Pampa's school facility plan begins to take shape

Architects will meet with Pampa Independent School District personnel and a citizens' advisory committee next week to continue to narrow the focus on a school facility plan.

Officials with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper will meet with school board members, school staffs and members of an advisory committee on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday in the Pampa High School library as they discuss renovations and replacement of the high school and junior high with regard to a master plan for the district.

Pampa school board member Lee Porter indicated Thursday night in a meeting of the groups that he would like to see a master plan extending 20 to 25 years into the future, not just a plan leading to a school bond election this fall.

Architects with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper met with the school board and representatives of the 40-member advisory committee Thursday night to review preliminary estimates and suggestions concerning the

district's facilities.

The advisory committee has been divided into four subcommittees. The subcommittees have studied the high school, junior high, elementary schools and support facilities, including the football stadium.

Next week's meeting will focus on the high school and junior high buildings, said Jay Edwards with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, since they represent the biggest challenges.

Decisions concerning the elementary schools and support facilities could depend upon the priorities set for the secondary schools, Edwards said.

One of the major concerns in connection with Pampa High, built in 1941, is space.

Mike Baker with Parkhill, Smith and Cooper said most of the classrooms in the main building are about 600 square feet. Texas Education Agency, TEA, now recommends a minimum of 700 square feet per classroom.

Baker said, however, that the 600-square-

Help available for utility bills

Residents of Gray, Roberts and Hemphill counties who are struggling to pay high utility bills may be able to find relief at Panhandle Community Services in Pampa.

Peggy Hall, who is in charge of the utility program, said her office is concentrating on electric bills this summer because most of them are high.

"There are income guidelines and proof of income for 30 days is required," she said. "They must show proof of Social Security cards for everyone in the household."

In addition to utility bills, Hall said some relief is

available for homes that have air conditioners that are substandard.

"If a home has an air conditioner that doesn't work properly, they may be able to have it replaced," she said. "If a home does not have an air conditioner and the residents get a medical form filled out that states they need the air conditioner, we may be able to help."

Hall said people who feel they might qualify for this program should call her at 806 665-0081 or come by her office at 411 N. Cuyler.

All prospective clients will have to fill out forms. Panhandle Community

Two jailed after evading arrest

The one that got away didn't stay free for long after two Borger residents were stopped early Thursday in connection with a prowler call and a non-functioning headlight.

Gray County Sheriff's Deputy Dennis Elliott responded to a call at about 1 a.m. Thursday in order to assist Pampa Police Department with a prowler call on South Dwight Street. Elliott saw a vehicle with only one working headlight in the area.

"He pulled in behind it," said Lt. Joe B. Hoard of



feet rooms would generally work because of smaller class sizes.

The average class size last year was 18 students per class, and TEA recommends 28 square feet per student.

Still, the architects recommended adding 10,000 square feet of space to the high school. That would include classrooms, particularly science classrooms, and a commons area.

The commons area could be used both as an assembly area and as a cafeteria.

The architects recommended moving the cafeteria out of the school's basement, and the 450-seat school auditorium is not large enough for the school's 950 students.

Edwards said that while the junior high school is overcrowded, the facility is generally sound structural-

ly. Many of the problems with the facility are cosmetic.

The architects reviewed the sizes of the district's facilities and estimated replacement costs for both the high school and junior high. Edwards stressed that the estimates were only a starting point and that the numbers would be refined as the master plan was developed.

"We're just starting," Edwards said.

He said that by the end of next week, the plan should be taking shape.

Edwards said that while both the high school and junior high should probably be replaced, there most likely would not be enough money to replace both buildings.

By law, Pampa ISD is limited to a \$35 million bond issue.

The estimated replacement costs of the high school and associated buildings on campus total in the neighborhood of \$40 mil-

lion alone. Edwards said the high school main building is in poor condition, verging on needing replacement. The junior high should be replaced, he said. The football stadium and track need replacement, as do Mann, Carver and the bus barn.

The elementary schools are in good condition, he said, reflecting the renovation of them 10 years ago.

"We're going to have to make some tough choices," said Derrell DeLoach, school board member.

