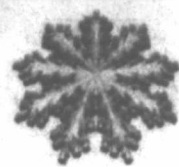

Jack Willis White, 82, of Pampa, Texas, died Jan. 11, 2007, at Amarillo, Texas. Services will be at 10 a.m. Monday, Jan. 15, 2007, at Carmichael-Whitley Colonial Chapel with Dr. Johnny Funderburg, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiating.

He enjoyed spending time on the family farm in Crawford, Okla. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army Air Corps, serving from 1942 to 1945.

Survivors include his wife, Betty White, of the home; one son, Paul Mark White of Pampa; one daughter, Betty Katherine Amerson and husband Rick of Los Altos, Calif.; and several other relatives and friends.

He was preceded in death by his parents and one son, Gregory Kim White on Jan. 21, 1966.

Snub of high court decision puts death case in spotlight

LIVINGSTON, Texas (AP) — A high-level judicial spat with life-and-death consequences involving a condemned Texas man is back before the U.S. Supreme Court for an unusual second time in three years.

Justices agreed to look again at LaRoyce Lathair Smith's argument that the jury in his sentencing phase was given deficient instructions after Texas's top criminal appeals court ignored their concerns about the jury's decision more than a decade ago.

Smith is one of three condemned Texas men whose cases are being argued before justices Wednesday. Smith argues his sentencing jury wasn't allowed to sufficiently consider the abuse and neglect he suffered as a child.

The two others, Brent Ray Brewer and Jalil Abdul-Kabir, are raising similar claims after the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals turned down their appeals. The Supreme Court has

combined their two cases into a single argument, also to be heard on Wednesday.

The state appeals court upheld Smith's conviction despite the high court's concerns.

"My argument is the Court of Criminal Appeals didn't comply to the holding of the Supreme Court decision," said Jordan Steiker, Smith's lawyer.

"It's not unheard of, but not common either," Erwin Chemerinsky, a Duke University law professor who urged the justices to take Smith's case a second time. "Usually when it happens, the Supreme Court does not take well to what they regard as disobedience by a lower court."

Texas has executed 380 prisoners over the past 24 years, making it by far the nation's most active death penalty state.

A favorable decision from the high court could mean new sentencing trials for the three and possibly affect a few dozen other inmates sent to Texas' death row in the late 1980s and early 1990s who might have been sentenced under similar jury instructions.

Smith, Abdul-Kabir and Brewer are not contesting their guilt.

Smith was convicted of the 1991 fatal shooting and stabbing of Jennifer Soto, a 19-year-old Dallas fast-food restaurant night manager who was tortured in a robbery that netted no money. His lawyers argued the sentencing instructions didn't allow jurors to consider that Smith, 19 at the time of the crime, was a special education student who had made

only the 8th grade by the time he was 18, and whose father was in a biker gang and abused alcohol and crack cocaine and stole from the family.

At his trial, jurors were instructed to determine if Smith's conduct was deliberate and if he would probably remain violent. A "yes" to both questions meant a death sentence. A "no" to either or both meant a life prison term.

Jurors also were told to change one of their two "yes" answers to "no" if they believed mitigating evidence could lead them to conclude Smith's life should be spared. A jury in Dallas County deliberated 16 hours over three days before returning with the decision Smith should die.

Texas legislators in 1991 added a third question to jury instructions, specifically asking jurors if mitigating evidence they heard convinced them a life sentence would be more appropriate. The change in the law, however, came too late for Smith, who already had gone to trial.

In 2004, the Supreme Court ruled 7-2 the instructions in Smith's trial were inadequate because they didn't allow jurors sufficient latitude to consider Smith's mitigating circumstances. Justices returned his case to the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals.

But March 1, the state high court, while acknowledging Smith's hard childhood showed he "may have suffered 'some' actual harm," denied Smith's appeal, saying the jury instructions were not "so egregiously injurious" as to make Smith's trial unfair.

"The United States Supreme Court said this is constitutionally inadequate and the Court of Criminal Appeals and Texas say that's wrong," Victoria Palacios, a Southern Methodist University law professor who teaches capital punishment matters, said. "But you can't disagree with the Supreme Court when the Supreme Court is interpreting the federal Constitution."

Steiker, a University of Texas law professor, appealed again to the high court.

across the Oklahoma Panhandle producing hail up to 1.75 inches and wind gusts near 60 mph. Also on the 1st, storms moved across the northern Texas Panhandle producing hail up to 1.50 inches in diameter. The severe weather was short lived though as wildfires once again became the main story for April. Fires spurred by high winds occurred in the Oklahoma Panhandle on the 2nd burning 600 acres of land. In the Texas Panhandle, 18 wildfires raged mainly in the first half of the month consumed more than 100,000 acres and destroyed 23 homes.

Near the end of the month, a second round of severe weather developed. Storms on the 22nd, 23rd, and 28th occurred in the Texas Panhandle producing hail up to 1.75 inches. A severe storm also occurred in the Oklahoma Panhandle on the 28th producing hail up to 1 inch in diameter.

A very May can lead to more wildfires, plenty of severe thunderstorms, but surprisingly no tornadoes. The severe weather for May began on the 2nd when a storm producing 1-inch sized hail moved through

Beaver County in Oklahoma. Storms also moved across the southeast portion of the Texas Panhandle producing baseball sized hail. There were two especially active severe weather days in May. The first was on the 9th when multiple storms moved across the eastern panhandles. There were 28 reports of severe hail in total including one report of hail up to the size of a softball. The second active day in May was on the 30th. There were 16 reports of severe weather across the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles with most of the activity located in the central Texas Panhandle. Wind speeds reached more than 65 mph and hail stones increased to 1.75 inches. Heavy rains caused a flash flood in Carson County. In addition, thirteen wildfires occurred in May burning 44,000 acres and causing 4 injuries.

