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Drug raid nets seven arrests

By MARILYN POWERS Staff Writer Seven persons were arrested as the result of a narcotics search warrant served Thursday morning at 1210 E. Francis. Four of the seven were found at the house, and the other three were added to the total after peace officers at the scene noticed a red SUV driving by the address and stopped the vehicle on Browning Street, according to a news release from Lt. Fred Courtney of Pampa Police Department. The search warrant was served at 8:55 a.m. by the Pampa Special Response Team as the result of an investigation involving PPD's narcotics and criminal investigation divisions and Gray County Sheriff's Office, Courtney said. The SRT, assisted by sheriff's deputies and PPD detectives, found four persons at the home when the search

warrant was served. The four were taken into custody while the residence was searched. "The officers found marijuana in plain sight in the living room of the house. During the actual search of the house, officers found additional amounts of marijuana and approximately 20 'rocks' of crack cocaine," Courtney said. More than \$800 was also recovered, and officers believe the money is the profits from sale of the drugs, Courtney said. "Many items of paraphernalia were found. Much of the paraphernalia was used to package the drugs into smaller amounts for sale," he said. The quantity of the drugs reportedly found has an estimated street value of \$800 to \$1,000. Deputies believe a camera

DPS continues success in illegal drug seizures

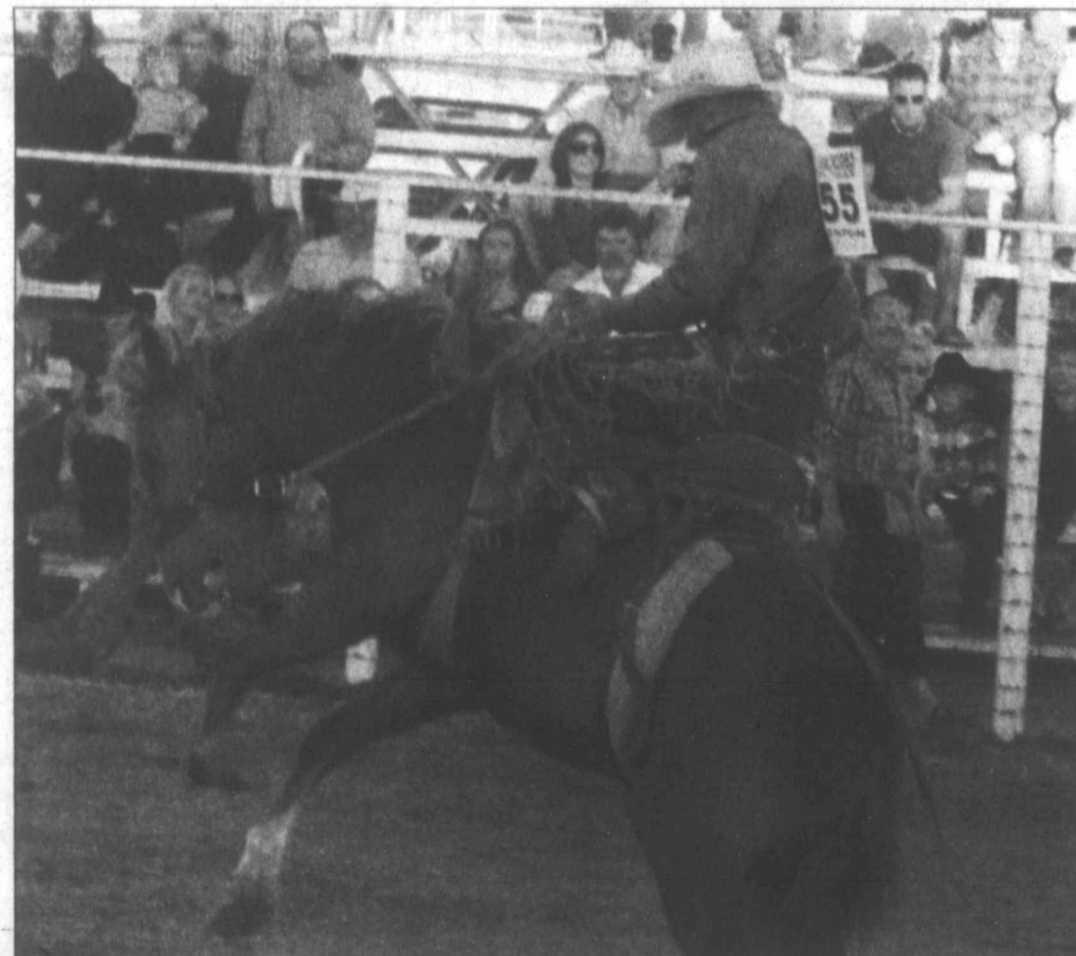
Texas Department of Public Safety troopers have seized about \$160 million worth of illegal drugs during routine traffic stops in 2005. "Our troopers, who are trained to be on alert for criminal activity during traffic stops, have been rewriting the record books the last several years" said DPS Director Col. Thomas Davis Jr. "Three of the four top years in terms of the value of drugs seized have been recorded since 2001." Some of the drug seizure highlights in 2005: • Nearly two tons (2,825 pounds) of cocaine - the third most ever by DPS

