Texas employment numbers continue to show gains AUSTIN — Seasonally adjusted Midland The Metropolitan nonagricultural employment in Statistical Area (MSA) experienced Texas increased by 15,200 jobs in the lowest unemployment rate in the September and 226,200 jobs over the state at 3.3 percent (not seasonally last 12 months, representing a 2.3 adjusted). The Amarillo MSA was percent growth rate over the year. second at 3.6 percent, followed by

The nation as a whole has seen job growth of 1.3 percent during the same period. Texas employers have added jobs for 24 consecutive months and 37 of the last 38 months. A total of 676,700 jobs have been added since July 2003. The September seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped threetenths of a percentage point to 4.8

percent.

"The decline in the statewide unemployment rate combined with continued job growth speaks very well for the health of the Texas labor market," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chair Diane Rath. "Job growth continues to outstrip U.S. job growth, and the unemployment rate of 4.8 percent has not

been seen in the last five years."


In September, hiring activities remained strong in Manufacturing. Employment in this industry experienced its second over-the-month job increase since July adding 3,400 jobs. This increase brings the total employment in the Manufacturing industry to its highest level in over three years. The annual growth rate rose from 0.6 percent in August to 0.9 percent in September, representing the addition of 8,400 jobs since September 2005.

"For the first time in Texas history, nonagricultural employment reached the 10 million mark over the last two months," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Ron Lehman. "With a record of 10,020,400 jobs, expansion continues to be broad-based across many industries and geographic areas."

Financial Activities employment increased in September, with the addition of 3,300 jobs, continuing the industry's three-month streak of employment gains. The annual growth rate remained unchanged at 3.0 percent for a total of 18,300 jobs added in Financial Activities since

# Signing deadline Dec. 15 for EQIP

By MARILYN POWERS Staff Writer

Dec. 15 has been set as the 2006 deadline for signing up for the 2007 Environmental Quality Incentives Program and the Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program, both offered by the USDA -Resources Natural Conservation Service in Texas.

"The funds allocated for EQIP will help farmers and ranchers improve natural resources on private working lands in Texas," said Dr. Larry Butler, NRCS state conservationist for Texas. "The program provides conservation measures that help

solve natural resource problems."

Natural resource concerns are established in each county by local work groups, who identify the most important natural resource issues in the area. Through EQIP, NRCS also funds projects that address special statewide resource concerns recommended by the Texas State Technical Committee.

The 2007 statewide resource concerns are animal waste, invasive species, plant condition, water quality, water quantity, and wildlife emphasis areas.

# U.S. reaffirms commitment to defend South Korea

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is reaffirming its commitment to defend South Korea, but the two countries' defense chiefs openly disagreed over the U.S. refusal to specify that it would reply to a nuclear attack on South Korea with a nuclear response.

It also was obvious Friday from a joint news conference that Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld and South Korean Defense Minister Yoon Kwang-ung are at odds over how quickly Korean soldiers should assume operational wartime command of the country's military and how the expenses should be shared.

In his opening statement, Rumsfeld said he and his Korean colleague had discussed North Korea's Oct. 9 underground nuclear test and reports that another might be planned.

"The United States reaffirms its firm commitment to the Republic of Korea, including continuation of the extended deterrents offered by the U.S. nuclear umbrella, consistent

with the mutual defense treaty," he respond

Rumsfeld said that commitment "has sent a clear signal for over three decades" when it appeared in public statements issued after the joint ministers' meetings.

Later, Rumsfeld seemed slightly befuddled by a Korean reporter's suggestion that Yoon's delegation had wanted changes in the communique's discussion of the deterrent commitment.

extensively," very Rumsfeld said. "We've had language in the communique for a very long time. It's specific with respect to the nuclear umbrella. I don't recall hearing any proposal to change it ... or can I imagine how it could be improved upon."

Yoon demurred: "This morning, we had extensive discussions about the nuclear umbrella issue, as we did during yesterday's ... meeting. So I hope that when the joint state-"I guess I'm not in a position to ment comes 'out eventually, it'll

have different language from years past."

RUMSFELD: "Oh, do you?" YOON: "I think so." RUMSFELD: "I see."

Yoon had said in his meetings with Rumsfeld that the statement should be more explicit about U.S. nuclear assurances, according to two American officials who participated in the talks and who would discuss the matter only on condition of anonymity.

Rising star Eduardo Espinel takes the podium the Amarillo Symphony on Friday and Saturday as the second finalist in the Symphony's search for a new music director.

Espinel arrives in Amarillo today to guide the Symphony through a week's worth of rehearsals before making his concert debut in the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts. The program features a lineup of rich classical works by

Falla, Grieg and Schumann, with a performance by Van Cliburn-winning pianist Chu-Fang Huang.

