

## High court rules against parents in special ed case

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled today that parents who demand better special education programs for their children have the burden of proof in the challenges.

Retiring Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, writing for the 6-2 court, said that when parents challenge a program they have the burden in an administrative hearing of showing that the program is insufficient. If schools bring a complaint, the burden rests with them, O'Connor wrote.

The ruling is a loss for a Maryland family that contested the special education program designed for their

son with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder.

The case required the court to interpret the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act, which does not specifically say whether parents or schools have the burden of proof in disputes. The law covers more than 6 million students.

The Maryland family in the Supreme Court case had argued that when there are disagreements between schools and parents, education officials have better access to relevant facts and witnesses.

The Bush administration backed the Montgomery County, Md., school district which maintained that

the extra requirement would be expensive for local schools.

Chief Justice John Roberts had recused himself from the case, because attorneys from his old law firm represented the school district in suburban Washington.

Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Stephen Breyer wrote separate dissents.

"School districts are charged with responsibility to offer to each disabled child an individualized education program (IEP) suitable to the child's special needs. The proponent of the IEP, it seems to me, is properly called upon to demonstrate its adequacy," Ginsburg wrote.

O'Connor said the court was not ruling on a separate issue, whether states could set their own policies and put the burden on the school officials.

In other action the court agreed to consider reinstating rules that keep newspapers and magazines out of the hands of disruptive Pennsylvania inmates, a case that court nominee Samuel Alito dealt with.

A panel of the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals had sided with inmates who claimed the ban on most reading material and personal photographs violated their free speech rights.

## Water board to consider Mesa rights

WHITE DEER -- The Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District board of directors will consider amending production permits on more than 1,000 acres to reflect the ownership of the water rights as Mesa Water at the water district's board meeting Tuesday morning at their offices here.

The board is expected to amend Initial Production Permits for 320 acres from Fred S. Barber and 817 acres from Frances Deen Maddox, et al., to reflect Mesa Water, LP, as sole owner.

The board will also consider eight well permit requests.

The requests include one one-inch well in Armstrong County and five one-inch wells in Potter County.

They will also consider a permit request for a six-inch well in Carson County by the City of Panhandle and a six-inch well in Gray County by Tejas Feeders.

The board is to consider bids for property in Donley and Carson Counties and annexation of part of the Hayhook Ranch in Hutchinson County.

They are also expected to appoint a representative from the district to serve on the Joint Planning Group.

The board meets at 9 a.m., Tuesday, at their offices at 201 W. Third St.

Among items to be considered include financial reports, a review of updated legal and local policies, and options on resignations of board members.

## It is past time to put death tax to rest

"Nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes." When Benjamin Franklin first spoke these famous words, he could scarcely have predicted the fate of his two certainties. Today, even death offers no relief from taxes. Supporters of the Death Tax do not believe that it affects hard-working, everyday people. Many ordinary folks, however, find it difficult to pass the American dream on to their children. The legacies we will leave to our children depend upon the government taking strong action against these taxes. I believe the Congress must repeal the Death Tax permanently and immediately.

When the Death Tax is calculated, an individual's

bank account holdings, investments, land and even insurance policies are considered taxable assets. The IRS may take up to 55 percent of portions of the deceased's estate. Some people might think this tax only affects millionaires, but thousands of Americans lose their inheritances to taxes every year.

Numerous Texas families dedicate their lives to the land they work. A family ranch or farm is much more than the plowed soil or wide grasslands you see from the road. The land is the heart of the family — a heritage passed on from father to son, from mother to daughter. Yet it is precisely these families whose property can be so adversely affected by the

Death Tax.

In 1966, the average acre of South Texas ranch land cost just \$196, even after adjusting for inflation. Due to appreciation, this same acre is now valued at \$1,779, making the tax burden nine times higher than when the land was purchased. To shoulder this burden and keep its land, a bereaved family may be forced to take out huge loans, incurring debt they may not be able to manage, or sell the land altogether.

One woman in Hill County was surprised to learn that her uncle left her

4,500 acres of land the family had owned since the turn of the century. She was even more surprised when she learned the family would have to pay \$1.7 million in taxes to keep the land. When her father died, he too left his portion of the family land to her, along with a \$565,000 tax bill.

Unfortunately, she believes she will have to carry debt against the land for the rest of her life.

The Death Tax also attacks family-owned businesses. Only 30 percent of all family-owned businesses are passed down to a second

generation, and only 13 percent reach a third generation. Current tax laws effectively force some families to sell all or part of their businesses rather than bequeath them. The Death Tax can also contribute to the complete failure of some small businesses, causing employees to lose long-held jobs. One study found that 77 percent of family businesses that entered bankruptcy had failed after the unexpected death of the founders.