June

The lack of tornadoes in May quickly changed in June. Eleven tornadoes were reported with strongest rating as an F1 on June 21 in Texas County, Okla., (the other 10 tornadoes were all rated F0). The F1 tornado caused damage to 3 barns, three homes, and a pickup truck with a trailer attached. Aside from the tornadoes, strong thunderstorm winds occurred numerous times during June. The strongest winds blew on June 16 when thunderstorms produced

wind speeds of 70 mph. In fact, June 16 was one of the most active severe weather days of the year. There were two reports of severe thunderstorms in the Oklahoma Panhandle on the 16th, with 35 severe reports throughout the Texas Panhandle. Most of the severe weather was related to very strong winds, but storms also produced tennis ball sized hail in Gray County. Also on the 16th, four wildfires raged across the west Texas Panhandle. These four wildfires burned more than 30,000 acres and caused \$15 million in damage.

The worst back-to-back severe weather days of the year occurred on June 21 and 22. The two-day total included 26 reports of severe weather in the Oklahoma Panhandle and 47 reports across the Texas Panhandle. Of the 73 incidents of severe weather, most were once again due to strong winds, some in excess of 60 mph. However, golf ball sized hail and one flash flood resulted from heavy rain in Hartley County. Plus, nine of the 11 tornadoes that occurred in June came either on the 21st or 22nd of the month.

July

The severe weather relaxed a bit in July, although an F0 tornado did occur in Deaf Smith County on the 28th. Otherwise, there were only five additional reports of severe weather in July. There was one lightning strike which

hit a junior high school in Guymon, Okla., causing damage to an air conditioning system.

August

Average — 74.6 (1.7 below normal)

Interesting Facts: Fourth wettest August on record. Wettest month of the year.

Above average rains in August brought flash flooding to the panhandles. Flash flooding occurred on the 14th, 20th, and 21st when flash flooding resulted in the death of a young man in Amarillo. In addition, numerous campers became stranded in Palo Duro Canyon between the 20th

and 21st of the month as water levels blocked exit roads. Aside from the flash flooding, there were 28 severe weather incidents including one F0 tornado on the 27th in Hutchinson County, Texas.

September

Average — 64.3 (4.8 below normal)
Precip — 1.09

Interesting Facts: Second coldest September on record.

Severe weather dropped off in September. However, a few thunderstorms did reach severe levels mainly during the middle part of the month. Hail up to the size of golf balls was reported on the 15th in Beaver County, Okla., and flash floods occurred in Hutchinson and

Carson counties on the 7th.

October was the quietest month of the year with near normal temperatures and slightly above normal precipitation. No severe weather occurred in October.

Snowfall — 7.2

Records — Set daily record low of 10 on the 30th
November brought the first snow of the year, strong winds, and more wildfires.

As we were walking around Forest Park viewing the exhibits, we walked past the giraffe area. I stopped and looked at one of the majestic creatures and held out my

open hand.

The giraffe walked up to me, lowered his head, and licked my hand. Then he put his head down lower and allowed me to pet him on the head.

It was a moment I will never forget.

Most of the bread just stuck there, between his cheek and gum for want of a better expression.

He would open his mouth and the bread was just lodged there.

I felt bad for that hippo and thought of Quasimodo, enduring the taunts and jeers of others with cruel intent.

The last one was at Sea World in San Antonio.

On vacation with some friends, we took in the show where the dolphins and whales fly out of the water on command and do a trick and are rewarded with a snack of mackerel or some other fish.

As I sat there watching, I could-

Today's Highlight in History:

On Jan. 14, 1784, the United States ratified a peace treaty with England, ending the Revolutionary War.

On this date:

In 1639, the first constitution of Connecticut — the "Fundamental Orders" — was adopted.

In 1858, French emperor Napoleon III escaped an attempt on his life.

In 1900, Puccini's opera "Tosca" received a mixed reception at its world premiere in Rome.

In 1943, President Roosevelt, British Prime Minister Winston Churchill and French General Charles de Gaulle opened a wartime conference in Casablanca.

In 1952, NBC's "Today" show premiered, with Dave Garroway as the host, or "communicator," as he was officially known.

In 1953, Josip Broz Tito was elected presi-

dent of Yugoslavia by the country's Parliament.

In 1957, 50 years ago, actor Humphrey Bogart died in Los Angeles at age 57.

In 1963, George C. Wallace was sworn in as governor of Alabama with a pledge of "segregation forever."

In 1969, 27 people aboard the U.S. aircraft carrier Enterprise were killed in an explosion that ripped through the ship off Hawaii.

In 1970, Diana Ross and the Supremes performed their last concert together, at the Frontier Hotel in Las Vegas.

