## Trees at library come under discussion again

"I think I shall never see A poem as lovely as a tree." - Joyce Kilmer

Unless it is a locust tree, and its seed pods clog the drains on a building.

The Friends of the Library want to cut down three locust trees around Lovett Memorial Library for that very reason.

The library support organization contacted the City of Pampa earlier this month and asked that they be allowed to cut down three locust trees and replace them with a type of tree that might be more suitable on the grounds of Lovett Memorial Library.

During discussions at the Pampa City Commission meeting Tuesday, City Manager John Horst said a limb had broken off one tree during recent wind storms.

"It's a safety issue," he told the commission, "and a matter of taking care of the building."

Horst said seed pods from the three trees that tower over the library

drop on the roof, are washed down the rain gutters and clog the drains. Rain water then backs up and stands on the roof, which is also dangerous.

Horst said snow and ice this winter could also add to broken limbs on the roof and grounds this winter.

The city manager said the Friends of the Library proposed removing the three trees and replacing them with other trees further away from the building.

While not an urgent problem, Horst said it does need to be addressed.

A similar request had been made

several years ago, but there was some opposition to it. People in the Texas Panhandle don't like to cut down trees, he said.

Pampa Finance Director Robin Bailey, who oversees the library, suggested cutting the trees back instead of cutting them down.

Mayor Lonny Robbins said he would like for the Friends of the Library and the Lovett Memorial Library Advisory Board to come to the commission with a plan.

"Whenever they want to come will be fine," Robbins said.

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## Accident sends man to NWTH

A one-vehicle accident at about 2:15 a.m. today sent one man to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo by LifeStar helicopter.

The man, who was driving. a Ford Bronco, collided with a light pole at the intersection of Highway 60 and Hobart Street. The identity of the man was not available.


Pampa Police Department units, one Pampa Fire Department truck with four personnel, and one Guardian EMS ambulance responded to the scene.

The man was trapped inside the vehicle and had to be cut from the Bronco by fire department personnel. Guardian EMS ambulance transported him to a location just west of the city on Highway 60, where he was transferred to a LifeStar helicopter.

The Bronco's driver was the only person in the vehicle and the only person involved in the accident.

No further information on the accident was available as of press time today.



## Smith's son died from drug combination

(AP) — Anna Nicole Smith's 20-year-old son died from the accidental effect of methadone and two antidepressant drugs interacting in his system, according to a prominent American pathologist who conducted a private autopsy.

The low levels of the three drugs detected by toxicology tests indicated Daniel Smith

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico died "a tragic, accidental, Lexapro and methadone had drug-related death," Dr. Cyril Wecht told The Press Associated Wednesday.

Smith died Sept. 10 at his mother's hospital bedside in the Bahamas, where the reality TV star and former Playboy playmate was recuperating from giving birth to a daughter three days earlier.

a lethal "cumulative effect on the central nervous system" that ultimately stopped Smith's heart — a "classical" death resulting from a combination of drugs without an overdose of any one. "Oh my, that's a really lethal combination right

there," said Lisa Johnson, a pharmacist at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles. "If that's what he was on, it could very well have caused this." "The methadone will

slow you down, but the other ones make your system speed up, so it's an odd combination," she said in an interview. Smith had reportedly

been suffering depression related to a breakup with a girlfriend when he went to visit his mother and newborn half-sister in Nassau. Zoloft and Lexapro, which a U.S. doctor had prescribed, are antidepressants commonly used to treat anxiety and panic disorders.

Wecht said he did not know why Smith was taking methadone, a pain-reliever that is also used to ease heroin cravings for recovering addicts.

"It is used for people who have been on heroin or morphine," Wecht said.

## Newsmaker Interviews: Burns watches the news

Eric Burns, the impeccably fair-and-balanced host of Fox News Channel's "Fox News Watch" (Saturdays at 6:30 p.m.) has had a long and successful career in broadcast journalism. Though he never achieved his dream job of hosting NBC's "Today" show, he worked as a correspondent for NBC News, appearing regularly on "NBC Nightly News" and "Today" before joining Fox.

