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
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# Roach pleads guilty, sentenced to 18 years

PAMPA -- A year after being sentenced to five years in federal prison on a weapons charges, a former Texas Panhandle District Attorney was sentenced to 18 years in a Texas prison on state drug charges.

Richard James "Rick" Roach, 57, pled guilty Monday to possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamines, and was sentenced by State District Judge Bill Smith to 18 years in a Texas prison to run concurrently with his federal sentence.

Smith, 84th District Judge, was appointed to the case after 31st District Judge Steven Emmert recused himself last year.

Roach was arrested Jan. 11, 2005, as he entered the district courtroom in the Gray County Courthouse by Federal Bureau of Investigation agents on a charge of possession of methamphetamine.

As a result of a plea bargain, Roach was sentenced to five years in federal prison on


federal weapons charges and three years of supervised release. Federal drug charges were dropped.

Roach was indicted May 17, 2005, by a Gray County grand jury on state charges of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver, a first class felony punishable by 10 to 99 years in prison and a \$20,000 fine, and possession of a controlled substance, a second class felony punishable by two to 20 years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

In a plea agreement Monday, Roach pled guilty to the lesser charge and was sentenced to 18 years in a Texas prison with credit for the 377 days he's already spent in jail.

Special Prosecutor David Scott said he felt justice had been served, although he had argued that the sentences should run consecutively on grounds that Roach violated the public trust. Roach served as district attorney

### Fireworks stands report less than explosive sales

Sales at local fireworks stands this year have gotten off to a slow start, according to vendors at two stands near Pampa.

"Business has been slow so far this year. We've only had two customers so far today," said Jennifer Shephard of Lefors at 4:45 p.m. Monday. Shephard is in charge of the Mr. W's-Fireworks stand at Highway 60 and South Price Road.

Fireworks stands opened Saturday, and will continue conduct-

ing business through Independence Day.

The Mr. W's stand is the main fund-raiser each year for the Lefors High School cheerleaders.

"We depend on this every year to pay for uniforms, camp, activities and equipment," Shephard said. Cost of yearly activities and equipment is about \$860 per cheerleader, an amount their parents would otherwise have to pay in order for them to participate, she said.

Some confusion over what is banned and what is allowed to be

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sold and used this year may be contributing to slow sales. Gray County Commissioners approved a fireworks ban on June 15 that concerns aerial fireworks.

Copies of Section 240.904 of the Texas Local Government Code which were e-mailed to The Pampa News and in the possession of Shephard state that the section refers to the regulation of certain fireworks by the authority of a county during a drought. The section containing the regulation could not be found on the official Web site of the Texas Local Government Code; the chapter online jumps from Section 240.903 to 240.905.


Section 240.904 states that the commissioners court of a county may prohibit or restrict the use of certain aerial fireworks where drought conditions have been deter-



#### Teens charged in crime spree that left four people dead

HOUSTON (AP) - Four teenagers and a 22-year-old man have been charged in a monthlong violent crime spree that police said included at least four murders and "dozens and dozens" of rob-

beries. "This may be the meanest bunch of guys we've come across," Houston police Detective Alan Brown said. Dexter Johnson, 18: Keithron Fields, 17:

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Timothy Randle, 19; Alvie Butler, 22; and Ashley Ervin, 17, are charged with capital murder. Authorities say Johnson and Fields led the group. Butler is Randle's uncle; Ervin is Randle's cousin and Fields' girlfriend.

All are being held without bail at the Harris County Jail.

Police said the crime spree began May 26 with the slaying of retired wood shop teacher Brady Davis, 61. It ended around June 20 when a man later identified as Jose Lopez was found fatally shot.

Investigators said Davis was attacked at gunpoint by Johnson and Fields at a car wash. He was found next to his truck, dead from a single gunshot wound.

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# **Treasury head vows improvement**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary-designate Henry Paulson pledged today to review a once secret program that allowed the government to access a massive international data base of financial information to catch terrorists financiers.

"If confirmed, I'll be all over it ... and make sure I understand the law thoroughly," Paulson, a 32-year veteran of Wall Street, told the Senate Finance Committee today, during his confirmation hearing which touched on a wide range of topics.

Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., was upset that the administration did not brief the Senate Finance Committee on the terrortracking program, which has stirred some concern among privacy advocates and some Democrats.

In response to a request by Baucus, Paulson pledged to personally review the program after he takes the Treasury helm. .

Paulson said that he would have to "get my arms around" the issue of a program that the Treasury Department has used to track activity by suspected terrorist financiers. He said he had not been briefed on the program. but said that weighing people's financial pri-

vacy with fighting the global war on terror is a delicate balancing act.

