Strange electronic sounds defy logical explanation

In today's world of multiple methods of communicating and sending signals, not all modern devices work and play well together.

The result of some signaling conflicts may be interference with the sound and/or image transmitted by various devices, including telephones, radios, televisions and computers.

Some Pampans are currently experiencing interference with a relinterference has been remarked upon by residents in northern and central Pampa, including the North Crest area around Travis Elementary School, the area south of 23rd Avenue and west of Hobart Street, two locations within a few blocks of Pampa High School, at least one home on Comanche Trail, and offices in the downtown area and on South Barnes Street.

At two homes, white noise resembling that which accompanies "snow" on a television is sometimes atively wide range of systems. This heard over the homes' land line tele-

phones. Crackling is heard over the phone at a third home.

Perhaps the oddest type of interference is described as a sound like electronic "Morse code," heard in short bursts in a nearly identical pattern each time. This sound has been heard via televisions, both land line and cellular phones, computers, emergency radio scanners, and radios. The sound may occur multiple times in a single day.

Transmission towers such as the one recently erected by Alltell at Pampa Mall for cellular phone signals are sometimes blamed for such interference. However, the new Alltell tower is not yet in service, according to Chadd Giles, assistant performance engineer at Alltell's Pampa store.

"It's not picking up and sending out signals," Giles said of the new

Alltell has two similar towers in the Pampa area which have been in operation for some time. One is near Highway 152 and the other is locat-

Also available are detailed marker research guides that provide information on how to compile the requisite research for a variety of eligible topics including structures, cemeteries, individuals, institutions, churches, synagogues, communities and World War II.

The marker research guides offer resources, links, documentation formats, research checklists and sample histories to assure applications are completed cor-


"We are excited and proud of the new features to the historical marker program," Dan Utley, chief historian for the THC, said. "Elements like sample nominations are both fun to read and informative, and they help get the word out to CHCs and individuals in anticipation of the upcoming application deadline."

The THC's redesign of the Official Texas Historical Marker Program is the first in the more than 40-year history of the agency's placing historical markers around the state.

One of the most visible THC programs, the marker

ed off Loop 171.

"If it was us, you'd have seen it (the interference) a long time ago," Giles said.

Two new wireless Internet towers built by Pampa Communications are also evidently blameless, according to Pam Martin, owner.

"I noticed the interference before the towers were ever built. I think it's cell phones, but I don't know," Martin said. "Mine has done it for a long, long time and it's gotten worse.'

Martin has heard of the same type of interference occurring as far away as Dumas.

Douglas Campbell, vice president for AMA TechTel in Amarillo, said the source of the interference could depend on the frequencies on which it is occurring.

"It's odd that it would be on so many different things," Campbell said when told of the various devices which have picked up the signals. "That is really, really, really bizarre.

Some of the possible culprits for the sounds which Campbell listed include transmission towers, electric service equipment, some types of monitors, radar, and government equipment,

"It could be anything from a new power transmission line, which actually emits radio waves, to a new electrical substation," Campbell said. "If it's the government, they operate in frequencies nobody can touch."

Monitoring equipment used to monitor oil wells, water flow and pipelines operates on low frequencies and might conceivably cause interference, he said.

Other possible sources include UHF transmissions and weather telemetry devices, Campbell said.

"We deal with these sorts of interference all the time,"

"All those devices work on so many different frequencies. I don't have any idea," said Steve Hawkins of Hawkins Communications when asked about the possible causes of the interference. "Normally, if you have interference, it's on a specific frequency."

Hawkins said the geographic size of the area affected, plus the range of frequencies, may point to some type of broadcast station putting out a lot of power.

"All of our instruments are checked every day," said Darrell Sehorn of KGRO/KOMX radio sta-

Some travel tips to bear in mind this holiday season

As Thanksgiving and Christmas approach, so does the holiday travel season. Many of you may travel year-round. Merilee Kern with Kern Communications, poses a rather significant question for those of you planning to travel or who travel often: Do you know your 'travel rights'?

"Holiday travel season is upon us, with flights, cruises, railways, lodging and vehicles being booked at lightening speed. But, as collectively consumers spend \$1.3 trillion annually for travel and tourism, far too few know what their legal 'rights and obligations' are before making their travel-related purchase, which can render them vulnerable – even to severe unforeseen legal consequences," Kern

Communications reports in a "Media News Brief."

