## Zarqawi was alive when troops arrived at scene

WASHINGTON (AP) — A mortally wounded Abu Musab al-Zarqawi, still alive after a U.S. airstrike on his hideout, mumbled briefly and attempted to "turn away off the stretcher" he had been placed on by Iraqi police, the U.S. military said today.

U.S. officials had said Thursday in announcing the attack that Zarqawi

was dead when U.S. troops arrived on the scene.

Maj. Gen. Bill Caldwell, speaking to reporters at the Pentagon from his post in Baghdad, said he learned after getting briefings Friday that Zarqawi was alive when Iraqi police first arrived on the scene, but he died a short time later.

"We did in fact see him alive,"

Caldwell said. "He mumbled a little something but it was indistinguishable and it was very short."

Caldwell said U.S. forces have conducted many raids over the past two days based on intelligence gathered from the scene of Zarqawi's killing. He displayed several digital photographs taken from the results of one such raid, which found small

arms, ammunition and other items hidden beneath the floor of a building in the Baghdad area.

He said one targeted individual, whom he did not identify, was killed in the latest raids and at least 25 were captured.

Pentagon officials have refused to

## Low income energy assistance available

AUSTIN — The State of Texas has received a supplemental allocation of \$38.2 million in Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) funds from the federal government, significantly increasing the amount of program dollars available to help low income households manage their energy needs as the hot summer months approach. Low income households may be facing critical hardships with a combination of escalating cooling costs and Texas' hot summers.

The Texas Department of

Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) administers LIHEAP funds in Texas. Based on a TDHCA Governing Board decision made at a recent meeting, TDHCA will allocate these funds through existing contracts to agencies providing energy assistance services at the local level in all 254 counties.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) in March announced the supplemental LIHEAP award of \$38.2 million to the

## Applications for emergency farm loans accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for damages and losses caused by wildfire on March 5, 2006 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices at 321 Sully St. in Clarendon and 12125 S. Fredrick in Pampa, Larry Goetze, FSA farm loan manager, said today.

Gray County is one of 8 recently named by the Secretary of Agriculture eligible for loans to cover physical and production losses resulting from the wildfire. Goetze said farmers may be eligible

for loans of up to 100 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue the agriculture business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," Goetze said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to consider proceeds from

those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Jan. 31, 2007, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing, with possible delays into the new farming season," Goetze said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers

who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who meet U.S. citizenship requirements and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizenship requirements are met by individuals holding a majority interest.

The FSA offices are open from 7:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday thru Friday. The Clarendon phone number is 806-874-3561 and the Pampa phone number is 806-665-6561.

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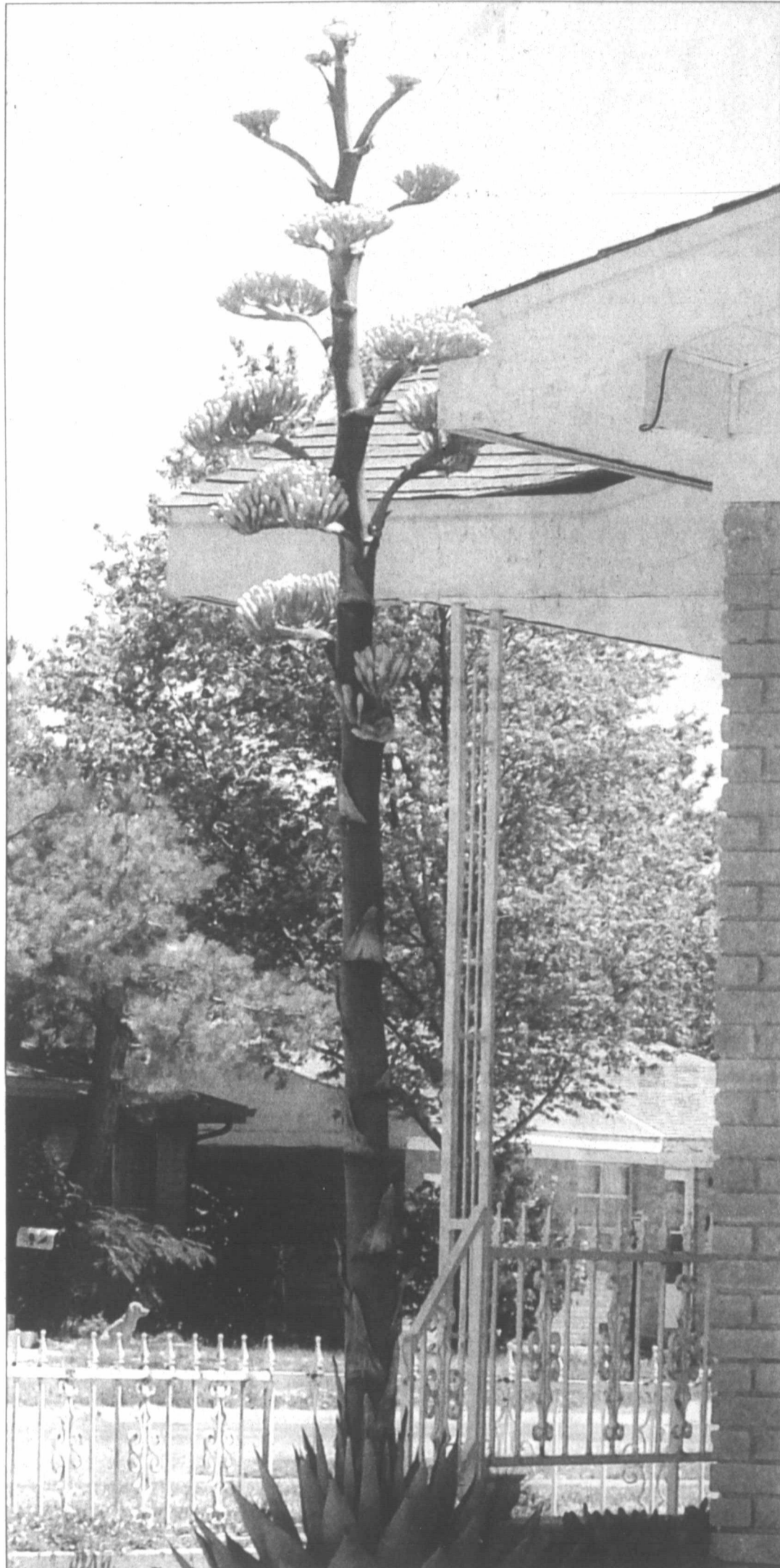

