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

### Economy: Inflation up by small amount on wholesale level

InfWASHINGTON (AP) -Inflation at the wholesale level edged up by the smallest amount in five months in July as falling food prices helped offset another rise in energy costs.

The Labor Department reported that wholesale prices increased a

slight 0.1 percent in July, far below the 0.5 percent jump in June. The improvement reflected a retreat in food prices, which fell by 0.3 percent in July, after having surged by 1.4 percent in June, which had been the biggest increase in nearly two

Federal Reserve policy-makers broke a two-year string of interest rate increases last week, saying they believed that a slowing economy would help restrain inflation pressures. But some private economists are worried that the relentless rise in energy costs could force the

Fed to resume rate increases in

coming months. The 0.1 percent rise in the government's Producer Price Index represented the smallest amount of inflation since wholesale prices actually fell by 1.2 percent in


Environmental Quality Incentives Program.

#### Twenty-eight states reporting decline in home sales

WASHINGTON (AP) -The slowdown in the oncesizzling housing market is spreading, with 28 states and the District of Columbia reporting spring sales declines, led by big drops in former boom areas of Florida and Arizona,

California. Nationally, sales were down 7 percent in the April-June quarter this year compared with the same period in 2005, the National Association of Realtors said Tuesday in its latest stateby-state look at housing conditions around the coun-

The Realtors survey showed that the biggest declines occurred in states that had been enjoying redhot sales during the fiveyear housing boom.

The five biggest declines this spring compared to the April-June period of 2005 were Arizona, down 26.9 percent; Florida, down 26.7 percent; California, down 25.3 percent; Virginia, down 23.9 percent, and Nevada, down 23.5 percent.

The Realtors report depicted a tale of two housing markets, with former

boom areas experiencing declines and other areas of moderate sales gains during the boom years experiencing strong growth.

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
In all, 20 states had sales gains in the spring, led by Alaska, which enjoyed a 48.6 percent jump in sales; followed by Arkansas, up 17.9 percent; Texas, up 11.3 percent; North Carolina, up 11 percent, and Vermont, up 9.1 percent compared to the spring of 2005.

"States with moderately priced areas that have experienced healthy job creation are seeing sales gains," said David Lereah, chief economist for the Realtors. "The economic backdrop remains favorable for the housing market, which is helping home sales level out."

In a separate survey of price changes in 151 metropolitan areas, the Realtors reported that 26 metro areas experienced outright price declines while 37 areas were still enjoying double-digit price increases.

The biggest price drops in percentage terms were in Danville, Ill., where home prices fell by 11.2 percent in the spring compared with the spring of 2005, and the Detroit area, where home prices were down 8 percent.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The big guns have barely fallen silent in Lebanon but already President Bush and the State Department are finding cause for cheer in the outcome of the 34-day war between Israel and Hezbollah militia.

It is an optimistic view echoing in

Israel, too, where Prime Minister Ehud Olmert says the "state within a state" that Hezbollah had in place in southern Lebanon has been blown away, its arsenal shattered.

In their upbeat assessment, both the United States and Israel are placing their blue chips on the emergence of a strengthened and democratic Lebanon via the cease-fire resolution approved unanimously last week by the U.N. Security Council.

15,000 With Lebanese troops and

another 15,000 foreign troops perhaps only weeks away from deployment near the border with Israel, Bush said Hezbollah no longer can keep Lebanon from becoming a democracy.

While the way forward is going to be difficult and require more sacrifice, the president said, "We can be confident of the outcome because we know and understand the unstoppable power of freedom.

"Forces of terror see the changes that are taking place in their midst," he said Monday. "They understand that the advance of liberty, the freedom to worship, the freedom to dissent, the protection of human rights, would be a defeat for their hateful ideology.'

The cease-fire does not propose the eradication of Hezbollah, but it revived a two-year old Security Council demand for the milita's disarmament, a tough job that the Lebanese government did not

> attempt on its own. Even now, the Bush administration is not calling for the uprooting of the group designated by the State Department as a terror-

ist organization. But spokesman Sean McCormack said it had to make a choice between being a political or a terrorist organization.

"Hopefully, won't have to live with such a term, Hezbollah guerrilla, for much longer," he said.

"Hezbollah suffered a defeat in this crisis,' Bush said at the State

Department Monday after conferring with Vice President Dick Cheney, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and national security officials.

"The reason why is, this is because there is going to be a new power in the south of Lebanon, and that's going to be a Lebanese force with a robust international force to help them seize control of the country," Bush said.

Sounding the same positive note, McCormack declared, "You will not have Hezbollah roaming freely in the south of Lebanon.

reflect the hope, the dreams, the joys and the sorrows of America's citizens.

Having been at it a little over a year now, Bettinger said they have recorded some 7,500 interviews.

For the first two weeks of August, the Story Corps crew was in Garden City working with High Plains Public Radio. Thursday, the crew will move to the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce parking lot at 10th and Polk.

