

County OKs new employee By MARILYN POWERS

Gray County commissioners gave County Clerk Susan Winborne approval this morning to hire an employee to replace one who retired at the end of April.

Commissioners met at 9 a.m. today in the second-floor courtroom of the county courthouse.

Winborne had asked permission to hire a replacement for Carolyn Law at commissioners' April 1 meeting. Commissioners asked her at that meeting to try working without a replacement for a short period of time to see whether her office could function sufficiently well with fewer staff.

"We have tried it for a month and a half. I feel like we're getting further behind all the time," Winborne told commissioners this morning.

A new arrangement for maintaining the proper amount of collateralization through bond transactions Hefley was approved.

Bond transactions under the newly approved method would not have to wait for written


approval before being completed. A contract with the state Attorney General's office was extended through Aug. 31, 2006.

Hoover VFD gets grant for new truck

Hoover Volunteer Fire Department has been awarded a \$54,000 grant from the Texas Forestry Service for a new fire truck.

"This will be our first new truck. We've never had a new truck before," said Hoover VFD Fire Chief Joe Millican at this morning's Gray County commissionmeeting when he

announced the grant. The truck will be used to fight grass and brush fires in rural areas of Gray and Roberts counties.

"It will take about five to six months to put together the truck components and get it built. We have to decide what size tanks, which truck, and all the components. We'll have to put it together ourselves," Millican said.

The grant is a 90/10 split, meaning that Hoover VFD will have to pay about \$5,400 of the total cost of the new truck in order to use the grant money.

"This is not taxpayers money. It is coming through insurance compa-

Hemphill Co. water district juggles competing interests

CANADIAN – A management plan was the main topic of conversation at the Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District Tuesday night.

With both Mesa Water, Inc., and the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority bidding on water rights in Hemphill County, the water district's management plan is key to water development projects there.

Following a three-hour management plan work session with the district's manager and board of directors, Bob Harden, an Austin hydrologist familiar with the Ogallala Aquifer, commended the district for their openness and willingness to hear and discuss a variety of ideas.

"They purposefully started with a clean slate," Harden said. "They're working diligently through the process."

He said he thinks the district will develop

a management plan that will balance various competing interests.

Harden has been hired by Mesa Water to monitor the district's rule-making process.

Mesa Water, headed by Roberts County rancher and Dallas businessman Boone Pickens, is buying water rights in an effort to sell water downstate to San Antonio or cities in the Metroplex area.

The Canadian River Municipal Water Authority provides water to its 11 member cities, including Pampa.

Both entities have extensive water rights in Roberts County.

Mesa recently announced the purchase of 90,000 acres of water in Gray and Roberts counties and 10,000 acres of water rights in Hemphill County. The purchase is contingent on the landowners being able to obtain well permits.

Marty Jones, an Amarillo attorney repre-

Consumer prices drop last month

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer prices fell 0.1 percent in May, the first decline in 10 months as energy prices retreated after a big run-up in the previous three months.

The Labor Department reported Wednesday that the decline in its closely watched Consumer Price Index followed big gains of 0.4 percent in February, 0.6 percent in March and 0.5 percent in April. Those increases had been driven by a surge in energy costs this year as crude oil prices hit all-time highs in early April.

Analysts had expected inflation would moderate in May, given recent declines in energy prices, but the outright drop came as a surprise. They had been forecasting a small 0.1 percent increase. Outside of food and energy, inflation remained well contained as well with a modest increase of just 0.1 percent.

Another government report showed that production at the nation's factories, mines and utilities rose a solid 0.4 percent in May, reversing a 0.3 percent decline in April. The increase reflected a big 0.6 percent jump in output in manufacturing as auto production stopped falling and other sectors actually posted increases.

Output at the nation's mines, a category that includes oil production, rose by 0.1 percent while production at utility plants fell by 0.7 percent after an even bigger 2.4 percent decline in April.