went up 10 cents over last month to \$3.60 to \$4.20 per bushel. Last year's average was \$3.42.

"The price for wheat is very good, but it doesn't do you any good if you can't raise the bushels," said Kendall Hodgson, who farms in Little River in central Kansas.

Hodgson is keeping his

fingers crossed; he expects to start harvesting his wheat next week.

Across all varieties, this year's wheat crop is estimated at 1.81 billion bushels.

For the other major crops — corn, cotton, rice and soybeans — the forecast was unchanged.

The outlook is improving somewhat for the nation's beef, pork and poultry producers, according to the report.

Exports were stronger than expected in the first

three months of the year, and prospects look good for economic growth globally and favorable exchange rates, analysts said. While worries about bird flu have dampened chicken exports to some countries, low prices are encouraging higher exports, according to the report.

Analysts lowered the forecast for beef production, raised the forecast for pork production and left the forecast for poultry production unchanged.

say whether U.S. special operations forces participated in the Zarqawi operation Wednesday, but a comment today by President Bush suggested that some of the military's most secretive units may have been involved on the ground.

Speaking to reporters, Bush mentioned that among the senior officers he called to offer congratulations for killing Zarqawi was Army Lt. Gen. Stanley McChrystal, commander of Joint Special Operations Command, whose forces include the Army's clandestine counterterrorism unit, Delta Force.

Asked whether Zarqawi was shot after U.S. ground troops arrived at the scene of the airstrike, Caldwell said he could not give a definitive answer based on what he had read in the latest official U.S. military report on the event. "I'll go back and specifically ask that," he said. "But no, there was nothing in the report that said he had received any wounds from some kind of weapons system like that."

Zarqawi's safehouse was destroyed by two 500-pound bombs launched from an Air Force F-16 on Wednesday evening.

Caldwell said the U.S. military was still compiling

some details of the event, including the exact amount of time Zarqawi was alive after the attack. He said an initial analysis of Zarqawi's body had been done but he was not certain whether it constituted a full autopsy.

"I know that there was, quote, an autopsy done, but I'll go back and make sure it was performed by the certified kind of person that we're supposed to have so we can call it an autopsy and make sure I'm exactly correct before I tell you that," he said.

In an interview earlier today with Fox News Channel, Caldwell was more descriptive of Zarqawi's actions before he died.

"He was conscious initially, according to the U.S. forces that physically saw him," Caldwell told Fox. "He obviously had some kind of visual recognition of who they were because he attempted to roll off the stretcher, as I am told, and get away, realizing it was U.S. military."

Caldwell indicated that U.S. troops "went into the process to provide medical care to him" before Zarqawi expired. He did not elaborate on the medical assistance. He said U.S. officials are in discussions with Iraqi government officials about the disposition of Zarqawi's body.

The spokesman also provided a revised accounting of the dead. He said the six

people killed in the airstrike included three women. On Thursday U.S. officials had said one woman and one child were among the dead. Caldwell said today the latest information available to him gave no indication that a child was killed.

