

Rendition forms in the mail soon

Businesses in Gray County may expect to receive their annual rendition forms soon in the mail from Gray County Appraisal District, according to Chief Appraiser Pat Bagley.

"Although mailing of these forms is not required, the District believes that the convenience of receiving the forms in the mail is beneficial to local businesses that must render each year," Bagley said in a news release.

The forms are required to be completed by businesses and returned to the Appraisal District office by April 15. Information to be completed on the form consists of each asset owned and used by the business and that asset's value. The information is used to levy property tax on businesses each year.

"If the rendition form does not fit the needs of a business, additional sheets or listings may be added to clarify the information," Bagley said in the release. "The information provided by a business will help the Appraisal District produce a fair and equitable appraised value of the business' assets for the year."

All businesses are required to render their personal property whether or not they receive a rendition form in the mail. Failure to file a rendition by April 15 of each year carries a 10 percent penalty.



Meredith planning for prescribed burns

FRITCH Acting Superintendent Paul Eubank announced Tuesday Lake Meredith National Recreation Area will conduct seven prescribed burns at Mullinaw, Alibates National Monument, Big Blue Creek, Martins Canyon, Rosita, Lake Meredith Harbor and Triangle areas in the coming year.

Park staff expect to begin burning this week and should complete the burns by the first of May 2007. depending on weather conditions. Eubank also stated that pile burning from the last two years of salt cedar treatment will be accomplished, if moisture allows.

The Alibates unit consists of the southern half of the Monument and should be completed by May 1, 2007. The Rosita unit is divided into two blocks. The first block will begin on the south side of the river at the Rosita Campground access road and follow the park's boundary to Bull Taco Hill.

The second unit is on the north side of the river along the park's boundary to Tin Cup Canyon. This unit is expected be complete by April 1, 2007.

The Big Blue Creek unit starts west of the Big Blue Creek Bridge on Highway 1913 and follows upstream on the south side of the creek, and should be completed by April 1, 2007.

Lake Meredith Harbor is surrounded by private lands, roads and the lake. This unit

begins at the Fritch Fortress Boat Ramp and moves along the park boundary to Lake Meredith Harbor Boat Ramp. Proposed completion date is May 1, 2007.

The Triangle unit is located on the northeast boundary of Lake Meredith NRA and is bounded by the Recreational Area boundary and State Highways 3395, 1319 and 687. This unit should be completed by March 1, 2007.

Martins Canyon unit lies between the Recreation Area boundary, Evans Canyon and the Blue West Boat Ramp. Burning in this area should be completed by May

The Mullinaw unit begins at McBride Access Road and continues into Coetas Creek, and completion is expected by May 1, 2007.

The purpose of the prescribed fires is to reduce the buildup of grassy fuels that typically feed a wildfire and return the mesquite grasslands to their natural cycle of growth. The reintroduction of fire into the ecosystem will help traditional plant distribution, reduce the danger associated with wildfires including protecting threatened communities and ranchlands, and increase public and firefighter safety in the event of wildfires.

Fire crews began preparing burn units Oct. 1, 2006, and have spent several months removing brush and other fuels from the perimeter of the burn units. The

burns will be a cooperative effort sponsored by the National Park Service with assistance from local ranchers, and local and Federal agency fire departments.

Extensive fire management plans have been created that will guide the strategic placement of fire crews and engines based on weather and expected fire behavior. Lake Meredith began its prescribed fire program in 1999 and has successfully approximately

36,000 acres to date.

During these controlled burns some of he areas will be closed to the public. People traveling in the area should use caution by reducing vehicle speed and turning on their headlights when smoke is present. The burns are designed so that the majority of smoke will move toward the waters of Lake Meredith, which means boating activities near the burn units may be affected



Tom Tipps, 90

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah Tom Tipps, former Defensive Coordinator and Super Football Coach for the Washington Huskies, passed away peacefully on February