Paulson's nomination is not expected to hit any major roadblocks.

The panel's chairman, Sen. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa, has said he hoped the nomination would be approved by the full Senate by the start of the July 4 congressional recess.

Democrats and Republicans on the Senate committee welcomed Paulson's nomination, citing his strong credentials for the job.

If approved as expected, the 60-year-old chairman-chief executive officer of Goldman Sachs would become Bush's third Treasury secretary since the president took office in January 2001.

As Treasury secretary, Paulson also promised to improve America's global competitiveness, in part by ensuring that companies are treated fairly in trade matters and by keeping taxes down.

To help make the United States more competitive on the global playing field, Paulson said he would work to advocate policies that provide open and level markets for U.S. investment and for U.S. products.

mined to exist. The definition of aerial fireworks which is given in the section is those items classified as "skyrockets with sticks" and "other pyrotechnic devices that have fins or rudders for the purpose of achieving aerodynamic flight, including devices that would be considered a missile or a rocket."

County commissioners must approve the aerial fireworks ban on or before June 15 concerning Fourth of July sales, and on or before Dec. 15 for New Year's celebrations, according to the local government code.

"Everything we have is legal," said Jina Pesqueda of the TNT Fireworks stand south of Pampa on Highway 70. "There's a lot of misunderstanding. This stand has none of the fireworks that are banned.'

"There are some products that we could have that are banned this year, and we don't have them on the shelf," Pesqueda said.

The TNT stand, which is open from 9 a.m. to midnight each day and will remain open until about 1 a.m. starting June 30, has a DVD which can be viewed on a television at the stand. The DVD shows how each type of firework sold at the stand works and what each looks like.

"This way, you know what you're getting before you buy it," Pesqueda said. Mr. W's Fireworks is open from 10 a.m. until midnight daily until Friday, when they will begin opening at 9 a.m., Shephard said. "We do not have any-

thing that is banned," she

said of the fireworks available for purchase at Mr. W's.

"We've already talked to several stands about bottle rockets and fins," said County Judge Richard Peet.

Peet said he would have thought other types of fireworks, such as Roman candles and others which shoot into the air, could be included in the ban.

"But the government and Legislature has not seen fit to include those," he said.

"The governor can do a whole lot more to protect lives and property, but he hasn't seen fit to," Peet said.

The county burn ban which has been in effect since Jan. 3 and which led to the fireworks restrictions for the county will be on the commissioners' next agenda and "probably on each upcoming meeting's agenda to reassess it," Peet said.

# **Congress questions Bush's claims he can ignore laws he signs**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The White House on today defended President Bush's prolific use of statements that tend to limit the impact of bills he signs into law, saying they help him uphold the Constitution and defend the nation's security.

'There's this notion that the president is committing acts of civil disobedience, and he's not," said Bush's press secretary Tony Snow, speaking at the White House. "It's important for the president at least to express reservations about the constitutionality of certain provisions."

Snow spoke as Senate Judiciary Committee Chairman Arlen Specter opened hearings on Bush's use of bill signing statements saying he reserves the right to revise, interpret or disregard a measure on national security and constitutional

grounds. Such statements have accompanied some 750 statutes passed by Congress — including a ban on the torture of detainees and the renewal of the Patriot Act.

"There is a sense that the president has taken signing statements beyond the customary far purview," Specter, R-Pa., said.

"It's a challenge to the plain lan-

guage of the Constitution," he added.

Democrats pounced, saying the signing statements are the latest example of the administration's expansion of executive power.

'I believe that this new use of signing statements is a means to undermine and weaken the law," said Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California. "If the president is going to have the power to nullify all or part of a statute, it should only be through veto authority that the president has authorized and can reject — rather than through a unilateral action taken outside the structures of our democracy."

A Justice Department lawyer defended Bush's statements.

"Even if there is, modest increase, let me just suggest that it be viewed in light of current events and Congress' response to those events," said Justice Department lawyer Michelle Boardman. "The significance of legislation affecting national security has increased markedly since Sept. 11."

"Congress has been more active, the president has been more active," she added. "The separation of powers is working when we have this kind of dispute."

Specter's hearing is about more than the statements. He's been compiling a list of White House practices he bluntly says could amount to abuse of executive power - from warrantless domestic wiretapping program to sending officials to hearings who refuse to answer lawmakers' questions.

The session also concerns countering any influence Bush's signing statements may have on court decisions regarding the new laws. Courts can be expected to look to the legislature for intent, not the executive, said Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas., a former state judge.

