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Praise, protest greet hearing on hazardous trees

Comments ranged from praise to protest Thursday evening as about two dozen area residents and Texas Department of Transportation representatives met in the M.K. Brown Room of Pampa Community Building to discuss the final proposal for TxDOT's Hazard Elimination Safety Project.

The main bone of contention, as it has been since the project was first announced, is the removal of a number of trees from along 147 miles of Highways 60 and 83 in Gray, Hemphill, Lipscomb, Ochiltree and Roberts counties.

Mark Tomlinson, district engineer from TxDOT's Amarillo office, reviewed the history of the project, from its unveiling in May 2004 to the current version of the plan, which also includes lowering speed limits in some areas, improving the grades on some slopes, upgrading guardrails and putting protective bars over culvert openings

Tomlinson also focused on the tree removal portion of the current project, while Kenneth Corse, area TxDOT

engineer for Pampa, explained plans for culverts, slopes, curb and gutter work, and guardrails.


The original plan of felling 1,185 trees has been trimmed to removal of 93 trees, composed of 20 in Gray County, 47 in Hemphill, seven in Lipscomb, 16 in Ochiltree and three in Roberts. The numbers of trees per county provided Thursday evening were a correction from the totals previously reported to The Pampa News by Paul F. Braun, public information offi-

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Business Expo offers

'Killer Bees' found in area

AMARILLO - Bees confirmed as the Africanized strain have been found in the Panhandle, prompting a word of caution from a Texas Cooperative Extension specialist

Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension entomologist in Amarillo, said this summer he has received two to three samples of bees a week to send for testing, compared to two to three a month in the past.

"We just need people to understand we have them (Africanized honey bees) in the area, and there will be bees throughout the Panhandle that act a little more aggressively than they have in the past," he said.

The first confirmed case was collected

Jan. 30 in Armstrong County, Patrick said. Since then, bees from Amarillo in Randall County were collected and tested positive on April 19, May 16 and June 1.

"We knew they had moved as far north as Swisher County in the past years, but this is the first year they've been found this far north," he said. "We haven't received anything from the northern Panhandle, but we have to assume they run throughout the area now."

Distinguishing between native honey bees and the Africanized strain cannot be done visually, Patrick said. All bees must be sent to the Texas Honey Bee Identification Lab in College Station to be confirmed through



Pampa potter selected for award

Staff Writer A Pampa potter whose work was chosen as one of just over 100 pieces nationwide to be exhibited at an annual competition earned the People's Choice award with her entry.

Linda Nowell's stoneware bowl, "Winter's Sting," sold after the awards were announced at the recent 16th San Angelo National Ceramic Competition.

"The San Angelo Museum of Fine Arts put out an invitation for entries. You could submit three slides of your work," Nowell said.

She created the winning entry in her backyard studio by shaping it on a potter's wheel, carving the openwork design, firing the piece, glazing and staining it, followed by a final firing.

"Winter's Sting" was one of the approximately 100 pieces selected from more than 1,000 entries submitted for the exhibition.

The San Angelo award was not Nowell's first for her ceramic works. She won first place last year at the Oklahoma City Arts Festival, first place at an Austin show, second place at a show in Miami, and two third places at

Amarillo events.

Nowell will mark her seventh year as a potter in September. She started out by buying a potter's wheel, and then searching for someone to teach her how to use it.

"A woman and I were visiting, and I heard a local potter here had moved to New Mexico. I though Pampa needed a potter. I went and bought a wheel, and it never occurred to me that there was no one to teach me how to use it," she said.

Tree removal is not a new or localized practice for TxDOT, Tomlinson said.

"Practically every district in the state is using ongoing tree removal, using the same parameters. We are using practically the same standards as are used nationwide," he said.

The price tag for the entire hazard elimination safety project is \$4,111,128. Included in that total is \$72,600 for earthwork, curb and gutter work. \$610,020 for guard rails and \$48,360 for tree removal.



A powerful offshore earthquake shook southern Peru, killing at least 100 people. Yvonne Dionne, one of three remaining Dionne quintuplets, died at age 67.



San Antonio Express-News on Internet neutrality:

The Internet has managed to thrive with a minimum of interference and regulation by the government. What began as a decentralized communications network for the military during the Cold War has become a critical medium for the exchange of ideas, goods and services.

Private ingenuity and the demands of the marketplace are the primary forces behind the growth and innovation of the Internet. Now some members of Congress want to put a brake on those

forces by invoking the well-intentioned but misguided notion of Net neutrality.

The basic principle behind Net neutrality is that Internet users should be able to access the Web content of their choice without restriction from their Internet service providers. A broad alliance of interest groups supports this reasonable-sounding concept.

But an extension of that principle would cripple Internet innovation. As Web content has become more graphic and video intensive, the amount of bandwidth it consumes the volume of data flowing through the pipes that make up the Internet has grown tremendously.

To keep up with demands for bandwidth and to support the growth and innovation of the Internet, service

providers that build and maintain its infrastructure companies like Verizon and San Antonio-based AT&T that own the pipes make major capital investments. To pay for them, service providers want to offer tiered service to content providers.