The 0.4 percent overall gain in industrial production was double the 0.2 percent increase that economists had been expecting. It left U.S. industry operating at 79.4 percent of capacity in May, up from an operating rate of 79.1 percent in April.

The moderation in inflation pressures in May helped boost the incomes of American workers. Weekly earnings of nonsupervisory workers after adjusting for inflation rose by 0.3 percent in May compared to April.

That gain followed three straight monthly declines. However, workers' weekly pay is 0.3 percent lower than it was a year ago.

The Commerce Department reported that business inventories held on shelves and backlots rose by 0.3 percent, a slowdown from the gains of the previous several months. Analysts are looking for inventory building, which added significantly to economic growth in the first quarter, to slow in the current quarter.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - NASA returned the nal fuel tank after the super-chilled fuel was loaded. space shuttle Discovery to the launch pad today for the first mission since the Columbia disaster, after replacing the external fuel tank with a new model designed to prevent dangerous ice buildup.

Shuttle managers are aiming for a liftoff as early as July 13. Discovery's four-mile trek from the assembly building to the launch pad aboard the giant shuttle transporter took more than nine hours.

The morning trip was halted several times because of overheated bearings in the transporter, and the speed fell below the usual mile per hour.

"A little bit of deja vu — we've done this before, we're doing it again," vehicle manager Stephanie Stilson said as Discovery crept to the pad. The shuttle team was disheartened

when it had to haul Discovery off the pad last month for more work, but understood it was the right thing to do, Stilson said. "Today was not quite the excitement of

the first time, but still, what a great thrill to be back on track, moving in the right direction, getting ready for launch, getting back out to the pad," she said.

Discovery was transported to the pad in April but removed May 26 after NASA determined that potentially deadly pieces of ice could form over an expansion joint on the exter-

Managers decided to install a heater at the joint, located along the feed line for liquid oxygen.

Falling chunks of ice could be even more menacing than pieces of the fuel tank's insulating foam, which was responsible for Columbia's Today was not quite

destruction during re-entry and the deaths of seven astronauts 2 1/2 years ago. Because of their focus on keeping big chunks of foam from coming off the tank during liftoff, engineers did not realize the ice threat until April. NASA replaced Discovery's fuel tank

with one intended for Atlantis on the second post-Columbia flight, because it was quicker to add a heater to the expansion joint on that second tank.

Discovery also got the two booster rockets intended for Atlantis.

Stilson said Discovery should now be the safest shuttle to ever fly, with all the other safety modifications made in the wake of the Columbia catastrophe.

NASA is still assessing the potential danger of ice buildup on brackets on the tank. Options for reducing that risk include using infrared lamps at the pad or putting bags over

Discovery's 12-day mission to the international space station is considered a test flight because of all the changes.





Blair gets more platitudes than pledges

Tony Blair must be miffed. The British prime minister has been dancing on a political hot plate and endures a reduced majority in Parliament because he supported the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq. But when he came to Washington last Tuesday to ask Bush for a hand with his Africa relief plan, Blair got more platitudes than pledges.

Blair wants the wealthy nations that make up the Group of Eight, when its leaders meet July 6-8 in Gleneagles, Scotland, to sign off on forgiving the international debt that cripples Africa's poorest nations. On Saturday, finance ministers from the G-8 agreed to write debt.

Blair also want G-8 nations to double the amount of aid they provide Africa during the next five years. And he proposes to jumpstart African economic development by boosting access to

international markets.





Major quake rocks northern California coast

Tremors prompt brief tsunami warning, evacuation of residents

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - A powerful earthquake jolted the ocean floor off the Northern California coast, triggering a brief tsunami warning that sent thousands of residents evacuating a community that was hit by a killer wave four decades ago.

The feared tsunami did not materialize, and there were no reports of significant damage or

struck at around 7:50 p.m. 8:14 p.m. and continued for about

Tuesday, 300 miles northwest of San Francisco and about 90 miles southwest of the coastal community of Crescent City, where a 1964 tsunami killed 11 people, according to the U.S. Geological

A tsunami warning was briefly in effect from the California-Mexico border north to Vancouver Island, British Columbia.

