## City to begin seal coating

Summer is a busy time for the City of Pampa's Public Works division, with mosquito spraying, weed spraying and street seal coating currently scheduled.

"We're spot-spraying with Biomist for mosquitoes," said Kim Lincycumb, public service superintendent. "Anyone having problems with mosquitoes may call the Action Center at 669-5888."

Biomist has been used by the city in previous years to help control mosquito populations

The city is also continuing

to spray weeds growing on Pampa streets, she said.

Work has already begun on the city's annual seal coating project, according to Richard Morris, public works director.

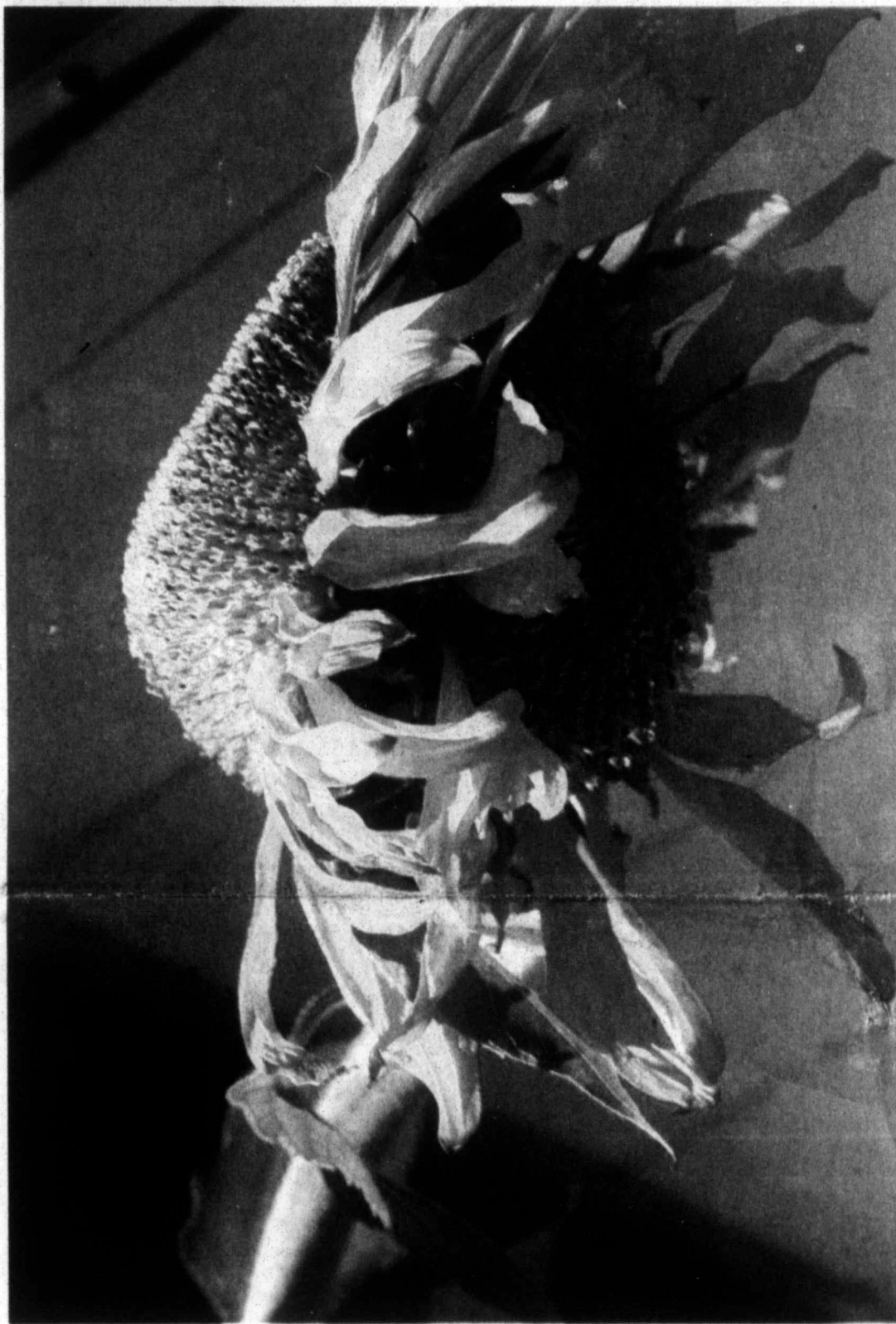
City crews have been spot-patching on streets slated for seal coating.

"We've got several areas where we're doing the initial seal, and the contractor will come back and seal over the entire area," Morris said. "We've got quite a bit of patching to do."

The contractor, Lewis Construction, will also do

## Roberts Judge Cook receives ag honor

MIAMI — Judge Vernon Cook recently received the Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture Award at the annual meeting of the Texas County Agriculture Agents Association in Fort Worth.

The award is given to only seven individuals in the state each year for their outstanding leadership in the field of agriculture and their support of local Extension programs.

