## Triple tragedies mar holiday weekend

The July 4 holiday period has proven to be a tragic time, with three fatal collisions involving area residents since Saturday.

Late Monday afternoon, a Canyon man was killed and his passenger

injured after a one-vehicle crash on U.S. 287, two miles west of Goodnight.

At 5:45 p.m., Monday, Donald Brent McElroy, 20, was driving a 1998 Chevrolet Camaro northbound on U.S. 287 at a high rate of speed, according to a press release on the accident from Wayne Beigle of the

Texas Department of Public Safety.

The vehicle left the roadway and moved into the center median, where it struck a culvert at County Road 23 and became airborne. The vehicle traveled approximately 155 feet, rolling in the air, and landed on its top. The vehicle then slid another 150 feet before coming to a stop, the

release stated.

McElroy, who was not using a seat belt, was partially ejected from the vehicle, Beigle said. He later died at the scene.

A passenger in the Camaro, Kellye Joe Horner of Amarillo, 23,

## Man in yard dies; police await results of autopsy

Pampa police are waiting on autopsy results in the case of a 73-year-old Pampa man who died Saturday after he was found unconscious early Friday in the driveway of his home.

"At this point, we're waiting for the autopsy results. We feel it may have been accidental, but we want to see those results," said Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner this morning at the police department.

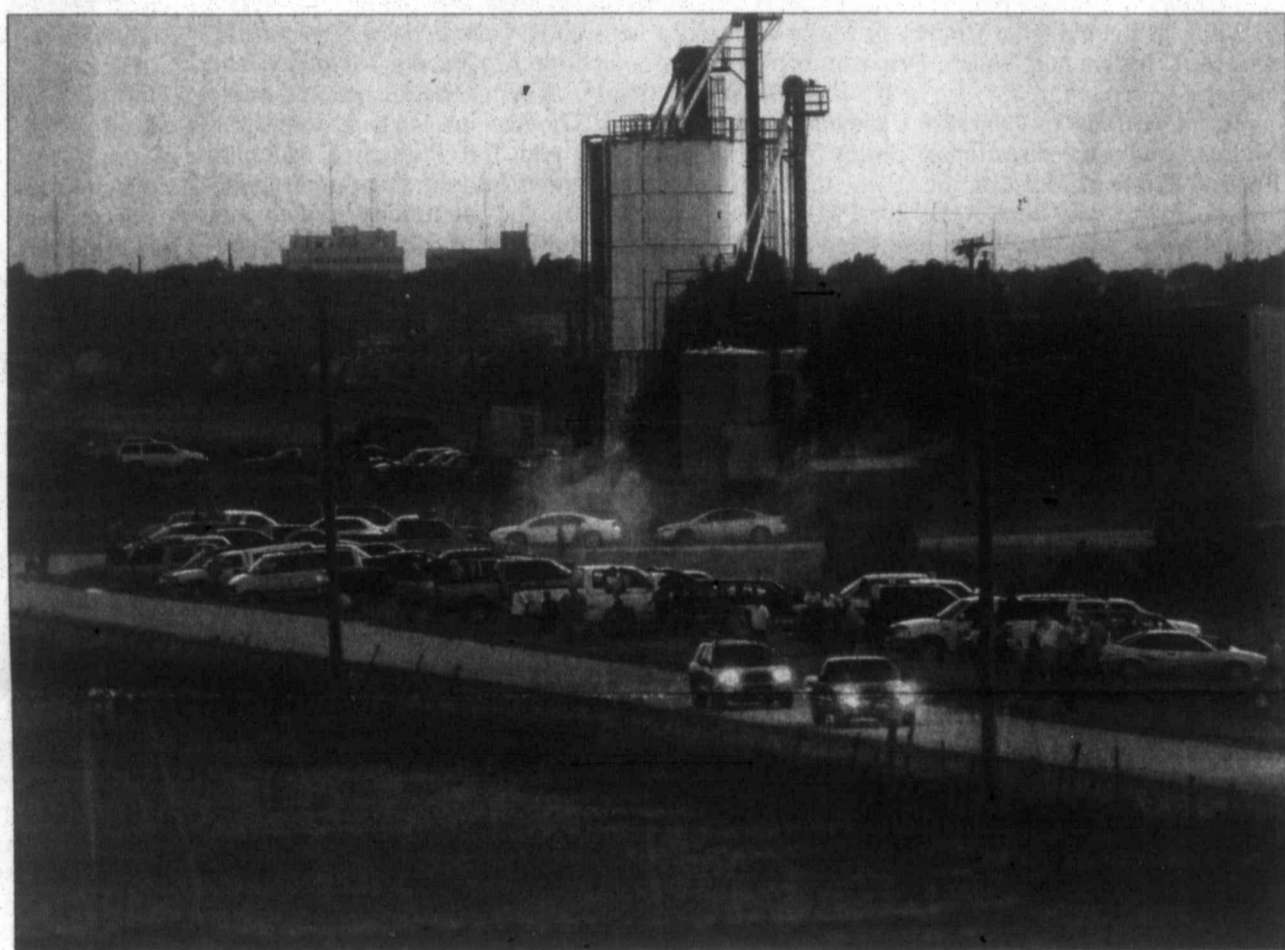
The investigation, which was initially opened as a possible aggravated assault, remains an open and active case as of press time today, according to Pitner.