troopers; • 53 pounds of methamphetamine-the second most in DPS history; • Nearly 23 tons (45,952 pounds) of marijuana; • Almost 1,800 drug arrests. The \$160 million worth of drugs is a conservative estimate and ranks fourth in DPS history. DPS generally leads the nation in highway drug seizures. "Putting drug smugglers behind bars and taking thousands of pounds of drugs off the streets every year is a positive step in increasing public safety," said Davis.

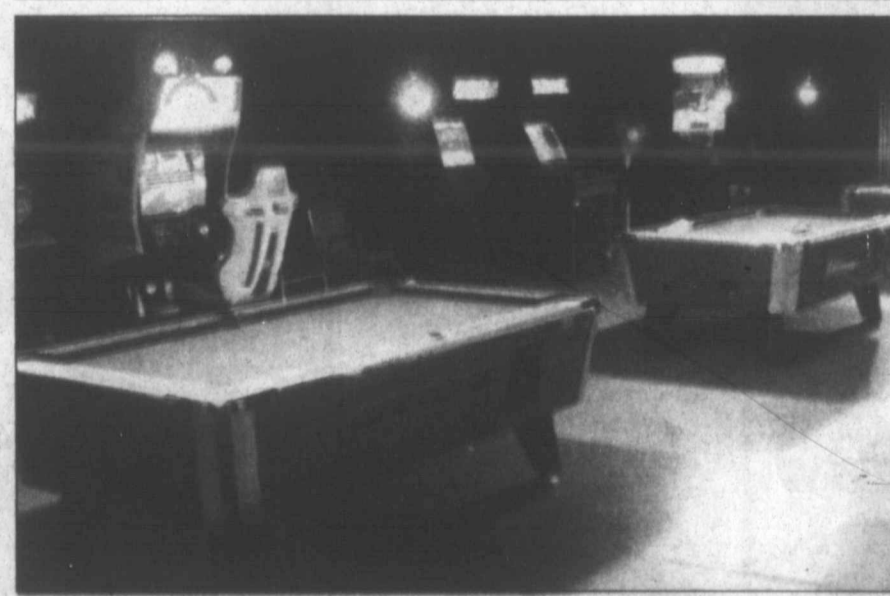

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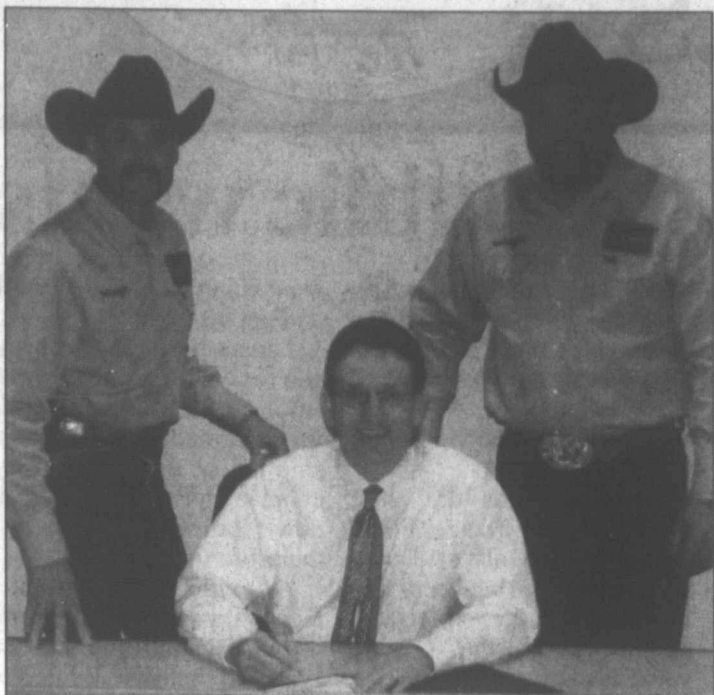

**Perryton man dies, 2 injured**

**PERRYTON** — A Perryton man was killed and two others injured early Thursday after their vehicle rolled on Highway 70 south of Perryton.