Along the way, the Pittsburgh-area native and 1967 Westminster College grad became known as one of the best writers in TV journalism. Not only has he written for magazines like Reader's Digest, The Weekly Standard and Spy, he's authored five books, including this spring's "Infamous Fathers and the Rowdy Beginnings of American Journalism," which is a lively history of the vulgarity, lies, partisanship and bias that filled colonial newspa-

I talked to Burns by recently as he was finishing preparation for a recent show:

Q: Does the debut of Katie Couric symbolize the end of nightly news as we've known it?

A: No. I think that's too extreme a statement. When I was a correspondent for NBC many years ago, Barbara Walters was hired away from NBC to be a coanchor on the ABC evening news with Harry Reasoner. They debuted on a Monday. The following Tuesday,

Scams and false offers are nothing new. Criminals have been committing fraud for many years. They started with postal mail, moved to telemarketing, and now are finding new victims in cyberspace. In fact, the schemes they use are exactly the same, just modified for the new communication medium. Let's start with the most common ploy:

FDA officials have advised people not the eat the spinach, which comes conveniently bagged for use in salads and other preparations. One of the

problems is that too many people assume that because the product is in a bag and appears fresh and crisp, that it is also clean. That's not necessarily the

Also, it's important to note, as the FDA is warning consumers, that even washing the suspect spinach won't kill the bacteria. The FDA's advice is to not use the product.

A bout with E.coli can be painful and sometimes fatal.

Formally called Escherichia coli0157:H7 and, according the Centers for Disease Control Web site, it's just one of hundreds of strains of the bacterium E.coli. Although most of the strains are harmless, this one isn't.

It can cause severe bloody diarrhea,

abdominal cramps, and could lead to complications. It's essential to check with a physician if symptoms are pres-

El Paso is no stranger to problems with E. coli.

In the past it has posed problems at Ascarate Lake and more recently, it was found in the standing water at Album Park following heavy rains and flooding.

The best advice is to stay away from bagged fresh spinach until authorities have figured out the origin of the problem, its extent and declared that it's once more safe to use the product.

If you crave spinach, there's no problem with using the canned product.

home and do the White House or State Department for four or five years. And then when you are 20 or so years into it, you will have the gravitas to anchor one of the shows." Well, it's certainly not like that any more.

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Q: You don't give away much on the air. You're pretty good at playing the middle - the centrist. Can you tell us what your politics are, generally?

A: No. I won't do that because that's not what I'm paid for at Fox. There are a lot of people who do give their political opinions on the air. And I make it a point - and a point of pride - to have people not know my politics. I don't think they are relevant to a show that analyzes the news, so I prefer to keep them to myself off the air, as I do on.

The truth is, I have been hosting "News Watch" for eight years. Not once in eight years - that's 400 shows - has anyone said to me, "You've got to put this in the show." ... There is simply no interference with "Fox News Watch." I have never been asked by anyone who works in any capacity at Fox what my politics are and I have never heard a comment from anyone in any capacity at Fox about anything I've said on the air.

And that's the thing a lot of people who write about Fox don't like to hear, because they make assumptions about bias that I - in eight years of hosting a show about the media have never once personally encountered. They don't like to hear that, I suppose, because they don't believe

Q: What's your pet criticism of news media today? Things aren't balanced, there's a liberal bias, too much frivolity?

A: I think there's a much greater problem than political bias. I see political bias both ways. I don't tend to see as much of it as some people do. To me, the two

main biases that affect television news are a bias toward simplicity - stripping a story of its necessary nuance - and toward sensationalism, making a story that really isn't that important seem as if it is. Those are the two primary and most deleterious biases operating in television news

Q: Have you seen that in coverage of Iraq?