Edwards said the prioritization of the facility needs is what the master planning process is all about.

There will be a meeting for the overall plan at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday in the Pampa High School library. The groups dealing with Pampa High School and Pampa Junior High will then meet separately.

The meetings on Thursday and Friday will begin at 6 p.m. in the PHS library.

When Mahmoud Ahmadinejad was elected president of Iran by a narrow margin, the U.S. experts predicted he wouldn't last three months. Ahmadinejad's approval ratings are now in the 70 percent range (as opposed to President George Bush's 30 percent range). At the present, he seems assured of re-election.

Texas Thoughts

Odessa American on U.S. Supreme Court's exclusionary rule:

In *Hudson v. Michigan*, handed down Thursday, the U.S. Supreme Court carved out yet another "drug war exception" to the Fourth Amendment, which was written to protect Americans from unreasonable searches and seizures of their persons and homes.

Unfortunately, the ruling is likely to lead to more military-style no-knock raids of peoples homes and businesses, which will mean some innocent peoples homes will be raided, and a few people are likely to be killed.

The Fourth Amendment states, "The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrant shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized." Its an affirmation of the ancient common-law principle that a persons home is his or her castle, that the authorities cannot intrude on it without solid evidence of a crime having been committed or being in progress.

The most direct way to enforce this rule would probably be to impose fines or other penalties even prison sentences on police who violate it, but such

penalties are not realistic.

So about 100 years ago the courts came up with the "exclusionary rule:" evidence seized in an illegal search is excluded from any subsequent court case. Its an imperfect rule the incentive for a police officer to worry about the final disposition of a case is somewhat indirect but its the best device weve come up with, and it has a long history.

The situation is complicated when legislatures pass laws against crimes that are victimless in the very specific sense that there is unlikely to be a complaining victim to go to the police to offer specific and reliable information for an accurate warrant. Drug laws, which prohibit adults from ingesting certain substances, are one example.

Neither the buyer nor the seller of drugs is likely to complain to the police, even if a transaction goes sour. A user of illicit drugs is unlikely to call the police and say, "Hey, there are illicit drugs in my apartment." To get evidence to prosecute these laws increasingly intrusive methods of getting into otherwise private places and surprising people are necessary. Therefore the constitutional protection against unreasonable searches and seizures must be and has been progressively weakened.

Among the methods increasingly employed are undercover operatives and informants, "no-knock" warrants, in which a judge can authorize serving a warrant without the police knocking and announcing, and military-style SWAT team invasions. These tactics can put police at risk if a person is con-

fused and thinks criminals are breaking down his door, and they have led to "wrong-door" raids where innocent citizens have been killed by the police.

In the Hudson case, the police, who did have a warrant, waited only three to five seconds before entering Booker T. Hudsons apartment and finding cocaine and a gun. The courts who reviewed the case agreed it violated the "knock-and-announce" rule and was unconstitutional, but the appellate court in Michigan ruled that excluding the evidence was too severe a penalty for a minor infraction and allowed the evidence, leading to Mr. Hudsons conviction. A deeply divided 5-4 Supreme Court, in an opinion written by Justice Antonin Scalia, affirmed that decision.

The decision could mean, in effect, that every search warrant becomes a "no-knock" warrant. As Radley Balko, a Cato Institute policy analyst whose writing was cited in Justice Stephen Breyers eloquent dissent, told us, "the state of Michigan acknowledged that it knows of no successful suits or disciplinary action against police who violated search-and-seizure rules. So the only real defense against police abuse was to exclude evidence seized in illegal raids. Today, the Supreme Court removed that defense."

Since drug raids are often based on confidential informants whose reliability can be dicey, this decision is likely to lead to more military-style policing and more "wrong-door" raids on innocent people. It is wrong-headed and potentially tragic.

Texas baseball: Astros win; DeRosa an everyday starter

Astros 4, Cardinals 2
HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Astros had just enough offense and plenty of defense to beat the St. Louis Cardinals.

Mike Lamb homered in the first inning and Lance Berkman made two pinpoint throws from right field in the Astros' 4-2 victory Thursday night, their fifth win in six games.