British author J.K. Rowling, who went from being an unemployed single mother to one of the richest authors in history, is drop-. ping hints about her final book in the Harry Potter series.

Rowling has said that two characters will die in the seventh<sup>2</sup> and last book, but she is not so far revealing who dies.

Harry Potter is the main character in a series of books, one per school year, of Harry's attendance at Hogwarts, a British school for witches and wizards. The books, aimed mainly at young readers, also have their share of adult fans.

One drug that is supposed to help you lose that stubborn belly fat even runs an alternate commercial hyping it as the "feel good" drug.

When I was growing up, it was generally known that diet pills could be used as "uppers." They were sometimes abused by people who took them mainly for this reason, rather than losing weight, and by people who discovered their mood-altering side effect.

People would sometimes get hooked on diet pills because of their "feel good" effects. I guess that knowledge has been lost, or is no

I haven't heard as much

of an outcry about these commercials as I have about the Harry Potter books. And that somewhat I find strange.

After all, parents have more control over the books their kids read and the television shows and movies their kids see than they do over commercials which are not noted on a television schedule and which are aired at all hours, on just about every channel.

Perhaps those who worry about such things are afraid their kids can't tell reality from fantasy. And that really is something to worry about.



In 1969, patrons at the Stonewall Inn, a gay bar in New York's American author Village, Greenwich (1892 - 1973)clashed with police in an incident considered the birth of the gay rights movement. In 1973, former White House counsel John W. Dean told the Senate Watergate Committee about an "enemies list" kept by the Nixon White House.



In 1980, President Carter signed legislation reviving draft registration.

In 1986, the International Court of Justice at The Hague ruled that the United States had broken international law and violated the sovereignty of Nicaragua by aiding the contras.

In 1991, Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall, the first black to sit on the nation's highest court, announced his retirement.

Ten years ago: President Clinton and other Group of Seven leaders meeting in Lyon, France, pledged solidarity against terrorism following a truck bombing in Saudi Arabia that killed 19 Americans. A Dallas police officer was charged with trying to hire a hit man to kill football star Michael Irvin. (Johnnie Hernandez later pleaded guilty to solicitation of capital murder. He was sentenced to serve two concurrent six-year prison terms, and was paroled in 1998.)

Five years ago: The United Nations concluded a three-day summit on HIV/AIDS after adopting a blueprint which set tough targets for reducing infection rates and called for protecting the rights of infected people.

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# The truth is Karl Marx was a racist

Karl Marx is the hero of some labor union leaders and civil rights organizations, including those who organized the recent protest against proposed immigration legislation.

What most people don't know is that Marx was an out-and-out racist and anti-Semite. He didn't think much of Mexicans. Concerning the annexation of California after the Mexican-American War, Marx wrote: "Without violence nothing is ever accomplished in history."

Then he asks, "Is it a misfortune that magnificent California was seized from the lazy Mexicans who did not know what to do with it?"

Much of Marx's ideas can be found in a book written by former communist Nathaniel Weyl, titled "Karl Marx, Racist" (1979).

In a July 1862 letter to Friedrich Engels, in reference to his socialist political competitor, Ferdinand Lassalle, Marx wrote, "... it is now completely clear to me that he, as is proved by his cranial formation and his hair, descends from the Negroes from Egypt, assuming that his mother or grandmother had not interbred with a nigger."

Engels shared much of Marx's racial



Houston Chronicle on a national policy on climate change:

Mention the words "climate change," and U.S. insurers usually get very, very quiet. The industry just doesn't think "stochastically," explains Beaman Floyd, director of Texas Coalition for Affordable Insurance Solutions, a trade group. Translation: Insurers doesn't act on the unprovable or hypothetical.

But the effect of climate change on the business world is already a certainty. American insurers, missing in action on the climate change debate, should

philosophy. In 1887, Paul Lafargue, who was Marx's son-in-law, was a candidate for a council seat in a Paris district that contained a zoo. Engels claimed that Paul had "one eighth or one twelfth nigger blood."



Though few claim him as their own, such as leftists claim Karl Marx, Thomas Carlyle is another unappreciated historical figure. Carlyle is best known for giving economics the derogatory name "dismal science," an inversion of the phrase "gay science," which at the time (1849) referred to life-enhancing knowledge.

Most people have incorrectly learned that the term "dismal science" had its origins in reference to Thomas Malthus' gloomy predictions that the global population would grow faster than food supplies, condemning mankind to perpetual poverty and starvation. My George Mason University colleague, Professor Davy Levy, and his co-author, Sandra Peart, tell the true story in their 2001 book, "The Secret History of the Dismal Science: Economics, Religion and Race in the 19th Century."

