Protect Your Family From Fire Hazards

December's month-long festival of lights--Christmas trees and decorations, and New Year's Eve fireworks--can become a time of tragedy if fire safety is forgotten.

"Sadly, we overlook fire prevention during the holidays, which makes the loss to fires during December especially painful," said Michael E. Hines, Executive Director of the Texas Commission on Fire Protection.

"Last Christmas season, five

people died in fires involving accidents with Christmas trees. More than \$850,000 in property damage was caused by holiday-decoration fires."

Last December, 51 fires involved Christmas trees and another 13 fires involved holiday decorations, according to the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System operated by the commission to gather fire statistics from Texas fire departments. The most common causes of holiday

fires were candles and electrical malfunctions, especially involving lamps and lights.

Fireworks were involved in 79 fires that caused property damage estimated at \$175,000 during December 1991 and January 1992, Hines added.

Everyone should remember that natural trees used as decorations in the home are twice as likely as artificial trees to be involved in fires, according to fire statistics. Natural trees require special care.

Heaters dry the air, which dries natural trees. You should use a humidifier to replace air moisture.

You should water the tree daily, letting the water supply run out even once can keep the tree from drawing any more water through the trunk.

Another thing you should remember is as the tree dries, don't leave lights on for extended times. Never leave a lighted tree unattended.

Fire statistics show that candles caused half of the holiday-decoration fires last year. The best option is to replace wax candles with battery-operated candlesticks.

If wax candles are used, be sure someone is in the room whenever the candles are burning. Put out all candles before going to sleep or leaving the room.

Faulty or unattended electrical lights caused half of the Christmas tree fires in 1991, according to fire statistics. Be sure someone is at home and awake whenever decorative lights are on. Turn off lights before going to sleep.

About two-thirds of all fires caused by fireworks were grass, tree or brush fires. However, building fires caused by fireworks destroyed property valued at \$100,000. The

Ellen Bayless was in Morton Thursday and stopped at Senior Citizens for a short visit.

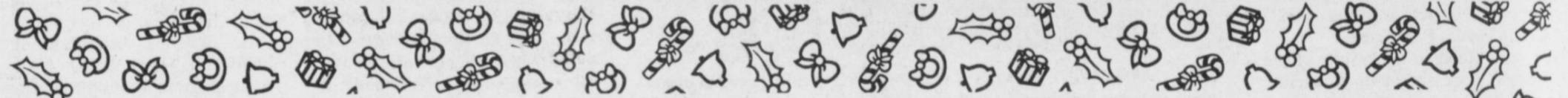
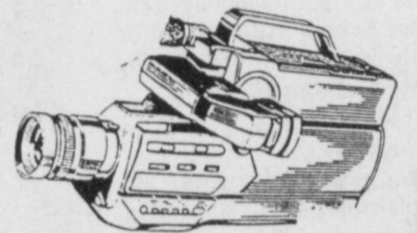

Proposed Solutions For Aquatic Nuisance Species

The Great Lakes and a number of this country's best known rivers are teeming with activity that does not belong there. It is the presence of introduced non-native aquatic species in this Nation's waterways. As part of the effort to address this problem, the Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service today announced public meetings will be held in Maryland, California, Hawaii, Florida, Minnesota, and New York.

The hundreds of transoceanic vessels that visit the Great Lakes annually, in addition to cargo, carry millions of gallons of water for ballast which must be unloaded upon arrival. But sometimes, traveling along with the fresh or brackish ballast are some pesky non-native aquatic life forms which are wrecking havoc in America's waterways. The zebra mussel, and the ruffe, a small fish, are just a couple of recent examples.

The zebra mussel, native to the Caspian Sea, was first detected in Lake St. Clair near Detroit, Michigan in 1988. Prolific, the mussel is now abundant in Lake Erie and western Lake Ontario and found in major rivers such as the Mississippi, Illinois, Hudson, Susquehanna, and Ohio. Municipal water treatment and power plant facilities are being threatened because the mussels attach to hard surfaces and obstruct pipes, hoses, and screens. Recently, an intake pipe became so encrusted with mollusks that its diameter was virtually cut reduced in half, nearly shutting off the water supply to the city of Monroe, Michigan.

