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## Pampa High Hall of Fame inductees named



Culberson

Plans have begun for the Pampa High School Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony at 10 a.m. on Oct. 6 in McNeely Field House at PHS.

Superintendent Barry Haenisch, PHS Principal Danny Seabourn and PHS Student Body President Maggie Hopkins have announced that James Orr, class of 1952, and Edward Culberson, class of 1955, are the latest inductees into the hall.

Orr is being recognized for his service to his country, his reputation as a scholar and his many accomplishments in both military and civilian life.

Col. Orr graduated from Rice Institute (now Rice University) in 1957 with a bachelor of science in civil engineering. Upon graduation he entered the Marine Corps, and

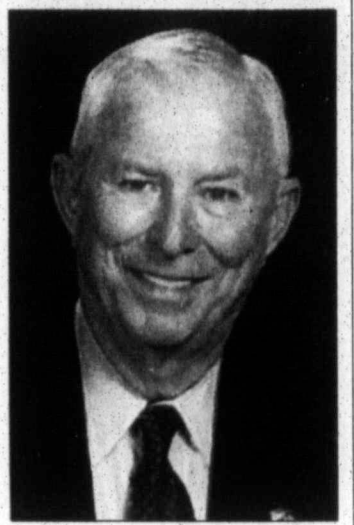
rose to the rank of colonel.

During his military career he attended the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School and the Naval War College in Newport, R.I., both of which he completed with distinction. Col. Orr was truly a pioneer in Marine aviation, helping to develop many aircraft as a test pilot.

He was the commanding officer for Marine Attack Squadron-513, the first AV-8 Harrier squadron. He then served as the program manager for the second generation Harrier, the AV-8B, which was key weapons system in the 1991 Iraq war and the 2003 Iraq war.

His military decorations include the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star, Air Medal,

## Family struggles after losing everything in fire

About the only thing that could be salvaged from a fire Aug. 21 which destroyed a family's trailer home was a family Bible which had been burned around the edges.

"The next afternoon, I went to my trailer to see if anything was salvageable," said LaRhonda Willhite, who with six of her seven children had occupied the trailer her aunt had deeded to her less than a year ago.

"Fire Marshal Keith Fisher brought out my family Bible. It had been burned all around the edges, but Jesus' picture wasn't touched," she said.

Willhite and her children were spending the night at her mother's home when the fire occurred. Strangely enough, a fire also occurred at her mother's home that same night at about the same time.

Nancy Lowther of 828 Scott was awakened in the early hours that Monday by her dog, Molly, which was barking from the yard.

"She looked out a window and saw flames. She grabbed two of my kids, shouting 'Fire!'" Willhite said.

Lowther, Willhite, and all seven of Willhite's children, including Felicia Boden, 18, the oldest, who lived with Lowther, were able to get out of Lowther's home to safety.

Willhite tried to call 911 on Lowther's cordless phone, but the phone was dead. She went to a neighbor's house to ask them to call, and their phone was also dead.

"All the phones on both sides of her street were out," Willhite said.

She then got in her van and discovered her right front tire had been flattened. Two of her mother's tires had been cut, also, she said.

She drove on the flat to her house at 914 E. Denver, just around a corner and down the next street from her mother's home, to call in and report the fire from there.

That's when she discovered her home was in flames, too.

Willhite drove to the nearest Taylor Mart and reported both fires, which were logged in at 4:09 a.m., according to Pampa Fire Department records.

The fire at Lowther's home destroyed a storage building and damaged two back windows, some trim on the side of the house, and two air conditioners. A utility pole which provided electric service to Lowther's home was also damaged by the fire.

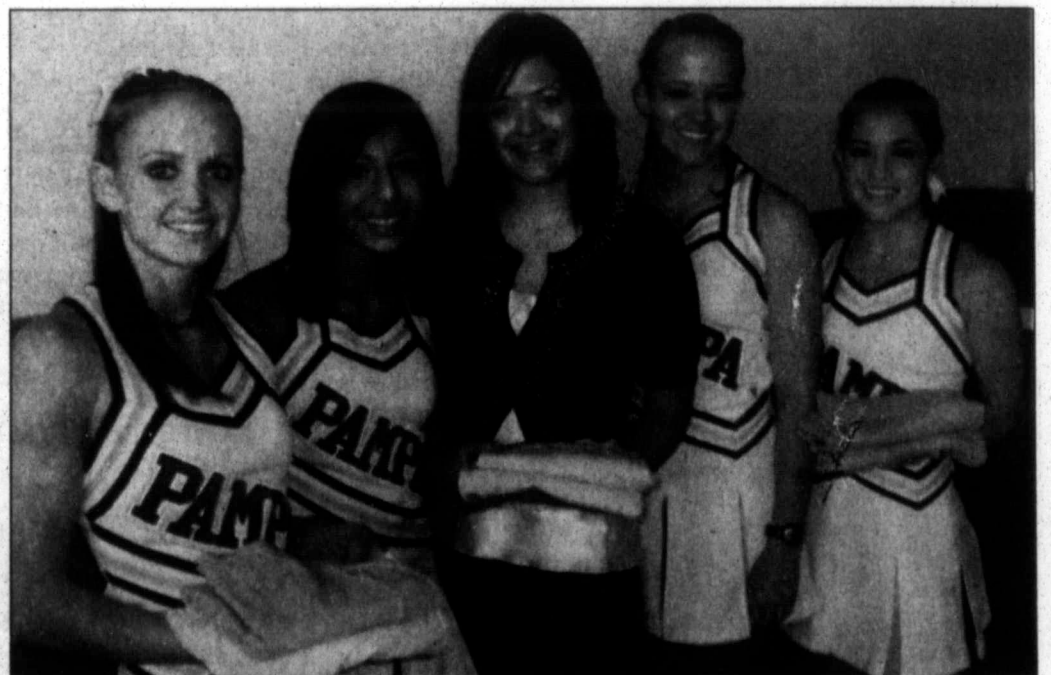
Willhite had worse luck. Her trailer was a total loss.