A neighbor found Manuel Maldonado Hinojosa at about 6:20 a.m., July 1, in his driveway at 525 Zimmers.

He was treated at the scene by emergency medical services personnel for possible seizures and then transported to Pampa Regional Medical Center by Guardian EMS ambulance.

Hinojosa was found to have a fractured

was injured slightly and taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in good condition. Horner was wearing a seat belt and, according to the DPS report, alcohol was believed to be a factor in the crash.

McElroy is the son of James McElroy and wife, Sheila, of Pampa and Sonya Jones and husband, Kevin, of Fritch. He was a 2002 graduate of Sanford-Fritch High School and a senior at West Texas A&M University in Canyon. Funeral services are pending with Minton/Chatwell Funeral Directors of Fritch.

This is the second fatal one-vehicle collision investigated by the Texas Department of Public Safety during the July 4 holiday period which ended at midnight last night, DPS officials said.

"The one-vehicle crash has been and continues to be our number one killer on area roads," Beighle said.

Last year, out of a total of 63 fatalities on area roads, 33 died in one-vehicle crashes, he added.

On Sunday, 25-year-old Juan Rios of Pampa died in a one-vehicle rollover, six

miles south of Pampa on Texas Highway 273. He was a passenger in a 1990 Chevrolet pickup driven by Pampan Luis Felipe Guereca, no age given, that struck a tree and flipped end over end down a hill. Guereca suffered critical injuries in the wreck and was flown by LifeStar medical helicopter to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, DPS officials reported. Guereca's current condition was not available at press time.

Amarillo police continue their investigation of a fatal collision on Saturday in which Pampan Bobby Jack Porter, 23, and Chad Musgraves, 25, of Borger, were both killed. According to Amarillo PD reports, the accident occurred at 2:04 a.m., July 2.

A 1992 Chevrolet pickup driven by Porter reportedly failed to yield right of way at a red light at the intersection of NE 9th and Taylor streets, colliding with a 1997 Chevrolet Tahoe. Porter and Musgraves, a back seat passenger in the pickup, were both ejected.

Westley Snow of White Deer, the front seat passenger in the pickup; a 6-year-old passenger ejected from the Tahoe; and three of the child's family members in the Tahoe were also injured, according to the police report. The persons in the Tahoe were not named by the police.

skull, bleeding in the cranial cavity, a black eye and a chipped tooth, all on the right side of his head.

He was airlifted to Northwest Texas Hospital at about 8:25 a.m., Friday, without having regained consciousness.

Emergency room personnel at PRMC called Pampa Police Department at about 9:40 a.m., Friday, because "the injuries seemed suspicious," said Police Lt. Fred Courtney in a press release

dated July 1.

Pampa police and Pampa Fire Department had responded to the emergency call concerning Hinojosa upon his being found by the neighbor, according to the release.

Hinojosa was hooked up to a ventilator at NWTB, where he was considered to be in "grave condition" by attending physicians, according to the release.

"The injuries to Hinojosa, according to medical staff, are consistent with either a blow to the head or a hard fall," Courtney said in the release.

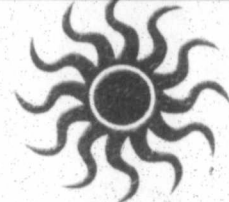

## Who do you want to 'Send to?'

Some of the best shortcuts in Microsoft Windows are those that are right in front of our noses. Such is the case with the "Send To" command.

