# New power plant to boost capacity

HOBBS, N.M. - A new, clean-burning, natural gasfired power plant using a fraction of the water needed by other generators will bring additional power capacity to southeastern New Mexico and West Texas by the summer of 2008.

Xcel Energy and Lea Power Partners, LLC announced a new contract Tuesday that calls for Lea Power to develop the 550megawatt combined-cycle generating plant near Xcel Energy's Maddox and Cunningham generating stations west of Hobbs.

Project development assistance is provided by Genova Power Solutions, LLC of Plano, Texas, an

independent power project developer. Colorado Energy Management, LLC of Lafayette, Colo., a subsidiary of Centennial Energy Resources, LLC, will construct and operate the new plant.

Lea Power Partners is wholly owned by ArcLight Energy Partners Fund III, L.P., of Boston, Mass.

Xcel Energy has agreed to purchase power from the new plant for 25 years to supply a growing demand for power in its Texas and New Mexico service area. The agreement provides Xcel Energy an option to acquire the plant in the future.

A megawatt can power up to 1,000 homes The addition of 550 megawatts is an obvious benefit in a region where economic growth has driven demand for electric power upward by as much as 8 percent in the past year. And because the plant features a dry condensing system, it will use approximately 10 percent of the water required by a traditional power generating station. This frees up valuable freshwater supplies for people and agriculture.

Another benefit for the region will be a reduction in emissions. The new plant is more efficient at converting natural gas to electric power with fewer emissions than neighboring plants. And the additional power provided by the new generators means the older, less-efficient plants can scale back their power output and thus reduce their emissions.

claims drugs and guns seized from criminals were resold to the community.

A U.S. Postal Service employee, a probation officer and five citizens also were charged in the 34-count indictment. The charges include racketeering conspiracy, firearms charges, narcotics distribution, obstruction of justice and perjury.

"It is disgraceful corruption," said John Brownlee, U.S. attorney for western Virginia.

William R. Reed, one of the indicted citizens, told investigators he was a middleman in the distribution ring and paid a sheriff's sergeant to use a house he owned for drug distribution, according to the indictment.

Reed began cooperating after he was arrested last year on charges of possession with intent to distribute narcotics.

The indictment alleges that cocaine, steroids, marijuana, other narcotics and guns seized by the Henry County Sheriff's Office have been sold to citizens like Reed for disfederal drug enforcement agents and money laundering. He was in custody and faced an afternoon bond hearing Thursday.

Fourteen others also were in custody and police had been in contact with the rest of those indicted except for one defendant who was at large, Brownlee said.

The Henry County Sheriff's Office declined to comment. A sheriff's dispatcher referred questions to state police; an officer who answered the phone there referred calls to the U.S. attorney's office.

Cassell has been sheriff since 1992 in the rural county of about 58,000 residents along the North Carolina line.

PHOENIX (AP) — A gunman stepped from a car and shot two people in an office parking lot today, and police said they were searching for a fired security guard.


One of the victims was another security guard at the Pitney Bowes office, and the other was an office employee. Both were in critical condition but were conscious and speaking when they were taken to a hospital, said police Sgt. Joel Tranter.

"I don't know if he knew these employees," Tranter said. "One of these (victims) was a relatively new employee. But it's not a random act that he just chose this business."

Police closed off surrounding businesses as they searched for the shooter.

Falling furniture is not a syndrome

I have finally discovered something positive about being a poor relation. And that would be, you ask? Well, that I can actually feel good about not having the savings to buy new furniture.

According to the Home American Furnishings Alliance, furnishing the home can be risky business.

For example, I bet you've never considered the tipover factor when assessing a couch or chair for your living room.

Now, no laughing. This is a serious matter. After all, efforts to revise the ASTM

furniture falling knows no socio-economic barriers. It is a threat that may occur in any abode regardless of how modest or how grandiose.

