City clears up water violation of bacteria

The appearance of coliform bacteria in Pampa's drinking water coincided with a change in the laboratory contracted to conduct required testing, and no further coliform bacteria have been found since the city reverted to its previous lab, according to Richard Morris, City of Pampa director of public works.

One violation was noted in Pampa's 2005 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report, mailed recently to the city's water service customers. The violation states that one positive monthly sample of the bacteria was found.

The report also notes that the bacteria is "naturally present in the environment."

City commissioners, in an effort to save money, had decided last summer to try a different testing laboratory for state-required water tests, Morris said.

"We had been using

another company, and switched to a different company," he said. "The very first month they tested, we had failures."

"It was summer, and they're (the samples) supposed to be iced down and tested within 72 hours, Morris said. "They shipped them to Tyler by bus. They say they tested them at 71 or 72 hours."

Companies that perform the tests are required to be certified to do such testing. Both the current company and the one used for the month in which the violation appeared are certified by the state, Morris said.

"We re-tested, and were OK. That was their first and last chance," he said of the new company.

"Some other towns in this area had the same thing happen to them at the same time with the same company," he said.

Carmichael is president and co-owner of Carmichael-Whitley Funeral Directors, Inc., and is a member of the Texas Funeral Directors Association.

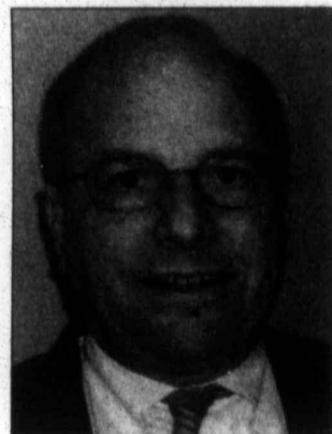
He's vice president of the Clarendon College Pampa Center Foundation, and is a trustee of the

CVS Pharmacy announces plans for Pampa store

A new CVS Pharmacy is being planned for a portion of the 1300 block of North Hobart, according to Pampa City Manager John Horst and Public Works Director Richard Morris.

A public hearing is scheduled for 5 p.m. July 31 by the city's Planning and Zoning Commission concerning

re-zoning of the odd-numbered, or west, side of the 1300 block of Coffee Street, which is the east half of the block affected. The hearing will be held in the third-floor city commission chambers at City Hall, 201 W. Kingsmill.

The area, currently zoned as an office district, would be re-zoned as a retail district to allow retail sales, said Morris. The amount of land to

be re-zoned is generally the smallest to be considered in a re-zoning request, even though the new pharmacy will not occupy the entire area, he said.

First Hartford Realty Corp. of Manchester, Conn., the developer for the proposed pharmacy, submitted the request for rezoning early in June.

If the rezoning is accomplished,

the next step will be for the company to submit building plans for the city's approval, Morris said.

The new CVS Pharmacy building would be 11,945 square feet, with 77 parking spaces available, according to preliminary plans.

The 1300 block of Hobart, the west half of the affected block, is

CRMWA to deal with Lake Meredith level

The status of Lake Meredith and expansion of the John C. Williams Wellfield will highlight the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority when they meet at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday at their offices in Sanford.

CRMWA's board of directors will consider possible action in connection with declining water levels in Lake Meredith and allocations of water to the authority's 11 member cities, including Pampa. Water storage levels at Lake

Meredith are dropping and setting new record lows on a daily basis.

The board is expected to authorize Satterwhite to execute contracts to expand the John C. Williams Wellfield in Roberts County.

The water CRMWA provides to its member cities is a mixture of Lake Meredith water and groundwater from the authority's wellfield.

Satterwhite indicated in a letter to the authority's cities earlier this summer that total 2006 water allocations would remain the same, but that the amount of

water from the wellfield might increase and the lake water could decrease.

The board will also consider authorizing Satterwhite to execute well maintenance contracts.

The CRMWA board will also hear a report on water rights transfers, the Xcel rate case and the sale of the 2006 bonds.

The board will also consider a request from the cities of Tahoka and Slaton, near Lubbock, to participate in

water quality report states that Pampa Municipal Water Treatment Plant was in violation of the Total Coliform Rule for July and August 2005 due to "questionable results." The footnote states that corrective action was to change the contract laboratory, with the result that no further positive results had been reported. Another problem coincid-

ing with the change in labs, according to the footnote, is that although the total number of required coliform samples were collected for July 2005, they were not analyzed in the required time frame due to laboratory contract issues, with the result that the water treatment plant was not given full credit for collecting the total required monthly samples.

"The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has determined that the presence of coliforms is a possible health concern.

Coliforms are bacteria that are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially harmful, bacteria may be present," according to the report.

Twenty-five samples per month are required to be collected and tested, Morris said.

"We used to do our own tests, but it was costing as much to do the certification as it was to send them out. It was a matter of economics to decide to send them out," he said.

The city's previous con-

tract lab conducted the re-test, along with another lab for a double-check, Morris said. A re-test is required when such a violation is found. No coliform bacteria were found in the re-test.

OMI operates the city's water and wastewater treatment plants, and has done so since 1985, according to City Manager John Horst.

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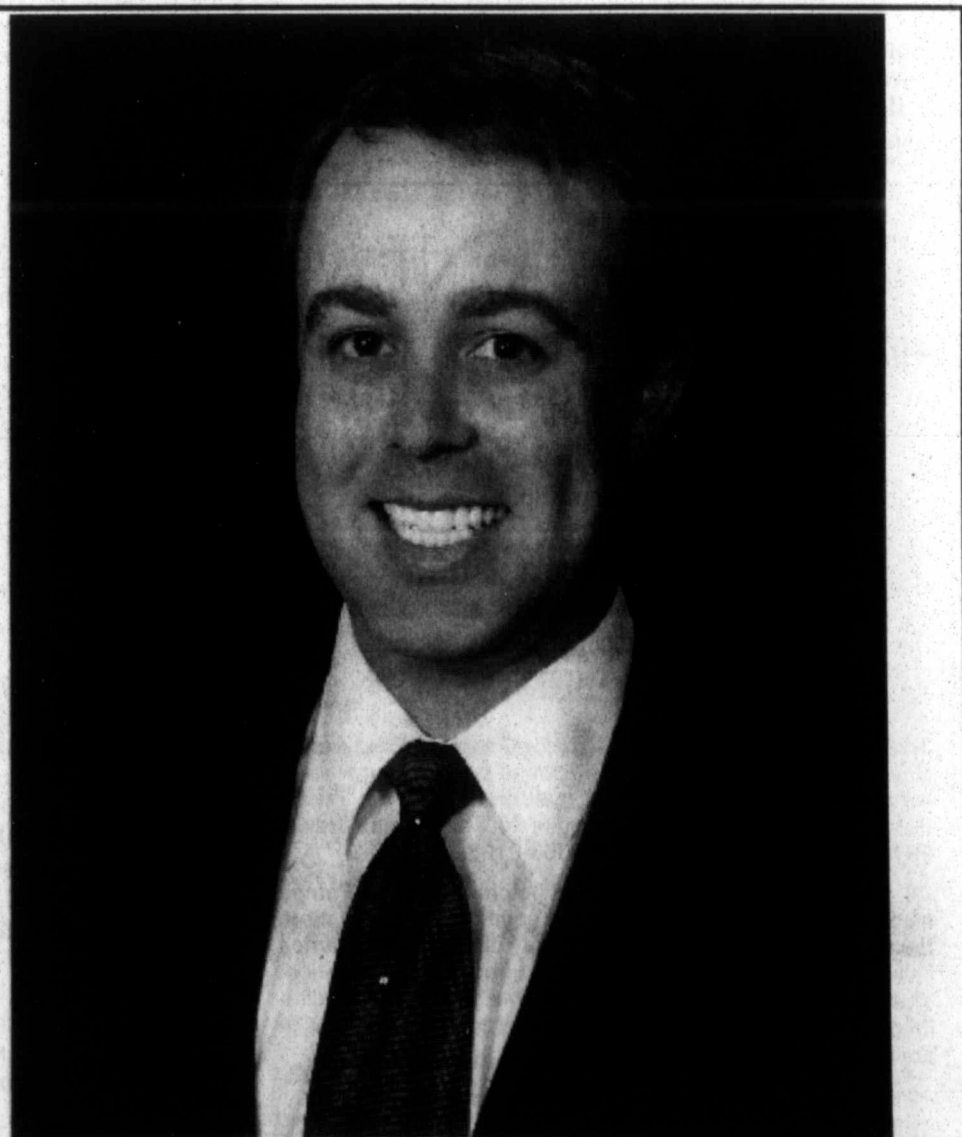

