

## Borden County school installs new computer lab

A new computer lab to be used by all grade levels is a new addition awaiting the return of students this month in the Borden County school system at Gail.

Second-year superintendent Jimmy Thomas said the new IBM computer lab would allow the students to become acquainted with the technology and skills they will need to succeed in tomorrow's world.

One use of the new lab will be a new micro-computer applications course for high school students.

Although returning students might not notice the change, Thomas said one part

of the school will be gone. Or, at least one substance.

Borden Co. ISD's asbestos abatement project has completely removed that substance from the school, Thomas said.

Thomas said long-time pricipal Mickey McMeans will return to direct grades K-12.

Last year's high school faculty remains intact, but Thomas has hired a new kindergarten teacher and shuffled some personnel in the elementary school.

Deidre Smith is the new kindergarten teacher. She replaced Beverly Copeland, who retired.

Paula Miller will

be moving from third to first grade. She replaces Doris Steadman, who also retired.

John Wilson will be moving from the high school to fifth grade to teach English.

Shirley McMeans will move from teaching Gifted and Talented courses to third grade, a position which she has previously held.

Returning to the second and fourth grades, respectively are Pat Murphy and Dorothy Gray.

"We have an outstanding group of teachers and a outstanding group of kids," Thomas said. "We're looking for a good school year.

Thomas is expecting 190 students to enroll in the county-wide school, with an anticipated high school enrollment of 53.



With the start of approaching, school all drivers are urged to use caution and to obey state laws when around school buses.

You should be aware that it is unlawful to pass a school bus that is displaying alternately flashing red lights. Children are Instead, loading or unloading while these lights are flashing.

Motorists remain stopped until the school bus resumes motion, until they are signaled by the bus


driver to proceed, or until the red lights on the bus are no longer flashing.

#### BREAKFAST . . . Energy Booster

School is just around the corner, and parents are beginning to shop for supplies. But a nutritionist at the Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston says one obvious entry on the annual checklist is often overlooked —breakfast.

It is the most important meal of the day, especially for children. Breakfast supplies 1/4 to 1/2 of the recommended daily allowance of vitamains and minierals. If you skip breakfast, it is hard to catch up during the day.

Mastering the three Rs requires a lot of energy. Without breakfast, children are usually hungry by midmorning. A hungry child is too cranky and too tired to concentrate on school-work.

Breakfast gives a child an energy boost improving his or her behavior, attitude and physical and mental performance.

Healthy breakfasts draw on several of the basic food groups. Parents can fortify their mini-scholars by serving a dairy product, a protein, a bread or cereal and a fruit.

However, it is okay to vary the menu and offer foods that do not fit the traditional breakfast ideal.

The following alternatives are suggested:

\* peanut butter and jelly sandwich

- \* yogurt and toast with jelly
- \* fresh fruit and cottage cheese
- \* cheese and crackers
- \*soup
- \* popcorn
- \* breakfast taco
- \* leftovers


Before parents rush to the store and overstock the pantry with breakfast "goodies" they are encouraged to read labels.

To add protein to the morning meal, either Canadian bacon or ham that has been prepared in a non-stick skillet or microwave oven. Only 45% of the calories in Canadian bacon or ham come from fat.

Despite good intentions, parents may undermine efforts to start their child's day on a healthy note. Children's food choices and eating habits are influenced by the preferences of their parents.

Parents must set a good example, and Mom is an especially important role model. If she sips coffee and munches on a doughnut, what kind of message is she sending her child?

When possible, parents should also include the child in menu planning, shopping and meal preparation. The entire family should practive the ABCs of good nutrition.

#### Tank Registration

The Texas Water Commission has announced that, beginning immediately, owners of underground and aboveground storage tanks who have not yet registered their tanks with the state agency may do so without penalty for late registration until October 15, 1991.

"Many individuals or small business owners who own and operate tanks, or who have unused tanks on their property,

registered the tanks with the TWC because of lack of knowledge regarding registration requirements or a fear of penalties for late registration," TWC Executive Director Allen Beinke. "Because our main goal is for every tank to be properly registered in order to protect the environment, we are granting this short 'grace period' for owners to voluntarily

ACP funds are still available for cost sharing of conservation work on farms and ranches.