Cook was selected for the award based on his outstanding leadership in the area of water and water conservation. He has served on the Panhandle Regional Water Planning Group and was integral in the development

of the Regional Water Plan.

He has also been involved with the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, and has been recognized for his leadership in the aftermath of the fires that occurred in March.

Cook has been a supporter of Texas Cooperative Extension. He serves on several Extension-related committees include the Cooperative Education & Extension Team, the Roberts County Extension Leadership Advisory Board, the Roberts County Animal issues committee and the Roberts County Jr. Livestock Show Board.

### Wild West 150

The 2006 MS Wild West 150 Bike Tour is heading back to Canadian this year, making stops in Panhandle, Pampa, White Deer and Miami along the way. The ride is set for Saturday and July 30.

The ride starts at 7 a.m. Saturday at the Ashmore Inn and Suites in Amarillo. From there, cyclists travel up Highway 60 to Canadian, where cyclists stay the night and are treated to dinner at the Jones Pavilion.

"This year's dinner will be really nice," said April Brownlee, development coordinator for the Panhandle Division of the National MS Society. "The Cattle Exchange is catering the meal at an extremely reduced

price, so we are very grateful they were able to be so generous so that we could really treat our cyclists this year."

Day two of the tour takes cyclists from Canadian to Higgins and ends in Canadian.

One of the MS 150's biggest teams is Relentless Pursuit from the Celanese Plant. "As always, the Celanese team is supporting us 100 percent," Brownlee said. "They've been one of our top teams for years, and we're very happy to have them back for '06."

Relentless Pursuit had a tough and tragic year in 2005, with the sudden loss of team captain Fran

# Oil industry profits for second quarter expected to soar again

Five of the world's largest energy companies are expected to report combined second-quarter profits next week of more than \$30 billion, a bounty fueled by worldwide economic growth and political instability that helped keep oil above \$70 a barrel.

The oil industry is braced for a backlash in Washington, where elected officials are concerned about constituents in many parts of the country paying more than \$3 a gallon at the pump. But some analysts say companies could face less criticism than usual given the attention focused on Middle East violence.

Whatever the political fallout, the industry has done right by Wall Street's standards. The five oil behemoths releasing quarterly results next week — BP

PLC, Houston-based ConocoPhillips, Chevron Corp., Exxon Mobil Corp. of Irving, Texas, and Royal Dutch Shell PLC — earned

an estimated \$33.6 billion, or 32 percent more than a year earlier, according to analysts surveyed by Thomson Financial.

World oil prices that rose 33 percent, on average, helped drive the earnings growth. On Friday, U.S.-benchmark crude-oil futures

were above \$74 a barrel as traders nervously eyed an expected Israeli ground invasion of southern Lebanon. The market fears that the

fighting could draw Iran, a key oil producer and supporter of Hezbollah, into the conflict.

some patching beginning the first week of August, and then begin seal coating, Morris said.

Weather can play a part in the seal coating process. "It can get too hot to seal coat," he said.

"Hopefully, we'll be through by the third week of August," Morris said.

Years ago, I had the opportunity to visit the Burchetts in Chicago.

We took the opportunity to make the trek to Wrigley Field to see my beloved, albeit snake-bitten, Cubs for two games with the Phillies. True to form, the Cubs lost both games.

We even visited Comiskey Park to take in a White Sox game. I do not remember who was visiting or who won. What I do remember about Comiskey is that they have really good ballpark food. No vegetarian fare there.

The Wrigley Field experience was my first pilgrimage to visit a shrine, and it was a memorable one.

In a telephone conversation earlier this year, Chet asked me to come visit and take in a few baseball games at Yankee Stadium and Fenway Park.

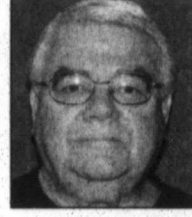
Of course I bit. I checked the schedules and made arrangements to go.

That is where I spent last weekend. A Friday night game at Yankee Stadium and a Saturday night game at Fenway.

Chet and I started out early for

the Yankees-White Sox game so we could watch batting practice and take in the experience. What began as a 1.5-hour trip to the city ended up being a 3.5-hour trip in a traffic jam.

We arrived in time for the game to begin and found our seats a few rows from the field a little behind third base. Alex Rodriguez and Derek Jeter were so close we could read their lips.

I looked around the stadium and could imagine Babe Ruth, Lou Gherig, Mickey Mantle, Whitey Ford, Johnny Mize, Ed Lopat, Billy Martin and all the other Yankee greats playing the game.

But it has now morphed into the Evil Empire, even with the great players they have. It was nice to

see future hall-of-famers like Rodriguez, Jeter, Mariano Rivera and perhaps Randy Johnson and Bernie Williams.

The next leg of the pilgrimage led us to Boston and Fenway Park. We first visited the Burchetts' 17-year-old son who is in a summer program at Berklee School of Music.

Fenway is a lot like Wrigley in that it is surrounded by businesses selling souvenirs and restaurants.

We found an outdoor bar and sipped beer in the hot sun waiting for the gates to open. Watching the different people pass by was entertainment enough.

