ment at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. He announced to reporters at a Capitol Hill news conference. He walked in alone, gripped the lectern, cleared his throat and began
haltingly haltingly.
Kennedy, who has strug-
gléd with addiction and depression, said he had checked into the Mayo Clinic over the Christmas
holidays and returned to holidays and returned to Congress
healthy."
"Of course, in every ups and downs, but I' have been strong, focused and productive since my return," Kennedy said.
The congressman said he
again became concerned again became concerned
about his condition after the Thursday morning car accident.
"I simply do not remember getting out of bed, being pulled over by the police, or being cited for three driving
infractions," Kennedy said. "That's not how I want to live my life. And that's not how I want to represent the people of Rhode Island. As he was leaving the room, Kennedy was asked
whether he might resign and whether he might resign, and

## Museum Mementos: City of Pampa not officially incorporated until 1912 ...

There has been confusion about when the town of Pampa was incorporated, possibly because the city vehicles show year that is incorrect. Although 1902 is an important year in the early history of Pampa, it is not the year of incorporaed in 1912. Perhaps it is appro-
priate to review some of the èvents in the early Lane history of Pampa that occurred in the years
92, 1902 and 1912.
George Tyng wrote to Frederic Foster: "A cou
ple of months ago, the Railway changed the name of their siding from Tyng was the mad.
Tyng was the manager of the White station, and Foster was a trustee for the British bondholders of the White Deer Lands.
Pampa was first known as a station named Glasgow on a map of the Santa Fe
Route in 1888. Because of confusion Route in 1888. Because of confusion
with Glasgow, Kan., the name of the station was soon changed to Sutton. Three years later there was confusion with Sutton County in southwest Texas, and railroad officials asked Tyng to choose a ew name for the station. Tyng's first suggestions were unsatisactory. Then he thought of how the grassy plans oo this area resemble the friend, "We will take the 's' off and call it 'Pampa'.
The railroad officials approved this suggestion.
Then Tyng began to circulate a peti-
tion for a post office, and on Oct ion for a post office, and on Oct. 29,
1892, the United States Post Office 1892, the United States Post Office
Department established a post office at Pampa with Thomas H. Lane as postmaster. The application for the post office stated that there were 24 inhabitants in the village, and that the post office was to serve a po

It's good news after a year in which "Last year we had a record crop,
and we still couldn't provide all the cherries we needed," said B.J. Thurlby, president of Northwest Cherry Growers, a promotional

The group is aiming to increase sales by as much as 30 percent this year, getting more cherries -
including new varieties that ripen including new varieties that ripen
later in the summer - to conlater in the summer - to con-
sumers both in the U.S. and other sumers bo
The Northwest, along with he nation's sweet cherries
Growers in Washington, Idaho, Oregon and Utah harvested a record 117,000 tons of fresh cherries last year. The early estimate

ranges between 110,000 and 130,000 tons, with much of the harvest in Washington.
If the weather stays warm, with no extended heavy rain, growers see potential for the harvest to
come in at the higher end of that
range, Thurlby said.
Washington state has an estimated 29,000 acres of cherry
orchards, up frem about 25,000 acres in 2004. That number continues to increase as growers tear out
apple orchards and replace apple orchards and replace them
with cherry trees and wine grape vineyards, which have been more
