Good-bye, friend

Longtime publisher of The Pampa News dies

Louise Fletcher of Pampa, a pioneer in the field of Texas newspaper publishing, died June 6, 2005, in Pampa.

Services are pending with Carmichael-Whately Funeral Directors.

Fletcher, 73, was the first female newspaper publisher in the State of Texas. She worked at The Pampa Daily News, later renamed The Pampa News, for 44 years. She was publisher of the paper

for 17 of those years.

Fletcher was active in the Salvation Army of Pampa, and was a member of Mary Ellen & Harvester Church of Christ. She was named Pampa Chamber of Commerce Woman of the Year. Fletcher was born Dec. 22, 1931 in Mangum, Okla. She married Ernest Fletcher on July 7, 1948 in Wellington.

Survivors include her husband, Ernest, of the home; one son, Mark Fletcher, and his wife Rhonda, of Amarillo; her mother, Viola Louise

Goodman of Altus, Okla.; two grandchildren, Bradley Fletcher and Jarrett Fletcher, both of Amarillo; three brothers, Tommy Goodman of Mangum, Okla., Ed Goodman of Vernon, and Jerry L. Goodman of Tulsa, Okla.

Soldier finds 'there's no place like home'

Daniel Abernathy's just 22 years old and he's already seen a good part of the world as a soldier with the U.S. Army.

With his travels, he's discovered the truth of an old saying, "There's no place like home."

Abernathy entered military service in June 2001, just days after graduating from Pampa High School. He served four years, including a 13-month stint in Iraq.

"I went in to go to college, to get money for college," Abernathy said. "That was the main thing. After just graduating, it made sense."

His mother, Renee Abernathy, did-

n't want her son to join the military. "Are you sure? Don't sign anything!" she remembers telling him. But she knew he had already made up his mind. "He was so ready to take care of himself."

After four years serving his country, he'll be starting at South Plains College in Lubbock in the fall. He and his younger brother Tommy, a student at Texas Tech, will share a house there. And he plans to earn a degree in the skills he acquired in the Army - electrical engineering.

Abernathy worked as a network system switching operator, setting up telephones, Internet service and other communications systems. He

was in Bravo Company, 121st Signal Battalion of the First Infantry Division.

"We kept everything connected," he said, a smile crossing his face.

He was stationed in Kitzingen, Germany, for three years, before being deployed to Baqubah, Iraq, a small community northeast of Baghdad. He arrived in Iraq in February 2004 and returned in March 2005.

"I wasn't too happy about going. I guess no one ever is. But I'm glad I did now," he said.

In the 13 months he was in Iraq, Abernathy saw a decrease in hostilities.

"Where we were, we saw mortar attacks every night," he said. "At the last, they were cooling off a little bit. There's a bunch of roadside bombs, still."

He saw summer temperatures top 140 degrees Fahrenheit. They had to wear full uniforms, helmet and body armor, despite the intense heat.

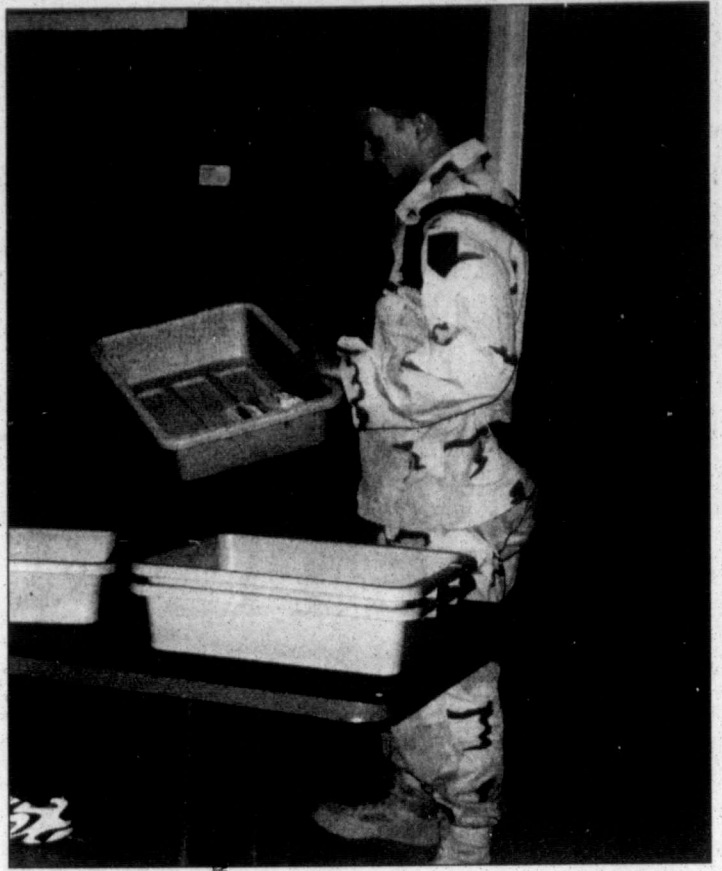
"You just stay in the shade as much as you can," he said, adding that the soldiers drank lots of bottled water.

