States Are Running Out of Sins to Tax

Cars took it on the chin last year. So did the gasoline to run them. And so did cigarettes, alcoholic beverages, and hotel and motel rooms.

During the 1990 legislative season, state legislators, as they did in 1989, tried to fill in all or part of their revenue disappointments the easy way: by raising their rates on so-called "sin taxes" and similar excise taxes that put the tax pain on people's pleasures.

But that's not the likely scenario in 1991. Given the level of state activity in 1989 and 1990 and the federal government's full-court press on excise taxes this fall, many state legislatures will find that this revenue vein is just about played out.

Sixteen states passed excise tax legislation in 1990 that is

expected to raise \$2.1 billion in fiscal 1991. More than half of those legislatures raised rates on two or more types of these taxes.

In addition to adjusting the sin and gasoline taxes, many states looked around for other easy targets. Hotel and motel rooms were one: Four states enacted room or meal tax rates on the theory that it was easier to load a little tax burden on the shoulders of out-of-towners.

But excise taxes have probably had it for now on the state level. For starters, the sin tax base is dwindling as people smoke and drink less.

The taxes also tend to be relatively unproductive, points

Score by quarters for Borden County was 10-15-10-18 and 20-18-18- fourth period just as 26 for Westbrook.







Beta carotene has also been reported to reduce the incidence heart through it's role in cholesterol reducing levels in the blood.

Gold, director of the Center for Study of the States at the Rockefeller Institute, because they're usually based on quantity rather than value - that is, an excise tax on beer may be 5 cents per bottle rather than a percentage of the price. Therefore, excise tax revenues don't rise with inflation, only with a legislative increase in the tax.

No matter how much of a boost the tax is given, excise taxes have their revenue-raising limits, especially in troubled times.

If excise taxes won't play a starring role, or even a supporting role, in the revenueraising picture this coming year, where will legislators in revenue-pinched states find additional funds?



States with a sales tax closer to 4 percent have more room to maneuver, but the alternative to raising sales tax rates is broadening the base. For many states, that could mean taxing services.

Legislators in some other states say they are reluctant to go the service tax route. In Arizona last year, a state tax reform commission recommended reducing the sales tax rate but broadening the base with taxes on services. "It met with high disfavor in the legislature," reports Arizona Sen. Doug Todd. Arizona did revamp its income tax code last year. It was one of 17 states that revised income tax codes with an eye to increasing revenues.

Restructuring of income tax systems along Arizona's line, in addition to broadening sales tax systems, is what Gold predicts as the wave of the future for states that will be revenuestarved in the 1990s. "If they're smart, states won't just raise their rates, but they'll reform their tax systems and make those systems more responsive to economic growth."

For crop year 1991, producers may no longer transfer their equity interest in the cotton by filing a CCC-813 at a county ASCS office. Because of legal aspects, the CCC-813 is now obsolete.

For crop year 1991, producers may personally repay the loan at the county ASC office or execute a CCC-605, Designation of Agent - Upland Cotton, with a cotton merchant. The CCC-605 gives the merchant the right to exercise an option to redeem the producers cotton from the Form A loan. The producer is not transferring his/her equity interest in the cotton. The producer continues to maintain the liability for the cotton. If the cotton is forfeited to CCC, the producer is liable for charges incurred by CCC during the 8 month extension.

FAILED CROP ACRES

Producers who abandon standing crop acreage must file an ASCS-574 prior to the destruction of the crop. Producers with failed acreage need to measure and identify those acreages that are failed.

APPRAISALS FOR DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

Because legislation is pending before Congress which authorizes disaster payments for participating and non participating farms, ASCS has issued a policy regarding appraisals of disaster affected o crops.

Producers who have disaster affected crops of cotton, sorghum, corn, soybeans and sunflowers that will be destroyed prior to harvest and which would not be appraised because of no insurance coverage by either FCIC or a multi-peril insurance company, should consider requesting ASCS to perform an appraisal on the affected acreage. There will be a charge for the appraisal.

LOAN DEFICIENCY PAYMENT (POP)

participating cotton farm are eligible to forgo placing the cotton in the loan and apply for a loan deficiency payment (LDP), known to some as (POP), when the adjusted world price (AWP) is less than the base loan rate of 50.77 cents. To be eligible for the loan deficiency Payment (LDP), producers must still retain a beneficial interest in the cotton. In essence, this means you must still own the cotton.

Producers will "lock-in" the adjusted world price when they obtain all required signatures on ASCS from CCC-AA along with presenting the warehouse receipts and class cards to this office. Cooperative members may contact a gin representative if you choose to apply for the loan deficiency payment thorugh Plains Cotton Cooperative.



NOTICE OF INTENTION TO CONDUCT WEATHER MODIFICATION OPERATIONS IN THE STATE OF TEXAS

Date of the first of three weekly publications of this Notice: DEC. 11, 1991

- 1. Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.
- The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license. The initial license was issued on December 18, 1974, and was renewed in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.
- 3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1992, 1993, 1994, and 1995.
- 4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.
- 5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Runnels, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.
- The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, east to the Nolan-Taylor County border; thence, south along the eastern Nolan County line to the Runnels County border; thence, east along the northern Runnels County line; thence, south along the eastern Runnels County line; thence, west along the southern Runnels County line; thence, north along the western Runnels County line to a point where the southern Coke County line meets Runnels County; thence, west along the southern Coke County line to a point 13 miles south of Robert Lee in Coke County; thence, north to Robert Lee; thence, west to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.
- 7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumuliform clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air at cloud base.
- 8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather & Climate Section of the Commission.
- 9. If at least 25 eligible persons make a written request for a hearing, the Commission shall hold a public hearing on this application. Those eligible to request a hearing are all persons at least 18 years of age who reside or own property within the boundaries of the proposed weather modification operational area. A request for hearing must contain (1) the signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting a hearing; (2) a statement that each person requesting a hearing is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property within the proposed operational area; and (3) a brief description of each requester's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected by the granting of this application.
- 10. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days after the first publication of this notice. All requests for hearing should be mailed to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711-3087.