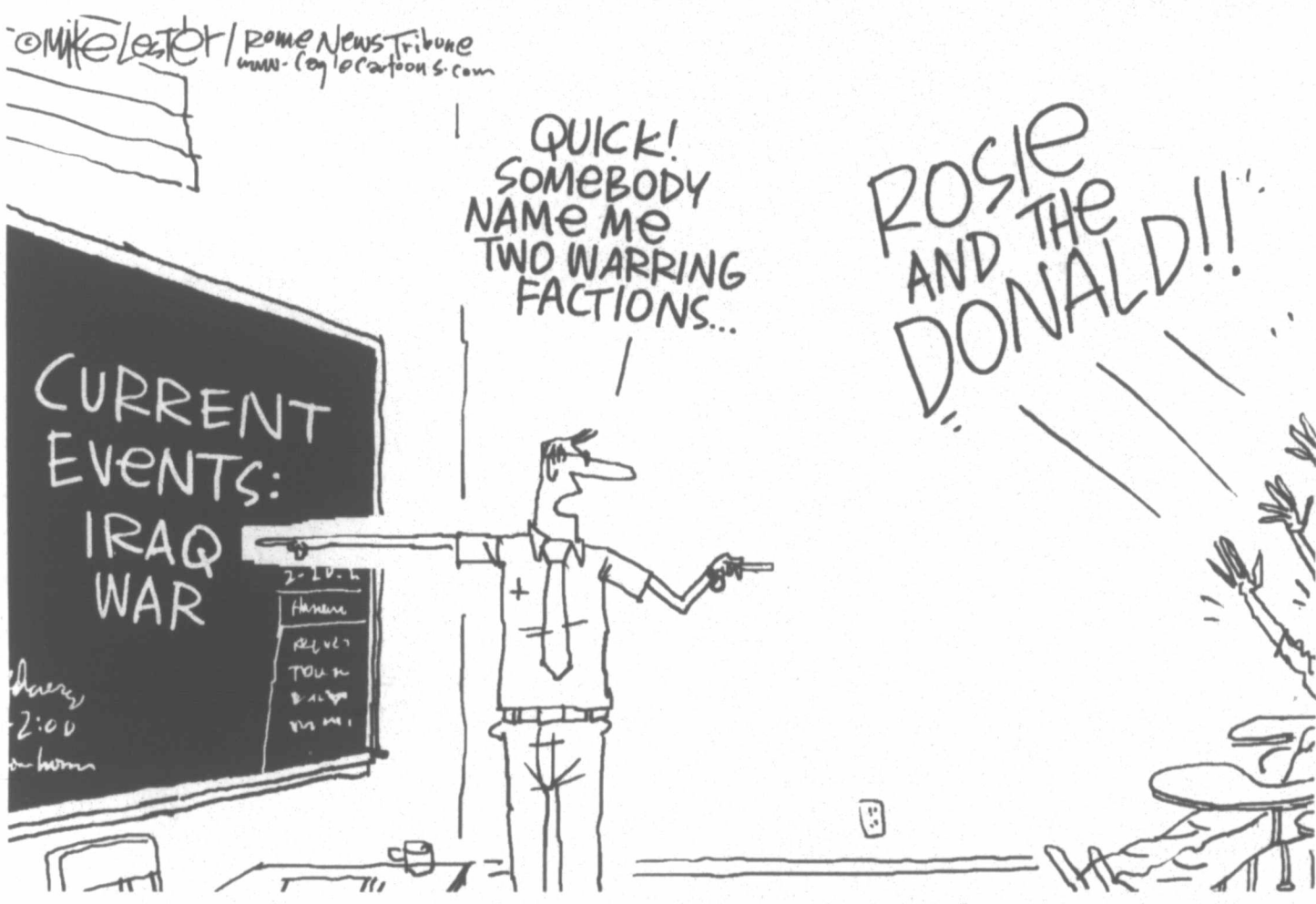

One year ago: The chief judge in Saddam Hussein's trial (Rizgar Mohammed Amin) submitted his resignation (he was succeeded by Raouf Rasheed Abdel-Rahman).

Mr. President, do you have the time?

My friend, Jean David, flipping through her calendar on December 26th, looked back at the year, thinking most significant entries had been made and appointments kept. Most of the latter were with medical doctors.

She calls them her "team of physicians," a term well understood by folks of a certain age.

And she chuckles at pharmacist Connie Tomlin's observation: "After 50, you can figure on taking one additional pill daily per year."

A TV news bulletin rocked her contemplation: Gerald Ford was dead at 93. Her thoughts sprung back to that spring day in 1976 when she, her late husband, Bill David, daughter Lisa and several hundred others had lunch with President Ford in

Fort Worth.

Then, just three days after Ford's death, a tornado swept away the 120-year-old barn on the family place near Alvarado.

She knew what her late husband would say: "Relax, Jingo. It was just a barn. The house wasn't touched, and you weren't hurt. Relax. ..."

So she relaxed. Smiling, she did not think of "ill wind" aspects. Indeed, it ignited memory's wick, as did President Ford's death.

She happily recalled April 28, 1976, and the Fort Worth/Tarrant County Bar Association's "Law Day" luncheon. She and Lisa, a high school senior, hurried

to their places.

They felt the warmth of eyes and smiles — both from Bill, who, as president of the Association, presided. And from the man seated next to him, President Ford. ...

"Those two men really hit it off," Jean remembers. "Both played college football, served in the Navy, went to law school and loved the land. And both were lifted to the offices they held. They had much to talk about; it was as if they had known each other for years."

David, who vowed never to wear a wristwatch or carry a time piece after World War II service, was aware of a meticulous schedule calling for President Ford to speak

at 1:29 p.m. David asked the President to nudge him when it was 1:29. President Ford smiled, glancing often at his watch. And when it was 1:29, he nudged David. ...

A few minutes earlier, when the head table was served, a Secret Service man switched the two men's plates.

Thus, David became the "official taster" for the President.

He did so happily, probably chuckling that there were lots more lawyers should the "taste test" take him out. ...

I never met a sitting president. But, I once sat where a sitting President sat many times. And it was President Ford.

Texas Thoughts

A sample of editorial opinion around Texas:

■ Jan. 8:

The Dallas Morning News on the first 100 hours of a Democratic-led Congress:

House Democrats, led by Majority Leader Nancy Pelosi, blew into office last week with an ambitious agenda for their first 100 hours in session maybe too ambitious. The leadership unwisely insists on sidelining Republicans, discarding a campaign promise for a more bipartisan House.

The 100-hour schedule is packed with eight Democratic initiatives. Although the first two were tucked into internal House rules voted on last

week, the clock actually begins ticking tomorrow. Here are their proposals and our assessment of them:

The initiative: Tougher ethics rules. Democrats want to implement a ban on gifts, meals and most travel funded by lobbyists. And they plan to require the disclosure of all "earmarking" the process by which lawmakers slip pet projects into spending bills.

Our opinion: We're glad to see tough lobbying restrictions, although it would be better to see more discipline placed on members, rather than on lobbyists. And the earmarking bill requires members to disclose what they've inserted, which is good but doesn't go far enough to limit the practice.

