# **Bush: Iraq militias must be curbed**

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Bush said today that militias are the biggest roadblock to Iraq's effort to. getting a unity government up and running, a goal that would help bolster the president's sagging approval ratings over its handling of the war.

Bush spoke at the White House where he met with 10 former secretaries of state and defense from both **Republican and Democratic** administrations to discuss Iraq and the broader Middle East.

"Perhaps the main challenge is the militia that tend to take the law into their own hands and it's going to be up to the government to step up and take care of that militia so that the Iraqi people are confident in the security of their country," Bush said.

Iraqi officials plan to restructure police forces in the capital under the newly formed National Police force to rein in militias and death squads.

"It's important to have a secure Iraq in order for people to go about their daily lives," Bush said.

Just over a third of Americans say they support Bush's handling of Iraq more than three years after the U.S.-led invasion, according to AP-Ipsos polling in early April.

## Inmate ends up in doghouse

WARNER ROBINS, Ga. (AP) — A Dooly State Prison inmate who slipped away from a work detail near a park here ended up in the doghouse. Literally.

Marcus Antonio Valdez, 22, serving a two-year sentence for aggravated assault, was found hiding in a doghouse in the back yard of a nearby residence, police Lt. Todd Edwards said.

The fugitive's flight for freedom was cut short after law enforcement officers

from several agencies converged on the residential neighborhood, Edwards said.

Authorities arrested him Wednesday afternoon with the help of a police tracking dog and tips from residents, Edwards said.

Valdez, a medium-security inmate, walked off the trash detail about 12:30 p.m., authorities said. Authorities learned of the escape when witness called 911 to report "somebody in a white prison uniform," Edwards said.

of state, who has criticized Bush's invasion of Iraq.



Q: If there are 12 million illegal immigrants in the country, how many legal immigrants are there?

A: Well, total foreign-born now is around 36 or 37 million. If you go with the 12 million illegals, the legal immigration is about 25 million. That doesn't mean they are all citizens.

Q: Is it still true that most

illegals live in California, Texas, Florida, New York, are from Latin America. Illinois and New Jersey?

A: It's still very concentrated. The immigrant population is spreading. But the top three states - California, New York and Texas - have about half







# Former NFL kicker pleads guilty to shooting Siegfried & Roy house

LAS VEGAS (AP) - Groomed and polite, a former NFL kicker who has been hospitalized for mental illness pleaded guilty Thursday to shooting at the home of entertainers Siegfried Fischbacher and Roy Horn in 2004.

Cole Ford, who last kicked for the Oakland Raiders in 1997, agreed to a felony plea that could result in a suspended sentence of one to six years in a Nevada prison if he continues mental-health treatment at a center near his family's home in Tucson, Ariz.

"We've come a long way with Mr. Ford, and he's doing terrific," Clark County District Judge Jackie Glass said as she addressed Ford's mother, Amy Ford, in the courtroom gallery. The judge, who last year sent Ford to a state mental-health facility in Sparks, also signed an order allowing a mother-son jail visit.

Outside court, Amy Ford, who turns 61 on Monday, said she didn't exchange words in the courtroom with her son, whom she said she had not seen since 1999.

"But with his eyes, he said, 'Hi Mom," she said. "This is a nice Mother's Day and nice birthday present."

Ford, 34, stood before the judge in a blue jail jumpsuit with his wrists shackled at his waist. But his cropped hair and a cleanshaven face were a marked contrast to his appearance during court hearings in late 2004 and early 2005 when he wore his hair past his shoulders and had a full beard that extended to his chest.

A year ago, Glass ruled Ford incompetent for trial and rejected his attempts to plead guilty to charges that could have sent him to prison for 27 years.

"Yes, your honor," Ford responded calm-ly Thursday after Glass deemed him competent and asked him if he understood the plea agreement, which also requires him to pay restitution and have no contact with Fischbacher or Horn.

# Patterson passes; Jacksonville's Smith retires

#### PRO BOXING

(AP) — Floyd Patterson, who avenged an embarrassing loss to Ingemar Johansson by beating him a year later to become the first boxer to regain the heavyweight title, has died. He was 71.

Patterson died at his home in New Paltz, N.Y. He had Alzheimer's disease for about eight years and prostate cancer, nephew Sherman Patterson said.

Patterson's career was marked by historic highs and humiliating lows.

He emerged from a troubled childhood in Brooklyn to win the Olympic middleweight championship in 1952.

In 1956, the undersized heavyweight became at age 21 the youngest man to win the title with a fifth-round knockout of Archie Moore.

But three years later, Patterson was knocked down seven times in the third

round in losing the title to Johansson at the Polo Grounds in New York City.

Patterson returned with a vengeance at the same site in 1960, knocking out Johansson with a tremendous left hook to retake the title.

BASEBALL NEW YORK (AP) — Hideki Matsui broke his left wrist and his consecutive games streak ended - even

though he started and touched the ball. Because of a quirky baseball rule, Matsui's streak of 518 games played ended when he was injured trying for a diving catch in the first inning of the New York Yankees' game against the

Boston Red Sox. Because Matsui did not play a full half inning, his streak ended when the game became official.

Matsui played 1,250 consecutive games' with the Yomiuri Giants in Japan from 1994-2002, and in every game with the Yankees since joining the team in 2003.

**PRO FOOTBALL** JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Jimmy Smith, a five-time Pro Bowl selection who overcame several health problems and drug addiction during his 13 seasons, abruptly retired to "move on to the next phase of my life."

The 37-year-old receiver led Jacksonville with 70 catches for 1,023 yards and six touchdowns last season. He has more receptions than every receiver in the Hall of Fame, and only Marvin Harrison has more catches and yards receiving than Smith since 1996.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Wide receiver Donald Driver has signed a two-year contract extension with the Green Bay Packers, his agent confirmed.

Hudgins was 1-1 with a 6.38 ERA for Oklahoma.