Espinel's audition is the second in the final round of finding a successor for Director Music Conductor James Setapen, who announced in April 2005 that he would step down at the end of this season, his 19th with the Symphony. Two other finalists will also take the baton in hopes of being named to the position in Amarillo: Byung-Hyun Rhee on Nov. 17-18 and Joel Smirnoff on Jan. 19-20. Kimbo Ishii-Eto gave his audition performance Sept. 22-23.

"Our first concert of the season was an outstanding success, and the bar is set high for Eduardo and the remaining candidates," said Nathan Newbrough, the Symphony's executive director. "We are thrilled by the fantastic momentum that this search is already building, and we are certain that this process will result in us hiring the best possible conductor.'

Tickets start at \$18 (\$15 for students and seniors) and are available at several convenient locations: through the Symphony at its 1000 S. Polk office, via phone at 376-8782 or its Web site, www.amarillosymphony.org ; or through Panhandletickets through its several outlets, via phone at 378-3096 or its Web site, www.panhandletickets.com.

Espinel, a Venezuelanborn conductor who now works in upstate New York, said he hopes to bring the Symphony's musicians and audience members a fresh take of the classics.

"I believe in a chamberlike approach to conducting that is important in creating rhythmic stability and a uniquely blended sound," he said. "As I am presenting an interpretation to the orchestra, I am forcing them to listen intently to one another to create a musical dialogue similar to what you find in a chamber setting. Through new interpretations of the great masterworks, presentation of new compositions and innovative concert programs and formats, it is my hope that the audience will be excited to gain a further understand-

ing of music." And Amarillo is primed for such a transition, Espinel said.

"The Symphony and the city seem to be at the start

of an artistic renaissance. With a new concert hall, new key players in management and in the orchestra, an exciting new era is coming," Espinel said. "I would like to be a part of and contribute to this exciting new energy. I also believe that I am at a stage in my career and musical development where I can effectively lead a professional orchestra."

Espinel has appeared as a

guest orchestral conductor

with the Canton Symphony, Fort Worth Symphony, Brevard Chamber Orchestra, Southern Arizona Symphony, Waco Symphony Orchestra, Branford Messiah in Connecticut, and has been active in Connecticut and Georgia as a guest choral director and trumpeter. During the 2004-05 season, Eduardo served as cover conductor for the Fort Symphony. Worth Recently, he made his international conducting debut the Daejeon Philharmonic Orchestra in Korea.

A decision on who will the Amarillo Symphony's new Music Director and Conductor will be made as quickly as possible by the 13-member committee that has led the search since May 2005. About 200 applications were received before the

top four candidates were chosen.

Since 1924, the Amarillo Symphony has been filling audiences with an unbridled enthusiasm for the performance and discovery of great orchestral music. As the only professional orchestra in the Panhandle area, the Symphony employs 85 skilled musicians to perform for more than 2,300 subscribers each year.

More than 200,000 Texas students participated in the 2004 Texas School Survey of Substance Use, the largest of its kind in the nation. Among the find-

 Alcohol continues to be the most widely used substance among Texas students, with 68 percent of students reporting they had used alcohol at some point

in their lives. Marijuana remains the most commonly used illicit drug among students. Thirty percent of all seventh through 12th graders in 2004 reported having smoked marijuana at some point in their lives. Pastmonth use of marijuana in

2004 was 12.6 percent, compared to 14.4 percent in 2002

 Inhalant abuse declined lifetime use but remained stable for pastmonth use. The overall rate for lifetime use in 2004 was 17 percent, and pastmonth use was seven percent. Like elementary students, both seventh and eighth graders showed an increase in inhalant use during the past two years.

The first Red Ribbon celebration was organized in 1986 by a grassroots organization of parents concerned about the destruction caused by alcohol and drug abuse. The red ribbon was adopted in honor of Drug Enforcement Administration Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, who was kidnapped and killed in February 1985

while investigating drug traffickers in Mexico.

Camarena, then 37, had uncovered an alleged multi-billion dollar drug scam in which he suspected officers of the Mexican Army, police forces and government. As he left his office one day, five men appeared at his side and kidnapped him. His body was found one month later in a shallow grave; he had been tortured and beaten.

"The funds allocated for WHIP will help Texas landowners restore and conserve native wildlife habitat," Butler said. "The program provides financial and technical assistance to producers applying approved conservation meas-

ures that help improve wildlife habitat. State habitat priorities for WHIP are based on recommendations from the Texas State Technical Committee. Atrisk and declining wildlife species are the primary targets for habitat improvement.

All counties within the state are eligible to participate in WHIP; however, funding priority will be placed on the Major Land Resource Areas that have experienced a notable decline in native wildlife habitat. These priority areas may be found in the Texas WHIP State Plan on the NRCS Texas web site at http://www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov/programs/w hip/.