The initiative: Pay-as-you-go budgeting, or "pay-go." To help eliminate

the deficit, any tax cut or spending increase would have to be offset by spending cuts or a tax increase.

Our opinion: Huzzah! This tit-for-tat tactic was instrumental in balancing the budget in the '90s, and it can help lawmakers again today. Such fiscal discipline will make budget bills excruciating but the deficit is still close to \$250 billion. It's time for Congress to make some tough calls.

The initiative: 9/11 panel recommendations. Democrats want to implement most of the outstanding proposals by the commission.

Our opinion: The campaign pledge was to implement all the recommendations. But now one proposal is on hold

reorganizing Congress to strengthen oversight of intelligence. Of all the commission's recommendations in 2004, it listed that as one of the most important. The changes are a good step for national security, but the Democrats should live up to their campaign promise and revisit this.

The initiative: Minimum wage. An increase from \$5.15 to \$7.25 an hour in steps over two years would be the first shift in a decade.

Our opinion: The minimum wage, adjusted for inflation, is at its lowest point in more than 50 years. We support an increase. But we're interested in the details and GOP compromises. That only underscores the need for the plan to get a full committee review.

The initiative: Stem cell research. President Bush used his only veto last year on this plan to expand federal funding for research on stem cells extracted from excess embryos at fertility clinics. Democrats hope

they can muster a veto-proof majority this time around.

Our opinion: These restrictions should be loosened. By limiting research on embryos that would otherwise be destroyed, the government is ignoring the potential for breakthroughs in diseases like Alzheimer's and Parkinson's.

The initiative: Lower drug prices. By allowing the government to negotiate with the pharmaceutical industry, Democrats hope to ease the financial burden on those enrolled in the Medicare drug plan.

Our opinion: It's hard to argue against lowering seniors' medication costs. But giving the feds the power to negotiate prices would, in effect, put Washington in charge of the drug industry. Better to keep price negotiations in the realm of private insurance companies.

The initiative: Lower education costs. Democrats want to halve the interest rate on federally subsidized student loans, to 3.4 percent.

Our opinion: We are dedicated to making college more affordable. But one estimate put the cost of this plan at \$18 billion over five years.

Convince us that this can work in accordance with pay-go, and we'll give it a shot.

The initiative: Energy independence. Rolling back subsidies and boosting the collection of royalties from oil and gas producers would provide billions of dollars, Democrats say. The funds would be squirreled away into a reserve for tax breaks on renewable energy.

Our opinion: A contract blunder extended some companies' royalty relief which was sensible at \$10 a barrel no matter how high the price soared. It's high time that loophole closed. With oil going at \$55 a barrel, companies don't need incentives to search for it. Subsidies are better directed toward renewable sources.

With the ethics and budget changes already under their belts, Democrats have forged a promising start. It's unfortunate, however, that taxpayers will have to rely on the Senate to give these bills a full hearing.

Ms. Pelosi has promised to "drain the swamp that is Washington." She must be mindful that she doesn't get her own feet stuck in the process.

I join millions of other Americans

in joyous remembrances of President Ford. Though there was much coverage about his death, we know only smatterings of his acts of kindness and care.

One such act was within days of his appearance here.

David's daughter, Lisa, with high school graduation but days away, was killed in an automobile accident.

President Ford penned a letter of sympathy to the David family. ...

Friend Jean and Mrs. Ford never met. They no doubt have much in common, too, including long marriages — the Fords, 58 years, and the Davids, almost 60.

Of the wonderful tributes to President Ford, none, I believe, was more profound than that of CBS newsman Bob Schieffer: "He's the nicest man I ever met in public life."

The same things have been said of Bill David. He's been gone now for nearly five years, and is greatly missed. ...

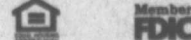

Duke lacrosse district attorney asks for special prosecutor

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — As he aggressively pursued sexual assault charges against three Duke lacrosse players for nearly 10 months, Mike Nifong never wavered publicly in his commitment to take the oft-sensationalized case to trial.

But facing ethics charges that could lead to his disbarment, the Durham County district attorney quietly asked to be removed from the case Friday — faxing a letter to the state attorney general asking for a special prosecutor to take over the case that is sure to define his nearly three-decade career.

"His withdrawing from the case has nothing to do with how he feels about the merit of the case," Nifong's attorney, David Freedman, told The Associated Press.

"He's disappointed he has to get out of the case. He likes to see things from beginning to end."

What comes next in the troubled prosecution of Reade Seligmann, Collin Finnerty and David Evans will likely be determined by the lawyer appointed by State Attorney General Roy Cooper. His office declined to comment Friday night, but a spokeswoman said officials would speak with reporters Saturday.

"If he decides to take it, his staff is going to spend a significant amount of time to review the case files, interviewing the witnesses and making a determination on what is the proper process," said Peg Dorer, director of the North Carolina Conference of District

Attorneys.

Dorer said that could take a month or more. Defense attorneys said they weren't worried about the prospect of such a delay, and instead cheered Nifong's decision to recuse himself.

"We've tried to cooperate with Mr. Nifong, and he's refused," said Joseph

Cheshire, an attorney for Evans. "We look forward to working with whoever the new prosecutor is and we're confident that after that review is made, the case will be dismissed."

Under North Carolina law, only a district attorney can formally request a special prosecutor. The request can be made when there are potential conflicts of interest, when a case is particularly complex or when there are other unusual circumstances.

Once the ethics charges were filed, Nifong "had a conflict of interest with respect with the case," said Ron Sullivan, a criminal law professor at Yale University. "It's probably safe to say that Nifong felt that he couldn't be completely objective."

Nifong led the investiga-

tion into allegations a 28-year-old student at North Carolina Central University — hired to perform as a stripper — was gang-raped and beaten at a March 13 party thrown by Duke's highly ranked lacrosse team. His frequent interviews with news agencies in the early days of the case generated much scrutiny; at one point, he called the lacrosse team "a bunch of hooligans."