Bruce Thompson began his career working for large grocery chains and later struck out on his own, founding Market Basket Foods. He worked hard and made sacrifices, and his small grocery business gradually grew into a family-

owned chain of 37 stores. Today, his son, Skylar Thompson, is president of the company. Bruce fears that when he passes on, the Death Tax will take away most of the business's capital base. This loss will jeopardize jobs throughout southeastern Texas and southwestern Louisiana.

Small businesses are the core of our economy. They are the engine that drives our nation, and they provide a livelihood for millions of our citizens. When family heads pass on, however, there is often little they can do to preserve their achievement. At present, the tax man comes calling, even for the dead.

In 1968, Yale University announced it was going co-educational.


In 1969, Apollo 12 blasted off for the moon.

Ten years ago: The U.S. government instituted a partial shutdown, closing national parks and museums while government offices operated with skeleton crews. U.S. Rep. Enid Greene Waldholtz, R-Utah, filed for divorce from her husband, Joe, who was under federal investigation for possible campaign financing improprieties. (Joe Waldholtz spent 22 months in federal prison.)

Five years ago: Florida Secretary of State Katherine Harris certified George W. Bush's fragile 300-vote lead over Al Gore, hours after a judge refused to lift a 5 p.m. deadline; however, the judge gave Harris the authority to accept or reject follow-up manual recount totals. Pioneering CBS Radio newsmen Robert Trout died in New York at age 91.



## Foreign influence, the bane of republics

I don't share the president's high opinion of I. Lewis Libby, now under indictment for obstruction of justice, making false statements and committing perjury.

He was, after all, the lawyer who for years represented Marc Rich, the fugitive billionaire who renounced his own country. It was Libby who arranged the last-minute presidential pardon of Rich issued by Bill Clinton — a pardon that stank to high heaven. Rich, along with a number of Russian oligarchs the Russian government would like to get its hands on, is now an Israeli citizen.

Libby was also part of the trio of neoconservatives who pushed the phony intelligence in order to get the U.S. to go to war. Another member of that trio, John Hannah, has now replaced Libby as Vice President Dick Cheney's national-

security adviser. As described by Juan Cole in an excellent article at Salon.com, "Most of the members of Cheney's inner circle were neoconservative ideologues, who combined hawkish American triumphalism with an obsession with Israel."

Libby was an early protégé of Paul Wolfowitz, now president of the World Bank but who has been called the architect of the war against Iraq. Libby and Wolfowitz co-authored a paper in the first Bush's administration advocating removal of Saddam Hussein, and Libby was later a founding member of the Project for a New American Century, an outfit advocating that America forcibly police the world.

Hannah comes from the belligerently pro-Israel think tank Washington Institute for Near East Policy. It was founded with the help of the American-Israel Public Affairs Committee, the powerful pro-Israel lobby that seems to dominate Congress. It was to Hannah that Ahmad Chalabi funneled a lot of the phony intelligence on Saddam's nonexistent weapons of mass destruction.

Another Cheney adviser is David Wurmser, another alumnus of WINEP. He co-authored with Richard Perle, Douglas Feith and others a policy paper for then-Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu that called not only for going to war with Iraq, but also for scrapping the Oslo Peace Plan. It was a

stupid paper. Wurmser's wife is Meyrav Wurmser, who was listed as a co-author of the paper. She and an Israeli colonel formed the MEMRI translation service, which cherry-picks Arabic newspapers for their most outrageous articles and translates them in a continuing program to depict the Arab world in the worst possible light.

David Wurmser was chosen by fellow neoconservative Feith to be part of the Office of Special Plans in the Pentagon. OSP was set up to go around conventional intelligence agencies to better push the propaganda for war. It was most likely through this outfit that the forged business of the nuclear-weapons program ended up in the president's now-infamous State of the Union speech of 2003.

## Texas Thoughts

The Dallas Morning News on the failure of the oil-for-food program:

For all of its management problems, the United Nations isn't the sole reason the Iraq oil-for-food program failed so badly.

There are at least 2,200 other reasons.

About half of the nearly 4,500 companies in the ill-fated U.N. program paid illegal surcharges and kickbacks to former Iraqi dictator Saddam Hussein that helped perpetuate his regime, according to the final independent report on U.N. reform.

So much for a world united against a brutal dictator.

The list of those suspected of illegal payments reads like a Who's Who of

international business:

DaimlerChrysler, Daewoo, Siemens, Volvo and numerous French, Chinese and Russian firms. And there were individual profiteers, numerous foreign politicians and even a priest who stashed his take in a Vatican bank account.

In all, companies or executives from about 66 countries supposedly cut deals that put at least \$1.8 billion into Saddam's secret accounts and generated millions for themselves. Add Saddam's already well-established oil-smuggling operation that seemingly escaped U.N. attention, and the sanctions became a farce of enormous proportions.

The 2,200 companies, middlemen and others bear immense responsibility for the program's collapse right alongside the U.N.'s well-documented management conflicts of interest and its winks-and-nods.