Food vendors began setting up kiosks outside the ballpark in preparation for what we discovered later was a big party after the game. The streets around the park are barricaded, and party-goers fall into a festive mood for the after-the-game festivities.

Inside Fenway is a meticulous field. I cannot think of a nicer field in the four or five major league parks I have visited.

Our seats here were as good as it gets. We were 11 rows up just to the left of home plate.

Curt Shilling, another future hall-of-famer, pitched for the Red Sox against the Oakland A's. David Ortiz, who calls himself Big Papi, lined a home run to right-center. Manny Ramirez, the freest spirit of all the major leaguers, hustled and got his uniform dirty on several plays.

And I thought of Ted Williams, Bobby Doerr, Mel Parnell and others from my generation.

These two stadiums are historical landmarks, and I am pleased to have visited both of them.

Of the two, I prefer Fenway because it is more conducive to the way baseball was meant to be played.

"Old friends become telephone numbers in far away places," a poet said.

I am grateful that my old friends are more than telephone numbers.

Thank you, Chet and Marcy, for a weekend I will never forget.

In 1967, rioting that claimed some 43 lives erupted in Detroit.

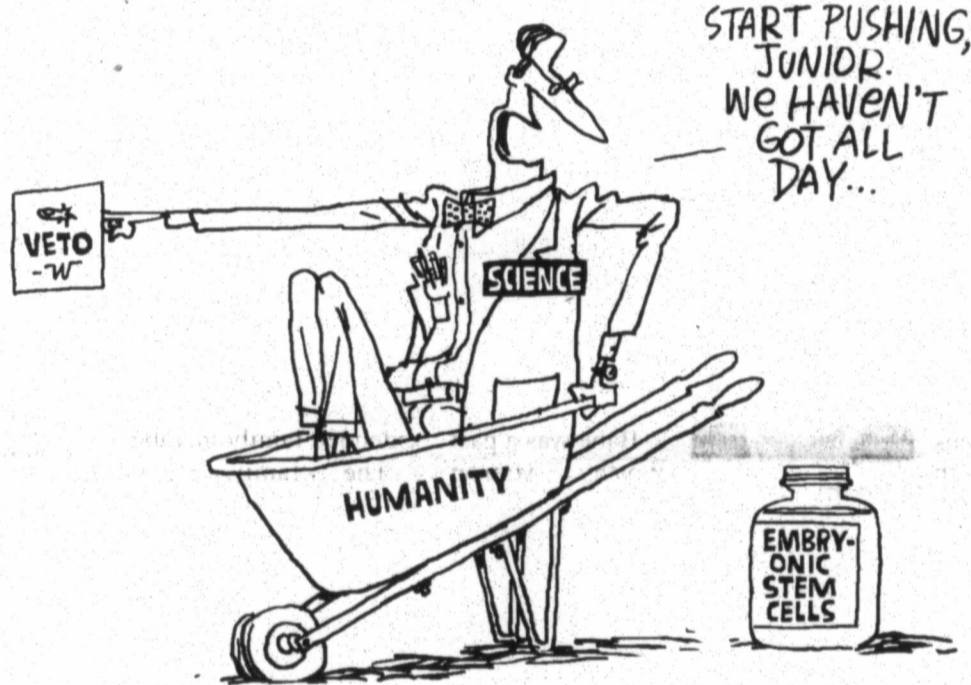
In 1977, a jury in Washington convicted 12 Hanafi Muslims of charges stemming from the hostage siege at three buildings the previous March.

## New York City still a happenin' place ...

It was our first visit to the Big Apple in more than 15 years. Spending 48 hours around Times Square provided far more confirmations than adjustments of long-held perceptions.

In most ways, it remains a "where it's at" city that's the nerve center, the trend-setter and a mob scene where the letter "R" is in the repertoire only of visitors' dialects.

Overheard: "Hey, Chahlie, you a visitah heah in New Yawk?" You get the drift. And before my wife and I could complete sentences, locals branded us as Southerners, often with this addendum: "And probably from Texas. ..."

The old "small world" observation surfaced within hours of arrival. We were seated with a couple of hundred others to see "I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change," an off Broadway musical comedy completing 11 straight years at the Westside Theatre. We heard unmistakable "Texas talk" just a few feet away on the next row.

Yep, the drawing couple, their voices elevated enough to be heard above other "leather lungs" at intermission, are from Austin. Turns out we have dozens of friends in common.

The show was a delightful musical/comedy with a cast of four. It's amazing, really, how such verve and freshness stand out even after 11 years. And one of the male leads was in the opening show back in '95. ...

Broadway at any hour remains a magical place. When the play ended, we joined a throng there watching the Dallas Mavericks in their final game against Miami on ABC's 585-square-foot JumboTron.

Cheers were about equal for each team. These included "whoops and hollers" from a dozen or so officers of "New York's finest" milling among the crowd.

We should have stayed with the fans outdoors. Instead, we retreated to a hotel room — one so small that when I inserted the door key, it cracked the window on the opposite wall. Seriously, it was smaller than our cabin on Carnival's Legend where we spent the next week cruising in the Eastern Caribbean.

