The Small Business Administration has announced that small, nonfarm businesses in 204 Texas counties may apply for low interest disaster loans. Gray, Carson, Hutchinson,

Armstrong, Collingsworth, Donley, Roberts, Wheeler and Hemphill residents are eligible to apply, according to a press release from SBA. These disaster loans offset

economic losses because of reduced revenue to farmers and ranchers caused by the severe drought conditions,

above normal temperatures and wildfires that have occurred, according to Alfred E. Judd; director of SBA's Disaster Field Operations Center - West.

Small businesses' may qualify for Economic Injury Disaster Loans of up to \$1.5 million to help meet financial obligations and operating expenses which could have been met had the disaster not occurred.

"Eligibility for these working capital loans is based on the financial impact on any actual property damage," Judd said. "These loans have an interest rate of 4 percent, a maximum term of 30 years, and are restricted to small businesses without the financial ability to offset the adverse impact without hardship."

Small, non-farm businesses eligible for disaster loans

By law, SBA makes Economic Injury Disaster Loans available when the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture designates an agricultural disaster. Secretary Mike Johanns declared this disas-


> **Businesses** primarily engaged in farming or ranching are ineligible for SBA disaster assistance. Agricultural enterprises should contact the Farm Services Agency about the U.S. Department of Agriculture assistance made available by the secretary's declaration.

## \$1 million available to protect agricultural land

TEMPLE — Natural Resources Conservation Service State Conservationist Larry Butler has announced the availability of more than \$1 million to protect agricultural land in Texas through the Farm and Ranch Lands Protection Program in fiscal year 2006.

"Preserving the state's prime agricultural farm and ranch lands helps to ensure a vibrant future for American agriculture," Butler said. "Once protected by conservation easements, this land will be shielded

from development pressure and continue to support our safe and abundant food supply."

The NRCS is seeking proposals from state, federally recognized tribal and local governments, and nongovernmental organizations interested in working together to acquire conservation easements on farms and ranches. NRCS state offices must receive proposals by 4 p.m. CDT on May 11. NRCS is expected to announce final project selections in June.

Since the program's inception in 1996, more than 2,000 acres of farm and ranch land have been protected in Texas. FRPP protects productive agricultural land by purchasing conservation easements to limit conversion of farm and ranch lands to nonagricultural uses.

Using existing programs, USDA partners with state, tribal, or local governments and non-government organizations to acquire conservation easements or other interests in land from landowners.

USDA provides up to 50 percent of the appraised fair market value of the conservation easement in this voluntary program. State and local entities can match that amount, including the use of landowner donations.

The eligible farm or ranch must have the following components:

· Contain productive soils or historic or archaeological sites

DALLAS (AP) Thunderstorms raged through North Texas early today, causing scattered damage and leaving up to 85,000 people in the dark About 70,000 remained

without power around the Dallas-Fort Worth area just

after daybreak, said TXU Electric Delivery spokeswoman Carol Peters. All available crews have been dispatched for repairs, which could take 24 hours to complete, she said.

Numerous Dallas intersections were left without functioning traffic lights, complicating the area's morning commute.

Wind gusts as high as 77 mph toppled trees and shattered glass in at least one downtown Dallas office tower. One large pecan tree at the historic Belo mansion

in downtown Dallas was among the toppled trees, chipping a corner of a mansion canopy.

Rescue crews had to lead motorists from vehicles stalled in standing water on Dallas-area streets early Thursday.

No major injuries were reported.

Most of North Texas was under a flash flood watch, with storms forecast for later Thursday in parts of West, North and East Texas.



## FCC steps up probe into radio payola allegations

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission is stepping up its investigation into alleged payola practices at four of the nation's largest radio corporations after attempts to reach a settlement stalled.

An FCC official with direct knowledge of the investigation confirmed the agency had requested documents this week from Clear Channel Communications Inc., CBS Radio Inc., Entercom Communications Corp. and Citadel Broadcasting Corp. The agency wants to learn more about accusations that radio programmers received gifts, eash and other items in exchange for playing certain songs at radio stations without publicly disclosing the deals.

The FCC requests, known formally as "letters of inquiry," are the next step in investigations that could result in sanctions ranging from financial penalties to the revocation of stations' licenses.

"The commission takes seriously any alleged violations," said FCC spokesman David Fiske. "Chairman

Martin directed the enforcement bureau to conduct an active and ongoing investigation a number of months ago."

