He was a veteran of the U.S. Army, serving in the Philippines during World War II. He was an avid wood worker.

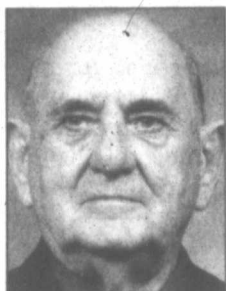
Survivors include his wife, Pat Griffin of

Report calls for cleaning up school bus pollution

AUSTIN (AP) — A report released today says thousands of Texas school buses emit exhaust harmful to children's health and calls for the state to pay for upgrading old buses.

The report by Austin-based Environmental Defense cites the dangers of fine particle pollution produced by older-model diesel buses. School districts across the state operate some 35,000 buses, and more than one-third of those were built before 1994.

"If your kids ride on buses, it's a cause for concern," said Ramon Alvarez, one of the report's authors. "I think there's an opportunity here to decrease pollution exposure and make what's already a safe ride into a health-

ier ride." According to the report by the environmental advocacy group, older buses release emissions that collect in school buses and can cause asthma attacks, dizziness and coughing.

The report calls for the replacement of buses built before 1994 and for retrofitting newer buses with pollution-control equipment that brings them up to cleaner standards.

Betin Santos, a study author, said retrofitting the buses costs about \$7,300 each.

Environmental Defense says the money to overhaul the state's bus fleet could come from a \$50 million surplus projected for the Texas Emissions Reduction Program fund.

COP CORNER

We continue our tour of the Police Department "where the rubber meets the road," the Patrol Division.

The Patrol Division is currently staffed with 15 officers. They are the men and women who have the most contact with the residents of our community. Patrol is a 24-hour, 7-days a week, 365 days a year operation. It is comprised of one lieutenant, three sergeants, and 11 officers.

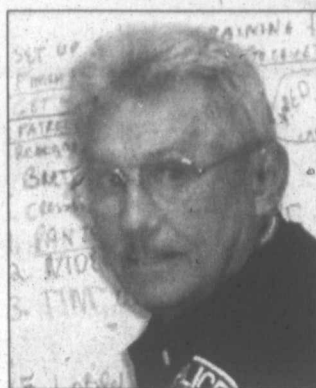
A sergeant is in charge of each shift and is backed up with a designated senior officer and three or four patrol officers. The patrol lieutenant is Kenneth Hopson, a Pampa native and veteran officer of more than 25 years.

The patrol division is organized into three shifts: days, evenings, and mid-nights. Each shift is eight hours long. The patrol officers are the most visible division in the department and have the most contacts with our residents.

Many times residents have, as their only contact with the police, an encounter resulting from a traffic violation or an accident. Our officers are trained to make these contacts in a professional and courteous manner and to resolve the situation in a timely manner.

Regretfully, these types of encounters sometimes end with a citation being given. Our officers work traffic and enforce the laws, especially seat belts and driving while intoxicated. They check businesses at night countless times. The patrol officers keep tabs on the known drug dealers and make arrests as often as they can.

They seek out persons that have warrants. They make other arrests as the situation and the law requires. It is an awesome



Courtney responsibility knowing that an officer can take someone's freedom away. The patrol officers try to treat everyone fairly and use only the force necessary to complete an arrest, but they also take into consideration coming home uninjured to their families at the end of shift. Sometimes it gets pretty scary out on the streets.

Patrol Officers take 99 percent of the reports that you make concerning thefts, assaults, burglaries, and other violations of Texas law. Generally they make this original report and then turn it over to the detectives, but sometimes they undertake the entire investigation.

Patrol officers handle more than 25,000 calls for service in a calendar year. Sometimes they would like to do more, but there is always another call to answer. There are three or four officers on duty at any given time. When you divide that into our population of about 18,000, well, you can do the math.

The most impressive fact of our patrol officers is that they want to stop the small element of our population that preys on the good residents of Pampa. In other words, they love catching crooks!

50 pounds of marijuana.

