Water groups OK recharge study

PLAINVIEW -- Kent Satterwhite has the blessing of the Panhandle and Llano Estacado Regional Water Planning Groups to begin work on a recharge study along the Canadian River Breaks.

Satterwhite, general manager of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, told the two regional water planning groups in a joint meeting here Tuesday that CRMWA wants to study water recharge to the Ogallala Aquifer in Roberts County.

He said CRMWA would fund the study with help from the Texas Water Development Board, but he asked for support from the two water planning groups since CRMWA supplies the water for about two-thirds of the population in the two planning areas.

CRMWA provides water through a 324-mile long aqueduct to 11 member cities, including Pampa. Initially, the water came only

on the Canadian River. In 2001, the water authority began pumping groundwater from the Ogallala Aquifer in Roberts County.

Satterwhite said it's a good thing CRMWA developed the well field when it did. Extended drought has caused the water in Lake Meredith to drop to precipitous levels. As of Tuesday, the water level stood at 55.67 feet, a record low.

"Each day is a record low," Satterwhite said.

With a drop in the lake level, the groundwater well field becomes more important.

"We started production in the well field in 2001 and at that time we had about 42,000 acres of water rights," Satterwhite said. "Recharge wasn't too huge of an issue when we had that kind of acreage."

Today, CRMWA owns/or has contracted for about 300,000 acres of water rights in the Roberts County area.

"Now, recharge is starting to become an issue for us,' Satterwhite said.

Final hazardous tree removal proposal Thursday

Department Texas of Transportation will present its final proposal concerning tree removal in five counties at a public hearing at 6:30 p.m. Thursday in the M.K. Brown room of the Pampa Community Building, 200 N. Ballard.

A briefing will be held from 6 to 6:30 p.m., during which time the summary of the project will be presented and public discussion will be heard. Verbal and written comments

will be recorded at the public hearing which begins at 6:30 p.m. The comments will be addressed in writing at the end of the hearing.

TxDOT has targeted 93 trees for removal in its Hazard Elimination Safety Project, down from the 115 last proposed at its June 27, 2005 meeting in Pampa.

The number of trees in each county currently under the saw blade are Gray County, 31; Hemphill County, 52, a decrease of six; Lipscomb County, seven; Ochiltree County, zero, a decrease of 16; and Roberts

County, three.

"Please remember that the tree removal part of the plan is only part of the entire overall project. We will also be improving the grades on some slopes, lowering speed limits in some areas, and putting protective bars over culvert openings," said Paul F. Braun, public information officer for TxDOT's Amarillo District office.

TxDOT had originally planned on cutting down 1,185 trees in the five counties. The 93 trees currently targeted are along 147 miles of

Highways 60 and 83 within those counties.

The current removal plan involves, with one exception, only trees within 70 mph speed zones, and only those trees which are within 30 feet of the nearest lane line. The one exception is a tree just east of Pampa near Red River Dairy on Highway 60. That tree is in a speed zone lower than 70 mph.

The plan was first unveiled by Kenneth Corse, a TxDOT engineer

Waco City Council approves resolution decrying lynchings

WACO (AP) — The City nity of broad citizen participa-Council has approved a resolution condemning lynchings and the "mob mentality" that led to them in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

"We are appalled and grieved by heinous lynchings and other forms of violence that created a culture of fear and injustice," the council said in a resolution read Tuesday by Mayor Virginia DuPuy. "We recognize that past mob actions hurt our city in ways far beyond the brutal murders, as they deprived our commution and created a stigma that we strive to overcome."

The action came a month after the Community Race Relations Coalition asked the city and county to adopt a resolution apologizing for the lynchings, saying it was necessary for the community to heal

But some locals said leaders and residents should not apologize for something that happened before they were born.

Although the city wrote its

own resolution without the word "apologize," the coalition praised it, saying the council carefully considered what it said. Coalition member Jo Welter said the resolution "very much uses the language of reconciliation."