"My house was pretty much gone," she said of the moment she

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## Bush pushes plan for detainee trials

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush pressed Congress on Saturday to approve his plan for prosecuting suspected terrorists, a proposal lawmakers could debate as early as next week. "As soon as Congress acts to authorize these military

commissions, we will prosecute these men and send a clear message to those who kill Americans: No matter how long it takes, we will find you and bring you to justice," Bush said in his weekly radio address. "As we bring terrorists to justice, we're acting to secure the homeland."

The radio address marked the fourth time this week that Bush has delivered a message about the war on terror. The series of speeches gave Bush an opportunity to buttress the GOP's national security credentials just two

months before the critical congressional elections on Nov. 7.

In his speeches, delivered on the eve of the anniversary of the attacks of Sept. 11, 2001, Bush described the enemies and their motives and outlined steps the administration has taken to protect the nation.

He also acknowledged for the first time that the CIA runs secret prisons overseas and uses tough interrogation techniques to get suspected terrorists to divulge information about their networks and plots.

Bush wants Congress to support new legislation the White House drafted for prosecuting suspected terrorists for war crimes. A new plan was needed after the Supreme Court ruled in June that an earlier plan violated U.S. and international law.

Senate leaders back the plan. But some Republicans support alternative legislation, and several of the military's top lawyers worry that Bush's plan could violate treaty obligations and make U.S. troops vulnerable.

Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., has placed the White House proposal on the Senate calendar, allowing debate to begin as early as Tuesday, the day after the nation mourns the loss of the nearly 3,000 victims of the Sept. 11 attacks.

"On this anniversary, we also remember the brutality of the enemy who struck our country and renew our resolve to defeat this enemy and secure a future of peace and freedom," Bush said in the radio speech. He will address the nation Monday after visiting the Sept. 11 targets in New York, Shanksville, Pa., and the Pentagon.

Democrats, hoping to make the November midterm elections a referendum on Bush's policies in Iraq and the war on terror, argued again this week that Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld be made to step down.

They contend the White House has mishandled the war, failed to prosecute terrorists and mismanaged the detainee system.

Some Democrats say the first step toward making Americans safe is to chart a new course in Iraq.

National Defense Service Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, and Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal.

After retiring from the Marines in 1983, he established a distinguished record in the aviation industry.

He served for eight years as vice president and general manager of Dowty and Smiths Industries Controls, Inc. He then formed J.W. Orr Associates and served as a consultant for several aerospace companies, including five years with Boeing on the Joint Strike Fighter airplane.

Orr continues to be a viable leader after retirement as he devotes countless hours to his community of Lago Vista, Texas, and to assisting with church mission projects.

Culberson is being recognized for his service to his country, and his many accomplishments in both military and civilian life.

Upon graduation, Culberson worked for the next few years at Celanese in Pampa, and then as a traffic policeman in

Lubbock. He then entered the U.S. Navy in 1959.

During his military career he attended the Navy's basic and advanced electronics schools, served as an electronic technician on the USS Norton Sound, AVM-1, which was a test platform for the Tarter, Terrier, and the Terrier Tarter missiles on the USS Isle Royale, AD-29, where he served as the ship's electronic material officer and 3-M coordinator.

His last command prior to retirement was at the Naval Communications Station in the Philippines, where he served simultaneously as the operations officer and command electronic material officer.

Also during this time, Culberson attended several universities as he moved to assignments around the world. He retired in 1981 from the Navy as a commissioned officer, chief warrant officer, W-4.

After his retirement from the Navy, he graduated from National University magna cum laude in business administration.

With the knowledge he gained while in the Navy, he immediately went to work at the Beckman Instruments Central Manufacturing Facility in Porterville, Calif., where he

worked as a manufacturing engineer. After three years, he accepted an engineering position with General Dynamics in Pomona, Calif.

During his civilian career, he primarily aided in the design and production of both the Navy's Phalanx Close-In-Weapon System and the Standard Missile surface-to-air systems.

He has also been involved in the Navy's Rolling Airframe Missile, the Army's Stinger, Ground-to-Air Missile System and the National Missile Defense System (Star Wars).

Culberson recently retired from Raytheon Missile Systems and currently resides with his wife, Jeri, in Sugar Land, Texas, where he is active in his community and enjoys woodworking, refurbishing old radios and playing with HO model trains.

discovered her home was on fire. "I lost everything except for my babies."

The tire which was flattened on her vehicle continues to go flat, and she cannot afford to repair or replace it right now. She said she has to get air in the tire every time she sets out to take the children to school or run an errand.

Both fires are under investigation by the city's fire marshal, she said. Lowther's fire started on top of the storage shed, and the fire at Willhite's trailer originated in the living room.

Willhite has had difficulty replacing the things that were lost in the trailer fire. She receives disability income and other public

assistance, and has limited resources at her disposal, she said.

She has found a house to live in, but needs just about everything with which to furnish it.

"I need a stove," she said. "The house I moved into has a fridge and that's it -- no stove, no heater. We need everything -- furniture and appliances."

Pampa High School, Wilson Elementary School and Tralee Crisis Center have helped with clothing for the children. The Eastern Texas Panhandle Chapter of the American Red Cross has helped with clothing and medicines.

Lowther, although her house is still standing, is living with Willhite and the children because she still doesn't have electric service at her home. The fire at her address resulted in loss of electricity to her house due to a burned utility pole

which Willhite said Lowther had been told she'd have to replace herself at a cost of about \$1,500, an amount she doesn't have. Lowther is also receiving disability income.

When asked what Willhite misses the most that she lost in the fire, she began to cry.

"All my kids' baby pictures. A picture of me and my brother and sister that no one else has a copy of," she said.

