

Roach's bills paid out of DA's forfeiture account

The \$18,630.83 in bills filed in 31st District Court in connection with the prosecution of Rick Roach on state charges has been paid out of the 31st District Attorney's forfeiture account, according to District Attorney Lynn Switzer.

"I've already paid all of David Scott's bills, the video company bill and the accounting bill," Switzer said Wednesday. "All bills submitted to me have been paid."

account, she said, meaning that payment of the bills does not come from money collected from Gray County residents.

Gray County residents do, however, pay the cost of Roach's courtappointed attorney, Bill Kelly of Canyon, Switzer said, even though Kelly is not on the list of courtapproved attorneys. Court-appointed attorneys are paid for through an account which is part of the Gray County budget.

Gray County provides the majori-A court order already in place con- ty of the funds in the account for court-appointed attorneys, meaning that local property taxes fund the account. The state reimburses the

county for a portion of the attorneys' costs, but the county pays the majority of the fees, according to County Judge Richard Peet.

Roach was indicted June 21 by a Gray County grand jury on a charge of aggravated perjury in connection with an affidavit of financial status and request for court-appointed counsel. The affidavit and request had been filed June 10 by Kelly and indicated that Roach was requesting Kelly as his court-appointed attorney because he was unable to pay for his own defense.

David Scott of Perryton, 31st District attorney pró tem concerning state charges against Roach, filed a

court document in response, and pointed out that Roach had assets including real estate, a retirement fund, a coin collection and other items which should disqualify him from being considered financially unable to pay for his own defense.

The three bills totaling more than \$18,000 are dated Oct. 24 and were filed Oct. 26 in the 31st District Clerk's office by Scott. They consist of \$610 for copying VHS tapes, DVDs and CDs; \$6,725.20 for an accounting firm's audit of financial records from Roach's tenure as 31st

Sales of previously owned homes fall

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sales of previously owned homes fell by 1.7 percent in November, fresh evidence that the high-flying housing Jones industrials were up 20 market is losing altitude.

The latest snapshot of activity in the nousing market, released by the National Association of Realtors on Thursday, showed that November's sales of existing homes, including singlefamily, town homes and condominiums, totaled 6.97 million units at a seasonally adjusted annual rate. It marked the lowest level of sales since March and the second month in a row that sales went down.

In other economic news. the number of new people signing up for unemployment benefits rose last week, but even with the pickup the level of applications still pointed to an improving job

The Labor Department's applications filed for uneminsurance increased by a seasonally adjusted 3,000 to 322,000

for the week ending Dec. 24. That matched economists' expectations.

In the housing report, the over-the-month decline was slightly steeper than the 1.3 percent drop that analysts were expecting before the report was released.

Yet, even with the drop, economists said the housing market remains in healthy shape and is on track to set record-high home sales for the fifth year in a row for all of 2005.

"We are really on track for a soft landing," said David Lereah, the association's chief economist. Moderately rising mortgage rates are allowing the housing market thus far to land safely, he said. "There are no balloons popping," he said.

Other housing barometers — including a drop in newreport showed that new home sales in November also have flashed signs that the market has peaked and is now slowing.



COP CORNER

Ever since the left turn lanes on our major streets and highways were put in, I have wondered if the motoring public really understands what these lanes are for. There are a few problems I see about their use.

Drivers are using the center lane as a "merge" lane instead of a turning left lane. There seems to be a little confusion when there are double yellow lines on either side of the center lane.

Last, it seems drivers enter the center lane at the wrong place when approaching an intersection. Drivers, like when pulling out of a business, should proceed across the turn lane and into the first clear traffic lane.

That means you have to wait for traffic to clear so you can go safely. If you pull into the center lane and wait for a break in the traffic, then you impede other drivers who want to use the center lane and you violate the traffic code.

The citation is driving in the center lane and not turning left. It is also called "staging." When you have the double lines on each side of the turn

lane, then you should turn left from the traffic lane just like there is no center lane. Just be sure to signal your turn in plenty of time.