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety, at 7:15 a.m., Frank Lugo, 44, of Perryton was driving a 2000 Chevrolet pickup northbound on Highway 70, 15 miles south of Perryton when he apparently fell asleep. Lugo lost control, and the pickup rolled twice.

Joseph Allard Barnes, 35, of Perryton died at Ochiltree General Hospital.

Another passenger, Jimmy Gray, 37, of Perryton and Lugo sustained injuries. They were treated at the hospital and released.

DPS said Barnes was not wearing a seat belt. Lugo and Gray were wearing their seat belts.

which was found at the scene was stolen from a person in Wheeler County, Courtney said, and several other items suspected of being stolen were taken as evidence.

The youngest of the four arrested at the home was a 15-year-old male who had both marijuana and \$240 cash in his trousers, Courtney said. He was released to Gray County Juvenile Probation Department and was subsequently sent to the Youth Center of the High Plains in Randall County.

The juvenile is charged with possession of under two ounces of marijuana, a Class B misdemeanor.

Also arrested at the house were Haley Esther Maddox, 20, of Pampa; Charlie Warren Melzer, 21, of Erick, Okla.; and Jason David Sprawls, 19, of Payne Springs, according to Gray County Jail records.

All three were charged with possession of less than two ounces of marijuana. Melzer has several outstanding warrants out of Beckham County, Okla. Maddox was also charged with theft over \$50 and under \$500, and manufac-

ture/delivery of over four ounces and under 200 ounces of a controlled substance.

Maddox' theft charge was a result of the camera which is suspected of being stolen from Wheeler County being in her possession, Courtney said.

A red SUV was noticed driving by the scene as officers were conducting the search.

"Officers thought the persons in the car might have some information on an unrelated matter," Courtney said.

Officer Donny Brown and Deputy Robert Baker stopped the SUV on Browning Street and asked the occupants to return to the address on Francis Street and talk, Courtney said. The SUV returned to the house.

"During the course of the interview, a resident on Browning Street called the police department to report drug paraphernalia being found where the officers had stopped the SUV. One thing led to another, resulting in the arrest of the occupants of the SUV," Courtney said.

Norman Brady Barker, 33, of Borger; Daniel Yancy Klotz, 44, of Stinnett; and Kelly Lyn Burris, 32, of Borger were arrested and taken to Gray County Jail.

Barker was arrested on a capias pro fine for disorderly conduct/obscene language. Klotz was arrested for having no driver's license. Burris was charged with possession of drug paraphernalia.

Maddox was released from jail as of press time today on bonds of \$25,000 for manufacture/delivery of a controlled substance, \$1,000 for theft and \$1,500 for possession of marijuana.

Sprawls had also been released as of press time on \$1,500 bond for the possession of marijuana charge.

Melzer remains in Gray County Jail as of press time in lieu of \$1,500 bond on the drug paraphernalia charge. He is also awaiting extradition to Beckham County, Okla. on four charges pending there against him, according to jail records.

Burris was released to pay her fine at a later date, while Klotz and Barker remain in jail as of press time, according to jail records.

"This is an example of what can be accomplished when the community and law enforcement work together," Courtney said.

## President Bush understands what the public wants

It is odd how there are so many issues on which the two political-party establishments in the United States sharply differ but on which the public is relatively united. As the debate rages in Congress on whether to be tough on the border or generous in granting citizenship and guest-worker status to illegal immigrants, a recent Fox News poll echoes the public's point of view: Do it all!

While their party leaders steadfastly resist granting "amnesty" by allowing "illegal immigrants who have jobs in the United States to apply for legal temporary-worker status," voters back the proposal by an overwhelming 63-29 percent. And, despite the posturing of the right wing, Republican voters say yes by 63-30.

Nor are Democrats any more likely to fall in line behind their party's polarizing positions. Asked if they back "using thousands of National Guard troops temporarily to help patrol agents along the Mexican border to stop illegal immigration," voters as a whole answer yes by 63-31, and even Democrats support the idea by 52-40.

