher Joel

and an hour while emergency personnel checked the campus.

"After the detectives completed their investigation, and determined Principal Evan

Smith had students and faculty return to their classes," Courtney said.

The first of the two calls concerning the bomb was a local convenience store. The second was at 12:24 p.m. from a grocery store. "They dialed 911 at a

Taylor Food Mart first. They were gone at our arrival. Then they called again from Albertson's. They were still there when we got there," Hopson said.

Pampan held for interference in apprehension of Tulia man

The vehicle turned and headed south on Varnon with the deputy in pursuit, using lights and siren, Hoard said.

The driver pulled into a driveway at 1173 Varnon, where Deputy Jarrett Parsons placed him under arrest.

At this point, a "male subject exited the house and approached the deputies in an aggressive manner, shouting obscenities. He was advised to go back to his house. He told the deputies it was his property and he could do what he wanted," Hoard said.

When the subject, Spencer, made a fist at Deputy Larue, he was arrested, Hoard said.

Williams was arrested on a warrant for assault causing bodily injury, and was also charged with evading arrest, a felony, according to jail records.

Bond on the assault charge was set at \$2,000, and bond on the evading charge was set at \$3,000, according to jail records.

Williams remained in jail as of press time today in lieu of bond on the charges, according to a jail spokesperson.

June 1 sentencing set for former DA Roach

The sentencing date for former 31st District Attorney Rick Roach on a federal charge has been set for 9:30 a.m., Wednesday, June 1, according to Assistant U.S. Attorney Christy L. Drake of Amarillo.

On Feb. 8, Roach pled guilty in federal court in Amarillo to a charge of addict or unlawful user in possession of firearms. He also resigned as 31st District Attorney on that date.

Roach The remaining three federal charges

against Roach are expected to be dropped as a result of his guilty plea, Drake said in a previous interview.

Roach was arrested Jan. 11 at Gray County Courthouse by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents on a charge of possession of methamphetamine.

Roach's indictment in federal court later included three additional charges concerning firearms, methamphetamine and cocaine.

Two state indictments on charges of possession of a controlled substance

with intent to deliver, a first-degree felony, were handed up by a Gray County grand jury on May 17, according to court records.

One of the charges specifies methamphetamine, and the other specifies cocaine.

Both charges allege that Roach committed the offenses within 1,000 feet of a school and that a handgun was used or exhibited during the commission of the alleged crime.

Both charges also state that the amount of the controlled substance for each indictment was four or more grams but less than 200 grams.

Perryton attorney David Scott was appointed special prosecutor in March by 31st District Judge Steven Emmert and confirmed by 84th District Judge Kelly Moore to investigate the possibility of filing state charges against Roach.

In addition to possible drug offenses, Scott has retained the Pampa firm of Brown, Graham & Co., certified public accountants, to examine financial records from Roach's office concerning possible irregularities in the DA's bank accounts.

"Scott may be seeking additional charges against Roach in the near future," 31st District Attorney Lynn Switzer said Monday afternoon.





However, the most insidious virus in the wild today is the polymorphic virus. As a preface, we need to talk about how anti-virus software works. Viruses are simply programs and programs are simply "sets of instructions." When a virus replicates or copies itself, it is simply copying it's "set of instructions" somewhere else. Anti-virus software can search all of your programs for copies of these instructions. If it finds them, it can remove them. Of course, in another program, what hap-

Welcome back to Viruses order for your anti-virus software to work, it must know about the virus to begin with. Obviously, newer viruses that your software doesn't know about will evade the search. Polymorphic viruses are

change their instructions, making them impervious to virus searches. Don't get me wrong, they can be found (sort of). Whenever a virus infects pens to the size of the program? It grows. Your programs should never just 'grow" on their own. Your data may grow and shrink, but programs are static in their size, unless you

upgrade them.

their sizes. Whenever you run your anti-virus software from then on, it will compare your programs to that list. If any of them have "suddenly grown", the software will

alert you and ask if you have recently upgraded them. If not, the anti-virus software will erase the infected program (taking the virus with it). At this point, you will have to re-install the original program. But, hey, it's better to lose one program than an entire hard disk.