The children, who range in age from 3 to 18, have also felt loss.

"The things they miss the most are things my aunt left them before she died, because she meant a lot to them," Willhite said.

An account has been set up at FirstBank Southwest in care of Sharon Strickland for donations to help the family get back on their feet.

## Livestock still a mainstay of annual fair

AMARILLO — New buildings and trading spaces have allowed all of the livestock events to be moved to the northeast corner of the fairgrounds during this year's Texas Ford Dealers Tri-State Fair and Rodeo.

Livestock and agriculture-oriented events have been a mainstay of the fair and will continue to be in the future, said Virgil Bartlett, fair general manager.

This year, however, with some changes being made on the fairgrounds, Bartlett said the smaller animals such as goats, pigs and lambs, will be moved into the Glenn McMennamy Livestock Building's Cactus Arena.

At the same time, the larger cattle events will be moved into the newly built Livestock Pavilion, located just north of the Amarillo National Center, he said.

The number of livestock entries this year is already more than 2,200, and that number will grow when the horses are entered at show time during fair week.

In addition to the livestock competitions, contestants will be entering the Garden and Pasture ID

Vegetable/Agronomy Show, the Range and Pasture Plant Contest, the livestock judging contest and the 4-H and FFA Ag Mechanics contest.

A doorman and a young girl screened those entering. The girl would allow in those who looked "cool." She turned away those who she deemed as "not cool."

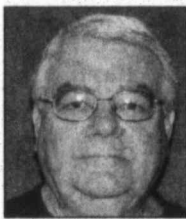
The message was that if you buy your clothes at this coat factory, you will automatically be cool. If you do not, you are relegated to a lesser status of being not cool.

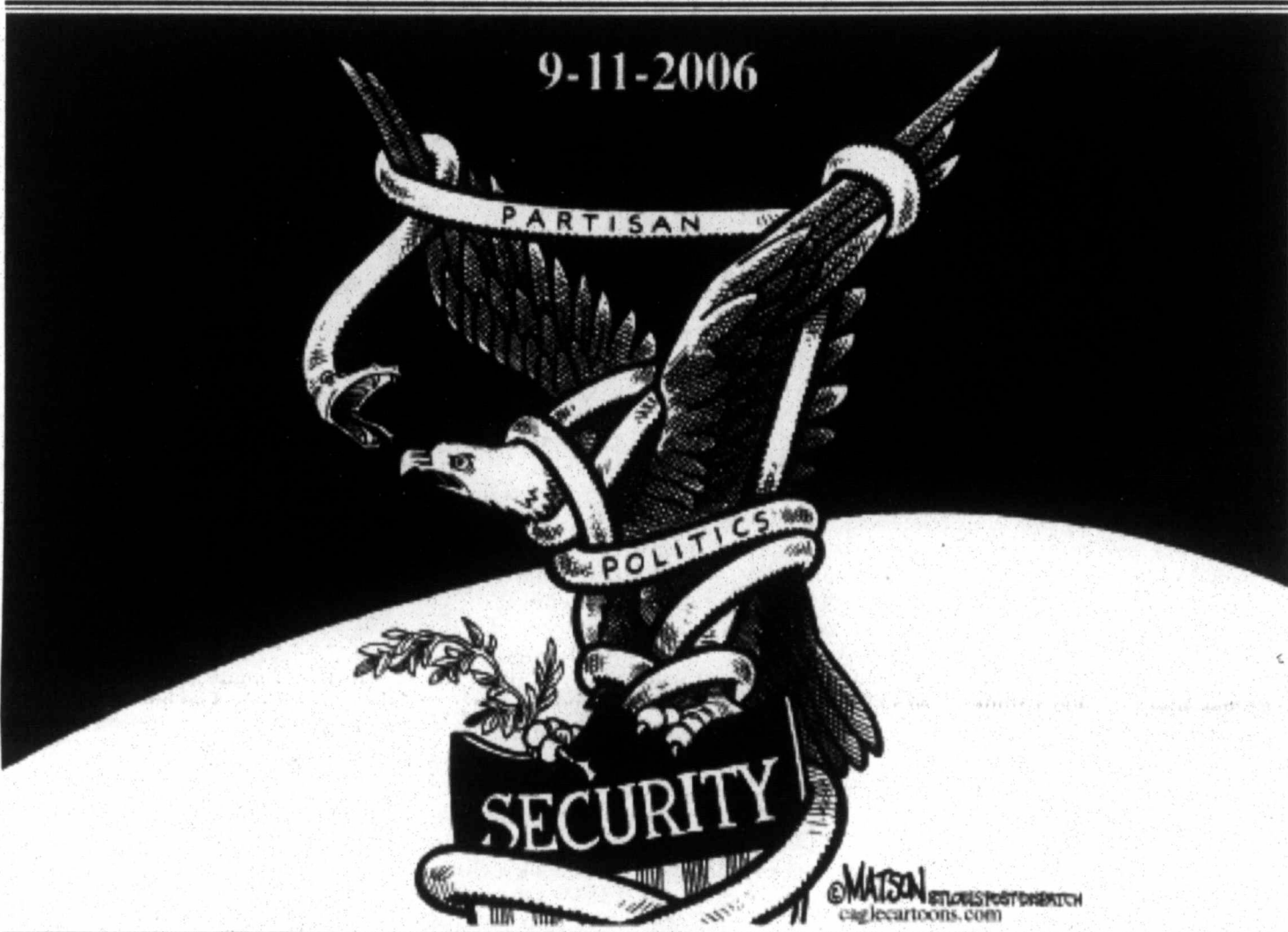

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## Texas Thoughts

■ Sept. 4

The Dallas Morning News on the growing wage gap:

For months now, the U.S. economy has emitted mixed signals. Worker productivity is racing. Yet worker wages are falling, and consumer confidence is as fickle as the Texas wind.

