Wildfire lawsuit draws stunned response from Cano

Jeff Johnson, Cano Petroleum Chairman and CEO, said Tuesday he was stunned and disappointed that Cano and three of its subsidiaries have been sued by the Burnett Trust, owners of the Four Sixes Ranch.

The suit was filed April 10 in 31st District Court by Joseph and Judy Hutchison of Miami, according to a report in the Amarillo Globe-News on April 14. It claims that a wildfire on the ranch on March 12 that

destroyed 13,000 acres was caused by equipment for which Cano was responsible.

"We don't understand it," Johnson said in a press release. "It looks like they want to fight fires with lawsuits. Our focus has been on protecting the land and the people during this extraordinary drought. Over the past four months, hundreds of grass fires in the Texas Panhandle have been blamed on careless cigarette disposal, fireworks, trash burning, and even arson. The claims in this lawsuit are an unbelievable stretch."

The lawsuit alleges that equipment was neglected and that the companies did not correct fire hazards when they knew there was a high fire risk.


The Hutchisons allege the fire that spread to their property caused the couple damage and irreparable harm.

"Such negligence on the part of the defendants in failing to properly monitor oil and gas operations and inspect and secure the equipment and electrical supply sources ... constituted negligence and was a proximate cause of the extensive losses sustained by the plaintiffs," according to the lawsuit.

Johnson noted that the suit was filed only days after the fire started and before any state or federal agency issued a report that identified possible causes of the fires.

"The legal blame game has begun, even without the facts," Johnson

2 from Perryton busted for drugs

Public hearing scheduled for PISD school calendar

Pampa Independent School District's 2006-2007 school calendar will be among items on which the district's board of education will take action at their 6 p.m. meeting Thursday.

The proposed PISD calendar includes a begin date of Aug. 15, which requires a public notice and public hearing since state law requires that public schools begin the . school year the week of Aug. 21.

Two public hearings on the pro-

posed calendar were included in the ate with less than 180 days of board's February and March meetings. A third and final public hearing on the proposed calendar will be at Thursday's meeting, before board members vote on the calendar.

If the proposed 2006-2007 calendar is approved by the board, the district will request a waiver from the Texas Education Agency to begin the year on Aug. 15.

PISD is also requesting three other waivers for 2006-2007.

The Staff Development Waiver will allow the school district to operinstruction during the school year if the missed teaching days are devoted to staff development. The proposed calendar for PISD provides 178 instructional days, with two days of additional staff development.

An Early Release Waiver allows for up to six student early release days from instruction if the remainder of the day is devoted to staff development. No specific early release days are planned for the upcoming year, but training and a shortage of substitutes may require

early release.

A third waiver allows students who are not being tested during a TAKS test to begin their school day after the test has been administered and to be counted as present for funding purposes.

Other action items on Thursday's agenda are two budget amendments, one for the purchase of a rotary mower; employment of professional personnel; approval of an engagement letter for assessment of school facilities; and a lease for a broadband

"That was too much to wait for, so I rushed to Barnes & Noble, bought a copy of the paper, immedi-


ately looked for the first page of the Business Section and wow! There I was, in color," he said.



In 1993, the 51-day siege at the Branch Davidian compound near Waco, Texas, ended as fire destroyed the structure after federal agents began smashing their way in; dozens of people, including David Koresh, were killed.

In 1995, a truck bomb destroyed the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, killing 168 people and injuring hundreds. (Timothy McVeigh was later convicted of federal murder charges and executed.)

Ten years ago: On the first anniversary of the Oklahoma City bombing, hundreds of mourners paused for 168 seconds of silence at the site where the federal building once stood. President Clinton, visiting Russia, paid tribute to the hundreds of thousands of Russians who died in the Nazi siege of Leningrad — and to the victims of the Oklahoma bombing as well.

DEAR ABBY: I work for a large drugstore chain as a clerk. There is no special training required to be a clerk in a drugstore except to learn to operate a cash register. I earn \$7 an hour, and the job is mostly physical (running shipments, etc.). While I like my job, I am puzzled by the number of

Please tell your readers that just because someone works in a drugstore, it does NOT mean he or she has had any medical training. - "KITTY" IN CLEVELAND

DEAR "KITTY": I'm printing your letter and hope it will help, but please don't bank on it. The people you are describing appear to be confused and not completely on track. Your problem may be something that simply goes with the territory, and my advice is to continue directing customers who are in need of medical intervention to get help from someone who is qualified to give it.

Clippers lose game, earn home-court advantage in first round

(AP) - The Los Angeles Clippers lost a game and got a better playoff matchup.

Jake Tsaklalidis scored 18 points and grabbed nine rebounds, while Lorenzen Wright finished with 17 points Tuesday, night as the Memphis Grizzlies defeated the Clippers 101-95, securing the fifth seed in the Western Conference.

The Grizzlies will open the playoffs on the road against fourth-seeded Dallas, while the sixth-seeded Clippers have home-court advantage against Denver because they have a better record than the Nuggets - who earned the third seed by winning the Northwest Division.