Sandstorms were common. He experienced the first one while in Kuwait before going into Iraq.

The winds blew so hard, it blew away one of the tents.

"People were running around trying to get their stuff," he said.

The sand isn't grainy like he'd seen in Texas. "It was

get out and engage them. We're just supposed to shoot from the truck. They shot my truck up pretty good. I shot back at them."

His truck wasn't armored. It had vinyl doors on the sides, he said. Luckily, the insurgents shot the front of the truck and behind the doors.

He didn't realize his good fortune until later.

"I didn't think about (what had happened) until later on that day," he said.

One night, insurgents tried to invade their camp.

"We ran out to the outer

television and keep up with current events. He missed Texas' thunderstorms.

While stationed in Germany, he traveled around France, Spain and Germany. He skied in the Alps and attended Oktoberfest in Munich, Germany.

"I saw everything there, but at the last I was ready to come back to Texas," he said. "It was a nice place to visit, but I wouldn't want to live there."

He expressed his gratitude for the care packages he received from his hometown, including a box full of Girl Scout cookies.

A box sent by Travis Elementary didn't catch up with him until he got back home, but he appreciates it, all the same.

"It was always real exciting to get mail," he said, adding that all the soldiers looked forward to mail call every day.

His parents, Doug and Renee, are glad to have their

son home safe and sound. "He went away a boy and he came back a man, without me getting to see it," Renee said with a trace of wistfulness in her voice.

"He has a calmness and patience about him, a thing the military brought to him," she said, adding, "He's more likely to take care of us than us take care of him. That's a strange turn-around for us."

more like moon dust than sand," Abernathy said.

The young soldier got his first taste of war while driving in a convoy from Kuwait to Baqubah.

"We were getting close to a town. It was small, probably didn't even have a name, and a few guys jumped up from behind a berm and started shooting at us," he remembered.

"We're not supposed to

wall. It was made of cement. (The insurgents) came in a little bit, but they never got close to the inside where the people were. We were sitting on the outer wall waiting for guys to come by. I'll never forget that," he said.

"Those are my two war stories, I tell everybody," he finished with a grin.