Zebra mussels are also becoming encrusted on native species, fouling commercial fishing nets and boat hulls, and littering swimming beaches. They are also altering the feeding and migration patterns of mussel-eating waterfowl, and the feeding behavior of some fishes.

The ruffe, a cool-water European perch, has recently colonized Duluth Harbor at the western end of Lake Superior. The current ruffe colony in Duluth Harbor number approximately 2 million. A small fish, less than 5 inches long, the ruffe is now the single most abundant of over 60 fish species found in the harbor and is causing dramatic declines among fish species. It competes with the native fish for food and feed

voraciously on the eggs and larvae of more valuable species such as whitefish and other perch.

In 1990, in response to these rapidly spreading threats, Congress enacted the Nonindigenous Aquatic Nuisance Prevention and Control Act which created the Aquatic Nuisance Species Task Force. The Task Force, made up of seven Federal agencies and eight governmental organizations, is co-chaired by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The Act charged the Task Force with developing a national program to:

- *reduce the risk or prevent the unintentional introduction of these species.

- *ensure prompt detection of the presence of and monitor changes in the spread of these species.

- *and control those species already established.

The Task Force has now developed a proposed cooperative program which outlines measures to prevent further introductions, detect those that slip through, and control existing aquatic nuisance species. In addition, it includes research, technical assistance, and education activities as well as a zebra mussel program.

At the public meetings on the proposed program, Task Force members will provide information and answer questions. Participants

will have an opportunity to provide comments. The meetings are part of a broader effort to gather information from interested individuals and organizations concerning the proposed program.

Adolescence, A Time Of Change

When a person goes through a period we've labeled as adolescence, it is usually a time of change and development. It may be characterized by unusual behavior as they try to establish their own identity. This growing process is not always destructive. Many of the following symptoms are "normal". However, if you notice a pattern of consistency, you might want to investigate for chemical dependency or abuse.

- * Changing attitudes toward rules and a lack of participation in family activities.

- * Isolating self from family and changing friends.
- * Your child's peers are uncomfortable in your home. In fact, you may not know them.
- * Stealing items from the home - lying.
- * Grades fall; skips classes; sleeps in class.
- * Lack of motivation; lack of self-discipline.
- * Change in personality, mood swings.
- * Deep, nagging cough which persists.
- * Dilated pupils, eyes are red; uses eye drops or sunglasses.
- * Change in appearance.
- * Weight loss/gain.