Taylor Buchholz (6-6) pitched six solid innings for Houston and Brad Lidge got four outs to earn his 21st save and 14th in his last 15 opportunities. Shortstop Adam Everett made two nice plays in the ninth to finish off the Cardinals.

"We played a very sound, solid defensive game," Houston manager Phil Garner said.

Jim Edmonds homered for St. Louis, which lost for the 10th time in its last 11 road games. Edmonds led off the seventh against reliever Chad Qualls with a liner off the wall in right, but Berkman gunned a perfect strike to Craig Biggio for the putout at second. Earlier, Berkman threw out Scott Rolen at third as he tagged up following Edmonds' fly out.

"My philosophy is just to get it on its way and hope it lands somewhere in the vicinity of the base," Berkman said. "That worked out twice tonight."

Berkman is the lone Astro on the NL All-Star roster and he'll compete in Monday's Home Run Derby. He doesn't mind being known for his bat more than his glove.

"All I can do is keep making plays," he said. "I'm not sitting up nights thinking, 'I hope somebody thinks I can play defense.'"

DeRosa an everyday starter without set position in Texas

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Mark DeRosa has finally achieved his goal of being an everyday player in the major leagues, though not exactly how he envisioned it.

A utility player without a set position for the Texas Rangers after not winning the second base job during spring training, DeRosa is still in the lineup every day — and his .336 batting average would be fourth-best in the AL if he had enough at-bats.

DeRosa, affectionately referred to by manager Buck Showalter as an "irregular regular," is the only player in the majors this season who has started at six positions.

"It keeps it interesting. I never know from day to day where I'm going to be," DeRosa said. "I am in the lineup every day right now, which is something I didn't expect coming in had I not won the second base job. So I'm positive in that respect. ... It gives Buck a lot of options. Hopefully, it keeps me around a lot longer."

DeRosa has started 26 games each at second base and in right field, with five starts at third base and one each at first base, shortstop and left field. He started another game as the designated hitter.

Mickelson opens Western at 4 under; Woods struggles

LEMONT, Ill. (AP) — Phil Mickelson was feeling better. Tiger Woods was still frustrated.

Mickelson showed little carry-over from his U.S. Open collapse while shooting a 4-under 67 in the first round of the Western Open Thursday. Woods wasn't as fortunate.

While Mickelson was one shot out of the lead, Woods struggled to a 1-over 72 in his first tournament since missing the cut at the U.S. Open last month.

"I know what I'm doing wrong, just having a hard time stopping it," Woods said.

Joe Ogilvie, Lucas Glover, Daniel Chopra and David McKenzie were tied for first after shooting 66 on the 7,326-yard course at Cog Hill. Davis Love III and Vijay Singh joined Mickelson at one back, along with Charles Warren, Stephen Leaney and Robert Allenby.

Defending champion Jim Furyk, who finished in a tie with Mickelson and Colin Montgomerie at the U.S. Open, was at 2 under.

Mickelson, starting from the 10th tee, bogeyed his first two holes but ended his round with an eagle on No. 9.

"I bogeyed the first few holes, but I knew I was hitting the ball well," he said. "I hit some good shots coming in to make some birdies and turned at even, and then my last nine holes I was

able to make a couple of birdies. It was a fun round today."

It ended in spectacular fashion on his last hole, rather than a spectacular meltdown.

Mickelson, who double-bogeyed the final hole at the U.S. Open in Mamaroneck, N.Y., to drop from first to a three-way tie for second, sent a tee shot to the middle of the fairway. Then, he drove a 4-wood that rolled past the lip of the cup and stopped about 5 feet beyond the hole 271 yards away.

"I was just trying to get on the green and the ball ended up rolling by the pin," said Mickelson, who made the putt.

The ending made up for the rough start. And it was a step toward putting aside the loss at the Open.

"The great champions that play the game of golf all have to have one thing in common," said Rick Smith, Mickelson's swing coach. "They have the ability to rebound. And they know it's going to make it tougher. ... They come back."

