## Bush works to strengthen coalition

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) - President Bush, trying to fortify global pressure on Rim leaders in demanding that the communist regime abandon its nuclear weapons program.
In Hanoi for the annual summit of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation forum,
Bush worked to preserve U.S solidarity Bush worked to preserve U.S. solidarity
with five nations getting ready to restart nuclear negotiations with Pyongyang. The White House endorsed a statement all 21 Pacific Rim members will issue to express their worries about North Korea's first nuclear test on Oct. 9 and its missile
launches in July. "I think we're pleased with launches in July. "I think we're pleased with
that statement and I think it will be a good contribution to the diplomacy," National Security Adviser Stephen Hadley told Security
reporters.
But while
But while cheered with the APEC statement against North Korea, Bush failed to win South Korea's support for intercepting ships suspected of carrying supplies possibly
bound for North Korea's nuclear weapons program.

\section*{Whale blubber salad anyone?Alaskans add tribal foods to holiday}

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)
David Smith was a new David Smith was a new arrival to the North Slope village of Nuiqsut last year when the former resident of upstate New York cooked up
few turkeys and vat of chili for the Eskimo
Thanksgiving dinner.
He was completely unprepared for another dish on the menu: hun-
dreds of pounds of gleaming red raw whale meat, served frozen solid in bite-size pieces.
"I thought we were going to
have a feast. I never assumed it have a feast. I never assumed it
would be a feast of whale meat," would be a feast of whale meat," said Sm

Thanksgiving tables this year will be set with store-bought turkey and all the trimmings. But alongside will be delicacies such as reindeer stew, moose roast, stuffed moose

which is whipped animal or vegetable fat that is mixed with sugar,

Nuiqsut's gathering includes a sprinkling natives like Smith, teachers, government workers and North Slope oil crews. Former Mayor Leonard

tion from first-timers witnessing the bowhead whale feast.
"They're usually very curious," he said. "They're always asking
questions, like, 'What questions, like, 'What part is this
that you are eating? Is that normal that you are eating? Is that normal
to dip it in steak sauce like that?"' to dip it in steak sauce like that? 50 feet or more and weigh up to 100 tons. Edible parts include the meat, tongue and muktuk, which is the blubber and skin. In Nuiqsut, each bowhead caught is traditionally divided into thirds, to be distrib-
uted at Thanksgiving and uted at Thanksgiving and

Whale can be cooked, but it is eaten raw and frozen - never thawed - at the Nuiqsut feast.

Thanksgiving dishes will include the familiar turkey and mashed potatoes as well as muktuk salad and teriyaki caribou.

capped by Eskimo dances honoring the whaling crews.

The whale hunters are "the stars
of the dance, you might say,"

\section*{Tumbling tumbleweeds are actually Russian thistle plants}

\begin{abstract}
It appears we are being attacked
by tumbleweeds. I was driving home the other day and the tumblers rolled across the highway by the thousands from the back coming from the south. And another day last week they were coming from the west. At one point, a car in front of me actually swerved from left to rig in an attempt to avoid them here at businesses on the north side of town as well as fences all over town and in the country. As a native of western Kansas, I am no stranger to these bothersome
weeds. weeds.
Tumbleweeds are not native to
America. They are actually Russian thistle plants. I have heard they were introduced to America in the late 19th century by Russian and German immigrants who transported the see
their trousers.
But the official explanation is
that tumbleweeds were first report-
ed in the United States around
1877 in Bon Homme County, S.D.,
transported in flax seed imported
by Ukrainian farmers, according to
information on the Internet.
Twenty years later, they had invad-
ed a dozen states. The prolific
plants are now entrenched from
Canada to Mexico.
Russian thistle plants are gener-
ally rounded clumps wwith skinny
stems that can grow to four feet in
height. When young, the plants are
soft but soon develop stems that
have pointed edges that are sharp
enough to cut the skin.
They grow mainly where the
ground has been disturbed by ani-
mals, usually in idithes, and thrive
in salty and alkaline soils. They can
grow at elevations from below sea
level to more than 8,500 feet.
Russian thistle plants bloom
between May and October and pro-
duce tiny white to pink flowers. In

Hospitals and doctors acres Hountry report that doctors across the country report that newborns have been denied coverage since a federal policy
that prohibits automatic Medicaid eligibility to babies took effect this year. And it's only a matter of time before this new law results in unintended tragedy.
The American Academy of Pediatrics is sufficiently alarmed by the possibility that newborns will wind up without preventive care, immuniza-
tions and treatments essential to their first year of life that it has asked the federal government to clarify the
intended purpose of the policy Before President Bush signed the change into law in February, babies in most states were automatically eligible dren's medical expenses for one year. The new policy requires that parents also fill out an application and prove the child is a U.S. citizen. The prob lem? Processing birth certificates can sometimes take weeks or months.
Texas has long required proof of iden tity for Medicaid applicants. But the additional proof of citizenship requirement is making it more difficult to ge help at chronically understaffed and overwhelmed eligibility offices in such cities as Dallas, Fort Worth and Austin.
Two hundred babies under the age of Two hundred babies under the age of
2 months were denied Medicaid coverage between August and October because they lacked citizenship docu-
ments, according to the Texas Health and Human Services Commission. The new guidelines are designed to curb fraudulent abuse of Medicaid benefits, a worthy goal. But innocent chil-
dren should not be left vulnerable because of possible paperwork tie-ups. Even worse, misinformation might keep parents from taking their child to he hospital until the baby is gravely ill Also, consider that denying health car child ends up in the emergency the which by law must provide help to al in need.
One thing we can all agree on is that denying medical services to a young child who has no culpability in wher he or she is born is cruel and unusua out before we read about that firs needless infant death.

