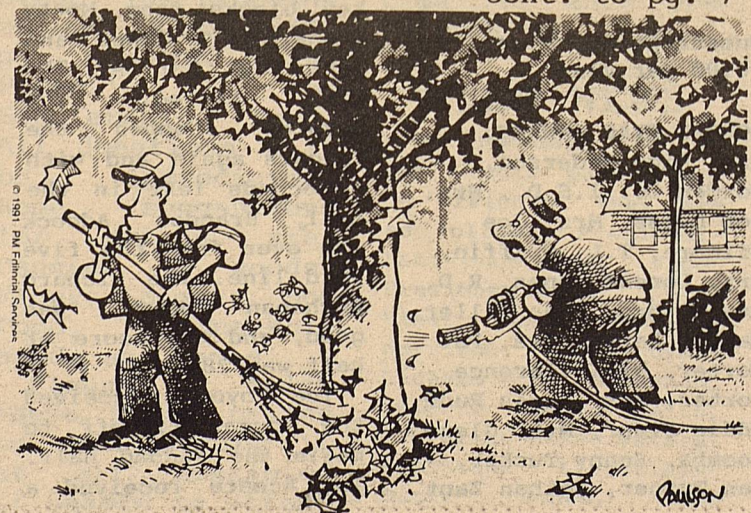

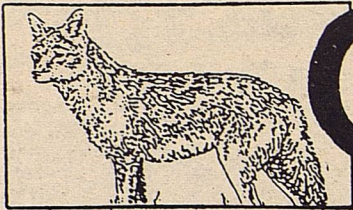
As president, Dorothy will be responsible

# COYOTE NEWS

## COYOTES SPOIL COUGAR'S HOMECOMING

Friday night was homecoming at Klondike but the Borden County Coyotes spoiled the Cougars' festivities.

The Klondike Cougars started out with a bang but ended with a fizzle. The results was a 55-22 loss to the Coyotes.

The Coyotes kicked off to Klondike after deferring the option for the ball until the second half. The Coyote defense stopped the Cougars without a first down. On the Coyotes first posses-

sion Clint Wills burst through the Cougar lines for a big first down but it was negated when the ball was fumbled to the Cougars. This gave them good field position when a Cougar went over from the one yard line. The PAT failed, and the score was 6-0.

On the Coyotes' next possession Clint Wills connected with John Paul Harris for 47 yards and a big first down. Kirk Jones caught another Wills' pass for 10 yards and a first down. On the next play Brandon Adcock powered over from the two yard line. The PAT was no good, and the score was tied with 1:22 left in the first half.

In the second quarter the Coyotes pulled away with 22 unanswered points. With 7:54 left in the second quarter John Paul Harris ran over the line from the 5 yard line. The extra point trio of J.J. Kincheloe, to Guy Zant to Richard Buchanan scored the extra points to make the score 14-6. The Coyotes made it 20-6 with 3:47 left in the half when Brandon Adcock ran 55 yards for a touchdown. Brandon was aided by key blocks from Monty Stone, Kirk Jones and John Paul Harris. The kick failed. The Coyotes stopped the Cougars again and with 3 seconds left in the half, Brandon Adcock ran over from the five yard line. The Richard Buchanan kick was good, and the score at half was 28-6.

The Coyotes received the Cougar kickoff to begin the second half. Joe Acosta received a

short kick, ran left, broke two tackles, ran right and broke another tackle before darting lose 55 yards for a T.D. With 9:46 left in the third quarter, Buchanan kicked another extra point through to make the score 36-6.

On the Coyotes next possession, John Paul Harris broke lose and sprinted 66 yards for another T.D. Richard Buchanan passed to Kirk Jones for the 1 point P.A.T., and the score with 7:58 left was 43-6. The Cougars scored their second touchdown with 21 seconds left in the third quarter. The PAT was good, and the score was 43-14.

The Coyotes scored two more times in the fourth quarter. Brandon Adcock stepped between the Cougar quarterback and the running back, kicked the ball lose, and sprinted 79 yards to the end zone feeling no guilt for his thievery. With 7:17 left, the PAT failed and the score was 49-14. With 6:29 left, Juve Balaque ran 36 yards into the end zone. The PAT was missed. The Cougars scored their final touchdown with 47 seconds left in the game. The PAT was good and the score was 55-22.

The Coyotes covered 342 yards total offense and allowed only 164 yards. Brandon Adcock led the Coyotes with 139 yards on 12 carries. Brandon scored 3 touchdowns, recovered a Cougar fumble, and ran 79 yards for a fourth touchdown.

