



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School board votes to give teachers pay raise

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees gave teachers an effective 6.64 percent pay Thursday night. Administrators received a raise of between four and six percent and substitute teachers got a 13.3 percent

The Texas Legislature mandated a \$2,500 a year pay raise for teachers plus \$500 for health compensation. This amounts to an average of 9.88 percent increase in teachers' pay, but because Pampa teachers were

already getting the \$500, the effective raise here would be 6.64 percent, said Carol Fields, Pampa Independent School District business manager.

Fields said teachers' pay in Pampa would still be below the state aver-

The school board, during another marathon meeting Thursday night, also increased the pay of substitute teachers from \$45 a day to \$51.

Fields said the district had been talking about increasing substitute pay for the last five or six years.

The board also increased the pay

of the superintendent by five percent plus a \$400 travel allowance, the pay of the special populations director by four percent and the pay of the assistant superintendent and business manager by six percent.

In other business, the board approved a trip on April 26 through 29 to San Antonio for the Pampa High School Band. Students would miss two days of school. The trip would cost \$500 per student, but the band students will have several fundraising events during the school year.

The board approved 93 fund-raisers by 23 organizations at Pampa

High School during the next school year, two fund-raisers at each of the four elementary schools, Austin, Lamar, Wilson and Travis, and one fund-raiser at Pampa Junior High School.

They also approved the sale of delinquent tax properties.

Jason Miller of Austin bid \$125 for 632 Somerville, \$250 for 421 Crest, and \$105 for 520 Barnes. Scott Lindsey of Las Vegas, Nev., bid \$110 for 805 S. Gray and \$110 for 902 Clark. Shaneea Selby of Las

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### City takes steps to regulate adult businesses

No adult entertainment businesses have applied for permits to build inside the city limits of Pampa, according to Public Works Director Richard Morris.

New city ordinances which are currently pending a public hearing and votes by the city commission are targeted at such businesses as a precaution so that ordinances will already be in place should such an enterprise ever seek to locate in Pampa, Morris said.

"There was just a thought that someone might want to do that someday, and we didn't have any ordinance for it," he said.

The public hearing on the proposed ordinances, numbers 1452 and 1453, is scheduled for 4 p.m. Aug. 8 in city commission chambers at City Hall.

Proposed Ordinance No. 1452 provides for a new zoning classification titled "adult business" and "topless establishment." It restricts location of such classifications to the light industrial district and/or heavy industrial district within city limits.

Proposed Ordinance No. 1453 deals with the regulation of adult businesses. It states that such businesses must be at least 1,000 feet from the boundary line of any type of residence, church, public or denominational school, hospital, licensed child care facility, hotel or motel, public park or playground, public stadium, or institutions of a religious, charitable or philanthropic nature. It also requires that such businesses be at least 1,000 feet from any structures, if any, which house other adult business-

"From what I understand, you can't ban them, but you can certainly get them in definite areas," Morris said

## **Boat ramp construction continues**

FRITCH - The Fritch Fortress boat ramp will be closed temporarily on Monday as Lake Meredith maintenance personnel begin preparations to lengthen the launch ramp for the third time in the last seven months.

"When this segment is completed we will have added over 80 feet of concrete launch ramp extension at Fritch Fortress since February," Chief Maintenance Jimmy Muncy

Heavy equipment will be used to clear silt, sand and mud from the area in and around the boat ramp, and additional concrete pours will be made.

All boat launch traffic should use the Sanford-Yake Marina boat ramp beginning



# Newsmaker interviews: Debriefing Oliver North

Oliver North spends so than the one we have today. much time on patrol with or interviewing the troops in Iraq, you'd think he is still an active colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps.

North, who has been to Iraq seven times and Afghanistan once and fought in Vietnam, is a conservative commentator for Fox News, "War where he hosts Stories" at 8 p.m. Sunday nights. July 9th's episode was on the role of baseball in wartime, "From the Ballpark to the Battlefield: Baseball and WWII." I talked to North recently by telephone:

Q: What is your assessment of the condition of the U.S. military today?

A: There has never been a brighter, better-educated, better-equipped, led or more combat-experienced military

And I can say that having spent 25 years in uniform. A lot of it has to do with the fact that it is all volunteer.

Q: Is our military as modern, as smart, as it needs to be for the 21st century?