For Verizon and AT&T, that means allowing the owners of high-bandwidth Web sites Yahoo, Google and Amazon.com, for instance to purchase premium service for the fastest delivery of their content. For advocates of Net neutrality, that amounts to discrimination and creates the potential that service providers will limit or altogether block access to sites that don't pay for premium service.

AAA: Texas gas prices fall after rising for two weeks

HOUSTON (AP) -Texas motorists are getting a little relief from rising retail Christi, where they fell gasoline prices this week, according to the weekly AAA Texas gas price survey released Friday.

The new survey found the average price of regular, self-serve gasoline at Texas pumps fell 4 cents per gallon this week to \$2.78. The national average fell 5 cents per gallon to \$2.85.

Pump prices could fall further if crude oil prices remain below 70 dollars a barrel, auto club spokeswoman Rose Rougeau said. "Oil prices have been trading below \$70 for the last several days, although closing prices have occasionally been above \$70," she said.

The most expensive average pump prices were in the Galveston-Texas City area at \$2.90 per gallon, down 3

cents from last week. The cheapest gas was in Corpus almost 13 cents to \$2.53 per gallon.



Killgo crushes grand slam to help lead Cabot Corp. past DFB for city title

Pereira would give way to Shelby Carpenter and Cody McIntyre before returning late.


The two teams kept things close and exciting through four innings, DFB hanging on to a narrow 5-4 lead.

showed his age. Francisco Liriano showed his stuff.

In The Rocket's return to the majors, the Minnesota rookie ace looked more like the Clemens of old, striking out seven in eight strong innings to lead the Twins to a 4-2 victory over the Houston Astros on Thursday night.

"You take a lot of memories away from a game like this," the 22-year-old Liriano said. "You maybe will not ever be on the field with him again."

Liriano, 7 months old when Clemens started his big league career, improved to 7-1, allowing his only runs on Jason Lane's two-run homer in the seventh.

With a Minute Maid Park-record 43,769 fans on hand to see the 43-year-old Clemens, the seven-time Cy Young winner threw 100 pitches in five innings in his first start since leaving Game 1 of the World Series eight months ago with a strained hamstring.

He allowed two runs on six hits and had four strikeouts and two walks. He also made an error, struck out in his only at-bat and hustled to first to complete a double play.

"It was positive," Clemens said. "My body felt better than expected and I hope. and expect to get stronger each time I get out there."

Clemens got a standing ovation as he walked from the dugout to the bullpen 20 minutes before the game. As he warmed up, a fan held up a fluorescent sign that read: "Clemens is Proof the 40s is the new 30s." Another fan wearing a helmet and a bright orange spacesuit had one that said, "That's a Roger, Houston, Our Rocket Has Landed.'

Cameras flashed in every corner of the park as Clemens fired his first pitch, a 91mph strike, to Luis Castillo.

"When I walked out, it was great," Clemens said. "After I came out of the game, I was hearing the numbers and the record crowd and the people turning out. It was very gratifying that they appreciate your hard work and that they're out here to support us."

On a 1-2 count, Castillo bounced a ball

HOUSTON (AP) - Roger Clemens back to Clemens, who dropped the ball and couldn't scoop it up before Castillo reached first base safely. Clemens was charged with an error.

> The next batter grounded into a double play before Joe Mauer, who leads the majors in hitting, struck out.

> Clemens (0-1) glided through the first inning in 12 pitches, nine of them strikes.

> "I was really excited about how my legs felt in my warmup session," he said. "I knew I was going to be fairly crisp."

> Astros manager Phil Garner said Clemens would throw "around 100 pitches" in the game and he was more than halfway there after a withering third inning.

> He gave up an RBI double to Jason Kubel and a run-scoring single to Michael Cuddyer, finally ending the 38-pitch inning by striking out Torii Hunter.

> "I had that one long inning and I was trying to make a point to work fast and see how winded I could get and it worked out fine," Clemens said. "I really didn't feel like I was sitting on my back leg or collapsing. Overall, it was just good to get back out there."

> In the fifth, Clemens lumbered over to cover first base on a 3-6-1 double play. He pointed at the umpire to make sure he got the call before slowly retreating to the mound.

> Russ Springer relieved Clemens to open the sixth and the Twins extended their lead to 3-0 on Justin Morneau's homer.

> Garner said Clemens may have rushed his return, but Clemens insisted he's ready for the grind of the remaining season.

> "I'm excited about it, but I know the work that's involved," Clemens said. "I've got a lot of work in front of me. It's going to be a huge challenge.

Picking up a trend from last year, the Astros failed to give Clemens much run support. The Rocket was 13-8 with a career-best 1.87 ERA in 32 starts last season, but Houston was shut out in nine of his starts and scored three runs or fewer in 20 of them.

This time, it was mostly due to the lefthanded Liriano, who baffled the Astros with a slider that made Clemens look bad when he struck out in the third.
