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# **City eyes grant** for water mains

The way has been cleared for a quarter million dollar grant application to replace water mains in Pampa.

There was a public meeting Tuesday in the Pampa City Commission chambers, but the public didn't show

Chris Sharp with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission briefed city staff concerning \$250,000 community development block grant following the Pampa City Commission meeting Tuesday.

The city can apply for \$250,000 to be used for infrastructure · projects, Sharp said.

"Typically," he said, "the money is used for water projects.

Pampa City Manager John Horst said that if the city is staff plans to use it to replace

aging water mains.


Sharp warned that Pampa is competing with at least 36 other cities in the area for a grant. He said that probably only 12 or 13 projects will be funded.

"It's very competitive," Sharp said.

The grants are awarded on a match basis. The money that a community has to put up depends upon the population of the town. For Pampa, Sharp estimated that the city would have to put up 20 percent of the grant, or about \$50,000.

Sharp said the grants are supposed to be used in low to moderate-income neighborhoods.

Pampa Public Works Director Richard Morris said his office has identified 10 segments of the city's water main system that need replacing. That would cover about 4.5 miles of pipeline, able to get such a grant, the he said, but the grant would not stretch that far.

# Cattlemen, cowboys raise \$10,000 for fire aid

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FORT WORTH - More than \$10,000 was raised to help Texas wildfire victims at a May 7 benefit in Pampa hosted by Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association and the Working Ranch Cowboys Association.

All funds raised during the event will be contributed to the Cattlemen's Disaster Relief Fund, bringing the total to more than a quarter of a million dollars. The fund was established in March by TSCRA, Texas Cattle Feeders Association and the Livestock Marketing Association of Texas to help cattle producers affected by fires and similar disasters in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Since Dec. 26, 11,048 wildfires

have burned 4,903,851 acres in Texas, killing 11 people and destroying 423 homes and 25,000 miles of fence.

The worst fires were in the Panhandle area where 2,000 people in seven counties were evacuated. Dr. Brad Williams, area director for the Texas Animal Health Commission, estimates that 10,000 animals died.

"Neighbors helping neighbors is a time-honored tradition among ranch folk," TSCRA President Dick Sherron, said. "A lot of people opened their hearts and pocketbooks to make this event a success."

Entertainment was provided by Western music trio Palo Duro, cowboy humorist Curt Brummett, and Paul and Susie Luchsinger. Donations were collected during a brisket supper sponsored by Barnhardt Capital Management, Inc.

### **Evacuees go to New Orleans for mayoral debate**

HOUSTON (AP) Sisters Christine Walker and Gloria Travis were two of about 50 Hurricane Katrina evacuees who boarded a bus Thursday to attend a mayoral debate in New Orleans and cast early ballots in a runoff election for the city's top leader.

"We want a candidate to be for the people. We need somebody to speak up for us and speak out for us," said Walker.

Nearly 100 other evacuees living in San Antonio and Dallas also were scheduled to make the trip, said Ginny Goldman with the trip's organizer, the Association of Community Organizations for Reform Now. Mayor Ray Nagin and Lt.

Gov. Mitch Landrieu were the top two vote getters in the first round of voting April 22 and will face each other in a May 20 runoff to see who will lead New Orleans as it rebuilds from Hurricane Katrina's devastation. The debate was set for Thursday night.

The sisters, who planned to attend the debate and cast their early votes Friday, said they were still undecided. Voters can cast early bal-

lots in New Orleans and 10

Walker, 56, said she most evacuees won't be able to vote because of financial hardship or a lack of access to information.

"It's not because they don't want to, but they just can't," Walker said. "I don't think it will be a fair vote."

Before Katrina hit, New Orleans was roughly twothirds black, and civil rights activists have said many of those still outside the city are black. Less than half the city's residents have returned.

Dorothy Stukes, president of the ACORN Katrina Survivors Association, said she isn't confident either candidate will do the things that are necessary - such as providing low to moderate income housing or getting insurance companies to help residents rebuild their homes to get people to return.

### Shanghai plans zoo for humans

SHANGHAI, China (AP) — Shanghai is getting set to open a "human zoo."

Four Australian men will live in a glass box on a downtown mall for two weeks in June, with the public able to watch them sleep, eat and bathe, a news report said Thursday.

The group, known as the Urban Dream Capsule, has drawn crowds with similar displays in London, Montreal, Hong Kong and other cities.

"They won't turn off the lights or pull down the curtains. They show their whole life, from getting up to going to bed," Karen Chang, the event's organizer, told the Shanghai Daily newspaper.

"People like to watch them taking a shower, so they have to shower at least two times a day," Chang said. "Of course, one can't see the key parts, because there is nontransparent glass in the bathroom."

The 650-square-foot glass capsule is to be decorated in a Shanghai theme.

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# Pampan charged in assault

A May 2 altercation in the area known as Horse Alley resulted in one man spending the night in the hospital and another being arrested by Gray County Sheriff's Office deputies.