But as he started to hand over his evidence to the defense, the case appeared to unravel. Legal experts and observers have said it appears to be based only on the testimony of an accuser who has told wildly different versions of the alleged assault — a shifting story that led Nifong to drop rape charges on Dec. 22. The

three players remain charged with sexual offense and kidnapping.

Last month, the North Carolina State Bar charged Nifong with violating four rules of professional conduct for making misleading and inflammatory comments about the athletes under suspicion. He faces penalties ranging from admonishment to removal from the bar.

"He feels as a result of the accusations against him that he would be a distraction and he wants to make sure the accuser receives a fair trial," said Freedman, who said Nifong met with the accuser this week to tell her of his decision.

"He still believes in the case," Freedman said. "He just believes his continued presence would hurt her."

Sweeney eager to move forward from Bonds situation

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Mark Sweeney wasn't about to sit back and ignore a situation dealing with his name in the same sentence as amphetamines and Barry Bonds.

He wanted his message out: There were never any amphetamines in his locker for Bonds to take.

Sweeney, respected around baseball for his candor win or lose, minding his own business and being a good teammate, expressed

shock at learning that Bonds apparently mentioned his name in connection with the slugger's failed amphetamines test last summer.

The fact it came out publicly months later caused Sweeney to respond.

"That's almost like losing a game and leaving your locker and not talking to people," he said of keeping quiet. "You don't do that. You stand up for what's right. That's the way I was raised."

The New York Daily News reported Thursday that Bonds failed an amphetamine test last season and initially attributed it to a substance he took from Sweeney's locker.

"There was nothing I had for him to take or for me to give to him," Sweeney told The Associated Press in a phone interview Friday night.

Sweeney moved forward after being told by Gene Orza, the union's chief oper-

ating officer, that his name had come up with a failed test for the stimulants. He wasn't informed of the player's name or any other details.

"That was kind of a shock," Sweeney said. "I heard my name was mentioned. I didn't know who mentioned it. I didn't know how or why. I was angered and hurt a little bit that however it came out someone didn't know the facts. That happens in all walks of life."

"I just hit a few jumpers," Battier modestly said. "At the end of the of the night, that's all I did — hit a few jumpers."

McGrady had 12 points and 11 assists as the Rockets won for the eighth time in nine games.

"He's a playmaker," Battier said. "He makes the right decisions 98 percent of the time. Some nights he helps us by shooting, some nights by his assists."

Steve Blake scored 13 points — all in the second half — in his Denver debut. Blake didn't practice with the team Friday morning as he waited for the paperwork to go through on the trade that brought him from Milwaukee in exchange for Earl Boykins, Julius Hodge and cash considerations.

A teenage golfer - but not Wie - makes history

HONOLULU (AP) — Tadd Fujikawa tried to block out the cameras, the faces packed behind the ropes and the loudest ovation he had ever heard as he closed in on history over the final hour Friday afternoon at the Sony Open.

When his 15-foot putt fell for eagle, he joined the delirium.

He dropped his putter and raised both arms in the air, then punched the air with an uppercut that made Tiger Woods look like a featherweight. Four days after he celebrated his 16th birthday, Fujikawa shot a 4-under 66 to become the youngest player in 50 years to make the cut on the PGA Tour.

"That was the loudest roar I've ever heard in my life," he said.

It was the moment Hawaii has been waiting for — a teenager playing Waialae on the weekend.

Only it wasn't Michelle Wie.

The cheer for Fujikawa's eagle putt could be heard all the way to the clubhouse, where the 17-year-old Wie was wrapping up her press conference after a 76 to miss the cut for fourth straight time in the Sony Open, this time by 14 shots.

"I tried my best. It's all I can do," said Wie, who has not made the cut in seven PGA Tour starts. "I have a lot of game, it's just not

showing right now. When I get it to come out, I'm going to be fine."

Paul Goydos (63) and Luke Donald (66) shared the lead at 11-under 129, but attention shifted to the 5-foot-1 kid who first got everyone's attention when he qualified for the U.S. Open at Winged Foot.

"I can't breathe right now," Fujikawa said. "I'm sooo excited."

He was tied for 25th at 3-under 137, one shot ahead of Kapalua winner Vijay Singh.

The youngest player to qualify for the weekend on the PGA Tour was Bob Panasik at the 1957 Canadian Open when he was 15 years, eight months. Ty Tryon was 16 years, nine months when he made the cut in the 2001 Honda Classic.

"Making the cut is an awesome thing for me right now," Fujikawa said.

"Having all these people watching and supporting me ... I wish everybody in the world could feel what I'm feeling now."

That's what Wie has wanted since she was 14, but it will have to wait. Her driving was so erratic that when she hit the fairway on her 10th hole, she covered her mouth and said, "Oh, my God!" in mock surprise.

Her 14-over 154 total was her highest at the Sony Open; in three previous tries, she didn't miss the cut by more than seven shot.

The gallery fled to the far east side of Waialae, the back nine, after seeing that Fujikawa was 3 under for his round and two shots inside the cut line. He missed a 3-foot par putt on the 14th, then missed the green well to the right on the 15th for another bogey, and followed that by driving into a bunker on the 16th.

But he hit out to 15 feet and holed the birdie putt and punched the air in sheer delight, and he was on his way.

The kid now gets two more days to see how far he can go.

"I'm probably not going to win this tournament," he said.

Donald was steady as ever, opening with seven straight pars and finishing with a flourish. He birdied three of the final four holes

to share the lead going into the weekend.

Goydos wouldn't even be in Honolulu without the last full week of the 2006 season. He was destined for Q-school until putting together his best four rounds of the year at the Chrysler Championship to tie for second, earning enough money to finish 97th on the money list.

The 10-week vacation with his two daughters didn't slow his momentum.

"This is probably one of the top five rounds I've played on tour," he said of his bogey-free 63 in steady 20 mph wind.