Wages and salaries now make up the smallest portion of the nation's gross domestic product since the late 1940s, in stark contrast to corporate profits, which are the highest share since the 1960s. The wage numbers are particularly illusory: The nation's most highly compensated workers continue to receive raises greater than the rate of inflation, which, on paper, is enough to keep average income and consumer spending looking deceptively stronger.

And while the unemployment rate is still surprising low an indication that new jobs are being created fewer Americans are saying jobs are "plentiful" and more are saying that jobs are "hard to get."

These are troubling and widening gaps between the haves and have-nots. The health of an economy can't be measured by the success of the wealthiest. It also has to be measured by the stability of the middle class, which historically has been the heart of the American economy.

The emergence of a prosperous, stable middle class after World War II offered economic hope and security. Middle-class incomes now are rising slower than housing, health care and education costs, putting middle-class families and neighborhoods at risk.

Some of the disparity and upheaval is the inevitable consequence of an economy in transition from unionized manu-

facturing jobs to white-collar service and information technology jobs. Outsourcing, downsizing and other strategies make corporations more competitive, at least in the short run. The flipside is that middle-income workers feel increasingly estranged from the spoils of their labor and that rips at society's fabric.

Louis Uchitelle, the New York Times economics writer and author of the new book *The Disposable American: Layoffs and Their Consequences* says these trends have far-reaching societal consequences. In an interview with *The Dallas Morning News* earlier this year, he said the concept of stakeholders used to include workers, the community and customers. Now, he says, top executives focus on stock price and compensation packages and less on other stakeholders.

A society is only as strong as the vast middle that binds it. That core mustn't be forgotten.

"Maude's always wanted to take a cruise, and I think that'd be a good time to take her."

I concurred, and offered to drive them to the port. Gas costs being so high, they depend on a golf cart for the dozen-mile winding road to town. And cruise lines don't serve their neck of the woods.

Mort is always the "designated talker." Others within range have listening roles. When he mentioned cruises, though, I muscled my way in to re-count a first-hand

Mediterranean cruise experience. ...

"A religious experience" is the way I described our most recent cruise aboard the Wind-Surf, a vessel with "MSY" designation. The abbreviations stand for "motorized sailing yacht."

He cocked his head at the description, and interest heightened when I spoke of the many magnificent churches visited in Barcelona. I told him about one there that has been under construction since the 1880's, with completion in sight by 2030.

"Man, that's a long time to be paying out building pledges," Mort joked. ...

Mort wondered why a sailing ship needs motors. I explained that motors are needed when the wind doesn't blow, or if it's from the wrong direction.

## Mackie kicks Pampa to 21-18 win

Harvester Field was dressed in its Sunday best Friday night. Shiny aluminum bleachers closed off the north end zone. A few new signs welcomed fans at the main gate. Shrubs sat at the base of the still new scoreboard. The entire facility looked as though it had been cleaned top to bottom. Stone Phillips and the NBC 'Dateline' crew were on hand to wrap up a week's worth of filming for the upcoming October special. The Pampa Harvesters and Lubbock Estacado Matadors gave them a game to remember. The Matadors got the ball

first and moved down the field to the Pampa 25-yard line aided in part by a Harvester face mask penalty. Shavious Kelley later picked off an Estacado TD pass attempt, downing it in the end zone. Pampa used the ground attack featuring Michael Robinson and Chase Harris and a long scamper by quarterback Casey Trimble to work the ball down to the Mat's 6-yard line where Robinson later dove into the end zone. Dock Mackie's extra point attempt was good. With 5:47 to play in the opening quarter, Pampa led, 7-0.

Mackie's leg would prove to be a key to Pampa's win. So would the Green Team defense, which forced two fumbles and two interceptions. Estacado found the end zone on a short dive play with 4:40 to go in the first half after a Marcus Limon pass attempt was deflected from one Matador receiver to another giving Estacado the ball near the goal line. Kelley used his speed to race in and block the Matador extra point attempt. The teams went into the locker rooms at the break with Pampa leading, 7-6. The two teams would swap touchdowns in the third quarter. Estacado hit pay dirt on a long run midway through the period, but failed to convert 2-point attempt. With 5:17 to play in the third, Harris scooped up the ensuing Matador kickoff and looked to be touchdown bound before he was tackled at the Mat's 30-yard line. A few plays later, Trimble would shed a couple of tack-

les before hitting Harris with a TD pass. Pampa now led, 14-12. With less than three minutes to play in the game, Pampa recovered a fumble near the Matador's 7-yard line. Harris would spin into the end zone with 1:18 to go in the game. Again, Mackie's extra point try was true and Pampa led 21-12. The Harvester's defense however gave up a late TD with only seconds left in the game, making it a 21-18 nail-biter (PAT failed). Pampa was not able to corral the Mat's on-side kick which Estacado recovered while Pampa fans gathered their breath. Estacado was flagged for being off sides on the play, forcing them to re-kick. This time, Pampa's Craig Crowell was able to cover the ball. "It was good to get our first win," said Coach Cavalier after the game. "Our kids really needed it." Pampa (1-1) is on the road at Amarillo High next week.

## Healthy McNabb, Eagles first test for Texans and No. 1 pick Williams

HOUSTON (AP) — When Texans No. 1 pick Mario Williams plays against Donovan McNabb on his Madden video game he can't catch him. He's hoping for a bit more success against the real McNabb when the defensive end makes his regular season debut for Houston against the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday. "It's going to be a challenge," Williams said. "We as a unit have to contain him or slow him down at least."

It will be a day of challenges for the young and revamped Texans when they face a healthy McNabb and the ready-to-rebound Eagles. Philadelphia went 6-10 last season, when it was hit with myriad injuries and forced to take part in the soap opera that was Terrell Owens.

"With everything that happened last year, it doesn't make me any more eager to go back out to prove a point," McNabb said. "It's all about winning football games and not about stats. I think if we all continue to have that mind-set of doing the right things and having that confidence that the guy next to you is going to do his job, then good things will happen for us."