The U.S. military earlier had displayed images of the battered face of al-Zarqawi and reported that he had been identified by fingerprints, tattoos and scars. Biological samples from his body also were delivered to an FBI crime laboratory in Virginia for DNA testing. The results were expected in three days.

Caldwell said today that authorities made a visual identification of al-Zarqawi upon arriving at the site of the airstrike.

"Zarqawi attempted to sort of turn away off the stretcher, everybody resecured him back onto the stretcher but he died almost immediately thereafter from the wounds he'd received from this airstrike," Caldwell said.

Caldwell said it was unclear whether Zarqawi was trying to get away as he made movement on the stretcher.

"We did in fact see him alive," Caldwell said. "There was some kind of movement he had on the stretcher and he did die shortly thereafter. But yes, it was confirmed by other than the Iraqi police that he was alive initially."

State's 2006 base award of \$44.1 million. Combined with contingency funds totaling more than \$1.5 million, TDHCA has available \$84 million to help low income Texans manage their energy needs during calendar year 2006.

"TDHCA's energy assistance programs help thousands of our state's neediest families, and these additional funds will help even more households cope with increases in home energy costs throughout the summer months," said William Dally, TDHCA Acting Executive Director. "The Department is committed to helping low income households cool their homes and ensure the continued health of our most vulnerable neighbors."

LIHEAP grants help fund two TDHCA programs. The majority of these funds are administered through the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program, a program that helps eligible Texans pay their monthly utility bill and better manage their energy consumption. The Department reserves 15 percent of its LIHEAP allocation for the Weatherization Assistance Program, which helps weatherize the homes of low income families, significantly reducing energy use and utility costs. The Weatherization Assistance Program also receives funding from the US Department of Energy.

Both programs are designed to assist households at or below 125 percent of the federal poverty guidelines. For a family of four living in Texas, this equals an approximate annual income of \$25,000. Client

intake and income verification are performed by the agencies providing energy assistance services at the local level in all 254 counties.

While eligibility is based mainly on income, a priority for service is placed on extremely low income households with the highest energy burden, elderly persons, persons with disabilities, households with very young children, and individuals with health conditions that could be aggravated by extreme heat.

To find the nearest agency administering the Comprehensive Energy Assistance Program, low

income persons should use a land-based (non-cell phone) telephone to call 1-877-399-8939.

For the Weatherization Assistance Program, individuals should call 1-888-606-8889.

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs is Texas' lead agency responsible for affordable housing, community and energy assistance programs, and colonia activities. The Department annually administers funds in excess of \$400 million, the majority of which is derived from mortgage revenue bond financing and refinancing, federal grants, and federal tax credits.

1993 — The Great Blizzard of 1993 strikes the eastern half of the United States, on Oct. 6 Michael Jordan retires from basketball for the first time.

1994 — Nancy Kerrigan is

clubbed on the right leg, lead singer of Nirvana Kurt Cobain is found dead, on June 12 Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman are murdered and O.J. Simpson is later acquitted of the killings.

1995 — April 19 the Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City is bombed, Microsoft releases Windows 95.

1996 — Suspected "Unabomber" Theodore Kaczynski is arrested, Dolly the Sheep is born, the first mammal cloned from an adult cell.

1997 — Tony Blair appointed Prime Minister of

the United Kingdom, Aug. 31 Diana Princess of Wales was killed in an automobile accident.

1998 — The movie Titanic wins 11 Oscars, Apple computer introduces the imac, in August the Monica Lewinsky and Bill Clinton scandal begins to unfold.

1999 — Michael Jordan retires from basketball again, on July 25 Lance Armstrong wins his first Tour de France.

2000 — America On-Line agrees to buy Time Warner for \$162 Billion, in November George W. Bush defeats Al Gore in Presidential election but the final vote is not known for

more than a month because of disputed votes in Florida.

2001 — NASCAR driver Dale Earnhardt is killed in a crash at the Daytona 500, on Nov. 11 almost 3,000 people killed in terrorist attacks on the World Trade Center, the Pentagon, and plane crash in rural Pennsylvania.

2002 — Kmart Corp. becomes largest retailer in American history to file Chapter 11 bankruptcy, on Oct. 16 George Bush signs the Iraq war resolution.

2003 — Space Shuttle Columbia explodes over Texas, Martha Stewart indicted for using privileged investment information, Saddam Hussein is captured by the U.S. 4th Infantry.

2004 — In May 652 million viewers watch final episode of Friends, Lance Armstrong wins 6th consec-

utive Tour de France.

2005 — George W. Bush is inaugurated for his second term as the 43rd U.S. President, Hurricanes Rita and Katrina both hit the Gulf Coast within a month and a half.

2006 — The one-billionth song is purchased from iTunes.

