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Limb cleanup to begin **Jan. 11**

Crews from the City of Pampa will begin residential tree limb removal on Jan. 11. Combined crews from the city's Public Service, Water Distribution, Waste Water Collection and Sanitation departments will work together to clean up the mess left behind by an icy winter

The sweep of the city will begin in ward one, which is the northwest portion of town. Clean-up will continue through ward two in the northeast, ward three in the southeast, and ward four in the southwest, over the next several weeks

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DPS reports 99 traffic fatalities in area during 2006 The Amarillo Department of in 2005 that number increased to 87.

Public Safety released the 2006 fatal crash statistics today which showed that 99 people died on area roads in the Amarillo area district.

These numbers are for crashes worked only by DPS on rural roads and do not include those worked inside the city of Amarillo.

This is the second year in a row that fatalities have increased. In 2004, 66 fatalities were recorded and

The main factors that contributed to these accidents are driver inattenspeeding and alcohol. tion, Inattention was a factor in 35 fatal crashes and speeding in 26. Alcohol was a known factor in 9 crashes, which ends up being 11 percent of all those reported.

Another factor in this deadly year was the number of multiple fatality crashes. There were 14 total, including six crashes that killed a total of to almost half of the fatalities, DPS 20 people.

Weather played a part in four of the fatalities being contributed to

The leading category once again was the one-vehicle crash with 46 of the 99 fatalities reported. Of these, 36 involved the vehicle rolling over. in which 26 were not wearing seat

Not wearing seat belts contributes

said. Of the accidents in 2006, 46 percent of those killed were not wearing seat belts.

Drivers are killed more often than passengers. The report released shows that 62 drivers and 34 passengers were killed. Three pedestrian deaths were reported.

County commissioners to hold year's first meeting

Gray County commissioners' first meeting of 2007 will begin at 9 a.m. Friday in the second-floor courtroom at the county court-

house, 205 N. Russell. The meeting had originally been scheduled for 9 a.m. Tuesday, but county offices were closed that day after Gov. Rick Perry declared Tuesday as a day of mourning for former President Gerald R. Ford, who died Dec. 26.

Perry's declaration also calls for all flags under the control of the state to be flown at half-staff until sunrise Jan. 26. Counties, municipalities and others are encouraged to also fly their flags at half-staff for that amount of time.

The burn ban currently in effect will be reviewed for continuation or termination. The ban was implemented by commissioners at their Dec. 15 meeting, along with a ban on sales of aerial fireworks for the New Year's celebrations,

due to a heightened danger of wildfires as a result of dry weath-

The Pampa area received 3.16 inches of rain in December, most of it falling on Dec. 29, when 2.03 inches of precipitation was recorded at the automated weather station near Recreation Park.

Commissioners will review bonds of elected officials and replace Lee Cornelison's name with that of Scott Hahn as county treasurer on all bank and signature accounts. Hahn and other county officers who were elected in the Nov. 7 general election were sworn in Monday morning at the courthouse.

Recommendations by a third party administrator for improvements to the county's partially self-funded health plan will be heard.

Other items on Friday's short agenda include a tax bid of \$100 by Jimmy Burks for 321 Miami, and payment of bills and salaries



Student arrested in school shooting

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — Hundreds of students were headed for their first classes after the long holiday break when shots rang out in the halls of Henry Foss High School. Within hours, one boy was dead and another was behind bars.

The shooter and victim knew each other but detectives did not yet know a motive for the attack, Police Chief Donald Ramsdell said. Police said the shooting was not believed to be gang related or racially moti-

"Today we lost a nice young person in a Tacoma public school in an act of senseless violence," Ramsdell said.

The shooting Wednesday morning sent students scrambling. Samnang Kok, 17, lay dying in a hallway as the shooter bolted out a set of double doors.

About two hours later, police arrested fellow student Douglas Chanthabouly, 18, not far from Foss High School. He was booked for investigation of first-degree murder and due in court Thursday. It was not clear if he had a lawyer.

Kok, whose first name means "lucky" or

"fortunate" in Cambodian, was born to parents who fled the killing fields of the Khmer Rouge during the 1980s. His weeping mother, Ry Sou, said she was pregnant with him when the family arrived in the United States.

"I came here to raise my family in freedom, and my son goes away from me," she told The Seattle Times.