To see it, right-click on any file and hover over the "Send to" option. Chances are, you'll see a list that includes "Floppy Disk, Desktop (create shortcut), Mail Recipient," and "My Documents." Basically, when you choose one of these options, the computer will copy the file to the appropriate location.

But, did you know you can add "new places" to this list? It's simple...Before we jump into that option, though, let's cover the uses of the existing choices:

**Send to Floppy Disk**  
Perhaps the most used "Send to" option, this choice will copy any selected file (or files) to a normal floppy diskette. Instead of "dragging and dropping" or opening a DOS window and using the "copy" command, all one has to do is put a floppy into the drive, right-click on the target file, and choose "Send to Floppy." It couldn't get simpler. However, today, most people don't use floppy disks anymore. These little, black plastic squares just don't hold as much as they used to.

**Send to Mail Recipient**

If you have Outlook, Outlook Express, Eudora, or any other major e-mail program, you can use this shortcut to quickly

send a file as an attachment. Your e-mail program doesn't even have to be running for this to work. Clicking on this option creates a blank e-mail message with the target file attached, ready to send. Just give it an address, subject, and short message and you're ready to go.

**Send to My Documents**  
I use this option quite a bit. I make sure that all of my data files, whether they are Word documents, Excel spreadsheets, or pictures, end up in the "My Documents" folder. That way, I can easily back them all up at once. Whenever I locate an important file in another location, I just right-click on it, choose

"Send to My Documents," and then delete the original file. For business users, I call this process "File Consolidation."

Home users may label it simply "Spring Cleaning."

**Creating New "Destinations"**

So, how do you add new destinations to this submenu? Well, the first task is to find the "Send to" folder. Its location is dependent on your version of Windows

**Windows 2000/XP**  
On your C: drive, navigate to the "Documents and Settings" folder; find the folder with your username and open it. Then, open the "Send to" folder.

**Windows 98/ME**  
On your C: drive, open up the Windows Folder, and then double-click on the "Send to" folder.

At this point, all you have to do is simply put the shortcut of any location or program you want to show up in the menu. As an example, let's add a

shortcut to Notepad. Leave the Send to folder window open and click your Start button, Programs, Accessories menu. Don't click the "Notepad" menu item. Right-click on it, instead. Choose "Send to Desktop (create shortcut). Now, go to your desktop and simply drag that new "shortcut to Notepad" into the "Send to" Folder. Next time you have a strangely named text file, simply right-click on it and choose "Send to Notepad."

Alternatively, if your "Send-to" menu has too many options, feel free to delete them while this folder is open. Anything you can make a shortcut for can be placed in the "Send to" folder, including network locations. In a networked environment, many people share files through a common (shared) folder on one of the machines. By placing a shortcut to that area in your "Send to" folder, you can easily drop files anywhere on the network you please.

If only I could right-click on certain people I know... I'll see you in Cyberspace.

## Struggling Foulke blows another save

Keith Foulke has not lost his job, even after he lost another game.

Foulke blew his second save in a week, giving up two runs in the ninth inning of Boston's 6-5 loss to the Texas Rangers on Monday night.

The Red Sox led 5-4 before Foulke (5-5) allowed a one-out triple to Michael Young and a double by Mark Teixeira to tie it. Teixeira scored on Kevin Mench's liner over the head of drawn-in left fielder Manny Ramirez, sending Boston to its fifth loss in seven games.

Though Mike Timlin saved a game last week when Foulke was unavailable, the Red Sox want to stick with the pitcher who was on the mound for the final out of the World Series as their closer.

"We have all kinds of options, but our best option is to have Foulke throwing well," Red Sox manager Terry Francona said.

That hasn't happened nearly enough for a team trying to defend a championship.

Foulke has four blown saves in 19 chances, and his ERA rose to 6.23 after he retired just one of the six batters he faced Monday. That came just two outings after Foulke allowed five runs in 1 2-3 innings of a 12-8 loss to Cleveland last Tuesday.

Still, the Red Sox expect Foulke to turn things around.

"The fact that he was at the end of our bullpen is the fact that we won a championship, he's that good," Red Sox catcher Jason Varitek said. "He's not able to get away with any mistakes at this point. He's going to get through one of those situations and that's going to be the end of it."