"The goal is to make sure each person in the community feels valued and loved," she said

The resolution did not mention specifically the 1916 lynching of Jesse Washington, a black 17-year-old who was cut and burned while hanging from a tree after a jury convicted him of killing a white woman. Some 15,000 people

COP CORNER

I thought this would be a good time to talk about Municipal Court Warrants. I do this because the officers are stepping up traffic enforcement especially on seat belt violations. I wanted to let everyone know the procedure the Municipal Court uses when a warrant is issued.

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Of course, the procedure begins when someone is issued a citation. The officer writes the citation and, while it is being signed, tells the violator that he or she is actually signing a "promise to appear," not an admission of guilt. In our judicial system everyone is presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law.

The promise to appear gives the violator 12 days in which to contact the court. Not contacting the court starts the second step in the procedure. At the end of the 12 days, the court sends the violator a letter, to the address on the citation, asking the violator to come in.

The letter will also say that at the end of another 12 days a warrant will be issued. This will be the only notification a violator will get concerning the issuance of a warrant. The court usually issues warrants on Thursday of each week.

When the next Thursday, following your second 12 days, rolls around the warrant is issued. The actual warrant is then given to

Pampa Central Dispatch. Law enforcement can then check for warrants through dispatch. Dispatch will not give out this information to people that call in.

There is a silver lining to the warrant process. Even if you have a warrant and come to the court, then the court will usually take your plea on the citation and work out the terms of the plea. Even though there is a silver lining in this cloud, some thunder and lightning lingers.

Once a warrant is issued for the original charge, a "Fail to Appear" warrant is added to it. This FTA warrant amount is about \$341.00. That is a hefty sum for anyone.

The main point of this week's Cop Corner is the court really doesn't like to issue arrest warrants and generally works with a violator to bring closure to a citation, but it's up to the violator to start the process.

Flames approached the canyon's two-lane highway in places during the night but crews were able to light

CRMWA's projections.

There has been talk of adding a second pipeline and selling water to as many as 42 other cities on the South Plains. If that happens, CRMWA may need to expand its supply of water.

Recharge could be critical to what has become known at CRMWA II, the additional proposed pipeline.

The problem, Satterwhite said, is that there is no information available on recharge in the region where CRMWA has its water rights.

"There's a lot of unknowns about all this," Satterwhite said. "There really hasn't been any studies done on the Ogallala recharge in the Canadian River breaks area."

He said there's a lot of good sandy soil in there. Research needs to be done, he said, to figure out how much water CRMWA needs and how much it has.

"We think we have about 15 million acre-feet of water in place," Satterwhite said.

The recharge could be a huge part of that, he added. "We just think it's critical

to learn more about that," Satterwhite said.

Division of NAMI, is a non-profit organization that offers support and education to those who are affected by mental illness.

Reasons for the negative reactions to the proposed tree removal include damage to wildlife and bird habitats, the fact that some of the trees are part of a national historic site, adverse effects on tourism including the annual fall foliage festival in Canadian, and aesthetic reasons.

TxDOT's reason for plans to cut down the 93 trees is safety of motorists.



Viewpoints Texans share their thoughts on foreign affairs

A distinguishing trait of Texans is our determination. We do not shy away from our responsibilities, and we are resolute in the face of challenges. My recent Listening Post survey concerning our country's foreign affairs agenda revealed as much. A comment indicative of the overall response said, "Freedom should not just be limited to the **U.S.**"

Texans support our effort to help bring freedom to Iraq. Most agree that our presence there is critical to the long-term security of the United States and are against the notion of withdrawing our troops now

One constituent wrote, "A free and democratic Iraq is essential now more than ever since we have a huge threat from Iran." Another said, "We have planted the seeds not only of democracy but of

the people."

Some support our mission without approving of military action. "I do not like the fact that our military is in a foreign country fighting and dying." Another said, "I do not support the decision or the reasoning for our commitment."

