Heart stent at PRMC a first for Pampa

Steve Silver recently did something no one else has ever done in Pampa.

Dr. Silver, a new cardiologist at Pampa Regional Medical Center, opened up an artery with a stent.

Although the use of stents and balloons to open arteries rather than surgery has become more widely used during the past few years, Dr. Silver said it is still a serious procedure and one that should be entrusted only to experienced hands.

Silver estimates that he's inserted almost 2,000 stents in a career that spans more than 25 years.

He is originally from Chicago. "I did my medical school training there, my internship and my residency both there," Silver said.
"After I did all that, I went to San Francisco to do my cardiology training."

After his cardiology training, Silver practiced medicine in California for about 20 years.

"I got tired of the crowds," Silver said. "I got tired of the cost of living."

More than anything else, he said, California has a lot of managed health care programs.

"It's a doctor unfriendly environment," Silver said.

He said he and his wife Dina and their pets moved to Casper, Wyo., in 2001 for a couple of years.

"They had a good hospital and good heart facility," Silver said. But his wife did not like Casper, so the couple moved to

Midland, but Silver wasn't wild about Midland.

Then he got an offer from Natchez, Miss.


"I was there for two years," Silver said. "Then I got an extremely good offer out here in Pampa."

One of the problems he had in Natchez, Silver said, was a heart surgery team had to be on premises at the hospital or stents or balloons couldn't be used.

He ended up driving long distances to outlying hospitals with heart programs.

"I was offered this position where I could do procedures on site," he said. "The need is apparently quite great out here."

Accident review reveals causes of fatal crashes

Loss of control was a factor in 66 percent of 200 fatal traffic accidents reported by Texas Department of Public Safety and reviewed recently by Panhandle Regional Advisory Council, Trauma Service Area A, in Amarillo.

The average age of the driver in the accidents, which date back to 2001, was 45. The crashes involved 231 deaths; another 175 people were injured. Alcohol involvement data on the accidents was not available for the review.

The deadly loss of control which factored into two-thirds of the accidents may be from distraction of the driver, according to a press release from PRAC.

"We drive the same familiar roads daily to work, shopping, church, et cetera. We begin to drive by habit, while we eat and drink, adjust our radios and CDs, talk on our cell phones, visit with passengers, discipline the kids and generally treat our vehicles as mobile living rooms," said Kay Harris, program manager, in the release.

"On familiar trips, with little traffic, we don't always feel the need to buckle up," she said.

Loss of control of a vehicle results in collisions with oncoming vehicles, rear-end collisions with vehicles going the same direction, bridge abutments and trees, according to the release. Loss of control also accounts for almost all rollovers.

"If you aren't buckled in during a rollover, you can expect to bounce violently around the inside and/or be partially or fully ejected from the vehicle. Ejection opens the possibility of severe lacerations from glass, being struck by the vehicle or having it land on you, or flying through the air to land like a rag doll," Harris



With two weeks left to avoid the threat of schools closing, lawmakers sent Perry a landmark tax overhaul hoping to prevent a freeze on state money to schools. The Legislature adjourned the 30-day special session on Monday. It had been called in response to a Texas Supreme Court order to fix the unconstitutional system by June 1.

The session was the sixth attempt in three years to address the difficult issue.

Perry's re-election could hinge on what has been accomplished in the special session.

The final measure to be sent to Perry on Monday was a \$1-perpack increase in the cigarette tax.

The House also finalized a measure that would dedicate all money raised from the new taxes to property tax relief until school districts get their tax rate down to \$1 per \$100 of land value. Once the \$1 rate has been reached, one-third of the revenue would go to school funding. Most school districts have a tax rate at or near the current state maximum of \$1.50.

Ken Salazar, D-Colo., it said immigration changes envisioned in the legislation could proceed if the president declared they were in the national security interests of the United States.

The Senate cast its first votes on the immigration bill as Bush renewed his call for Congress to act. "The objective is, on the one hand, protect our borders; and, on the other hand, never lose sight of the thing that makes America unique which is, we're a land of immigrants and that we're not going to discriminate against people," he said at a news conference with Australian Minister Prime John Howard.

Bush drew continued critfrom House Republicans for his speech, and the White House sought to emphasize the border security elements of the

president's plan.

"This is going to be a tremendous enforcement support partnership," U.S. Border Patrol Chief David Aguilar told reporters at the White House, anticipating the deployment of up to 6,000 National Guard troops to states along the Mexican

"We can certainly do what is asked by our commander in chief," added Lt. Gen. Steven Blum, National Guard Bureau Chief.

Blum, Aguilar and others stressed that National Guard forces would function in support roles, leaving frontline law enforcement against illegal immigrants in the hands of federal Border Patrol agents.

Republicans expressed support for new attempts to secure America's porous borders, but they rebelled against another element of what Bush calls a comprehensive plan to alter immigration laws.

"Thinly veiled attempts to promote amnesty cannot be tolerated,' said Rep. Tom Price, R-Ga.

six weeks, Silver said he's still finding his way around.

But the doctor has been busy. In a one-week period he put in five heart stents and one leg stent.

"One of the heart stent patients was in cardiogenic shock," Silver said. "Which means that she was having a big enough heart attack that she wasn't able to maintain her normal blood pressure. She came out of it quite nicely."

It's possible, Silver said, that if she had to wait to be transferred to Amarillo, she would not have done as

"It's the time element,"

he said. "The quicker you can get an artery open, the better the chance of survival and lack of complications."

He said the artery has to be opened very quickly. "Time is muscle, heart

muscle," Silver said. It has never been done in

Pampa, he said. "Nobody has put a stent in or balloons," Silver said.