Carlyle first used the term "dismal science" in his 1849 pamphlet titled "An Occasional Discourse on the Nigger Question." He attacked the ideas of Adam Smith, John Stuart Mill and other free market, limited government economists for their belief in the fundamental equality of man and their anti-slavery positions.

The fact that economics assumes that people are all the same and are equally deserving of liberty was offensive to Carlyle and led him to call economics the dismal science. Carlyle argued that blacks were subhuman, "two-legged cattle," who needed the tutelage of whites wielding the "beneficent whip" if they were to contribute to the good of society.

Marx, Engels, Carlyle and Dickens all share one belief prevalent throughout mankind's history: the belief that some people are endowed with superior intelligence and wisdom and they've been ordained to forcibly impose that wisdom on the masses.

The mostly European megafirms that insure insurers have taken climate change seriously for more than a decade. Last week Lloyds of London issued a report warning its industry to factor climate change into planning, rather than relying on historical data.

If it doesn't, the insurance giant warned, weather-related phenomena including rising sea levels and more frequent storms could bankrupt it.

In a way, U.S. insurers are addressing climate change by charging higher rates. Last year's onslaught of disastrous hurricanes cost U.S. insurers \$55.3 billion in natural disaster losses. Reinsurers raised their fees, and now

insurers are raising theirs.

Insurers have another tried-and-true response to extreme weather patterns: pulling coverage from vulnerable regions. They've done so already in Florida, where the second-largest insurer is the state itself.

But dramatically raising rates or redlining risky areas is not politically sustainable.

That would lead to just what groups like Texas Coalition for Affordable Insurance Solutions dread most: angry lawmakers and regulators forcing political changes on a hyper-rational industry based on meticulous calculations and formulas.

U.S. insurers have been mostly silent. If they think the answer is rate hikes and canceled policies, they don't know what real risk is.





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Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: I appreciate your concern for children's safety and your dedication to getting helpful information out to the public. In a recent column, you printed a letter regarding a young man who was hit and killed by a car. My sympathies to the parents and family for their loss. That letter raised a question in our household. If you are walking, and no sidewalk is available, on which side of the road should you walk? When I was involved in scouting, the rule was to walk facing traffic. However, I recently heard that pedestrians should walk "with" the traffic. Can you please address this issue and let everyone know what is the correct side of the road to walk on? It may also be appropriate to mention the side of the road bicyclers should travel. Thanks! -- CONCERNED PARENT, FAYETTEVILLE, N.C.

**DEAR CONCERNED PARENT:** What's probably causing your confusion is that the rules are different for bicycle riders and pedestrians. People on bikes are required by law to "go with the fløw" of traffic. However, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration:

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(1) If you must walk on a roadway and sidewalks are unavailable, always walk FACING the oncoming traffic. This will allow you to take evasive action if a vehicle comes into your path.

(2) Before stepping into the street, always stop and look left, right and left again. This will ensure that you see all oncoming traffic.

(3) Make full eye contact with the driver before stepping in front of his or her vehicle. Many people falsely assume that if they can see a vehicle, the driver can see them as well. Not true!

(4) Even when you have a green light or a "walk" signal permitting you to cross the street, always watch for inattentive drivers. Many drivers simply fail to stop for pedestrians. (And sadly, many drivers fail to stop for red lights, too, these days, and the results have been tragic.)

(5) Dress to be seen by drivers. During dusk and later evening hours, wear reflective clothing and carry a flashlight.

(6) Exercise caution in parking lots and garages. Vehicles may be backing up without the driver realizing that you are attempting to pass. (Watch for backup lights and listen for engine noise.)

(7) Always remember that many drivers fail to yield to pedestrians in a crosswalk, even though they're required to do so. Walk defensively!

DEAR ABBY: My condolences to the family who lost their 16-year-old son because he was hit by a car while walking at night. That letter struck a nerve with me because I am a taxi driver. Every night I'm driving, I see anywhere from 30 to 100 people cross the street after dark wearing dark clothing, and in many cases without looking for oncoming traffic. For all intents and purposes, people are invisible when they wear dark clothing at night. I narrowly missed one pedestrian one night because the area was poorly lighted, he was wearing dark clothes, and he walked out from between two parked cars without looking. The only reason I can think of to explain why I missed him is that he had a guardian angel with the wings of a B-52. -- DAN L., LONG BEACH, CALIF.