Money is the root of all lawsuits ...

I'm sure most of you know by now that the Texas Pyrotechnic Association and eight fireworks companies have sued 13 Texas counties, including Gray and Donley, because the counties banned sales and use of some types of fireworks during the Fourth of July holiday for safety reasons.

This is one of those lawsuits where you scratch your head and think to yourself, "What are they thinking?"

The plaintiffs say the bans have violated their state and federal constitutional rights. They also say the bans have caused them to lose money.

Then you realize that money is the root of the suit. Of course they will lose some money if they are not selling as many fireworks as

they want to.

It is puzzling that Gray County was included because the county only banned several kinds of fireworks — skyrockets and aerials with fins on them. Everything else was sold legally at area fireworks stands.

The reason for the ban on the sales and use of those fireworks is simple: The county was protecting county residents by eliminating a dangerous cause of fires.

I will bet that everyone involved with the Texas Pyrotechnic Association and the fireworks vendors were nowhere to be seen in March when the area was on fire.

If they had lost loved ones, or livestock, or their homes to those fires, they

would not be so eager to allow dangerous pyrotechnics to be used at all.

The county judge and county commissioners were doing their job — providing protection for county residents — and should not have to be subjected to such a lame lawsuit because some vendors want more money.

I still do not understand how they can justify suing governmental bodies that are acting in the best interests of the people who voted them into office.

If all they are saying is that they want to sell more

dangerous fireworks that are capable of starting raging prairie fires, they cannot justify the lawsuit.

There is simply no sense to it. It is all about money, and they will surely fail. Any

logical person on a jury could see through that.

It is hard to accept that corporate greed overrides the safety and well-being of folks who live in these counties that are being sued.

I see this as a comparison to the illegal immigrants who tried to ram their agenda down the throats of Americans by shouting and flag-waving. They failed to

make any converts with those tactics, and I think the general public will see through this lawsuit for what it is — a ploy to make more money.

1911: Future Hall of Famer Ed Walsh of the Chicago White Sox ends Ty Cobb's hitting streak at 40 games.

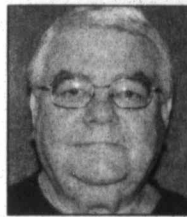

San Antonio Express-News on Texas legislators flunk disclosure test:
In 2003, the Texas Legislature enacted a modest reform to the state's campaign finance laws.

Beginning in 2004, candidates were required to disclose the employers and occupations of all donors who contribute \$500 or more in a reporting period.

The purpose of this requirement was simple: To make it easier for the public to discern what role businesses and special interests are playing in elections.

The additional disclosure doesn't burden a campaign. The Texas Ethics Commission already requires candidates to disclose the name and address of anyone who contributes \$50 or more. When big givers' employers and occupations are lacking, the law only requires a documented oral or written request for the missing information within 30 days of the contribution.

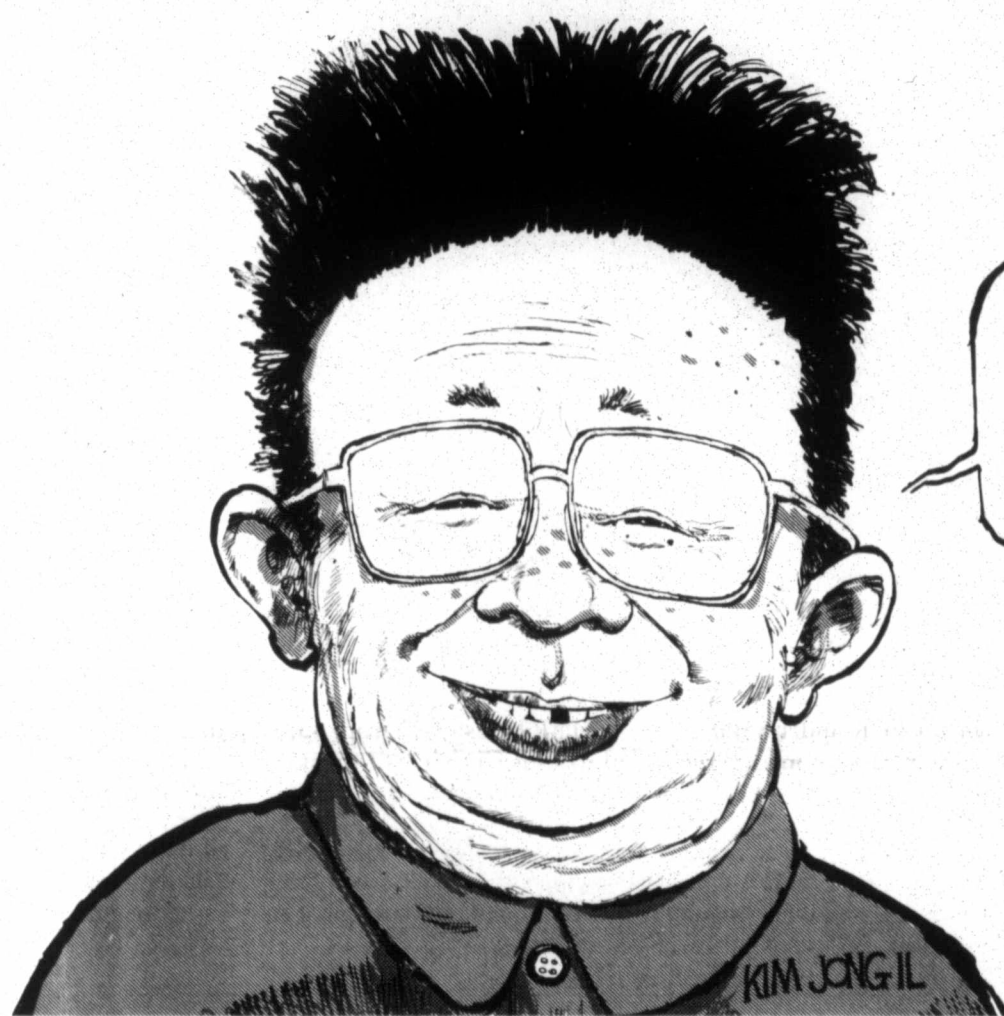
Texas for Public Justice, a nonpartisan research organization that tracks the influence of money in Texas politics, decided to grade how well the 181 members of the Texas House and Senate were complying with the new disclosure requirement. The group gave F's to 13 senators and 89 House members for making full disclosures on fewer than 60 percent of large contribu-

tions.
Sen. Judith Zaffirini, D-Laredo, received the worst grade in the Legislature. Among 136 large contributions worth \$226,400, she failed to report a single occupation or employer for a donor.