Jerry Wayne Stegall, 29, of Pampa was arrested Wednesday on warrants for aggravated assault causing bodily injury and interfering with an emergency call. He was released from Gray County Jail this morning on \$2,500 bond for the assault charge plus \$1,500 bond on the interference charge.

find a 47-year-old Pampa man bleeding from the mouth and nose, with his left eye swollen shut, according to Chief Deputy Kelly Rushing.

"He could not sustain his balance," Rushing said.

"A female at the scene had attempted to call 911. The suspect took the cell phone from her and threw it into a field. She got another cell phone, and he did the same thing with that cell phone when she tried to summon aid," Rushing said.

The victim, whose name has not been released by the sheriff's office, was transported to Pampa Regional Medical Center where he was kept overnight for observation and then released the next day, according to Rushing.

"The victim has requested anonymity," he said.

No weapon was reported as being used in the assault. Stegall apparently used his fists in the altercation, Rushing said.

Stegall, who had left by the time deputies arrived on the scene, did not report any injuries from the incident.

Horse Alley is an area which includes a number of animal pens and is located south of Alcock and east of Price–Road, outside Pampa city limits.

After a major breach three years ago in which Social Security numbers and other vital information on 40,000 people were stolen by a student hacker (who was later prosecuted), UT officials promised changes. Top among them was a declaration that UT would stop using Social Security numbers as

But in this month's breach, Social Security numbers of 106,000 people in the McCombs School of Business computers were accessed by hackers. They acquired the personal information of 197,000 people, including applicants, students, faculty, staff, alumni and corporate recruiters. UT says no credit card numbers or family member information was accessed.

It was a shocking breach of the school's system. Clearly, the university has not acted quickly enough to protect information or eliminate from databases Social Security numbers that can be used to steal identities, drain bank accounts and make illegal purchases.

Identity theft is a pernicious crime, one that can be crushing to the victim

Zoom Types

Digital cameras have two zoom types - optical and digital. Optical zooming involves moving the lens to achieve a closer shot. Digital higher quality images) than zooming tries to achieve the one with a lower megapixel same result by increasing the

pixel (those little dots that make up an image) size. As you can imagine, optical zooming is preferred among the two, as less detail is lost.

A typical camera might be advertised as having "3X Optical and 6X digital zoom." Higher optical numbers equate to higher quality images. However, that quality comes at a price. Digital zooming, being somewhat of a software trick, requires no additional hardware and, therefore, adds nothing to the price of a camera. It's always a tradeoff, isn't it?

Viewfinders and LCDs

Even the oldest cameras had optical viewfinders, those little square lenses used to frame up a shot before you snapped a picture. Most of today's digital cameras add an LCD viewscreen. The viewscreen gives the photographer two

because it is so costly and difficult to correct. Identity thieves wreck credit ratings, steal from bank accounts and credit cards and generally make life miserable for victims.

About 9 million Americans are victims of identity theft each year, and that theft costs the public about \$50 billion. Financial institutions and universities are most often the targets of hackers seeking Social Security numbers and other personal information.

Universities are especially vulnerable to hackers and identity thieves because their systems often aren't centralized or well-protected. A California report last year found that more than half the reported incidents of personal

advantages: First, the LCD is larger than the typical glass viewfinder, aiding in shot composition. Second, the little LCD viewscreen can be used to review previously taken shots. Think of it as a miniature slide projector.

#### Media

As to storage choices, you basically have five options: CompactFlash, Smart Media, Secure Digital, Multimedia Memory Cards, and Memory Sticks. Memory sticks are only found in Sony products. They're good, but proprietary. Of the other options, CompactFlash is the most widely used, and the fastest. It's my choice.

They're very small and fit in a vari-

ety of devices, from PDA's to cameras. Most digital cameras come with a small capacity memory card. My advice: purchase the largest capacity card for general use and use the small capacity card for emergencies. Trust me, you'll fill up those cards quicker than you think.

Digital cameras need not be complicated as long as you understand some of the lingo. So, what are you waiting for? Start shopping!

obtained were from colleges. UT knew this from its experience in 2003, when then-stu-

dent Christopher Phillips downloaded Social Security numbers, phone numbers and other data from the school computer system. Thankfully, none of that information was used for illegal purposes, and Phillips was sentenced to probation, a fine and community service.

It's disturbing that, three years later, an even more brazen invasion of computer security occurred, this time from multiple hackers in the Far East.

In 2003, Dan Updegrove, UT's vice president of information technology, was apologetic and promised that UT would work diligently to secure the personal information in school computers. Sadly, improved security

did not come to the McCombs business school system in time to prevent the massive theft of personal information including Social Security numbers that should have been purged.

UT is required by law to maintain Social Security numbers for its employees and students receiving financial aid, but it must better protect that vital information.