A tipover standard, developed by ASTM International, is already in place for chests, armoires release said. And, whew! Underwriters Laboratories stands.

Other dangers posed by your seemingly innocuous recliners, sofas and

chairs? Upholstery flammability. A tip from the ASTM? Candles and upholsteries don't mix. What a shocker. Be especially aware of

recliners. According to the information provided by

ASTM, recliners are now safe for adults.

"Voluntary industry guidelines," the ASTM said, "have made today's reclining chairs safe for adult use, but children should never be allowed to play or climb on reclining chairs, particularly when the chair is open."

As for dressers and chests of drawers, yanking too hard on sticky drawers may result in falling furniture. Don't overload bookcases for the same reason, and remember to choose entertainment centers/TV stands with a strict eye toward size limitations. Never outfit blanket

chests, toy chests and other storage bins with an automatic lock (for obvious reasons) and watch your head in case the lid accidentally slams shut.

ASTM recommends furniture with a gold tag.

The tag represents only those manufactures participating in a voluntary program instituted by the Upholstered Furniture Action Council.

The tag verifies that the furniture maker kept to certain safety criteria during construction of the piece or pieces.

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## A hidden online gem: Usenet, part two

In my last column, I discussed the wonderful world of "Usenet." Billed as the planet's largest bulletin board, this system allows anyone on the Internet to view messages from anyone else.

As a little review, remember that the Usenet is divided into thousands of "newsgroups," or sub-bulletin boards. Each newsgroup exists to discuss one particular topic. The organization of these newsgroups is hierarchical. In other words, a newsgroup with the name of "rec" is for discussions on all things recreational. Rec.Humor, therefore, would be for joke-telling.

Think of a Usenet message (posting) as "public email." Usenet messages look exactly like e-mail messages except they aren't "sent" to an e-mail address. They are "posted" to a newsgroup. Because of the danger of viruses, only plain-text messages are allowed on the Usenet. Since all viruses are binary, not plain text, this

### Former commander of U.S. forces in Iraq retires in San Antonio

McALLEN, Texas (AP) ---Lt. Gen. Ricardo Sanchez, who served a tumultuous year as commander of all U.S. forces in Iraq, retired from the Army on Wednesday, calling his career a casualty of the Abu Ghraib prison scandal.

"That's the key reason, the sole reason, that I was forced to retire," Sanchez said for a story in today's editions of The (McAllen) Monitor. "I was essentially not offered another position in either a three-star or four-star command."

Sanchez had been a candidate to become the next commander of U.S. Southern Command but was passed over after the prisoner abuse scandal exploded into an zation.

international controversy. He was criticized by some for not doing more to avoid mistreatment of Iraqi prisoners.

An Army spokeswoman declined comment early today.

The Army's inspector general, Lt. Gen. Stanley E. Green, concluded last year that allegations of criminal wrongdoing by Sanchez were unsubstantiated.

Sanchez, 55, served for 33 years. As commander of the Army's 5th Corps in 2003, he issued three memos authorizing harsher interrogation techniques such as stress positions, sleep deprivation and dogs at Abu Ghraib --but only with written authori-







Meanwhile, reports from the nation's largest retailers indicate that consumers may have taken a breather in October after going on a shopping spree in September. But analysts said significant declines in gasoline prices should boost retail sales in the upcoming holiday season as consumers will have more to spend on other items.

Merchants beating expectations for October included Limited Brands Inc. and Bebe Stores Inc., while retailers reporting disappointing results included Costco Wholesale Corp.

The flat productivity reading in the third quarter was the poorest showing since a 0.1 percent decline in productivity in the final three months of last year. Over the past four quarters, productivity has risen by 1.3 percent, the weakest showing since a 1.1 percent rise in early 1997.

The 3.8 percent rise in the cost of labor per unit of output followed even bigger gains of 9 percent in the first quarter and 5.4 percent in the second quarter. Those increases pushed labor ing in September, the biggest gain since late 1982.

