Water district approves drilling of nine new wells

WHITE DEER -- Nine people will be able to drill water wells today after the Panhandle Ground Water District Conservation board approved their applications this

The water board approved the permit applications during their meeting Wednesday. The board also set a date for a hearing on a permit application from Petco for a well for secondary

A hearing for a well to be drilled for an Amarillo car wash was canceled after the company withdrew

Autumn approaching

their application. The board also tabled a permit application from G&C Lindel Dairy for the second time. It is expected to be on next month's agenda.

Petco is seeking a permit for a sixinch well for secondary oil recovery near the intersection of Baggerman Road and Boydston Road. After an hour's discussion, the board declared the Petco application administratively complete and set Oct. 25 for a hearing date.

Ouick Ouack car wash was seeking a permit for a four-inch well at 24th and Georgia in Amarillo, but Donley County.

they withdrew their application.

The board approved drilling applications by Sam Coffer, Christi Cates, Don Shawhart and two applications from the Mays Trust for one-inch wells in Potter County. They also approved an application from James Alfonte for a replacement well in Bishop Hills, northwest of Amarillo in Potter County.

The board also approved a drilling permit application by Crow Hollow, LLC, for a four-inch well in Donley County and an application by Eric Wilcox for a three-inch well in

The board approved the district's plan to drill a monitoring well near the River Road elementary school in Potter County.

They also approved amendments to the district rules following a hearing Wednesday afternoon. The changes brought the rules up to date and made them compatible with state regulations with one exception.

The board made one change in the wording of the rule to clarify how soon a second well could be drilled in an area. The rule had stated that it had to be a year. They changed the rule to read 12 months.

Shuttle Atlantis, astronauts make safe landing

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) Space shuttle Atlantis and its six astronauts glided to a safe landing in darkness early today, ending a 12day mission whose smooth success was briefly upstaged by the high drama caused by mysterious floating debris.

"Nice to be back. It was a great team effort," said commander Brent Jett immediately after touchdown at Kennedy Space Center at 6:21 a.m.

More than 1 1/2 hours after landing, the astronauts, all wearing broad grins, left the shuttle to greet NASA administrator Michael Griffin and other agency officials. Then they

walked under Atlantis to inspect the shuttle's heat shield.

"It's really a beautiful day in Florida, a great way to end a mission," said Jett. "It was a pretty tough few days for us, a lot of hard work, a great team effort to get the station assembly restarted on a good note."

Jett and his crew did the first construction work on the international space station since the Columbia disaster 3 1/2 years ago. The astronauts performed three grueling spacewalks and took on other heavy-lifting tasks in one of the most challenging missions ever, adding a 17 1/2-ton truss addition with giant solar wings that will help power the orbiting lab.

The landing 48 minutes before sunrise was a day later than planned because NASA ordered up extra inspections of the spacecraft's delicate skin to make sure it was safe to come home. The fear was that a mysterious piece of debris spotted floating nearby on Tuesday might have hit the spacecraft. Astronauts later saw other debris.

It was a flying piece of foam insulation that knocked a hole in Columbia causing its demise in 2003, killing seven astronauts. Since then, NASA has developed new equipment and practices to guard against and watch out for similar

damage to the sensitive space shut-


Those new techniques were used to make sure Atlantis was safe to return. After numerous cameras took pictures above and below Atlantis, some of them maneuvered robotically by the shuttle astronauts, NASA proclaimed the spacecraft damage-

"We've seen a new standard in NASA vigilance," said shuttle program manager Wayne Hale.

NASA officials said their best guess was that the most worrisome debris was a plastic filler from the

NEW YORK (AP) — British business mogul Richard Branson said today he would invest about \$3 billion to combat global warming over the next decade.

Branson, the billionaire behind the multiplatform Virgin brand, said the money would come from 100 percent of the profits generated by his transportation and airline sectors. It will then be invested in efforts to find renewable, sustainable energy sources in an effort to wean the world off of oil and coal.

Branson made the announcement on the second day of the Clinton Global Initiative, a conference of business, political and nonprofit leaders hosted by former President Clinton that debuted last year.

"Our generation has inherited an incredibly beautiful world from our parents and they from their parents," Branson said at a news conference with Clinton at his side. "We must not be the generation responsible for irreversibly damaging the environment."

Clinton praised Branson as one of the

most "creative" and "committed" people he had ever known.

The commitment ensures that the conference, which brings people together to brainstorm on solutions to global issues, would more than meet its goal of matching last year's pledges of more than \$2 billion.