Stacy Yates with High Plains Public Radio said that they have already set up 31 interviews in Amarillo and are trying to arrange more.

Yates said they hope to record at least 50 interviews with Panhandle residents. One White Deer resident will be interviewed by her

Each person interviewed will get a CD of the hourlong interview. The original recording will go on file in the Library of Congress.

Every Friday, National Public Radio's Morning Edition airs a clip from one of the Story Corps interviews from somewhere in the country.

"It's played by all the public radio stations across the country," Bettinger said.

Yates said that the local recordings will be played on High Plains Public Radio, the National Public Radio affiliate in western Kansas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and Texas Panhandle.

"Right now our plan is to produce as many of those as possible," Yates said, "and air one once a week.'

Yates said that tentatively, High Plains Public Radio plans to air the local recordings on Monday mornings near the time of the national Story Corps stories.

"They'll be on the Web, too," Yates said. "We hope that we'll still be airing stories from this visit this time next year. We hope we get about 50 or more good stories."

A Dell spokesman said Monday that the Sony batteries were placed in notebooks that were shipped between April 1, 2004, and July 18 of this

"In rare cases, a shortcircuit could cause the battery to overheat, causing a risk of smoke and/or fire," said the spokesman, Ira Williams. "It happens in rare cases, but we opted to take this broad action immediately."

The battery packs were included in some models of Round Rock, Texas-

DALLAS (AP) — In based Dell's Latitude, Inspiron, XPS and precision mobile workstation. teryprogram.com, that described the affected models. Williams said the Web site would tell consumers how to get free replacement batteries from Dell.

Rick Clancy, a Sony spokesman, said the companies have studied problems with the battery packs intensely for more than a month, after getting reports of about a halfdozen fires or smoking laptops in the United States.

Lithium-ion batteries have been around for about a decade and are used in devices such as cell phones and digital music players.

## Does Pluto qualify as the ninth planet or not?

We grew up being taught that there are nine planets in the solar system - Mercury, Venus, Earth, Mars, Jupiter, Satarn, Uranus, Neptune, and Pluto.

Now scientists are questioning that knowledge. Some say Pluto shouldn't be classified as a planet. Others say another, larger, celestial body, discovered farther out from the sun than Pluto, should be designated as a 10th planet in our system.

Why the big debate over Pluto's status and that of its newly discovered neighbor?

It seems that no one has ever bothered to come up with the definition of a planet. That's right. None of the world's astronomers, present and past, have ever decided exactly what should be considered a planet.

That has left the door open to debate, not only concerning Pluto and its newly discovered neighbor, but even on the gaseous planets like Jupiter.

The basic definition of a planet, as most of us have understood it, is a non-luminous celestial body larger than an asteroid or comet that revolves around a star which illuminates it.

Pluto meets that loose definition, but the problem is that it does not behave like our other planets. It is part of a disc-shaped zone beyond

NASA admitted Monday that it has been searching for over a year for about 700 boxes filled with transmissions from that historic Apollo mission, but so far has been unable to locate them.

NASA has copies of the television broadcasts, but those images are of lower quality than the originals which were stored on the missing magnetic tapes.

Things like that don't do much for our confidence in the competence of government agencies, do they?

## Correct minimum wage vision

out a selfish hidden agenda, who support increases in minimum wages as a means to help lowskilled workers, and there are other decent people, with the identical goal, who strongly oppose increases in the minimum wage. So the question is: How can people who share the same goals, helping low-skilled workers, come up with polar opposite means that produce polar opposite results?

It all depends on one's initial premise. It would do us some good to make our initial premises explicit and check them against reality. One initial premise is that an employer needs a certain number of workers to accomplish a given task. That being the case, increasing the minimum wage simply means that all low-skilled workers will enjoy a higher salary and employers will have lower profits and/or customers will pay higher prices. With this vision of how the world operates, the logic of increasing the minimum wage as a means of helping low-skilled workers is impecca-

Another initial premise is that there is no fixed number of workers necessary to accomplish a given task. Employers might be able to substitute capital for labor such as using dishwashing machines instead of dishwashers, automatic elevators instead of elevator operators, self-service gasoline stations rather than fullservice gasoline stations, online

There are decent people, with- reservations rather than reservation clerks or relocating their operation overseas. People who

share this initial premise can still have concern for the welfare of low-skilled workers but argue that increasing minimum wages will cause unemployment for some of them and deny job opportunities for others. Given their initial premise, the logic of their argument is also impecca-

Thus, the question to decide is which initial premise best describes how the world operates. Is it the one that says there's a fixed number of workers necessary to perform a given task, or the one that says employers have flexibility in the mix of workers and capital they use and where in the world they can choose to manufacture? I think the latter description more properly describes how the world oper-

Place yourself in the position of an employer and ask: If a worker costs me, say, \$7 in wages, plus mandated fringes such as Social Security, unemployment compensation, sick and vacation leave, making the true hourly cost of hiring a worker \$9

an hour, does it pay me to hire a worker who's so unfortunate to have skills that enable him to produce only \$5 or \$6 worth of value per hour? Most employers would conclude that doing so would be a losing economic proposition.