Kern Communications called on attorney Jeff Isaac to cull forth some worthy travel advice. The following tips were lifted from the Kern news brief:

 Ensure your travel agent is legit. Before booking, ensure your travel agent or agency is compliant with state requirements. Regulations vary from state to state, every license issuing state requires registration, fees and compliance with some financial security regulation or statute. Many states even have specific laws for the regulation, registration, licensing, or bonding of sellers of travel, so it's important to know if you agency is adhering to such requirements.

support resources. Purchase travel with your credit card rather than cash or a debit card. Under U.S. law, credit

card holders Skyla have the right to **Bryant** request a **News Editor** "chargeback, essentially a

refund, on their accounts for travel services that are not delivered as promised. Of course, the credit card company must agree that your situation is chargeback-worthy.

· Find out if your state has a restitution fund. Seek out travel-related consumer advocate groups. The California Travel Consumer Restitution Fund (TCRF),

· Leverage available for example, compensates and treatment, cancellations consumers who purchased air or sea travel, either alone or in conjunction with other travel services, from a regis-

tered California travel agent, and who did not receive what had been promised. Those

believing they are eligible to receive compensation can submit a claim with the organization for considera-

 Consider travel protection. Protecting large travel investments and property with a travel protection plan can insure you against possible supplier default, bankruptcy, medical evacuation and other such vacation disruptions. Just be sure you purchase travel insurance from a reputable provider one that is NOT self-insured their shortcomings become yours.

 Heed TSA regulations. If you mistakenly pack a "prohibited item" in your carry-on bag, you could be assessed a TSA fine up to \$10,000! Carrying certain prohibited items could even result in both a civil and criminal enforcement action. Arguing with a TSA screener could also result in a substantial fine, so stay calm, cool and collected when you find yourself in a possible contraband situation.

 Check baggage at your own risk. Legal recourse for mishandled baggage claims

is largely futile in light of the large number of airline tariffs (restrictions), albeit listed in the fine print on the back of an airline ticket that usually go unnoticed or unread by travelers. Airline regulations prohibit compensation for almost any claim, particularly for high dollar and/or somewhat fragile items such as laptop computers, jewelry and electronics.

· Invoke Rule 240 when delayed. Rule 240 - an airline's delay-and-cancellation policy - covers delays that are the airline's fault, such as mechanical problems or schedule changes. Under this rule, the major carriers must try to book you on the next available flight at no extra charge, even if it means put-

How to get translations on the Internet

Whenever I'm out speaking to different groups, one of the most common questions I receive goes something like this: "Is the Internet English-only?" I quickly answer, "Not at all!"

Remember, the Internet was started by the United States, so the foundational terms and services were created with English in mind. However, over the years, other countries have joined the Net, adding their own unique customs and culture to this online village.

Roughly, 80 percent of the information on the Internet is in English. The other 20 percent is in other languages, but that ratio is changing. Here's why: Let's say you live in Italy and run a clothing company. You decide to put up a Web site. What is your goal? What is the goal of ALL Web sites? To receive as many visitors as possible! If you design your site strictly using the Italian language, you are effectively excluding the majority of your potential customers.

eign language sites usually have "English versions." As an example, take a look at ear, allowed it's host to one of my favorite sites, understand any spoken lanerrari (http://www.ferrari.it).

About the only country that ignores this practice is France. They actually have government

employees tasked with the goal of "preserving the French language." Believe it or not, some companies in France have been fined for not using French on their Web sites!

Having said all of that, what do you do if you run into a Web page that has no English version? (Most like-

ly French, heh, heh, heh ...) First, try visiting the Altavista Babelfish server (http://babelfish.altavista.co m/). The word "babelfish" comes from the Douglas Adams book, "The Hitchhiker's Guide to the

site. You will notice a large blank area ready to receive some foreign text or a Web address. This is actually a very powerful interface. Once, I received a Microsoft Word document via e-mail written entirely in French. I cut and copied into this Altavista page, hit the "French to English" button and voila! I could read it. By far, however, it is easier to

translate an entire page. Try this: Go to a foreign language page (how about the La Tribune newspaper at http://www.latribune.fr/). Note the URL (Web address). Go back to the

Altavista Babelfish page and copy the URL into the big blank. Choose "French to English" and hit the "Translate" button. The translation is not always perfect, but it is good enough to Anyway, get the main idea of the page. Also, note, words on Oh, graphics are not translated.

> What about LEARNING a foreign language, though? The Internet is one of the best (and most economical) methods to do so.