In 1954, during the Senate-Army Hearings, Army special counsel Joseph N. Welch asked Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy: "Have you no sense of decency, sir?"

In 1969, the U.S. Senate confirmed Warren Burger to be the new chief justice of the United States, succeeding Earl Warren.

In 1973, "Secretariat" became horse racing's first Triple Crown winner in 25 years by winning the Belmont Stakes.

In 1978, leaders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints struck down a 148-year-old policy of excluding black men from the Mormon priesthood.

In 1980, comedian Richard Pryor suffered almost fatal burns at his San Fernando Valley, Calif., home when a mixture of "free-base" cocaine exploded.

In 1985, American educator Thomas Sutherland was kidnapped in Lebanon; he was released in November 1991 along with fellow hostage Terry Waite.

In 1986, the Rogers Commission released its report on the Challenger disaster, criticizing NASA and rocket-builder Morton Thiokol for management problems leading to the explosion that claimed the lives of seven astronauts.

Ten years ago: White House Chief of Staff Leon Panetta, appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press," said it was wrong for an investigator to have obtained secret FBI files on 341 people, including prominent Republicans, and President Clinton agreed with Panetta that an apology was called for.

Five years ago: China and the United States announced an agreement on farm subsidies and other remaining issues blocking Beijing's bid to join the World Trade Organization. The Colorado Avalanche won the Stanley Cup by defeating the defending champion New Jersey Devils 3-to-1 in game 7. Jennifer Capriati beat Kim Clijsters 1-6, 6-4, 12-10, to win the French Open. "Point Given" won the Belmont Stakes.



## Demonizing Iran leading up to another war

If we allow the Bush administration to drag this country into a war with Iran, we should all burn our voter-registration cards and go ahead and admit that we are no longer worthy of being citizens of a self-governing republic.

For heaven's sake, the administration is employing the same tactics it used to justify the war against Iraq — refusal to negotiate, lies, disinformation and demonization of the Iranian leader. Are we going to fall for the exact same con job all over again? If so, we are far too dumb to be trusted near a voting booth.

Recently, a story was floated that the Iranians had passed legislation requiring religious minorities to wear an identifying badge. "Nazi, Nazi" cried the neocon warmongers. Trouble is, the

story was completely false. No such legislation was passed, and this bit of disinformation was knocked askew by the representative of Iran's Jewish community in the Iranian Parliament.

The source of the story was an Iranian who had been a big shot when the Shah was in power and is now with a public-relations firm that represents — surprise — many of the neoconservatives.

Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert also told a big whopper when he said Iran was only months away from making a nuclear bomb. No nuclear expert I'm aware of agrees with that assessment,

and Olmert is no nuclear expert. Even assuming Iran wants a bomb, it is years away from being able to produce one.

It's clear that the Bush administration has chosen war. One, it refuses to negotiate with Iran; two, it refuses to recognize Iran's right, as a signer of the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, to enrich uranium for peaceful purposes; three, it has already set up an office in the Pentagon and another in the State Department to agitate for regime change; and four, it has begun its anti-Iranian propaganda campaign.

President Bush is a liar

when he says he wants to use diplomacy to end the crisis. In the first place, he created the crisis; in the second place, he refuses to negotiate; and in the third place, he has, for all practical purposes, issued an ultimatum: Give up your right to enrich uranium, or we'll attack.

No country in the world wants us to attack Iran except Israel. That's no surprise. If the American people haven't figured out that Israel exerts an undue and injurious influence on the American government, then that's another reason for them to tear up their voter-registration cards.

And if driving toward war with Iran isn't bad enough, the Bush administration has restarted the Cold War with Russia by its incessant criticism of Vladimir Putin's

San Antonio Express-News on Capitol Hill corruption:  
In principle, House Speaker Dennis Hastert and Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi have a point.  
In a joint statement, the two leaders called last week for the Justice Department to return files seized from the offices of Rep. William Jefferson of Louisiana.  
The statement reflects bipartisan

indignation brimming over in Congress. The Washington Post notes that the recent raid on Jefferson's office, part of an ongoing corruption probe, marked the first time the FBI has executed a search warrant on the Capitol Hill office of a sitting lawmaker. Members are calling it an unconstitutional breach of the separation of powers.  
While the raid certainly broke long-standing tradition, it's far from clear it was unconstitutional.  
The executive branch should have to pass a very high bar to abrogate a 2-centuries-old accord that safeguards

Congress against intimidation. It's on this principled issue that Hastert and Pelosi make their best argument.  
But this bipartisan defense would be far more compelling if evidence of bipartisan corruption weren't so abundant. And lawmakers would get a more sympathetic ear from the American people if they even remotely attempted to enforce ethics rules on themselves.  
Members of Congress can rail against the Justice Department for violating a constitutional understanding.  
But if principles have been eroded, they have no one to blame but themselves.