Michael Eugene Horton Jr., 23, of Pampa was indicted for burglary of a habitation and possession of a prohibited weapon. Bond on the burglary, a second-degree felony, was set at \$10,000. Bond on the weapon charge, a third-degree felony, is \$7,500. Today's Highlight in History:

One hundred and fifty years ago, on April 5, 1856, black American educator Booker T. Washington was born in Franklin County, Va.

On this date:

In 1614, American Indian princess Pocahontas married English colonist John Rolfe in Virginia.

In 1621, the Mayflower sailed from Plymouth, Mass., on a return trip to England.

In 1792, George Washington cast the first presidential veto, rejecting a congressional measure for apportioning representatives among the states.

In 1986, an American soldier and a Turkish woman were killed in the bombing of a West Berlin discotheque, an incident which prompted the U.S. air raid on Libya more than a week later.

In 1991, former Texas Sen. John Tower, his daughter and 21 other people were killed in a commuter plane crash near Brunswick, Ga.

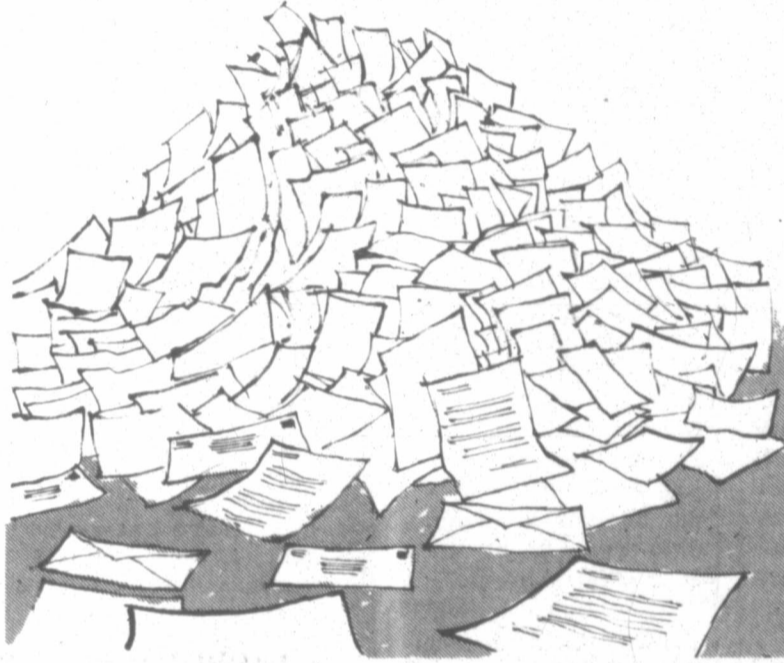
Ten years ago: Accompanied by six children who survived the Oklahoma City bombing, President Clinton bowed his head in silent prayer at the site where 168 people were killed almost a year earlier.

Five years ago: The United States and China intensified negotiations for the release of an American spy plane's crew; President Bush, in a conciliatory gesture, expressed regret over the plane's in-flight collision with a Chinese fighter that triggered the tense standoff. Dutch driver Perry Wacker was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to 14 years in prison in the deaths of 58 Chinese immigrants who suffocated in his truck in Dover, England.

Wang Zhizhi became the first Chinese player to play in the NBA when he took the court for Dallas against Atlanta. (Wang scored six points and grabbed three rebounds as the Mavericks beat the Hawks 108-94.)

One year ago: ABC News anchorman Peter Jennings revealed he had lung cancer (he died in August 2005 at age 67). Nobel Prize-winning author Saul Bellow died in Brookline, Mass., at age 89. Dale Messick, creator of the long-running comic strip "Brenda Starr, Reporter," died at age 98.

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Texas port security critical for our safety

The Texas Gulf Coast is one of our state's finest resources. The 367 miles of shoreline along the Gulf of Mexico has beaches that boost our tourism industry as well as natural resources that nourish our economy. Texas' position on the Gulf of Mexico has made shipping a bedrock of our state's commerce.