Through WHIP, NRCS will develop agreements with landowners to install conservation practices that best benefit the wildlife species of concern. Costshare assistance will be provided for

Immediately following the end of the sign-up period for both EQIP and WHIP, all applications will be ranked. Producers with an approved application will work with an NRCS conservation planner to develop a contract and a plan, and they will begin implementing conservation



The United States has long opposed sweatshops around the globe. So who could possibly have a problem with China's plan to protect workers' rights in a nation where most live on the edge of poverty?

The answer is foreign corporations, including American ones, doing business there. Recently proposed labor rules, they contend, will increase wages and threaten additional foreign invest-

a long legacy of economic and human rights abuses; less abusive labor laws are long overdue.

Economic globalism works when workers aren't solely low-cost production fodder. If workers become fodder, the backlash is clear and harsh. That's why recent World Trade Organization gatherings have ended in deadlock and confusion and why misguided protectionist sentiment is gaining momentum around the globe.

Rather than issue dire warnings, foreign corporations would be better served to shape a competitive strategy that doesn't begin and end with cheap labor. China is a heavy exporter, aided partly by its artificially strong currency.

But China badly lags as a consumer This reaction is troubling. China has of foreign goods, in part because too

many people are too poor to purchase them. China wants domestic consumer demand to play a greater role in economic growth. But that will be hard to accomplish without improving the purchasing power of average citizens, which includes giving workers a greater voice in their destiny.

Yes, China must live up to its obligations as a member of the World Trade Organization. The Chinese government, for example, must be held accountable for protecting intellectual property rights, developing a more transparent economic system and eliminating discriminatory trade barriers. Those are serious impediments to an industrializing nation. But so is an abu-



non-profit United Way schools. The average length agency that is governed by a of their stay is four to six volunteer board of directors and has been providing substance abuse treatment to adolescents for the past 35 years.

The facility has two homes, one housing males and the other females, which enables it to offer its clients a home-like atmosphere. The target population it serves is adolescent males and females between the ages of 13 and 17 who have a pattern of substance abuse and/or have come into contact with the criminal justice system.

Intervention of treatment must be mandated as an alternative to incarceration. Many of the juveniles served by the program are placed in the care of the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services due to abuse or neglect. Many of the teens have parents with poor parenting skills or who are struggling with substance abuse, chronic poverty, lack of impulse control or inability to deal with anger.

Others are placed at Genesis House as a result of their involvement in criminal activity.

Educational groups are provided to the residents' family members during treatment at the facility. Genesis House conducts individual family counseling sessions to strengthen the family system and to identify problems within the fami-

Genesis House gives its clients an opportunity to reverse destructive behaviors through education and development of positive and social life skills. The residents attend Pampa Junior


At about age 11, she became involved with a gang and began using crack, cocaine and marijuana on a daily basis. She had a history of running away and quit attending school.

Elizabeth's willingness and constant dedication to her goals enabled her to complete the program in five months. With a discharge plan in place, she returned home to work toward obtaining a GED.

The series between the teams is tied at four, with the Jaguars taking both season. games last Houston's last win over Jacksonville was a 21-0 victory in 2005 that kept the Jaguars out of the playoffs and remains the Texans' only shutout.

Of course the Jaguars remain one of the stingiest defenses in the league, ranking seventh. That could lead to another tough outing for Houston and its paltry running game.

The Texans are last in the league in rushing, averaging 68 yards a game. Houston running backs rushed for just 19 yards against Dallas.

# Hereford in District 3-4A driver's seat following 48-13 win over Harvesters

Those on hand to watch the game learned the Whitefaces are as good as their record indicates as Hereford was able to breach the Harvester's usually strong defense and come away with a 48-13 win.

The first quarter appeared to provide a hint of a toe-to-toe scoring match as both teams wasted little time in finding the end zone. Pampa's scores came quick. The first was an 80yard run by Michael Robinson, followed by a 73-yard scamper by Chase Harris.

Hereford matched Pampa score-for-score in the opening period, leading the Harvesters 20-13 when the second quar-

That's when it appeared the Whitefaces were able to make some adjustments defensively, shutting down

Pampa's offense while the Hereford offense turned up the

Hereford quarterback Casey Page was mobile and accurate (14-20-0) and spread the passing wealth around en route to a 244-yard night.

The Whitefaces held a 34-13 advantage at the half. They would add two more TDs in the third before sitting their starters.

The Harvesters finished the night with just over 250 yards in total offense, most of that on the ground. Hereford rolled up 423 yards in offense.

The loss drops Pampa to 3-4 overall, 1-1 in district, while Hereford improves to 6-1 (2-0).

The Harvesters host Randall Friday night.

### Barber, Jones present similar challenges for Cowboys, Giants

IRVING, Texas (AP) - Although Michael Strahan has never had to chase teammate Tiki Barber in a game, 10 years of practices have taught him what a challenge it is.