Silver said that the treatment, in this case the insertion of a stent or balloon to open an artery, depends upon the patient.

"You select patients that are very good candidates and not very high risk patients," he said.

Patients with arteries that have a lot of twists and bends require other treat-"What we want to avoid

doing is closing an artery

off," he said. "Instead of making it better, making it worse.

In that regard, he said there is an ambulance standing by in case anything adverse happens when a stent is inserted.

"The risk is very low," Silver said. "It's probably less than one percent."

Silver's arrival in Pampa, he said, is an indication of where the hospital is mov-

"I think this is offering patients the option of treatment close to home," he said. "It's a major event and can be life saving."

He said he's also reaching out to the smaller outlying communities. It's faster to transfer patients to Pampa Regional Medical Center than to carry them all the way into Amarillo.



What about the charitable donations of rich Americans, to use the silly phrase, who've given something back?

While the actions of these people and their organizations are laudable, results motivated by charity and selflessness pale in comparison to other motives behind getting good things done. Let's look at it.

Bolivia isn't finished with its nationalization. International players in the mining industry also could come in for greater government control in the form of higher taxes and royalty payments. Morales wants to break up mining companies' large land holdings, possibly to turn them over to the poor. Timber companies are also in for

changes.

Bolivian officials say they want to use the additional revenues to fund social programs in the country. The people of Bolivia, who are mostly poor, should be the main beneficiaries of profits generated by the country's natural wealth. But Morales must manage his program with care.

Among the 25 international energy firms operating in Bolivia, the United States has a relatively small interest through Exxon Mobil Corp. Brazil's state-owned Petrobras and Spain's Repsol YPF have the largest stake. Officials in those concerns have expressed some irritation with the nationalization scheme. Petrobras

Nonprofit is seen as more righteous, particularly when people pompously stand before us and declare, "We're a nonprofit organization."

Profit is cast in a poor light because people don't understand the role of profits. Profit is a payment to entrepreneurs just as wages are payments to labor, interest to capital and rent to land. In order to earn profits in free markets, entrepreneurs must identify and satisfy human wants in a way that economizes on society's scarce resources.

Here's a little test. Which entities produce greater consumer satisfaction: for-profit enterprises such as supermarkets, computer makers and clothing stores, or nonprofit entities such as public schools, post offices and motor vehicle departments? I'm guessing you'll answer the former. Their survival depends on pleasing ordinary people, as opposed to the latter, whose survival is not so strictly tied to pleasing peo-

Don't get me wrong. I'm not arguing that self-interest and the free market system produce perfect outcomes, but they're the closest we'll come to perfection here on Earth

pulled the plug in March on a plan to invest \$5 billion because of nationalization fears, and it called Morales' implementation of the scheme, in which

soldiers were posted at 56 gas installations around the country on Tuesday, "unfriendly." Petrobras has invested \$1.6 billion in Bolivia since the mid-1990s.

Morales may have the upper hand in forcing the renegotiation of current gas contracts, but it could be disastrous for the country if, in being heavy-handed, he sours Bolivia's climate for future international investment. Bolivia needs foreign money to fully exploit its resources. If the state leaves too little profit for foreign businesses, those companies won't have the capital to reinvest in future growth.

The president's move has been extremely popular among Bolivians, 63 percent of whom live in poverty and saw little job creation from natural gas' privatization in the 1990s. With this latest economic incarnation, Morales will be successful only if he manages to extend the benefits to the poor.



Mavs 123, Spurs 118 OT

DALLAS (AP) — This type of series is exactly why the NBA will likely change its playoff format next season.

Because, so far, Dallas Mavericks and San Antonio Spurs have delivered a riveting second-round series perhaps better suited for a conference final, with the Mavericks' 123-118 overtime Monday night another thriller.

Jason Terry scored four of his 32 points in overtime, including the go-ahead layup and the clincher — an arching jumper over the lunging, outstretched arms of Tim Duncan to put Dallas up 3-1 in the series.

If the Mavericks beat the defending champions Wednesday in San Antonio, they'll advance to their second conference final in four years.

The finals is where the Spurs and Mavericks could have only met if the top two playoff seeds were based on records which NBA commissioner David Stern announced before Monday's would likely happen next season. The Spurs won just three more games than Dallas in the regular season, but Dallas

was dropped to the No. 4 seed behind the other two division winners.

But even if it's not a series with the NBA Finals on the line, it has played out that way.

"That was the best game I've ever been a part of," said Mavericks forward Jerry Stackhouse, who scored points off the bench. "The emotional roller coaster was unbelievable."

The loss gave San Antonio its first three-game skid of the season and the daunting task of trying to become just the ninth team in NBA history to climb back from a 3-1 deficit. The Spurs' own history isn't on their side, either: Since Duncan came aboard in 1997, the Spurs are 0-5 when trailing this deep into a playoff series.

They also haven't won an elimination game to keep a series going; the only time they won when facing elimination was Game 7 of last year's finals.

"The bottom line is that we could have come out of here with two wins," San Antonio coach Greg Popovich said.

"It's not like we're playing horrible and they're playing great. We're right there."

"I'm just a big kid," Flutie said, wearing jeans and sneakers at his retirement news conference Monday. "I enjoy playing. ... It could be in the backyard as far as I'm con-

He won the Heisman Trophy and threw

one of college football's most famous passes in 1984, a 48-yard desperation touch-down to Gerard Phelan as time expired in BC's 47-45 upset at Miami.


Phelan, an executive with a Boston printing company, said Monday, "If he knew he was going out there to play and start, he would not retire, (but) Sundays are frustrat-