But, our coast is not being protected the way it should be. In the Senate, my highest priority is our country's national security, and I have been concerned that port security is not moving forward with the proper urgency. The planned transfer of American port management from a British firm to an Arab-government owned company brought port security to the national forefront.

Texas is home to 29 ports, including four of the 10 busiest in the country. Unfortunately, these thriving ports are inviting targets for our enemies. Only about 5 percent of containers arriving in our ports are inspected. This is unacceptable. Our ports must not continue to be

a hole in our homeland protection.

Not only does shipping play a large role in our economy, it is also a national security issue. We learned on Sept. 11, 2001, that immediate steps had to be taken to protect our airports, and since then, the federal government committed to heavy investments in homeland security by providing \$18 billion to strengthen airline security. Yet in that same period, there has not been enough emphasis on securing our nation's ports.

Last year, a study by the Coast Guard and the U.S. Department of Homeland Security confirmed that significant gaps remain in our port security. The study identified 66 of the nation's 359 ports as being especially vulnerable to terrorist attacks.

One of the most important ports in the world is in Texas. The Port of Houston

ranks first in the United States in foreign waterborne tonnage, second in total tonnage, and is the sixth-largest in the world. It is also home to one of the planet's biggest petrochemical complexes and the \$20 billion U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve, the world's largest oil stockpile.

The Port of Houston's significance is unquestioned, and its stature has only increased in the months since Hurricane Katrina. It has become even busier by adding much of the business that used to go through the Ports of South Louisiana, New Orleans and Baton Rouge. With this additional traffic, strengthening its security is even more critical.

I recently met with officials from Texas ports, including officials from the Port of Houston, to discuss our security concerns. I am thankful for all of the hard work that local officials are

already doing with the resources they have, but they need greater support to be sufficiently protected from potential threats.

As a result of the controversy over a company from the United Arab Emirates managing some U.S. ports, Congress is now focusing more attention on port security. We have the momentum for more comprehensive programs for port security, and I am pleased we are finally moving more decisively in the right direction.

I first introduced the Shipping Container Security Act in 2004; and last November, most provisions of my bill were included in a comprehensive package of transportation security improvements approved by the Senate Commerce Committee.

This March 15, the Senate passed an amendment that I sponsored to the Senate Fiscal Year 2007 Budget Resolution. The amendment calls for \$978 million to improve port security measures. This is a positive start,

The administration starts a war on false pretenses, completely botches the aftermath, gets bogged down in a guerrilla war, so now it says to the critics, "OK, you fix

it."

Well, since I'm proud of my consistent opposition to this war, I will freely admit that I don't know how to fix Iraq. I do, however, know how to fix our involvement in Iraq. That is for the American people and their elected government to recognize the truth: We, the United States, cannot fix Iraq now or ever. We can pay bribes and cajole and threaten, but in the end, the fate of Iraq is now in the

hands of the Iraqis, and there is nothing we can do about it.

Three months after the election, the Iraqi politicians cannot agree on a government. Eventually, they will, but even when they do, it will be a sham. The ministries don't work, according to people knowledgeable about the situation. The army is still essentially in our hands, not in the hands of the Iraqi government. Thus, you will

have a corrupt government claiming to represent three factions, with inoperative ministries, no power to enforce the laws and no money with which to repair the infrastructure.

Therefore, what the United States should do is say goodbye and leave. It's silly to say that if we leave there will be chaos. There is chaos now. It is silly to say that Iraq will become a haven of anti-Americanism. It is today. President Bush lives in a dream world that bears little resemblance to the world outside of his head.