And everybody supports increasing the Border Patrol force. Voters as a whole back the addition of thousands of new agents by 79-17, and Democrats go along by 73-22.

So why is our politics so polarized when our voters are not?

The Fox News poll gives us the answer. The American people see illegal immigration as a serious problem and

tend to favor anything that will solve it. Eighty-six percent say it is a very or somewhat serious problem, and 57 percent call it very serious. Only 13 percent take it more lightly.

Indeed, in the ultimate heresy for the Bush administration, 52 percent of all Americans — and 63 percent of Republicans — say they would be willing to pay \$100 in extra taxes if they knew that it would all go toward border security.

President Bush understands, for once, where the public is on this issue. As a result, his proposal is a grab bag of every proposal that is out there. The two parties'

extreme ideologues are mistaking the public's mood in attempting to parse the Bush package and back the parts that appeal to their ideologies while opposing the rest. That is not what Americans

— or their own constituents — want. They want everything passed, whether it has its genesis on the left or the right.

It's virtually the same situation on gas prices. People want solutions whether they are ideologically acceptable to their parties or not. The left sees no reason why we should not drill for more oil and the right strongly supports alternative fuels. While it is possible to ask the

polling questions in such a way as to show disagreement where there really isn't any, it is striking how voters essentially favor whatever works to solve the key problems.

When he was the U.S. ambassador to France, Felix Rohatyn reputedly said that the difference between the French and the American people was that the "French value ideas over facts while Americans value facts over ideas." His point was that we want what works while the French have to stop to see if the remedy to the problem fits in with their ideological worldview.

But our politicians are increasingly following the French model, attacking one another's solutions when the people simply want their elected officials to pass

everything that will work and get on with it.

I suspect that the real reason for the Republican opposition to the Bush proposals for an earned path to citizenship is that they are worried about a massive number of new Latino citizens and therefore voters.

As with the motor-voter legislation, they can't admit it but Republicans like to keep the franchise limited to those upon whom they can count. This policy, if such an evil motivation lurks underneath GOP rhetoric, is shortsighted. The Hispanics are going to vote in large numbers eventually anyway. Only the question of for whom they will vote is up for grabs.

## Today in History

Today is Friday, June 2, the 153rd day of 2006. There are 212 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 2, 1953, Queen Elizabeth II of Britain was crowned in Westminster Abbey, 16 months after the death of her father, King George VI.

On this date:

In 1886, President Cleveland married Frances Folsom in a White House ceremony.

In 1897, Mark Twain, 61, was quoted by the New York Journal as saying from London that "the report of my death was an exaggeration."

In 1924, Congress granted U.S. citizenship to all American Indians.

In 1941, baseball's "Iron Horse," Lou Gehrig, died in New York of a degenerative disease, amyotrophic lateral sclerosis.

In 1946, the Italian monarchy was abolished in favor of a republic.

In 1966, the U.S. space probe Surveyor 1 landed on the moon and began transmitting detailed photographs of the lunar surface.

In 1975, Vice President Nelson Rockefeller said his commission had found no widespread pattern of illegal activities at the Central Intelligence Agency.

In 1979, Pope John Paul II arrived in his native Poland on the first visit by a pope to a Communist country.

In 1986, for the first time, the public could watch the proceedings of the U.S. Senate on television as a six-week experiment of televised sessions began.

In 1995, a U.S. Air Force F-16-C was shot down by a Bosnian Serb surface-to-air missile while on a NATO air patrol in northern Bosnia; the pilot, Capt. Scott F. O'Grady, was rescued six days later.

Ten years ago: "Rent," "Bring in 'da Noise, Bring in 'da Funk" and "The King and I" dominated the Tony Awards, each winning four prizes.

Five years ago: Nepal's Crown Prince Dipendra, on life support after killing at least eight members of the royal family, including his parents, before turning the gun on himself, was named king by Nepal's State Council.

## The nation in abstract versus reality ...

How do you persuade a man who has a wife and children and who works hard but can barely make ends meet to take a pay cut and go do something that has a high probability of getting him killed or seriously injured?

Clearly, it is not in a man's self-interest to go to a foreign country and fight in a war, the outcome of which won't affect him or his family. So how do you persuade him to do it?