We had just enough room to applaud, watching the TV in cramped quarters. Alas, we didn't have too many reasons to clap; the Mavs don't play nearly as well on a small screen. ...

NYC still is a city rightly famous for its restaurants, large and small, fancy and otherwise. Even cart vendors, serving up heaven knows what, give Broadway a midway look, and if it's candied, fried, baked, boiled, steamed or frozen, street strollers have many choices available.

We opted for Restaurant

Zoë, a small SoHo establishment near Ground Zero. It was an everything-made-from-scratch operation founded by Stephen and Thalia Loffredo in 1992. They both hold culinary degrees, and their grand dishes are proof of excellent training.

They responded to questions about 9/11, quietly pointing out that the fifth anniversary of the tragedy is at hand.

"We did what we could to help as many as possible," they said.

They were among thousands of stalwarts who rose above the carnage. For days as they labored to re-open the restaurant, they wore gas masks. Yes, their spirit and attitude is typical of most New Yorkers adjusting to life after 9/11. ...

Following lunch, we wanted to see Ground Zero. Thousands of visitors quietly file to the site each day. We asked our driver where he was on the fateful day of 9/11.

the world. I have the best job in the world, and soon will marry the best man in the world."

The cabbie has no clue whether she had entered the building; he just knows that he escaped harm's way by mere seconds before the airliner crashed into the building. ...

### Dr. Frank W. Kelley, 97

FREDERICKSBURG — Dr. Frank W. Kelley, 97, formerly of Pampa, died Friday, July 21, 2006, in Fredericksburg. Services will be at 2 p.m. Monday, July 24, 2006, at St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Pampa with the Rev. Linda Kelly, rector, officiating.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery under the direction of Carmichael-Whitley Funeral Directors.

Dr. Frank W. Kelley, physician and surgeon, was born Nov. 25, 1908, in Dallas and was reared in Miami, graduating from Miami High School in 1926. He moved with his parents from Miami to Pampa in 1929 while attending Texas Tech University.

He was a member of the second class to enter what was then Texas Technological College in September of 1926. He received his M.D. degree from Baylor Medical School in 1938.

Dr. Kelley interned at St. Paul's Hospital in Dallas, then practiced with the Samuel Clinic in Dallas for one year. He married Mary Ann Moyer in 1939 before returning to practice medicine with his father, Dr. J.H. Kelley, a pioneer doctor in Miami and Pampa.

With his father, he built the Kelley Clinic in 1950,

and he practiced there with Dr. Raymond Laycock in what became the Kelley-Laycock Clinic.

During World War II, Dr. Kelley served as an Army Air Corps flight surgeon, returning to Pampa after the war to practice medicine until his retirement in 1988 at the age of 80. In 1968, he was accepted into the International College of Surgeons. In 1979, he was given honorary membership in the Texas Medical Association, and at the time of his retirement, was one of its oldest living members.

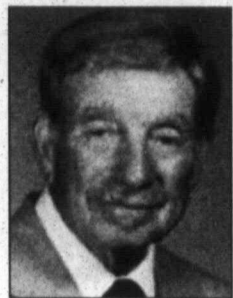
He was also a member of the American Medical Association, the American Association of Physicians and Surgeons, the Southern Medical Association, and he was a past president of both the Top O' Texas Medical Society and the Gray-Wheeler Medical Association.

Dr. Kelley was a past chief-of-staff of Highland General Hospital in Pampa and was a member of Texas Athletic Team Physicians, assisting with the Pampa Harvester Football Team.

He was a longtime member of St. Matthew's

Episcopal Church in Pampa.

Dr. Kelley's wife of 62 years, Mary Ann, passed away in 2002, and he moved to Fredericksburg to be near his oldest daughter. There he remained active and enjoyed his favorite pastime of watching golf and football, especially the Texas Tech Red Raiders.

### Rabid bats found in housing complex

LAKE JACKSON, Texas (AP) — Health officials in Brazoria County have ordered about 300 residents to vacate their apartments after two out of the thousands of bats nesting in the building complex tested positive for rabies.

"It's too risky for people to be here", said Leo O'Gorman, Brazoria County's health department director. "The potential of bats biting and people handling bats — dead or alive — were of main concern."

The displaced residents were being placed in area motels and provided with vouchers for food until the bats could either be relocated or exterminated from the Casa Del Lago apartments.

It was unclear how long the complex would be quarantined.

## Mets shut out Astros, 7-0

NEW YORK (AP) — In the hours before Friday night's game, New York Mets general manager Omar Minaya talked about how he was shopping for pitching as the trading deadline approaches. John Maine's performance against the Houston Astros may have reduced the urgency for Minaya.

Plugged in at the last minute, Maine responded with a brilliant four-hitter, shutting out the Astros 7-0. He had plenty of help with Jose Valentin hitting his second grand slam home run in two weeks and Carlos Delgado adding a two-run shot.