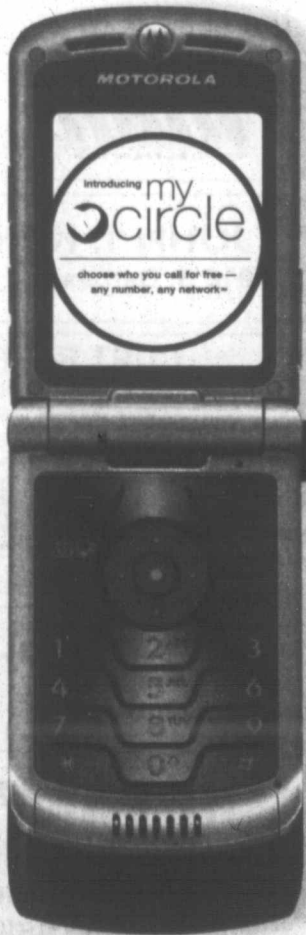

### A voice from out of the past ...

I just heard a voice from out my past that I had not heard from in over 30 years. I thought I'd take a few minutes to share with you the story that goes along with the voice. This article is for every Christian who ever led someone to the Lord, especially for preachers.

Sometimes we wonder if all of our witnessing/preaching has really made any kind of lasting difference. We don't really need to know, but we want to know. Sometimes God grants our wants.

I met Anthony Kenneth Herron in 1972. He attended a revival I was preaching in Bernice, La. Shari and I were the only two white people in the building. I remember being so

scared the first night of the revival, but by the last night I was having a ball preaching Jesus. Anthony attended several nights along with two of his teenage friends. On Friday night, Anthony and his friends gave their lives to Christ and were baptized.

I was actually preaching at a little church there in Bernice, on the weekends with a friend named Larry. We alternated the preaching. That little church was made up of 100 percent white folks. When Larry and I asked to hold a revival and invite the

whole town, the two men in the church said that we could, but not with blacks and whites at the same revival.

They said that they didn't have any problem with it personally, but that the "community sentiment" just wouldn't allow it. (Boy, was I gullible.) So we asked if we could hold two revivals that week. Larry would preach at the church building and I would preach at a rag-tag community center in the "black" section of town.

Being very optimistic at the gospel's power to convert lost souls, we asked those two men, "So what happens on Sunday to those who become Christians at the revival at the community center during the week?" They said, "Oh, it will be fine if they come to church here. We don't have any problem with that." (Boy, I was so very, very gullible!)

We baptized Kenneth and his two friends in the freezing cold water of the baptistry in that little church on Saturday night. By the time we finished our revival service and got over to the church for the baptismal service, their revival meeting was over. I now know that if those two men had known that we were baptizing those three young

## Parents must put a wall between their children and Satan's attacks

When I thought of writing this article, I thought of those who know nothing about me. I am not a national figure. I am and I have been a Christian for more than 73 years and was called by Jesus Christ to preach His gospel 72 years ago.

I hastened up from my knees and began harder and harder to learn to read the Bible. My first pastoral charge was in Hooker, Okla., in the spring of 1936. Fifty years later I retired from pastoral ministry in McLean, where I was called to preach 52 years earlier.

It has never been my intention to quit proclaiming the gospel. I have been answering the call all along. After pastoral retirement, one call took me to Garfield, N.M., for 10 months.

After my first year of ministry, I married a girl, Virginia Mae Conway of Keyes, Okla., a beautiful Christian girl who made me a wonderful wife for just over 60 years when death did us part. We have three wonderful daughters and a wonderful son — all four have beautiful families serving the Lord Jesus Christ.

My Social Security income is small but I

am rich, rich, rich, with those four wonderful families and grandchildren and great-grandchildren around me. No wonder I go through my house with my hands up and

tears of joy falling, rejoicing and praising God for His goodness and mercy to me.

Virginia and I were very, very strict with our children. We knew there were temptations out there that they were apt to yield to if they were not made afraid to do so. We were strict with requiring them to dress modestly and monitored all their activities — to abstain from all appearance of evil.

I never gave Virginia a hug until we were married. How did she know I loved her? I treated her like a lady, and she appreciated it.

Maybe we did not have to be so strict and so fanatical, but we were putting up a wall against attacks of the devil. In the late 1930s and early 1940s, Christians fought compromise harder than most Christians do in 2006.

We saw that hell was real, that the devil was alive and that he was after our children if there was any way he could get them.

## Stars fall as Mavs take Heat in Game 1

DALLAS (AP) — The stars struggled, and then they disappeared. Dirk Nowitzki, Shaquille O'Neal, Dwyane Wade — three of the sport's best couldn't take control in the fourth quarter of the NBA finals' Game 1.