A: You always want guys with more education. But no nation ever has ever had a military as bright. When you add to that the combat experience of this military, it is an enormous war-fighting capability that no nation has ever had. And with the technology of the weapons and the equipment that they use and maintain, it gives you an extraordinary advantage on the battlefield.

Q: How are the troops in Iraq holding up morale-wise - in spite of what you've called "the steady drumbeat of dismal defeatism"?

A: (laughing) Nothing like a little alliteration for us newspaper guys, right? Look, while they are over there they are blissfully unaware of most of the negativism. It's the guys who come back home and then go back out.

home don't understand how successful they've been. And maybe the best barometer of troop morale – and I think it's been this way since 1777-78 – has been, always, the re-enlistment rate. The re-enlistment rate – not the new enlistment

rate – has never been higher.

Q: It seems that it's pretty obvious U.S. troops in Iraq are going to be drawn down for political reasons in time for November's elections and again in 2008. Will this hurt the situation in Iraq?

A: They're already being drawn

down. There units are that were out there in December that have come home that are not

being replaced. So the drawdown has already begun. They're not going to make a big announcement about it to give encouragement to the bad guys or to discourage an Iraqi government that desperately wants us to stay as long as we can.

I differ with you, Bill. I don't think it's just because of the November elections. These decisions were being made back last September, October, November. My sense is that they have watched the overall success from an entirely different perspective than we're getting on television from the balcony shots at the Baghdad (Hotel) and they're getting that from the guys in the field.

I watched the Iraqi armor unit roll into Ramadi and was stunned at the reaction of the Iraqi people. This is a town that has been the centerpiece of the so-called Sunni insurrection. It's right in the heart of the Sunni Triangle. I watched the people react incredibly warmly.

They were impressed by their own army's strength and resolve. I've been on patrol with them out there.

Q: Are these the things that give you confidence the Iraqis will be able to hold it together when we leave or draw down significantly?

A: Yes. And it's because they have overcome the two great obstacles we put in their path. Both were made at the same time, in May of 2003, and I was there when it was happening.

Obstacle No. 1 was the decision not to call the Iraqi army back to their barracks. Coalition (Former Provisional Authority head) Paul Bremer called me up we've known each other for a long time - and I said to

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 21, 1861, the first Battle of Bull Run was fought at Manassas, Va., resulting in a Confederate victory. On this date:

In 1831, Belgium became independent as Leopold I was proclaimed King of the Belgians.

In 1899, author Ernest Hemingway was born in Oak Park, Ill.; poet Hart Crane was born in Garrettsville, Ohio.

In 1925, the so-called "Monkey Trial" ended in Dayton, Tenn., with John T. Scopes convicted of violating state law

In 1944, American forces landed on Guam during World War II. In 1949, the U.S.

In 1955, during the Geneva summit, President Eisenhower presented his "open skies" proposal under which the U.S. and the Soviet Union would trade information on each other's military facilities.

In 1961, Capt. Virgil "Gus" Grissom became the second American to rocket into a suborbital pattern around the Earth, flying aboard the Liberty Bell 7.

In 1969, Apollo 11 astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin blasted off from the moon aboard the lunar module.

In 1980, draft registration began in the United States for 19- and 20-year-old men.

Ten years ago: Dozens of memorial services were held across the country to remember the 230 people lost in the crash of TWA Flight 800. At the Atlanta Olympics, swimmer Tom Dolan gave the United States its first gold, in the 400meter individual medley. The men's 800-meter freestyle relay team also won.

Five years ago: Street battles raged for a second day in Genoa, Italy, site of a Group of Eight meeting, despite pleas for calm from protest leaders and global summit leaders alike.

One year ago: The House voted to extend the USA Patriot Act. Two weeks after the deadly London terror bombings, small explosions struck the Underground and a bus, but no deaths resulted.

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
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## Who will win scapegoat prize in America?

High water is not a game. It's a dangerous byproduct of heavy rainstorms, just waiting to trap, injure and possibly even drown the unwary or imprudent motorist and pedestrian.

Last week's heavy rain - and we can expect more, you can bet - is a case in point. Intersections and low-lying areas can flood rapidly, and extreme care must be taken to avoid the problem areas if you must be driving during a

Rain poses a consistent and constant

danger for drivers. The first part of a storm turns pavement into a virtual oil slick in places. It's all too easy to apply the brakes and go into an uncontrollable slide. And as the rain progresses, the water itself is the peril.