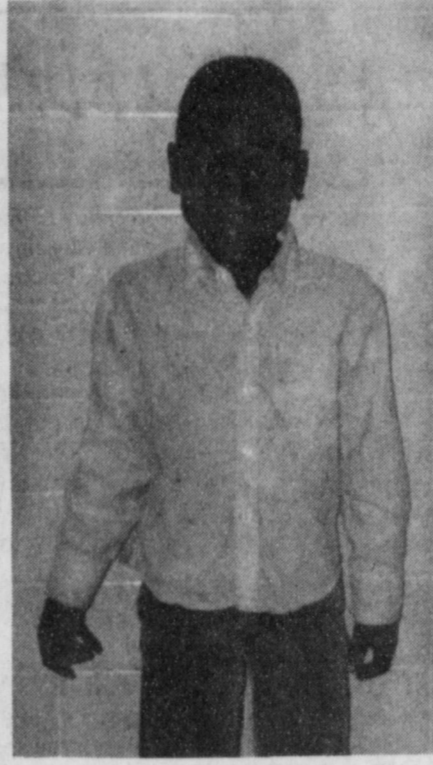

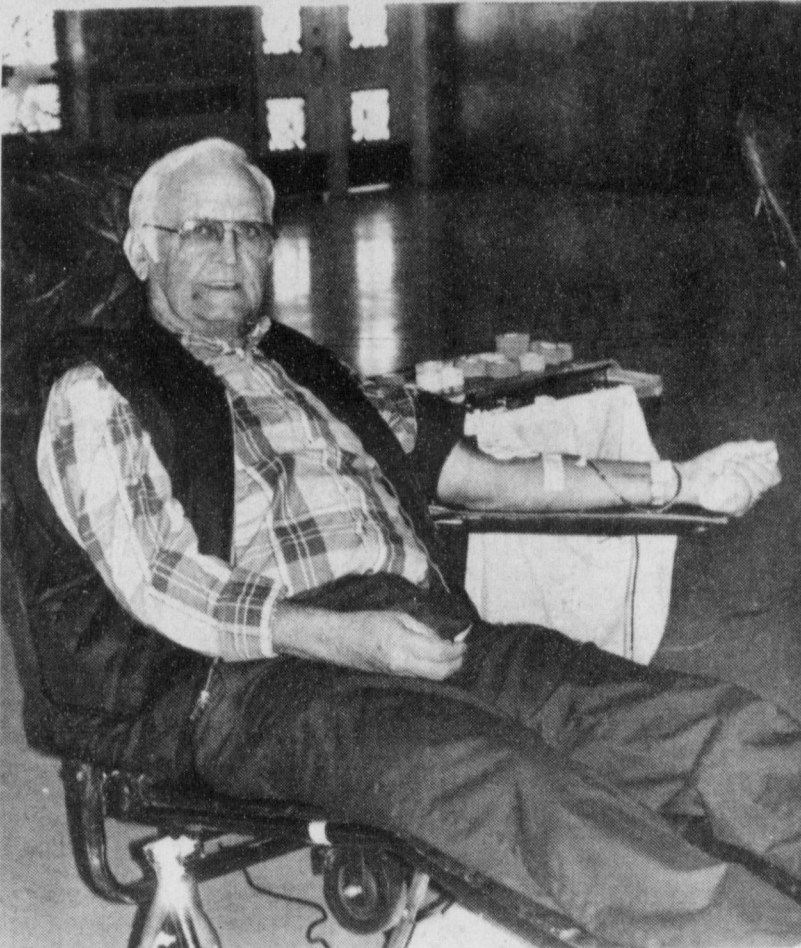

Report From State Senator Teel Bivins

What is the most powerful lobby in the Texas Legislature? Texas Trial Lawyers Association? The Sierra Club? The AFL-CIO? The Chemical Council? The Automobile Dealers Association? The Texas Chamber of Commerce? The Texas Medical Association? If you answered any of these you would be wrong. The most powerful lobby in Texas is the Retired Teacher's Association.

According to Leslie Hinds, president of the Midland Retired Teachers Association, there are 128,000 retired school teachers in Texas. But of equal or greater importance, there are 550,000 school employees currently contributing each month to the retirement system.

While members of this group indeed contribute money to the Retired Teachers Association, their power does not come from large campaign contributions. Rather, their power comes from their sheer numbers, their intensely focused special interest, and their incredibly well-organized lobbying network.

Picture this: I'm in my office in Austin at 9:30 on the night of Nov. 16. No one knows I'm working that night. Yet the phone begins to ring. The eighth retired teacher to call that evening was Rose White. Rose taught in the Amarillo public schools for 32 years and retired in 1990 from Sanborn Elementary. She and the seven previous callers had only one issue on their minds. They wanted to make sure the Teacher Retirement money was not used to "launder money" in a new public school finance plan.

Gov. Richards, Speaker Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bullock's "FAIR SHARE PLAN" for public education included a proposal that monies recaptured from "property wealthy school districts" be put into the teacher retirement fund. They further proposed that an equal amount of money that had previously gone into the TRS out of the General Revenue Fund be diverted to the equalization process.

The leadership plan was released on Nov. 4. Within one hour after the plan had been made public, my Amarillo and Austin office began receiving phone calls from retired teachers urging us not to involve the TRS in any of our plans to equalize funding for education. I, of course, was not the only member to receive such calls. Bullock's office was besieged. Within a week, the major legislative leaders such as the chairman of the Senate Education Committee had agreed that the TRS provision would be removed. Every vigilante, however, the TRS network has continued its telephone calls, personal contacts and letters. I'm sure they will continue until

they are certain the teacher retirement funds have once again been saved from the Legislature.