A man described by authorities as "a person of interest" in the deadly Esperanza arson fire was arrested late Tuesday for investigation of two wildfires set in the region earlier this year.

Raymond Lee Oyler, 36, was being held in connection with two June fires in the Banning Pass area, a windy corridor that carries Interstate 10 between mountain

Riverside County prosecutors had not filed any charges against Oyler, who was expected to appear at his first court hearing on Thursday. The case was still being investigated, said Ingrid Wyatt, a spokeswoman for the district attorney. Oyler remained jailed in lieu of \$25,000 bail.

The Esperanza fire was set shortly after 1 a.m. on Oct. 26 in Cabazon, a city 90 miles southeast of Los Angeles. Stoked by Santa Ana winds, it destroyed 34 homes and charred 40,200 acres - or about 60 square miles — before being contained Monday.

Investigators interviewed Oyler on Oct. 27 and served a search warrant on his Beaumont residence Monday, according to a Sheriff's Department statement that described his detention as a "probable cause arrest."

Authorities stressed that Oyler was only being held in connection with the June fires

"Oyler is not a suspect in the 'Esperanza Fire,' but is a person of interest," the statement said.

Two young men were picked up by sheriff's deputies for questioning on Monday and were then released. Authorities have said they would be questioning multiple people.

A reward for information leading to an arrest has reached \$550,000.

In Joplin, Mo., police and court records show Oyler had several traffic violations and other mostly minor run-ins with the law from 1997 through 1999.

# William Styron dies at age 81

NEW YORK (AP) — William Styron, the Pulitzer Martha's Vineyard or join-Prize-winning author of "The Confessions of Nat Turner" and other novels whose explorations of the darkest corners of the human mind and experience were charged by his own near-suidemons, cidal died Wednesday. He was 81.

Styron's Alexandra, said the author died of pneumonia at a hospital in Martha's Vineyard, Mass. Styron, who had homes in Martha's Vineyard and Connecticut, had been in failing health for a long time.

"This is terrible," said Kurt Vonnegut, a longtime friend. "He was dramatic, he proud and he

His other works included "Sophie's Choice," the award-winning novel about a Holocaust survivor from Poland, and "A Tidewater Morning," a collection of fiction pieces. He also published a book of essays, "This Quiet Dust," and the memoir best-selling Visible," "Darkness in which Styron recalled nearly taking his own life.

Styron was a liberal long involved in public causes, from supporting a Connecticut teacher suspended for refusing to say the Pledge of Allegiance to advocating for human rights for Jews in the Soviet Union. In the 1990s, Styron was among a group of authors and historians who successfully opposed plans for a Disney theme park near the Manassas National Battlefield in northern Virginia.

Although he was often cited along with Vonnegut and Norman Mailer as a leading writer of his generation, he produced little over the past 15 years. Styron was reportedly working on a military novel, yet published no full-length work of fiction after "Sophie's Choice," which came out in 1979. He

tenant in the Marines during World War II and in 1945 was stationed in Okinawa. He was to take part in the invasion of Japan and didn't expect to come out alive.

The battle never took place; the United States dropped the atom bomb instead.

"Some of my problems I think came from a continuing anguish over my mother's death and if I had gotten shot it would have been, I suppose, some kind of completion. It's hard to say how that would have worked out," Styron told The Associated Press in a 1990 interview.

"When I was a young Marine platoon leader, there was this incredible sense of fate. The myth at that age is you're going to live forever. Well, I never believed that and my friends didn't. I thought I was going to die."

After the war, Styron graduated from Duke University and moved to New York, where he worked briefly as a copy editor at McGraw-Hill until the publisher fired him "for slovenly appearance, not wearing a hat, and reading the New York Post."

With extra free time and financial help from his family, Styron was able to complete "Lie Down in Darkness," detailing the destruction of a Southern family in a tempest of alcoholism, incestuous longing, madness and suicide.
