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Cornelison, Hahn in runoff for county treasurer

Willoughby wins; runoff April 11

A runoff election between incumbent Gray County Treasurer Lee Cornelison and challenger Scott Hahn will be April 11 as a result of Tuesday's election returns.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Gary Willoughby won his re-election bid with 322 votes as opposed to 251 for his challenger, Durward Dunlap, on the Republican ticket. The county treasurer and Precinct 2 commissioner races were the only two local contested races.


Cornelison was in a three-way race with Hahn, who was Gray County Treasurer for 16 years before Cornelison won four years ago, and Tory Peet, a teacher and coach. The same three ran in the 2002 election. All are Republican Party candidates.

Cornelison received 975 votes in Tuesday's primary. Hahn earned 753, and Peet garnered 418.

Election law states that in races involving more than two persons, if any one candidate does not receive a total number of votes equal to 50 percent of all votes cast plus one vote, a runoff election will be held between the candidates earning the

Cornelison's total represents 45.4 percent of votes cast in the county treasurer's race, while Hahn got 35.1 percent of the votes and Peet garnered 19.5 percent.

"The job of county treasurer is very important and needs to be done right. I believe that out of the two candidates in the runoff, Scott Hahn will do it correctly. I encourage those who voted for me to do



Exxon to boost spending by almost \$2 billion by 2010

NEW YORK (AP) -Exxon Mobil Corp. forecast today that its spending on oil and gas drilling, refining and chemicals manufacturing would rise from about \$18 billion now to almost \$20 billion a year between 2007 and 2010.

The world's largest publicly traded oil company said in a presentation prepared for Wall Street analysts that roughly three-fourths of that amount would go to oil and natural gas exploration and production, boosting output by about 1 million barrels a end of the decade. In 2005, than 4 million barrels of oil

Exxon CEO Rex Tillerson said the company's estimated boost in spending "is not

driven by short-term swings in commodity prices or earnings," but rather reflects a methodical completion of projects already waiting in the wings.

"We invest our shareholders money wisely, in projects that remain attractive over the long term," Tillerson said.

While the industry has been under attack by some members of Congress seeking a so-called windfall profits tax — an outcry that gained momentum after gasoline prices jumped above \$3 a gallon late last year - Tillerson noted that Exxon has invested more money than it has earned day, or 20 percent, by the over the past 15 years. He said the criticism coming out Exxon said it produced more of Washington only highlights "how little the working fundamentals of our business are understood."

outside the United States, as energy-rich countries such as Venezuela and Russia seek tighter control of their resources and more compensation from outside oil and gas producers. Exxon operates in both countries.

"It's difficult to make any new commitments to major investments in Venezuela," Tillerson said in response to an analyst's question about geopolitical challenges. He said there is "still a question of the Russian government deciding where they want the foreign investors to play and how they want them to participate."

"There's only so much pushing you want to do on this whole process," he added. "I'm taking more of a patient view."

Now he faces what many consider the real contest — a general election fight against an organized, well-funded Democrat with a score to

Lampson spent the primary campaign season raising money in the Houstonarea district, building support in Washington and around the country from Democrats who saw the first chance in 22 years to unseat the embattled DeLay. Lampson raised \$2 million, about what it cost DeLay to keep the nomination.

Lampson told supporters that he was a man with "thick skin and hard hands"

"Tom DeLay gets headsons," he said. "Well, I'm looking forward to that headline on November 8th — No Further DeLay."

DeLay was indicted last year and is awaiting trial on charges that he illegally funneled corporate donations to GOP candidates for the Texas House in 2002. The Republicans won a majority in the Legislature that year, and then pushed through DeLay's congressional redistricting plan that sent more Republicans Washington in 2004.

DeLay also has come under scrutiny over his ties to Abramoff, who pleaded guilty to fraud in January and is cooperating in an investigation of influencepeddling on Capitol Hill.

cent, but Satterwhite said they had decided to join in the bond issue.

Lamesa, Brownfield and Levelland have approved participating in the issue.

The new water rights are an expansion of the groundwater rights that CRMWA began buying a decade ago.

Initially, the water authority bought 70,000 acres of water rights in Roberts County for the John C. Williams Well Field. The water was to be mixed with the authority's main water supply in Lake Meredith, but the lake level is dropping. It is now just

shy of 60 feet deep. "It's still going down," Satterwhite said.

Recent rains have not added to the level of water in the lake, he said.

The record low for the lake, 58.41 feet, was set in June, 2004.

The purchase of the new water rights makes CRMWA the largest holder of groundwater rights in the state with an estimated 4.5 trillion gallons of groundwater.