One question that has been asked not only by retired teachers but by many with whom I talked with during the course of the special session is: "Why don't you just dedicate the revenues from the lottery to education and thereby solve the school finance problem?" While I do not oppose such a dedication, the answer is two-fold.

First, some of our state leaders convinced the people of Texas that the lottery would solve not only our education budget woes but all others. This is a tragic fraud. Total revenue from the Texas lottery for this biennium is not anticipated to exceed \$500 million. While that sounds like a lot of money it only amounts to about 1 percent of the total state budget. We spend approximately \$16 billion each year on public education in Texas. Thus, even if all the lottery revenues were dedicated to education they would only contribute less than 4 percent to the total financing package.

There is a second problem with dedicating lottery revenues to education. That is, once a dedicated stream of revenue is established, legislatures have a nasty habit of redirecting the original funds that went to a program. California probably provides the best example. The state adopted a personal income tax that was sold to the people by dedicating its proceeds to public education. Californians got their income tax. But then once education had a dedicated stream of revenue, the general revenue funds that had previously gone to public education were diverted for other state purposes.

While I would not oppose dedicating lottery funds to education, a preferable policy that would demonstrate Texas' long-term commitment to funding public education would be to require the Legislature to adopt an appropriations bill for public education before it could appropriate money for any other state function. While folks in the criminal-justice system, health-and-human services and higher education might complain about such a requirement, leaders from each of those communities have told me that public education is the long-term answer to their basic problems.

Traveling With The Texas Angler

This time of year a fishing trip to the coast can either be great, or terrible. This is primarily due to the weather. Pacific fronts or Artic fronts arrive in Texas at least every 3-7 days from November through February. If the day you've chosen to fish is the day the front arrives, you're most likely in trouble. However, if your day on the water is the day after the front blows through, you're in for a pretty good day.

Reports are coming in from Port Arthur to Port Mansfield that fishing is best right now on the jetties. These man made rock ridges separate the bay system from the gulf's open water. During the early part of winter, trout, redfish, and flounder begin to leave the shallow water bays and head for deep water. They find the first deep water at the jetties, and this is where they are right now. As these fish migrate past the jetties, they are basically funneled through a narrow pass which causes them to bunch up. Hitting these rocks this time of year, you are almost assured of action.

Not only do the inland bay species locate around jetties, but offshore species also are caught there on occasion. Kingfish, pompano and shark are not uncommon at all. As far as planning your trip, you should watch the weather. Do not try to fish the jetties during strong winds. Fish from waves is terrible and will create a miserable day of fishing, even if the fish are biting. Many saltwater jetty fishermen have their equipment ready, so they

can make the trip on short notice when conditions are right.

Jetty fishing requires little equipment compared to bay fishing out of a boat. Most areas have access from roads or a jetty boat service that runs on a schedule to drop off and pick up fishermen.

Artificial lures (soft plastic, live and dead bait all work great. A couple of rod/reel combinations, an ice chest and net are all that's needed. Most successful jetty fishermen will fish one rod with cut or live bait under the float. (If you fish with a bottom rig, you're likely to get hung in the rocks). While that rod is waiting for a bite, they cast with artificials.

Remember to check the minimum length requirements (and maximum for redfish) of your saltwater fish and measure them carefully. This time of year, the jetties are full of fish and game wardens.

New Sallie Mae Program Rewards Students

Sallie Mae (Student Loan Marketing Association) announced that it is introducing the Great Rewards Program, the first national student loan repayments on their Stafford student loans by significantly reducing their interest payments.

"Great Rewards is a whole new concept in education lending," said Sallie Mae Senior Vice President Lydia Marshall. "Under this program, borrowers whose loans we own and service will be able to reduce their interest payments simply by repaying their loans on time -- and we'll be helping them do that."

Stafford loans are the predominant type of student loan, with \$15 billion in lender originations annually and more than \$60 billion outstanding. Sallie Mae, which buys Stafford and other types of education loans from originating lenders, is the nation's largest holder and servicer of such loans.