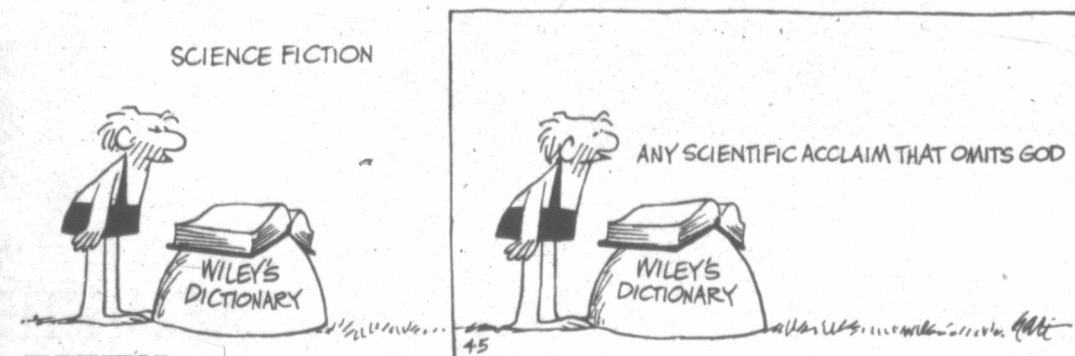

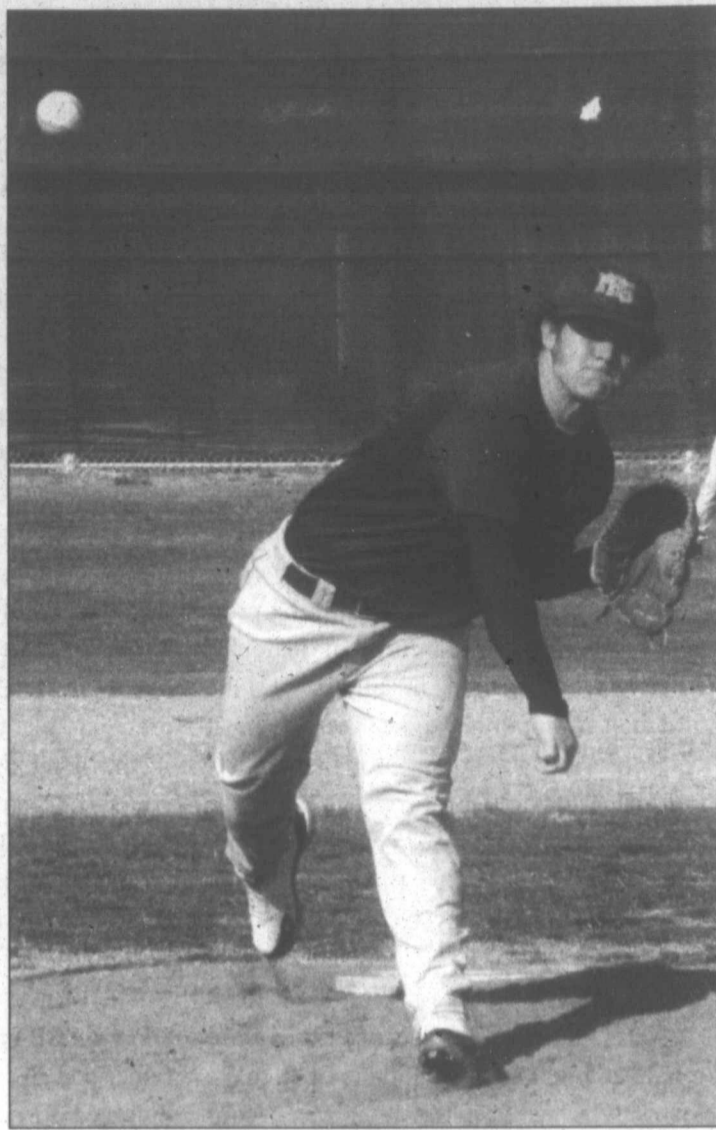

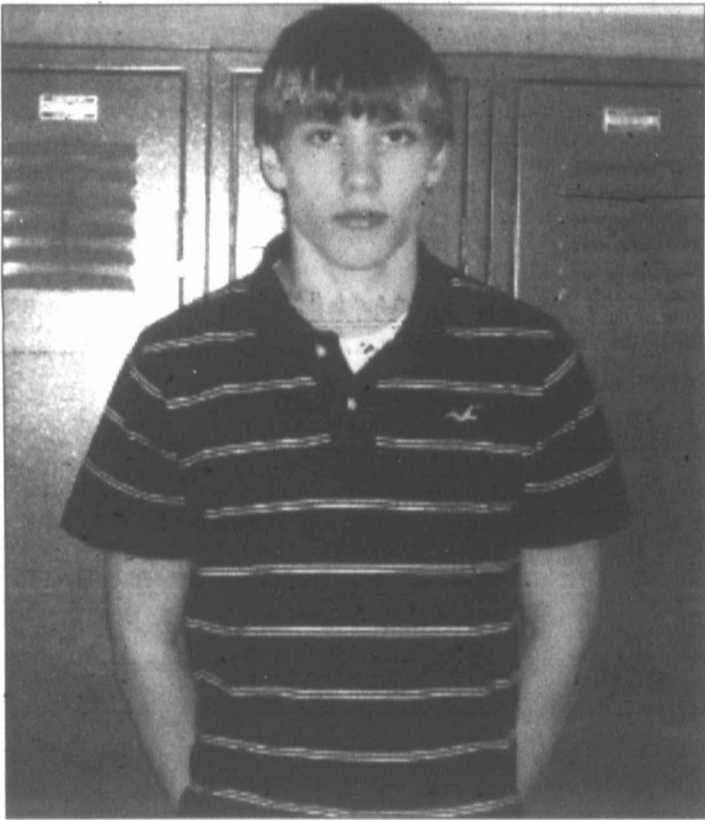
Lady Harvesters 5, Caprock 2

but much remains to be done.

In particular, we must require all foreign countries shipping goods to the U.S. to grant access to U.S.

inspectors. This will permit containers headed to the U.S. to be inspected at their port of origin. In addition, we need to develop a comprehensive plan to increase the number of containers inspected as they enter the U.S. Finally, cargo transported within the U.S. should be monitored until it reaches its final destination.

Now is not the time for grand-

standing about who manages the ports. The U.S. Coast Guard is responsible for port security and the U.S. Customs Service is responsible for container security. The level of the security they provide is the real issue that needs to be addressed. We must not simply talk about improving port security — we must continue to take constructive actions.

Democracy cannot be transplanted, especially not at the point of a gun. Iraq has never been a democracy. It has always been ruled by a dictator or an authoritarian central government, either self-chosen or imposed by a foreign power. That gaggle of Iraqi politicians squabbling over how to divide the loot and the patronage is certainly not going to create a democratic government.

Furthermore, people don't have an innate craving for democracy. The end result of government, a wise man once said, is a family eating their evening meal in peace in their home. That's what the Iraqi people are crav-

ing right now. They want security. They want the electricity back on. They want the sewage and water plants to function. They want jobs. After they get all of that, then they might want to make speeches or vote for politicians.

How can the president claim we have made progress when, three years after our rule began, Baghdad has less electric power, less oil production and a whole lot less security than it had under Saddam Hussein? Attacks have increased, not decreased. Americans are still confined to their heavily fortified "Green Zone," completely isolated not only from Baghdad but also from Iraq. American casualties have lessened somewhat because most of our troops are confined to their heavily fortified bases.