Slamming through running water near curbs can send a vehicle out of control. Rushing through shallow minilakes too fast can get water up into the engine and might "drown" it. Trying to negotiate high-water areas can likewise kill your engine and leave you uncomfortably stranded.

If you must drive in the rain, leave more than the usual room between you and the vehicle ahead of you.

And, while it might seem romantic to get out and walk in the rain, it can also be dangerous.

For one thing, you can almost be assured that motorists will be concentrating on their own problems and won't be watching out for you. At the very least you might get soaked by a car barreling through a puddle. At the worst ... well, it's not a pleasant thought.

Also, you might think that you're familiar with a certain area, but if you step off into a hole or depression or ditch, you could be in for big trouble.

Perhaps we have seen the onset of the monsoon season. If so, we're sure to get some more "frog drownders" that will pose a challenge to drivers.

If at all possible, don't drive in the

downpours. If you must, be careful.

## Christianity spreading around world

The world used to be much smaller for Jewish groups trying Christian friends.

Interfaith relations once were a matter of Jewish leaders shaking hands at the Vatican, seeking out mainline Protestants in the United States and Europe, and forging ties with American evangelicals over Israel. But the landscape of

Christianity is transforming, creating a new challenge in the drive for mutual acceptance: Christian churches are growing fastest in the developing world, and within a generation or two, will eclipse their northern coun-

The outlook of some of these churches is warm toward Judaism but still different than that of American and European Christians, and will require an outreach strategy far broader than the one Jewish leaders adopted after the horrors of World War II.

"The balance in terms of

influence is shifting southward," said Rabbi David Rosen, who directs interfaith work internationally for the Jewish American Committee, which is based in New York. "It's certainly an issue we need to give

much more attention to.' The changes are not all negative. In Africa, where the Christian population grew from about 10 million

to 423 million over the 20th century, many feel an affinity for Jews and Israel.

African Christians place a heavier emphasis on the Old Testament than northerners do, partly because they see in the sacred book a reflection of their modern-day suffering — from poverty to illness to moral corruption. Jacob Olupona, a Harvard University expert on African religion, notes that many African Christians, including him, have Old Testament

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Visiting Israel is so important to Nigerian Christians that many put "J.P." meaning Jerusalem pilgrim at the end of their names after they travel to the



### 'Tiger Sizzles After Duel with Faldo Fizzles'

HOYLAKE, England (AP) — Outside of the royals, few people provide more tabloid headline fodder over here than Tiger Woods.

The chance of fireworks between the Yank and hometown hero Nick Faldo, a delicious story line the newspapers were hyperventilating over all week, disappeared the moment the two shook hands on the first tee Thursday. And then the golf course

intervened, putting enough \_ distance between them soon enough to make any further talk of a feud irrelevant.

By then, the best the tabloids could hope for was something along the lines of, "Tiger Sizzles After Duel with Faldo Fizzles!"

Fortunately, Woods did not disappoint.

He provided more than his fair share of pyrotechnics the rest of the way, making one birdie from behind a signpost =

at No. 11 and another at No. 17 from the wrong fairway. Next were par saves from shin-high rough and a greenside pot bunker that required two mighty swings to excavate his ball. And just for punctuation, there was the 25-footer for eagle at the last hole to complete an opening-round 67, which left Woods just a stroke off the lead.

"I don't know who it was," he recalled afterward, "but someone made the same putt earlier this morning. I was watching it on the telecast. I doesn't break at the end. ...

"Normally," Woods added, "I would have given that hole away if I hadn't seen that putt earlier in the morning."

While Woods was back at his digs watching the telly, his peers were showing Royal Liverpool about as much respect as the local muni. A heat wave has parched the fairways and turned them the color of 12year-old Scotch. The rough in some spots is thinner than Jack Nicholson's hair. But watching his opponents tear up the place

didn't make Woods anxious, just eager. "We started at the beginning of the day saying it wouldn't surprise us if 7 or 8 (under par) was leading," he recalled.

What might have surprised a few spectators on the first tee were the cordial greetings he and Faldo exchanged. The two are hardly friends, and were never really contemporaries, though the Englishman was the dominant player in the majors, especially at the British Open and Masters, in the pre-Tiger era. Faldo, at 49, is 19 years older than Woods and now saves most of his best shots for TV. It was his analysis of Woods' swing during a telecast 18 months ago that set off the current round of hostilities, prompting a few wisecracks that Shingo Katayama of Japan, the third member of the group, was along just to play the role of Switzerland.