The tsunami siren system in 7.0-magnitude quake Crescent City was activated at

40 minutes, Del Norte County Sheriff Dean Wilson said. About 4,000 people were evacuated.

Wilson reported some minor traffic accidents but no injuries. He said it was the third evacuation he has taken part of in his 27 years in law enforcement.

The evacuation served as a tsunami drill for Crescent City following December's devastating wave in the Indian Ocean.

"You have a short time frame to

had approximately 20 minutes to evacuate and we cleared out about 4,000 people. There was some disruption of phone service, which hampered the effort. But we had a great response from volunteers, local enforcement and the CHP (California Highway Patrol)."

Xiojin Yuan, owner of the beachfront Hampton Inn and Suites in Crescent City, said police told him to evacuate the 53room hotel. "People evacuated in deal with it," Wilson said. "We a really orderly way," he said.

The only tsunami on record that has caused deaths on the West Coast struck Crescent City with 20 feet of water and leveled 29 city blocks on March 28, 1964.

That tsunami, caused by the Good Friday quake in Alaska, also was blamed for more than 100 deaths in Alaska and four people

The wave also caused damage in San Francisco Bay and at the Los Angeles and Long Beach har-



Africa, a group that includes the continent's government and finance leaders. Regrettably, those leaders have been unable or unwilling to rein in the worst of their peers, who do more harm to their people than any indirect misery caused by insufficient U.S.

assistance. Zimbabwe's President Robert Mugabe is on a brutal campaign to destroy the country's shantytowns. His dictatorial oppression has turned the country, once southern Africa's breadbasket, into a catalyst for famine that threatens millions in the region.



FORMER BAYLOR PLAYER SENTENCED

Dotson receives 35 years for killing teammate

player Carlton Dotson was sentenced to 35 years in trying to kill him because "he is Jesus, the son of prison Wednesday, a week after he unexpectedly pleaded guilty to murdering his teammate two years

Dotson, 23, faced from five years to life in prison for killing Patrick Dennehy, 21, who was missing for six weeks before his body was found in field a few miles from campus in July 2003. On June 8, five days before his murder trial was to start, Dotson pleaded guilty without a sentencing deal with prosecutors.

Instead of hearing from witnesses Wednesday, state District Judge Ralph Strother made his decision based on documents filed by prosecutors and defense

Part of the prosecution's report included FBI documents detailing Dotson's confession, in which he said "a higher power told him to talk to the FBI" and told authorities where to look for Dennehy. The body was found a few days later.

WACO, Texas (AP) Former Baylor basketball Dotson told agents that he thought people were God." Dotson, who moved in with Dennehy in May 2003, said he had received threatening telephone calls and that the two bought guns for protection.

He told FBI agents that on June 11, Dennehy pointed a gun at him after the pair went to gravel pits for target practice. When Dennehy's gun jammed, Dotson said "Father, please forgive me," and shot his friend. He then went to pack his belongings, called a relative to wire him money and drove home to

Maryland, throwing the gun in a lake along the way. But the autopsy doesn't support his self-defense claim. Dennehy was shot twice: once above the right ear and once behind it toward the back of the head.

Last fall, Dotson was found incompetent to stand trial and was sent to a state mental hospital. He was released and returned to jail in February after a hospital psychologist said Dotson was competent but must continue to take anti-psychotic medication.

"She said, 'Let your hair down and go out there and play some basketball, or else you can't eat," Wallace recalled.

The Detroit Pistons, a collection of castoffs turned into resilient champions, are at their best when they're playing as if their dinners depend on it. Down 0-2 in the best-of-seven series, they essentially had to win their first game back home.

And with a hair-raising passion they lacked last week, the Pistons beat the Spurs 96-79 Tuesday night.