John Paul Harris had 4 carries for 91 yards and two touchdowns. John Paul caught a pass from Clint Wills for 47 yards.

Joe Acosta ran a Cougar kick-off back for 55 yards and a touchdown.

Juve Balaque carried the ball five times for 30 yards including a 35 yard touchdown scamper.

Clint Wills completed 2 passes of 5 attempts for 57 yards. Clint

was injured in the second quarter and saw no action in the second half.

Borden County is now 3-2 on the season. The Coyotes begin district play this week with Hermleigh. They will have to take it one game at a time, but the Coyote football team has its sights set on another district championship. Everyone come out and help the Coyotes accomplish this goal.

## BORDEN PUPS--12 TRENT GORILLAS--22

The Coyote Junior High team visited Trent last Thursday night. The Gorillas won the game, but the Coyotes fought to the end. The Gorillas returned a Coyote punt late in the third quarter and cinched the game.

The Coyotes kicked off to the Gorillas and held them. On the Coyotes first possession, Desmond Acosta ran across from 9 yards out. The PAT was no good, and the score was 6-0.

The Gorillas looked like they would score when they broke lose and ran 55 yards to be chased down by Desmond Acosta on the 5 yard line.

Desmond intercepted a Gorilla pass to kill the drive.

The ball was given back to Trent on downs. This time Trent would score and make a successful kick for 2 points and the score was 6 to 8. The

Gorillas gained the ball back again on downs. Oscar made a key tackle and Desmond Acosta intercepted a Trent pass which gave the ball back to the young Coyotes.

Again, the Coyotes turned the ball over on downs and this drive produced 8 more points for the Gorillas. The score at half was 6 to 16.

To begin the second half Grant Key returned the kick off 22 yards. On this drive Oscar Baeza completed a pass to Grant Key for 7 yards. Desmond Acosta and Grant Key make good runs but eventually Desmond Acosta had to punt. The Gorillas returned the punt 52 yards for a touchdown. With 1:31 left in the third quarter the score was 22-6.

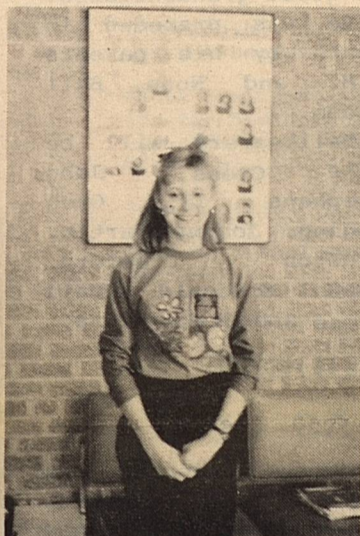

Mitchell Dalton Cross, 73, Big Spring, died Wednesday, Oct. 2, 1991, at Scenic Mountain Medical Center after a long illness.

Services were held Friday, Oct. 4, 1991, at Myers & Smith Funeral Home Chapel, with the Rev. James Wilborn, pastor, Wesley United Methodist Church officiating. Burial was in Trinity Memorial Park under the direction of Myers & Smith Funeral Home.

He was born Aug. 6, 1918 in Cash. He was a lifetime resident of Big Spring. He married Bonnie Ayers, Aug. 17, 1936, in Big Spring. He grew up in the Center Point community and farmed there. He was later employed by Webb Air Force Base. He was a Howard County

## BORDEN COUNTY JUNIOR LIVESTOCK ASSN.

General Membership Meeting  
September 17, 1991

The Annual General Membership meeting of the Borden County Junior Livestock Association was held on September 17, 1991 at the Borden School Vocational Agriculture Building.

**Minutes:** Minutes of the Sept. 11, 1991. General Membership meeting were read. D.M. Parks moved to accept the minutes as read. Guy Zant seconded the motion. Motion carried.

**Treasurer's Report:** Jerry Stone presented the Treasurer's Report. John Anderson moved to accept the report. D.M. Parks seconded the motion. Motion carried.

**Coyote Opry Report:** Buddy Wallace gave a report on plans for the 1991 Coyote Opry to be held on September 21, 1991. Activities this will include a "County Fair", fish fry, art show, team roping, entertainment and a pie and cake auction. A raffle will also be held for a processed barrow.

**Policy changes for 1991:**

1) Memorial Trophies - All memorial plaques to be given at the 1992 Junior Livestock Show must be requested on or before November 1, 1991.

2) Area Stock Show Purchases - Borden County Junior Livestock Association will not purchase animals at

area stock shows who do not make purchases at the Borden County Junior Livestock Show.