Houston didn't have any similar drama, it just couldn't win. The Texans lost their first six games en route to a franchise-worst 2-14 record that got coach Dom Capers fired and several players released.

Besides Williams, the Texans will start four other rookies as they look for their first win in an opener since 2003 in the inaugural season under coach Gary Kubiak.

But the question for the Houston is, can a team win while developing young players? "I don't know. Maybe I'm about to find out," Kubiak said. "If you don't

have a vision in this business, if you don't know where you're going and what you're trying to get accomplished, you can spin your wheels fast. We do understand we have a lot of young players, but we won't use that as an excuse."

McNabb should get a boost by the addition of Donte Stallworth, who was recently traded from the Saints, and a healthy Brian Westbrook. Stallworth is prepared to immediately contribute to the offense, McNabb said.

"He has an understanding of the West Coast offense. He knows exactly what we're doing," McNabb said. "It's just important that we begin to reach out to him and let him know about the approach, the attitude and what we plan on to get done."

While Westbrook seems to be recovered from a foot injury that kept him out of most of camp, the Texans aren't so lucky in that department after recently placing Domanick Davis on injured reserve. Davis, Houston's leading rusher for the past three seasons, will be replaced in the starting lineup by rookie sixth-round pick Wali Lundy.

Lundy, who grew up in Philadelphia and speaks with reverence about McNabb, could get some help from 1999 Heisman Trophy winner Ron Dayne, claimed off waivers by Houston after being released by Denver.

More interesting than how the running game will perform is how David Carr will execute Kubiak's new offense. He has more ammunition than ever with the addition of Eric Moulds, who signed a \$14 million contract after being traded from Buffalo in April, to complement emerging star Andre Johnson.

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## Jags believe they have T.O. covered

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — If cornerbacks Rashean Mathis and Brian Williams could have chosen any team to play in Jacksonville's season opener, they agree it would have been Dallas.

After all, what would have been better — and potentially more rewarding — than trying to shut down receiver Terrell Owens in his much-anticipated Cowboys debut? "I love the challenge," Williams said. "I wouldn't want to go out there and have an easy opponent. You want to go out there and play the best. If he's the best, we want to play him."

Mathis and Williams will get the chance Sunday when Owens officially begins his Cowboys career against Jacksonville and returns to Alltel Stadium for the first time since the 2005 Super Bowl.

"He's a good receiver," Mathis said. "He deserves all the respect given to him, all the hype. He makes plays year in and year out. But our defense is up to the task. Whoever we go against, we're going to hit him and hit him hard."

Mathis and Williams were given hefty contracts to be lockdown cornerbacks. Mathis, a second-round draft pick in 2003, signed a five-year, \$25.5 million contract extension in August 2005. Williams was the team's biggest offseason acquisition, signing a six-year, \$32 million deal in March that included a \$10 million signing bonus.

The duo will get its first — and maybe biggest — test against Owens and fellow receiver Terry Glenn.

"I was made for this," Mathis said. "I'm a cornerback and striving to be a great cornerback. If I didn't have that mentality, I'm at the wrong position."

Mathis played high school football in Jacksonville and probably would have been offered a scholarship to play at Florida State. But he broke a leg as a senior and ended up at Bethune-Cookman.

Instead of putting, Mathis worked hard and finished his college career with 31 interceptions. Mathis probably would have been a first-round pick had he been at a more prominent school. But coming from a small, predominantly black college in Daytona Beach, Mathis was available to his hometown team in the second round.

He earned a starting spot as a rookie, then made a seamless transition to cornerback midway through the season and has started 42 consecutive games there. Mathis has 12 interceptions in three seasons, including five in each of the

last two years. Williams, a fourth-round draft pick from North Carolina State, started 48 games in four seasons with Minnesota and had 262 tackles and 12 interceptions. He had started 33 consecutive games for the Vikings before losing his starting spot to Fred Smoot last season and moving to nickel back.

Williams responded by skipping the team's offseason conditioning program and vowing not to return to Minnesota. Despite his displeasure, the Vikings designated him their transition player in February.

The tag would have allowed Minnesota to keep Williams by matching any outside offers, but it also guaranteed him a \$5.5 million salary this season. The Vikings eventually lifted the tag because they couldn't justify paying a backup that much.

He signed with Jacksonville on the opening day of free agency.

Now, the Jags feel they can better match up with any opponent, whether it be Marvin Harrison and Reggie Wayne of Indianapolis, or Andre Johnson and Eric Moulds of Houston, or even Owens and Glenn.

"They have two good corners," Owens said. "I feel like we've got some weapons on the offensive side of the ball to really make some things happen. I'm pretty sure they're going to step up to the challenge, as well."

Owens caught 124 passes for 1,963 yards and 20 touchdowns in just 21 games with Philadelphia. He played the first seven games last season, but the Eagles suspended him the rest of the year after he griped about his contract and bickered publicly with quarterback Donovan McNabb.

