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
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Officers find ton of weed in onions

Over a ton of marijuana, the largest load ever seized in the Amarillo area, was discovered by Texas Department of Public Safety troopers Tuesday afternoon near Shamrock on Interstate 40, according to a DPS news release.

At 3 p.m., commercial vehicle enforcement troopers stopped a 2001 Freightliner traveling eastbound on the interstate to conduct a routine

safety inspection.

"The troopers became suspicious after visiting with the driver and checking his bill of lading.

Troopers received a verbal consent to check the trailer and to verify load securement," said Trooper Wayne Beighle, public information officer in the DPS Amarillo office, in the release.

Troopers noticed that a load of

onions in the trailer had partially fallen over and had not been completely loaded to the front of the

"Upon further inspection, 98 bundles of marijuana in cardboard boxes, wrapped in cellophane, were discovered in the front of the trailer," Beighle said.

The marijuana weighed 2,377 pounds and has an estimated value of \$5,942,000, he said.

Heriberto Armendariz, 33, El Paso, and Peter Werner Corzo, 31, St. Compton, Calif., were arrested and booked into Wheeler County Jail on drug charges.

Troopers believe the load originated in El Paso and was headed for Streator, Ill., Beighle said.

Former **DA** files waiver

Richard J. Roach, former 31st and 223rd district attorney, filed a waiver of arraignment last Thursday concerning the two indictments against him on state charges of possession of controlled substance with intent to deliver, according to 31st District Attorney Lynn Switzer.

Roach is currently in Randall County Jail awaiting transportation to a federal prison to begin serving a five-year sentence, handed down June 1 in Amarillo, on a federal firearms charge.

The two indictments were handed up May 17 by a Gray County grand jury. One indictment concerns methamphetamine, and the other specifies cocaine.

Each of the two state charges is a first degree felony and could carry a sentence of 10 years to 99 years or life, according to David Scott, a Perryton attorney named as special

Pampa Fire Department in conjunction with the International Association of Fire Chiefs, International Association

of Firefighters and United States Fire Administration call for a June 21, 2005, "Stand Down" for Firefighter Safety.

These partnering fire service organizations are calling for all fire departments in the nation to conduct a "stand down" for firefighter safety beginning Tuesday, June 21. As of May 1, 2005 there have been 50 line-of-duty deaths - that is 10 more than at this same time last year.

"This is the first time we've done a stand down since I've been chief," said Pampa Fire Chief Kim Powell.

A stand down is a method used by the military to correct an issue that has been identified as a problem throughout its ranks. PFD and the other partners are participating with fire departments across the nation in suspending all non-emergency activity and focus entirely on firefighter safety.

Powell said the city's fire department will review its standard operating procedures, make detailed equipment checks and study

> the department's current accountability systems.

> "We'll also be working with our engine and equipment procedures and how we are keeping up with our people at all times," she said.

In addition, fire officials plan to review universal precautions for when firefighters are providing medical assistance, she said.

This will give PFD the opportunity to talk about causes of line-of-duty deaths; double check all apparatus and equipment; discuss health and safety regulations; review fire ground safety issues; and take stock of training exercises and fitness goals.



In addition, the salon handles a selection of lotions and scrubs for the hands and feet and keeps a stock of cuticle oil on hand for customers to purchase.





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
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
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

Michael needs to look at man in the mirror

who Michael Jackson is has some opinion on whether he really did molest children.

The pop singer was acquitted yesterday of 10 criminal counts relating to child sexual molestation.

A jury in Santa Maria, Calif., deliberated 32 hours before declaring Jackson not guilty of four counts of lewd conduct with a child younger than 14; one count of attempted lewd conduct; four counts of administering alcohol to facilitate child molestation; and one count of conspiracy to commit child abduction, false imprisonment or extortion.

The recently completed trial is not the first time

Most anyone who knows Jackson has been accused of bling a bit for Michael. His child molestation. But it is the closest he has yet come, I think, to being jailed on criminal charges related to such accusations.

There is no doubt Jackson is extremely talented. He is a genius with music and choreography, and can make dance moves that defy the laws of physics. Remember

it so easy to believe the worst of him.

There's his appearance. Over the years, his skin tone has gradually lightened until now he appears very pale indeed. This has been attributed to a medical condition, and if that is true, it cannot be held against him.

The plastic surgery is another matter. Over the years, Michael's face has undergone a startling transformation. His nose has been narrowed and reshaped until now it is almost no more than a knife blade seen on edge. His lips are different, and he has a much squarer chin, complete with a cleft in the middle, and dimples in his cheeks.