Other area legislators with failing grades are Sen. Leticia Van de Putte, D-San Antonio; Rep. Ruth Jones McClendon, D-San Antonio; Rep. David Leibowitz, D-San Antonio; Rep. Carlos Uresti, D-San Antonio; Rep. Frank Corte Jr., R-San Antonio; Rep. Mike Villarreal, D-San Antonio; Rep. Robert Puente, D-San Antonio; and Rep. Joaquin Castro, D-San Antonio.

During the 2004 and 2005 campaign

New York Yankees. Gehrig tells 61,808 fans at Yankee Stadium, "I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the Earth." Gehrig is the first major leaguer to have his uniform number officially retired.

1948: Boston Red Sox hitting great Ted Williams makes an appearance as a pitcher. Williams faces three batters in the Red Sox' 20-8 win over the Philadelphia Athletics.

1980: Nolan Ryan of the Houston

Astros becomes the fourth pitcher in major league history to reach 3,000 strikeouts. Ryan fans Cesar Geronimo of the Cincinnati Reds to join the exclusive club, but loses an 8-1 decision after allowing six runs in four and 1/3 innings.

1983: Dave Righetti of the New York Yankees pitches a no-hitter against the rival Boston Red Sox. Righetti's no-hitter is the first for the Yankees since Don Larsen's perfect game in the 1956 World Series.

1984: Future Hall of Famer Phil Niekro becomes the ninth pitcher in major league history to record 3,000 strikeouts in a 5-0 win over the Texas

Rangers.

1985: The New York Mets defeat the Atlanta Braves, 16-13, in 19 innings. In one of the wildest games in major league history, the Braves rally twice in extra innings to tie the Mets. In the bottom of the 18th inning, pitcher Rick Camp, a lifetime .060 hitter, deadlocks the game with a homer. The Mets score five runs in the top of the 19th and hold the Braves to two runs in the bottom half to win the game. Mets' first baseman Keith Hernandez hits for the cycle in a game that lasts six hours and 10 minutes, not including a pair of rain delays.

ranging activities and shore excursions fade away.

They are ready to work, to comfort, to cooperate and to be team players. For many of them, such employment is a "ticket out" of tough lives back home. But their smiles are natural and effortless; they "smile because they're happy." American youth getting a couple of years with them through a "draft" could learn much.

Benito, our tour guide for a walk through Old San Juan, made us happy about our decision to go ashore in Puerto Rico. We saw 500 years of rich history in just two

hours.

Our smiling guide told us about the centuries-old bricks in the streets. Bluish in tint, their initial use was to "weigh down" Spanish sailing vessels. Earlier, plunderers attacked gold and silver-laden ships that sailed low in the water.

With the addition of bricks mandated for all vessels, they all sailed low, and bricks stacked up in San Juan.

He pointed out a two-winged building that formerly had been an insane asylum.

"Men were housed in one wing, and the women in the other," he said. "And when they caught inmates in the wrong wing, they were released, figured to be normal after all."

We think he was joking.

Though we heard many dialects

and accents not heard every day, we continue to believe that smiling is contagious, and truly is a "universal language."

They spotted 15 just-hatched sea turtles in the shallow water. During play-time with the turtles, they spotted hungry seagulls circling. Before leaving, they moved the tiny turtles under a protective ledge.

Soon, the family hurried back to the ship. We heard the children's animated descriptions of playing with the wiggly turtles. And we all smiled, hoping the seagulls had moved on down the beach or became 100 percent vegetarians.

DEAR ABBY: My husband doesn't support anything I do anymore. He thinks I am always wrong, no matter what the situation

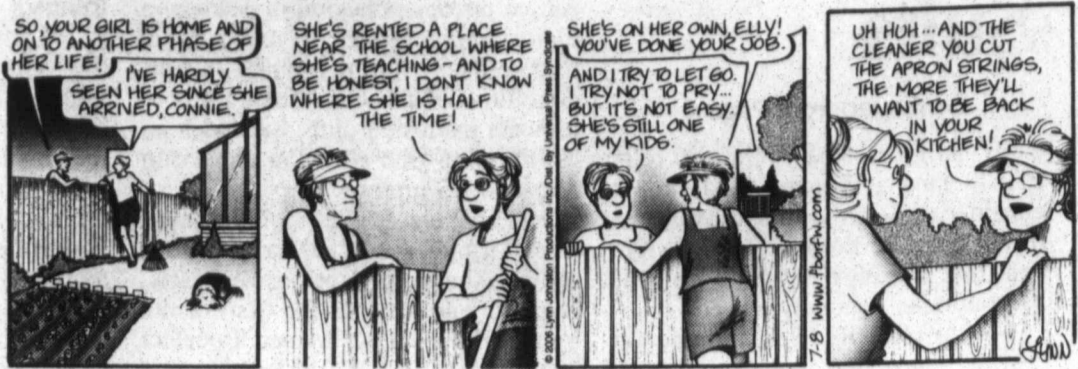

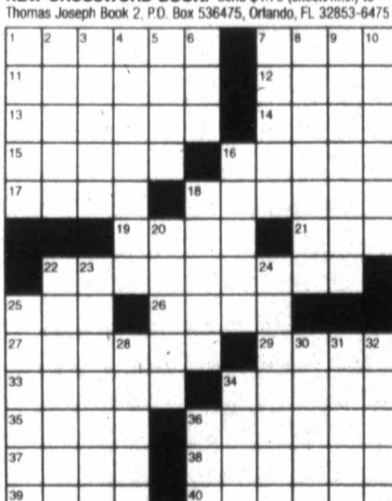

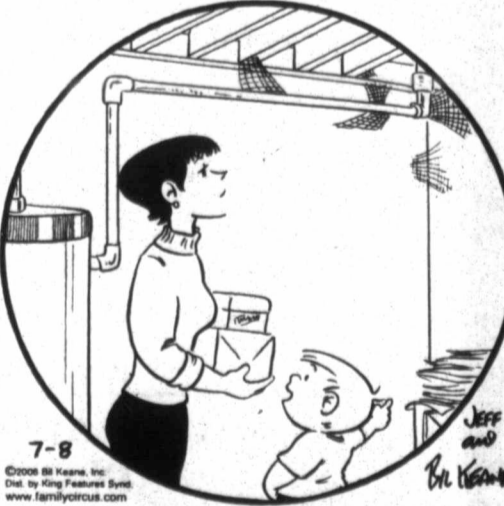

RRC posts monthly oil, gas stats

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,452 original drilling permits in April 2006 compared to 1,339 in April 2005.

The April total included 1,223 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 69 to re-enter existing well bores, and 160 for re-completions. Permits issued in April 2006 included 285 oil, 368 gas, 735 oil and gas, 54 injection, zero service and 10 other permits.

Texas preliminary March 2006 crude oil production averaged 899,826 barrels daily, down from the 914,661 barrels daily average of March 2005.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for March 2006 is 28,162,680 barrels, a decrease from 28,354,130 barrels reported during March 2005.