"I'm real glad to be home," Abernathy said. He appreciates getting to watch

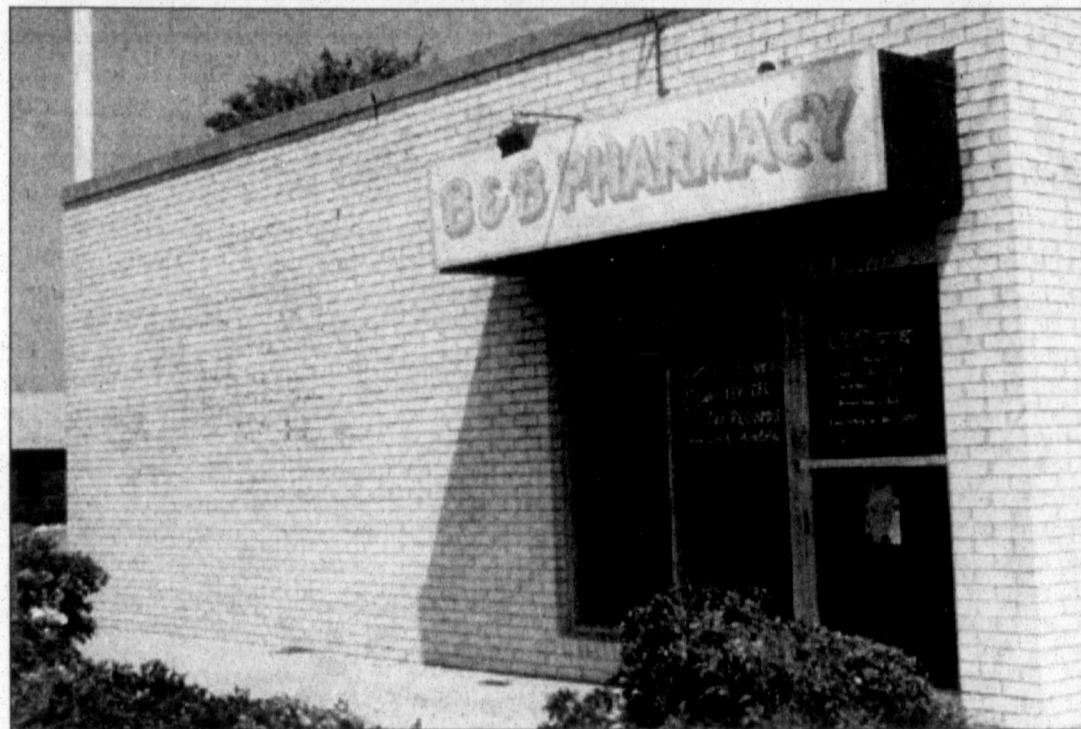

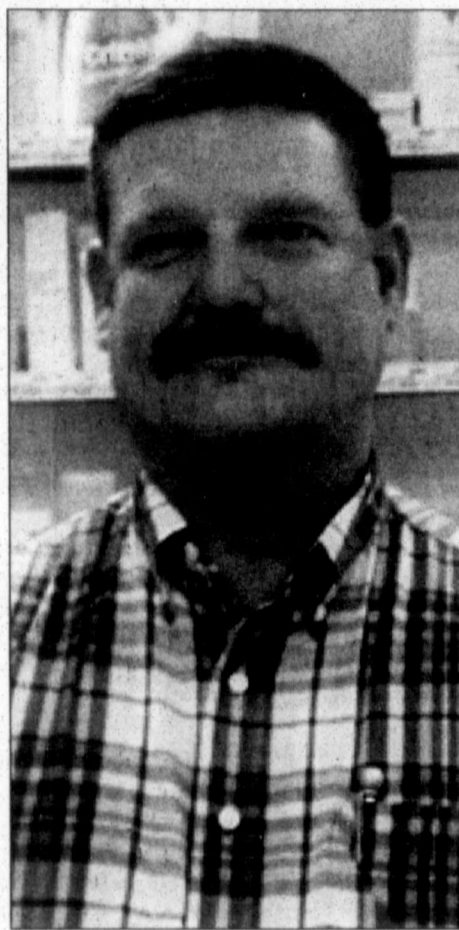

Monday was an important day in many ways

Yesterday was a day of significance for me for several reasons.

First of all, it was the anniversary of D-Day, one of the most important days of World War II.

Most significantly for me, it was my wedding anniversary. My husband marked the day with a rose for each year of our marriage.

Sadly, it was also the day Louise Fletcher died.

Louise was the publisher of The Pampa News for many years, working her way up to that position from the bookkeeping department.

She was captain of this ship all through my previous two stints here as lifestyles

editor, throughout the 1980s.

Many people would agree that Louise was The Pampa News. She kept her finger on the pulse of each department, providing leadership and support to everyone.

I don't know about others who worked here at that time, but Louise never, never lost her temper with me or handled me in any way other than with kid gloves. Perhaps she realized that that was usually all it took to steer me.

I think one reason that approach worked was because people who truly deal from a position of strength don't need to bluster or make a scene or get loud. They obviously have the

power, so no convincing is necessary. Louise had what it took.

Louise would say complimentary things to others about me, and I know she meant them. She also had a keen sense of humor and a piercingly sharp wit. She could be as dry as dust when she chose. She could also use those tools as weapons, but had the good judgment to reserve them for whoever or whatever most deserved them.

Louise always dressed tastefully and stylishly. She

always had flawless makeup and a perfect hairdo. She also had an expressive face, and a distinctive voice. I can see and hear her responding to some absurdity to this day.

Louise was a good friend of the Salvation Army. She supported that endeavor in every way she could. I remember her efforts to help others through that agency, and she seemed to never tire of her involvement.

One of my most memorable car rides was in Louise's red Toyota. I had

not been working here for very long, and thus had not heard about or witnessed Louise's motoring skills for myself.