3, 2007, in Salt Lake City, UT. He was 90. Thomas Olan Tipps was born into a farming family in Denton County, TX on January 29, 1917. His parents were Arthur V. Tipps and Allie Gertrude Rucker Tipps. He and his twin brother, Robert, were the youngest in a family of five boys and five girls. Born in simpler times, they grew up without electricity, running water, or an indoor bathroom, first in rural Denton County and then Quitaque after their father died of typhoid fever on their 7th birthday. Tom's fondest memories of those times include fishing with Uncle Dick, playing with a toy made from an old wheel rim, and once or twice riding to town on the family wagon with his father to sell watermelons. Tom attended Sul Ross

State College in Alpine, TX from 1934-1938. He earned a B.S. in History. He was a football and basketball star and football team co-captain. In 1939, he was named to the All-Time Football Team at Sul Ross. In 1987, he was inducted into the Sul Ross State University Athletic Hall of Honor. He met his future wife, Frances Louise Cotter, while at Sul Ross. They married on March 29, 1940, in Alpine. Tom later earned a master's degree in History. After graduating, he

coached high school football avid fisherman and continfor 13 years, mostly as head coach, in a variety of Texas

towns including Seagraves, Temple, Dennison, and Pampa. Except for the three years spent in the U.S. Army during World War II, he was involved with football his entire working

Tipps In 1954, he joined the staff of football great Bear Bryant at Texas A&M in College Station. He coached there for three years becoming before Defensive Coordinator and linebacker coach at the University of Washington in 1957. He helped revive the UW program and was instrumental in sending three Husky teams to the Rose Bowl. His years at UW were the highlight of his career; he was a Husky to the core. So it was with a heavy heart that he resigned this position in 1969, a decision precipitated by the challenging times of racial unrest on the team. He subsequently became a pro football scout for the Dallas Cowboys; the Quadra Combine, which included Rams, the Chargers, Cowboys, and 49ers; and, finally, the Green Bay Packers. He retired in 1987 to his home near Denver,

Though football was his passion, Tom loved sports of all types and was a voracious reader. He especially liked murder mysteries. He was an

ued fishing well past his 80th birthday, making two deep sea fishing trips to

Alaska around that milestone. After his wife passed away in 1999, he met Beverly Conley, whom he affectionately called "Redhead." They remained special friends until his death.

Tom has been described as "the most intense football coach I ever saw." He was tough, compassionate, feared, loved, and respected. He was driven to prepare his players to win on the field, but also taught them the skills to succeed in the pros and their later working life. He instilled values and work ethic, accepting nothing less than someone's best effort, even if it was more than needed to win the game. He demanded excellence and inspired people to work harder. One of his sayings, even at home, was "a person who really wants to do something finds a way, while others look for an excuse." Through his work, he was a great influence on the lives of many young men over many decades. He maintained strong ties with many of his former players

Female space whiz suffers meteoric melt-down

What was she thinking? Why would any woman with a successful, high-profile career, a husband of 19 years, two 5-year-old twin daughters and a teenage son throw it all away for a man who, by her own admission, was not a full, romantic partner in what appears to be an otherwise licentious affair?

Lisa Marie Nowak, astronaut, wife and mother, stands accused of attempted first-degree murder in a lust triad involving fellow astronaut Navy Cmdr. William Oefelein.

to According Associated Press, Nowak described her relationship with Cmdr. Oefelein to the authorities as "more than a working relationship but less than a romantic relation-

Less than a romantic rela-

tionship. And, yet, Nowak raced across several states to neutralize someone she clearly viewed as a romantic rival for Oefelein's affections - Colleen Shipman.

Nowak says she only

wanted to frighten Shipman, but police aren't buying that. They believe Nowak set out to kill the other woman because she viewed Shipman as a threat to her relationship - her "less than" romantic relationship - with Oefelein.

At first, according to the AP, police were only charging Nowak with "attempted kidnapping, attempted vehicle burglary with battery, destruction of evidence and battery" and assorted other charges. That was what the AP initially reported. Now, it seems, Nowak is facing attempted murder charges.

Well, for one thing because authorities linked her with or found in her possession (or in her car), among other items, a BB gun, pepper spray, a "new" steel mallet, a knife, garbage bags and rubber tubing.