The U.N. Security Council devised

the humanitarian program to permit the Iraqi regime to use oil revenue for food and medicines. Instead, participants turned it into a corrupt money grab. Companies and individuals suspected of circumventing the rules must face charges. The U.S. is pursuing Texas oilman Oscar Wyatt on charges that his firm improperly did business with Iraq, while Australia, Germany and France are probing various claims in the report. So should other nations.

The report reveals the hypocrisy and crass capitalism that doomed the program and allowed Saddam's regime to survive. Those who knowingly aided the Iraqi dictator share in the blame for his brutal rule and must be prosecuted.

The world will never know whether a loophole-free oil-for-food program might have brought Saddam to his knees and averted the U.S. invasion of Iraq. In hindsight, it's clear that the oil-for-food program never had a chance.

That is the ultimate perfidy.

# Houston crack house killer to die Tuesday

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Robert Dale Rowell already had a slaying under his belt, a fatal stabbing committed while in prison on a robbery conviction, when a Harris County jury decided he deserved to die for shooting three people at a Houston crack house, killing two of them and leaving a third paralyzed.

Rowell, 50, faced lethal injection Tuesday evening for the 1993 shooting spree that left Raymond Mata, 38, and Irvin Wright, 52, dead. Mata's wife, Angie Perez, was seriously wounded.

He would be the 18th Texas prisoner executed this year and the first of two on consecutive nights this week. Condemned inmate Shannon Thomas was to follow him to the death chamber Wednesday night for a triple slaying in Baytown on Christmas Eve in 1993.

The U.S. Supreme Court last month refused to review Rowell's case.

Rowell has spent much of his adult life in prison, and prosecutors used his extensive criminal history to convince jurors to send him to death row.

Evidence showed Rowell arrived at Wright's north Houston house on Red Ripple Road about 4 a.m. May 10, 1993, as a dissatisfied customer complaining he'd paid too much for some crack cocaine. Mata and Perez, who answered the door, also were living there. Court records show Rowell, armed with a pistol, warned the couple he would shoot them if they tried to flee.

"He knew the guy was a dope dealer, and he was thinking either he was going to get a little dope or get some cash," Kelly Siegler, the Harris County assistant district attorney who prosecuted the case, recalled. "And then things went crazy."

Perez later would say she heard a thumping sound and screams from Wright's room. Wright, investigators determined, had been badly beaten with a claw hammer and was led into the couple's

room. All three were herded into a bathroom where they were shot in a bathtub. Rowell then took a shower.

He was arrested a short time later at an auto repair shop where he worked. Police found a .22-caliber revolver with six spent cartridge casings and a bank bag belonging to Wright.

Rowell declined to speak with reporters in the weeks before his scheduled punishment. His attorney, Edward Mallett, did not return calls seeking comment.

Witnesses at his trial described him as depressed, introverted, psychopathic and a chronic drug user who turned violent while under the influence of drugs.

Rowell first went to prison in 1974 at age 18 with 10- and 12-year concurrent sentences for armed robbery. He was paroled 4 1/2 years later.

Furthermore, the Death Tax embodies a culture that runs counter to the American Dream. Instead of teaching our young people to work hard and save their money, we demonstrate only a dim future that penalizes people for saving. Instead of showing our children how to provide for their own heirs, the current law teaches them that upon their death, the government

will take away the prosperity they have achieved. The Death Tax disregards the sacrifice of those who risked everything to provide for today's generation. It punishes American farmers, ranchers and business owners who worked hard to build their legacy.

Ranchers and conservation groups alike fear that the Death Tax will destroy priceless wildlife habitats. The need to sell part of their inherited land to pay the tax man forces many landowners to sell their land piecemeal to developers.

it should be repealed permanently. I am a co-sponsor of Senate Bill 420, which would make permanent the current phaseout of the Death Tax. I am also a co-sponsor of Senate Bill 988, which would make the repeal effective for people who have died since Jan. 1, 2005.

Americans work hard for what they have and take pride in their achievements. All citizens have the right, and should have the opportunity, to pass the fruits of their labor on to their loved ones.






## Big Spring puts an end to Harvesters' season by 14-7 score

Sporting events are often compared to battles. While it seems cliché, the analogy usually rings true. Saturday's football game in Lubbock was just that: a battle between the Pampa Harvesters and the Big Spring Steers.

In Big Spring's first possession, Marcos Campos dealt Steers quarterback Ryan Tannehill a sack to force a third-and-long situation. However, Big Spring was able to regroup and not only make their first down, but march the ball all the way to the Harvester one-yard line. Running back Lance Tissue capped the drive with a touchdown run which gave Big Spring a 7-0 lead.