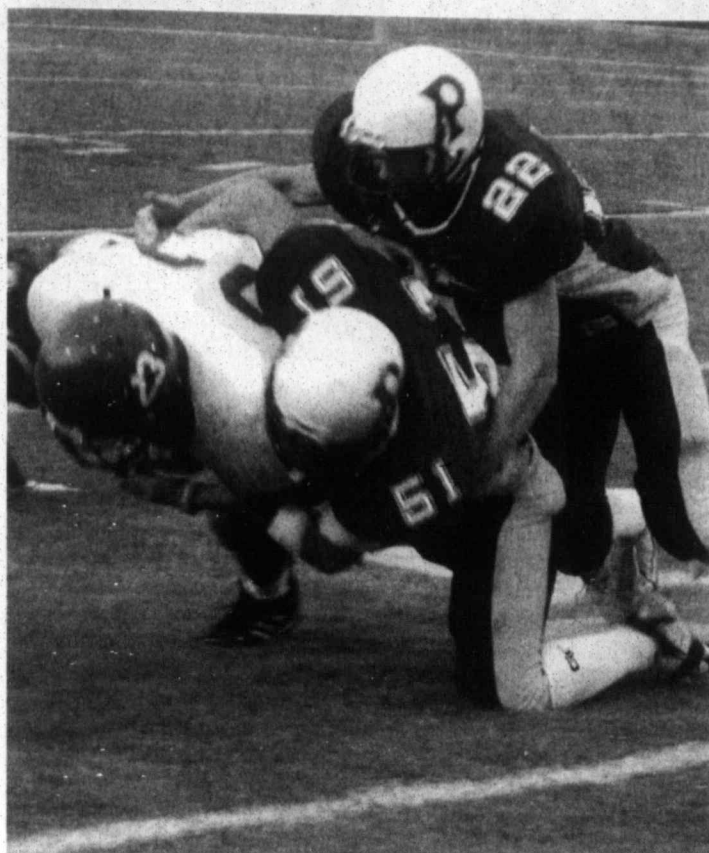
Philadelphia finally released Owens in March, and he signed with the Dallas four days later.

He hasn't played a regular-season game since Oct. 30, 2005, when he caught three passes for 154 yards and a touchdown at Denver. He hasn't played in Jacksonville since returning from a broken ankle and catching nine passes for 122 yards in a loss to New England in the '05 Super Bowl.

"I'm looking forward to getting back out on that field and making some plays," Owens said. Mathis and Williams are looking forward to it, too. "He's the big story," Williams said. "He knows it, we know it, everybody knows it. I think we're well-equipped for the challenge."

The offense looked sharp in preseason, but things will certainly be tougher against the Eagles' defense, which features a secondary with three perennial Pro Bowlers. The starters allowed only three points in exhibition play and defensive end Darren Howard, also from the Saints, joins the Eagles after getting 14 1/2 sacks combined in the last two seasons.

"I think even more so in this offense, you're seeing his athletic ability," Eagles coach Andy Reid said of Carr. "He sure throws the ball well on the move. I think he is really buying into Gary's offense and he looks like he is executing well."

Philadelphia's defense is not only good, it also is out to prove something after the struggles last season in allowing an average of more than 24 points a game.

"What we are trying to do now is get back to where Eagles football is and has been prior to last year," safety Brian Dawkins said. "And even go a step further and be the last team standing. We are trying to go out and dominate and cause havoc — pure havoc."

Joining Williams as the other rookie starter on Houston's defense is middle linebacker DeMeco Ryans, a second-round pick and the star of Houston's preseason. Williams, who at 21 will become the youngest player to ever play for the Texans, acknowledged he will have to guard against getting overexcited, which got him

winded in his first preseason game.

If he needs someone to calm him down, the serene Ryans might be the perfect candidate for the job. It's hard to tell if his attitude comes from naiveté, confidence or simply the Alabama-raised player's laid-back demeanor. Either way it could be a good sign for a defense that will count on him heavily.

"I know it's not Alabama, but I don't have anything to be nervous about," he said with an easy smile. "It's football. They're men just like I'm a man."

## Barkley among Hall inductees

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — Charles Barkley loves watching films of himself playing basketball.

He says it's not narcissistic. It's about seeing basketball played hard, with players giving 100 percent and the game coming before the individual.

"I always tried as hard as I possibly could," Barkley said Friday before his induction into the Basketball Hall of Fame. "I like seeing that on tape. Today, they want to be stars. They don't want to be

great players. We wanted to be great players."