In April 2006, operators reported 281 oil, 676 gas, 33 injection and one other completion compared to 308 oil, 369 gas, 21 injection and six other completions during April 2005.

Total well completions for 2006 year to date are 4,390, up from 3,193 recorded during the same period in 2005.

Operators reported 232 holes plugged and zero dry holes in April 2006 compared to 606 holes plugged and 132 dry holes in April 2005.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 434,821,678 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for March 2006, down from the March 2005 preliminary gas production total of 440,596,902 Mcf.

Texas production in March 2006 came from 134,522 oil and 70,694 gas wells.

Agency releases average rig count for Lone Star State

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission has reported that the state's average rig count as of May 19 was 735, representing about 52 percent of all active land rigs in the United States.

In the last 12 months, total Texas reported production was 314 million barrels of oil and 5.7 trillion cubic feet of natural gas. Texas natural gas production represents approximately 29 percent of total U.S. natural gas demand.

The Commission's estimated final production for March 2006 is 29,931,296 barrels of crude oil and 449,105,557 Mcf of gas well gas.

The Commission derives final production numbers by multiplying the preliminary March 2006 production totals of 28,162,680 barrels of crude oil and 378,896,108 Mcf of gas well gas by a production adjustment fac-

tor of 1.0628 for crude oil and 1.1853 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include casinghead gas or condensate.)

Texas natural gas storage reported by the Commission for April 2006 is 310,340,690 Mcf compared to 244,838,525 Mcf in April 2005. The May 2006 gas storage estimate is 325,855,746 Mcf.

The Texas Railroad Commission's Oil and Gas Division set initial June 2006 natural gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 20,824,122 Mcf (thousand cubic feet). In setting the initial June 2006 allowables, the Commission used historical production figures from previous months, producers' demand forecasts for the coming month, and adjusted the figures based on well capability. These initial allowables will be adjusted after actual production for June 2006 is reported.

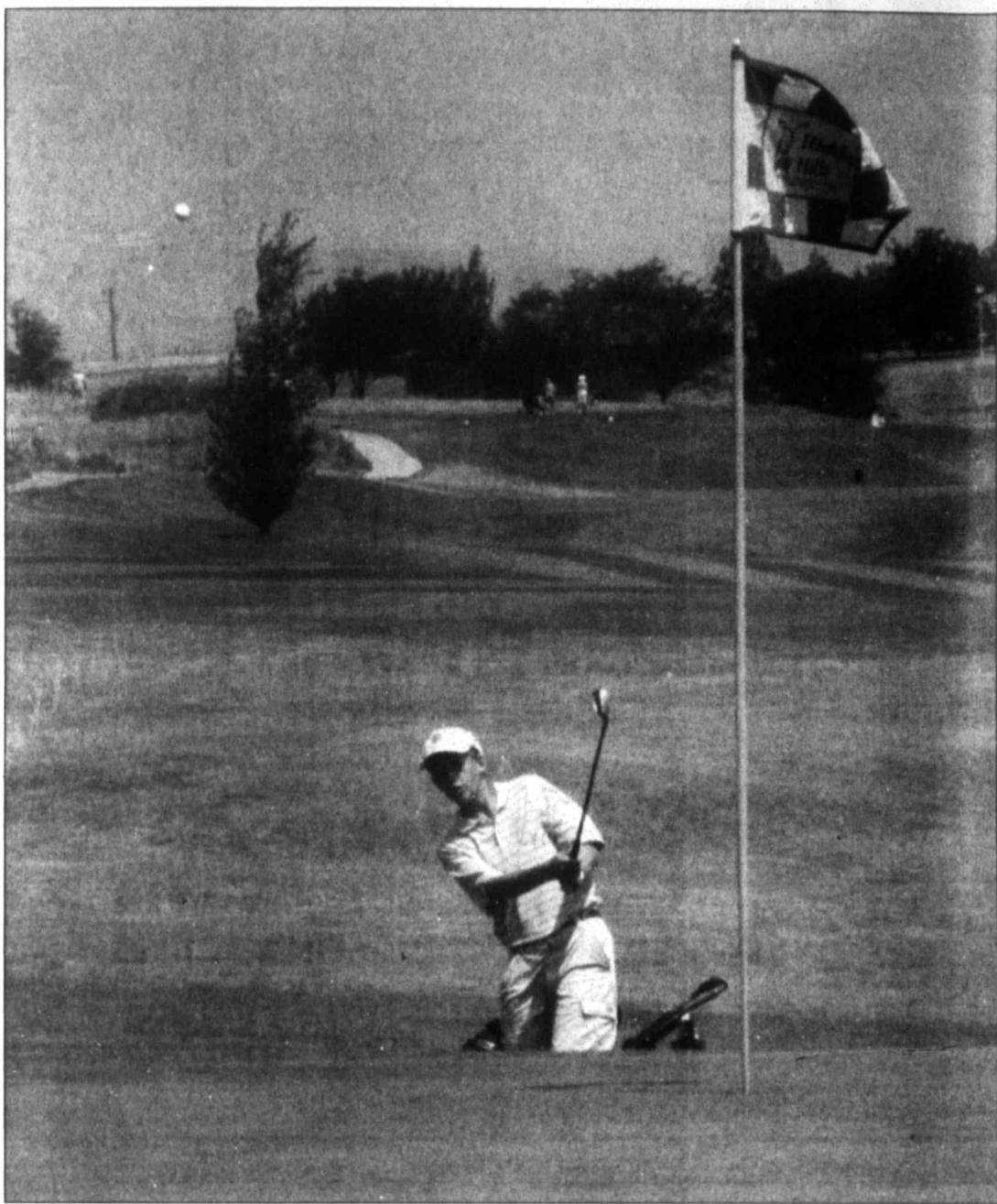

Cards clobber Astros, 8-2

HOUSTON (AP) — Jason Marquis is tied for the NL lead in wins, thanks to a terrific catch by Jim Edmonds.

Marquis shut down the Houston Astros for his 11th win and pinch-hitter John Rodriguez homered in the St. Louis' Cardinals' 8-2 victory over the Houston Astros on Friday night.

But the talk of both clubhouses after the game was the outstanding catch Edmonds made.

In the fourth inning, with the Cardinals leading 4-1 and a runner on second, Edmonds made an over-the-shoulder grab on a long drive by Eric Munson, just before falling flat on his face on the hill in center field.

"Edmonds' play was huge," Marquis said. "He made that great play to save me from some runs. That helped out a lot and I got my confidence up."

Gary Bennett added a season-high three hits and an RBI for St. Louis. Marquis (11-6) allowed two runs and six hits in 7 2-3 innings, striking out four and walking two.

The right-hander, who tied Tom Glavine of the New York Mets for the NL lead in wins, was replaced by Jason Isringhausen

after Morgan Ensberg walked in the eighth. Isringhausen got four outs for his NL-leading 26th save.

Houston manager Phil Garner agreed that Edmonds' catch was the key.

"It might have dramatically changed the game," Garner said. "We can't hit it much harder in that part of the ballpark without it going out. I'm just tired of seeing him do it."

Edmonds was perhaps the only one who downplayed its significance.

"I can't explain it," he said. "I was just doing my job. I thought I might fall on my face, but I tried to catch the ball first. You shouldn't make too big a deal about this. It's just another catch."