As it turned out, no mediation was necessary. Woods

and Faldo made up briefly on the practice green Wednesday and sealed it with a very public handshake before teeing off. But while Woods might forgive, he never for-

In a bid to shake Faldo right off the bat, he ran his opening putt for birdie 4 feet past the hole — "that mistake," Woods called it afterward, as if it was the only one - and missed the comeback for a bogey. But Faldo made double-bogey at No. 2 and added three more bogeys in a four-hole stretch before the group made the turn.

Part of Woods' genius, though, is that he never lacks for incentive. At the U.S. Open in June, his last major, Woods missed the cut for the first time in his pro career, and that prompted questions about how he would deal with the inevitable distractions following the death of his father, Earl, in May.

### Rangers fall to Red Sox; Dallas investor to buy **Cubs hold off Astros**

Red Sox 6, Rangers 4 BOSTON (AP) - Josh Beckett and Curt Schilling have a friendly little contest going, and right now it's all tied up.

Schilling couldn't extend Boston's string of shutouts, but he did join his teammate at 12 victories on Thursday when he lasted seven innings to help the Red Sox beat the Texas Rangers 6-4.

"Now it's on," said Schilling (12-3), who allowed four runs and a season-high 10 hits while walking one and striking out six. He gave up three runs in the second to end Boston's string of 22 scoreless innings, including consecutive 1-0 victories over the lowly Kansas City Royals.

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Beckett earned the victory on Wednesday, and after getting congratulated by Schilling he reminded his elder teammate about the challenge they discussed earlier in the season.

"He's like, 'Let's go. You've got to catch me now," Schilling said. "It's a kind of a game you play and I've always enjoyed being in a rotation where you can do things like that."

Mike Timlin pitched the ninth for his second save in the makeup of a May 14 rainout. Closer Jonathan Papelbon had saved each of the three previous games, all one-run victories.

Rangers reliever Bryan Corey (1-1) gave up single runs in the sixth and seventh innings, allowing an RBI single to Mark Loretta and a run-scoring double by Jason Varitek. Corey allowed two runs and three hits with two walks, striking out one while getting four outs.

Cubs 4, Astros 1 CHICAGO (AP) — Cubs manager Dusty Baker came to the mound in the Ramirez followed with his eighth inning to talk to team-high 17th homer, to pitcher Carlos Zambrano, deep center, to make it 3-0. who was struggling to cap

off another sensational start.

Baker told Venezuelan right-hander to relax in Spanish — just to make sure he got his point

"He speaks good Spanish and he just went to the mound and said calm down and make your pitches," Zambrano said. "I think he wanted me to understand clearly."

Zambrano went on to win his career-best seventh consecutive decision, striking out 10 and allowing one run in eight innings to lead the Chicago Cubs over the Houston Astros ·Thursday.

"He's having quite a run Baker said. here," "Especially since it's his 10th victory and considering he didn't get a win in April."

Michael Barrett and Aramis Ramirez hit backto-back homers in the third to give Zambrano an early cushion. It was the first time this season the Cubs have hit home runs in consecutive at-bats.

"This is a long time com-Baker said. "Especially since we're used to having quite a few back-to-back homers."

Zambrano (10-3) gave up two hits and walked four. The Cubs' ace had a shutout going until Willy Taveras singled and scored on Chris Burke's sacrifice fly in the eighth. Zambrano then walked Mike Lamb with two outs to bring Baker out of the dugout.

Is Zambrano, whose ERA is down to 3.11, in the NL Cy Young race?

"Yeah," Baker said. "But I don't want him to start thinking about that stuff."

Barrett singled in a run in the first against Andy Pettitte (8-10) and hit a oneout homer in the third.

- The Tacoma Rainiers, the Triple-A affiliate of the Seattle Mariners, are being sold to a Dallas group that owns a minor league hockey team and has an ownership share in another, club officials say.

Schlegel Sports Group, which is paying an undisclosed price for the club, plans to sign a new lease to remain at Cheney Stadium and to renew the affiliation with the Mariners, Rainiers general manager Dave Lewis said in Friday's editions of The News Tribune.