Kok was also a father — he had an 18month-old son, Makhai Kok, with his girlfriend. Tiari Johnson, 16, who sobbed as she hugged her little boy in the young man's garage apartment beside the Kok family's

"He is everything anybody would ever ask for - smart, nice, kind," she told The News Tribune of Tacoma/

In a tidy house on a cul-de-sac about six miles from the Kok home, Chanthabouly's mother was "crying her eyes out," said the young man's uncle, Soukanh Bounchanh. He said their family, too, was in shock.

"He's a very nice and sweet boy. I don't know what came on him," Bounchanh said. "It's not like he was gang-banging or shooting. Nothing.

Police said Chanthabouly had no criminal



DEAR ABBY: Although I am not a mental health professional, I am concerned for the welfare of "Stressed in Pennsylvania" (Nov. 22), who is suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder due to his tour of duty in Iraq. As a current commander of troops and a two-time returnee from "down range," I take caring for soldiers seriously, and I would opine that the writer's healing process has already begun. It began as soon as the soldier acknowledged he had demons he could not deal with. Regardless of a soldier's location in the continental United States, the Veterans Administration has a steady stream of counselors available for any soldier -- past and present -- dealing with the aftermath of his experience in Iraq. In addition, depending on his location and current status (active duty, primarily), he can go to any base and seek assistance through the Community Mental Health Agency. Within that office he will find a host of professionals ready and able to assist him with the symptoms associated with PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder). Soldiers serving in Iraq and Afghanistan are witnessing and taking part in some horrific situations. Many of those incidents are unlike any war in which our forces have ever been involved. PTSD cannot be taken lightly, and many people throughout our nation do not, nor should they, understand all of the underlying implications associated with the ailment. It's a condition that should be addressed immediately, though, depending on the severity of the situation. To the writer of that letter: Good luck, Godspeed, and thank you to all of my sisters and brothers in uniform for your service to our nation. -- CONCERNED MEDICAL SERVICES CAPTAIN

DEAR CONCERNED: Thank you for your helpful letter. For any other veterans who are reading this column and are perhaps in need of assistance, I am offering a reference you can use to begin your quest for support: www.ncptsd.va.gov. The Department of Veterans Affairs has launched this Web site for the National Center for Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, a special center within Veterans Affairs. The center is designed to advance the clinical care and social welfare of America's veterans through research, education and training in the science, diagnosis and treatment of PTSD and stress-related disorders. The Web site is provided as an educational resource regarding PTSD and other enduring consequences of traumatic stress, for a variety of audiences, but does not replace face-to-face interaction with a clinical practitioner. If someone is in need of assistance for problems related to his or her experience in combat, he or she should seek help immediately. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I'm a Vietnam vet who also has post-traumatic stress. "Stressed" should go to a veterans hospital, veterans center, or contact a veterans service officer through his county. Counseling is available on a one-to-one basis or group therapy. I take two or three vets each month to assist them in getting the services and help they need. These are veterans of all ages, branches of the service and all wars/conflicts. The best way to resolve these service-related issues is to talk with someone else who has experienced the same problems. Help is out there. "Stressed in Pennsylvania" can also look in the Yellow Pages of his phone book. - VIETNAM VET, PITTSBURG, CALIF.

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





Vince Young named AP Offensive Rookie of Year

NEW YORK (AP) — Vince Young looks as if he'll make the NFL his personal playground, too.

The dynamic quarterback for the Tennessee Titans won The Associated Press Offensive Rookie of the Year Award on Wednesday. He did it in the same fashion he turned around the Titans' season — running away from the rest of the field.

Young, who led Texas to the 2005 national championship and was the third overall pick in last April's draft, overwhelmed one of the strongest rookie classes in NFL history. He received 23 votes from a nationwide panel of 50 sports writers and broadcasters who cover the league.

That easily beat New Orleans wide receiver Marques Colston and Jacksonville running back Maurice Drew, who had nine apiece; San Diego tackle Marcus McNeill (6); and Saints running back Reggie Bush (3).

Running back Carnell "Cadillac" Williams of Tampa Bay won the award last year. Young is the third member of the Tennessee-Houston franchise to take top rookie honors: Earl Campbell in 1978 and Eddie George in 1996 did it for the Houston Oilers.

Young was the catalyst in Tennessee' rally from 0-5 to 8-8, at times looking as unstoppable for the Titans as he did with the Longhorns. A starter from Week 4, Young sprinkled all kinds of spectacular big plays with a growing maturity in joining Ben Roethlisberger (2004)

as the only quarterbacks to win top rookie honors in the 49-year history of the award.

He became the first rookie quarterback to rush for more than 500 yards in the Super Bowl era, and his passing skills improved all year under coach Jeff Fisher and offensive coordinator Norm Chow.