But this was Maine's show. "How about that, huh?" manager Willie Randolph said. "Johnny Maine threw the ball great. He did an outstanding job. He kept hitting his spots and putting up zeroes. He was strong and stayed in his rhythm."

Not bad for a guy who wasn't supposed to pitch.

Maine was slotted for Saturday's game against the Astros with Orlando Hernandez set to go Friday. But with heavy rains falling before the game, Randolph decided to move Maine up a

day to protect El Duque from having his start interrupted by the weather.

"They told me about 5 o'clock," Maine said. "They said, 'Are you ready to pitch?' and I told them I was ready to go. I didn't have much chance to think about the hitters. I think that was the best thing for my performance. I located my fastball well and got away with some changes. I got some quick outs."

He threw 98 pitches, 67 for strikes and produced his first major league complete game. It was his first win since Sept. 5, 2005 when he was with Baltimore.

Houston manager Phil Garner was frustrated by the loss.

"We got fastballs, that's why," he said. "We put them in play but didn't get anything for it."

Maine (1-3) walked one and struck out four. It was his first complete game and the sixth shutout of the season for the Mets.

"I just want to win," he said. "They're an aggressive team. They put the bat on the ball but hit it at people. My goal is to pitch well. You just want to pitch well."

## Teixeira, Young hit back-to-back homers in Ranger's 10-3 win over White Sox

CHICAGO (AP) — Mark Teixeira and Texas Rangers teammates are the latest team to rough up Mark Buehrle and the Chicago White Sox.

Michael Young and Teixeira hit back-to-back homers off Buehrle to lead the Rangers to a 10-3 victory on Friday night.

Buehrle has lost his last four starts and during the span he has given up 27 runs in 21 1-3 innings for the White Sox, who have lost eight of their last 10 games and are 1-6 since the All-Star break.

"If you expand the zone and swing at his pitch you're not going to have any success. We did a good job of hitting pitches we could handle and we got to him," said Teixeira, who broke out of a 2-for-20 slump with the home run.

Kevin Mench hit a three-run homer in the eighth for the Rangers and Brad Wilkerson added a solo shot in the ninth.

Jim Thome hit his 462nd career home run and Joe Crede also homered for the White Sox.

With the loss, the White Sox trail the first-place Detroit Tigers by 6 1/2 games in the AL Central, but they maintained a 2 1/2-game lead over the New York Yankees in the wild card.

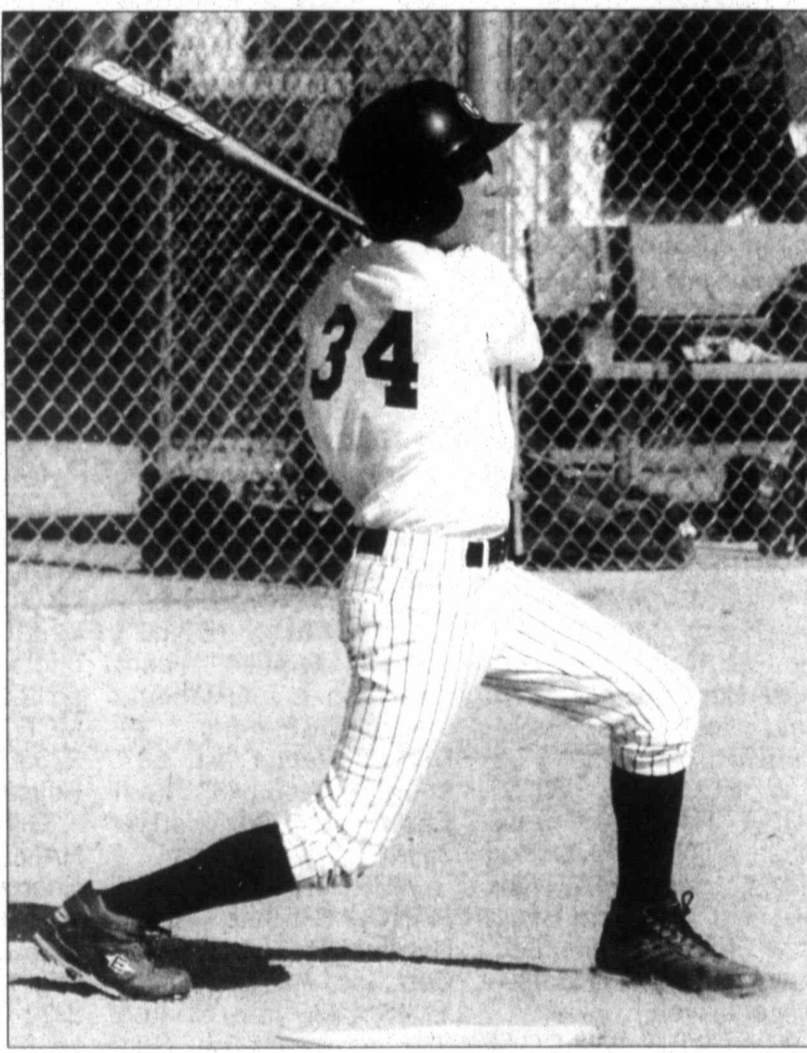
"I told them to just continue to play. We know we're going to win a lot of games, but the main thing is good teams come out of slumps quicker than others and we have to come out the quickest we can," White Sox manager Ozzie Guillen said.

