During Roadcheck 2006 which ran from June 6

2001 when she faces Olga Savchuk. Roger Federer will have to work hard from the start to earn a fourth consecutive Wimbledon title. Seeded No. 1, Federer faces a grass-court rematch against Richard Gasquet in the first round Monday, and four-time
Wimbledon semifinalist Henman looms as a potential second-round opponent.
Federer Federer edged Gasquet in the sec-
ond round last week at Halle,