Chad Campbell, tied for the lead going into the final round at the Sony Open last year until he went 16 holes without a birdie and finished five shots behind David Toms, played in the morning and turned in a 65 to finish two shots out of the lead at 9-under 131.

Charles Howell III rode a birdie-eagle finish to a 63 and was at 132, followed by Will MacKenzie (68), Jim Furyk (68) and Robert Allenby (66).

Wie stands a foot taller than Fujikawa, but Hawaii has a new giant to celebrate this weekend.

"I've never played with him or talked with him," Wie said. "It's great being how young he is. I'm rooting for him."

Non-thunderstorm winds blew across the panhandles on the 14th and 15th of the month reaching speeds near 70 mph in some cases. Three wildfires occurred across the panhandles on the 20th, 21st and 28th, burning 5,800 acres and injuring one firefighter. At the end of the month, a winter storm dumped snow over the entire panhandles with up to 8 inches of snow piling up in parts of Amarillo. Strong winds along with the snowfall produced near blizzard conditions in parts of the panhandles.

December brought a variety of weather to the pan-

handles. The month started off cold, but dry, with a low temperature of 10 on the 1st. This was followed by 3 more days of low temperatures of 20 or below. However, by mid December, temperatures began to increase and finally peaked on the 16th when a new daily record high temperature of 75 was set. Unfortunately, the warm December temperatures did not last. Three days after the 16th, a winter storm hit the panhandles bringing freezing rain, sleet and snow. Initially, the freezing rain coated parts of the panhandles with up to 1 inch of ice, followed by as much as 5 inches of snow in some locations. This made for difficult driving conditions and left thousands of panhandle residents without power for a few days. Once again though, the cold air exited the panhandles and within a week another daily record high temperature was set when the thermometer hit 72 on the 27th.

Just two days later, a second winter storm hit the panhandle on the 29th. Up to 18 inches of snow fell in parts of the northwest Texas and western Oklahoma

Panhandles. The combination of very strong winds and low visibility resulted in blizzard conditions in these areas and caused snow drifts of 4 to 6 feet. Across the rest of the panhandles, a mix of freezing rain, freezing drizzle and rain showers coated most of the region in a sheet of ice. Many residents once again lost power and road closures with stranded motorists were common in the western panhandles. The addition of 1.28 inches of precipitation in the last 4 days of the month helped this December to become the 6th wettest December on record.

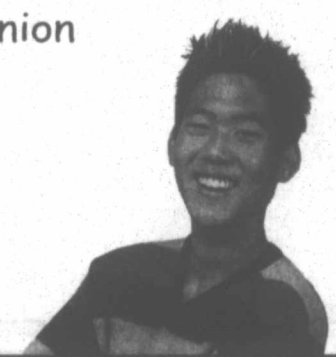

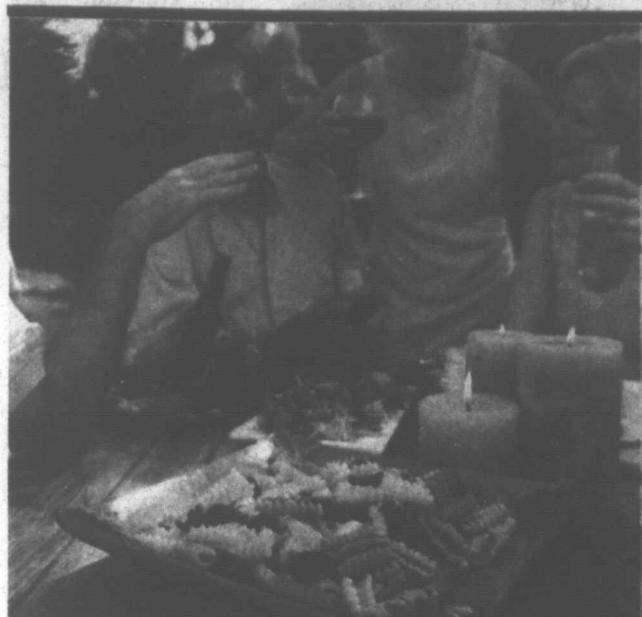

MACARONI AND CHEESE MY WAY

Recipe by Michael Chiarello for Progresso Foods

- 18 uncooked jumbo pasta shells

- 1 cup uncooked chopped bacon or tasso ham
- 5 large shallots, finely chopped
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 1/2 teaspoons all-purpose flour
- 1 cup dry white wine or nonalcoholic white wine
- 2 cups whipping cream
- 1 cup shredded fontina cheese (4 oz)

- 2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese
- 18 medium to large shrimp (about 3/4 lb), peeled, deveined
- 2 cups lightly packed spinach leaves
- 1/4 teaspoon sea salt or kosher (coarse) salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground white pepper
- Red pepper sauce to taste
- 1/2 cup Progresso Parmesan bread crumbs
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh Italian (flat-leaf) parsley

1. Cook pasta shells as directed on package; drain well.
2. Meanwhile, in 12-inch skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add bacon; cook, stirring occasionally, until just crisp. Stir in shallots and garlic; cook 3 to 4 minutes, stirring occasionally, until shallots are translucent. Stir in flour; cook about 5 minutes, stirring constantly, to toast the flour. Stir in wine; continue cooking, stirring occasionally, until almost dry.
3. Stir in whipping cream. Heat to a simmer; cook 5 to 10 minutes, stirring occasionally, until sauce coats the back of a spoon. Remove from heat; stir in cheeses, shrimp and spinach. Gently stir until cheeses are melted, spinach is wilted and shrimp are beginning to turn pink. Stir in salt, white pepper and pepper sauce.
4. Set oven control to broil. In 2-quart casserole, place cooked pasta shells. Add shrimp mixture; gently fold into pasta. Sprinkle with bread crumbs and parsley. Broil with top about 5 inches from heat 2 to 3 minutes or until bread crumbs are toasted.

Full-bodied Chardonnay makes the perfect match for the rich flavors of this dish. A good bottle of Sangiovese, with cherry flavors and earthy undertones, can offer an unorthodox, but delectable, pairing as well.