Many comments indicated a preference to have military leaders, not elected officials, determine when our troops should start coming home. A sampling of these comments include: "Let our generals decide on when the job is done so we can withdraw our troops," and, "Those with the intelligence should decide when we withdraw."

Texans are concerned with the threat of a violent civil war in Iraq following any withdrawal of our troops. Sixty-four percent of respondents agree that a free, dem-

morality, justice and freedom for ocratic Iraq is essential to longterm stability in the Middle East. "Similar to the way our presence in West Germany after World War II kept the USSR in check, I believe our presence in Iraq will deter further terrorist regimes in the Middle East."

The notion of standing up as the Iragis stand down was supported overwhelmingly by readers. One person said, "I am glad our President took the mad man [Saddam Hussein] down. The Iraq people are and will be better off." Iraq is not the only hotspot that

monitoring. Many constituents think that our country should be especially concerned with North Korea's nuclear weapons program, Iran's nuclear ambitions, and the pace of China's increasing economic and military strength. One stressed, "Being concerned should not be confused with forcing our will on other peoples and with trying to undermine the progress of other countries."

Texans agree that international trade boosts our economy by expanding access for American companies to overseas markets and promoting peaceful relations with foreign countries, but there was some disagreement on how to best promote it. While 52 percent of respondents support regulating international trade with tariffs to ensure our overseas competition

Texans feel our country should be observes the same health and labor laws that we do, 47 percent believe that international trade is most successful when the free market is left alone.

There are also conflicting opinions on how to best prevent the spread of weapons of mass destruction (WMDs) and their delivery systems. Seventy percent of respondents agree that prevention is best addressed by building international consensus on WMD proliferation through diplomacy, while 64 percent think that prevention is dependent upon our willingness to use military force, when necessary.

Thank you for all of your thoughtful responses, and I will soon provide another Capitol Comment, responding to' my Listening Post concerning immigration.

In 1982, a jury in Washington, D.C., found John Hinckley Jr. innocent by reason of insanity in the shootings of President Reagan and three other men.

In 1985, scientists announced that skeletal remains exhumed in Brazil were those of Nazi war criminal Josef Mengele.

In 2004, the SpaceShipOne rocket plane punched through Earth's atmosphere, then glided to a landing in California's Mojave Desert in the first privately financed manned spaceflight.

Ten years ago: European leaders agreed to gradually lift a global ban on British beef exports imposed nearly three months earlier following a scare over "mad cow" disease. Pentagon officials said American troops destroyed an Iraqi ammunition depot in March 1991 that may have contained chemical weapons.

Five years ago: A federal grand jury in Alexandria, Va., indicted 13 Saudis and a Lebanese in the 1996 bombing of the Khobar Towers in Saudi Arabia that killed 19 American servicemen.

sweepstakes is gradually becoming clearer through the fog of war. There is a surprising and artful symmetry in how each party's contest is shaping up.

In the Republican primaries, McCain runs far ahead of all other contenders. But the specter of Rudy Giuliani hangs over the nominating process. If Rudy runs, his challenge will most directly affect McCain, who then would have to battle for the moderate side of the party. But if Rudy stays out, the contest will polarize around the Arizona senator.

But since McCain is on the left of the GOP - despite his efforts to court the right - he will inevitably face a runoff in the primaries against the great right hope, a title for which Virginia Sen. George Allen, Massachusetts Gov. Mitt

The problem is that McCain probably can't win the Republican nomination. He is too independent, original, creative and populist for his party. A party that prides itself on regularity and corporate grayness won't take a chance on a maverick who led the fight for tough corporate governance, against big tobacco, for campaign-finance reform, against CIA torture and for tough environmental regulation. So the challenger who emerges from the rightwing miniprimary will probably be the

nominee.

winning the general election by backing the war before she got the nomination, which will be decided by anti-war Democratic primary voters. Her error opens the door for Al Gore, the figure who is the equivalent of Giuliani's looming presence over the Republican primary.

If Gore runs, it will be a dogfight to the end between these two veterans of the Clinton administration.