Satterwhite said the recent purchases should allow CRMWA to maintain its commitments to the water authority's member cities when the lake is at low levels and will supplement Lake Meredith when lake levels are at more normal levels.

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Hillary can win with cultural forces

The Republican Party appears to be coalescing around the happy assumption that, while Hillary Clinton will win the Democratic nomination, she cannot be elected. So, the self-delusive logic says, she is really God's gift to the Republican Party.

This optimistic set of assumptions comes through loud and clear in the comments the president and Karl Rove made to Bill Sammon as he interviewed them for his new book "Strategery." But their confidence indicates simply that they don't even begin to understand what they will be up against in a Hillary candidacy.

It has always been Mrs. Clinton's "strategery" to wrap herself in the generic. By embracing a set of liberal issues, she avoids personal scrutiny. By identifying with working women who are "trying to balance career and family," she buys a pass on charges of a conflict of interest over Rose Law Firm representation of Arkansas while her husband was governor. And now, by hiding behind the generic question of "Are we ready for a woman president?" she invites the question of whether we want this particular woman in the Oval

The cultural forces that Hillary's candidacy will unleash – from the media, from Hollywood and from the cultural icons who decree our lifestyles – will be far beyond those that normally line up behind a presidential candidate. A small foretaste emerged in ABC TV's show "Commander in Chief." in which Geena Davis plays a female president who masters the men and the crises that litter her path. What

other presidential candidacy was foreshadowed by a prime-time,

hour-long weekly television show? Hillary's candidacy will not be Democratic so much as demographic and not nearly as political as it will be cultural. The pent-up emotions of half of America will rise to the surface just as Catholics rallied to JFK's candidacy in 1960.

And white women are the swing vote in our politics. George W. Bush carried them by only 1 percent in 2000 and lost the popular vote. He walked away with white women in 2004 by a 14-point margin and carried the electorate by 3.5 points.

White men will vote against Hillary, of course, but are they likely to exceed the 2-1 margin by which they backed Bush in 2004? Or is the GOP organization really going to be able to turn out more than 62 million voters, an increase of 12 million over its 2000 total with very little increase in national population?

Blacks will vote for Hillary with genuine affection rather than the mere duty that animated their support of John Kerry, and Hispanics, who strongly backed Hillary in New York state, are likely to return to the overwhelmingly Democratic vote they cast in 2000, rather than the more balanced ballots they cast

In the face of these demographic arguments, can Hillary's admittedly brittle public performances assure her defeat? Will voters see through her posture of moderation and hawkishness on terrorism? White men will. But white women won't. And Hillary will be elected.

Last year, my wife and I wrote about the urgency of a Condoleezza Rice candidacy to nullify Hillary's advantages. Since then, Rice, despite her best efforts to deny a candidacy, has caught fire among the American electorate. In the most recent Gallup poll, 12 percent named her, unaided, as the Republican they would like to see run, and the most up to date head-to-head poll, by the Marist Institute, shows her locked in a three-way tie with Rudy Giuliani and John McCain, with each candidate winning 22 percent of the Republican primary vote.

Those who listen to the melodious tones of Bush and Rove do a disservice to our country. The threat of a Hillary Clinton victory is real and present, and the usual suspects - the likes of Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist (R-Tenn.), Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney, Virginia Sen. George Allen, Nebraska Sen. Chuck Hagel, New York Gov. George Pataki et al. are not likely to be able to defeat her. Rudy could, but he won't be nominated because of his social liberalism. McCain could, but he lacks popularity with the GOP rank and file. Do not underestimate Hillary

Clinton's chances to win!





New book: Bonds juiced for years

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — The evidence keeps mounting that Barry Bonds might have been juiced for

Steroids. Human growth hormone. Insulin. He may have used them all during his pursuit of the home run record.

An upcoming book written by two San Francisco Chronicle reporters reveals the San Francisco slugger took quite the cocktail of performance-enhancing drugs for at least five seasons beginning in 1998 and claims of being clean. you later," San Francisco

he earned all his accolades from good old hard work.

An excerpt from "Game of Shadows," which details Bonds' extensive doping program, appears in the March 13 issue of Sports Illustrated.

"I won't even look at it. For what? There's no need to," Bonds said Tuesday after a workout Scottsdale Stadium.

Bonds has long dismissed speculation he used steroids and other substances to turn his average-sized body into a monstrous, home-run hitting machine.

"No, no, no, I don't want despite his constant denials to talk about Bonds. I'll see

Bonds has always insisted manager Felipe Alou said after the Giants' 12-3 win over San Diego in Peoria. He then bolted onto the bus.