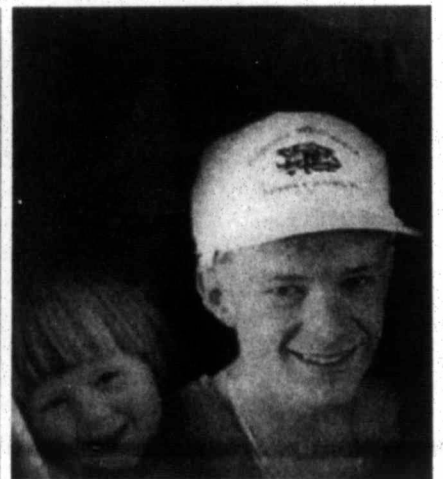

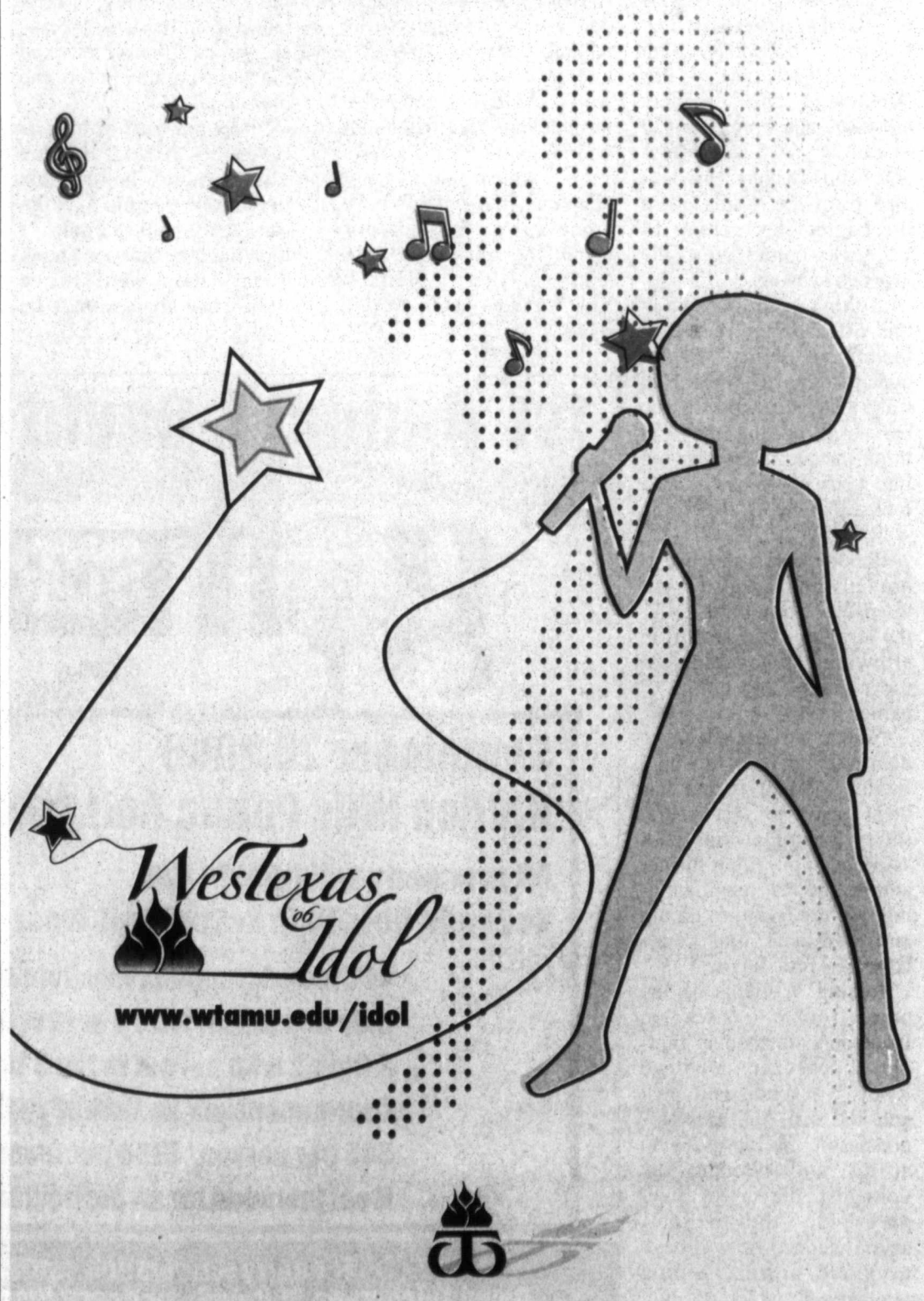

### "At Home" Pad Thai With Creamy Peanut Sauce

Makes 6 servings

#### PEANUT SAUCE

- 2/3 cup (5-fluid-ounce can) Carnation Evaporated Milk
- 1/3 cup smooth or chunky peanut butter
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger

- 1 bunch green onions, sliced (about 3/4 cup), *divided*
- 1/2 cup chopped peanuts, *divided*

PLACE evaporated milk, peanut butter, soy sauce and ginger in blender; cover. Blend 30 seconds or until smooth. Set aside. Makes 1 cup.

SOAK rice noodles 30 minutes in hot tap water; drain. Noodles will be flexible but not soft.

COMBINE water, sugar, ketchup, soy sauce, juice of 1 lime wedge (1 teaspoon) and cayenne pepper in small bowl. HEAT oil in large, non-stick skillet over medium-high heat. Add shrimp and garlic; cook, stirring occasionally, 3 minutes or until shrimp turn pink. Stir in noodles, stirring quickly to keep from sticking. Pour ketchup mixture over noodles; cook 2 minutes or until sauce is absorbed, stirring constantly.

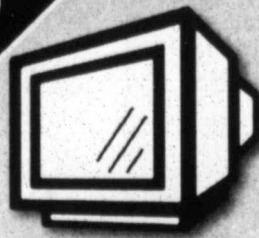
Kay was an instructional teacher's aide at Baker Elementary School and was a receptionist for Dr's. Simmons and Simmons.

# Man on the case of brother's killing for 27 years

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. (AP) — Eric Mausert was stabbed in the heart on a Honolulu street at age 28. A suspect in the killing was placed in custody, the bloody weapon was recovered and witnesses were identified.

An open-and-shut case, insists Kurt Mausert, the victim's brother and a veteran criminal lawyer.

Yet after 27 years, it has been anything but.

The suspect was released days after the killing and promptly disappeared. The case went into limbo. Mausert and his brother Mark have lobbied aggressively — prosecutors say too aggressively — to have the case pursued. Prosecutors began taking a fresh look at the 1979 killing after Kurt Mausert told them he located the long-lost suspect in the Philippines. But Mausert is still frustrated, still waiting for a conviction in his older brother's death.

"This isn't how it should be," Mausert, 49, said in his law office overlooking this resort town's main street. "My brother was murdered and his killer is free. This isn't how it should be."

The boys' father died of a heart attack when Kurt was 11 and he always looked up to Eric.

Eric Mausert was a Hare Krishna in Honolulu with a job indexing Sanskrit texts when he was killed Feb. 22, 1979. He and another man were accompanying a young couple from the temple to the airport and stopped at the home of the woman's family. Her family apparently disapproved of her involvement with Hare Krishnas. There was an argument that spilled outside as the woman walked back to the car, where Eric was waiting.

Eric heard screaming, got out of the car, raised his arms and asked what was happening when he was stabbed by a Filipino man, according to a police report. His heart was punctured. Eric's friend from the temple looked at the gushing wound and said to the dying man: "This is it. You better think of Krishna."

The woman's brother, Juvenal Andrada Llana, was jailed after the stabbing, but released after 48 hours. Mausert believes Llana was released because his father, who worked at the Philippines embassy, had political connections. He said Llana hopped on a plane to his home country.

Honolulu's current prosecuting attorney Peter Carlisle, who was not involved in the 1979 case, bris-

bles at the accusation. He said Llana could not be held beyond 48 hours without probable cause he committed a specific offense, in this case murder. He said filing a quick manslaughter charge to hold a suspect could induce him to quickly plead, securing a lesser sentence.

