Exhibition on killing buffalo a little too much for spectators

When Fred Gipson's family went to an old-settlers reunion and

fair at Katemcy to see the aging
Herman Lehmann Herman Lehmann put on a one-
man exhibition, the Mason County youngster got a taste of the old west far more realistic than any-
thing he ever saw in a Tom Mix thing he ever saw
movie.
Captured by the Apaches at Lehmann spent more than eight
years with the Indians, finally reuniting with his family in Texas in the spring of 1878. As he grew
older, Lehmann became a Hill Country celebrity, periodically
earning a little money for staging. performances that amounted to one-man Wild West shows.

Katemcy, a good-sized crowd had gathered near the schoolhouse in an open field bounded on one side
Lehmann demonstrate how he once

## New test could help answer questions about Alzheimer's disease

By RANDOLPH E. SCHMID AP Science Writer lest may help scientists -answer perplexing "which came first" question about the development of Alzheimer's disease, possibly
pointing the way to earlier diagnosis or even treatment.
Brain deposits of a small protein known as amyloid beta long have been associated with Alzheimer's. But scientists have been unable to
determine whether the determine whether the body begins producing too much of the protein
or loses the ability to clear it away Now, a research team led by Dr Randall J. Bateman at Washington

University in St. Louis is poised to the first time can monitor the proAn in
tein. nique initial test of the new technique on six healthy volunteer determined that the protein is quickly produced and quickly
cleared; keeping it in balance in the central nervous system, the researchers report in Monday's online issue of the journal Nature Medicine.
Indeed, it turned out that the proein, also known as Abeta, is proured before, Bateman said in a statement.

That was unexpected. Because the brain-wasting disease takes so long to develop, many experts had assumed that the production