A: Maybe simplicity a little, which is somewhat endemic to television, because there isn't that much time and we need pictures for everything. But no. I don't think Iraq is a good example of what I'm talking about. John Mark Karr is a good example of what I'm talking about. But when we cover really serious stories, when we cover the violence in the Middle East, when we cover the war in Iraq, the gravity of the story tends to force us into doing our best work. But it's the slower news times when we are more prone to be sensational. And it's when the story is very complex, for instance, the roots of what's going on in the Middle East, that we tend to simplify. We can certainly cover the day's action very well. But we don't do nearly as well at helping people to understand why there is such violence and how far the roots

Q: When you were "Infamous researching Scribblers," what was the most surprising thing you found?

A: That Samuel Adams, who is so venerated a figure and so estimable a brand of beer, was probably the least ethical journalist this country ever had; that he so wanted America to separate from Great Britain, either politically or militarily, that he was willing to write lies and he was willing to incite violence. He used his newspaper, the Boston Gazette, the way soldiers used muskets – as a weapon, not as a means of communication.

The second biggest surprise was that George Washington, who we think of in Garry Wills' phrase, "the original marble man,"

was the most savaged man in the history of American journalism.

Q: And that's where the phrase "infamous scribblers" comes from?

A: Yes, Washington was so upset by the coverage that he got that he referred to reporters at one point as a bunch of "infamous scribblers." It's just extraordinary. You read everything that was written about Washington in those times and you come away feeling sympathy for him. The notion of being sympathetic for someone so heroic seems preposterous but it happens when you read all the coverage Washington.

Q: So things back then weren't so fair and balanced

in the press in those days? A: There was no fairness and balance and there was no sense that there should be fairness and balance. A person owned a printing press. He thought he was entitled to do anything he wanted with it, just as a blacksmith who owned a forge was entitled to do with it what he wanted to do.

Q: You say Ben Franklin, Sam Adams and Alexander Hamilton were big-time journalists of the day. Would either any or all of them be working for The New York Times or Fox News today?

A: Sam Adams would be working for Fox News, because the immediacy of television would appeal to him. Ben Franklin would try to work for both, because he would love the substance of print but he would love the visual aspect of television when he covered science stories. Hamilton, I think, would just work for The New York Times. Hamilton was very academic in his leanings and in his writings. He was a man of ideas. I don't think he would have had any concern whatsoever for illustrating his stories. His stories were all about ideas and ideas don't inherently have pictures that attach to them.

First, if the offer is via email, never reply. By replying, even angrily, you are proving that your e-mail address is valid. The easiest method is simply to delete the message without even reading it. After many years of seeing these kinds of schemes, I can easily go through my new e-mail messages and delete them based on the following criteria: Subject in all uppercase; words "wealth," "rich," or "free" mentioned; more than

one exclamation point "!!!!" Many e-mail programs can even be set to automatically delete messages that match the above rules. If you feel like being a diligent netizen (Internet citizen), forward the offending message to the owners of the network. For

instance, if the message came from scamartist@aol.com, forward the whole message to abuse@aol.com. All major networks have the "abuse" email box for that purpose. They will investigate the matter and cancel the account of the perpetrator if they find credible evidence.



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## Lawmakers press HP on scandal

Lawmakers denounced the high-ranking HP executives intrusive tactics used in Hewlett-Packard Co.'s spying probe as a congressional hearing opened today with stark comparisons between the tawdry affair and the 67year-old company's reputation for integrity.

Ten people involved in the company's cloak-and-dagger investigation of boardroom leaks — including HP's justresigned general counsel, Ann Baskins, and hired private detectives — appeared before the House Energy and Commerce Committee and asserted their Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination, refusing to answer questions.

Ousted HP Chairwoman Patricia Dunn, sitting with her attorney in the front row of the packed hearing room, listened as members of the House Energy and Commerce Committee voiced outrage at the company's probe into the source of boardroom leaks.