The rest of the first-round matchups will be determined after the final day of the regular season today.

If the Los Angeles Lakers beat the New Orleans Hornets, they will take the West's seventh seed and open the

playoffs against Phoenix. That would leave Sacramento in eighth place, drawing defending champion San Antonio in the first round.

If the Lakers lose, then they'll drop to eighth and open against the Spurs, while the Kings would face the Suns.

In the East, the top four seeds are set: Detroit, Miami, New Jersey and Cleveland. However, their opponents are still to be determined.

Washington will take the No. 5 seed with a victory at Detroit on Wednesday, or with a Chicago loss at home to Toronto. The Wizards can finish no worse than seventh. Indiana, also in the mix, finishes the season at home against Orlando. Milwaukee, currently in eighth place, is done but could have its seeding improve.

Despite all the talk about the convoluted playoff picture, the Clippers showed down the stretch, even though it was done mostly with reserves, that

they were hardly trying to lose.

"We didn't talk about it much," Los Angeles forward Walter McCarty said of losing their way to the sixth seed. "We wanted to win this game, and we were trying to win it with the guys we had on the floor.

"We were playing down to the wire. If people think we were trying to throw games or whatever, they've really got it wrong."

In other games, it was: Atlanta 103, Miami 100; Washington 116, Milwaukee 103; Philadelphia 91, New Jersey 88; and Sacramento 111, Seattle 105.

At Memphis, Tenn., the Clippers cut the Grizzlies' 18-point fourth-quarter lead to 96-93 when Daniel Ewing hit a pair of free throws with 29.6 remaining. However, a 3-pointer by Mike Miller with 11 seconds left put the game out of reach.

Rangers top Mariners, 7-4

SEATTLE (AP) - Early Tuesday, the Venezuela sports daily Meridiano hailed seven countrymen pitching on the same day as "the seven wonders of the world." Late in the day, Seattle was wondering about one of those seven.

Felix Hernandez allowed early two-run home runs to Phil Nevin and Brad Wilkerson in the Mariners' 7-4 loss to the Texas Rangers on Tuesday night.

Hernandez (0-2), the hard-throwing 20year-old right-hander, struck out nine and walked one. But he allowed four runs and six hits, leaving him with a 6.14 ERA. He threw 100 pitches - his third straight start with triple figures in pitches. He hasn't tast ed past five innings in any of them.

"I'm fine," Hernandez said through an interpreter when asked if he was concerned. "I don't feel any kind of pressure. I was just a little bit off with my command."

He has given up four homers in 10 2-3 innings - he surrendered only five in 84 1-3 innings during his impressive, two-month debut last season.

The crowd of 17,927 - the smallest at Safeco Field, which opened in July, 1999 seemed more surprised than disappointed. Hernandez seemed frustrated. He often

shook his head. He fidgeted and smirked as catcher Kenji Johjima and then pitching coach Rafael Chaves visited him on the mound.

"I was just frustrated with myself," Hernandez said. "I was trying to keep my team in the game."

Texas starter John Koronka (2-1) was also off with his command. But he got his second AL win by holding the Mariners to one run in five innings. Koronka, acquired from the Chicago Cubs on March 31, allowed five hits and four walks but held Seattle batters to 1-for-7 with runners in scoring position.

Seattle loaded the bases in the first before Carl Everett grounded out. Willie Bloomquist hit an RBI single in the fourth, and the Mariners had runners on second and third with one out before Yuniesky Betancourt popped out and Ichiro Suzuki flied out to keep the Texas lead 4-1.

Suzuki was 0-for-4. He has two hits in his last 24 at-bats and is batting .177.

Texas manager Buck Showalter praised Koronka and catcher Rod Barajas for "not giving in" as he continually fell behind in counts.

Investigators search for evidence in dorm rooms of arrested players

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) - Police searched the dorm rooms of two Duke University lacrosse players after the two were arrested on charges of raping and kidnapping an exotic dancer during an off-campus team party

District Attorney Mike Nifong said Tuesday he also hoped to link a third man to the alleged attack soon, but he said that person had not been "identified with certainty."

"It is important that we not only bring the assailants to justice, but also that we lift the cloud of suspicion from those team mem-bers who were not involved in the assault," Nifong said in a statement.

The accuser, a 27-year-old student at a nearby college, told police she was attacked by three white men at a house where she and another woman were hired to dance at a party of lacrosse team members the night of March 13.

Two team members - Reade Seligmann, a sophomore from Essex Fells, N.J., and Collin Finnerty, a sophomore from Garden City, N.Y. - were arrested early Tuesday. Each posted \$400,000 bond and was released within hours.

Their lawyers assailed the district attorney for bringing the charges after DNA tests had failed to connect any of the team members to the alleged rape.