My favorite site in this regard is the Foreign Languages for Travelers site (http://www.travlang.com/la nguages/). The simple, twostep process asks you for the language YOU speak and then asks what language you WANT to speak. Choose anything from Albanian to Zulu. Over 70 languages are represented.

Once you select your new language, you can then choose what types of translations you want: Basic Words, Numbers, Shopping/Dining, Travel,

If the Democrats should regain Congress, no doubt the nation might be taken a different direction in some of the hot-button issues that tend to incite emotions. And emotions tend to trigger large number of voters who can effect change.

Truth of the matter, the Republicans are facing a day of reckoning. Theyve had time to demonstrate their use of unbridled power. And they will be judged on everything from the war in Iraq to the state of the economy.


On the other hand, the Democrats havent been very effective at offering better alternatives to current policies.

But looking at the bigger picture, neither party has been particularly strong on things that provided the bedrock for the United States from the beginning.

For instance, individual liberty has been eroding since 9/11 as a number of wide-reaching laws, including the controversial Patriot Act, have allowed government to be more intrusive in all of our private lives.

Meanwhile, government power and the resulting runaway spending seems to be expanding no matter who controls Congress.

· Know your "bump" rights. The Department of Transportation requires each airline to give all invol- Should you need to seek legal assis-

statement of their rights along with an explanation of the carrier's policy on overbooked flights. Airlines must first ask for volunteers to give up seats before they deny boarding to a ticket-holder. Involuntarily bumped passengers may be entitled to an onthe-spot payment of denied boarding compensation up to \$400 based on the price of their ticket and the length of the delay. Airlines must also refund the ticket price if you ultimately choose not to travel.

· Document any incidents.

untarily bumped passengers a written tance for a travel-related incident, be sure to detail a chronology of events leading up to the problem and be able to provide your attorney with all documents relating to the issue.

> · Consider alternative dispute resolution. Should you have an escalated travel-related dispute that for which a legal proceeding-is in order, a courtroom trial, often a deterrent, is not your only recourse. Alternative Dispute Resolution, Arbitration and Mediation are other means of settling the case quicker, easier and more economically.



Signs of her brain DEAR ABBY: My grandson, "Braden," damage will start out with gaps in memory, short-term memory loss, slurred speech and sudden outbursts of anger. The more advanced stages of brain damage include disorientation, loss of coordination and balance, and seizures. People who choke themselves to get high should visit the nursing homes in their area, as one of them will someday wind up in one. I speak from experience. I care for many people who said it would never happen to them. This is serious. That girl needs help, and she needs it now. - ED IN SNOHOMISH, WASH.

DEAR ABBY: I lost my 13-year-old son to ing-game.com. the "choking game." It's NOT a game.

"Worried's" sister can only be mad at her for so long. Please urge her to talk to her parents. It's the only way to save her sister. If she waits, it could be too late. - MOM WITHOUT A SON IN VIRGINIA

DEAR ABBY: As a school counselor, I can confirm the widespread familiarity of kids 9 to 15 years old with this "game" and how often parents and other adults are clueless. (I was.) After an 11-year-old died at a nearby school, I polled several middle and elementary school classes to see if they had tried it or knew somebody who had. The percentage was 75 percent! It doesn't receive the news coverage it should because medical examiners often mistake it for suicide. Knowing about it is the key to stopping it. - CONCERNED COUN-**SELOR IN OREGON**

DEAR ABBY: I teach in an elementary school. One of our students died from playing the choking game. Children as young as 6 and 7 have told me they know what to do. We warn students never to put anything around their necks, and talk about "safe" games they can play. We also encourage them to tell an adult if they know someone who is playing the game. Sadly, we didn't learn that children were doing it here until it was too late. - AMY IN INDIANA





Publisher considers Simpson book a confession

NEW YORK (AP) — O.J. Simpson created an Goldman's father, Fred Goldman, said on CNN's uproar Wednesday with plans for a TV interview "Larry King Live" Wednesday night. and book titled "If I Did It" — an account the pubutives condemned as revolting and exploitive.

Fox, which plans to air an interview with Simpson Nov. 27 and 29, said Simpson describes how he would have committed the 1994 slayings of his ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, and her friend Ronald Goldman, "if he were the one responsible."

Denise Brown, sister of Simpson's slain ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, lashed out at publisher Judith Regan of ReganBooks for "promoting the wrongdoing of criminals" and commercializing abuse. The book goes on sale Nov. 30. She added: "It's unfortunate that Simpson has

decided to awaken a nightmare that we have painfully endured and worked so hard to move Regan refused to say what Simpson is being paid

for the book but said he came to her with the idea. "This is an historic case, and I consider this his confession," Regan told The Associated Press.