HP, the nation's 11thlargest company by revenue, used a shadowy network of private investigators who burrowed into the personal lives of journalists and HP directors, and impersonated them with a tactic known as "pretexting" to obtain their telephone records.

"We have before us wit-Hewlettfrom nesses Packard to discuss a plumbers' operation that would make Richard Nixon blush were he still alive," Democratic Rep. John Dingell of Michigan said.

Rep. Ed Whitfield, R-Ky., chairman of the committee's investigative panel, demand-

WASHINGTON (AP) — ed to know why, with many and attorneys involved in the probe, "No one had the good sense to say 'Stop.'


"It's a sad day for this proud company," said Rep. Diana DeGette of Colorado, the panel's senior Democrat. "Something has really gone wrong at this institution."

Dunn planned to testify that she discussed the conduct of the company's leak investigation with CEO Mark Hurd, board members and others in the company

— getting a clear impression that the directors were satisfied with it and that its methods were not improper.

Dunn and Hurd were appearing at the hearing with other top executives and hired detectives. Some volunteered to testify; others were attending under the summons of a congressional subpoena.

As lurid details of the affair emerged in recent weeks, HP's corporate casualties have mounted.



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## Winter heating bills expected to be lower this year, industry says

WASHINGTON (AP) — Natural gas producers predicted today that consumers will see lower prices this winter because there's plenty of natural gas already in storage and more is being produced.

major losses of supply because of Hurricane Katrina, wholesale prices going into the winter ranged from around \$12 per thousand cubic feet. Recently, the prices dipped below \$4.50 per thousand cubic feet at the wholesale level.

Conway said that overall, natural gas production this year "will be substantially higher" than in 2005, as the industry steadily recovered from the hurricane a year ago and stepped up onshore production.

Consumers have faced soaring winter heating bills for the last three winters.

BAILEY, Colo. (AP) — The gunman who took six his gun and told them to stay girls hostage in a high school classroom, killing one, had sexually assaulted at least some of them, the sheriff the man walked in, fired a said today.

"He did traumatize and assault our children," Park up. He told some to leave County Sheriff Fred and others — all girls — to Wegener said. "I'll only say stay. that it's sexual in nature."

Wegener identified the suspect as Duane R. Morrison, 53, of the Denver area. He said investigators had not established any previous connection between him and the hostages.

Authorities said Morrison had let four of the hostages go before a SWAT team. stormed the Platte Canyon High School classroom where he had been cornered Wednesday.

The gunman fatally wounded one of the girls and killed himself as the deputies charged in. The other girl escaped.

The victim was identified by acquaintances and a coworker as 16-year-old Emily Keyes, shown in a yearbook photo as a smiling blonde who played volleyball and was on the high school debate team.

She was pronounced dead at a Denver hospital after Wednesday's standoff, which reminded many people of the 1999 massacre at Columbine High, less than an hour's drive away.

"This is something that has changed my school, changed my community, said Wegener, a 36-year resident of Bailey. "My small county's gone.'

Wegener said Morrison made few demands. "Most of the demands were, 'Leave me alone, get out of here," he said.

Asked about his decision to storm the classroom, Wegener said:

"Being a sheriff in a small community, knowing all the parents, knowing the kids my daughter graduated last year, my son's a junior here it is very difficult. Because I'd want whoever was in my position to do the same thing. And that is to save lives," he said.

Morrison began the takeover by ordering students to line up at the chalk board as he tapped each with or go, a student in the classroom said.

Residents gathered quietly this morning at the Cutthroat Cafe, where Keyes had been a waitress for about two years, to grieve and remember, said Bobbi Sterling, a waitress and cook there.

"It's very sad here. You know, the family lost their daughter but as a community, we lost a child," she said. "We're just sitting here, numb and in shock. We're all just kind of stunned. People are here for mutual support."

Grigg described Emily as one of his first friends when he moved to the area in sixth grade.

"She was always sweet," he told "Today." "She was just friendly. She was just a good person in general."