The defending champs got 24 points from a revitalized Richard Hamilton, 20 points and seven assists from big-game guard Chauncey Billups — and a spur to excellence from Wallace, their defensive

When Wallace stole the game's opening pass and roared downcourt for a dunk, he reminded the Spurs that Detroit's veteran roster still knows what's necessary to win in June. Wallace was all over the court, even by his own athletic standards: He blocked five shots in the first quarter, then added a decisive dunk in the fourth.

"There really wasn't a message,"

Game 4 is Thursday night, with Game 5 on Sunday.


Almost nothing about Game 3 resembled the first two, when San Antonio seemed to get every loose ball, every big shot and every call.

All three games of the series have been close in the fourth quarter, but Detroit put this one away with nine straight points early in the period.

Billups, last season's finals MVP, started the rally with a 3pointer and a steal for a layup on consecutive possessions.

Tony Parker scored 21 points for the Spurs, who allowed 90 points for the first time in the franchise's three trips to the finals. San Antonio's vaunted defense thrives on momentum, but the Spurs had none of that fuel in Detroit.

The Pistons held Manu Ginobili to seven points and limited Tim Duncan to a 5-for-15 performance on the way to 14 points and 10 rebounds. Though San Antonio led at halftime and kept it close until the fourth, Detroit always seemed

to be in control. "We didn't play well for three quarters, and we were almost tied," Ginobili said. "It's something that we've got to be happy about in some sort of way. ... As a team, we just didn't have that juice, that sharpness that you need to play well on the road. I didn't play well. I don't think any of us played particularly well."

Ginobili confounded the Pistons

in the first two games with his knack for making improbable fourth-quarter shots, but the Pistons were determined to squelch his creative game.

They ran at least four defenders at him in single coverage, from lanky Tayshaun Prince to dogged Lindsey Hunter, and gave him few chances to affect the game.

Ginobili might have been mildly hobbled by a collision with Prince in the first minute, but he accepted the blame for having as many turnovers (six) as shots.

Hunter, who also slowed Miami's Dwyane Wade in the conference finals, seemed particularly effective in preventing Ginobili's drives to the hoop - which could mean trouble for the Spurs.

"I don't know if they tried anything different," Duncan said. "Their aggressiveness was up, so that fueled what they were doing."














As warm weather and Spring approaches, baseball and softball season begins. After being inactive all winter, weekend warriors are anxious to hit the field and play ball. If you are not prepared your chance of injury increases. A number of injuries can occur with baseball or softball including shoulder injuries involving the rotator cuff, bicep injuries, and impingement syndromes; ankle injuries, and hamstring or quadricep pulls to name a few of the most common. Most injuries occur from overuse, improper sliding, and failure to prepare your body in the pre season or before game time.

Shoulder injuries typically occur from not stretching or warming up the arm before playing. They are also common as a result of the repetitive motion of throwing. Ankle injuries can occur from stepping in a hole while going for the pop fly or sliding improperly into the base. Hamstring and quadricep



strains are very common and can be avoided if stretching or jogging is done before playing.

Overhead, stretching and warming up the shoulder with gentle throwing motions will help to loosen the muscle and the joint. To help decrease your chance of injury, stretching and strengthening in the preseason are very important. Stretching or warming up loosens the muscles and joints making the muscle and

joint more flexible and less apt to injury. Hamstring and quadricep stretching along with slow pace jogging assist in warming up the muscle in preparation for running.

Initial treatment of these type of injuries consist of following the RICE principles (Rest, Ice, Compression and Elevation).


Resting the area injured to prevent further wear and tear is the first step in recovery.

Icing the injured area immediately will help reduce swelling. Typically applying ice for 10-15 minutes ever 2-3 hours for the first 24-48 hours is recommended and continue if swelling persists.

Compression of the area with an elastic bandage to support the structure.

Elevating the affected area above the level of the heart will help prevent further swelling or accumulation of fluids.

So remember to warm up, cool down, and play safe to prevent injuries during this baseball and soft-ball season. If pain or symptoms persist after using **RICE**, contact your physician. Play Ball!