"Their plans are to keep it in Tacoma," Lewis said. "They're happy with the market. They're happy both with the current conditions and with our affiliation."

The purchase agreement has been signed, and the sale is expected to be completed in September. The primary owner will be Kirby Schlegel of Dallas,

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) owner of the Texas Tornado of the North American Hockey League and vice chairman of the ownership group of the Iowa Stars of the American Hockey League.

Frisco, Texas, the Dallas suburb where the Tornado play, also is home to the Double-A affiliate of the Texas Rangers

Lewis said the prospective owners have approval from the Pacific Coast League.

The Rainiers, who have played in Tacoma since 1960, rank 13th in attendance in the 16-team PCL with an average of 4,488 fans a game, compared with a league average of 6,490.

George Foster, who bought the Rainiers for \$5.5 million in 1991, put the club up for sale in 2000. A deal to sell the team for nearly \$11 million collapsed in 2003.

## Landis in third

MACON, France (AP) - American Floyd Landis remained in third place in the Tour de France, while Matteo Tosatto of Italy won today's 18th stage in which the top contenders rode together in a trailing pack.

Spain's Oscar Pereiro retained the yellow jersey as the Tour's overall leader after the relatively easy 122.4-mile stage from Morzine to Macon, which followed three tough days in the Alps. Pereiro, of the Illes Balears team, and his main rivals for the Tour title cruised in 8 minutes behind Tosatto.

That sets the stage for Saturday's time trial, the last major test before cycling's premier race ends Sunday on the Champs-Elysées in Paris.

Saturday's race against the clock, in which riders leave one by one in reverse order of the standings, measures 35.4 miles from Le Creusot to Montceau-les-Mines. Going in, Pereiro holds a 12-second lead over countryman Carlos Sastre, and a 30-second advantage over Landis.

"I know Floyd is better than me in the time trial, but I'm going to go all out," Pereiro said.

Landis said he was "optimistic" about Saturday's stage Tosatto won Friday's stage by prevailing in a sprint against fellow Italian Cristian Moreni of Cofidis and Gerolsteiner rider Ronny Scholz of Germany. Tosatto and Moreni finished in 4 hours, 16 minutes, 15 seconds.

Scholz was another 2 seconds back. It was the first stage victories in four Tour appearances for the QuickStep rider who won the 2004 Tour of Tuscany. He pumped his right fist and screamed as he crossed the line.

"Moreni, I know is fast — but I'm fast, too," Tosatto said, recalling how the three men had dashed ahead with about 11.2 miles to go. "I gave it my all."

Jewish state, just as Muslims who make the pilgrimage to Mecca add "al Hajj" to their names, Olupona said.

"The African Christians see the Jewish land as sacred to them, too," he said.

In Latin America, the situation is less promising. Jewish leaders say the declaration of the Second Vatican Council four decades ago, that rejected collective Jewish guilt for the death of Christ, has not sunken in on the predominantly Roman Catholic southern con-

tinent.

While this problem is not new, it has gained urgency because Hispanics are bringing their views with them as they move to the United States in growing numbers, Jewish leaders say. About 28 percent of adult U.S. Catholics are Hispanic and their presence in the church

It's "classic European anti-Semitism transported to Latin America," said Abraham Foxman, head of the Anti-Defamation League, the Jewish civil rights group

The shift is occurring at an already anxious time for Jewish groups.

The generation of Christian leaders who lived through the Holocaust and the creation of the state of Israel in 1948 is dying out. Pope Benedict XVI, a 79year-old German, could be the last pontiff to directly experience the war.

Meanwhile, with the Catholic Church winning millions of new adherents in Africa and Asia, Vatican observers say it is only a matter of time before the church has its first Third World pope. The next wave of Christian leaders will have different concerns, and may not view relations with Jews as a priority.

"The difficulty is, particularly in Africa and especially in Asia, there's the sense that the Catholic issues regarding Jews are really European issues," said Philip Cunningham, executive director of the Center for Christian-Jewish Learning at Boston College. "I think there is need to foster a consciousness that it's more than that.'

Other potential troubles are looming.

Among them is a stream of Christian thought which focuses on the biblical message of freeing the oppressed. Its adherents across denominations worldwide tend to identify closely with Palestinians and have a negative view of Jews, Cunningham said.