Wegener was at a loss to explain a motive.

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

**DEAR BAFFLED AND DISGUSTED:** Cross your fingers and count your blessings. Because your son-in-law feels that taking care of kids is "not his thing," his influence on your grandson may be less than you fear. While a child might mimic the behavior of a parent who spends time with him, I'm not sure the same is true of a child whose parent ignores him. It is clear from your letter that you are very uncomfortable around your son-in-law. The





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

## Astros need 15 innings to edge Pirates; Rangers fall at home to Angels, 6-5

Astros 7, Pirates 6, 15 innings

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Once the Houston Astros got into the 11th inning, the 12th, the 13th and later, they didn't need anyone to tell them they had to beat the Pittsburgh Pirates. They already knew it from the out-of-town scoreboard that showed the St. Louis Cardinals winning

Brad Ausmus' sacrifice fly in the 15th inning finished off Houston's comeback within a comeback as the Astros rallied from five runs down to beat the Pirates 7-6 on Wednesday night, their eighth straight win that kept them close to St. Louis in the NL Central.

"I've complained all year about not being able to get a run in from third, so I'm going to kiss his lunch for getting that one in," manager Phil Garner said of Ausmus' gamewinner.

The Astros didn't gain any ground for the first time during their winning streak but, almost as importantly, didn't lose any as they stayed 1 1/2 games out with four to play. The Cardinals cut their magic number for winning the division to four by beating San Diego 4-2 on Albert Pujols' homer to end a sevengame losing streak.

"I'm sure everybody saw that, so I've got to applaud these guys for a great effort and getting results," Garner said. "We have to plan to win 'em all and still it may be not enough, but the bottom line is everybody is still playing."

He was right — most of the Astros knew the Cardinals had won, yet the tired team persevered to win its fourth game in four nights in three ballparks. They finished off a four-game sweep of the Cardinals at home Sunday night, then won a makeup game Monday night in Philadelphia before winning the first two of a three-game series in Pittsburgh.

"Seeing the Cardinals win makes it even more crucial for us going into extra innings, and understanding we move to 2 1/2 out with only four games left for us if we lose," Ausmus said. "Obviously it was a crucial win."

Houston, held to one hit over the first five extra innings by three rookie relievers, finally won it against Jonah Bayliss (1-1) in the 15th. After Eric Bruntlett walked and Craig Biggio's sacrifice bunt turned into a fielder's choice, Orlando Palmeiro singled to center. Ausmus then fought off a two-strike pitch to lift the fly to center that scored Biggio.

"We had chances to win, but they finally scratched out the run we had been working to get," Pirates manager Jim Tracy said. "But our young relievers, to do the job they did, pitching against a club playing for its playoff life ... they really grew up tonight."

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Tim Salmon has four games left to get his 300th career home run before he retires. His teammates desperately want to see it happen, and so does Los Angeles Angels manager Mike Scioscia. It's the only thing the team has left to play for this season.

yet the tired team persevered to win its fourth game in four nights in Angel Stadium has been replaying

some of the most memorable homers by the franchise's all-time home run leader. On Wednesday night, he hit No. 299 in a 6-5 victory over the Texas Rangers, leaving him one shy of the milestone.

"That was a lot of fun. That's my understatement of the year," Salmon said with a laugh. "My head is spinning a lot right now. It's kind of a 'Did that really happen?' kind of thing."

One night after the Angels were mathematically eliminated from playoff contention, Salmon started as the designated hitter and batted third. The 15-year veteran, who was able to squeeze one more season out of a 38-year-old body that was racked by severe knee and shoulder injuries last year, got a standing ovation when he walked to the plate in the first inning and didn't disappoint the crowd of 38,032.

"The whole year, from spring training on, the fans have really gone way beyond what anybody could imagine to show their appreciation," Salmon said. "Hitting a home run like that, that's one way to give it back."