I don't think there's anything wrong with plastic surgery, per se. I just think Michael has gone so far with it that he has caused himself a great deal of physical pain and lasting damage in order to make drastic, abnormal changes in his appearance.

Is that the meaning of "Man In The Mirror?"

What Michael has had done to his appearance, however, should have no bearing on whether he is found guilty or innocent. But people are only human, and when they look at Michael, they see someone who will go to great lengths to accomplish a goal that many people see as undesirable and/or unnatural.



Closing down prison won't help image, prominent Republicans say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Prominent Senate Republicans said Tuesday that closing the Guantanamo Bay prison will not fix a U.S. image tarnished by allegations of American troops mistreating terrorism suspects.

"To cut and run because of image problems is the wrong, wrong thing to do," Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist said.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., said there's no doubt that the United States has an image problem because of allegations of abuse and torture at the prison in Cuba.

He added: "The key to this is to move the judicial process forward so that these individuals will be brought to trial for any crime that they are accused of rather than residing in Guantanamo facility in perpetuity."

A few of their GOP colleagues are raising questions about keeping the prison in Cuba open, arguing that it has given the country a bad name abroad and undermined the war on terrorism.

Answering the critics, Vice President Dick Cheney on Monday said that war-onterror detainees would continue to be held at Guantanamo, even as the White House said all options for prison's future were on the table.

Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., tried to turn the Guantanamo debate into a broader indictment of how the administration handles detainees. He said administration policies have "caused tremendous damage to American credibility around the world and placed our troops at greater risk."

Over the past few days, several Republicans have acknowledged an image problem at Guantanamo. But they also have said that shutting down the facility, which one human-rights group likened to a "gulag," is not the answer.

"Reform it, don't close it," said Sen. Lindsey Graham of South Carolina, a GOP member of the Armed Services Committee. On Monday, he said the prison is dysfunctional. "It's hurting the war effort. The image of it is as a place where there's a lack of rule and lack of procedures," he

grams by their amount of "use." Look through the list and "Remove" any programs you don't need. Don't fret if you make a mistake. You can always blow the dust off that old CD and re-install it later.

Re-Zone Your Land

Speaking of Windows 2000/XP, consider changing your hard drive's file structure to NTFS (New Technology File System). The standard file format on most hard drives is called FAT32 (sounds like a rapper doesn't it?). NTFS can more efficiently handle large often-used files than FAT32. Better still, NTFS adds more security and reliability to your system. Only one draw-Windows back exists, though: 95/98/ME will not recognize drives formatted as NTFS. So, only consider this option with higher versions

To see which file structure your hard

drive is currently set to, double-click on "My Computer," right-click on a drive, and choose "Properties." Converting a FAT32 system to NTFS is very easy. Click the Start button, Programs, Accessories, and then "Command Prompt." Type the follow-

CONVERT C: /FS:NTFS /V

You can, of course, replace the "C:" with any drive letter. This process takes a while, so you might consider starting this task right before bedtime. Open the Spigot All the Way

Make sure you are taking full advantage of your hard drive's DMA (Direct Memory Access) pipeline. In simple English, by using DMA transfer methods, your hard drive can bypass the microprocessor when moving large amounts of data into memory. Chances are, your hard drive is already installed with this option turned on. However, it

doesn't hurt to check. Get ready, we're diving deep this time: Click on Start/ Settings/ Control Panel /System /Hardware /Device

Manager, and then double-clicking on your IDE ATA/ATAPI controller. Double-click on your Primary IDE channel and choose "Advanced Settings." Make sure "DMA if available" is selected in the drop-down menu.

Yes, "Defrag" is a Word

Finally, make sure to defrag your system regularly. I won't go into the particulars of what "defragging is" simply because I covered that in the last column. To use Microsoft's utility, click Start/ Programs/ Accessories/ System Tools/ Disk Defragmenter.

Next week, I'll continue this "speed up your dinosaur" segment with cost effective upgrades that will put off the new-system-purchase for a year or two. Until then...

DEAR ABBY: I have been a practicing architect for 40 years, and I've built facilities and homes to ADA (Americans With Disabilities Act) standards.

A lot of people build their dream house later in life. A house built with stock cabinets 6 inches lower, sit-down counters, 36-inch doors and other design features that could later be wheelchair-accessible will allow enjoyment of their dream home for 15 or 20 years longer than otherwise, should the person later become disabled. Further, such a house would bring a premium price on the resale market. In fact, I'm sure Paula's mother would someday in

the future, as age takes its toll, be extremely happy to visit such a house. --ARCHITECT IN NEW JERSEY **DEAR ARCHITECT:** Thank you for sharing your expertise.