If Gore runs, there is no room for anybody else. If Gore doesn't go for it, Sen. John Kerry and former Sen. John Edwards will assert their claims, but I think they will be easily pushed aside by Hillary. Both backed the war and are seen as losers in the wake of 2004's disaster.

As to the election, whoever wins the Democratic nomination in 2008 will get elected president unless:

(A) Either McCain, Giuliani or - my old favorite - Condoleezza Rice gets the GOP nomination, or

(B) McCain runs as an independent, a race he could win, thereby reshaping American politics forever.

Heat arrive home with trophy

MIAMI (AP) - After an 18-year pur-suit, the Miami Heat have finally brought the NBA championship trophy to South Florida.

The newly crowned world champi-ons arrived home shortly before 7 this morning. Fans gave huge cheers and pressed up against a chain link fence as the players' plane taxied along the runway at Miami International Airport. Fire trucks shot streams of water over the aircraft

Shaquille O'Neal hoisted the golden trophy with one hand and then cradled it as he walked off the plane, smiling and waving to fans. Most likely remember the promise he made them when he first arrived in Miami two years ago that he would bring a championship to South Florida. Coach Pat Riley said the team drank

22 bottles of the high-end Cristal champagne on the flight: "We're not sleeping. We'll sleep in the summertime

"I'm running on fumes right now.

I'm so excited," said center Alonzo Mourning, who has played through 13 seasons, two retirements and a serious kidney ailment for a championship.

The Heat then went to a waiting fleet of limousines and the team left about an hour after landing. Police said the overnight festivities throughout the area had remained peaceful.

Only hours earlier, the Heat beat the Dallas Mavericks 95-92 in Game 6 of the NBA finals. Miami won the series 4-2, claiming the first title in franchise history

Dwyane Wade had 36 points in the title-clinching victory, one that made O'Neal a four-time world champion and gave Pat Riley his fifth ring as a head coach. Afterward, they celebrated in their locker room, spraying cham-pagne in every direction, then moved the festivities to a Dallas hotel before flying home.

And now, the real parties begin: city officials say a victory parade is tenta-tively scheduled for Thursday after-

"Thank you for your support, your patience," a champagne-soaked Mourning shouted when asked if he had a message to fans as he stood in the middle of the locker room party in Dallas. "We love you all, and without you, we wouldn't have gotten it done, baby

The Heat became the third team in NBA history to win the championship after losing the first two games of the final series. And they could not wait to get home afterward.

"Get ready, Miami," Heat guard Gary Payton said before the team left

Dallas, a broad smile on his face. Francisco Sarazia, a 34-year-old Miami biology teacher, started his celebration at AmericanAirlines Arena, where he watched a live broadcast of the game with more than 10,000 other fans. He ran outside the arena after the game to exchange high-fives with people in passing cars, then made his way to the airport to await the team.

Larsson salvages draw and keeps up unbeaten streak against England

COLOGNE, Germany (AP) -Henrik Larsson showed the patience of a true striker who has been scoring goals for years. He waited until his country desperately needed him and then got a single stud to the ball to

steer it into the goal. Larsson's 90th-minute goal salvaged a 2-2 draw for Sweden against England in their Group B finale Tuesday night. The tie stretched Sweden's streak to 12 games _ four wins and eight draws _ without a loss to England since 1968.

It also pushed the Swedes into the second round, where they will play Germany on Saturday in Munich.

"Germany will be a very tough match," Larsson said. "But at the same time, they will be the favorites. Hopefully it will suit us."

The English won the group and face Ecuador on Sunday in Stuttgart.

Larsson played two games against Trinidad and Tobago and Paraguay, and almost 90 minutes against England, without scoring. But he was never worried.

"I knew my chances would come," he said. "If you're lucky you will score. I was tonight. The ball touched a front stud of my right shoe. But those goals also count. It's always nice to score and keep the streak alive.

Larsson scored from a throw-in, getng the slightest of touches to deflect the ball into the net. It was his 36th goal in 92 appearances for Sweden.
