Afraid of Friday the 13th - or the number 13? Of cats or bats? Does being alone or in a crowd or crossing bridges - or fish or fur - make your a bit uneasy?

And what about sounds in the night - or simply the unknown?

In a year looming with three Friday the 13ths - in February, Mach and November - a new national "favorite fear" poll says that some 30 percent of Americans surveyed describe what frightened them "the most simply as Unknown" - unseen things that go bump in the night in a variety of smaller pernormal, suddenly, somehow black bats, snakes isn't.

February is National Children's Dental Health Month

During National Children's Dental Health Month, the Texas Department of Health is promoting ways to prevent dental disease. One way to prevent tooth decay is fluoride. Fluoride is a mineral that occurs naturally in almost all foods and water supplies. Fluoride makes teeth stronger, so they are more resistant to acid attacks. it also repairs areas in which acid attacks have already begun.

Research shows that fluoride reduces cavities by up to 50% in children. As a result of water fluoridation and over-the-counter fluoride products, half of the children entering first grade today have never had a cavity, compared with 36% in 1980 and 28% in the early 1970's. Dr. Carl D. Foster, Regional Dental Director for the Texas Department of Health in El Paso, says, "Effective prevention of dental decay requires the proper mix of fluoridated community water, self-applied fluoride and professional fluoride applications. Your dentist can help you assess whether everyone is your family gets enough fluoride."

The American Dental Association (ADA) recommends that everyone use a that fluoride toothpaste displays the ADA Seal of Acceptance. using a fluoridated toothpaste is one way to apply your own fluoride. You can also buy fluoride mouthwashes at a drug store or through a prescription from your dentist. These mouthwashes are to be rinsed in your mouth and then spit out.

Dentists and dental hygienists apply fluoride in the form of a gel, foam or rinse. These fluorides are more concentrated than self-applied fluorides (like toothpaste) and are not used as often.

contains All water fluoride naturally. "Community water fluoridation, which has been around for over 50 years, is simply the process of adjusting the fluoride content of fluoridedeficient water to the recommended level of optimal dental health 0.7 to 1.2 parts fluoride per million parts water," says Dr. Foster. Water fluoridation has been proven to reduce decay in both children and adults. While water fluoridation is an extremely effective and inexpensive way to prevent cavities, not everyone lives in a community with a centralized public or private water source that can be fluoridated. If you drink water from a well or bottled water, you should use a fluoride rinse prescribed by your dentist or purchased at your drug store. Children between six months and sixteen years of age who do not live in communities with fluoridated water can take dietary supplements (tablets, lozenges) to drops of prevent tooth decay. Your dentist or physician can prescribe the correct dose for your child. It is based on the natural fluoride concentration of the child's drinking water and the age of the child.

SECTION 2. Election and Tenure of Office. 
SECTION 4. Nominations. The Nominating Committee, selected by the Board of Directors, shall meet and nominate two candidates for each Director position open. Minutes of this meeting are to be posted at the headwith the quarters along nominations made by petition ["any fifteen (15) or more members acting together may make other nominations by petition not less than twenty (20) days prior to the Membership Meeting"]. The ballot used at the election will list the names of the candidates nominated by the Committee and nominations made by petition. The Chairman will call for additional nominations from the floor and nominations will not be closed until at least one minute has passed during which the additional nominations have been made. No member may nominate more than one candidate.

SECTION 7. Compensation. No Board Member shall receive compensation for serving the Cooperative in any other capacity, nor shall any close relative ["grandparents, parents, husband, wife, children, grandchildren, brothers, sisters, uncles, aunts, nephews, and nieces by blood, by marriage or by adoption, and spouses of any of the foregoing"] of a Board Member receive compensation for serving the Cooperative, unless the payment and amount of compensation shall be specifically authorized by a vote of the members or the service by the Board Members or his close relative shall have been certified by the board as an emergency measure.







Bell Telephone Company Southwestern (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to charge an additional 26 cents per month per line to recover costs for providing Expanded Local Calling service (ELC) to certain Texas Customers.

The 26 cents per month surcharge would not be billed to customers who receive ELC. However, customers who receive ELC and pay less than the maximum \$3.50 a month residential ELC charge or less than the maximum \$7 business ELC charge will have to pay the additional 26 cents per month charge

Expanded Local Calling was created in 1993 by Texas legislation that requires telephone companies to provide toll-free calling between small towns that share a community of interest such as a school or hospital district. The legislation allows telephone companies to recover costs not paid through customer charges by applying a surcharge to all other customers in the state who do not receive the ELC service or who do not pay the maximum ELC rate. The maximum monthly ELC rate allowed under state law is \$3.50 per line for residential

cents per month per line charge will recover the \$27 million annual cost of providing ELC service that is not recovered from ELC rates.

If approved by the PUC, the monthly statewide surcharge of 26 cents per line per month will begin with the April, 1998 billing cycles, with an agreement to refund all or part of the charge if the PUC does