"I can't say that I know all the facts," Carlisle said, "but I know enough about how the procedures work so that I can piece together that at least the initial problem was that they thought they had a murder on their hands and they didn't have the evidence to prove it. And they were under a deadline of 48 hours."

Carlisle said there was clearly something "factually difficult about the case," though he didn't know if it was an exculpatory witness or something else.

Whatever the reason, Llana's absence effectively halted prosecution after he was indicted for manslaughter in June 1979. The Philippines had no extradition treaty with the United States.

The trauma of the unresolved killing nudged Kurt toward a career in criminal justice. He went to law school and prosecuted criminal cases in New Hampshire before switching to defense work

at Saratoga Springs.

But as he raised a family and established a practice, the killing shadowed him. He still keeps a picture of his brother looking contemplative with his robe, shaved head and a garland around his neck.

Today, Kurt and Mark harbor as much — or more — animosity against the prosecutor who let Llana go as their brother's killer. Mark, an attorney in Reno, Nev., is particularly scathing. "Watching a prosecutor behave like a dissembling street whore is never very pleasant," Mark wrote in a recent letter to Hawaiian authorities.

This has complicated the brothers' longtime efforts to lobby prosecutors halfway across the Pacific. County prosecutors last November transferred the case to the Hawaii attorney general's cold case unit, citing a threat from Mark in a 1991 letter. More recently, state prosecutors have cut off communication with the brothers, saying Mark made verbal threats — a claim Mark denies.

The brothers see the calls and letters as the only way to move the case along.

Kurt, for instance, found out last year that the United States had an extradition treaty with the

Philippines since 1996. Then he Googled Llana's name and got a hit in the Philippines. He told prosecutors they had their suspect and the legal means to get him.

The wheels finally seemed to be turning again when the AG's cold case unit began a review. But months later, Kurt still waits for an answer on whether the case will be prosecuted.

The Hawaii state attorney general's office did not return calls from The Associated Press. But the office wrote Kurt in July saying the passage of time "has taken its toll on the evidence and thus requires time and effort to uncover and evaluate."

This leaves Kurt not all that far from where he was in 1979: hoping prosecutors will make a move. He seeks help from federal officials, the press, anyone. New York Sen. Charles Schumer, saying "it's long past the time when the Mausert family should find justice for their brother," has promised to do what he can.

Eric Mausert has been dead for almost as long as he was alive. Kurt is aware that the odds on his long fight for a conviction grow longer with the years, but he shrugs it off.

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## Sturgeon making comeback in south, and in Great Lakes

TOLEDO, Ohio (AP) — Frank McDonald felt the tug on his fishing line and knew he had something big. "I was hoping it was a gigantic walleye," he said.

It was much bigger. McDonald hooked a 3-foot-long sturgeon, a prehistoric fish that was thought to be all but gone from Lake Erie less than a decade ago. He hauled it into the boat just long enough to snap a few pictures before releasing it.

"We were being gentle," he said. "If I could've gotten away with keeping that fish, he would've been on my wall."

Sturgeon — prized for its caviar and smoked meat — are slowly starting to make a comeback in areas where water quality has improved. The fish, which are protected in just about every state where they're found, were overfished and nearly disappeared in the early 1900s despite being so abundant on Lake Erie that they were burned for fuel in steamships.

Many obstacles — from poachers to polluters — remain before efforts to restore the sturgeon population will allow them to be fished in more than a handful of waters.

"The biggest problem is we have dams on nearly every spawning river," said Douglas Peterson, a fisheries researcher at the University of Georgia.

The dams limit how far sturgeon can swim upstream to find a spawning site. And it's doubtful that dams built to provide drinking water and electricity will be removed.

Sturgeon also are coveted by poachers who sell their pricey caviar eggs on the black market. Wildlife officers in California broke up a ring in June that netted poaching charges against 17 suspects.

In Wisconsin, volunteers line the rivers near Lake Winnebago during the spring spawning season to protect the sturgeon and their eggs from poachers.

What makes the sturgeon so appealing to environmentalists and anglers is their size and appearance.

They're covered with bony plates and often called "living fossils." There are nine species in North

America, and at least one can be found in most states. The Atlantic sturgeon can grow up to 800 pounds while the lake sturgeon can grow to 200 pounds.

And they can live more than 100 years on the bottoms of rivers, which is why they have been able to survive as a species despite pollution and other threats.

"What we see today is a living relic of the dinosaur age," said Bruce Manny, a fishery biologist at the U.S. Geological Survey center in Michigan. "That's another reason we should handle them with care."

He has studied the lake sturgeon in the Detroit River since 1998 and found only one spot where they are laying eggs, near an old steel plant. He said untreated sewage being dumped into the river limits where the fish can spawn.

North of the river, sturgeon are thriving in Lake St. Clair and the St. Clair River. Michigan estimates the lake sturgeon population at 45,500. "It's one of the few places they are able to sustain themselves," Manny said.

Until the late 1990s, sturgeon sightings were unheard of on Lake Erie. Now there are 20 or 30 each year, mostly around the islands region in the western part of the lake.

Still, catching one is a rare treat.

McDonald, who fishes nearly every weekend, said the charter boat captain he was with told him he had never seen a sturgeon in all of his years on the lake.

Boaters nearby were cheering. "They wanted to see it, but I wanted to get it back in the water," McDonald said.

Almost all of the sturgeon caught on the lake have been 5 to 10 years old, which is an encouraging sign, said Chris Vandergoot, a fisheries biologist with the Ohio Department of Natural Resources.

It's suspected that they made their way to the islands region from the Detroit River, he said. It's unknown whether they are reproducing in Ohio waters. A survey last year of the Maumee River, a potential spawning spot, didn't turn up anything, Vandergoot said.