Approaching an intersection, drivers should move into the center turn between where the yellow line ends and before the white line begins. If you enter the turn lane before this point it raises the risk of a collision. The person ahead of you is not anticipating having to look for a car passing them on the left as they enter the center

Panhandle, are under a burn ban," Goehring said in telephone interview Wednesday.

Dry conditions and high winds make it more difficult to extinguish a fire quickly, both chiefs agreed.

"A small bar ditch fire now turns into five to 10 acres of grass fire quickly," Millican said. "This year, on what should be a onetruck fire, we're having to send three. The conditions require more men, more trucks and more water. The fire spreads a lot faster."

"We've got so much wide-open space that if a fire took hold, it could go for miles," Powell said. "And gullies and washes make it harder to chase those fires."

Low humidity increases the danger of fire, as can the time of year, she said.

"In winter, everything is dead," Powell said. "It's like kindling."

Hoover Volunteer Fire Department has been on one and one-half times as many grass fires as usual for the period from Oct. 1 to date, Millican said. The current grass fire total for the department is near 30, he said.

"These fires are burning 40. 50 or 60 acres," Millican said. "One in Roberts County in late October involved a couple of sections of land, or 1,200 to 1,500 acres."

HVFD's total includes

not only Gray and Roberts counties but assistance rendered through an agreement with Carson, Wheeler and Hutchinson counties.

Powell urges caution when handling anything that could cause a fire, and pointed out the legal liability involved in using fireworks and outdoor burns.

"If a person causes a fire on their own land and it travels to another's land and does damage, that person is liable," she said.

The City of Pampa has ordinances against fireworks and outdoor burning inside city limits, she said, and violators can be fined.

Millican urges caution when setting off fireworks, and warns against trying to put out a small fire during such dry conditions.

"Be careful with fireworks, especially aerial fireworks that go up in the air," he said. "The instant any grass catches on fire, call the fire department. Don't try to put it out yourself.

"Some rural citizens have tried to help that way and ended up getting minor burns," he said.

Will Gray County join the list of counties under burn bans?

"I've asked the commissioners to let me know anytime they want to be put on the agenda to consider a burn ban, and so for no one has done so," said County Judge Richard Peet in a telephone interview Wednesday.

"Be really careful. It's really dry," Millican said. "Everybody just be safe."

El Paso Times on distracted driving:

Cell phones present increasing problem Think of it this way: As you're driving along Interstate 10 at 60 mph (yeah, right!) in heavy traffic, about 10 percent of the people around you – that's one in every 10 cars you see – are yakking on a cell phone.

That statistic, from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, should put a good scare into you.

Because people who are talking on cell phones aren't paying full attention to their driving and thus have become accidents waiting to happen. It's classic distracted driving. That's probably right for other drivers, but not for me, you're probably saying right now.

I can multitask, drive and talk on the phone at the same time without sacrificing safety. Of course, that's patently absurd. Once you start fumbling with the phone, dialing, pressing buttons, looking for text messages or even just concentrating on a conversation, your attention has been compromised and you become a danger to drivers around you.

In fact, a study published in July's British Medical Journal showed that drivers using cell phones were four times more likely -- four times! -- to get into a crash serious enough to put them in a hospital.

Some people like to take comfort in the idea that using hands-free phones while driving reduces the risks. Not so, according to a study by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety. The study determined that it didn't necessarily matter whether a hand-held or hands-free phone was used. Both increased risk.

And who does the most talking?

NHTSA says women are more likely to use phones while driving than men, 8 percent to 5 percent. Industry officials have a perfectly valid argument in response, noting that drivers are distracted in many other ways besides phone use. Tuning in the radio or messing with the CD player, balancing a cup of hot coffee in one hand, trying to unwrap and eat fast food, applying makeup, talking with other passengers and actually turning to look at them. Some people even read while driving - maps, newspapers, even books.

And, of course, there's what seems to be an increasing problem with tired drivers, making dozing at the wheel an incredibly dangerous form of distracted driving. But special attention must be paid to cell phones because it's an emerging and growing technology. It will become cheaper and more and more available, and more people will use them. It's a driving hazard that shows every indication of growing rather than retreating.