"I like to go out there and play the game and show that I can deliver the ball down the field, and that I can use my legs at the right time, when its time to use my legs, and checking the ball down, just being a quarterback," Young said. "I want to change the game a little bit."

He's already helped change the perception of what a first-year quarterback can do given playing time. Young sat and learned for barely a month while Kerry Collins started and the Titans struggled. Then Fisher turned to the youngster well before he'd planned.

And Young delivered as the Titans threatened to become the first team to lose its opening five games and then make the playoffs. They were in contention until the final weekend, thanks greatly to a six-game winning streak that included a remarkable comeback from 21-0 down in the final 10 minutes to beat the Giants.

"He was very prepared when he got here because of the experience he had in college," said Fisher, who along with Tennessee's scouts and general manager Floyd Reese chose Young over Matt Leinart and Jay Cutler in the draft. "We knew that he had a chance to improve

and obviously that's why we went ahead and started him when we did. We felt like he was ready."

Chow, who worked with Heisman Trophy winners Leinart and Carson Palmer at Southern California, is considered one of the finest teachers of quarterbacks in the business. What does he like most about Young, who left Texas after his junior season?

"Besides the physical skills, it's the will and the strength inside, the 'it' factor that a quarterback either has or doesn't have," Chow said. "Obviously, he has it. The quickness in which he won the team over and the quickness in which he became the leader, the guy everybody looked up to, that was special.


"Vince Young has this great ability to lift others around him. To see him do it so quickly, that wasn't a surprise, but it was certainly good to see."

Perhaps Young's finest moment was a 39-yard TD run in overtime to beat Houston, his hometown team which bypassed the Lone Star State hero to take defensive end Mario Williams atop the draft. There seemed to be as many Titans No. 10 jerseys in Reliant Stadium as any Texans shirts.

"It was a great ending," Young said. "Being from Houston and being in front of my family and the fans that respect me as a player and a person, as well, it can't get any better than that."

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Police locate SUV possibly connected to Williams' shooting

DENVER (AP) — Police impounded a 1998 Chevrolet Tahoe early Thursday they believe might have been used in a New Year's Day drive-by shooting that killed Denver Broncos cornerback Darrent Williams.

Passers-by spotted the vehicle parked south of Denver International Airport and called police at about 6:30 a.m., police spokesman Sonny Jackson said.

"The community once again came through for us," he said.

Jackson said the vehicle had a license plate that matched the one investigators were looking for. He declined to describe the condition of the vehicle.

State confidentiality laws prevent the police from saying who a vehicle is registered to. However, the Rocky Mountain News and The

they didn't name, reported the SUV belongs to Brian K. Hicks of Denver, who is jailed on drug and attempted murder charges.

Television images appeared to show the Tahoe had been painted black on the sides, front and back, but the top remained white the original color of the vehicle authorities were seeking.

The vehicle was placed onto a flatbed tow truck and hauled away. Jackson said crime lab investigators would inspect the SUV, but he declined to discuss specifics of what they would look for or what tests they might conduct.

Although Hicks was behind bars on the day of the shooting, police want to know who was using his vehicle in the early morning hours of New Year's Day, when a gunman sprayed a Denver Post, citing sources white stretch Hummer limousine with at least 14 bullets, one of which struck Williams in the neck.

Hicks, 28, has been jailed since Nov. 9 on a charge of possessing drugs with intent to distribute. He also is accused of shooting at a woman who was later killed a week before she was to testify against him last month.

Hicks' wife, Kimaya James, told the Rocky Mountain News that police were looking for her husband's vehicle but that she didn't know who had been driving the Tahoe while he's been in the Denver County Jail.

Investigators have not identified any suspects in the attack on Williams that wounded two other people, spokesman Sonny Jackson

Police also aren't saying whether they know the motive for the slaying but have said there was a disturbance at a nightclub where Williams attended a New Year's Eve party shortly before he was killed. Investigators also are reviewing surveillance video from the club and footage from traffic cameras.

Williams' uncle, Demond Williams, said the cornerback was at the club to promote a rap group for his fledgling independent recording label, Ryno Entertainment.

The gathering at the club in downtown Denver also was billed as a birthday party for Denver Nuggets star Kenyon Martin, who has said he and other Nuggets left the club before any trouble arose.

Williams' teammates and coaches, along with owner Pat Bowlen and other team personnel gathered with Williams' relatives at the

Duke University invites 2 lacrosse players back to school in aftermath of dropped rape charges

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — For Collin Finnerty and Reade Seligmann, being invited to return to Duke University represents vindication.