The answer lies in the nature of the human being. We are mind-directed creatures. We act on the basis of our beliefs. Therefore, if you can control what people believe, you can control what they do. That's the whole purpose of advertising, for example — to instill in people's minds the belief that a product or service will be beneficial to them.

Persuading people to go to war is much more complicated and involves identity, which is constructed of beliefs. When we are born, we don't know who we are or where we are. We only know we've just been pushed out of the warm womb into the drafty world of giants who can pick us up by our feet and whack our backsides. We protest the only way we can — by yelling.

The first beliefs that will come to constitute our identity come from parents or caregivers. Any psychiatrist can tell you how important these beliefs are and how difficult they are to shed.

Then we begin to add more from our peers, from the culture and from education. So, we learn we are Americans, and just what are Americans? Well, we are told about that largely through history, through stories told by our own family and stories we read or see in the movies.

And once we identify ourselves as Americans, then we will act as we believe Americans, as we have defined them, ought to act. It was not in my self-interest to go into the Army. I had a good job. I had already decided against the military as a career. But, as an American, I believed it was my duty, so I went, and if the Army had said to go to Vietnam, I would have gone without question. My identity as an American was based on my beliefs, and part of those beliefs was that every American had a duty to take his turn on watch.

Millions of men have gone to war because, as Americans or British or French or Germans or Russians or Japanese, they believed it was their duty. The danger lies in the fact

that unscrupulous men, through misrepresentation and propaganda, can motivate

people to go to war even though it is not in their country's interest, much less their own. Unless there is an invader threatening one's home and hearth, it is never in the interest of an individual to go war — unless he decides to be a mercenary.

It is an evil paradox that men with the lowest motives can launch wars by appealing to the highest ideals of better men.

The millions killed in all the wars were nobodies as far as the leaders who sent them into war were concerned. They were cannon fodder. They all shared in common the fact that their political leaders were willing to sacrifice them for greed or ego. For all practical purposes, all of the dead in wars are unknown soldiers in the war leaders' eyes. The dead are

known only to the people who loved them.

The trick is to remember to make the distinction between America in the abstract and America in reality. The America in the abstract is made up of all our experiences, memories, stories, legends and myths. The America in reality consists of what exists right at this moment.

And what exists right at this moment is a corrupt federal government with a foolish man in the White House. What exists at this moment is a military-industrial complex with a vested interest in war and conflict. What exists at this moment are unnecessary wars in Afghanistan and Iraq. What exists at this moment is a government solicitous of corporate welfare, but one that doesn't give a hoot about the individual American.

Rudyard Kipling said it so well when in a poem he wrote: "If any question why we died / Tell them, because our fathers lied." Be alert when you hear politicians talk about abstractions like patriotism, national security and international stability. They are trying to control you by controlling your mind.

worried for their son or daughter's safety while they were in the military; and 3) of the spouses who lived "spouseless lives" for longer than they ever wanted.

Then I asked the Lord to bless each one who had made sacrifices.

By this time, it was about 12:45 a.m., and I was ready for sleep. But I left the memorial with the fullness and joy that only thankfulness can give, so the next time you can't sleep or the next time you are reminded of what you owe to the sacrifice of each and every veteran, just drive down to our Veteran's Memorial.

You'll have plenty to pray about and more to be thankful for than you will have time. And when it is time for you to leave, you will have been blessed.

God bless every veteran, and, God, send a special blessing for the men and women who worked diligently to get our Veteran's Memorial built. It is a place of blessing for us all.

### Church debates reparations

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — The Episcopal Church is poised to apologize for failing to oppose slavery, but making up for its 19th century inaction won't come without 21st century controversy.

At its national convention beginning June 13, the church is expected to approve a resolution expressing regret for supporting slavery and segregation. But the debate will likely get more heated when a second resolution comes up, calling for a study of possible reparations for black Episcopalians.

The church, already divid-

ed over the separate issue of gays' role in the church, is struggling over whether reparations would be a meaningful gesture 141 years after the Civil War ended.

The Rev. Harold Lewis, a black priest and rector at Calvary Episcopal in Pittsburgh, called the idea of reparations outrageous and impractical.

"The better thing to do is to talk about how we can work to eradicate racism and how we can fight to eliminate economic disparities regardless of racism," said Lewis.

nearby, but it is coming "out of" heaven. When we go to Heaven, we enter that beautiful city. That is where we go when we die. That is where the marriage supper of the Lamb is going to be. That is where the wedding feast is going to be. And in God's providence, at the end of these climactic days, out of Heaven will descend our incomparable and beautiful home.