Simpson was acquitted in 1995 of murder after a trial that became an instant cultural flashpoint and a source of racial tension. The former football star was later found liable for the deaths in a wrongfuldeath suit filed by the Goldman family. In the years since, he has been mocked relentlessly by late-night comedians, particularly for his vow to hunt down

"He's willing to tell the world how he 'would' murder his children's mother and Ron. Sick,"

Simpson has failed to pay the \$33.5 million judglisher pronounced "his confession" and media execment against him in the civil case. His NFL pension and his Florida home cannot legally be seized. He and the families of the victims have wrangled over the money in court for years.

The victim' families could go after the proceeds from the book's sales to pay off the judgment. But one legal analyst said there are ways to get around that requirement — such as having proceeds not go directly to Simpson.

"Clever lawyering can get you a long way," said Laurie Levenson, a Loyola University law school professor and former federal prosecutor who has followed the case closely.

Levenson noted that the criminal justice system's protection against double jeopardy means Simpson's book, explosive as it may be, should not expose him to any new legal danger. She added that Simpson could create an extra layer of insulation from any legal worries by presenting the story hypothetically.

"He can write pretty much whatever he wants," Levenson said. "Unless he's confessing to killing somebody else, he can probably do this with

Goldman's sister, Kim Goldman, told CNN: "He's snubbing his finger to the system, to the community again. He's telling us one more time, 'I'm gonna continue to get away with killing your family members and I'm not gonna honor the judgment and look at me, ha, ha, ha."

Oral Roberts upsets Kansas

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — It's party time at Oral Roberts, the religion-based school in Tulsa that gave Bill Self his first job as a head coach.

The lightly regarded Golden Eagles came into Lawrence as double-digit underdogs to a mighty Kansas team ranked No. 3 in the country, victorious in 165 of its last 175 home games. What they went home with Wednesday night was a surprising 78-71 victory over the Jayhawks, Self's current team.



China to use mice to test food for Olympic athletes

BEIJING (AP) — China will use mice to test the safety of food for athletes competing in the 2008 Olympic Games, state media reported Thursday

"Milk, alcohol, salad, rice, oil, salt and seasonings will be tested by white mice 24 hours before they are used in cooking or served to athletes," Xinhua News Agency quoted Zhao Xinsheng of the Beijing Municipal Health Inspection

Zhao told a meeting on hygiene measures for the games that the mice would develop an adverse reaction to any food poisoning within 17 hours, sooner than test methods such as bacteria cultures.

China has seen a string of food poisoning incidents in

recent months.

In October, more than 200 students and teachers fell ill at school in southern China.

There have been at least eight other food poisoning incidents, but officials say they don't appear to be connected.

Zhen Xiaozhen, of the medical team of the Beijing Organizing Committee of the Olympic Games, told the meeting that most of the food for the Olympic athletes

would be Western style, complemented by Chinese dishes. Health inspectors were to receive training in management and inspection of Western food preparation starting this month, said Liang Jin of the inspection bureau.

Clear Channel agrees to acquisition

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - Clear Channel Communications Inc., the nation's biggest radio station owner, said today it has agreed to be acquired for about \$18.7 billion by an investment group.

The transaction would be one of the biggest deals in which a company has been taken private, and showcases vast sums that buyout groups have recently been able to assemble to acquire public companies.

Clear Channel said the deal calls for a group led by the investment firms Thomas H. Lee Partners LP and Bain Capital Partners LLC to pay \$37.60 in cash for each share of Clear Channel common stock. That is a 10.2 percent premium over its closing price on Wednesday.

Its shares climbed \$1.89, or 5.5 percent, to \$36.01 in premarket trad-

The buyers are also assuming about \$8 billion in debt in the deal.

Clear Channel announced in late October that its board of directors was evaluating "strategic alternatives to enhance shareholder value."

Analysts had said taking the company private could push shares toward a price of \$37 to \$40 each.

Clear Channel said the company's board of directors "with the interested directors recused," unanimously approved the agreement and is recommending shareholder approval. Lowry Mays is the company's chairman of the board and his two sons, Mark and Randall, are CEO and chief financial officer, respectively.