The four companies have been negotiating with the FCC for weeks but the talks stalled last month over how much the broadcasters should pay, said the FCC official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation is ongoing.

Radio executives have said that company policies prohibit accepting gifts for airplay and that internal probes have not revealed widespread

wrongdoing.

Federal regulations require that radio listeners be informed anytime there is an exchange of items of value for airplay of specific songs.

New York Attorney General Eliot Spitzer launched an investigation in 2004 into alleged wrongdoing by music and radio companies. Earlier this year, Spitzer sued Entercom Communications Corp., accusing its executives of running scams to trade cash for airplay of songs.

Entercom has denied the allegations.

Confronted again with Bush administration assertions of sweeping power to fight terrorism, the Supreme Court took the safe route of avoidance.

Last week, the justices turned down a challenge from Jose Padilla to his long confinement as an enemy combatant. That leaves unresolved whether the president can order a U.S. citizen, arrested in the United States, to be held, indefinitely - without charge or a way to contest the detention - on the grounds of being a terrorism suspect.

Spellmann codes worked Columnist great until the advent

of computers. Even the slowest computer could run every possible combination of codes against a sample to break this "character-for-character" technique.

Scrambled or Over Easy? A stronger form of message control was needed. Enter encryption. To oversimplify the process, a computer uses incredibly complex mathematical techniques to scramble the message into an unreadable format. Only by knowing the algorithm used to create the code could a person de-code the message. The only way to break such encryption is usually through what we call "brute-force cracking." Rooms full of computers run every possible mathématical permutation until the

scramble a file, what if you could simply hide it "within" another file? Therein lies the roots of Steganography.

For this process to work, you must have two files: the 'payload" and the "carrier." A computer hides the payload in the carrier by storing the payload in unused portions of the carrier file. For instance, let's say you had a picture of a friend standing in front of the Grand Canyon. The computer would store the payload file in the large, single-color portions of the picture, such as the sky and canyon walls. The picture would look the same, and, except for a file size increase, no one would know the two files co-existed.

It takes four votes for the court to hear a petition, and the justices usually don't explain why a case gets rejected.

Only three justices - Ruth Bader Ginsburg, David Souter and Stephen Breyer - indicated that they wanted to rule on the merits of Padilla's case. Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice John Paul Stevens joined an opinion by Justice Anthony Kennedy explaining that they voted against hearing it because even though Padilla's claims "raise fundamental issues respecting the separation of powers," those considerations are, "at least for now, hypothetical."

Padilla, who was born in Brooklyn and raised in Chicago, was arrested in 2002 when he arrived at Chicago's O'Hare Airport on a flight from

cells around the world. What looks like an innocuous picture of the Eiffel Tower, may in fact, contain the full plans for a coordinated terrorist attack. Since steganography is still so new, military officials are just now learning to search for such hidden messages.

**Protect Your Files** But, as with all technologies, steganography has its legitimate uses. If you need to hide a file, or securely send a message where the intermediary receivers are unknown, consider this process.

As I mentioned earlier, you will need a carrier file and a payload file. For the best results, make sure the carrier file is at least eight times as large as the payload. So, if your payload file is 30k, you will need a carrier file of at least 240k.

In addition, you will need steganography software. For those willing to part with \$59.95, the commercial software, Steganos . Security S u i t e (http://www.steganos.com),

Pakistan. Then-Attorney General John Ashcroft announced with great fanfare that Padilla had planned to detonate a "dirty bomb," and he was transferred to military custody, where he was not even allowed access to a lawyer until March 2004.

After the Justice Department insisted for three and a half years that Padilla is a fearsome terrorist not entitled to regular constitutional protections afforded to criminal suspects, the department shifted gears late last year.

A grand jury in Miami indicted Padilla on charges of conspiring to cause and provide material support for terrorist acts in other countries charges that will be adjudicated in fed-

The first time that Padilla's case came before the justices, in 2004, the court ruled that it had been filed in the wrong jurisdiction, thereby sidestepping the key issue. It's unfortunate that the latest action gives the administration room to continue overreaching in the name of national security

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
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

## Morrison decides to go pro

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Gonzaga All-America forward Adam Morrison declared for the NBA draft Wednesday, passing up his senior season for a chance to be a lottery pick.

The 6-foot-8 floppy-haired, mustachioed forward, who led Division I in scoring last season at 28.1 points per game, is a diabetic and said uncertainty over his future health prospects was a factor in his decision

"It's been a great process so far. It's been fun, but I've decided to try to take my game to the next level and further my career as a basketball player," Morrison said at a campus news conference.