Innocent as a lamb to the slaughter, I accepted the offer of a ride in Louise's car out to M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium for some function or other which we were both going to attend.

I got into the front passenger seat, and aged about a decade in the course of the next 10 minutes.

Piloting an automobile was one of the few things that Louise, bless her heart, never did master. The rules of the road escaped her.

She would stop at intersections when she wasn't the

one to stop, and go through others when she was supposed to yield.

The highlight of that short, wild ride was the journey through the intersection of Somerville and Hobart streets.

My claw marks might even be visible to this day in that car. I was silently screaming as I hooked my fingernails and fingers into the upholstery and door trim of the Toyota, my feet pressing an imaginary brake pedal, as Louise cruised through the red light, across Hobart street.

Our guardian angels were with us that day, because we

Don't dismiss a computer game just because it is a year or two old. Some games are so good, they deserve a purchase years from their creation. Here are my favorite "bargain bin" games. If you find them, snap them up!

Freedom Force

I found this game at Wal-Mart for the bucks and have been hooked for weeks. The game puts you in the persona of a 1960s superhero. The 3-D graphics are incredible, as are the sounds and music. What makes the game so much fun (at least for me) is the "destructible environment." Are your superpowers not working against a

particular baddie? Why not grab that nearby lamppost and belt him into next week. Or, knock down the building he's standing on. Everything in the game can be used or destroyed.

Besides a large, built-in list of characters, you can create your own superheroes for customized fights. As you progress through scenarios, prestige points are earned. They can later be cashed in for more powerful abilities. The icing on the

cake, though, is the tongue-in-cheek humor injected throughout the game. You'll see (and hear) all the "Pow!s," "Boff!s," and "Kablam!s" requisite in any superhero show.

Diablo

Considered one of the most influential fantasy role-playing games of all time, Blizzard's Diablo combines superb graphics, excellent game play, and an intuitive interface. You choose to play the role of either warrior,

rogue, or sorcerer, as you lurk through dark, dank dungeons, hunting for treasure.

The movie-like cut-scenes are second-to-none (how's that for hyphen-mania?) and beat many of today's games for quality. The game comes with built-in, Internet multiplayer support guaranteeing long-life on your PC. If you look hard, you'll find this gem for eight or nine bucks.

Myst Masterpiece Edition

I cut my teeth on this game. It's incredible graphics mesmerized me for hours...nay, weeks on end.

Violence in Mexico affects U.S., too

Another day. Another story. Mexico's violence doesn't seem to subside.

The Dallas Morning News' Tracey Eaton reported last week that at least 550 people have died in drug-related executions in Mexico this year. And 300 of the drugland slayings have been in Mexican states bordering the United States.

We're only in June, mind you. No telling what the figures will look like by December.

Mexico's violence directly affects families in Nuevo Laredo, Juárez and Tijuana, who must live with the fear. Indirectly, this chaos could

affect Dallas, too, as well as the rest of the United States. It could change Mexico's politics in a way that isn't necessarily good for the U.S.

A U.S. official tells us Mexico's violence is popping up in talk about the race to succeed President Vicente Fox next summer. Despite major arrests, Mr. Fox and his center-right National Action Party are struggling to contain the violence. The more they falter, the more the left-

ist Party of the Democratic Revolution can turn this into a political issue.

The PRD's likely candidate, former Mexico City Mayor Andrés Manuel

López Obrador,

is running hot in opinion polls. He could

make the violence another plank in his platform, even though Mexico City has had its share of kidnappings, robberies and murders.

What's concerning about the left rebounding is that

have enjoyed a rewarding economic relationship. It would be a pity to jeopardize it. We know Mr. López Obrador says he'll abide by the North American Free Trade Agreement, but it's hard to see him championing free trade in the manner of Mr. Fox or his predecessor, President Ernesto Zedillo.

Mr. Fox's first obligation is to his citizens. He needs to control crime for their sake. But in the background, there's another reason to curb the violence: A resurgent left in Mexico would not be a good next step.

The cheaper sales deals are bringing buyers from diverse locations and ages.

"We have had a few with Halliburton, a few with Celanese, but it is not any one huge influx with one company," Edwards said. "We are also having a few people move to Pampa to retire, and we have had several out-of-town buyers who have purchased property to rent."

"It is hard to say when the market will slow down," Edwards said, adding that she feels sales have already begun to cool slightly.

