


Staying Busy "Clowning" Around



Republican Kollin Shadle visits with Borden County voters to the District Attorney's

Kollin Shadle, Republican candidate for the Eleventh Court of Appeals, visited in Borden County on Monday, January 26th. As part of his efforts to inform voters, Shadle said he is traveling to each of the 23 counties that make up the appellate court's district, "meeting voters on a face-to-face, handshake basis, hoping to bring an awareness of the court's work and its importance to the citizens, lawyers, law enforcement, and courts of our district."

Shadle said that although the Court had an exclusively civil docket when it was created, now criminal cases make up about 70% of the appellate court's docket, and most of those are felony cases. "Many criminal defendants receive a court-appointed attorney. They may appeal their cases, in many instances, even if they plead guilty. I believe we can expect the number of criminal appeals to increase because of stronger punishment options, longer sentences, and harsher parole eligibility laws. Criminal defendants dissatisfied with their sentences, and not bearing the expense of an attorney or the costs of an appeal, have noting to lose

and everything to gain by appealing their conviction. A civil party must pay their own way, and cannot appeal if the case is settled," he added.

"Many people do not realize that although decisions made by the Court Appeals may be of appealed to higher courts, such as the Court of Appeals, Texas Criminal Supreme Court, and the United States Supreme Court, it is up to the higher courts to decide whether or not to review Court of Appeals' the decisions. In the overwhelmingly vast majority cases that are appealed to the higher courts, review is denied. Therefore, the decisions made at the Court of Appeals level are vitally important," Shadle said.

As a prosecutor in the Taylor County District Attorney's Office in Abilene for the past eight and a half years. Shadle said he prosecuted felonies, has misdemeanors, post-conviction writs (including capital murder cases), and juveniles. He has handled numerous appeals in civil and criminal cases. In addition, Shadle has been a civil litigator and advisor for Taylor County during his tenure. Before coming

Office in 1989, Shadle's private practice included various family law matters, tort claims, and criminal defense cases, he has continued to handle family and tort law since joining the D.A.'s office, he said. Shadle emphasized that his broad, practical life and legal experiences would be an important addition to the Court, while noting that, at 41, he would give the people and the Court the best, most vital, years of his professional life. Shadle was born in Homlin, raised in Stonewall

County near Aspermont, and attended Angelo State University and Texas Tech University School of Law. He has lived and worked with the people of the district most of his life. His background includes teaching and coaching, carpentry and construction contracting and farm and ranch work. he currently resides in Merkel, near Abilene, with his wife of 21 years, and their 5-year old son.

MANAGING YOUR DEBTS

Are you having trouble figuring out how to pay for those Christmas gifts, that student loan you took out 10 years ago, or even the monthly electric bill? you are NOT Well alone! Millions of Americans are having difficulty paying their debts. Most of the people in financial distress are middle-income families with jobs. We all want to pay off what we owe, but having the extra money gets more difficult every day. Many of us live form pay check to pay check, and can't afford to buy any "extras" (a bag of our favorite cookies, eating out twice a week, a new CD or video, a new outfit, or whatever you consider an extra).

Finding anothe right financial plan for you may seem like an endless search. However, while you are searching, it is important to act on your debts. Don't let them sit unpaid! This can lead to an even bigger problem in the future - bigger debts, loss of assets, a bad credit

IRS, garnishing of wages and/or repossession.

There is good news, though! Solutions are out there, but you have to be disciplined and dedicated to getting out of debt. First of all, review your specific obligations. If you know you have to pay certain bills each month, write down the payment amount (for utilities an average amount), and then total. This is the amount of money you know that you MUST pay each month. If you are not going to make enough money to cover these payments, call the immediately. creditors Don't' leave them in the dark - they will appreciate your honesty and will usually work out a payment plan with you. After you have figured these monthly payments, it is time to make out a budget. This should include things like your creditor payments, rent, gasoline, utilities, groceries, healthy care/prescriptions, extras

If you are able to, budget for unexpected expenses (a flat tire, extra prescriptions or doctor visits, veterinary bills, car repairs, gifts, etc.) and place that money in a savings account, reserve checking accounts, etc. Once you make your budget, stick to it! We all splurge every now and then (that's OK as long as it's within your allowances), and sometimes we have unexpected expenses - but it's important to keep on track and not let your money get away from you. If you are one that spends that extra money just because it is there, a savings account is recommended. You can also not carry a checkbook, just carry cash when shopping - if you don't have it, you can't spend it! Next, reduce to your try expenses. Do you really need cable/satellite? Do you have to go to the movies every weekend? Do you really need that blouse or shirt? Think before you buy. You can also cut back on junk food, alcohol, and sodas - this runs a grocery bill up in a hurry! Fourth, if you have a savings and can use it to pay down creditors, do it. You will be thankful you saved all that money on interest, you can put it in the bank later. Finally, if you still can't manage your debt, look for additional resources. You may need to pick up a second job, or sell off something of worth. If you are really deep in debt or are out of work, you may qualify for government assistance.