# Hall of Fame coach Hank Stram dead at 82

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Even in declining health, Hank Stram was able to inspire his former players.

During his induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2003, the former Kansas City Chiefs coach was so weak he had to be pushed onto the stage in a wheelchair. But a video montage of his career and a prerecorded speech offered powerful reminders of Stram's passion for football, moving many in the crowd to tears.

"His whole life was football — that's what he was born for, I think. He had a passion for it, not just a liking," Chiefs Hall of Fame quarterback Len Dawson said Monday. "He was really sincere when he talked about the team being a family. Everybody really loved him."

The Chiefs' first and winningest coach, who took them to two Super Bowls and was known for his inventive game plans and exuberance on the sideline, died Monday, his family said. He was 82.

"I've lived a charmed life," Stram said in an interview two years ago. "I married the only girl I ever loved and did the only job I ever loved."

Stram had been in declining health for several years. Dale Stram attributed his father's death to complications from diabetes. He died at St. Tammany Parish Hospital, near his home in Covington, across Lake

Pontchartrain from New Orleans. He had built a home in the area during his brief stint as coach of the Saints from 1975-77 and retired there.

"He was responsible for doing a lot of the things in the '60s that teams are still using now," said Dawson, citing the moving pocket and the triple stack defense. Stram was also credited with the two-tight end offense that provided an extra blocker.

Stram took over the expansion Dallas Texans of the upstart AFL in 1960 and coached them through 1974, moving with them to Kansas City, where they were renamed the Chiefs in 1963.

The gregarious, stocky, blazer-wearing Stram carried a rolled up game plan in his hand as he paced the sideline. He led the Chiefs to AFL titles in 1962, '66 and '69 and to appearances

in the first Super Bowl, a 35-10 loss to Green Bay, and the fourth, a 23-7 victory over Minnesota in 1970.

He had a 124-76-10 record with the Chiefs and in 17 seasons as a head coach was 131-97-10 in the regular season and 5-3 in the postseason. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2003.

"He was one of the pioneers of the American Football League and someone I admired as a fan long before I had the opportunity to ever meet him," Patriots owner Robert Kraft said. "In recent years, I had the opportunity to talk to him on many occasions. He was a man with a great spirit and lived life to the fullest."

Stram was the first coach to wear a microphone during a Super Bowl and Stram's sideline antics, captured by NFL Films, helped bring the league into the video age.

"Pro football has lost one of its most innovative and creative personalities as well," Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt said.

Stram later enjoyed a successful second career in CBS' television and "Monday Night Football" radio booths as an analyst. He made his mark in the booth by consistently telling the audience what would happen before it did.

## Two jockeys hurt in separate spills

Two jockeys were in critical condition Tuesday after spills at separate Texas tracks over the weekend.

Casey Lambert broke his jaw and multiple ribs, and suffered a punctured lung in a three-horse fall at Lone Star Park in Grand Prairie during Monday's final race. Lambert, 39, was in critical condition at Methodist Dallas Medical Center. His horse, Eunever, was taken from the track in a horse ambulance. The other two horses suffered no apparent injuries.

Akili Gray was in critical condition at University Hospital in San Antonio with head injuries after he was thrown during a Saturday race at Fredericksburg's Gillespie County Fairgrounds. His wife, Elaine Thomas, told KSAT-TV in San Antonio that Gray's mount apparently clipped the hooves of another horse, causing his mount to stumble.

Fairgrounds' officials were not in their offices Tuesday to comment on the condition of the horse.

## Armstrong takes lead

BLOIS, France (AP) — Lance Armstrong's Discovery Channel squad won the team time trial of the Tour de France on Tuesday, handing the six-time champion the yellow jersey as overall race leader.

The 33-year-old Texan led his squad to victory for the third straight year in the time trial, clocking 1 hour, 10 minutes, 40 seconds for the 41.85-mile trek from Tours to Blois. Team CSC was second.

# Davies gets tip from Smoltz; Morris pitches like ace

(AP) — Rookie Kyle Davies turned a tip he received from the star of Atlanta's pitching staff into a victory over Kerry Wood.

After receiving advice between starts from John Smoltz, Davies pitched four-hit ball into the seventh inning, and Adam LaRoche supported him with two home runs in the Braves' 4-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs on Monday night.

"He said my front leg was a little weak," Davies recalled Smoltz telling him, and added that he tried to finish his follow-through stronger on his landing leg this time. "That's why my balls have been up."