Houston starter Wandy Rodriguez (9-6) got into trouble early, giving up a double to Scott Rolen leading off the second, followed by two walks to load the bases.

Bennett's RBI single with one out scored Rolen. Juan Encarnacion scored when Wandy Rodriguez hit Marquis with a pitch.

Bennett played in place of Yadier Molina, who sat out with a mild concussion after being hit in the back of the head by a pitch Thursday.

Oswalt, Ordonez added to roster

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Houston pitcher Roy Oswalt and Detroit outfielder Magglio Ordonez were added to the All-Star rosters Friday, taking the place of injured Pedro Martinez and Manny Ramirez.

Ordonez will join Detroit teammates Ivan Rodriguez and Kenny Rogers at Tuesday night's game at PNC Park. The surprising Tigers have the best record in the majors.

Ramirez, picked in fan voting to start in the AL outfield, has a sore right knee. Minus the Boston slugger, AL manager Ozzie Guillen gets to choose another starter.

Ordonez, on the All-Star team for the fifth time, is batting .307 with 15 home runs and 59 RBIs. Ramirez was hitting .310 with 24 homers and 65 RBIs.

Oswalt will make his second consecutive All-Star appearance and joins Lance Berkman as the only Astros on the NL

squad. Oswalt pitched one inning in last year's game in Detroit.

Martinez missed his start Monday because of a sore right hip and the New York Mets placed him on the 15-day disabled list.

Houston's Phil Garner, the NL manager, asked Oswalt to join the team after learning of Martinez's injury Thursday.

Oswalt (6-5) ranks sixth in the NL with a 3.10 ERA. He's thrown complete games in his last two starts and lost both, the first Astros pitcher to pull off the dubious double since J.R. Richard did it in 1979.

Oswalt is the only pitcher who's won 20 games the last two seasons and his 46 victories since the beginning of 2004 leads both leagues. He was the MVP of the 2005 NLCS and is 4-0 in the postseason, the most playoff wins without a loss among active pitchers.

Health officials investigate Special Olympics illness

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — At least 30 people were treated for vomiting and diarrhea as the Special Olympics national games ended Friday, and health officials warned authorities in other states that the illness could spread as people return home.

An estimated 30,000 people attended the six-day event in Ames.

"Some people have already left," said Mary Mincer Hansen, director for the Iowa Department of Public Health.

She said state health officials have contacted other health departments across the country and are still unsure why coaches, fans and athletes are feeling sick.

At least 10 have been hospitalized, and the health department has set up an area for others at an Iowa State University recreation center. Hansen said it was a precaution to keep hospitals from getting overwhelmed.

The health department questioned those affected and called in food inspectors to investigate possible causes. Tests have been taken and results are expected Saturday, Hansen said.

The first sicknesses occurred Friday morning but the health department was not informed until after noon, she said.

Tiger rebounds; Wie in contention

PGA TOUR LEMONT, Ill. (AP) — Tiger Woods rebounded from a rough opening round at the Western Open, but Phil Mickelson stumbled badly. And Stewart Cink jumped into contention with one of the best rounds ever at the tournament.

Woods shot a 4-under 67 during the second round Friday, a day after struggling for a 1 over. Still, he was seven shots behind leader Daniel Chopra, who carded a 5-under 66 to hold a two-stroke lead over Vijay Singh at Cog Hill. Chopra, who began the day in a four-way tie for the lead, is at 10 under. Singh shot 67 to stand at 8 under. Mickelson, who went into the second round one stroke back, shot a 3-over 74 and was 1 under for the tournament.

But it was Cink who impressed after a 6-under 29 on the front nine tied the tournament's nine-hole

record. His 64 for the round was one off the mark for 18 holes. That put him at 7-under 135 and in a tie for third with Trevor Immelman and Joe Ogilvie.

LPGA TOUR GLADSTONE, N.J. (AP) — Michelle Wie and Annika Sorenstam moved another step closer to a final-round showdown in the HSBC Women's World Match Play Championship.

With her mother shouting "Good shot, Michelle!" after each booming drive, the 16-year-old Wie beat friend Christina Kim 3 and 2 in the second round. The top-seeded Sorenstam beat Heather Young, also 3 and 2.

UPS stays with Jarrett

JOLIET, Ill. (AP) — Dale Jarrett says he didn't want any part of trying to recruit his current sponsor to follow him to his new team.

They did anyway. UPS announced on Friday that it would leave Robert Yates Racing at the end of this season to remain with Jarrett when he moves to Michael Waltrip's newly formed Nextel Cup team next year.

The move apparently happened without any lobbying from Jarrett, who said he recused himself from the negotiations out of respect to Yates. Jarrett and Yates have won 29 races together since 1995.

"Dale told us from the beginning, 'I don't want anything to do with you all talking to UPS,'" Waltrip said.

Now that the deal is done, Jarrett said he is excited UPS chose to stick with him. They will sponsor Jarrett through 2008 and might continue to sponsor Waltrip's team with a new driver beyond that.

"We feel very fortunate that we're the team that they chose and we'll continue this relationship for a couple more years," Jarrett said.

The deal is a major boost for Waltrip, who is starting a team nearly from scratch but now finds himself in the enviable position of having three fully sponsored cars next year when he only expected to have two.

"People thought we were maybe a little bit of a 'paper' team, not a whole lot substantial there," Waltrip said. "And like I said, we have a comprehensive map of where we're heading (and) how we're going to get there."

Waltrip is still looking to hire a third driver, a move he hopes to announce in the next few weeks.

Rabbit in the Hat Cake

Prep time: 25 minutes
Baking time: Cake 18 to 21 minutes; Cookie 12 to 15 minutes
Decoration time: 40 minutes

- 1 (14-ounce) bag M&M'S Milk Chocolate Candies
- 1 (13-ounce) bag M&M'S Peanut Chocolate Candies
- 1 (13-ounce) bag Twix Fun Size Bars
- 1 (18.25-ounce) box devil's food cake mix
- 4 large eggs
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1/2 cup oil
- 1 (3.4-ounce) box chocolate instant pudding
- 1 (18-ounce) roll refrigerated sugar cookie dough
- 2/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 (16-ounce) can chocolate frosting
- 2 (16-ounce) cans vanilla frosting
- 1/2 cup shredded coconut, optional
- Purple food coloring

1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Grease and flour 3 (8-inch) cake pans.
2. Prepare cake by combining devil's food mix with eggs, water, oil and pudding; blend. Divide batter evenly among prepared pans; bake 18 to 21 minutes, or until toothpick inserted in each center comes out clean. Transfer to wire racks; cool completely.
3. Meanwhile, knead cookie dough and flour until smooth. Roll out to 1/4-inch thickness. Using templates (www.brightideas.com/birthdays/themes/magic/cakestreats/c_1480_1.jsp), cut out bunny's head and hat brim. Transfer to cookie sheet lined with waxed paper. Before baking, insert 4 to 5 toothpicks as anchors into bottom edge of bunny's head. Bake 12 to 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Transfer to wire rack; cool completely.
4. Place one cake layer on serving plate, and spread 3/4 cup chocolate frosting on top. Top with another layer and spread surface with frosting. Add third layer, but don't spread frosting on its top surface. Spread remaining chocolate frosting over sides, leaving no gaps between layers. Refrigerate about 30 minutes, or until firm.
5. Spread bunny's head with vanilla frosting, and sprinkle with shredded coconut if desired. Decorate bunny's face (eyes, nose, inside of ears) with M&M'S; set aside.
6. Tint remaining vanilla frosting light purple, and spread evenly over cake until completely covered. Decorate sides with evenly spaced vertical lines of M&M'S.
7. Line sheet pan with waxed paper and place baked cookie brim on top. Microwave remaining purple-tinted frosting, stirring occasionally until texture resembles slightly whipped cream. Pour frosting over brim, covering it completely. Refrigerate 15 minutes, or until set.
8. Remove cookie brim from refrigerator, and place on top of layer cake. Line brim's edges with M&M'S. Insert bunny's head in open center of brim, and fill remaining space inside brim with brown M&M'S.
9. Arrange 4 unwrapped Twix bars end-to-end, and attach a yellow peanut M&M at tip to form wand.