Another truth we have to recognize

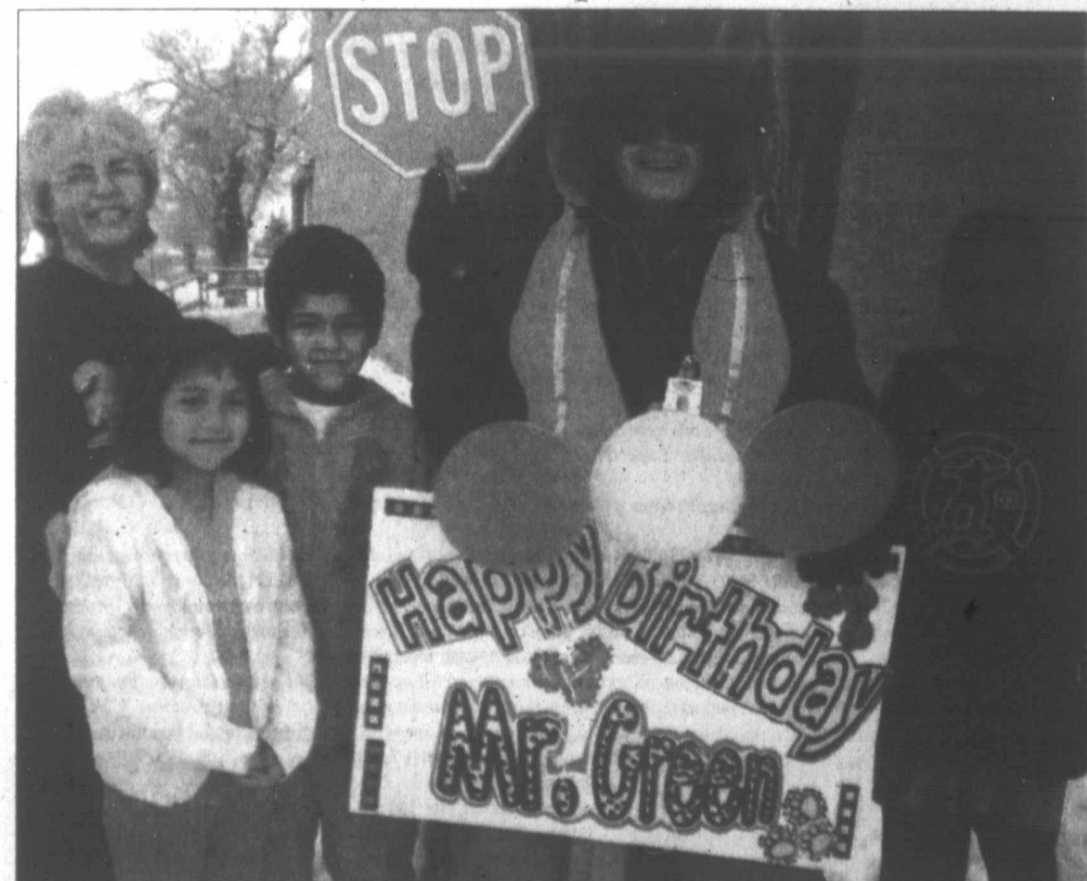
is that the military can destroy, but it cannot build. Our military has done what the president asked it to do. It destroyed the Iraqi government. Now it's time for the soldiers to come home. What now has to be done in Iraq has to be done by Iraqis.

Whether they can do it, I don't know. If they are not in a civil war already, they are on the razor's edge of one.

There is a tipping point in the affairs of humans. Nobody in America, North or South, wanted a war in 1860, but we blundered into one. The same tragedy might befall the Iraqis. If it happens, there is nothing we can do about it, whether we leave or stay, so the wise thing to do is leave now.

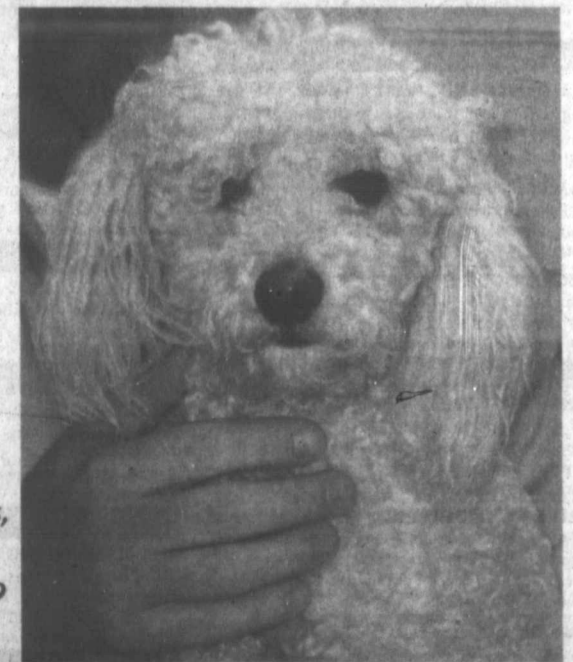