Branson, 56, started Virgin as a music retailing company, then expanded into fields including Virgin Airlines in 1984 and now has dealings in train travel, wireless communications — even space flight.

Branson, knighted by the Queen of England in 1999, is also known for extracurricular activities included sailing and hot-air ballooning.

The initiative began Wednesday with a slew of world figures, from first lady Laura Bush to Pakistan President Pervez Musharraf.

Jobless claims increase in latest report

WASHINGTON (AP) -A key gauge of future economic activity fell for a second straight month while the number of newly laid-off workers filing for unemployment benefits rose last week, providing further evidence that the economy has slowed.

The Conference Board reported today that its Index of Leading Economic Indicators dipped by 0.2 percent last month following a similar 0.2 percent fall in

Seven of the 10 components of the index contributed to the August decline. The index has been down five of the last eight months as the economy has flashed numerous signals of a slowdown under the impact of rising energy prices, high interest rates and a cooling housing market.

Meanwhile, the Labor Department said that 318,000 workers filed claims for jobless benefits, up by 7,000 from the 311,000 benefit applications filed the previous week. It followed two weeks of small declines in claims.

Wal-Mart to test generic drug prices

NEW YORK (AP) -Wal-Mart Stores Inc., facing pressure from critics who call its employee health care coverage inadequate, plans to begin selling nearly 300 generic prescription drugs for a sharply reduced price of \$4 for a month's supply.

The world's biggest retailer said Thursday that it will test the program in Florida and it will include 291 generic drugs available for conditions from allergies to high-blood pressure. The plan is available to its employees and customers, including those without insurance.


Wal-Mart officials said the reduced price represents a savings to the customer of up to 70 percent on some drugs.

"Wal-Mart is taking this

step so our customers and associates can get the medicines they need at a cost they can afford," Bill Simon, executive vice president of the company's professional services division, said in announcing the plan at a Tampa, Fla., store.

The program will be launched on Friday at 65 Wal-Mart, Neighborhood Market and Sam's Club pharmacies in the Tampa Bay area and will be expanded to the entire state in

Simon wouldn't be specific about why Florida and specifically the Tampa Bay area was chosen for the rollout of the initiative, saying only that there was a need for it here.

thermal tiles which protect the shuttle from blasting heat. Four other unidentified objects, including a possible garbage bag, floated near the shuttle over the next day.

In a news conference, Griffin downplayed the litter in space, saying debris can slip out of the shuttle cargo bay because people are not perfect. He and director Mike launch Leinbach said Atlantis came back as clean, if not cleaner, than Discovery in its two previous landings.

The unplanned drama threatened to overshadow what had been a nearly flawless mission filled with strenuous spacewalks and rigorous robotics work that placed the space station back on a path to completion after its long hiatus. The crew of five men and one woman were the longest-trained in NASA history, because they were originally supposed to fly to the space station in 2003. But the Columbia accident kept them grounded.

The mission was the first of 15 tightly scheduled flights needed to finish constructing the half-built space lab by 2010.

"We are rebuilding the kind of momentum that we have had in the past and that we need if we're going to finish the space station," said Griffin.

NASA and its international partners of Russia, Europe, Canada and Japan must finish building the space station before the U.S. space agency ends the shuttle program in 2010 with plans to return to the moon in a new vehicle. The massive, 25-year-old shuttles are the only spaceships large enough to haul construction parts to the space

The next flight in the construction sequence is set for December.

The mission was bookended by delays. The launch was scrubbed four

Less than 24 hours after Atlantis undocked, an oxygen generator on the space station overheated and spilled a toxic irritant, forcing the three-man crew to don masks and gloves in the first emergency declared aboard the 8-year-

old orbiting outpost.

Quicken has evolved many times ...

Whenever a family buys a computer, their reasons can run the gamut -Internet access, educational programs for the kids, games, and finances. If all you need to do is balance your checkbook, get the \$29.99 Basic edition. While lacking many of the bells and whistles of the more expensive versions, it does an excellent job at balancing your checkbook, paying your bills, and tracking your spending.

If you need to monitor your investments, prepare for tax time, and save

for financial goals, choose the \$49.99 Deluxe version.

Quicken Premier (\$69.99) includes 'wizards" that help you maximize your investment portfolio, find tax-saving opportunities, and prepare for retire-

Quicken Premier Home and Business (\$79.99) is almost a hybrid between QuickBooks and Quicken. While containing all of the features of Premier, it adds the ability to customize invoices, track accounts payable and accounts receivable, and provides wizards for business taxes.