Treasure Chest Cake

Decoration time: 25 minutes

- 1 (14-ounce) bag M&M'S Milk Chocolate Candies
- 1 (13-ounce) bag Twix Miniatures
- 1 (13-ounce) bag Snickers Mixed Miniatures
- 1 cup M&M'S Peanut Chocolate Candies
- 1 stick Starburst Tropical Fruit Chews
- 1 (16-ounce) box pound cake mix
- 1 (16-ounce) can chocolate frosting
- 1 cup vanilla frosting
- 1 cup ground vanilla wafers
- Yellow food coloring

1. Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 1 (9- x 5-inch) loaf pan with waxed paper, grease and flour. Reserve 16 Snickers. Unwrap remainder and roughly chop; set aside.
2. Prepare cake mix according to package instructions. Fold chopped Snickers into batter before pouring into prepared pan. Bake 50 to 60 minutes, until an inserted toothpick comes out clean. Unmold cake and transfer to wire rack to cool completely.
3. Reserve 1 tablespoon chocolate frosting and put into resealable plastic bag. Snip one bottom corner and set bag aside.
4. Tint remaining vanilla frosting yellow; set aside.
5. Cut off top third of cake lengthwise. Place bottom piece on serving platter. Frost sides of cake with chocolate frosting, and top with yellow-tinted vanilla frosting, reserving 1 tablespoon. Spoon 1 tablespoon yellow frosting into another resealable plastic bag, snip a bottom corner and pipe decorative edge around top edge of cake.
6. Facing front of cake, arrange unwrapped candies across front area of yellow frosting. Let candies spill over edge.
7. Put on cake top at an angle, resting on candies arranged along front edge, so that "chest" looks slightly open. Carefully frost top with remaining chocolate frosting. Pull fork tines through chocolate frosting, creating wood-grain effect on cake.
8. Using photo as guide, decorate chest as follows:
 - Line M&M'S on top and sides of chest to look like decorative bands.
 - Press 1 unwrapped Twix bar on each side of chest as handles, and place 1 yellow M&M on both ends of each handle (using a dot of chocolate frosting if necessary).

Vitamin E is safe and offers well-documented benefits, scientists say.

Health bulletin: Scientists give an 'A' to vitamin E

(NAPSA) — At a recent conference, scientists that specialize in nutritional oils met to examine vitamin E, discuss recent scientific advances and answer questions raised by a highly publicized 2004 article in *Annals of Internal Medicine*. Their conclusion was that vitamin E is safe and offers well-documented health benefits.

The Hot Topics symposium at the American Oil Chemists Society annual meeting in St. Louis, Missouri, covered "extensive science supporting the role of various vitamin E constituents with careful evaluation and scientific discussion by the large audience of oil chemists," said conference moderator Professor Ronald Watson, Ph.D., University of Arizona. Attendees also discussed recent research that has identified a group of components of natural vitamin E, the tocotrienols, which may be effective in treating strokes and for nerve regeneration.

In his presentation, Neil E. Levin, a Chicago area clinical nutritionist with an extensive background in vitamins, reviewed the large number of scientific studies showing that people taking the anti-oxidant vitamin E had better heart health.

Negative Study Had Flaws

Although the authors of the negative study admitted it had flaws and cautioned not to generally apply their results, that review still influences media reports on vitamin E safety. More rigorous

reviews, such as in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, concluded that the data actually showed no risks at doses up to 1,600 IU, but that clarification failed to stem the negative reports that caused a reported 19

percent drop in vitamin E use.

Needlessly Scared Away

"Most reporters are not trained to understand scientific jargon, and certainly not to scrutinize how a study is conducted to sniff out inaccurate conclusions, but they have needlessly scared people away from an important vitamin that is deficient in most Americans' diet," Levin said.

"Conflicting evidence has left consumers unsure of vitamin E's benefits and wary of harm," Professor Watson said. "Poor journalism has created consumer confusion." The symposium was hosted by the Natural Health Research Institute (www.naturalhealthresearch.org), which promotes research on the role of natural products as cost-effective tools to reduce leading causes of chronic disease and death.

Critics allege chimpanzees not properly cared for

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Bobby and Kermit were going to be living the high life, retiring to the sprawling Texas Hill Country to live out their days exercising, playing and eating.

Their chimpanzee golden years were to be spent at the Primarily Primates sanctuary near San Antonio, roaming the indoor and outdoor enclosures on the 75-acre compound, relaxing in the tire swings or hanging around bars.

They were supposed to get all the care they needed after spending their lives as research subjects, but within two months of their arrival both were dead.

Now the chimps' former caretakers at Ohio State University, Klaree Boose and Stephany Harris, and a California veterinarian, Mel Richardson, are suing the sanctu-

ary over the way it treats seven other chimps and two monkeys that came here from Ohio State for a quiet retirement.

Richardson paints a very different picture of Primarily Primates, one of 25 or so such facilities around the country. He said the chimps have nothing to do and their facilities are bare concrete with "stark naked cages." He worries that if something isn't done soon, more chimps will die.

"The staff isn't large enough to be able to maintain these cages to keep them having something to do," Richardson said. "They're in no better than 1960s primate cages."

Primarily Primates disputes those allegations, saying the nonprofit sanctuary prides itself on its mission of caring for the animals.

Founder and president Wallace Swett talks in subdued tones about the deaths of Kermit and Bobby and three other chimps that have died since March. He won't even utter their names. But he insists most animals he takes in have been so used and abused in research or the entertainment industry that it should come as no surprise when they die.

"They've been through hell and back to have served mankind," Swett said. "You've got to understand this is a retirement home."

Primarily Primates lawyer Eric Turton said Kermit and Bobby died of heart problems. But Mickey Gayler, a lawyer for the plaintiffs, said his clients dispute that and attribute the deaths to poor preparation for the animals' arrival.

While Kermit, Bobby and a

monkey that reportedly escaped on the day of arrival are gone, the fight now is over the living conditions, diet and intellectual stimulation of the surviving animals that came from Ohio State in a more than \$300,000 contract. The remaining chimps and monkeys are actually named as plaintiffs in the suit.

Gayler said his clients don't want the sanctuary to add primates to its cadre of 600, which includes 74 chimps, until it improves its standards.

"It's not our intent to hurt the sanctuary. It's our intent to get it up to its past standards," said Gayler, who said the animal-rights group People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals first contacted him about Primarily Primates after it was contacted by current and former

employees of the sanctuary.

But Swett said PETA, which isn't part of the litigation, started the suit simply because the animals are in captivity.