"If borrowers make payments on time," Marshall explained, "we don't have to perform additional, costly collection procedures that are required by law when borrowers' payments are late, such as sending overdue notices and making telephone calls. Great Rewards

Adopting A "New Attitude" Could Reduce Cancer Deaths

Adopting a "new Attitude" about nutrition and early detection could reduce the rate of colorectal cancer deaths in African-Americans, says Dr. John I. Hughes, a gastroenterologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"An important first step is making a simple change in dietary habits," said Hughes, a clinical professor of medicine at Baylor. "Preparing meals with high-fiber foods instead of fried and other fatty foods may actually lessen the chances of getting colorectal cancer."

Although traditional foods prepared in many African-American households may be well-balanced, certain fatty foods can increase the risk of colorectal cancer. It's no secret that adding more "roughage" to the diet can significantly reduce the risks, says Hughes.

One in 10 Americans eat the recommended daily allowance of fruits and vegetables, according to the National Cancer Institute (NCI). African-Americans appear to eat even fewer fruits and vegetables each day than whites.

Hughes recommends eating more fiber-rich foods like broccoli, cauliflower, whole grain breads, bran cereal and other foods rich in fiber, calcium and vitamin A. Such bulky foods could inhibit the production of cancer-causing agents.

Colorectal cancer involves the lower part of the digestive system or colon, interfering with storage and elimination of waste. More than 60,000 Americans die of the disease each year.

Although colorectal cancer deaths have declined significantly for whites, according to the NCI, there has been an increase in deaths from this disease among black men.

Studies have shown that a high-fat, low-fiber diet is linked to colorectal cancer because it may trigger production and concentration of dietary cancer-causing agents. A diet low in fat and high in fiber could reduce the chances of getting colorectal cancer by more than 50 percent.

Colorectal cancer can develop without warning. Hughes says that blacks over age 50 are frequently diagnosed with advanced colorectal cancer, leaving little hope for cure.

"Many older blacks with signs of colorectal cancer usually hesitate or cannot afford to see a doctor until it's too late," Hughes said.

People who are age 40 and older, or who have a family history of the disease are especially at risk for colorectal cancer and should have an annual rectal exam and blood test to check for the disease.

Colorectal cancer warning signs include:

- Rectal pain or bleeding
- Frequent narrowing of the stools or bloody stools
- A change in bowel habits or a feeling of incomplete emptying after bowel movements.
- Unexplained weight loss, paleness and tiredness.

"Colorectal cancer can be successfully treated and cured," Hughes said. "The choice is up to each individual to get screened for early detection of the disease, which can save lives."

provides borrowers with an incentive for making payments on time, and the savings we achieve will be shared with deserving borrowers. We hope this will be an incentive for more borrowers to avoid delinquency."

Marshall said Great Rewards is just the first of a series of major initiatives Sallie Mae plans to inaugurate over the next twelve months, such as automatic electronic loan payments, that will make the student borrowing experience easier and repayment more manageable for all who participate.

"Automatic electronic transfer of borrowers' monthly payments from their account to ours -- and the other initiatives we will implement -- will give borrowers

additional tools for making timely payments, so they can achieve the cost-savings that are available under Great Rewards," added Marshall.

The Great Rewards Program rewards borrowers who make on-time payments on their Stafford loans for each of the first 48 months of repayment -- by reducing their interest rate by two percentage points for the remaining term of all of the Stafford loans in their account with Sallie Mae. For a typical borrower with Stafford loans totalling \$5,000, this would result in a savings of approximately \$250. Borrowers who obtain Stafford loans in each year of undergraduate school, totalling as much as \$23,000, would save more than \$1,100 in interest payments.

Students who obtain Stafford loans after January 1, 1993, which are subsequently sold to Sallie Mae and serviced at one of its loan servicing centers before they enter

repayment, will be eligible for the program. Only lenders with commitments to sell their Stafford loans to Sallie Mae for servicing on its systems, however, can assure borrowers up-front of access to the Great Rewards Program. The program will be offered to borrowers whose loans are owned and serviced by Sallie Mae and who enter repayment on or after July 1, 1993. For the names of participating lenders, students should contact their school financial aid officer, who will be provided the names of lenders servicing their campus that are participating in the program.