Largest surplus in state history hits snag
AUSTIN (AP) - Estimates show Texas
will soon be sitting on the largest budget surplus the state has ever seen, but a quirk in the law may prohibit lawmakers from spending a large chunk of it. A spending limit put in the state constituon in 1978 to limit the growth of government could leave as much as \(\$ 5\) billion of an estimated \(\$ 15\) billion surplus off limits. But this year's school finance legislation requires the state to spend more to make up for lower property tax rates in local school districts. "There could be a requirement that we There could be a requirement that we
leave 3 to 5 billion dollars on the table," Rep. Jim Pitts, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, told a group of foster-home agencies. "Those funds are there, but they won't be able to be spent on

Student sex offenders fall through school safety nets

By JEFF CARLTON DALLAS (AP) - Background checks prevent teachers who are reg-
istered sex offenders from working in istered sex offenders from working in
schools, but no law keeps students schools, but no law keeps students
with histories of committing sex crimes from sharing history lessons and hot lunches with their classmates in Texas. That leaves parents in the dark
about who might be sitting in the about who might be sitting
desks next to their children. No single authority knows how mo single authority knows how
migh registered sex offenders are
high students. About 2,400 registered sex offenders are younger than 21, the oldest age allowed for
high school students in Texas high school students in Texas. About
320 are under the age of 17 , said Tela Mange of the Texas Department of Public Safety.
But those figures do not likely reflect the actual number of youthful sex offenders. Those who are 17 or 18
can petition the courts to can petition the courts to have their
cases removed from the registry cases removed from the registry.
Others may have dropped out of Others may have dropped out of attorney with the Texas District and County Attorneys Association. "It's a very fluid number," said Tom
Vinger, a spokesman for the public Vinger, a spokesman for the public

three known registered sex offenders who are also students in the Austin Independent School District. The communications breakdown in
Austin appears Austin appears commonplace around
the state, where many school districts the state, where many school districts
and local police seem unclear about and local police seem unclear about
their legal responsibilities. their legal responsibilities.
It's also led at least one teachers'
advocacy group to call for stricter
monitoring of students with histories of committing violent or sexual crimes. "In my mind, good public policy "In my mind, good public policy
dictates that the public and specifically ctates that the public and specificalregistered sex offender in their midst," said Jeri Stone, executive director of the Texas Classroom Teachers Association. Under state law, it is up to each offender to register his or her informa tion. Local police have 24 hours to
notify school districts, which must then let teachers know promptly. The same law prohibits teachers and staff from relaying that information to any one else, including other students or
their parents. their parents.

followed in Austin, however There local police sent monthly updates to the superintendent's office listing sex offenders living in the city, said Andy Welch, an Austin school district
spokesman. School personnel then spokesman. School personnel then
determine whether any on the list are determine whether any on the list are
students.
Mendoza had enrolled about a week earlier after moving to halfway house, where he was completing his sentence for indecency
with a 4 -year-old girl. The school diswith a 4-year-old girl. The school dis-
trict was unaware he was a registered trict was unaware he was a registered
sex offender because it not received the latest listing from Austin police, Welch said.
As a result of the incident, Austin
police will now notify schools imme police will now notify schools immediately when a school age offender
appears on the registry appears on the registry, po
spokesman Kevin Buchman said In Houston, school officials also ge a monthly list from the district attorney's office, district spokesman Norm Uhl said. In Fort Worth, police and schools
appear to comply more closely with appear to comply more closely with
the law. Adult sex offender lists are regularly sent on to principals and department heads, who are "constantly checking" for student names, school district spokeswoman Barbara Griffith said.
The Fort Worth youth crimes divi-

of students who are involved in any sort of crime, Griffith said.

Historians feel the "Black Friday" moniker stems from the age-old accounting practice of recording losses in red ink and gains in black ink.
Interestingly enough, while Black Friday is the busiest shopping day in terms of numbers of consumers, Christmas Eve typically boasts the highest sales volume of any day during the holiday season. Still, estimates for dollars spent on Black Friday in 2004 were in the neighborhood of \(\$ 8\) billion, according to Consumer Affairs.

The name Black Friday, however, could be losing some steam, as a number of retailers are attempting to change the day's name to "Green Friday," feeling the
color black brings with it a negative connotation.