There are a couple other villains in the piece that force employers to respond to increases in wages that exceed a worker's productivity. If he did hire such workers, he would earn lower profits. Soon, investors would abandon him and put their money where returns are higher.

There's another villain - the customer. If the employer retained workers whose wages exceeded their productivity, to cover his costs he would have to charge you and me higher product or service prices. I don't know about you, but I prefer lower prices to higher prices, and I'd switch my patronage to those firms who adjusted to the higher labor cost.

Congress can easily mandate higher wages, but they cannot mandate higher worker productivity or that employers hire a particular worker in the first place. Those of us who truly care about the welfare of low-skilled workers should focus our energies on helping them to become more productive, and a good start would be to do something about the rotten education that many receive.

## Texas Thoughts

Austin American-Statesman on Texas' advantage in later primaries:

On Tuesday, voters in the Connecticut Democratic primary, after a hotly contested campaign, will decide whether to renominate U.S. Sen. Joe Lieberman, who was the Democratic vice presidential candidate in 2000, or nominate challenger Ned Lamont.

We don't have an endorsement for Connecticut Democrats. But we note that their party primary is in early August just three months before the November election and a long five months after Texas held its own party primaries in March. Ten other states also hold party primaries this month.

There's a big advantage to selecting candidates so much closer to the November election than Texans do. In Lieberman's case, for example, voters have had five more months to see how world, national and state events unfold and how he and other candidates

respond to them. Whether the controversy is the war in Iraq or Lebanon, domestic surveillance, taxes, minimum wage, pension legislation, gasoline prices or stem cells, a lot has happened in the past five months, and Connecticut voters are better off for not having had to choose their nominees until now.

Furthermore, once the Connecticut primary is held Tuesday, there will be an intense but relatively short three months for voters to consider the campaigns of party nominees and independents leading up to the November election. Texans, in contrast, selected their nominees back in March and still have three months to go.

Texas held its primaries in early July until the Legislature in 1959 moved it to May to accommodate the ambitions of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, who planned to run for president the next year. The Legislature moved the primary date back again, to March, along with several other states in a vain effort to create a large Southern presidential primary known as "Super Tuesday," which has never worked as intended.

That change, which took effect in 1988, is still the law.

This year, Gov. Rick Perry called the Legislature into a critical special session for public education in April after party primaries on March 7. If the primaries were held in July or August, the Legislature probably would have met already and primary voters would know just what the incumbents had done about taxes and schools.

Today in Texas, the hottest races are likely to be in the Republican primary; fewer than a dozen of this November's general election for 181 state senator and representative seats are expected to offer much of a race, thanks to legislative redistricting that makes most districts safe for one party or the other.

Moving the primary date closer to the election at least to May, but perhaps even later in the summer would give voters more timely information and demand less of their time to hear out the candidates.

When it convenes in January, the Legislature should move the primary date to later in the year.

## Nevin homer helps Cubs defeat Astros | Pampa one of five

Cubs 3, Astros 0

HOUSTON (AP) Despite pitching out of iams most of the game, Carlos Zambrano still handled the Houston Astros on Monday night.

Zambrano dominated Houston for the third time this season and Phil Nevin homered and drove in all Chicago Cubs to a 3-0 victory over the Astros.

Zambrano (13-5)allowed four hits and struck out five in eight innings to improve to 6-1 at Minute Maid Park.

"I felt strong the whole game," said Zambrano, who threw 121 pitches.

Astros starter Roy Oswalt was hit in the right wrist by Ronny Cedeno's line drive in the seventh.

Oswalt retired two batters to finish the inning, then left the game and was listed as day-to-day.

"He's going to be a little sore," Houston manager Phil Garner said. "But right now, we're thinking he's going to be able to make his next start."

Zambrano, who had a three runs to lead the one-hit shutout in Houston on June 5, spent most of this night avoiding trouble. His outing also included seven walks, a wild pitch and a hit batter. However, the flustered Astros — with an NL-worst .258 batting average — stranded nine runners and dropped their third straight game.

Cubs manager Dusty Baker didn't hesitate to send Zambrano out for the eighth. After walking Aubrey Huff, Zambrano retired the next three in order.

Ryan Dempster pitched a scoreless ninth for his 12th consecutive save, and 24th in 29 chances.

Zambrano didn't retire the Astros in order until the seventh, but still outpitched Oswalt (9-8) who had won three of his last four decisions. Oswalt struck out four, but

allowed seven hits, including Nevin's homer in the fourth.

The Astros threatened for the first time in the third inning. Willy Taveras beat

Player and coach introductions will begin with the seventh grade at 7 p.m., concluding with varsity players and coaches.


Game On