MARINARA SAUCE

Recipe by Michael Chiarello for Progresso Foods

Makes 4 cups of sauce

- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon chopped fresh Italian (flat-leaf) parsley
- 1 large clove garlic, finely chopped

PASTA PUTTANESCA

Recipe by Michael Chiarello for Progresso Foods

Makes 4 servings

- 1 1/2 cups heated Marinara Sauce or other prepared marinara sauce
- 12 oz uncooked penne or rigatoni pasta (about 4 cups)
- 1/4 cup clam juice (preferably unsalted)

U.S., Canada reconsider Great Lakes cleanup plan

When Canada and the United States approved the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement in 1972, the running joke in Cleveland was that anyone unlucky enough to fall into the Cuyahoga River would decay rather than drown.

The Cuyahoga, which meanders through the city before reaching Lake Erie, helped inspire the cleanup initiative by literally catching fire three years earlier. The lower end of the 112-mile-long waterway was a foul brew of oil, sludge, sewage and chemicals. It made embarrassing headlines when its surface flamed for about 30 minutes.

Today the river is returning to health under a plan developed through the binational agreement. Pollution levels have fallen. Nearly 70 fish species have been detected in areas once considered virtually lifeless. Bald eagle nests have been spotted nearby.

"Maybe one day we'll actually be able to swim within the harbor," says Ed Hauser, an environmental activist who launches his kayaks from a park at the river mouth. "I'll get my feet wet, but I sure don't want to fall in there."

The U.S. and Canadian governments are considering whether to update and strengthen the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement, which hasn't been significantly revised since 1987. It commits the two countries to "restore and maintain the chemical, physical and biological integrity" of the world's biggest surface freshwater system — a mission that many see as only partly accomplished.

Although the lakes and their major tributaries are less dirty than four decades ago, states continue warning children and women of childbearing age to limit fish consumption because of lingering toxicity. Algae overgrowth and a resulting oxygen-starved "dead zone" in Lake Erie, all but eliminated by the early 1980s, are returning.

And the waters face threats that were recognized barely if at all when the agreement first was crafted, such as the exotic species invasion, climate change and shoreline development.

Despite increasingly urgent warnings from scientists and activists that the lakes are in peril, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and its counterpart, Environment Canada, "have no preconceived notion that we will or will not revise the agreement," says Mark Elster, senior analyst with the EPA's Great Lakes National Program Office.

A committee representing both countries is studying the matter. A decision isn't likely before next year, Elster says.

"Our only requirement right now is to review the agreement — its operation and effectiveness," he says. "The outcome of this process will be a report to the two governments on what could be done."

Many supporters say the agreement has lost clout and could become irrelevant unless overhauled.

There's no shortage of programs aimed at cleaning up the Great Lakes; a 2003 report by the U.S. Government Accountability Office identified 140 on the federal level alone. Yet the water quality agreement is unique because it obligates the two countries to work toward the same goals. Although not legally binding, it carries moral weight.

"It's really our insurance policy that Canada and the U.S. will continue to treat the Great Lakes as a joint responsibility," says Cameron Davis, executive director of the Chicago-based Alliance for the Great Lakes. "There is nothing else that comes close to providing that incentive."

Yet even its biggest fans acknowledge the agreement's success record is mixed. Some say its influence peaked during the decade after President Richard Nixon and Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau signed the initial version in 1972 and has waned since.

Simply persuading Canada and the United States to adopt a binational approach was a big accomplishment, says Lee Botts, co-author of a recent book on the agreement.

"That's why it's been considered a model around the world and really a pioneer at addressing environmental problems across international borders," Botts says.

The pact called for a crackdown on phosphorus pollution blamed for rampant algae growth, which sucked oxygen from the waters and suffocated fish. Lake Erie had a gigantic dead zone, and beaches along Lakes Michigan and Ontario were strewn with rotting algae and alewife carcasses.

Governments responded by ordering phosphate cutbacks in laundry detergents and better treatment of sewage and industrial wastes. Within a few years the algae problem faded, although it's now returning — possibly because of the exotic zebra mussel invasion.