So, which anti-virus software is best? While I don't have a favorite, two stand out as top choices: McAfee and Norton. Each can search for the five virus types I've mentioned. Buying and using one of these products is not enough, though. Every day, new viruses are discovered. You MUST keep your



anti-virus program updated with the newest virus lists. The two programs I mentioned can do this quite simply through easy Internet updates. For more information on them (and to download trial versions), check out their web sites:

http://www.mcafee.com http://www.norton.com If money is an issue, check out Avast Home Edition (http://www.avast.com). It seems to work just as well,

but doesn't cost you a penny. Most of today's viruses are built on the foundation of an older virus named Happy99. While you won't see this little bug much anymore, it is still the template for most of today's nasty viruses. This bizarre little virus doesn't do any real damage to your system. However, it can be annoying. Here's how it works:

One day you receive an email message from a friend. At the bottom of the message you notice a little attachment called, "happy99.exe" You think to yourself, "Hmmm, must be one of those animated greeting cards." So, you doubleclick on it. And sure enough, you see a pretty little display of fireworks with the message, "Happy 1999."

What you don't notice, however, is that the program has just infected your e-mail program. Now, every time you send a piece of e-mail, the virus automatically attaches itself to the message. You are now unwittingly sending the virus to all of your friends. And if they double-click on it, guess what? They're infected.

I received this virus 20 times in the first few weeks. Each time, I replied back to the sender informing them of the infection. Please note, that I have never been infected with the virus. Receiving it does not automatically mean your system is infected. Only if you double-click on it do you infect your sys-

So, what should do if you receive a Happy99-like virus from a friend? Reply to the message, explaining that their system is infected, and

then delete the message. The Happy99 virus issue does bring up a good point, though. Quite a few hoaxes are going around the Internet these days. Many of them revolve around viruses. For instance, if you've been on the Internet for very long, no doubt, you've received a message claiming to be from someone at Microsoft or IBM. The message warns you not to open a message with the words, "Join the Crew" in the subject. If you do, the message warns, your hard drive will be erased. Hoax.

Variations of this message have made it around the Net. Some of the popular ones warn of the following subjects: "Budweiser Frogs," "Naughty Robot," "Good Times," "Win a Vacation," and "Stand up for Jesus." If a well-meaning friend sends you one of these jokes, please tell them it is a hoax.

Computer viruses are not something to fear. Despite how I may have described them, they are not alive. Viruses are simply programs, created by cretins with too much time on their hands.

I'll see you in Cyberspace.





Grant, a three-year starter at safety from Duncanville, Texas, died Monday night when the car he was in was rammed broadside, said Senior Cpl. Donna Hernandez, a Dallas police spokeswoman. The car was turning across traffic onto an Interstate 45 onramp when it was hit, Hernandez said.

Grant, who was identified by the Dallas County medical examiner's office and school officials, died later at a hospital. Hernandez said the other motorist incurred minor

injuries. "This is a terrible loss for everyone associated with Oklahoma State University and the football family," Gundy said. "Vernon Grant was a terrific young man who had an infectious smile and a positive approach to everything he did. Our thoughts and prayers go out to his family, friends and teammates.'

Grant, 22, started all 12 of the Cowboys' games last season and had 67 tackles, two interceptions, two sacks, two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.



TEXAS A&M COACHING VACANCY

Johnson fired after poor season

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) Veteran Texas A&M baseball coach Mark Johnson was emotionally exhausted, hoarse and just wanted to leave his baseball office behind Monday to spend time with his family after learning he no longer had a job at the university.

"I'm really hurt right now," said Johnson, who took over as the Aggies head coach in 1985. "We've won enough that the expectations are there. I knew we weren't doing well. I wasn't blind to that. I had hoped that it would-

n't be resolved by a termination."
But on Sunday night, after the Aggies fell 11-1 to rival Texas, the long bus ride home was capped for Johnson with the news that he would be replaced.

"You have to man up and say,
'That's the way it is and move on,"
said Johnson, 59. "I'm not going to be

bitter. I love this university. I still do." The Aggies finished ninth in the 10-team Big 12 and had a 30-25-1 overall record.

"I respect and admire Mark for his character, and he has always represented Texas A&M with a great deal of class and integrity," A&M athletic director Bill Byrne said. "However, our baseball program did not meet our expectations, and I feel we need a change in direction.'