QuickBooks Ask most accountants what financial software they recommend to their clients, and they will respond with

'QuickBooks.'

What it lacks in ease of use, it makes up for in it's comprehensive feature list. And as with Quicken, QuickBooks comes in a variety of flavors: Simple Start (\$99.95), Online (19.95/month), Pro (\$199.95), and Premiere (\$399.95).

Without going into a lengthy explanation of the hundreds of features included in these packages, let me sum it up this way:

Simple Start: Everything you need if you are just starting out.

Online: If you dread installing or upgrading software, this option is for you. You simply pay \$19.95/month and access your finances over the Internet. Your records are stored in a highly secure database run by Intuit. All software upgrades are seamless since you are accessing THEIR server. But, if your Internet access is flakey ...

Pro: Adds multi-user capability and integration with Outlook, Excel, and

Premiere: The "Full Meal Deal." Lots and lots of freebies, including the "Complete Guide to QuickBooks" on CD, incredibly detailed report customization, and the ability to password protect a closing date.

In a nutshell, if you need invoicing, inventory tracking, or payroll management, get QuickBooks. Otherwise, stick with it's easier-to-use brother, Quicken. Find out more http://www.intuit.com.

The Odessa American on guarding the National Guard:

National Guard outfits have long served varied and valuable roles whenever emergencies have arisen. It can be argued, however, that lately the Guard has become a convenient crutch for officials who are overwhelmed, as well as an easy source of labor for political pet projects.

It's becoming more and more apparent that our loyal Guard needs protection itself. For this reason it is crucial to maintain some separation between the Guard and the president, especially

while the current White House occupant continues to deploy Guardsmen on dangerous whims.

Texas Gov. Rick Perry has added his name to those of all other governors on a letter to congressional leaders, opposing a provision in the current military funding bill that would give the president and secretary of defense direct authority to activate and deploy

National Guard troops. Currently, Guard outfits serve under the governor of each state in which they reside. In times of emergency, the president has asked for the troops, and the respective governors have dutifully called up the Guard and made them available.

National Guard troops aren't only helping in Iraq and Afghanistan.

President Bush has sent Guard troops to the U.S.-Mexico border to quiet rabid nationalists in his own party.

It also maintains one more check on the president's ability to maintain power by having armed troops at his immediate disposal. President Bush has been systematically working to erase checks and balances to his power, checks that were placed specifically to guard against tyranny by protecting the people from any branch of government that might assume too much power.

The current system of utilizing our National Guard has worked for two centuries. It isn't broke and doesn't need fixing. Congress should heed the governors of all U.S. states and territories, and scratch the presidential call-up provision from House Resolution 5122.





COLLEGE STATION, have a little eye-to-eye deal that he can trust me and I can trust him," Lane said.

During fall workouts, Franchione was concerned about Lane's weight and considered holding Lane out of the season opener. Then he watched some videotape of Lane nimbly dodging tacklers - when he wasn't running over

"He is an unusual athlete," Franchione said. "I don't know if he can dance, but I'm betting he can because he is light on his feet. He'll slip once in a while and fall because he cuts off the wrong foot but not too often."

Schroeder has returned eight of the 10 punts by A&M's opponents.





Knight weighs in on controversial call that cost OU a win at Oregon

OKLAHOMA CITY — Texas Tech basketball coach Bob Knight, whose Red Raiders lost to Oklahoma on a controversial call three years ago, said he knows how fans feel about wanting a forfeit after OU's loss to Oregon on Saturday.

Knight called for Oklahoma to forfeit its basketball game with Tech on Jan. 20, 2003, when the Sooners won 69-64 in overtime at Norman after two clock controversies in the final seconds of regulation.

Video replay later showed the game clock started late after OU in-bounded the ball on the game-tying drive.

"Maybe now those people at Oklahoma understand what I was talking about," Knight told The Oklahoman.

"Had Oklahoma forfeited that

game against us like I suggested, they would have gotten far more positive publicity out of that than if they had gone to the Final Four that year. Now I guess the 'duck' is swimming in the other pond."

Oregon scored two touchdowns late to beat Oklahoma 34-33, including the game-winner that came after the Ducks recovered an onside kick.

Video replay showed Oregon touched the ball before it went the required 10 yards, but the replay official did not overturn the call.

The replay official, Gordon Riese, who was suspended by the Pac-10 for one game, requested a leave of absence for the remainder of the season, the league announced Wednesday.