"I think the reason the market's fast pace has retracted a little is because of the lack of listings. We just don't have that many houses in the \$50,000 to \$100,000 price range, our most popular range."

In order to correct the lack

of listings, Edwards said that more new houses should be built; however, she added that the city needs to expand utility services further north before this can be done.

"Our problem with building is that we do not have many lots, and we can't develop any further north until the sewer is extended. I don't think, until this is done, we will get more developers," she said. "But I

know if the houses are built, they will sell."

Although construction is slow and the listings are running slim, Edwards hopes that

the market will last at least through summer.

"Our busiest time is normally around June and July. I don't think that should be an exception this year. I am pretty confident that the sales increase will last at least through then," she said. "But regardless of when it dies down, it has been great for our business and the town."

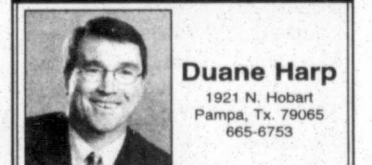
made it across with no mishaps. But that was the first, and last time, I ever rode in a vehicle when Louise was behind the wheel.

If you haven't heard of it (where have you been?), Myst is a game of puzzles. You find yourself in the middle of a graphically rich and immersive island, full of strange contraptions and creatures. The interface is simple. You click the mouse wherever you want to go, or to pick up an item.

The Masterpiece Edition improves on the original game by increasing the level of detail in the graphics. A help guide also exists to assist you if a puzzle becomes too frustrating. You should find copies of this game going for around eight bucks.

Myth II: Worlds — The Definitive Myth II Collection

Don't confuse "Myst" with "Myth." They are very different games intended for very different gamers. Myth II is a real-time strategy game, allowing you to control large armies of "creatures" in

huge campaigns. The graphics are exceptional, almost too much so. One of the drawbacks (at least in some squeamish gamer's minds) is the amount of blood shown. After any particular battle, the ground is completely "spattered red." Yuck. However, if you can get past the gore, the playability is excellent. Look for a price of six bucks.

The Incredible Machine: Even More Contraptions

Ever hear of Rube Goldberg? He was a Pulitzer Prize winning cartoonist back in the 40's. Through his "gadgets", Rube Goldberg discovered difficult ways to achieve easy results. His cartoons were, as he said, "symbols of man's capacity for exerting maximum effort to accomplish minimal results." Rube believed that there were two ways to do things: the simple way and the hard way, and that a surprisingly number of people preferred doing things the hard way. To that end, he drew complex "inventions" made up of gears, pulleys, handles, cups, rods, and even bowling balls. By starting one piece of his gad-

et in motion, and through a series of fascinating mechanical events, a simple task would be performed. (Think of the breakfast-making machine in Chitty Chitty Bang Bang).

Anyway, this game follows that line of thinking by giving you a seemingly random set of objects. Within a certain time limit you have to assemble them to achieve some goal. Your objects include everything from a monkey on a conveyor belt to multi-colored lasers. Loads of fun and very addictive. You'll shell out ten bucks for all this fun.

Most of the titles you'll find in the bargain bin are there for a reason: They're dreck. However, every now and then, a reputable software vendor will quietly slash the price on a piece of software treasure. Keep your eyes open.

I'll see you in Cyberspace!

Tucker was treated at the scene then transported to Lubbock where there was some early concern regarding a spinal injury. That concern seems to have subsided at this time.

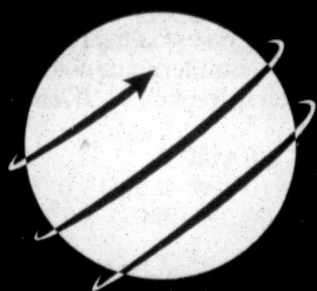

Dallas auto dealer sues Time

ATLANTA — A Dallas auto dealer who lost his bid to buy the Atlanta Hawks and Atlanta Thrashers filed a lawsuit Monday against the struggling franchises' former parent company, Time Warner Inc., and accused the media conglomerate of renegeing on the deal.

David McDavid also alleges in the lawsuit in Fulton County Superior Court that Time Warner and subsidiary Turner Broadcasting System Inc. revealed his confidential business plans to a competing group of investors who ultimately bought basketball's Hawks and hockey's Thrashers for \$250 million.

McDavid wants Time Warner and TBS to pay him the difference between the price the teams were bought for, which is similar to what he had agreed to pay, and what the teams are actually worth, which some believe is much more.