So the Dallas Mavericks climbed aboard their Jet: Jason Terry, with a soaring grace befitting his nickname, found the basket just enough to push his error-prone club past the erratic Miami Heat, 90-80 Thursday night to claim the series opener.

Even Terry was humbled by a missed fourth-quarter layup attempt that he nearly jammed between the backboard and the rim, but he recovered to match his play-off high with 32 points.

"Jason bailed us all out," said Dallas' Jerry Stackhouse, whose wobbly jumper with 1:02 left clinched it.

Both franchises' first appearance on the NBA's biggest stage contained all the jitters and mistakes you might expect. Terry, the point guard who ostensibly replaced Steve Nash two years ago, was the Mavericks' unlikely savior with 20 points in the first half and 12 in the fourth quarter.

"(I don't have) anything to prove," Terry said. "I just feel that I'm a much better shooter than what I've shown in this season's playoffs. With me, it's all about hard work and perseverance. ... I tried to get the big fellow involved and spread it around, but I was there when they needed me."

Game 2 in the best-of-seven series is Sunday night in Dallas, with Game 3 in Miami on Tuesday.

The clubs' finals debut wasn't pretty: The Mavericks went nearly 7 minutes between fourth-quarter field goals, and Dallas held the Heat to two free throws over the final

5:13. With a sellout crowd appreciating the result more than the method, Dallas escaped with a sloppy but satisfying victory — and just 16 points from Nowitzki, their superstar.

"I thought we were a little frozen up," Nowitzki said. "It's a big stage. Nobody has really been here before besides (coach) Avery (Johnson). ... We weren't making shots. We weren't making good plays, not swinging the ball."

Wade finished with 28 points for the Heat, but managed just three in the fourth quarter while feeling the effects of the sinus infection that's bugged him for a week. O'Neal had 17 points and seven rebounds — and the three-time champion went 1-for-9 at the free throw line, leading Miami's abysmal 7-for-19 performance.

"Throughout my career, I've known that for my team to win a championship, I have to step up at the line," O'Neal said. "I will. I was probably thinking about it too much."

Terry was the first Dallas player other than Nowitzki to lead the club in scoring since Game 4 of the second round against the Spurs, when Terry had 32. Though the fans love his energy and all-around game, he was inconsistent in three opening rounds highlighted by a gritty performance in a decisive Game 7 victory over San Antonio.

After Terry hit consecutive 3-pointers, the Mavs had a 10-point lead midway through the fourth quarter. But Terry inexplicably missed that open fast-break layup — and the Heat scored the next seven points while holding Dallas scoreless for 4 1/2 minutes.

"I got a little too excited, was running a little too fast and got ahead of myself," Terry said bashfully.

## Rape allegations a 'crock'

**DURHAM, N.C. (AP)** — A second stripper who performed at a Duke University lacrosse party where a dancer said she was assaulted called the allegations a "crock" in early interviews with police, according to court papers filed by a defense lawyer.

Kim Roberts said the accused was out of her sight for only five minutes. The accused told police she was dragged into a bathroom and raped, beaten and choked for half an hour.

Roberts' statement about the March 13 lacrosse team party was cited in a filing Thursday by lawyers for Reade Seligmann, 20, one of three team members charged in the case.

According to a March 20 statement written by a Durham police investigator, Roberts "stated that she

heard that (the accuser) was sexually assaulted, which she stated is a 'crock' and she stated that she was with her the whole time until she left."

The defense lawyers argue that prosecutors omitted that statement when they got court permission in March to obtain photographs and DNA samples from team members.

District Attorney Mike Nifong's office declined to comment Thursday.

In an April interview with the Associated Press, Roberts said she initially doubted the accuser's story but had changed her mind.

"I was not in the bathroom when it happened, so I can't say a rape occurred — and I never will," Roberts said. But she added, "In all honesty, I think they're guilty."

## O'Neal struggles in Game 1

**DALLAS (AP)** — Shaquille O'Neal handled everything the Dallas Mavericks threw his way. He spun past single defenders for dunks. He found open Miami teammates when double-teams came, setting up easy hoops.

No, O'Neal's biggest problem — as usual — came when no defenders were anywhere near him.

His free throw shooting woes reared up again Thursday night, spoiling his return to the NBA finals. O'Neal missed eight of his nine attempts from the free-throw line in Game 1, a major contributing factor in the Heat's 90-80 loss to the Mavericks.

"I know that if I want my team to win a championship, I have to step up to the line and hit them," O'Neal said. "And I will. I was just thinking about it a little too much. We still had a lot of opportunities to win the game, and on Sunday, look for me to shoot a little bit better."

Really, though, he couldn't shoot much worse.

O'Neal missed his first eight attempts from the line in Game 1, and that doesn't even include two misses nullified by lane violations. He was 8-for-11 from the field, but never really got rolling on the sort of dominant run that he used to carry the Los Angeles Lakers to three straight NBA titles from 2000 through 2002.