People familiar with the matter had expected at least two bids to be submitted as the deadline for offers passed earlier this week. Another bid had been expected from Providence Equity Partners, the Blackstone Group and Kohlberg Kravis Roberts & Co.

Clear Channel owns or operates

1,150 radio stations and is the largest operator of radio stations in the coun-

It also owns a majority of Clear Channel Outdoor, the outdoor-advertising segment that sells billboard and bus-stop ads.

In a separate announcement Thursday, Clear Channel said it plans to sell 448 of its radio stations, all located outside the top 100 media markets in the U.S., and its 42-station television group.

The deal would rank behind KKR's 1988 buyout of RJR Nabisco Inc., which still is the biggest going-private deal ever at \$25.1 billion. It would also trail two other deals announced earlier this year. Those included the \$21.8 billion buyout of airport development company BAA PLC and the \$21.2 billion buyout of hospital company HCA Inc.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Sacha Baron Cohen, whose fictional Kazakh reporter Borat has sparked controversy, says he could never put himself and others in embarrassing situations if he weren't in character.

"I think I'd find it hard to," Cohen says in an interview with Rolling Stone magazine. "I think you can hide behind the characters and do things that you yourself find difficult."

Cohen's spoof documentary, "Borat: Cultural Learnings of America for Make Benefit of Glorious Nation of Kazakhstan," follows his Kazakh TV journalist character on a cross-country trip to report back to his homeland on American culture.

The film has become a runaway hit — generating complaints and lawsuits along the way from Borat's unwitting subjects who say they were duped into making racist, sexist and anti-Semitic remarks.

Cohen, a devout Jew who keeps kosher and the Sabbath when possible, says he purposely made his character prejudiced.

"Borat essentially works as a tool," the 35-year-old British comedian tells the magazine in an interview conducted before the film's opening.

"By himself being anti-Semitic, he lets people lower their guard and expose their own prejudice, whether it's anti-

Semitism or Semitism," he says.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — A woman who claims soul singer James Brown raped her is asking

the Supreme Court to hear her sexual harassment lawsuit, which a lower court ruled this year she had waited too long

Jacque Hollander argues that the state's two-year statute of limitations in such cases does not provide equal protection to women.

In her lawsuit, Hollander said Brown raped her at gunpoint in 1988 while she was working as his publicist. She

seeks \$106 million in damages. Hollander said she sued Brown after she developed a thyroid condition in 2000 that doctors told her was caused by the stress of the alleged assault. She said the statute of limitations also shouldn't apply because the condition wasn't diagnosed for 12 years.

Brown's attorney, Debra Opri, called Hollander's request for the Supreme Court to hear the case "a pipe dream."

The appeal is likely Hollander's final legal option, said her lawyer, Donald Rosen. "Then her only recourse is in the court of public opinion,"

Rosen said. "That would be a horrible miscarriage of justice."

A federal appeals court tossed out Hollander's lawsuit in August.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — Whitney Houston's New Jersey mansion is slated to be sold at a sheriff's sale because she is more than \$1 million behind on the mortgage and taxes have not been paid this year, according to reports published Wednesday.

The Jan. 4 sale was scheduled Tuesday by the Morris County Sheriff's Office, the Daily Record of Parsippany reported. The service agent for Chevy Chase Bank, the mortgage holder, sued Houston in June.

Houston's estate comprises two lots, and the sale would be of the lot assessed at \$889,300. The adjacent lot is valued at more than \$5.6 million, the Daily Record reported. Houston, 43, bought the properties in 1987 for \$2.7 million.

Through a secretary, Houston publicist Nancy Seltzer told the newspaper the property was not in foreclosure. A woman who answered the telephone at Seltzer's office on Wednesday said Seltzer was traveling and could not be reached for comment.

Phone messages left after business hours with the service agent, Mortgage Electronic Registration Systems Inc., and the sheriff's office were not returned Wednesday.

Mendham Township is owed about \$83,000 in property taxes this year on the 10-acre estate, officials told The Star-Ledger of Newark.

Refund Policy

Clarendon College shall refund tuition and mandatory fees collected for courses from which the student drops or withdraws. Any student officially withdrawing from the College before the first day of classes of any semester will be refunded 100% of tuition and fees less a \$15 matriculation fee. (Class days refers to the number of calendar days the institution normally meets classes, not the days a particular course meets.)

For semester-length courses for which semester credit hours are awarded:

- 100% refund is to be made for courses dropped prior to the first class day.
- During the fall or spring semester if a course is dropped during the first 15 class days a 70% refund will be issued.




