Dear Parents and School Community:

The 1991-92 school year will begin on Wednesday, August 14, 1991. It needs to be emphasized that your continued support of the Borden County Independent District is sincerely appreciated.

The tremendous display of support that was shown for our school during last year's community meeting and the legislative session that followed was one of the many indicators that substantiates the fact that the people of the Borden County School Community will do what it takes to protect the standard of excellence that is synonymous with the Borden County School and Community. It may seem that our efforts to negate the unacceptable intentions of many of the state legislators was unproductive when we consider the pending tax burden that is inevitable for schools such as ours that have had the luxury of having a low tax rate and high property values. However, you can be assured that your efforts were of paramount importance in relation to preventing the "legislative machine" from destroying our school and community. Yes, tax rates will increase drastically in school districts throughout the state that were considered to be tax havens by the plaintiffs demanding equity in the Edgewood v. Kirby lawsuit and the legislators looking for an easy way to solve the school finance crisis while protecting their respective bids for re-election. The entire process is nothing less than disgusting and "gutt wrenching". It is simply unacceptable to place a burden on one group and to reduce the educational opportunity of that group in order to attempt to make everyone the same. It is equally unacceptable to circumvent the laws of our state that prohibit a state property tax without the vote of the people of the state by devising an innovative concept which we all know now as the County Education District which will be used as a vehicle to shift money from one school district to another and to allow the state to place an increased financial burden on the property owner in the name of "equity" and under the pretense that the legislature simply had no other alternative. This issue can be analyzed and criticized infinitely. However, the primary thing that we must consider when dealing with this issue is that the educational opportunity of our children is simply something that we cannot emphasize enough. The idea of "our children being our future" is a powerful reality. There is no way that we can avoid this issue or its ramifications. There is also no way that we will ultimately avoid paying for our children's educational experience.

There is no doubt that the 1991-92 school year will be a year of transition for the Borden County School as we bear the burden of new state mandates and a new taxing system to generate the needed revenue to fund the efforts of our School District. We must continue to advance and maintain the excellence that has been an integral part of our school and community. Therefore, we solicit your continued support of the Borden County School District during the 1991-92 school year in order to provide our students with the best educational experience that we can provide them. You are invited to visit the school at any time during the school year. Please do not wait for a special invitation or for your child to have problems in school before you visit his/her teachers about his/her progress. It also needs to be emphasized that your interest and involvement in your child's education is directly correlated to the level of success that he/she will experience during his/her school experience. Again, we appreciate you!

You will probably be surprised to see some "old faces in new places" during the upcoming school year. Mrs. Deidre Smith will teach kindergarten, Mrs. Paula Miller will teach first grade, Mrs. Shirley McMeans will teach third grade, and Mr. John Wilson will teach fifth grade. In addition, several teachers that have previously taught at the secondary level will be assigned to teach classes that they are certified to teach and that they have not taught in the recent past. Mrs. Peggy Frisbie will serve in the food services department, and Mrs. Verna Adcock will serve as an instructional aide during the morning and as the co-editor of the Borden Star during the afternoon. I am confident that the personnel shifts that will take place within our District during the upcoming year will facilitate an outstanding school year.

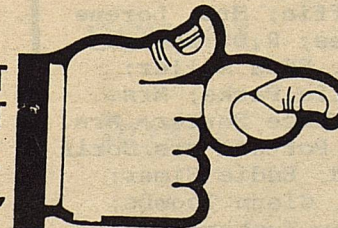
CROWNED "MISS LAMESA RODEO"

from 1:00 P.M.-4:00 P.M. on Monday, August 12, 1991. Students that have conflicts on August 12th may register from 9:00 to 4:00 on Wednesday, August 7th; 9:00-4:00 on Thursday, August 8th; or 9:00-4:00 on Friday, August 9th.

- School will begin at 8:10 A.M. and conclude at 3:35 P.M. each day.
- Buses will run according to the above schedule. Please be assured that bus routes will be modified or not traveled when the weather conditions warrant such action.
- Delays in the start of school, early dismissals, and school cancellations which take place as a result of inclement weather will be reported to KAMC TV-Channel 28 of Lubbock, KLBK TV-Channel 13 of Lubbock, KCBD TV-Channel 11 of Lubbock, KBYG Radio Station-1400 AM of Big Spring, KPET Radio Station-690 AM of Lamesa, KSNY Radio Station-1450 AM & FM of Snyder, KPOS Radio Station-1370 AM of Post, and KLLL Radio Station-1590 AM & 96.3 FM of Lubbock.
- Season tickets for school athletic functions will be available for purchase on September 1st. The price will be \$20.
- Student insurance will be available again this year. Students will be given packets at the beginning of the school year if you desire to purchase this coverage.
- Lunch prices will be \$1.00 for students in grades K-7 and \$1.25 for students in grades 8-12. The reduced lunch price for students that qualify will be 40¢ for all students. The regular price for breakfast will be 25¢ for all students. The reduced breakfast price for students that qualify will be 10¢ for all students. Visitors are also welcome to eat in the school cafeteria during the noon hour. The price for visitor's lunches will be \$1.25 for children and \$2.50 for adults.

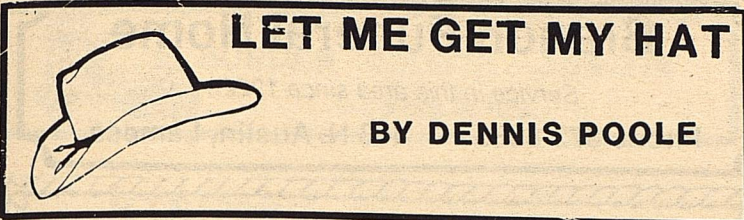

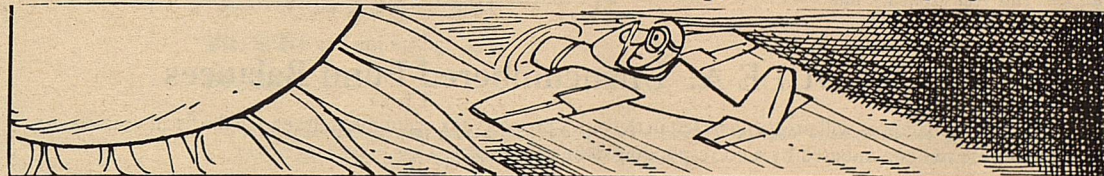
foods and nutrition and many other project areas improve your chances of being considered for educational scholarships.

Notice of Effective Tax Rate (for use by counties)

1992 Property Tax Rates in Borden County

This notice concerns 1992 property tax rates for Borden County. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. 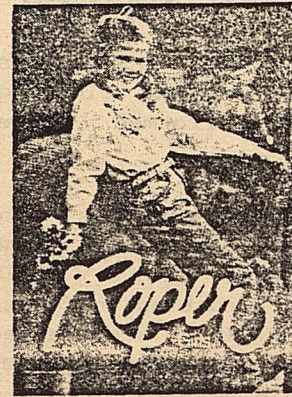
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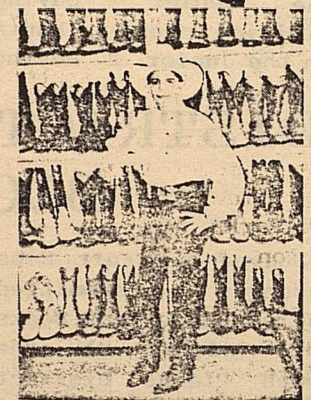

Turf Fund Report: Dennis Poole gave an update on the financial status of the Turf Fund.