## Senate approves medal for Nelson

DALLAS (AP) — The U.S. Senate approved a bill Wednesday night to posthumously grant Byron Nelson the Congressional Gold Medal in recognition of the golfing great's philanthropy.

Nelson, who won 52 tournaments during his career, died Tuesday at his home in Roanoke.

The House voted in May to award the medal to Nelson. The Senate approved The Byron Nelson Congressional Gold Medal Act on Wednesday and it now goes to President Bush.

"It is entirely fitting that as we mourn the

passing of Byron Nelson this week, we honor his life and tremendous service to his fellow Americans with the passage of this legislation today," Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas, said in a statement.

"The Congressional Gold Medal is given to individuals who exemplify the American spirit by serving their community and helping those less fortunate, which is what Byron Nelson devoted his life to doing. The lives of countless Americans were touched because of the compassion, dedication and generosity of this great Texan ..."

NEW YORK (AP) — ESPN is closing down its cell phone company for sports fans after less than a year, planning instead to forge deals with other wireless operators to offer Mobile ESPN's multimedia content, the majority-owned subsidiary of Walt

Disney Co. announced Thursday.

The company will continue providing wireless service and content for its subscribers until the end of the year, refund the purchase price for handsets and assist customers with transferring their phone num-

bers to other carriers, ESPN executives told The Associated Press.

Roughly two-thirds of the slightly more 100 employees at Mobile ESPN will likely lose their jobs next year as the company transitions to a licensing business, though some may find other positions at ESPN, the executives said.

The company has signed up only tens of thousands of subscribers since it launched the service in late 2005 and began advertising early this year, with commercial spots appearing regularly on ESPN's cable TV broadcasts.

Disney recently disclosed it has so far invested a combined \$150 million in developing both Mobile ESPN and Disney Mobile, a cell service designed for families that is unaffected by Thursday's announcement. The company did not disclose Thursday if there would be any charge against earnings to reflect the closure of Mobile ESPN.

"There's certainly some disappointment," said Salil Mehta, executive vice president for ESPN Enterprises. "I think the focus of the ESPN organization is that we took a risk, but in doing so we have the benefit of having created the industry's leading wireless application, and we're going to

Mobile ESPN signing off

NEW YORK (AP) — ESPN is closing down its cell phone company for sports figure out a way to bring that to fans and make the most amount of money."

ESPN's decision marks the retreat of one of the highest-profile and most-heavily marketed efforts to create what's known as an "MVNO," short for mobile virtual network operator.

An MVNO puts its own brand on a wireless network operator's service, in this case Sprint, paying that company to connect calls and deliver content. Globally, there were already more than 175 MVNO brands either launched or planned as of April of this year, according to the research firm ARCchart.

Each MVNO attempts to cater to the specialized needs or interests of an audience they contend is underserved by mainstream cellular players such as Cingular Wireless and Verizon Wireless.

For Amp'd Mobile and Helio, it's the youth market. Some of the new brands stress lower prices and prepaid offerings for users who can't meet credit requirements. Others focus on immigrant communities, providing cheaper international calls or screen graphics and customer service in another language. Some researchers estimate that a virtual cell brand needs several hundred thousand subscribers to be financially viable, while others put the number in the millions.

For Mobile ESPN, of course, the target audience was that breed of sports fans who are willing to pay extra to get their favorite team's name on a license plate.

Mehta said discussions with wireless operators to adapt the Mobile ESPN application for their cell phones have already begun, and that new offerings would likely emerge in less than a year, but that no deals were imminent.

## 12-year-old dies following practice

HOUSTON (AP) — A 12-year-old football player collapsed and died after a light training session with his school team, a school spokesman said.

The seventh grader, who has not been publicly identified, participated in "light football practice and conditioning drills" moments before he collapsed Wednesday afternoon, said Craig Eichhorn, a spokesman for Galena Park Independent School District.

The conditioning consisted of several 100-yard sprints, he said.