Through the years, and now through the centuries, the hands of our dear Savior have been fashioning what no architect in this life could ever dream of or think of. He is building a city and a home for us in glory, and its size is tremendous.

"And the angel measured it and it measured twelve thousand stadia." One thousand five hundred miles — it is a city as though it began in Maine and extended all the way down to Florida. It is so vast in length, breadth and height that the city of God would cover all of Ireland, all of

England and Great Britain, all of France, all of Spain, all of Germany, all of Austria, all of Italy, all of European Turkey and half of Russia.

One thousand five hundred miles one way. One thousand five hundred miles the other way, and one thousand five hundred miles upward — built street upon street, story upon story, in the beautiful,

golden city of God. We now go inside the beautiful city through one of its gates made out of solid pearl. There is a sermon in the fact that the gates are pearl. Heaven is entered through suffering and travail, through redemption and agony, through the blood of the cross. A pearl is a jewel made by a little animal that is wounded. Without the wound, the pearl is never formed.

We enter Heaven "through the gates of pearl and I saw no temple." The city itself is a sanctuary. God's presence is there. There is no need of veils,

curtains, ceremonies, rites, altars, covenants, arks and intermediaries. We shall live in the presence of God and shall worship immediately and directly. Our song shall be "Jehovah Shama," God is here.

There is no need for a temple, for God is manifest as He was in the Garden of Eden. This is paradise restored and regained.

"And the city," the Bible says, "had no need of the sun, neither of the moon ... for the glory of God did lighten it and the Lamb is the light thereof."

The glory of God is His garments. It is the iridescence. It is the incomparable effusion of color and light that stream from His person.

John now describes a remarkable parallel between what he sees in the paradise of God and what is described in the first and second chapters of the book of Genesis.

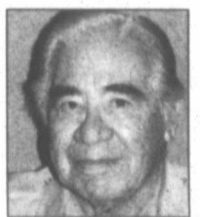

## Nowitzki scorches Suns with 50 points

DALLAS (AP) - Coming off his worst game in months, Dirk Nowitzki wanted to get off to a strong start in Game 5 of the Western Conference finals. So the first two times the Dallas Mavericks had the ball, he took it straight to the basket.

And he missed them both.

Yet Nowitzki wasn't about to be denied - not after getting chewed out by his coach, and especially not when he felt a tremendous season was slipping away.

Nowitzki set a franchise playoff record with 50 points, scoring 15 in a row during a fourth-quarter surge that turned a tight game into a rout, sending the Mavericks past the Phoenix Suns 117-101 and putting them within a victory of reaching the NBA Finals for the first time in their 26-year history.

"We're watching Dirk grow as a player," said Adrian Griffin, the only player other than Nowitzki who was with the Mavs when they made the conference finals three years ago. "He's developed into an extraordinary player."

The details are even more extraordinary, forming a tale that's instantly part of team lore, one that will grow in significance should they break through the championship round - and especially if they win it all.

Nowitzki scored only 11 points in Game 4 and Dallas lost by 20. So on Wednesday, coach Avery Johnson "let me have it." Nowitzki said, during a film session. He responded with 13 points in the first quarter, helping the Mavericks go up by 14.

Led by 26 points from Tim Thomas, the Suns took a seven-point lead late in the third quarter, with Thomas and Nowitzki exchanging words and technical fouls along the way. Sensing that a 60-win season and a playoff run that included a first-round

sweep and a thrilling seven-game knockout of the reigning champs was in jeopardy, Nowitzki turned to his teammates during a huddle with 3:24 left and said, "Let's go."

Then the big German led the way, scoring seven points during a 10-0 run that helped Dallas take a one-point lead in the fourth quarter. Soon after, Phoenix's Raja Bell let a foul escalate into a technical, and coach Mike D'Antoni got one, too, even shattering a clipboard in anger.

Nowitzki responded by making both free throws - and the rout was on.

The Mavericks went from leading 89-88 to having a 104-93 cushion with 4:59 left. Although Dallas blew a late nine-point lead in the opener, this one held up easily, especially with Nowitzki continuing to throw in baskets.

He reached 50 with a 3-pointer he was so sure was going to fall that he was nearly at halfcourt celebrating when it did. He left to a big ovation with 1:12 left.