These policy changes were approved by the General Membership.

**Rule Changes for 1991**

Rules - Any add-on and/or designated type bid solicited in the name of the Borden County Junior Livestock Association whether by committee or self appointed, must be turned in to the association treasurer before the premium sale. All add-on and/or designated type bids will be reviewed at the first meeting after the sale and must meet the approval of the board of directors. Any add-on and/or designated type bids not meeting the approval of the board will be put in the Association's general fund.

3) Barrow Rules - (B) The weight limit on swine will be 180-270 pounds to show. Only barrows which weigh 200 pounds or more will be allowed to sell at floor price.

2) Classification of Barrows - Barrows will be classified for the 1992 Borden County Junior Livestock Show by the person selected to classify lambs and steers.

4) Validation and Entry Fees - Validation fees of two dollars

per head will be charged for lambs and barrows. Fees for validating lambs will be collected on validation day. Validation fees for barrows will be collected when barrows are taken to their owners.

Entry fees of five dollars per head will be charged for lambs and barrows. Entry fees will be ten dollars per head for steers. Entry fees must be paid not later than January 12, 1992 at 5:00 p.m.

The above rules and/or rule changes were approved by the General Membership.

Report on Costs of the Borden County Junior Livestock Show:

Guy Zant discussed the cost of putting on a Junior Livestock Show. These costs are increasing yearly while collections are remaining about the same. Guy also made suggestions on ways to defray these costs.



tion of Texas, which was organized 98 years ago for educational purposes and has only missed two yearly meetings, both due to World War II.

As the president, one of Dorothy's first responsibilities was to appoint more than 90 persons to various committees and assignments.

She said she based her selections on her personal knowledge of each individual and recommendations from eight area directors.

In past years, Dorothy has often testified in Austin before the legislative committees either for or against whatever bills were pending that would affect district or county clerks' business.

"Some ideas looked very good on paper," she explained. "But some just didn't work in the office."

A recent change which has simplified child support somewhat was one that when a parent moves to another county, child support payments are transferred also to that county. It was often confusing when child support payments still had to be paid in the county the parent had previously lived in.

Another change is that for the first time in 30 years, county clerk fees will be increased. Fees used to be uniform throughout all counties in the state. Extra income generated will be used to store court records on microfilm and to rebind old records books.

Dorothy explained that this helps ensure that valuable county records will not be lost. She noted that this has not happened in Borden County, but other counties have had to deal with lost records.

She said Borden County is fortunate it is able to do this. Some counties, especially smaller ones,

cannot.

One of the reasons Dorothy said she likes her job so much is because she "enjoys people." She looks forward to seeing her ranching friends every 10 years - around Labor Day - when it is time to register their brands.

Sometimes she works overtime, but usually Dorothy is at the courthouse from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Since they are a small operation she said the whole courthouse shuts down for the noon hour.

As county clerk, Dorothy's duties include registering births, marriages and brands, and the buying and selling of property. She probates wills, works on civil and criminal cases and serves as the ex-officio secretary for the commissioners court. She works the elections also.

As district clerk, duties include worker's comp cases, civil lawsuits, divorces, child custody, criminal cases, jury calls and more.

To keep abreast of the changes in laws pertaining to both her

positions, Dorothy attends periodic seminars. For instance, one bill passed by the Legislature this year changed 23 items while another bill passed four years ago changed 123.

Since she doesn't always deal with all aspects of either job on a daily basis, Dorothy has reference books which allow her to look up the current requirements under present law.

Dorothy said she likes the "peace and quiet" of living in a small town. She said she rarely has to file a criminal case and the last juvenile case was filed in 1967.

She moved to Gail in 1966. She was a deputy in the district/county clerk's office when the present office holder announced her intention not to seek another term. When asked, Dorothy had no hesitation about "putting my hat in the ring," she said. She was first elected in 1979 and this marks her 13th year as county/district clerk.

Her hobbies include reading, crocheting, and square dancing. Volunteer work includes serving as a member of the Cancer Society chapter in Gail and the Borden County Cemetery Association. She also serves as editor of the "Borden

County Citizen," a newsletter sponsored by the Historical Committee.

A native of Crane, Dorothy grew up on a ranch in Gaines County.

She has two daughters and five grandchildren. They included Joyce Kincheloe and her husband, Jerry, and children Jana and J.J.

who live in Gail, and Janice Morgan and her husband, Jerry and children, Jennifer, Jonathan and Jerrica who live in Morgan, Miss.