So Dallas Cowboys running back Julius Jones should consider it quite a compliment that Strahan calls him "kind of like a little Tiki Barber."

"He's quick," Strahan said. "He's fast. He gives us trouble."

It doesn't take trying to tackle those guys to notice how much they have in common. Some things will jump out to anyone watching the Monday night game between Jones' Cowboys (3-2) and Barber's New York Giants (3-2).

Start with their size. Both are 5-foot-10 and between 205 and 210 pounds,

much of it muscle. Their styles are similar, too. Quick and shifty, they excel at bursting past the line and into the secondary. While they lack breakaway speed, their strength makes it tough to bring them

Barber certainly sees the resem-

"Absolutely," he said.

There also are some quirky similari-

They wear the same uniform number, 21, and were both second-round draft picks. They also have brothers playing in the NFL: Ronde Barber in Tampa Bay, Thomas Jones in Chicago.

Thomas Jones is even the tie that binds these two. When he was a freshman at Virginia, he was roommates with Barber, then a senior. Barber didn't get to know Julius then, but he heard all about him.

Now Julius is in his third season with the Cowboys and starting to

offense as Barber has been to the Giants since his ... fourth season. (Oh well, it can't all line up perfectly.)

Jones has run for 100 yards his last three games, marking the longest streak of his career.

He was leading the NFL in yards rushing per game until last Sunday. Who passed him? Barber, of course, by gaining 185, the most by anyone this

"He is a tremendous player, probably the best player in the division ... up there with the top four or five in the league," Cowboys coach Bill Parcells said.

Parcells was so impressed with Barber's performance last Sunday against Atlanta that he told Jones to study that film.

"There's some good learning on it," Parcells said. "He's patient. He accelerates. He will run through tackles. You don't see him make a lot of 80-, 90-yard runs, but there are a lot of pretty 10-pluses in there, which are a little

Barber had nine runs of at least 12 yards against the Falcons, who had been allowing only 69.3 yards per game, second fewest in the league.

Dallas has the NFL's stingiest run defense now, averaging 67.0 yards, but the Cowboys haven't faced anyone as good as Barber.

"He's a little guy, but he just plays big," linebacker Bradie James said. "I think Tiki is in his own league. He will block, he will run, get that tough yard, and if you don't lock him up, he'll get 20 yards and make you look bad."

Under Parcells, Dallas is 3-3 against New York. Barber's stat line is a per-

become as reliable and important to his fect gauge for which team wins. In the Giants' victories, Barber aver-

ages 110.7 yards rushing and 35.3 more receiving. He's had at least 110 total yards in all three, scoring a total of three touchdowns.

In the Cowboys' victories, Barber averaged 50.7 yards rushing and 22.3 receiving. He hasn't cracked 100 total yards and hasn't scored.

Jones is 0-2 against New York, but played well both times. He ran for 74 yards and caught nine passes for 88 yards last season, and ran for 149 yards and a touchdown, plus had 46 yards receiving, as a rookie.

The most telling stat is the games

played.

Until this year, Jones was always hurt the first time the Cowboys and Giants met. Now that he's made it through five full games, Jones could be developing the durability needed to become an elite running back capable of having a long, productive career like Barber, who comes into this game with 9,319 yards, only 88 behind Earl Campbell for 20th in league history.

"If Julius can turn out to be what this guy turned out to be, then the Cowboys are going to be in good shape for a long time," Parcells said.

Coincidentally, Barber talked this week about retiring after this season and moving into a new line of work.

"I don't know if there is anything that would change my mind," he said. "I know that at some point, as all running backs do, it's not a gradual decline. It's like you step off a cliff, from 1,500 yards rushing to 400 yards rushing. ... I kind of want to go out on my own terms."

IRVING, Texas (AP) - The Dallas Cowboy signed linebacker Junior Glymph off Pittsburgh's practice squad Friday and cut fullback Lousaka Polite to make room.

Glymph played three games for Dallas last season and was with the club in training camp. He also played three

games for Atlanta in 2004. Coach Bill Parcells said Glymph could be active Monday night against the New York Giants, in part because rookie defensive end Jason Hatcher is questionable with a

"I feel like I need a pass rusher, possibly," Parcells said. "I kind of like what I saw in preseason."



(AP) - Jeff Burton couldn't do anything right for five long seasons. Now he can't do anything wrong.

Burton has overcome late-race problems the past two weeks to widen his lead in the Chase for the championship standings, leading his rivals to wonder openly if the Nextel Cup title is his to lose.

"You can't break him. He's just there every week doing a great job," Dale Earnhardt Jr. lamented.

"If he keeps running great races, you're not going to be able to catch him. That's a really good team, and they're doing an awesome job," Kasey Kahne said.

So are these guys ready to hand over the championship? Or are these just mind games - the racer's version of trying to rattle a guy's cage?

If that's the goal, Burton said it isn't working.