Trailing 1-0, the Rangers tied the game in the third inning on a sacrifice fly by Wilkerson. With two outs and a runner on, Buehrle walked Ian Kinsler and Young followed with his eighth homer, a three-run shot to left. Three pitches later, Teixeira followed with his 13th home run to left-center, giving the Rangers a 5-1 lead.

The Rangers have hit consecutive home runs eight times this season.

"Buehrle is tough. He's always been tough on me," Young said. "I haven't really been following his last couple of starts, but that's the least of my concerns. As far as I'm concerned he's still one of the best in the league and always will be. We know every time we face him we have our work cut out for us."

Buehrle (9-8) was booed as he walked back to the dugout after retiring the Rangers in the third. He pitched seven innings, allowing five runs and seven hits. He had four strikeouts and walked two.

## Bonds relieved by legal reprieve

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Barry Bonds received a temporary reprieve from his legal troubles only to find himself injured again on the field.

Bonds expressed "relief" that the federal grand jury considering possible perjury and tax-evasion charges against him expired without an indictment.

Just when things looked up for the slugger and after he gave his right knee a clean bill of health, he hurt the other one.

Bonds left the Giants' 8-2 victory over San Diego on Friday night because of a bruised left knee following a leadoff single in the third inning, giving way to pinch-runner and defensive replacement Todd Linden. Bonds, hit by Jake Peavy's pitch in the first inning, was listed as day-to-day.

Bonds, who hit his 722nd career home run Thursday night in a win over the Padres, declined to talk to reporters Thursday only hours after federal prosecutors decided not to indict him for now, but he made a journal entry on his personal Web site.

"First off, I would like to say that what happened today is not a moment of joy for me, but one of temporary relief," Bonds said in his latest posting on <http://www.barrybonds.com>. "This has been an issue that has surrounded me for the past three years and I hope that this is the end. ...

"An investigation happened and hopefully it

is over. I do want to make it clear that there are no hard feelings for the legal process, but I feel there comes a point where everyone needs to move on."

Asked later if he wanted to add anything to what he said on his site, Bonds told The Associated Press, "It speaks for itself."

He turns 42 on Monday and his right knee is feeling better than it has for a long time, he said. The Giants' star underwent three operations on the knee last year, causing him to miss all but 14 games in 2005.

"I feel great," he said before the game Friday. "My knee feels 100-percent. I'm not lifting heavy like I used to. My body is just sore because I'm older."

Bonds had been running well again and has turned some of the extra weight he was carrying around his middle into muscle, though he noted his weight hasn't changed much. He is listed at 228 pounds.

"I haven't lost much weight, but I've lost my belly," he said. "I'm down from six or seven meals a day to three and supplementing with protein shakes."

Stress has affected his appetite, too, he said. The investigation into Bonds is still ongoing, but it appears less likely that an indictment would have an impact on him and the Giants this season, which could be his last in San Francisco after 14 years with the club.

## Coach killed, teen injured while moving goal post

GIRARD, Kan. (AP) — A high school football coach was electrocuted and a teenager severely burned Friday while trying to move a goal post near power lines at the Girard High School practice football field, authorities said.

Craig Crespino, 45, was pronounced dead at the scene, authorities said.

A 16-year-old boy was taken to St. John's Regional Medical Center in Joplin, Mo. His name and condition were not immediately known.

The two were moving a steel pipe goal post when it grazed a 7,200-volt power line just before noon, the Crawford County Sheriff's Department said.

Crespino, a high school physical education teacher, had coached the Trojan football team since 1992. He also coached the boys' track team and served as one of Girard High School's two activities directors.

## Kemp charged with drug possession

HOUSTON (AP) — Former NBA player Shawn Kemp faces a July 28 court appearance after he was arrested and charged Friday for possession of marijuana.

Kemp, 36, was arrested following a traffic stop for driving without a license plate shortly after midnight Friday. An officer with the Harris County Sheriff's Department pulled Kemp over and said he noticed the smell of burning marijuana coming from Kemp's vehicle.

The officer and later found less than 2 ounces of the illegal drug in Kemp's possession.

The six-time NBA All-Star player was released from the Harris County Jail after posting a \$500 cash bond.

After 14 seasons with the Seattle SuperSonics, Cleveland Cavaliers, Portland Trail Blazers and Orlando Magic, Kemp retired from the league in 2003 and now lives in Houston.

# Childress team closing in on competition

(AP) — Richard Childress never got to the point where he hated coming to the race track, but there were times in the past five years when he rather would have been hunting or fishing.

Since his longtime driver and friend Dale Earnhardt was killed in a crash during the 2001 Daytona 500, Richard Childress Racing, once considered one of the elite teams in NASCAR, has struggled just to be competitive.

"I hated seeing the faces in the race shop," said Childress, who won six championships with Earnhardt as his driver. "Nobody was smiling."