Davies (4-2) walked four but held an opponent scoreless for the fourth time in nine major league starts. He struck out three in his 6 2-3 innings.

Matt Morris pitched like an ace, a day after he was snubbed for a spot on the NL All-Star team.

Morris allowed one run

and six hits in seven innings, leading the visiting St. Louis Cardinals to a 10-3 victory over the Arizona Diamondbacks.

"It's not because he wasn't capable," St. Louis manager Tony La Russa said. "It's more because six Cardinals is a lot of representation already."

La Russa's decision to leave Morris (10-1) off the NL All-Star team was a difficult one, with Scott Rolen, David Eckstein and Jim Edmonds voted as starters; and Albert Pujols, 12-game winner Chris Carpenter and closer Jason Isringhausen also deserving of a trip. Someone had to be left out, and it was Morris.

"I don't think about the All-Star game and I should be on it, or I shouldn't," Morris said. "That's not my concern. I'm beyond that. We've got a bunch of representatives from this team, and they all deserve it."

In other NL games, it was: New York 5, Washington 2;

Houston 4, San Diego 1; Cincinnati 11, San Francisco 10; Philadelphia 12, Pittsburgh 1; Milwaukee 3, Florida 2; and Los Angeles 4, Colorado 3 in 11 innings.

Johnson, but Giles was thrown out at third by Jerry Hairston.

LaRoche followed with his two-run homer to center for a 3-0 lead.

"I made a few mistakes, and they hurt me," Wood said. "The hit by Jones was up the middle and then the home run. After that, I made better pitches. ... I felt strong. I thought I threw the ball pretty well after the first inning."

LaRoche led off the eighth with his second homer, another shot to center, off Will Ohman.

Told that he was manager Bobby Cox's star of the game, LaRoche passed the honor on to Davies.

"I'm going to give it to Kyle," LaRoche said. "For him to do what he did against that lineup, with as little experience as he's had, I can't say enough about him."

At Phoenix, Rolen hit a two-run double, and John Mabry and pinch-hitters

Arizona's Troy Glaus hit a two-run homer — the 200th of his career.