"PETA and Primarily Primates have not gotten along for past 20 years," Turton said. "Primarily Primates is a sanctuary; it has enclosures. There are philosophical differences."

Swett said the suit is wasting time and money that could go for animal care.

"It's an older facility; there's a lot of things we'd like to redo," he said.

Earle Holland, assistant vice president for research communications at Ohio State, said the school isn't party to the lawsuit and hasn't negated the contract.

Lockheed's new fighter called Lightning II

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Three months before it takes to the sky, the United States' next military fighter plane has a name: Lightning II.

The first copy of the plane was unveiled with much fanfare Friday at Lockheed Martin Corp.'s assembly plant, where the plane, also called the joint strike fighter, is being built.

"What a fantastic-looking flying machine," said Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley. "We put the enemies of peace and freedom on notice."

The first copy of the plane is parked in a hangar alongside a runway at the sprawling Lockheed facility.

It is scheduled to begin test flights

in October and be ready for use by the Marine Corps in 2012, the Air Force and Navy a year later, and U.K. forces in 2014.

Lockheed Martin, which won a \$19 billion contract from the Pentagon in 2001, touts the plane as the most powerful single-engine fighter ever built. The finished product is expected to cost \$45 million to \$60 million apiece.

Lightning II is designed to replace the F-16 and several other fighters now used by the U.S. and U.K. militaries. Its name harkened back to two planes of World War II vintage and named Lightning — the Lockheed P38 and a British fighter.

Lockheed hopes to sell more than

2,500 copies to the U.S. and U.K. militaries and hundreds more to eight allies who have been given subcontracting work on the plane.

Those countries are Italy, the Netherlands, Turkey, Canada, Australia, Denmark and Norway.

The Pentagon picked Lockheed and subcontractors Northrop Grumman and BAE Systems over a team led by Boeing Co. in 2001.

Parts of the fuselage are being built in Fort Worth, Palmdale, Calif., and in England, with final assembly in Fort Worth. The first plane was finished in February and has been undergoing testing in the hangar before trial flights begin in October.

Some garage band geezers refuse to die

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — In a dim bar on a cramped stage, the Invictas are getting ready to rock.

Twanging and tuning are a band of rockers in khakis with white hair, day jobs, grown children and — improbably — plans to keep playing power chords when their cohorts are fine-tuning golf swings.

"I'm pumped!" drummer Dave Hickey jokes as he walks in. "I took my Geritol, I took my vitamins!"

The Invictas made their bones in this city by packing houses and ripping through "Louie, Louie," "Satisfaction" and their own hit, "The Hump."

That was in the '60s, though. Reunited band members are now entering their 60s.

This is geezer rock at the other end of the spectrum from Mick Jagger prancing around stadiums for fat paychecks. This is what happens when a garage band refuses to die.

The money is lousy, the hours crummy, the age questions sometimes sarcastic. Is there a statute of limitations for singing "Sweet Little Sixteen"?

The Invictas are undaunted. Practice guitar notes ping as a few people look up from their beers.

The evening before the Invictas' show, Herb Gross, 62, drives to practice in the band's '84 hearse. It has a rumbling exhaust and "The Invictas" painted on the side, just like the hearse from the band's heyday. Passing drivers stare. This is OK by Herb, who aside from being the Invictas' singer is a professional ad man who works tirelessly on behalf of his band.

Herb put together the band's summer tour of local bars and festivals from his home in Charlotte, N.C. The "Skip 'n Go Naked Tour" (named after a drink, not the activity) starts at the California Brew Haus, a big, shopworn bar next to Kodak's massive industrial complex in Rochester.

Also practicing is bassist Jim Kohler, 63, the oldest Invicta, who also looks the most rocker-like with shoulder-length gray, curly hair. He calls himself the Keith Richards to Herb's Jagger, and like the famous duo they are both wiry men with big personalities. Dave, a 59-year-old grandfather, plays drums. His brother Bruce Hickey, 57, plays guitar.

They mostly look like suburban dads. Bruce even rides to the gig in a minivan and borrows his son's amp, which blows a fuse at practice.

They stumble on the bridge of "Midnight Rambler" during practice and have trouble finding a groove. Still, they seem confident it will all gel the next night. After all, it always used to.

The band came together at

Rochester Institute of Technology in 1961. The eventual four-man lineup consisted of Herb, Jim, Dave and Mark Blumenfeld, who now lives in California and is not involved in the reunion.

The Invictas caught fire playing at a local joint called Tiny's Bengal Inn. Though homegrown, they looked like a British Invasion band with their long hair and riding boots. Some bands played better, none played harder.

Their breakout single, "The Hump," was recorded in 1963 in a studio packed with pals, cases of beer and a keyboardist they bailed out of jail. The song is not dirty, technically, but urges listeners to "Do the Hump," a dance that goes like this: Hands behind head. Pelvis in. Pelvis out. Repeat.

The tiny-label single got some play on the East Coast and was a hit in western New York, leading to the still-repeated claim by the Invictas that they outsold the Beatles locally.

"Girls were chasing us. We could play pretty much wherever we wanted to play," Herb says.

An album, "The Invictas a Go-Go," was hastily recorded during a weekend in New York City in 1965. The band hated the slapdash album. Worse, the grind of touring around New York and the Northeast started to wear on them.

With Jim facing the draft after graduation, he joined the Air Force. Dave enlisted, too. Herb reconstituted the band with Bruce and other replacement players, but the Invictas fizzled away by the early '70s, re-forming once more in 1980, but only briefly.

Life went on. Herb started his own advertising firm. Bruce, Jim and Dave all got into the printing business.

Then two years ago, Dave and Herb were watching a blues band perform in Rochester when the singer invited them on stage. Herb, a few beers in, came up and sang. To his surprise, the crowd yelled for "The Hump."

Herb had a Blues Brothers moment. He told Dave: "We have to put the band back together!"

Being in a garage band is complicated once you're AARP age. It takes longer to recharge batteries after late-night shows. While the Hickey brothers live in the area, Herb flies up from Charlotte and Jim drives a few hours from Erie, Pa. Herb sunk thousands into the hearse. And there's the time away from their families. Jim's wife asks him at Applebee's before the gig: "This is temporary, right?"

To a man, they say the reason they do it is simple. It's just so much fun.

It helps that baby boomers have held on tight to the musical tastes of their youth.