This second embarrassing episode should spur President William Powers Jr. and Updegrove to move with all deliberate speed to protect personal information stored in databases.

Universities are at the forefront of the identity theft problem, so they also need to be leading the way to protect the vital information they obtain and house.

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


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

LOS ANGELES (AP) -The offense is finally coming around for the Los Angeles Dodgers, and Brett Tomko has been solid every five days. Now, if there was only something manager Grady Little could do about that bullpen of his.

Tomko allowed just one infield hit over six scoreless innings, and the Dodgers held on Wednesday night for a 9-6 victory over the Houston Astros that extended their winning streak to five games.

"We feel pretty good about winning five in a row, but we know that the best part of our season is still to come," Little said after the Dodgers handed the defending NL champions their sixth straight loss. "We like the way we're swinging the bats right now, but we've got a few things to iron out in the bullpen."

Jeff Kent and Rafael Furcal hit three-run homers and Nomar Garciaparra added a solo drive for the Dodgers, whose winning streak comes after a fivegame skid.

They have scored 31 runs their last three games, two more than they had in their previous seven.

"We've got a lot of experienced guys who don't care about the highs and lows," Kent said. "That's what's great about this game. Sometime you get them, sometimes they get you. You play 15 years and you

"It's not something we think about," Tomko said of the bullpen's recent woes. "Our job is to go out there and go as long as we can and then give it up to them.


"Everybody slumps. Hitters slump, Starters slump, bullpens have days where they don't go out and do it, but it's not something we sit around worrying about.



### FLOYD PATTERSON

### Former heavyweight champion dead at 71

Floyd Patterson, who avenged an embarrassing loss to Ingemar Johansson by beating him a year later to become the first boxer to regain the heavyweight title, died Thursday. He was 71.

Patterson died at his home in New Paltz, N.Y. He had Alzheimer's disease for about eight years and prostate cancer, nephew Sherman Patterson said.

Patterson's career was marked by historic highs and humiliating lows.

He emerged from a troubled childhood in Brooklyn to win the Olympic middleweight

championship in 1952. In 1956, the undersized heavyweight became at age 21 the youngest man to win the title with a fifth-round knockout of Archie Moore.

But three years later, Patterson was knocked down seven times in the third round in losing the title to Johansson at the Polo Grounds in New York City.

Patterson returned with a vengeance at the same site in 1960, knocking out Johansson with a tremendous left hook to retake the title.

"They said I was the fighter who got knocked down the most, but I also got up the most," Patterson said later.

Despite his accomplishment, he was so humiliated when he lost the title on a first-round knockout to Sonny Liston in 1962 that he left Comiskey Park in Chicago wearing dark glasses and a fake beard. Patterson again was knocked out in the first round by Liston in 1963.

Patterson got two more shots at winning the title a third time. Battered and taunted for most of the fight by Muhammad Ali, Patterson was stopped in the 12th round in 1965. He lost a disputed 15-round decision to WBA champion Jimmy Ellis in 1968.

Overall, Patterson finished 55-8-1 with 40 knockouts. He was knocked out five times and knocked down a total of at least 15 times. He was inducted into the International Boxing Hall of Fame in 1991. After retiring in 1972, Patterson remained close to the sport. He served twice as chairman of the New York State

Athletic Commission.

His second term began when he was

Fils second term began when he was picked in 1995 by Gov. George Pataki to help rebuild boxing in New York. On April 1, 1998, Patterson resigned the post after a published report that a three-hour videotape of a deposition he gave in a lawsuit revealed he couldn't recall impor-tant was the big began was a second to be tant events in his boxing career.

Patterson said he was very tired during the deposition and, "It's hard for me to think when I'm tired."

Patterson, one of 11 children, was in enough trouble as a youngster to be sent to the Wiltwyck School for Boys. After being released, he took up boxing, won a New York Golden Gloves championship and then the Olympic gold medal in the 165-pound class at Helsinki, Finland.

"If it wasn't for boxing, I would probably be behind bars or dead," he said in a 1998 interview.

He turned pro in 1952 under the manage-ment of Cus D'Amato, who in the 1980s would develop another heavyweight cham-pion, Mike Tyson. Patterson fought as a light heavyweight until becoming a heavy-weight in 1956.

After regaining the title, Patterson was the verge of losing it again when he was knocked down twice by Johansson in the first round in 1961. But Patterson knocked down Johansson before the round was over. then won on sixth-round knockout.

He made a successful defense, then lost the title to Liston in a fight a lot of people didn't want him to take. In fact, taking the match caused a split between Patterson and D'Amato.

Patterson said in 1997 that another person who didn't want him to fight Liston was President Kennedy.

"I'm sorry, Mr. President," Patterson said he told Kennedy. "The title is not worth anything if the best fighters can't have a shot at it. And Liston deserves a shot."

Patterson retired after been stopped by Ali in the seventh round of a non-title match in 1972 at Madison Square Garden.



# Humble teen hospitalized with rabies