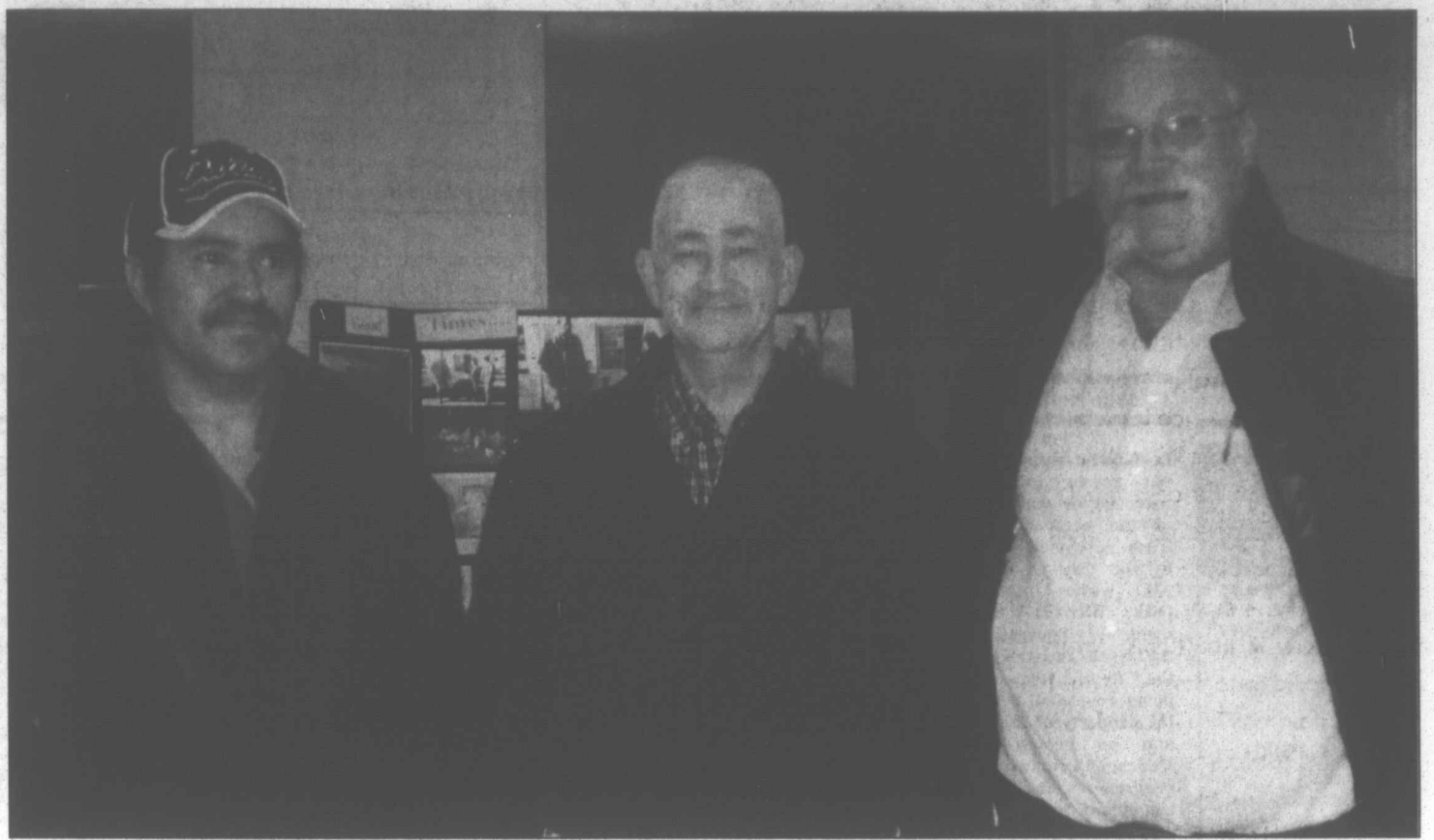
Research conducted under the agreement yielded information about water pollutants, including airborne contaminants such as mercury and chemicals that move up the food chain instead of breaking down.

In 1978, the agreement was updated to propose "virtual elimination" of toxins from the lakes. Both nations have made progress. But not enough, say advocates who blame inadequate funding and regulation.

They point to 43 heavily contaminated harbors and river segments designated for special attention under the latest version of the accord, approved in 1987. The pace of restoring these "areas of concern" has varied widely. Only three are finished: Collingwood Harbor and Severn Sound in Ontario and the Oswego River in New York. Most aren't close.

The International Joint Commission, an independent agency that advises both countries on Great Lakes issues, last fall proposed replacing the agreement with a more flexible, action-oriented version.

1 Public Notice

Section 1.
It shall be unlawful for any person to pilfer, scavenge, or scatter any of the contents of a trash receptacle owned by the City of Lefors. All waste material, junk, litter and other materials deposited in the trash receptacle of the City of Lefors, upon being deposited, become the property of the City and no person may scavenge or in any manner remove any of the contents of the trash receptacle. All trash receptacles known as "Dumpsters" are the property of the City of Lefors.

Section 2.
It shall be unlawful for any person to use or carry away from any public hydrant which is a part of the water system in the City of Lefors any water for private use. 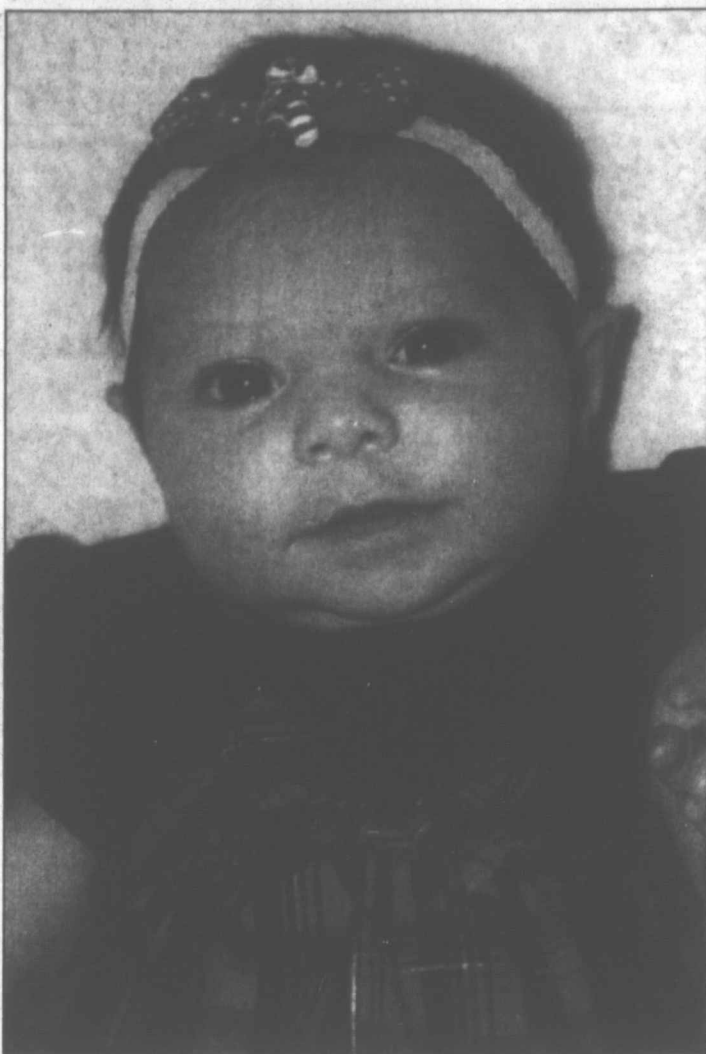