"We just couldn't find the right combination of people and equipment. It was tough on everybody on our team because we were used to winning races and winning championships and, all of a sudden, it wasn't happening."

For the first two years of NASCAR's Chase for the Nextel Cup championship, RCR was little more than an observer, with Kevin Harvick, the team's marquis driver, failing to qualify for the 10-man, 10-race play-off.

But thanks to some major personnel moves within the team, a lot of determination and a renewed excitement, it looks like RCR is back.

Heading into the Cup race this Sunday in Pocono, just seven races from the start of the Chase, Jeff Burton is third in the points and Harvick is eighth. Even rookie Clint Bowyer is having a solid season and is 16th in the standings.

"You've always got to be happy when you make any kind of progress," Childress said. "We know we've got a lot more we've got to accomplish to get the teams and the cars to where we want to be to win consistently and be

in the top five consistently. And that's what you've got to have to run for a championship.

"But the improvements alone that we've made in our aero programs, our engines, our cars, our chassis, personnel, it's been a pleasure to sit back and watch all these guys and ladies do their jobs and get these teams up and running. And the smiles are a lot bigger. So it's fun."

One big question heading into this season was whether Harvick, the driver who stepped into Earnhardt's big shoes in 2001, would stick around for the resurgence.

He spent much of the past two seasons complaining about team's lack of success and appeared ready to walk away.

Harvick would have been a free agent after this season and he certainly would have been a target for the new Toyota teams entering Cup in 2007. But, after seeing the direction RCR was headed late last season and early this year, Harvick signed a multiyear contract extension - perhaps the most significant evidence that Childress has turned it around.

"We're not all the way where we need to be with our cars and engines and things like that," said Harvick, who gave RCR its only Cup victory of the season early this year in Phoenix. "We've made a lot of strides, but we've got to continue to make progress. It's down to small things now. We've come a long way in a short amount of time. I think we're pretty close."

Childress, Harvick and Bowyer all give a lot of credit for the new attitude - and the improved results - to veteran racer Burton, who joined the team

midway through the 2004 season.

"Everybody at RCR has played a role, but Jeff has played a big role in the improvement," said Bowyer, who bears a resemblance to Burton, both on and off the track. "He has a lot of experience and he came from a successful team over at Roush (Racing). I think he's brought a lot to the table, a lot of ideas, a lot of input on where we need to be, where we need to change. And Richard listened to him."

Burton, the elder statesman of the RCR drivers at 39, said, "The big thing is, we have faster cars."

"When you have a 16th-place car, you finish 11th and you think you've done a really good job and everybody else thinks you're lousy," he added. "You leave the racetrack feeling like you got all there was, but you finished 16th and you just can't get anything done."

"But, now, we have revisited and rebuilt every part of our program, everything from marketing and merchandising to shock expertise and chassis and bodies. For the most part, we've seen improvements in every area."

Childress is a realist, though. He knows that a couple of bad races before the Chase could ruin a lot of good things that have happened this year. Still, he grinned when asked how big it would be for RCR to have two drivers in the play-off.

"It would be huge," Childress said. "We've been in a rebuilding mode, a growth mode, since 2001."

"We're still not over the loss of Dale. We never will be, but it's one of those things you've just got to work past, and we're making progress."

# Knee surgery sidelines Faulk for 2006 season, career now in doubt

ST. LOUIS (AP) — St. Louis Rams running back Marshall Faulk will have major reconstructive knee surgery and miss the 2006 season.

The 2000 NFL MVP is expected to have the surgery on one of his knees next week.

Faulk is ninth on the career rushing list with 12,279 yards, 34 yards behind Jim Brown. But he hasn't had a 1,000-yard season since 2001 and lost his starting job in 2004 when the Rams drafted Steven Jackson in the first round.

# Hamlin on pole at Pocono; Bourdais paces Grand Prix

LONG POND, Pa. (AP) — Denny Hamlin is the new driver to beat at Pocono Raceway, winning the pole at the track where he scored his first career victory.

Hamlin, who won here last month, posted a qualifying lap of 169.827 mph to grab the pole.

Ryan Newman was second, and Kasey Kahne was third, followed by Hendrick Motorsports teammates Brian Vickers and Jeff

Gordon. EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — Sebastien Bourdais won the provisional pole for the Edmonton Grand Prix after the opening round of time trials.

Bourdais' lap of 59.895 seconds (118.588 mph) guaranteed the two-time defending series champion a front row start on Sunday and gave him one point, extending his lead over A.J. Allmendinger to 24 points.

