## Mosquito fish put to work

NEW ORLEANS (AP) - In a large Board, as he sprinkled flakes of fish food aboveground pool here, entomologists are breeding front-line mosquito fighters. gling in the brown water, these fighters are ging in the brown water, these fighters are
being raised to be deployed to thousands of festering, flooded-out pools, ponds and hot tubs abandoned in New Orleans and the Gulf Coast since Hurricane Katrina
Their mission: devour mosquito larvae and, potentially, prevent the spread of diseases sometimes deadly West Nile virus. In the the sometimes deady west Nile virus. In the
process, they'll help minimize one of this region's most annoying summer pests. "They're incredible, little fish," said Greg Thompson, a research entomologist for the
New Orleans Mosquito and Termite Control

states, most of them probably illegal immigrants trying to get work. The federal government took years to discover the number was being used illegally, but authori-
ties took little action even then. "They knew what was happe ing but wouldn't do anything," said Schmierer, 33, a housewife in this affluent San Francisco suburb, "One name, one number, why can't they just match it up?" increasingly common prob an Many thieves are able to steal personal information because employers do not have to verify Social Security numbers or other

The situation has long drawn fire from anti-illegal immigration groups, but Congress has only