The first quarter ended with Pampa behind but driving down-

field with much more grace than their opening possession. A Brody Smith pass to Shavious Kelly moved the team into the Steers' end of the field. Then, with the drive seemingly halted, Big Spring was penalized 15 yards on a facemask call. Now at the Steers' 18-yard line, Pampa made a steady drive toward the end zone.

Michael Robinson pounded the ball up the middle on a four-yard touchdown run to even the score at 7-7. That run put a period on a seven play, 81-yard scoring drive.

Big Spring would regain the lead two minutes later when Tannehill lofted a 49-yard touchdown pass down the middle of the field. The Steers' 14-7 lead would hold through the first half.

Despite Big Spring's long score in the late second quarter, it was

their shorter plays that hurt the Harvesters. They were able to string together several first downs in a row, not through the air but through hard-earned six-yard runs by Tissue. Those drive-extending rushes led to Big Spring scores.

Scoring was scarce for both teams in the second half as the defenses took control. Sharrod Young intercepted a Tannehill pass two minutes into the third quarter. Unfortunately, Pampa fumbled the ball back to the Steers with 7:01 left in the quarter. The "Gang Green" defense appeared to have made the right adjustments during halftime. They put up a great stop deep in their own territory following the fumble.

In similar fashion to Big Spring, Pampa strung together a few good plays including Smith passes to

Young and Ryan Torres, but they could not put any points on the board.

In the fourth, Big Spring made a drive consisting of 60 yards, nine minutes, one questionable ball measurement and one unbelievable missed field goal. That last item would give Pampa hope. Pampa's passing attack provided some quick first downs, and a fourth-and-14 roughing penalty gave them one last shot at evening the score. However, Smith's 37-yard desperation attempt for Young was not meant to be. Despite the outcome, Wood was proud of the team's effort.

"They never gave up even until the last second," Wood said. "There's no give up in them."

He said he has no regrets about this season or the team's perform-

ance. "Hard work gives you opportunities," Wood said. "We did our best. It just didn't work out."

Indeed, Wood seems satisfied after his first year in Pampa.

"It was a roller coaster ride, but we got better in the middle of the season," he said. "We did some things that no one thought we'd do. Some polls chose us fourth or fifth in district and here we came with part of a district championship."

According to Wood, the success of this year can be attributed to the hard work which has become the staple of Harvester football.

"They beat a couple of teams that might have been more talented, but we wanted it more," Wood said. "We won a lot of ball games because of how hard they played."

## Cowboys facing desperate Eagles in key clash tonight

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Even before Terrell Owens took his big plays and bigger mouth home to Atlanta, the Philadelphia Eagles were a desperate team.

The four-time NFC East champions and reigning conference champs enter tonight's game against the Dallas Cowboys needing a victory to avoid falling below .500 and further out of the playoff race.

The Eagles (4-4) won't have Owens because the All-Pro wideout was dismissed from the team last Monday following a series of incidents, including harsh criticism of the organization and quarterback Donovan McNabb.

A once-potent offense certainly will miss its top playmaker, but McNabb and the rest of his teammates are eager to prove they can still

have success.

"We just have to come together, pull through, and understand the situation that has happened, and what we need to do in order to get out on this field and get back to playing with a lot of passion, playing with a lot of excitement and playing together," McNabb said.

Owens was on the field when the Cowboys completely outplayed the Eagles in a 33-10 victory at Dallas last month. The Cowboys jumped to a 17-0 lead in the first quarter and never let up. Drew Bledsoe picked apart the defense with 289 yards passing and three touchdowns and Dallas racked up

456 yards.

In that game, the Cowboys' defense was even more dominant than their offense. They held the Eagles to just 129 yards, while limiting them to only two third-down conversions in 12 chances.

"I think it may have been probably at the top of the list," defensive tackle La'Roi Glover said. "To get there again, it's going to take another great effort. You have to know what particular plays they like out of which formations, who they want to get the ball to, down and distance — all those type of things. You have to be on top of your game when you play

the Eagles."

Philadelphia lost 17-10 to Washington last Sunday in its first game without Owens. McNabb led the offense down the field in the final minutes only to be stopped with three chances from the Redskins 7.

Without Owens, the Eagles plan to spread the ball around to several receivers, including Greg Lewis, Reggie Brown, Billy McMullen and tight end L.J. Smith. Former three-time Pro Bowl tight end Chad Lewis was re-signed earlier in the week, giving McNabb another familiar target.

Running back Brian Westbrook should get more

carries as Philadelphia tries to balance out its pass-heavy offense.

"He is a good football player and good football players are hard to come by, but I think the team supersedes any of those good football players, because the team will continue to go on," Eagles offensive coordinator Brad Childress said of Owens. "I look at it from that standpoint."

Dallas (5-3) is coming off a bye week following an easy win against Arizona. The Cowboys have lost two games by a total of four points this season, and won three others by a combined margin of 10 points.