Also, the fastest-growing wing of Christianity around the globe is Pentecostalism, a movement that has little contact with mainstream Jewish groups even in North America where it originated. Leaders of the spirit-filled churches from Africa and Latin America are following immigrants from their homelands to the United States and are opening churches to serve them.

In Africa, the sometimes violent conflict between Muslims and Christians has generated some Christian sympathy for the plight of Israelis; Christians tend to see the two faiths as facing a common threat. But Rosen said this trend is ultimately harmful since Jews and Christians must find ways to build ties with their Muslim neighbors.

The American Jewish Committee is trying to tackle the issue. It created a Latin America institute a year ago, has sent travel teams to China and just started an Africa outreach effort. Cunningham said Latin American Catholic bishops are aware of Hispanic anti-Semitism and have been making statements to fight it. And Jewish groups have been inviting Catholic cardinals from the developing world to visit U.S. Jewish seminaries and travel to Israel.

Rabbi James Rudin, who spent years leading the American Jewish Committee's interfaith work, recalled that "people rolled their eyes" when he first argued that the agency should focus on the developing world. Now, Rosen said: "We're putting much more energy into it."

him that we've forgotten the lessons of history. Everybody thinks that the Marshall Plan won World War II in Europe. The first Marshall Plan dollar didn't

hit Europe until 1948. Between May of 1945, at the end of World War II in Europe, and 1948, Germany was rebuilt by the Wehrmacht, with American officers and supervisors. Italy was rebuilt by the Italian army, and Japan was rebuilt by the Japanese army.

And No. 2, we turned away the exiles in Iraq. And guess what? Look at the people who are in positions of ministerial power in Iraq today in the new government democratically elected. They are all exiles. They were put there by the Iraqis. So the Iraqis have overcome two major obstacles we threw in their path - not by the U.S. military but by the political leadership at the State Department and the White House.

Q: Has the Bush administration asked the volunteer army to do a job or mission it is not designed to do basically rebuilding a country and trying to plant a Western-style democracy in a place that probably isn't suited for that?

A: Or, as someone put it to me, "Have they been asked to do mission impossible?" No. Because this is a military that is capable of winning this kind of war. It's not the war they were designed to fight but they have fought it extremely well. The difficulty in this war is the inevitable frustration Americans always have which is let's get the doggone thing over with. ...

If you look at the capabilities of the armed forces of the United States, the part that has been missing is the political dimension – support for the troops. When was the last time you, in a local newspaper, had given to you the press release on the local citations for the Bronze Star, the Army Commendation Medal, the Silver Star, the Distinguished Service Cross or the Navy Cross?

Q: It doesn't happen any more.

A: Bingo. Well, why the hell doesn't it. ... Why the devil doesn't it? Why should the American people be reminded, regularly, about Haditha, instead of being reminded that we have real, live, walking, talking war heroes living among us?

## Producers, others chewing over standards for grass-fed beef

UVALDE - The beef cattle industry is experiencing increased consumer demand for specialty beef products, including grass-fed beef, said a Texas Cooperative Extension economist. And a standard for "grassfed" beef needs to be established for both producers and consumers of this product.

"As with organic and natural beef products, there will need to be a standard developed for producers so they can legitimately designate and market their product as grass-fed beef,"said Jose Pena, Extension economist in Uvalde. "This standard will also allow consumers to know just what they're getting when they buy a product labeled 'grass-fed.""

The beef cattle industry is diversifying to meet consumer demand for specialty products, Pena said. But developing a standard for grass-fed beef products acceptable to the industry and consumers will be difficult.

'Though the food industry is anxious to capitalize on this under-served niche market, consumer research shows beef-buying decisions are based on taste and eating satisfaction," he said. "Consistency is the key to providing a product, such as grassfed beef, which serves a special market. But to achieve consistency, a production standard needs to be established.'

There has been some disagreement on grass-fed beef standards. Producer, trade organization, meat industry and consumer responses to a 2002 U.S. Department of Agriculture request for comment on these standards were "all over the board," Pena said

"The main point of disagreement was the percent of grass in the diet of the ruminant livestock being marketed," he said. "Most comments indicated grass-fed should mean more than the 80 percent grass or forage material in a lifetime originally proposed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture: Many commented the percentage should be as high as 98 percent to 100 percent for grass or forage consumption in an animal's lifetime."