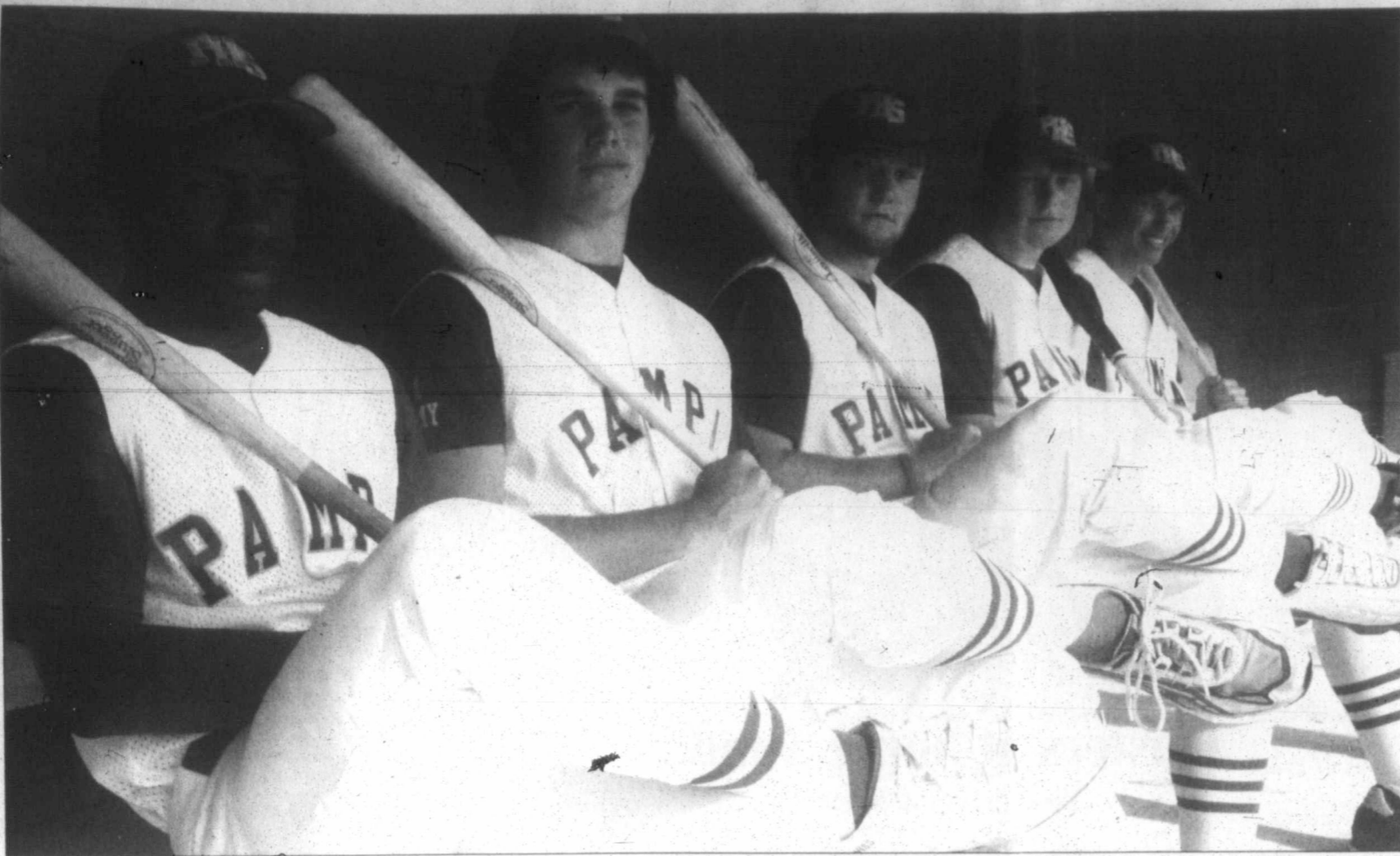

## Rogers can decide

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Kenny Rogers gets to decide if he wants to go to the All-Star game, and he's still not talking.

Rogers was a players' choice for the American League team on ballots cast before the Texas Rangers left-hander showed two cameramen last week in an angry outburst that earned him a 20-game suspension and \$50,000 fine.

As ugly as it was, it doesn't change what he's done on the mound. And with his penalty under appeal and not scheduled to be heard until after the All-Star break, Rogers (9-4, 2.45 ERA) can keep pitching. "He's one of the best pitchers in baseball," Rangers All-Star Mark Teixeira said Monday. "So if he wants to go, he belongs there."

Rogers spokesman Gregg Elkin said Rogers, who again refused to talk to reporters, hadn't given any

indication about whether he planned to go to Detroit next week for the All-Star game.

Manager Buck Showalter said he spoke to Rogers about making the AL All-Star team, but they hadn't discussed whether the pitcher would participate in the game.

"He got picked by the players. He's having a good year," said Red Sox outfielder Johnny Damon, another AL starter. "Unfortunately, the incident is what he's being remembered for this far into the season and possibly his career now — one day, one thing that happened last week."

After missing one start because of a broken bone at the base of the pinkie of his non-throwing hand, Rogers allowed two runs over 7 2-3 innings Sunday in a 2-1 loss at Seattle. His next start will be Friday or Saturday against Toronto.

"I think they'll go deep here," he would tell his partner, Jack Buck.

"Elway to throw," Buck would respond. "He's looking deep. He throws deep. Caught by Steve Sewell at the 11-yard line. You called that one, Coach."

"John just saw what I saw," Stram would say.

Hall of Fame linebacker Willie Lanier, who played for the Chiefs under Stram, said he was able to elevate his players to new levels of success, no matter what their skin color. It was because of owners like Hunt and coaches like Stram that black players were able to advance in the AFL, he said.

"No question they opened doors. Shortly after I was drafted out of Morgan State, I'm playing next to Jim Lynch from Notre

Dame," he said from his home in Midlothian, Va. "I thought it was a great joy to be in that kind of situation at a time when many industries were challenged to make equal opportunity truly equal."

Hunt hired Stram, then an assistant at Miami, Fla., in 1959 after Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson and then-New York Giants assistant Tom Landry turned down the team.

"He had never been a head coach before and you never know how that's going to work out. In our case, it worked out tremendously. I think it worked out great for his career, too, because he ended up in the Pro Football Hall of Fame," Hunt said. "He deserves to be there."

Stram is survived by his wife Phyllis, sons Henry, Dale, Stu and Gary, daughters Julia and Mary Nell, and a sister, Dolly.