DEAR ABBY: Paula is building her dream home at 43. This could be her FRP (final resting place). It should be designed to suit her needs. Forget about the resale value. In 20 or more years, when someone buys it, it will be time to install a new kitchen, and the new owners can have standard-height cabinets and countertops put in during the remodeling. 
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



Michael Jackson, a free man, acquitted on all counts

SANTA MARIA, Calif. (AP) — Basking in the jurors' decision to acquit his client of all counts, Michael Jackson's lawyer said Tuesday the singer will no longer share his bed with young boys.

"He's not going to do that anymore," attorney Thomas Mesereau Jr. told NBC's "Today." "He's not going to make himself vunerable to this anymore."

Jackson was found not guilty Monday of child molestation, conspiracy and other counts. Jurors said the accusations of a young boy and his family were not credible - a total legal victory that triggered jubilation among the pop star's fans attorney's office. Mesereau said the singer was still recovering from the ordeal.

"He's going to take it one day at a time. It's been a terrible, terrible process for him," Mesereau said Tuesday.

A raucous welcome greeted Jackson as he returned to his Neverland Ranch on Monday afternoon. As a convoy of black SUVs carrying him and his entourage pulled through the gates, his sister La Toya rolled down a window, smiled widely and waved. The crowd responded with a euphoric cheer.

"All of us here and millions around the world love and support and embarrassment for the district you," proclaimed a banner strung

"He's just not guilty of the crimes he's been charged with," said Ray Hultman, who told The Associated Press he was one of three people on the 12-person panel who voted to acquit only after the other nine persuaded them there was reasonable doubt about the entertainer's guilt in this particular case.

Prosecutors presented testimony about Jackson's allegedly improper relationships with several boys in the early 1990s, including the son of a maid who testified that Jackson molested him during tickling session between 1987 and 1990.

The attack in Kirkuk was allegedly claimed in an Internet posting by al-Qaida in Iraq, and it came as the Shiite-dominated government of Prime Minister Ibrahim al-Jaafari received a near overwhelming vote of confidence in the Iraqi National Assembly on a promise to help restore security to violence-torn Iraq.

Al-Jaafari's 37-member government, announced on April 28, was approved by a show of hands in the 275member parliament.

Although it has made quashing the insurgency its top priority, his government has been criticized for its seeming inability to stop a wave of attacks that have killed more than 1,000 people since its inception.

Security forces captured a reported key member of Abu-Musab al-Zarqawi's al-Qaida in Iraq terrorist group who is accused of building and selling cars used by suicide bombers, the Iraqi government said Tuesday.

He was identified as Jassim Hazan Hamadi al-Bazi, also known as Abu Ahmed, and was arrested June 7, the gov-

Aruba releases ex- guards; focus changes to trio in mystery of missing Alabama teen

ORANJESTAD, Aruba (AP) — Authorities freed two former hotel security guards detained after Natalee Holloway vanished, intensifying the focus Tuesday on three younger men who took the Alabama teenager to a beach before she disappeared.

Officials who confirmed the release of Antonius "Mickey" John, 30, and Abraham Jones, 28, late Monday declined to comment on whether they were making progress in solving the mystery of Holloway's disappearance on the Dutch Caribbean island during a student trip.

"The investigation is ongoing," Attorney General Caren Janssen told The Associated

Justice authorities refused to comment further Tuesday. But government spokesman Ruben Trapenberg said the release of the men "probably means they had nothing to do with this case and prosecutors were able to check out their alibis."

The release came after the mother, Betty Holloway Twitty, told AP she believed the two ex-security

Monday seeking an order for their release, but they were let go before a judge reviewed the motions, according to lawyer, Noraina John's

"These guys had nothing to do with this case and this decision reflects that," Pietersz said.

No one has been charged, and lawyers for the three men still in custody and the two freed men all say their clients are innocent

"I'm very happy but also disappointed," John said by telephone after his release from detention that began June 5. "I knew from day one that I was innocent."

Holloway vanished early May 30, hours before she was expected at the airport to return home after a five-day vacation with 124 classmates and seven chaperones celebrating graduation from Mountain Brook, Ala., High School. Her U.S. passport and packed bags were found in her room.

John and Jones, who had worked as security guards at a nearby hotel, were detained after the three young men said they dropped her off and last saw her around 2 a.m. being approached in the car park of her hotel by a black man in a security guard uniform.

Holloway Twitty said if she did not see results soon, she might start to believe authorities were trying to protect the young men, who told police they took the 18year-old Holloway to a beach after an evening of dancing and drinking, hours before she disappeared.

One of the three is a 17year-old Dutch honors student at Aruba International School who is the son of a high-ranking judicial official in Aruba and whose detained friends told police he was kissing and fondling the girl in the back of the car when they went to the beach.

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