As a result, the agriculture department developed a revised draft standard for comment, suggesting 99 percent or more grass or forage consumption as the as the primary energy source over the lifetime of an animal, Pena said. The exception would be milk consumed before weaning.

The standard would also apply to other ruminant animals, such as sheep and goats.

This year, the USDA has requested another round of comments on grassfed beef to be used in developing a voluntary standard. Once that standard is established, the organization's Agricultural Marketing Service can verify it's proper application through an audit of the production process.

"This will be an important step in the development of the grass-fed beef

enterprise," Pena said. "But care needs to be taken during the creation of a labeling standard and verification process that it does not detract from the processes now in place for the vast majority of meat already being consumed.'

"There's still a lot to be worked out to determine standards so producers know what they have to do to legitimately identify these specialty products and so consumers can know what they're getting," said Rick Machen, Extension livestock specialist. "And while specialty beef product differentiation can be difficult and occasionally confusing, it will ultimately help the beef industry."

Differentiating these products and making them available to consumers will help the beef industry retain consumers who otherwise might switch to pork or chicken, Machen said.

Gerry Shudde, a cattle rancher in Sabinal who has been producing grass-fed beef for several years, said health-conscious consumers are his

primary customers. "We began by providing organic beef without any antibiotics or hormones, "Shudde said. "Pretty soon we had lots of consumers who were concerned about their health coming to us for our organic beef. It was the same thing with our grass-fed beef product. They wanted meat that was produced by cattle feeding the way

nature intended them to be fed." While Shudde plans to continue to produce organic beef, he does not want to be a "certified" organic meet provider due to the expense and restrictions required.

"But I probably wouldn't have any problem with being certified as a grass-fed meat provider," he said. "We already feed our cattle 100 percent grass, and that would meet the highest possible standard the USDA might finally set."

Shudde uses Longhorn cows and Devon bulls to produce his grass-fed

"These are two of the oldest breeds in Texas and are suited to grass feeding," he said. "Other larger breeds aren't so well suited because they're a size where they can't usually be fed grass alone. And I think grass feeding is also better for the cattle because it's a more normal diet for them."

Grass-fed beef has more cancerfighting conjugated linoleic acids and omega-3 fatty acids than commercial beef, Shudde said. And research conducted by the University of California Cooperative Extension and California State University shows grass-fed beef contains more betacarotene and vitamin E than meat produced through "conventional cattle feeding strategies." Flavor consistency, however, has been a challenge for grass-fed beef producers, he said.

"The flavor of the beef will change depending on the type of grass the cattle are eating," Shudde said. "Those of us who are producing grass-fed beef need to work on a more consistent flavor for the product based on the grasses we choose feed or are able to feed - our cattle." In spite of the challenges of developing a standard for grass-fed beef and producing a consistent product for the consumer, making it available to the consumer will benefit the beef industry, said Richard Wortham, executive vice president for the Texas Beef Council.

"If you offer consumers a variety of beef products to meet their lifestyle or nutritional needs, then you are adding value for the consumer," Wortham said. "And even though the products are different, they have the same 'popular' characteristics of being safe, wholesome, nutritious and an excellent source of protein."

## Japan preparing to resume U.S. beef imports

TOKYO (AP) — Japan is making final preparations to approve a partial resumption of U.S. beef imports, which were banned over fears about mad cow disease, officials said Friday.

Kyodo News agency said Japan will officially approve an import resumption next week, but Agriculture Ministry official Yoshihiro Kawada said the timing of an approval cannot be predicted.


Department's mad cow testing program announced Thursday "will not directly affect" the government's decision on the resumption of beef imports, ministry spokesman Hideo Kawakami said.

On Thursday, the U.S. Agriculture Department announced that beginning in late August, it will scale back its testing program for mad cow disease to one-tenth of what it has been since the discovery of an infected cow in the U.S.

The ministry will make its decision based on a risk assessment, not out of political or diplomatic concerns, Kawakami added.

Japan was a huge consumer of U.S. beef before 2003, when it first imposed an import ban over concerns about possible mad cow disease. When it lifted the ban in January, it only allowed meat from U.S. cows age 20 months or younger, with spine and all other risky parts removed, among other safeguard

Mad cow disease is formally known as bovine spongiform encephalopathy, or BSE. In humans, eating meat contaminated with BSE is linked to variant Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease, a rare and deadly nerve disease.



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