Mickelson spent some time at home in California with his family after the U.S. Open. Then, he practiced at Royal Liverpool, which will host the British Open later this month. Now he sees his game, which has been off since his win at the Masters, coming around.

"I didn't feel like I played very well a couple weeks ago,"

Mickelson said. "I haven't really struck it the way I wanted to since the Masters."

Woods took nine weeks off between the Masters and U.S. Open to tend to his ailing father, who died in May, and then went a month without picking up a club.

Although he thought he was prepared for the U.S. Open, the rust showed. At 12 over, he failed to make the cut in a major for the first time in 10 years as a professional.

Woods ended Thursday's round with a birdie. His approach shot landed a few feet beyond the hole, rolled past the cup and settled on the edge of the green, about 10 feet from the hole. An easy putt ended a frustrating day.

Woods was even through 13 holes but bogeyed the next two. His tee shot from the par-5 15th sailed wide right into bushes, so he hit a provisional. When the original ball was located, Woods declared it unplayable and went back for a third tee shot.

Woods lamented "beautiful" putts early on that sailed right over the edge of the hole.

"My distance control wasn't very good, my direction wasn't very good," he said. "I hit the driver halfway decent today. (I) just didn't take advantage of my irons when I had the opportunity."

Federer cruises into Wimbledon final

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Roger Federer put on another masterful grass-court show today with a rout of Jonas Bjorkman, sweeping into the Wimbledon final and moving one win from his fourth straight title.

Federer, hitting breathtaking winners from all parts of the court, overwhelmed his Swedish opponent 6-2, 6-0, 6-2 in 77 minutes to become the first man in the Open era to reach five consecutive Grand Slam finals.

With the loss of only four games

by Federer, it was the most one-sided men's semifinal at Wimbledon in the Open era.

Looming Sunday is another potential No. 1 vs. No. 2 final showdown against Rafael Nadal, who faced Australian Open runner-up Marcos Baghdatis in the other semifinal. The 20-year-old Spaniard beat Federer for the French Open title last month and has defeated him five straight times, including four finals this year.

Britain marks anniversary of suicide bombings

LONDON (AP) — London Mayor Ken Livingstone laid a wreath outside the city's Kings Cross rail station Friday to commemorate the moment a year ago when the first suicide bombers in western Europe killed 52 people along with themselves in coordinated attacks on the transit system.

A pile of yellow roses and daisies lay beneath a sapling in the memorial garden in front of the station. Tim O'Toole, the London

Underground managing director, laid a wreath of flowers with a small note reading, "We will never forget. We shall continue to serve."

London has made a determined effort to return to normal life, but a sense of mourning descended on the city one year after the deadliest attack on the capital since World War II.

The buses and subway cars were standing-room only during the morning rush hour — a sign of how

last year's carnage in London's transit system has not disrupted life in the capital. But the atmosphere on the underground was tense and subdued, as the city was reminded of the 52 people who, on July 7, 2005, never made it to their destination.

At 8:50 a.m. — a year to the minute after three of the four suicide bombers detonated their deadly cargo — the first flowers were laid in front of King's Cross station, the first public expression of sorrow on a day filled with

ceremonies of remembrance.

A second ceremony began nearly an hour later at Tavistock Square, where a fourth bomb detonated at 9:47 a.m. The image of the destroyed No. 30 bus, sitting in the middle of the picturesque London square, became one of the iconic images of the day.

"It's so strange, because I can remember exactly what I was doing this time last year. Everything was all normal and then suddenly, it was not. People were going about

their normal daily business and then bombs were going off," said Angelina Alcorn, 26, a nurse who works at the nearby University College Hospital and who, helped many of the injured. "I will never forget the image of that bus. It is stuck in my mind."

Mexico's conservative won presidential election on fears of leftist instability

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Felipe Calderon won Mexico's presidential election not because of who he is, but because of who he isn't.

After peacefully ushering in democracy only six years ago, many Mexicans were not ready to shake up the status quo and flip the country on its head with a leftist leader who promised to put its nearly 50 million poor first.

