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# **Drug raid nets** seven arrests

### By MARILYN POWERS

Staff Writer Seven persons were arrested as the result of a narcotics search warrant served Thursday morning at 1210 E. Francis.

Four of the seven were found at the house, and the other three were added to the total after peace officers at the scene noticed a red SUV driving by the address and stopped the vehicle on Browning Street, according to a news release from Lt. Fred Courtney of Pampa Police Department.

The search warrant was served at 8:55 a.m. by the Pampa Special Response Team as the result of an investigation involving PPD's narcotics and criminal investigation divisions and Gray County Sheriff's Office, Courtney said.

The SRT, assisted by sheriff's deputies and PPD detectives, found four persons at the home when the search

warrant was served. The four were taken into custody while the residence was searched.

"The officers found marijuana in plain sight in the living room of the house. During the actual search of the house, officers found additional amounts of marijuana and approximately 20 'rocks' of crack cocaine," Courtney said.

More than \$800 was also recovered, and officers believe the money is the profits from sale of the drugs, Courtney said.

"Many items of paraphernalia were found. Much of the paraphernalia was used to package the drugs into smaller amounts for sale," he said.

The quantity of the drugs reportedly found has an estimated street value of \$800 to \$1,000

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

## President Bush understands what the public wants

It is odd how there are so many issues on which the two political-party establishments in the United States sharply differ but on which the public is relatively united. As the debate rages in Congress on whether to be tough on the border or generous in granting citizenship and guest-worker status to illegal immigrants, a recent Fox News poll echoes the public's point of view: Do it all!

While their party leaders steadfastly resist granting "amnesty" by allowing "illegal immigrants who have jobs in the United States to apply for legal temporaryworker status," voters back the proposal by an overwhelming 63-29 percent. And, despite the posturing of the right wing, Republican voters say yes by 63-30.

Nor are Democrats any more likely to fall in line behind their party's polarizing positions. Asked if they back "using thousands of National Guard troops temporarily to help patrol agents along the Mexican border to stop illegal immigration," voters as a whole answer yes by 63-31, and even Democrats support the idea

by 52-40. And everybody supports increasing the Border Patrol force. Voters as a whole back the addition of thousands of new agents by 79-17, and Democrats go along by 73-22.

So why is our politics so polarized when our voters are not?

The Fox News poll gives us the answer. The American people see illegal immigration as a serious problem and

will solve it. Eighty-six percent say it is a very or somewhat serious problem, and 57 percent call it very serious. Only 13 percent take it more lightly.

Americans - and 63

percent of Republicans - say they would be willing to pay \$100 in extra taxes if they knew that it would all go toward border security.



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## Local war memorial a blessing to all

This article is a big "thank you" to and friends made too. "Thank You" the men and women who made sure

that Pampa has a Veteran's Memorial. One recent night I found myself struggling with an old back problem that had been silent for about nine years, but recently it has flamed back up, making lying down a killer time more agony than sleep. But agony can be a good thing.

Since I couldn't sleep and it was Memorial Day weekend, I decided to once again visit our Veteran's Memorial - not too many visitors after midnight.

As always, I was first drawn to the memorial stone on the north end and to the names inscribed. I just stood there, eyes swollen with tears. Weeping and praying just seemed to be appropriate.

I then sat down on one of the benches and started thinking: 1) of the children who had done without their mom or dad while they were serving our country; 2) of the days and nights that moms and dads had

worried for their son or daughter's safety while they were in the military; and 3) of the spouses who lived "spouseless lives" for longer than they ever wanted.

Then I asked the Lord to bless each one who had made sacrifices.

By this time, it was about 12:45 a.m., and I was ready for sleep. But I left the memorial with the fullness and joy that only thankfulness can give, so the next time you can't sleep or the next time you are reminded of what you owe to the sacrifice of each and every veteran, just drive down to

our Veteran's Memorial. You'll have plenty to pray about and more to be thankful for than you will have time. And when it is time for you to leave, you will have been blessed.

God bless every veteran, and, God, send a special blessing for the men and women who worked diligently to get our Veteran's Memorial built. It is a place of blessing for us all.

### **Church debates reparations**

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) - The Episcopal Church is poised to apologize for failing to oppose slavery, but making up for its 19th century inaction won't come without 21st century controversy.

At its national convention beginning June 13, the church is expected to approve a resolution expressing regret for supporting slavery and segregation. But the debate will likely get more heated when a second resolution comes up, calling for a study of possible reparations for black Episcopalians.

ed over the separate issue of gays' role in the church, is struggling over whether reparations would be a meaningful gesture 141 years after the Civil War ended.