The university barred the two lacrosse players from class last semester while they faced charges of raping a stripper at a team party.

But now, as the case in a statement Wednesday. against them takes hit after hit, Duke officials said Wednesday that they have invited them to return for spring semester starting next week.

"We feel that this is a very important moment," said Finnerty's lawyer, Wade Smith. "This announcement speaks to Duke's integrity as an institution, to its mission, student affairs, said in a let-

The university was swept up in a tide of publicity, outrage and shock last spring when a black woman who attended nearby North Carolina Central University alleged she had been raped at a lacrosse team party last March.

Finnerty, Seligmann and codefendant Dave Evans who graduated in May a day before he was charged were dropped last month, after the woman wavered on some key details.

Since leaving Duke, Finnerty has volunteered to work with children who lost family in the terrorist attacks of Sept. 11 and has taken courses at Hofstra University near his home in Garden

City, N.Y., his attorney said. The next step in the case is a hearing scheduled for Feb. 5, when defense attorneys are expected to attack the results of a photo lineup in which the accuser identified the players. Without her identification, experts said, Nifong might have to drop the other charges.

Nifong dropped the rape charges after the accuser said she was no longer certain she had been penetrated vaginally by a penis, a necessary element of rape charges in North Carolina.

Seligmann, Finnerty and Evans have maintained their innocence, with Evans calling the charges "fantastic lies" the day he was indicted in May. Their lawyers have called on Nifong to drop the remaining charges.

The case led to the resignation of longtime coach Mike Pressler and the university's decision to cancel the remainder of the season for the highly ranked District Attorney Mike lacrosse team.

Students will blast off on to 12. an intergalactic adventure the Amarillo Symphony launches a new educational concert that wraps thrilling classical music and essential science facts into a multimedia extravaganza.

"To Space and Beyond," co-created by Lynn Hart and David Simpson of 4th Wall Productions, and Mark Nair, is designed to give fourthand fifth-grade students exposure to some of the great works of the orchestral repertoire, as well as provide an emphasis on science facts that are part of Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills curriculum.

Six concerts, comprising the annual Concerts for Young People series, will be given Jan. 10 and 11 in the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts. Students from Amarillo, Canyon and area schools will attend, and the concert also is open to

Concert times are 9:30 a.m., 10:45 a.m. and 1 p.m. both days. Seats are still available for the 10:45 shows both days, but advanced reservations are required. Tickets are \$2 per student. Call the Symphony office at 376-8782 for reservations.

The concert, hosted by ProNews 7 Chief Meteorologist Steve Kersh, will utilize spectacular computer projections, which will transport students to the farthest reaches of the galaxy. These images are designed by Nair, the creative director for Anderson Merchandising and a member of the Don Harrington Discovery Center board of directors.

"Nothing like this has ever been seen in the Globe-News Center," said Nathan Newbrough, Symphony's executive director.

"These projections show home-school students ages 9 off some of the most amaz-

ing views of our solar system that I've ever seen," Newbrough said. "As if the inside of the Globe-News Center's concert hall weren't gorgeous enough, these images will just stun the audience."

sage to ANY account(s) reminding you of the event. You can set it to remind you minutes, hours, or even days ahead of time. If you have a cell phone that can receive e-mail messages, you can have the system page you with the reminder. You can

also share your calendar

with friends if you want. How many of you have ever looked over your long distance bill only to find a phone number you didn't recognize? Well, instead of calling that number (incurring ANOTHER long distance charge), check out Any Who (http://anywho.com). They are one of the few sites on the Net offering a "reverse search" on phone numbers. Some people refer to this as a criss-cross service.

To use it, click on "Reverse Search" in the bar at the top and enter the number. It will retrieve the owner of the phone. Only two caveats exist: First, only "listed" numbers will show. People with unlisted numbers will not be listed. Second, this search only works in North America. Other countries are being added, but it is spotty at best right now.

Finally, I find myself wasting a lot of time online by having to go through so much junk e-mail (spam). Recently, I discovered a little trick that has practically eliminated this nuisance. First, sign up for one of the many free e-mail accounts on the Web. One of my favorites is Hotmail

(http://hotmail.com). Now, anytime some Web site asks for your e-mail address (and you know the only reason is to send advertising), simply give them this "throwaway" address. That way, all of the spam ends up in your Hotmail account, leaving your original one clean. Only give your REAL account to your family and friends. Every couple of weeks or so, log into your "throwaway" account and clean it out