While Mexicans were largely disappointed that President Vicente Fox did not do more to improve their daily lives, he also did not make things worse. The former Coca Cola executive's six years in office have been marked by slow but steady economic growth, without the kind of financial meltdowns that have plagued the country since the 1960s.

In the end, those who voted for Calderon opted to play it safe. Many worried his main rival, Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador, would send Mexico down the path of other Latin American countries like Venezuela, where President Hugo Chavez's socialist policies have driven away foreign investment.

Calderon capitalized on those fears, airing an ad on national TV highlighting a diplomatic flap last

year in which Chavez warned Fox: "Don't mess with me sir. You'll get stung." The spot then cut to video of Lopez Obrador telling the president to "shut up." The finale: "Say no to intolerance."

The former Mexico City mayor complained about the ads comparing him to Chavez, and electoral officials eventually ordered Calderon's campaign to take them off the air.

Other ads showed images of Lopez Obrador emblazoned with "Crisis" or "A danger to Mexico."

But the message had already left its mark in the minds of Mexicans. In a

country closely tied to the United States and where American companies are the largest private-sector employers, many believed the risks were too great.

Some worried a Lopez Obrador presidency would return the country to its boom-and-bust years, when the peso rode a roller-coaster and many people felt their savings were better off under a mattress than in the country's banks.

Lopez Obrador worked to assure foreign investors he was no Chavez. He sent his chief economic adviser, Cambridge-educated Rogelio Ramirez de la O, an independent consultant well respected on Wall Street, to spread the word that he planned to build on Mexico's economic system — not dismantle it.

While that message calmed international markets, it failed to reach his most crucial audience: Mexico's growing middle class, whose memories of the last financial crisis in 1994 were still too painful. That crisis galvanized people across class lines to kick out the Institutional Revolutionary Party, or PRI, six years later, ending seven decades of single-party rule.

us have gone off the "God standard."

We are today pushing forward a great program of defense. We are in favor of ships and planes and tanks and armaments, but the greatest defense that we can make is a spiritual preparation.

America needs God in government. God in business. God in her homes. And God in her schools today.

America needs God in her churches. Isn't God in our churches today? I am afraid that sometimes we fill the churches with so many programs and campaigns and drives that He doesn't have a chance with us.

God is with us. He always has been, and He always will

be. If we follow Him, America will go through, and we will land at last at a happy destination. As long as we honor God, He will honor America.



As warm weather and Spring approaches, baseball and softball season begins. After being inactive all winter, weekend warriors are anxious to hit the field and play ball. If you are not prepared your chance of injury increases. A number of injuries can occur with baseball or softball including shoulder injuries involving the rotator cuff, bicep injuries, and impingement syndromes; ankle injuries, and hamstring or quadricep pulls to name a few of the most common. Most injuries occur from over-use, improper sliding, and failure to prepare your body in the pre season or before game time.

Shoulder injuries typically occur from not stretching or warming up the arm before playing. They are also common as a result of the repetitive motion of throwing. Ankle injuries can occur from stepping in a hole while going for the pop fly or sliding improperly into the base. Hamstring and quadricep



strains are very common and can be avoided if stretching or jogging is done before playing.

Overhead, stretching and warming up the shoulder with gentle throwing motions will help to loosen the muscle and the joint. To help decrease your chance of injury, stretching and strengthening in the preseason are very important. Stretching or warming up loosens the muscles and joints making the muscle and

joint more flexible and less apt to injury. Hamstring and quadricep stretching along with slow pace jogging assist in warming up the muscle in preparation for running.

Initial treatment of these type of injuries consist of following the RICE principles (Rest, Ice, Compression and Elevation).

Resting the area injured to prevent further wear and tear is the first step in recovery.

Icing the injured area immediately will help reduce swelling. Typically applying ice for 10-15 minutes ever 2-3 hours for the first 24-48 hours is recommended and continue if swelling persists.

Compression of the area with an elastic bandage to support the structure.

Elevating the affected area above the level of the heart will help prevent further swelling or accumulation of fluids.

So remember to warm up, cool down, and play safe to prevent injuries during this baseball and softball season. If pain or symptoms persist after using **RICE**, contact your physician. Play Ball!