A cousin of the accuser who has been acting as a spokeswoman for her family disputed that allegation in an interview on ABC's "Good Morning America" today. She identified herself only by her first name, Jackie, to protect the woman's iden-

tity. "Before she went to the party she was not intoxicated, she was not drinking," Jackie said. "There's a great possibility that when she went to the party, she was given a drink and it was drugged.

The case has raised racial tensions and heightened the long-standing town-vs.-gown antagonism between Duke students and middle-class, racially mixed Durham. The accuser is black, and all but one of the 47 lacrosse team members are white.

Duke would not comment specifically on any disciplinary action taken against Seligmann and Finnerty, but said it is university practice to suspend students charged with a felony.

"Many lives have been touched by this case," Duke President Richard Brodhead said in a statement. "It has brought pain and suffering to all involved, and it deeply challenges our ability to balance judgment with compassion."

Since the scandal broke, the university has canceled the team's season, its coach resigned and Duke officials said they were investigating the behavior of the nationally ranked team, some of whose members have been found guilty of public intoxication and public urination. Neither Seligmann and Finnerty was among the team members arrested in recent years for such offenses as underage drinking and public urination. Finnerty, however, was charged in Washington, D.C., with assault after a man told police in November that Finnerty and two friends punched him and called him gay and other derogatory names." Finnerty greed to community service. Both Seligmann and Finnerty are prod-ucts of wealthy New York City suburbs and all-male Roman Catholic prep schools. Finnerty attended Long Island's Chaminade High School, where 99 percent of the students go on to college. Seligmann went to the exclusive Delbarton School, a lacrosse powerhouse in Morristown, N.J.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The head athletic trainer for the San Francisco Giants was told to appear before a federal grand jury investigating whether Barry Bonds lied about his connection to the BALCO steroids scandal, a newspaper reported.

Stan Conte, who is not related to Bay Area Laboratory Co-Operative owner Victor Conte, was subpoenaed to appear in a San Francisco federal courtroom April 27, the San Francisco Chronicle reported.

Conte is scheduled to appear before the grand jury on the same day as Bonds' orthopedic surgeon, Dr. Arthur Ting. The grand jury subpoenaed Ting's medical records related to Bonds a year ago, the Chronicle reported.

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) - Gonzaga forward Adam Morrison is expected to forgo his senior year and declare for the NBA draft, according to numerous media reports.

Morrison, a first-team All-America and the nation's leading scorer, has not commented on the reports, but has scheduled a press conference at Gonzaga for Wednesday afternoon.

HOUSTON (AP) - Rice athletics director Bobby May announced Tuesday he will retire on July 15.

May, 61, became the AD at his alma mater in 1989.

When he took over, the football team was in the midst of an 18-game losing streak and had not had a winning season since 1963.

Defense attorneys have said they have time-stamped photos from the party, bank records, cell phone calls and a taxi driver's statement to support Seligmann's claim of innocence

Robert Ekstrand, who represents dozens of players on the team, said neither Seligmann nor Finnerty was at the party "at the relevant time." The indictment repre-sents "a horrible circumstance and a product of a rush to judgment," he said.

Defense attorneys have also alleged that the accuser was intoxicated and injured when she showed up for the party.

Astros outlast Brewers

HOUSTON (AP) - For the first time since its first month of play, Houston has a .500 franchise record.

Morgan Ensberg hit two home runs, Adam Everett had four RBIs and the Astros held on for a 13-12 win over the Milwaukee Brewers on Tuesday night.

The win, Houston's fourth straight, puts the franchise at .500 for the first time since the Colt-.45s, as the team was known, were 6-6 before a 2-1 loss to the Milwaukee Braves on April 27, 1962. The franchise record is 3,507-3,507, making Houston the 13th team in the majors with a record of .500 or better.

"Considering that it's been since the 12th game of the franchise this is a pretty amazing event," Astros general manager Tim Purpura said. "Forty-four years is a long time, but just look where we have come from in the last 12 of 13 years. Since Drayton (McLane) owned the club we have just continued to pump out winning seasons and that's why we've made up so much of the ground."

Houston's low point was 228 games under .500 at 1,254-1,482 after play on Sept. 24, 1978, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

Astros manager Phil Garner briefly savored the milestone before moving on to a new goal.

"It means that the franchise has been pretty successful," he said. "I don't think there are many franchises who play over .500 at this point. It's a pretty significant milestone. Our objective now is to just stay way above it."

Like Purpura, Craig Biggio said the mark is noteworthy because it is a testament to the team's success over the past decade.

"It's pretty nice because we've made up a lot of ground," he said. 'We're focusing on this season, but

over the last 10-to-12 years our fans have had a lot to cheer about and you can't say that for every franchise."

Houston roughed up Doug Davis (0-1) for nine runs and eight hits in just 2 2-3 innings.

"I made a few mistakes obviously," he said. "I usually can get away with some of those, but not today."

Ensberg, who has homered in a career-high four straight games, had a solo shot in the first and a two-run drive in the sixth off Chris Demaria. Biggio was 3-for-5 with a leadoff home run and a three RBIs.