"We believe we would have had instant equity," McDavid lawyer Jason Freier said.

The suit does not specify an amount, but Freier said damages are in the hundreds of millions. Analysts had said before the deal that the Hawks, Thrashers and baseball's Atlanta Braves, also owned by Time Warner, together were worth about \$750 million.

A Turner spokeswoman, Shirley Powell, declined to comment, saying the company and its lawyers hadn't reviewed the lawsuit yet.

Time Warner's sale of the two teams and operating rights to Philips Arena to Atlanta Spirit LLC to help pay off the company's heavy debt was completed in March 2004.

The nine-person ownership group of investors from Atlanta, Boston and Washington includes Steve Belkin, founder and chairman of the Boston-based marketing and investing company Trans National Group, and Beau Turner, the youngest son of Turner founder Ted Turner.

The elder Turner previously owned the teams and baseball's Braves but lost control through a series of corporate mergers.

McDavid began exclusive talks to buy the teams in April 2003. With McDavid still believing his offer would work out, Time Warner suddenly changed course a few months later.

In the lawsuit, McDavid said his deal to buy the teams was ratified by Time Warner's board. He said that upon gaining access to his confidential business plans and financial models, Time Warner reneged and sold the teams to Atlanta Spirit.

The lawsuit accuses Time Warner and Turner of breach of contract, fraud and misappropriation of trade secrets, among other things.

"In this deal that unfolded over the course of a year, we had the best people in the business working through to understand what the real value of these teams were," Freier said in an interview.

Freier said consultants McDavid hired during the negotiation process believed the teams and Philips Arena were worth hundreds of millions of dollars more than what McDavid had contracted to pay for the teams.

Freier declined to be more specific. In connection with the sale, Turner Broadcasting said it would retain 15 percent ownership of Atlanta Spirit, but would have no say in operations.

FIGHTING THROUGH THE PAIN

Sore ankles and all, Duncan seems to hit stride in playoffs

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Tim Duncan seems to be peaking at the right time.

The San Antonio Spurs' star forward posted his lowest numbers as a pro this year, and then missed a dozen late-season games with a sprained ankle. But Duncan's production has steadily increased in each of the three playoff rounds as his health has improved.

In the Western Conference finals against Phoenix, he averaged 27.4 points and nearly 14 rebounds. He topped 30 points in three of the five games against the Suns, a telling statistic given that he reached that figure only seven times in 66 regular season games.

Duncan will be playing in his third NBA Finals in seven years, and while the Phoenix series showed he still can dominate at both ends of the court, he's just as willing to be a role player.

"The key with Timmy is that he is very unselfish. He doesn't care who's going to take the shot, who's going to be the guy with the basket to win the game," point guard Tony Parker said. "He's willing to share, and he always knows that the ball is going to come back to him. I think that's what makes him great."

The numbers support Parker's view — Duncan has averaged three assists per game in the playoffs, also up from his regular-season total.

"He knows that he needs help," Parker added. "Because he's our star and he's playing like that, it brings a mentality to our team."

The Spurs will have had eight days off by the time the Finals against the Detroit Pistons start in San Antonio on Thursday.

Duncan says he will come out with the same focus he had in the Phoenix series.

"There's always questions about losing your sharpness and all that stuff," he said. "It doesn't really matter. When that game starts, the only thing that matters is that 48 minutes you're out there."

Spurs reserve Robert Horry, going for his sixth championship ring, says Duncan's genuine lack of concern about getting his points makes him stand out among the league's superstar big men.

"He just lets the game come to him," said Horry, whose earlier titles were won in Houston with Hakeem Olajuwon and Los Angeles with Shaquille O'Neal. "Most big men, they feel like the best way to help a team is if they score, but he's so set in his ways that if he scores, good, if he doesn't and we win, he don't care."

As well as he's been playing, Duncan says the Spurs' playoff experience as a team has been more important.

"Not only with myself, but with Rob and Tony's been there, Manu (Ginobili) has been there and guys that have been down that road before," he said. "People aren't in awe and in shock. ... Guys won't be as nervous now that they understand the situation."

Nazr Mohammed, acquired from the New York Knicks late in the season, will be playing in his first Finals and he's glad it's alongside Duncan. "If you're open, he hits you. He waits for the double team, kicks it out, he guards on every possession," said Mohammed. "He does the little things and the big things."