"He only got 11 shots," Heat guard Gary Payton said. "He has to shoot more to be productive."

Afterward, O'Neal took the blame.

But his superstar teammate said he shouldn't carry all the burden.

"He did get the ball some, they double-teamed up, but we've got to do a better job of finding him," said Heat guard Dwyane Wade, who had 28 points. "And not only on the set plays, but also when he's going to the basket, getting him the ball. I had opportunities tonight to give it to him myself. ... I think it'll be a focal point going into the next game."

For the second time in their last three playoff games, the Heat were mindbogglingly bad from the foul line. They were 6-for-20 in Game 5 of the Eastern Conference finals at Detroit, a stat that played a key role in a 91-78 defeat that night.

In Game 1 of the finals, Miami struggled nearly as much from the stripe, missing 12 of its 19 tries. Most of those struggles came from O'Neal, of course. Wade was 6-for-10, and everyone else wearing the red Heat road uniforms combined to shoot exactly 0-for-0 from the line.

Dallas, meanwhile, was 20-for-26 from the foul line. And that was the difference.

"We were horrendous from the free throw line," Heat coach Pat Riley said.

How bad was it? The Heat's 36.8-percent success rate from the line was the lowest in NBA finals history, worse than the Chicago Bulls' 41.7 (5-for-12) clip against Utah exactly nine years ago to the day.

By normal standards, a 17-point, seven-rebound, five-assist night would be considered a fine effort. For O'Neal, though, it was largely unsatisfying.

## Federer advances to French Open final

**PARIS (AP)** — Roger Federer overcame a dismal start Friday to earn his first berth in a French Open final, leaving him one win shy of his fourth consecutive Grand Slam title.

Down one set and 3-0 in the second, the top-ranked Federer rallied and led 3-6, 6-4, 5-2 when David Nalbandian retired with an injured abdominal muscle.

The No. 3-seeded Nalbandian called for a trainer trailing 2-1 in the third set, again received treatment at 3-2 and quit after playing two more games. It was the first retirement in the men's semifinals at Roland Garros in the Open era.

"I really thought I was going to lose that match," Federer said. "I was fortunate, for I was not doing too well."

Federer's opponent will be the winner of the second semifinal between defending champion Rafael Nadal and Ivan Ljubicic.

If Federer wins the title, he would become only the third man to hold all four Grand Slam titles at the same time, joining Don Budge and Rod Laver. He would also become the sixth man to achieve a career Slam by winning all four majors.

Justine Henin-Hardenne will bid for her third Roland Garros title Saturday against Svetlana Kuznetsova, who will play in her first Grand Slam final since winning the 2004 U.S. Open.

By beating Nalbandian, Federer extended his Grand Slam winning streak to 27 matches.

es. He has reached the final in his past 14 tournaments, second during the Open era only to Ivan Lendl's 18 straight in 1981.

But his latest victory didn't come easily.

On another day fit for a Paris postcard — sunny and 80 degrees — much of the crowd was late to show up. Federer was, too, losing three of his first six service games while Nalbandian served well, held easily and won five consecutive games for a 3-0 lead in the second set.

Federer was late to reach shots and erratic with his forehand, the game's best. Sensing an upset, Nalbandian's fans chanted and waved Argentine flags.

Then came the abrupt turnaround. Nalbandian lost serve at love, double-faulting on break point, and Federer began to crack winners, his mood improved.

"C'mon!" he shouted for the first time after forcing a Nalbandian error.

"David played a great first set and a half," Federer said. "But then I started to hit some fabulous shots, and it gave me confidence."

Federer won five consecutive games for 5-3, then served out the set easily to even the match. He broke again to start the third set and didn't face a break point in his final seven service games.

The seventh game of the second set typified the erratic match. Federer hit the shot of the tournament, retreating for a lob, back to the net, then spinning to hit a forehand winner at shoelace level.

## McNair dubbed starting QB

**OWINGS MILLS, Md. (AP)** — Steve McNair was introduced as the Baltimore Ravens' starting quarterback, one day after he was acquired from the Tennessee Titans.

Last year's starter, Kyle Boller, immediately dropped to No. 2 on the depth chart after McNair passed his physical.

The transaction ended a lengthy odyssey

for McNair, who had negotiated a five-year deal with Baltimore on April 30 but had to wait five weeks to be traded.

