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King murder trial back on docket in Missouri

PINEVILLE, Missouri -- The double murder trial of a Missouri man who is also accused of killing a family in Gray County is back on the docket after the Missouri Supreme Court cleared the way for prosecutors to seek the death penalty.

Levi King, 24, is charged in this tranquil community in southwest Missouri of murdering Orlie McCool, 70, and his daughter-inlaw, Dawn Burr McCool, 47, on Sept. 29, 2005.

King has also been indicted by a Gray County grand jury in the predawn shooting deaths of Brian Conrad, 31; his pregnant wife, Michell Conrad, 35; and her son, Zach Doan, 14, on Sept. 30, at their home between Pampa and Interstate 40. Michell Conrad was six months pregnant at the time of her death.

At his arraignment here in March, King pleaded guilty to the murder charges against him with regard to the McCools. The charges at that time did not include special circumstances that would have allowed the prosecutors to seek the death penalty. Special Prosecutor Tim Finnical said that the prosecution had until the trial date to file the special circumstances.

In Missouri, as in Texas, there are special or aggravating circumstances, such as killing while committing another crime or committing multiple murders, in order for the prosecution to seek the death penal-

When King pleaded guilty, Judge Timothy Perigo allowed prosecutors to redraw the charges against King to include the death penalty, and King was allowed to withdraw his plea.

Eventually, the prosecutors dropped and then refilled the charges against King, noting the special circumstances.

King's attorney, Charles Moreland of the Missouri State Public Defender System, argued that the state should not have been allowed

Claude man convicted in online sex scheme

Attorney General Greg Abbott commended an Armstrong County jury for Tuesday who e-mailed sexually explicit images of children to an undercover Cyber Crimes Unit investigator who was posing as a young teen online.

Mike Lee Campbell, 50, 10 years in prison on each of two counts of promotion of child pornography, with the sentences to run concurrently. The jury also determined he should serve 10 years on each of nine counts of possession of child pornography, probated to run concurrently. In April 2005, Campbell used a Web camera to display child pornography online to a person whom he thought was a 13-year-old girl. The "girl" was actually an undercover Cyber Crimes investigator. In September 2005, a search warrant was executed at the grain elevator in Claude where Campbell worked as a facili-

Forest Hill standoff ends after gunman wounds three

FOREST HILL, Texas (AP) — A nearly 14-hour standoff between police and a man accused of shooting and wounding three people and holding a young boy hostage ended at dawn today with the boy safe and a suspect in custody. Police in the Fort Worth

suburb of Forest Hill arrested Joe Dixon, 57, on a charge of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, Lt. Chris Hebert said. The boy, described as a 4-

year-old nephew of someone who lived in the house, was found unharmed and placed in the custody of an unidentified guardian, Hebert said. He said the boy had been

in the house with Dixon throughout the standoff, mostly asleep, he said. Also found in the house with Dixon were one hand-

gun and one shotgun, Hebert said. Police first responded

Wednesday afternoon to reports of a shooting in a residential area of this Fort Worth suburb.

Police arrived to find vic-

tims in the area and in a home, including one person who was critically injured, Hebert said. The gunman then barricaded himself in the house

and an hours-long standoff ensued. Hebert said authorities had established "sporadic" contact with the gunman.

Around midnight, police broke a window and threw a cellular phone into the house to facilitate further negotiations. Those talks led to the surrender, Hebert said.

The standoff began late Wednesday afternoon after the suspect barricaded himself in the home with at least one handgun, a shotgun and the boy, Hebert said.

Police had arrived in the residential area to find shooting victims in the area and in the home, including one person who was critically injured, Hebert said.

SWAT teams encircled the home overnight and authorities ordered the evacuation of everyone within a block of the standoff.

Amish community buries victims

GEORGETOWN, (AP) - Horse-drawn buggies glided past roadblocks this morning as Amish families gathered to bury four of the five young girls who were gunned down inside their tiny rural schoolhouse.

All roads leading into the village of Nickel Mines, where a milk truck driver had taken the children hostage and killed them, were blocked off for the funerals.

Their Amish families asked for privacy as scores of mourners prayed at the girls' homes before taking the bodies to a hilltop cemetery and burying Naomi Rose Ebersole, 7; Marian Fisher, 13; and sisters Mary Liz Miller, 8, and Lena Miller, 7.

The funeral for a fifth girl, Anna Mae Stoltzfus, 12, was scheduled for Friday.

Five survivors of the schoolhouse attack continued to fight their injuries today, at least four of them still hospitalized.

County coroner G. Gary

contacted by a doctor at Penn State Children's Hospital in Hershey who said doctors expected to take one girl off life support so she could be brought home. Dr. D. Holmes Morton, who runs a clinic that serves Amish children, said today that the reports that a 6-yearold had been taken off lifesupport and taken home to funeral director Philip W. die were accurate "as far as I

know." "I just think at this point mostly these families want to be left alone in their grief and we ought to respect that," Morton said.