During his two decades as head coach, Johnson had a record of 876-433-3. He came to the school in 1983 and served for two years as an assistant coach under Tom Chandler.

Johnson led the Aggies to the College World Series twice (1993 and '99) in 13 NCAA playoff appearances. Texas A&M reached the round of 16

Teammates in shock after Reds let go of closer Danny Graves

CINCINNATI (AP) — Closer Danny Graves was let go by the Cincinnati Reds, a day after he made an obscene hand gesture at a fan taunting him over his latest poor performance.

The club's career saves leader was shocked by the decision to designate him for assignment, a move that ended his eight-year career in Cincinnati. The Reds have 10 days to trade him or put him on waivers.

The Reds had lost 18 of their last 23 games, falling out of contention in the NL Central. General manager Dan O'Brien said that Graves' encounter with the fan wasn't the main reason for the move.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Maurice Cheeks is in transition again, trying to go from popular point guard on the Philadelphia 76ers' last championship team to popular coach on their next one.

After spending 11 seasons as one of the most beloved fan favorites in franchise history and another seven seasons as an assistant under Larry Brown, Cheeks is returning to Philadelphia — this time calling the shots from the bench instead of the floor.

In a surprising move nearly three weeks following the end of their season, the Sixers fired Jim O'Brien on Monday after one sea-

son as coach and replaced him with Cheeks, who was fired this year after nearly four seasons as coach of the Portland Trail Blazers.

"One thing Mo says is, 'I'm coming back, not as Maurice Cheeks the player, but I'm coming back to do the job as a coach and not hang my hat on what I did in the past," Sixers president Billy King said.

Cheeks will be introduced as Philadelphia's 21st head coach at a Tuesday news conference. Terms weren't announced.

Philadelphia is certainly banking on the former point guard to have a happier homecoming than O'Brien, a _ Philadelphia native who

played for Saint Joseph's. O'Brien's stubbornness and seemingly unwavering belief in a system that didn't fit his players cost him his job despite a 43-39 record and a return to the playoffs.

"You've got to look at the style of play and the players and make the system work for them, not force them to work for the system," King said.

O'Brien just finished the first year of a multiyear deal that paid him about \$4 million a year. O'Brien, though, wasn't very popular with his players, who often complained about their roles.

King said after the Sixers were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs by Detroit that he planned to bring O'Brien back. After meeting with his players and other members of management, King had a change of heart and decided over the weekend he had to make a change.

Certainly, King knows a thing or two about making changes - Cheeks will be the fifth Sixers coach in four years under

his watch. Brown left for Detroit following the 2002-03 season, and assistant Randy Avers was promoted and fired 52 games into the 2003-04 season before he was replaced by Chris Ford.

Cheeks, who helped lead the Sixers to an

NBA championship in 1982-83, was a fourtime All-Star with Philadelphia and is still its career leader in assists and steals. Cheeks was part of the staff under Brown when they went to the NBA Finals in 2001 and developed a strong bond with Allen King wanted Cheeks for years and was

the first choice to replace Brown when he quit and left

> for Detroit. Two years ago, Portland denied King's request to interview Cheeks. But Cheeks always remained popular with Philly fans and was at the top of the Sixers' fans short list last year.

> King insisted the move was about hiring the best coach, not making a savvy public relations move.

"It's not about putting fans in the stands," King said. "It's about putting a basketball team on the court that's going to represent the city of Philadelphia in the right

Cheeks was fired March 2 after nearly four seasons as

coach of the Trail Blazers. He had a 162-139 record in Portland, the fourth-highest win total in Blazers history.

Cheeks guided the team to the playoffs his first two seasons, but the players hardly made his tenure easy — on or off the court.

The team was nicknamed the "Jail Blazers" after several brushes with the law, many of them involving marijuana posses-

"If players have problems with Mo Cheeks ... then there's got to be something wrong with those players," King said.

O'Brien led the Sixers to a 10-win improvement from a year ago and they returned to the playoffs, largely on the back of a healthy, happy Iverson.

While O'Brien avoided public spats with Iverson, he didn't have the full support of the rest of the team. Some of the younger players, such as Samuel Dalembert and Willie Green, felt they did not develop like they should have under O'Brien and were unsure about their roles.