Jason Ward, head coach of the North Shore Middle School team, had assembled the players for a speech about the importance of academics when the boy collapsed, Eichhorn said.

Ward and another coach performed CPR on the player while another coach called for an ambulance. The responding emergency medics tried to revive the boy with a defribillator, Eichhorn said.

The student was taken to the East Houston Regional Medical Center, where doctors

worked for several hours to revive the boy, Eichhorn said.
"At one point, they did get a slight pulse

from him, but despite their best efforts, they were unable to save him," Eichhorn said.

Nursing supervisor Gary West confirmed that the student died at the hospital. He said

an autopsy will likely be conducted to determine a cause of death.

Galena Park coaches are required to be certified in CPR and renew their training

annually, Eichhorn said.

Eichhorn said counselors would be at the middle school Thursday to help teachers and students. The boy was remembered as a good student, athlete, role model and leader, he said.

"When a young person dies like this, it is a sad day for everyone in the district," Eichhorn said. "We have the utmost respect for this young man's family, and we will keep them in our prayers."

The seventh grader was the third football player in the Houston area to die in 10 days.



#### Owens says it was all a big misunderstanding

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Terrell Owens has done a lot of things to draw attention to himself the last six years. His latest turn in the spotlight is one he'd rather forget.

Swallowing a bottle full of pain killers? Attempted suicide? Depression?
No, no, no, T.O. said, calling the saga

that swirled around him Wednesday a big misunderstanding

"I want to apologize to the organization for this being a distraction," Owens said at the end of a confusing half day capped by his explanation of what happened. This is definitely an unfortunate situation."

Owens said he expected to practice Thursday for the first time since breaking his right hand a week ago Sunday. If all goes well, he thinks he can play for the Dallas Cowboys on Sunday in Tennessee. Owens is listed as questionable, same as

he was Tuesday afternoon, hours before an ambulance took him to an emergency room and he spent the night in a hospital.

"It was just an allergic reaction," Owens said. "It's very unfortunate for the reports to go from an allergic reaction to a definite suicide attempt."

According to Owens, he made the mistake of mixing prescription pain pills with the all-natural supplements he ordinarily takes. The combination left him woozy and his publicist, who was with him at his Dallas condo, became worried when he couldn't respond to her questions. Having also discovered an empty bottle of pills, she

called 911 around 8 p.m. Tuesday.

But around 8 a.m. Wednesday, the story took a radical turn. WFAA-TV in Dallas got hold of an unreleased police report and reported that it stated a suicide attempt was called in, that Owens was described as being depressed, that 35 pills were missing and that Owens said he was trying to harm

The police and fire department followed by holding news conferences that provided few answers. Questions lingered, even as Owens left the hospital flashing a thumb's up sign to reporters.

Cowboys coach Bill Parcells held his daily news briefing before Owens spoke. He professed not to know any details, then cut the session off early once he was getting hardly anything but questions about

"When I find out what the hell is going on, you will know," Parcells said, getting up to leave. "Until then, I'm not getting interrogated for no reason.

Owens made it to team headquarters in time to catch some passes from quarterbacks Drew Bledsoe and Tony Romo. He then showed up to a packed news conference wearing workout gear and his usual wide smile.


T.O. seemed more amused than peeved. He apologized for being a distraction, thanked his friends for worrying about him and said he is "not depressed by any

"I am very happy to be here," said Owens, who received a \$25 million, threeyear deal from the Cowboys in March, four days after the Eagles released him. "My thing is I have come here to help this team get on a roll, get on the track of getting into the playoffs and winning some ballgames.

He's especially eager to play a week from Sunday, when Dallas plays at Philadelphia, offering him his first chance to beat the team that gave up on him midway through last season.

Etheredge also spoke at the news conference, telling her side of the story and criticizing the police report that found its way to reporters before sections were blacked out. About half the information was obscured once it was officially released.

"I am just upset that I just feel they take advantage of Terrell," she said. "Had this been someone else, this may not have happened."