> Now, even more questions arise about whether Bonds fairly moved up the career homers list to his current spot of No. 3 behind Babe Ruth and Hank Aaron.

Is Bonds' 41-year-old body finally breaking down in part because he's no longer taking the performance-enhancing drugs that aid athletes in their recov-

Is the added weight he's carrying around his middle the result of losing muscle mass he previously had while on steroids - or just a product of undergoing three knee operations last year?

Bonds, who testified before a California federal grand jury investigating steroid use by top athletes, repeatedly has denied using performance-enhancing drugs. "I've read what was reported," Bonds' agent, Jeff Borris, told The Associated Press. "Barry is looking forward to playing this year and the improved health of his knee, and being as productive as he's ever been."

Baseball did not ban performance-enhancing drugs until after the 2002 season, though there has long been suspicion star players such as Bonds were taking steroids to gain an edge. This book is yet another distraction for Bonds, who has become as accustomed to steroids questions in recent years as he has inquiries related to his powerful lefthanded swing.

'Gather all the facts' Mr. Stevens

Editor's note: The following was sent in response to a column by Sports Editor Michael J. Stevens in Monday's edition regarding Friday's game between the Lady Harvesters and Palo Duro soccer teams, a game Pampa High School officials say they opted to forfeit due to decreasing player numbers caused by injury.

I read the article about the Lady Harvesters soccer team. As I read the article, it became apparent that opinions and decisions were being made by people that do not understand the sport of soccer. It was inferred that by playing with fewer players, the team was being put in an unsafe situation. That is ridiculous and has no basis whatsoever. The world's official soccer governing association (FIFA) states that a team at that age group cannot have more than 11 players on the field or fewer than 7 players. All the other soccer associations use FIFA rules as the basis for their rules. In our local soccer association, we often play games with teams that have fewer players. Are you implying that we are putting our kids in an unsafe situation? FIFA and North Texas Soccer Association have set rules as to the maximum and minimum number of players on a soccer field. Are we smarter than the associations dedicated to the sport of soccer?

There have been five soccer girls injured this year. All but one of them occurred on our home field. All of the home field injuries have been in a non-contact situation. This means that even if another team is not present, our chances of injury on our home field are very high. So high in fact, that the referees have given our school warnings to repair the field. After the last injury, the referee filed a complaint to the UIL. Statistically, our girls are safer playing away from home. Borger has even volunteered to let us use their fields. I know that when personnel were sent to repair the fields, they were requested to leave. If we are so concerned about the safety of the girls, why don't we fix the fields?

In the article, it stated that the girls would have to play two 40 minute halves which would be risky and put them in an unfair situation. Typically, the players that start a soccer game will play the entire game unless injury requires a substitution. A coach will sometimes substitute to discuss strategy with a player or if the bench is deep, the coach will give new players some playing time to gain experience. Last year,

I formed a team from the high school girls and we played two U-19 girls teams from Lubbock. Since we traveled that far, I requested to play back to back games with an hour break. The games were delayed for an hour because of rain and it drizzled throughout the games. I only had eight girls show up and the other team had 11 plus five subs. We played both games (four 45-minute halves) down by 3 players, with no subs and we won both games. By the way, two of our eight girls were 8th graders. The last two indoor soccer seasons, these same girls played in the high school girls divi-We played Canyon, Palo Duro, Clovis, etc. We never had subs and most of the time we were short on the field. The first season our record was 7-1, this past winter our record was 5-3. Sure it was unfair. The other teams often had more players on the field. However, our girls

were determined to win. Pampa has a senior that can easily get a soccer scholarship at the college level. She is the best goalie in EVERY game that I have seen her play. She has been a member of my teams mentioned above. The first time she played goalie was when she was playing U10 (under 10 years old) in the Pampa Soccer Association. It never fails; opposing parents, players, and coaches at EVERY game rave about her abilities. She is the best goalie in this district PERIOD! I have seen her get kicked, punched, cussed at, double-teamed, and triple-teamed and that is on a good day. Hands down, she is the reason the Lady Harvesters have played close games. This young lady cried when the game was canceled last Friday because there was a possibility of college scouts

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attending. Was the administration thinking of her when they forfeited the game? What about the other talented seniors? I have been coaching soccer for 13 years. I have coached 4- to 19-year old girls. My teams usually place first and many times are undefeated. I have coached EVERY girl on the PHS soccer team except for one (she started soccer this year). I know them. I know what they are capable of doing. They should be the ones to determine if they lose a game. So Mr. Michael J. Stevens, before you judge the parents, the players, the referees, and the soccer associations, I suggest you take the time to gather all the facts.