Laws against using cell phones while driving are scarce. Ten states and the District of Columbia have restrictions on young drivers using cell phones. Connecticut, New York, New Jersey and D.C. forbid use of hand-held phones while driving.

To his credit, Texas state Rep. Paul Moreno, D-El Paso, has tried for some time to have restrictions in Texas, but to no avail. Don't drive distracted. Don't use cell phones, hand-held or hands-free, while driving. Use them only in an emergency, and then try to pull over before use.

Newsmaker interview with Tony Snow

Pundit and commentator Tony Snow hasn't been the host of "Fox News Sunday" since 2003. But the former director of speechwriting for the first President Bush is keeping busy hosting "The Tony Snow Show," his 9 a.m.-to-noon morning talk show on Fox News Radio, and "Weekend Live With Tony Snow" on the Fox News Channel.

Snow, who is back to writing a weekly syndicated newspaper column again and can be heard on satellite via Sirius or XM Radio, has spent most of the year fighting colon cancer. I talked to him by telephone on Thursday:

Q: First, how is your

A: My health is doing great. I had surgery in February to remove the colon. I had chemotherapy April through September. I had a followup operation to finish everything off. The good news for me is that I'm done with surgery. I'm done with chemotherapy. The CATscans have come back completely clean. The blood tests are encouraging. But as anybody who's had cancer knows, what you do is you keep doing your CAT scans. I'll do that every three months just to make sure we're still on track.

Q: A few years ago when I talked to you, you called yourself more libertarian than Republican. Is that still

A: Yeah, I think so. I learned a long time ago that if you sit around and pledge your fealty to politicians, you're going to get burnt. So what I like to do is maintain my independence. I'm clearly conservative. But I've been bashing conservatives on various forms of corruption, including spending money on stuff that's completely idiotic, like, oh, the fact that they are now going to have subsidies for people to have digital signals on their TVs. It's unbelievable. They are actually setting up They'll give them \$40 or \$60 per TV to digitize them. Give me a break!

Q: You recently wrote that Republicans are cowards because they have forsaken their core beliefs and betrayed the Republican Revolution of 1994. How

A: What happened is when Republicans came in in 1994, what did they say? They said



Dear Abby...

DEAR CYNTHIA: You have a point, but the mail that came in response to "Aaron's" query indicates that various readers saw the problem in a different light. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: In my years of work answering a company telephone, I have discovered that saying, "May I SAY who is calling, please?" conveys the idea that the need to know is to relay the information to the call recipient. "May I ASK who is calling" has a note of nosiness to it, and does not imply that the need to know is just to relay the name. Before I learned this trick, people would sometimes take offense at the question. However, using the word "say" instead of the word "ask" has never resulted in offense taken. -- DIANE IN GARDINER, MAINE

DEAR ABBY: You missed a golden opportunity to educate your readers on proper phone manners! I have always stressed to my teenagers, and their friends, that when they make a phone call, they

should identify themselves first, then ask for the person they wish to speak to, as in, "Hello, this is John. May I please speak to Kenny?" Not only will this prevent the problem of the person wondering who is calling, it's just common sense and good manners. DEAR ABBY: I agree with your advice to "Aaron" -- however, there is one exception. When I was in my teens, my mother became an ordained minister. From that time on, if someone called for her and didn't identify him/herself, we didn't ask, as there might be confidentiality issues for the caller. - MARGARET IN PHILADEL-**PHIA**

DEAR ABBY: About 40 years ago, a grand old New York department store opened a suburban branch in our area. They had a team from the telephone company come in and give a few classes in telephone etiquette to all the new employees. We were instructed to say, "May I TELL her who is calling?" in a pleasant tone, and I have done it ever since. People are invariably politely responsive. Also, we were told never to "mute" the receiver against our diaphragm while calling someone to the phone, because the chest cavity acts as an amplifier. Imagine a caller hearing, "It's that pest again!" or something worse vibrating through the phone. I enjoy your column. -- TAMPA READER