In Lancaster County, there have been prayer services for the Amish school shooting victims at area churches, but the traditional funerals for the girls were closed. About 300 to 500 people were expected at each, said Furman.

Amish custom calls for simple wooden caskets, narrow at the head and feet and wider in the middle. An Amish girl is typically laid to rest in a white dress, a cape, and a white prayercovering on her head, Furman said.

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Ethics committee to probe Foley case

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Ethics Committee opened an investigation today into the unfolding scandal over Rep. Mark Foley's come-ons to congressional pages and accusations even by some speaker Dennis Hastert failed to protect the teens.

The committee, evenly between Republicans and Democrats, sat in closed session to take up a matter that imperils Hastert's leadership and has stirred extraordinary GOP infighting with midterm elections barely a month

Leaders of the ethics panel said they would speak pubearly afternoon.

Hastert asserted that any Republicans urging his ouster are playing into the hands of Democrats and blamed his problems on the media and Democratic oper-Republicans that House atives, even suggesting former President Clinton might somehow be involved.

> "All I know is what I hear and what I see," he said in an interview with the Chicago Tribune on the eve of the ethics meeting. "I saw Bill Clinton's adviser, Richard Morris, was saying these guys knew about this all along, If somebody had this info, when they had it, we could have dealt with it

licly about the session in the GOP "base finds out who's feeding this monster, they're not going to be happy.'

> An extraordinary political spectacle surrounded the committee's first meeting since Foley's resignation and the fallout that followed. Some leading Republicans publicly blamed Hastert for failing to take action after he was warned about the messages. And a former Foley aide said he told Republican leaders about the Florida congressman's conduct years earlier than they have acknowledged.

With Republicans concerned about maintaining their congressional majority in the elections, support for Hastert was ebbing. Republican officials said at least a few disgruntled members of the GOP rank and file had discussed whether to call on the speaker to step aside. The officials spoke on condi-

tion of anonymity, citing the sensitivity of the issue.

Hastert himself apparently was torn over how to proceed. Although he repeatedly has said he would not step down, the Illinois Republican was reported to have told a conservative activist and critic that he might consider such a move to spare the party further problems.

Paul Weyrich quoted Hastert as telling him in a phone call Wednesday that "if he thought that resigning would be helpful to the Republicans maintaining the majority, he would do it," Congressional Quarterly reported. Je an al Dellago

to seek the death penalty and that because King initially pled guilty to the murders without special circumstances the most King could be sentenced to was life in prison without parole.

The Missouri Supreme Court ended the summer of legal wrangling and indicated that the charges would stand and the case could go forward.

Judge John LePage has tentatively set Jan. 4, 2007, at the McDonald County Courthouse here as the time and place for a preliminary hearing on the McCools' murder case.

King was arrested Oct. 3, 2005, by U.S. Border Patrol agents as he tried to cross the border from Mexico back into the U.S. at El Paso.

He was driving Orlie McCool's red 2005 Dodge Dakota pickup. Authorities said they found a number of weapons in the truck along with an identification card belonging to Conrad.

King reportedly told law enforcement officers that he had crossed into Mexico, but became frightened and was trying to return to the United States when he was arrested on a murder warrant out of Missouri.

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Officials said bullets found at the Conrad home matched one of the weapons found in the truck that King was driving.

King is being held without bond by the Missouri Department Corrections. He was transferred to a state prison after an alleged escape attempt from the McDonald County Jail earlier this

ty manager. A computer and external media were confiscated, and forensic analysis revealed images and video of children engaged in sexual conduct.


An Armstrong County grand jury returned indictments against Campbell in March 2006. He remains free on bond until formal sentencing.

Promotion of child pornography is a second-

degree felony punishable by up to 20 years in state prison and a fine of up to \$10,000. Possession is a third-degree felony punishable by up to 10 years in state prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

The Cyber Crimes Unit, which targets online predators, and the Fugitive Unit, which locates convicted child sex offenders who have violated the terms of their parole and could be stalking children, have combined for more than 500 arrests of such offenders since December 2002.



The benefits of Xolox and Yahoo Messenger

Every now and then, I come across a program or two that catch my eye. Such was the case this week. Xolox and Yahoo Messenger are my two newest diversions ...

Xolox

When the famous musictrading program, Napster, bit the dust, many of us weren't quite sure who would fill the gap. Within a few months, two contenders, Kazaa and Morpheus, vied for dominance. Up until recently, I was a big Morpheus fan. The program is solid, and finds shared files quickly. The only thing I DON'T like about Morpheus is it's intrusiveness.