Morrison said he had a verbal agreement 'etched in stone" with Chicago-based agent Mark Bartelstein, who also represents former Gonzaga stars Dan Dickau and Blake Stepp, and Bulls guard Jannero Pargo, brother of Gonzaga's Jeremy Pargo. That agreement means Morrison will not be able to change his mind and return for his senior year.

The West Coast Conference player of the year, Morrison edged Duke's J.J." Redick for this year's national scoring title. He finished second to Redick for the Naismith and John R. Wooden Awards for college basketball's player of the year. Gonzaga coach Mark Few said his staff

and team were "ecstatic" for Morrison.

Gonzaga finished 29-4 this season, and in Morrison's three seasons went 83-12, including 40-2 in the WCC.

"We went through this all last year," Pettitte said. "The offense is what it is. I feel like I should throw a shutout every time out. If I give up two runs and we score one, then I didn't do my job."

Coming off a 5-1 loss at Arizona. Pettitte (1-3) struck out eight and walked one in seven innings, allowing seven hits. Houston has scored 12 runs in his four starts - seven came in his lone victory, against Washington on April 9.

Pettitte gave up a go-ahead double to Damian Miller in the seventh.

"No matter what we're doing offensively, I should pitch better,' Pettitte said. "I knew Chris was going to throw a good game tonight. He has great stuff. I kind of made some mistakes tonight. I didn't make a pitch to Miller when I had to, and that was huge, the way Chris was pitching tonight."

Pettitte had won six straight starts against Milwaukee since a 7-5 loss for the New York Yankees on July 19, 1996. He dropped to 7-3 against the Brewers despite lowering his season ERA from 6.35 to 5.25.

Chris Capuano (2-2) allowed two runs and five hits in 7 2-3 innings with eight strikeouts and two walks to help Milwaukee stop a three-game

Milwaukee manager Ned Yost said. "He was just great. He was so sharp through the seventh inning that I hated to take him out."

Houston's Morgan Ensberg homered in his fifth straight game, tying a team record, and raised his season total to seven.

With the score 1-all and two outs in the seventh, Rickie Weeks and Jeff Cirillo singled, and Miller followed with a double down the right-field line

"After my first two at bats, I had to make a little adjustment," Miller said. "He was throwing me nasty cutters and I just came out and laid off of it. I got to 2-0 and tried to go the other way and play my game. He made a mistake with a fastball up, but I'll take it."

Bill Hall, Weeks and Cirillo had **RBI** singles against Russ Springer in a three-run eighth that made it 5-1.

"I'm happy with the way we're swinging our bats," Yost said. "This was not a must-win tonight. The Astros proved last year that April ad May are not important. We had two tough losses here, and we didn't want to compound it with another loss."

Ensberg's homer chased Capuano in the eighth, and Prince Fielder hit an RBI double off Mike Gallo in the ninth and scored on J.J. Hardy's single.

"It felt good to have a low-scoring game, a clean game played with good defense," Capuano said. "Our offense carried over from last night."

He also coached Team Canada to Olympic gold in 2002 and the World Cup of Hockey championship in 2004.

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
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

MIAMI (AP) — An invasion of privacy lawsuit filed by a woman who claims she participated in a sex video with Scott Stapp and Kid Rock was dismissed by a judge who said the woman cannot sue if she remains anonymous.

Miami-Dade Circuit Judge Gerald Hubbart on Wednésday told a lawyer for the woman, identified only as "Jane Doe" in court papers, that she could refile the lawsuit within 20 days if she is willing to have her real name included.

"There's no showing on why the claim should be allowed to proceed under a fictitious name," Hubbart said.

The woman claimed in the lawsuit that she was the "star" of a group of women who appear in the video with Kid Rock and Stapp. The lawsuit sought to prevent sale of the video and unspecified damages. It named distributor World Wide Red Light District and Stapp as defendants, but not Kid Rock.

Stapp and Kid Rock have won a

temporary court order in Michigan preventing World Wide from distributing it or promoting any part of the 1999 video, which the former Creed singer contends was stolen. Red Light had previously shown a 40-second preview clip on its Web site.

World Wide lawyer Thomas Julin said the woman has no claim because "she's not a child, she's not abused. She can't claim invasion of privacy because this tape was made in the presence of others."