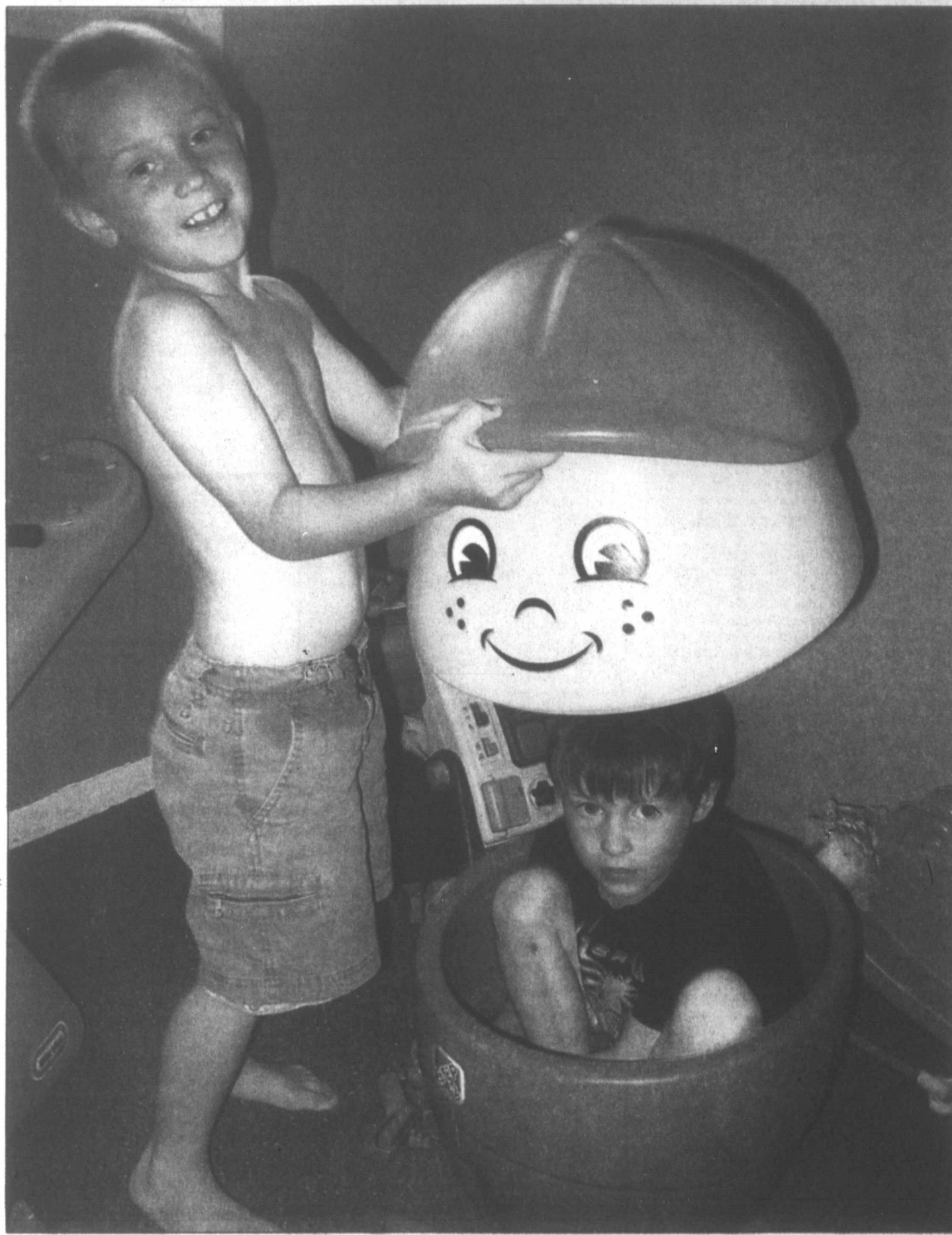

I can still remember having to look Kenneth and his friends in the eye and tell them that the Lord loved them, but that the people at this church didn't. The church basically fired Larry and me.

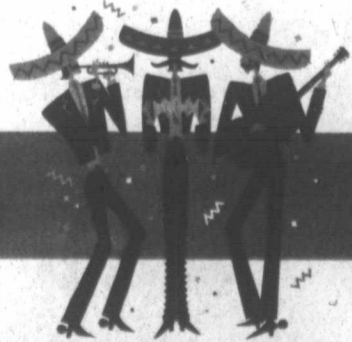

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## Halliburton protester acquitted

DUNCAN, Okla. (AP) — A Tulsa woman who protested outside Halliburton's shareholders meeting last month was acquitted Thursday of violating a city protest permit.

Municipal Judge Carl Lamar said he could not find cause to convict Joni LeViness, 45, within the section of the municipal code under which she was charged. However, Lamar said police acted responsibly and correctly in arresting LeViness after she left a des-

ignated protest area.

"I think she could have been charged with the crime of trespassing or disrupting a police officer when they told her to step back," Lamar said. "I cannot find that (LeViness) violated this ordinance."

Fifteen others who were arrested outside the meeting pleaded guilty or no contest and paid an \$89 fine. The Houston-based military contractor was founded in Duncan.