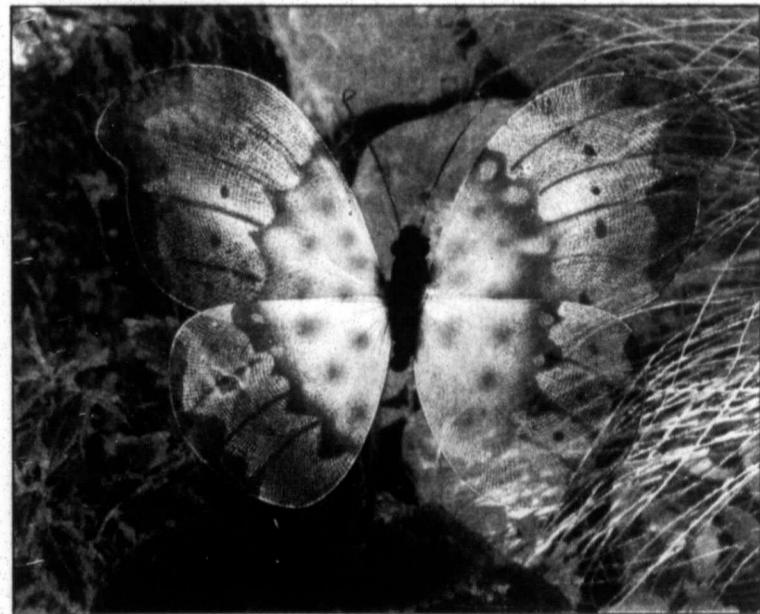


Las Pampas Koi and Water Garden Society's annual pond tour was held Saturday with 15 homes participating in the event.

## Ex-Pentagon officials accused of fraud

Two former Pentagon officials, including an acting secretary of the Navy, have been accused of scheming with a banned American contractor to get lucrative rebuilding contracts in Iraq, The Associated Press has learned.

The contracting firm, Custer Battles LLC, was suspended two years ago by the military for submitting millions of dollars in fake invoices.

The charges come in a sealed federal lawsuit, a copy of which was obtained by The AP. It was filed by two whistleblowers — one of whom won a \$10 million judgment in another suit when a federal jury agreed that Custer Battles had swindled the government.

The current suit names former acting Navy Secretary Hansford T. Johnson, former acting Navy Undersecretary Douglas Combs, and Custer Battles LLC officials including founders Scott Custer and Mike Battles, who were barred in 2004 after billing the government for work that was never done and for padding invoices by much as 100 percent.

Also named were six companies connected to the contracting firm, including Windmill International Ltd., a worldwide contractor run by Combs and Johnson, and a Romanian company, Danubia Global, which

purchased Custer Battles in 2005.

The new lawsuit contends Custer and Battles, both Army veterans with Washington political connections, tried to get around the suspension order by plotting with Johnson and Combs "to set up sham companies (thereby) concealing their ownership and control of those entities."

According to the suit filed in Virginia, the shell companies committed other illegal acts, including selling weapons on the Iraqi black market, creating a dangerous possibility that "insurgents could buy them and use them to attack U.S. soldiers."

In both lawsuits, a plaintiff is former Custer Battles associate Robert Isakson. He is also a former FBI agent.

His \$10 million judgment, won in March, is the first civil fraud verdict arising from the Iraq war. Isakson and a former associate contended Custer Battles created imaginary off-shore companies that overcharged the Coalition Provisional Authority, which ran Iraq after the 2003 invasion, by as much as \$50 million.

Isakson is joined in the current action by Rory Mayberry, a medic who said he was fired last year from a Custer Battles shell company after pointing out fraud. Under the federal False Claims Act, whistleblowers may file suits on behalf of the government and collect a portion of awarded damages.

## Florida couple earns pretty penny from sale of rare coin

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Nowadays, pennies aren't even worth the metal they're made with. A rare few, however, can fetch 600 million times their worth.

Denis Loring and Donna Levin, of Singer Island, reaped a windfall from a copper 1792 penny the couple bought last year at a Beverly

Hills auction for \$437,000.

Two months ago, the penny sold for a whopping \$660,000 to an East Coast energy company executive who wished to remain anonymous, said Greg Rohan, president of Dallas-based Heritage Auction Galleries, which arranged the transaction. The couple took home

\$600,000. Heritage made a \$60,000 commission.

The coin had originally been owned by descendants of Oliver Wolcott, a signer of the Declaration of Independence and Connecticut's governor in the 1790s.

The chocolate-colored rare coin, one of only nine known to exist,

bears the date 1792, the inscription "Parent of Science & Indust: Liberty," and the likeness of a woman's head representing "Miss Liberty."

"As silly as it sounds, coins like this, you don't really ever own. You get to be a custodian," Loring said Friday. "It was here long

before I was here, and it will be here long after I'm gone."

He said the new owner has a "multimillion-dollar coin collection."

Levin, Loring's wife, said her husband had been trying for years to get her interested in coin collecting.

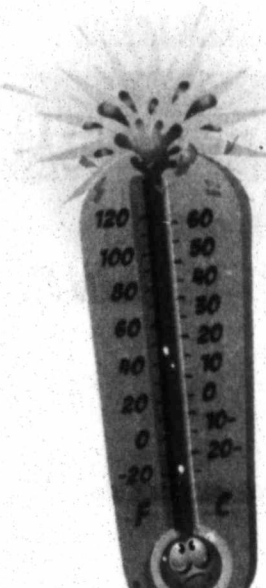