"The last game, I never really found my rhythm," Nowitzki said. "Today, I just wanted to be aggressive, no matter what happens."

Nowitzki broke his own club postseason scoring record of 46 points (set in the first round in 2003) and matched Kobe Bryant for the most by anyone this postseason. Bryant also did it against Phoenix, but in overtime.

"He played unbelievable," said Suns star Steve Nash, the league's two-time MVP and one of Nowitzki's closest friends from their years together in Dallas. "I didn't feel like he missed very often."

Nowitzki was 14-for-26 from the floor, including 5-of-6 on 3-pointers, and 17-for-18 from the line. He had 12 rebounds and three assists.

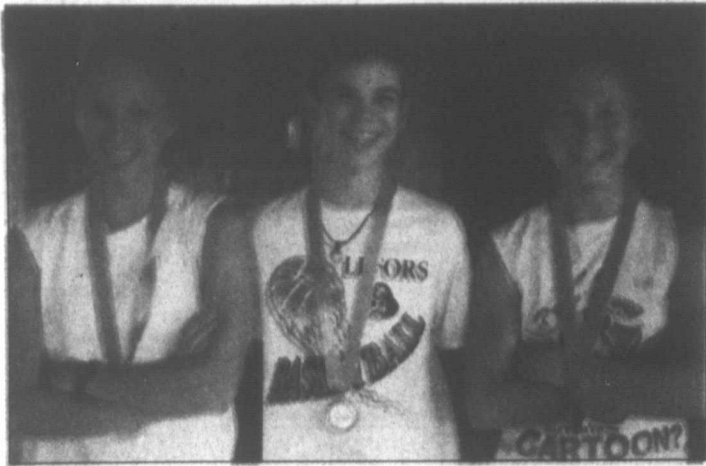

tiful river with four branches which watered the garden. Here again is the life-giving river. As the psalmist said, there is a river, the streams whereof as cool, clear water, and by the side of the stream flowing in the midst of the streets of the city is the Tree of Life. The Tree of Life taken from us in the Garden of Eden is restored to us here in heaven.

John continues: "The throne of God and of the Lamb shall be in it; and His servants shall serve."

How many times do you hear people say, "I cannot imagine heaven being interesting. We are just to sit and do nothing."?

There is no estimation of Heaven being such a thing as that. In the Garden of Eden, God said He needed someone to till the ground. When He made man, He placed him in the garden that he might dress it and keep it. Man was to have dominion over things above and things around and things below.

This was a tremendous assignment and responsibility for the first man in the Garden of Eden. There is every indication that Heaven follows the same pattern.

For example, in the parable of the pounds when the Lord blessed the man who had gained 10 pounds, He said, "You shall have authority over ten cities." To the man who had made five pounds, he said, "You shall have authority over five cities." There is vast administration in the future kingdom of God. Nations are mentioned. Governments, responsibilities are described.

Now John speaks of the most climactic and meaningful blessing of all — "and they shall see His face; and His name shall be in their foreheads."

That is what it is to be in

Heaven — namely, to look upon the face of God, our Lord, and to be with Him and one another forever.

I can hear the Lord as He asks, "On what street would you like to live and what mansion would you like to call your home?"

And I can hear a true saint reply, "Dear Lord, any street, any mansion, just so the windows open on the palace of the Great King. That I may see Him come and go."

Any street, Lord. Any house, Lord. Just so I may

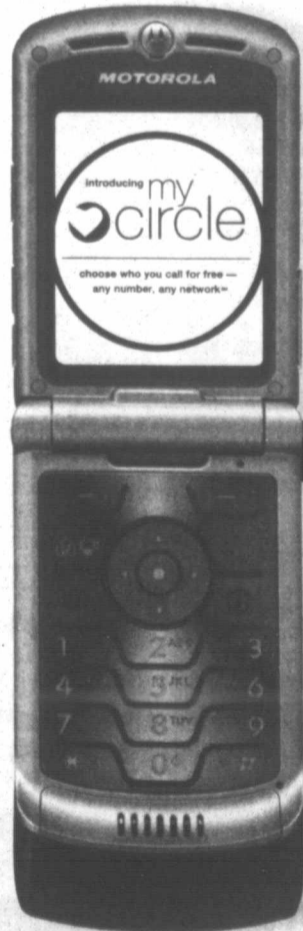


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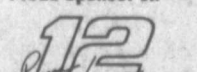
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