The Rev. Harold Lewis, a black priest and rector at Calvary Episcopal in Pittsburgh, called the idea of reparations outrageous and impractical.

"The better thing to do is to talk about how we can work to eradicate racism and how we can fight to eliminate economic disparities regardless of racism," said Lewis.

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### Nowitzki scorches Suns with 50 points

DALLAS (AP) - Coming off his worst game in months, Dirk Nowitzki wanted to get off to a strong start in Game 5 of the Western Conference finals. So the first two times the Dallas Mavericks had the ball, he took it straight to the basket.

And he missed them both.

Yet Nowitzki wasn't about to be denied not after getting chewed out by his coach, and especially not when he felt a tremendous season was slipping away.

Nowitzki set a franchise playoff record with 50 points, scoring 15 in a row during a fourth-quarter surge that turned a tight game into a rout, sending the Mavericks past the Phoenix Suns 117-101 and putting them within a victory of reaching the NBA Finals for the first time in their 26-year history

"We're watching Dirk grow as a player," said Adrian Griffin, the only player other than Nowitzki who was with the Mays when they made the conference finals three years ago. "He's developed into an extraordinary player.'

The details are even more extraordinary, forming a tale that's instantly part of team lore, one that will grow in significance should they break through the championship round - and especially if they win it all.

Nowitzki scored only 11 points in Game 4 and Dallas lost by 20. So on Wednesday, coach Avery Johnson "let me have it," Nowitzki said, during a film session. He responded with 13 points in the first quarter, helping the Mavericks go up by 14.

Led by 26 points from Tim Thomas, the Suns took a seven-point lead late in the third quarter, with Thomas and Nowitzki exchanging words and technical fouls along the way. Sensing that a 60-win season and a playoff run that included a first-round

sweep and a thrilling seven-game knockout of the reigning champs was in jeopardy, Nowitzki turned to his teammates during a huddle with 3:24 left and said, "Let's go."

Then the big German led the way, scoring seven points during a 10-0 run that helped Dallas take a one-point lead in the fourth quarter. Soon after, Phoenix's Raja Bell let a foul escalate into a technical, and coach Mike D'Antoni got one, too, even shattering a clipboard in anger.

Nowitzki responded by making both free throws - and the rout was on.

The Mavericks went from leading 89-88 to having a 104-93 cushion with 4:59 left. Although Dallas blew a late nine-point lead in the opener, this one held up easily, especially with Nowitzki continuing to throw in baskets.

He reached 50 with a 3-pointer he was so sure was going to fall that he was nearly at halfcourt celebrating when it did. He left to a big ovation with 1:12 left.

The last game, I never really found my rhythm." Nowitzki said. "Today, I just wanted to be aggressive, no matter what happens."

Nowitzki broke his own club postseason scoring record of 46 points (set in the first round in 2003) and matched Kobe Bryant for the most by anyone this postseason. Bryant also did it against Phoenix, but in overtime.

"He played unbelievable," said Suns star Steve Nash, the league's two-time MVP and one of Nowitzki's closest friends from their years together in Dallas. "I didn't feel like he missed very often."

Nowitzki was 14-for-26 from the floor, including 5-of-6 on 3-pointers, and 17-for-18 from the line. He had 12 rebounds and three assists.



tiful river with four branches which watered the garden. Here again is the life-giving river. As the psalmist said, there is a river, the streams whereof as cool, clear water, and by the side of the stream flowing in the midst of the streets of the city is the Tree of Life. The Tree of Life taken from us in the Garden of Eden is restored to us here in heaven.

John continues: "The throne of God and of the Lamb shall be in it: and His servants shall serve."

How many times do you hear people say, "I cannot imagine heaven being interesting. We are just to sit and do nothing."?

There is no estimation of Heaven being such a thing as that. In the Garden of Eden, God said He needed someone to till the ground. When He made man, He placed him in the garden that he might dress it and keep it. Man was to have dominion over things above and things around and things below.

This was a tremendous assignment and responsibility for the first man in the Garden of Eden. There is every indication that Heaven follows the same pattern.

For example, in the parable of the pounds when the Lord blessed the man who had gained 10 pounds, He said, "You shall have authority over ten cities." To the man who had made five pounds, he said, "You shall have authority over five cities." There is vast administration in the future kingdom of God. Nations are mentioned. Governments, responsibilities are described.

Now John speaks of the most climactic and meaningful blessing of all - "and they shall see His face; and His name shall be in their foreheads."