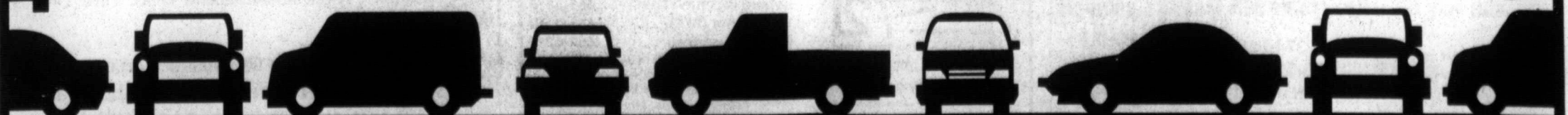

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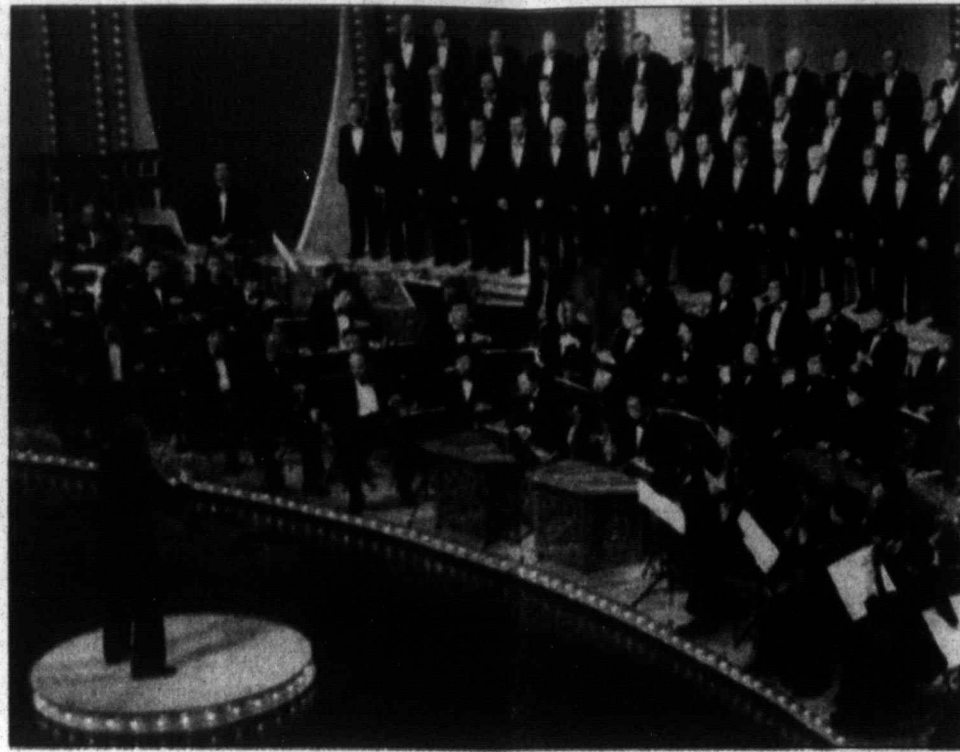

The Pampa Community Concert Association Presents "Live On Stage" has kicked off its membership campaign for the 2006-07 concert season. Gerry Caylor and Ruth Riehart are serving as co-chairs for the annual event.

Season membership fees are \$30 for adults, \$70 for families and \$15 for students.

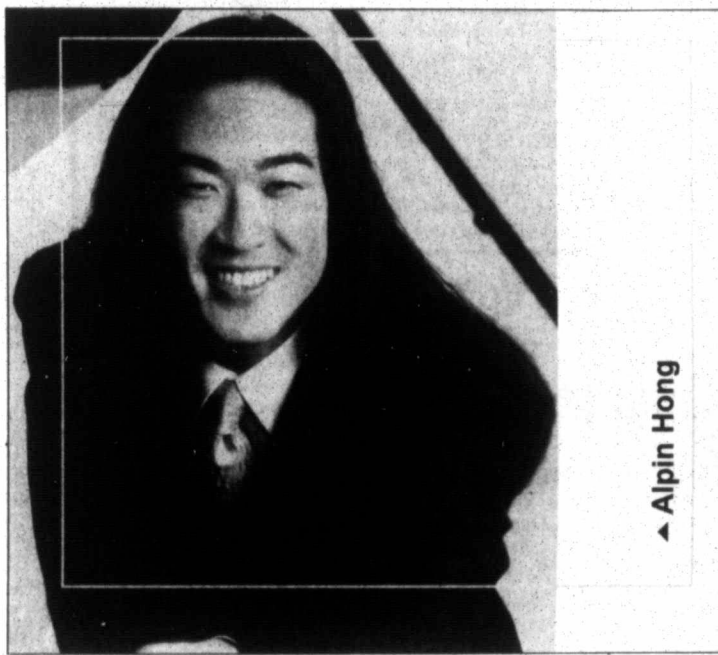
Organization board members suggested that the association would not be able to offer the high-quality performances each year at such reasonable membership rates were it not for the many community members who support the group's Patron Plan.

Patron donations are tax-deductible, but do not include concert membership tickets. Patron Plan levels are: Guardian Angel, \$5,000-plus; Special Angel, \$1,000-plus; Angel, \$500-plus; Benefactor, \$250-plus; Sponsor, \$100-plus; Patron, \$50-plus; Associate, \$25-plus; and Friend, \$15-plus.

Campaign workers have begun calling present members to renew and inviting new friends to join. The group's goal is a full house at concert performances.

Concerts scheduled include "The Centurymen," a group of 100 which will present a program of religious music kicking off the concert season on Sept. 20 at 7 p.m. at the First Baptist Church of Pampa.

"Some are teachers at Baptist colleges and one is from Germany," said Barry Owens, choir director for First Baptist Church. Owens

is one of the 142 men active in the Baptist church on the roster.

Begun in 1969, "The Centurymen" was organized to provide music for the Southern Baptist Radio and Television Commission and is a chartered, non-profit organization. Each member of the choir is selected by audition. The majority, 32, are from Texas with some 20 states represented.

"This is the finest music organization I have ever been a part of," said Owens. "It is one of the most talented group of men," he added.

Also scheduled is pianist Alpin Hong. Performing his orchestral debut with the Kalamazoo Symphony at age 10, he also won the 1994 Los Angeles Spotlight Awards Competition, the 1993 Southwestern Youth Music Festival Competition and the 1989 Stravinsky Piano Competition, all before age 20.

His show is scheduled for

2:30 p.m. Oct. 1 at the M.K. Brown Auditorium in Pampa.

On Feb. 15, 2007, at 7:30 p.m., "Puttin' on the Hitz, A Salute to Irving Berlin," will be performed at Borger's High School Auditorium in a concert jointly sponsored by the Pampa and Borger concert associations. This show is a "music journey" featuring the best of the 1,200-plus songs written in the lifetime of Irving Berlin, spanning more than 100 years.

Bronn and Katherine Journey, harpist and vocalist, will perform on March 19, 2007, at Pampa's M.K. Brown Auditorium at 7:30 p.m.

Bronn and Katherine do not typically use a written program, enjoying instead choosing each piece through interaction with the audience, with their performances including humor, pop, classical, folk and sacred music.

There is also a possibility

of an additional show in Pampa, yet to be announced, in December or April.

biographies of each of the dogs and then vote on which one they think is most deserving of the top dog honor. The winner will be celebrated at a special ceremony in September. If 100,000 votes are cast by July 14, 2006, \$25,000 will be donated to the American Humane Association. Here's a look at the other four nominees:

• **Hero** - This Labrador Retriever makes regular visits to patients at hospitals, hospices, nursing homes and other health facilities. He's the inspiration for "Project Hero," a program that provides young people living in a youth detention center with canine companions.

• **Rocky** - This chocolate Lab serves as an explosive detector dog at the Port of Los Angeles, where he's an "employee" of U.S. Customs and Border Protection. On an average day, Rocky screens between

5,000 and 7,000 international passengers, 15,000 pieces of luggage and thousands of pieces of cargo.

• **Xena** - This former shelter dog completed a rigorous training program and now serves as a guide dog. She provides her human partner with safe mobility, companionship and improved

quality of life.


• **Polo** - This German Shepherd recently returned from a tour of duty in Kuwait, where he served as an

Explosive Detection/Patrol Dog, searching vehicles, buildings, aircraft, barracks and open areas for dangerous and harmful explosive materials.

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