The Committee will review all applications received before their meeting in August. Priority will be given to those practices which achieve the most conservation benefit and can be completed by October 1.

#### MEASUREMENT SERVICE

Producers who requested crop measurement service should begin receiving their notices of measured acres soon. Remember that there is no tolerance this year on measurement service. If we measure your crop and the acreage exceeds the permitted, an acreage adjustment must be made back to the permitted. When an adjustment is made, the measurement service guarantee is lost and the crop becomes subject to a spotcheck - usually with only a 1.0 acre tolerance. If ACR is measured at less than the required, additional ACR must be provided which is also subject to a random spotcheck.

The measurement service notice will state the final date for you to make necessary adjustments and report acreages to the county office. Watch this date closely. If it is missed, latefiled fees will apply.

#### TOLERANCES

It will soon be time to conduct 1991 compliance spotchecks. The computer will select our spotchecks at random, unless you are a county committeeman who is required to be checked on all farms each year.

If you are selected for a spotcheck this is what you can expect. All crops and land uses certified will be measured and compared to the acres you reported. When there is a difference, a tolerance will be applied of at least 1.0 acre of 5 percent of the reported acres not to exceed 10 acres. The tolerance for program crops applies to differences of more or less than the reported acres. For ACR, CU for Pay, and CU for P&CP the tolerance applies only to differences less than the reported.

If you receive a notice of measured acres after a spotcheck, read it carfully. The notice will alert you if there is a discrepancy problem and you will have 15 days to respond. Your response is to appeal in writing to the county committee for a good faith determination. If they agree, the farm will be brought back into the program with standard payment reductions.

#### FAILED ACRES

Before mechanically destroying program crop acres that have failed, file a 574 to receive credit for planting the crop. A farm visit will be made and you will be notified as to when you may make other use of the acreage.

#### 1992 WHEAT PROGRAM

The 1992 wheat program has been announced with a

5% acreage reduction. The reduction for 1991 was 15%. There will be no paid land diversion. Producers who comply with the 1992 requirement will qualify for target price protection at \$4.00 per bushel, the same as this year. SCS PLANS

If you are farming highly erodible land and participating in a USDA program, you are required to have a conservation plan on file with SCS. Please review your plans and make sure you are in compliance with it. When windstrips or rotation crops are planted, you should report this to SCS. If the plan you currently have is not serving your needs, talk to SCS about a revision. Don't wait until you are spotchecked to find out that you are not following the plan—severe penalties may apply.

Haying and grazing of ACR and CU for Pay is authorized if requested by the producer and designated at the county office. Come by to sign a register before haying or grazing your ACR from now until September 1.

WEED CONTROL

Weeds continue to grow with the recent rains. We are making maintenance checks on ACR, CU for Pay, and CRP. Be a good neighbor and control your weeds before they cause a problem.

Owners of underground storage tanks that contain petroleum and subother hazardous have been stances 1987 since to register those tanks with the Texas Water Commission. Tanks not currently in use, but not properly closed out according to TWC standards, also must be registered. In addition, aboveground storage tanks contain motor fuel-type petroleum products have been required to register with the Commission since 1990.

Only owners of registered petroleum storage tanks eligible for clean-up reimbursement from the state's petroleum storage tank remediation fund in the event their tanks leak and result in environmental contamination.

After the tank registration "amnesty" period ends on October 15, 1991, owners with unregistered tanks are subject to fines of up to \$10,000 per day. The amnesty policy does not apply to

persons who have unregistered tanks that are discovered independently by the

Texas Water Commission.

Registration requirements do not apply to certain tanks exempted by law or excluded by TWC rules, including small farm and residential tanks of less than 1100 gallons, heating oil hydraulic lifts. hazardous waste tanks, wastewater treatment ground storage tanks of less than 1100 gallons, and certain other exempted excluded tanks.