For that matter, Kazaa suffers in that department, too. Both programs are free to the public. While this ploy can quickly add to marketshare numbers, it doesn't add much to the bottom line. To compensate, both of these companies signed agreements with advertisers. Basically, any personal information (including your e-mail address) you give one of these companies can, and is shared with these advertisers. To make matters worse,

Kazaa monitors which songs and files you download, tying that information to your personal demo-

graphics. Enter Xolox. Developed overseas (note the NL extension on the address), this program doesn't contain spyware of any kind. It's lean, mean, and accesses the same network of users as Morpheus and Kazaa. The interface is easy to use and quick to learn. Check it out at: http://www.xolox.nl.

Yahoo Messenger

Not much has changed in the instant messaging industry. You've still got the same players: AOL (http://www.aim.com), MSN (http://messenger.microsoft. com), and (http://www.icq.com).

However. another program making waves: the Yahoo Messenger. What

makes YIM stand out from the others is it's connectivity options, specifically the "Super Webcam" feature. For those of you that may not have heard the term, Webcam, here's the short version – an eyeball-shaped camera that sits on top of your monitor, allowing video conferencing and video e-mail.

While all of these cameras come with some type of proprietary software, no industry standard connects them all, until now. The Yahoo Instant Messaging software allows for two types of video connections - server-based and peer-to-peer. In a serverbased environment, all video sent to or from your PC goes through the Yahoo server. In a peer-to-peer setting, the Yahoo server is bypassed altogether, instead attempting a direct connection between you and another

This approach, while hard to initiate, is much faster the server-based method. However, by bypassing the middleman (the server), much higher data rates can be achieved. This increased speed translates into much higher quality video between the participants.

As an example, my broth-

Austin American-Statesman on fighting for the right to know:

Congratulations are in order for U.S. Sens. John Cornyn, R-Texas, and Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. Together they finally got an improved government-inthe-sunshine bill out of committee. But it wasn't easy.

The bill (S.394) would update the existing Freedom of Information Act, which gives the public access to federal government records. According to groups that have watched the bill's progress, it is the most significant change in the open records law in a

decade.

Cornyn, a former Texas attorney general, has been pushing the bill all year, hoping to make the federal law more like the Texas Public Information Act. The changes he and Leahy added to the bill would indeed be significant improvements to the federal law.


The bill would more strictly enforce the 20-day deadline for federal agencies to disclose records requested by the public; would establish a hotline to track requests for records; give courts more authority to force agencies to reveal public records; and make it easier for requesters to recover attorney fees when agencies force them to sue. The bill also would penalize agencies for delaying responses to requests for public information.

Groups that support openness in the federal government, including the media consortium Sunshine in Government Initiative, praised the bipartisan effort that got the bill Senate Judiciary through the Committee.

Access to government records requires constant attention from the public and legislators who understand and support government in the sunshine. Federal agencies have a long record of ignoring requests for information and delaying responses, sometimes for years.

A recent report by the Government Accountability Office found that federal agencies are taking longer than ever

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



Playing in the first postseason game of his 14-year career, Delgado had four hits, a mammoth homer and the go-ahead RBI in the seventh

Wright drove in three runs, helping the Mets jump ahead in the best-of-

Game 2 is Thursday night, with rookie left-hander Hong-Chih Kuo on the mound for the wild-card Dodgers against 290-game winner Tom Glavine. Kuo pitched six shutout innings at Shea Stadium on Sept. 8 for his only major league win.

The Mets started a rookie of their own in the opener after Orlando Hernandez tore a muscle in his right calf while jogging in the outfield Tuesday. He is expected to miss the entire postseason.

Athletics 5, Twins 2 MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Playing it safe? Not Torii Hunter's style. That's why he has five Gold Gloves.

Trying to make a tough catch right after his Minnesota teammates tied the game with back-to-back home runs, Hunter missed — and Oakland took advantage.

Oakland starter Esteban Loaiza slipped in the sixth inning, surrendering consecutive solo homers to Michael Cuddyer and Justin Morneau that evened the game at 2.

number of frames of video shown per second. To achieve television quality, you must have 30 frames per second. Most standard USB cameras operate in the 10-15fps range. USB 2.0 and Firewire cameras can easily approach the 30fps threshold with a fast enough Internet connection.

to disclose records requested by the public. The number of requests carried over from year to year delays of more than 12 months and in some cases more than 24 months has risen by 43 percent since 2002.

absurd That's an response, and Cornyn and Leahy are right to push the federal agencies to perform as they should to information requests and punish them when they ignore or delay requests. Those agencies exist because the public pays their bills, and those records are kept in the name of the American people.

However, committee approval is a long way from law, and no one expects the full Senate, much less the House, to approve the bill this year. It's too late in the process. But getting the bill out of the Judiciary Committee gives it a good start when the next Congress convenes in January.

Progress is not an illusion, as George Orwell noted, it's just slow. He added that it's invariably disappointing, but we hope that will not be the case with Cornyn and Leahy's bill.