The AP reported Skyla that Nowak Bryant made mad dash **News Editor** to Orlando from

Houston,

wearing a diaper no less (the kind frequently used by astronauts during launch and re-entry to and from space) to cut down on stops between Texas and her destination.

Wearing a disguise, Nowak, the AP said, tracked Shipman down at a Florida her car where she connived to get Shipman to open her door, first by asking for a ride and trying the door handle, then, after that wouldn't work, by pretending to cry. When Shipman cracked her window in pity for the sob-

bing Nowak, promptly rewarded kind gesture with a vent of pepper

Internet fulfills the needs of chatty people

Internet was limited to email. Communication was limited to sending text messages from computer to computer. While faster than the U.S. Postal Service, it was hardly "real-time communication."

Today, many options are available to savvy Internet surfers. They can be divided into three camps - text-only, instant messengers, and VOIP (voice over IP).

Text-only programs actually harken back to the birth of the Internet. IRC or Internet Relay Chat was one of the first chat-room systems available. The concept was simple enough: Using special software, people from all over the Internet would connect to a single server running "chat" software. The server would facilitate communication between the participants. When one person typed a

"page" you to initiate a personal chat. Of course, you will ALSO know if your friends are online or not.

One of the best known instant messengers is ICQ (http://www.icq.com). The name is actually a play on words. "ICQ" sounds like "I Seek You." After downloading this free program, you are asked to register. Enter as much or as little information about yourself as you like. Obviously, the more information you give, the easier it will be for your friends to find you. Total anonymity is available for the truly paranoid. Every ICQ user is assigned a unique ID code, though, allowing anyone with it to contact you.

As competition to ICQ, check out the Yahoo Messenger (http://messenger.yahoo.com). Personally, I like it better than ICQ. Two features set it a "step above" ICQ in my opinion - stock and e-mail alerts. I track my stocks via the Yahoo Portfolios feature (http://quote.yahoo.com) and also have a Yahoo e-mail account (http://mail.yahoo.com). Using the Yahoo Messenger, I am instantly notified if any of my stocks go above or below certain levels and also if I have any new mail.

The Parliament has been forced to adjourn almost every session since November due to no-shows, according to a report in the New York Times.



Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY: May I respond to the assertion that letting the 6-year-old drive a golf cart is unsafe (Dec. 31)? Six-year-olds routinely drive go-carts, motorcycles and the like recreationally. Most competitive leagues have divisions especially for them (peewee leagues). As long as they have the proper protective gear, this is in no way child endangerment. I drove a motorcycle and go-cart at the age of 5, and 31 years later, I attribute my spotless driving record to the early and vast experience I have. --AL M. IN BOISE, IDAHO

DEAR AL: The grandmother who wrote that letter ("Seriously Worried in Florida") stated that she felt the golf cart was too big and powerful for the safety of her grandchild. She also did not indicate that any safety gear was being provided for the little girl. I'm pleased your experience was a positive one, but read on:

DEAR ABBY: About 13 years ago, my nephew was allowed to drive a golf cart at the age of 8. He fatally injured his 6-yearold stepsister. He is still traumatized by it. And if that isn't bad enough, last June my great-grandson was driving a similar piece of equipment on his third birthday (a gift from his paternal grandfather). While the whole family watched, he overturned it as he drove off the road and into a ditch. Everyone seemed to think it was "cute." What is wrong with these idiots? --BEWILDERED GRAMMY IN MARY-LAND

DEAR ABBY: A 6-year-old driving a golf cart is child endangerment, and a social worker has the right to remove that child to a foster home and ask questions later. The parents would then be under a microscope. Because the grandparent knew about the situation and did not report it to the author ities, the grandparents would probably not

be considered safe guardians for that child, and the child would be placed with strangers until the parents finish courtordered parenting classes. Foster children are big business. It's a totally different climate than it was in the days when only severely neglected and abused children found their way into foster care. I speak from 17 years of experience as a foster parent and 30 years as a psychiatric nurse who has seen what hoops families must jump through to get their children back once child protective services is involved. -READER IN FERRIS, TEXAS

DEAR ABBY: An elderly lady here was killed in a hit-and-run golf cart accident while picking up her mail. The driver was a child. I hope this will serve as a wake-up call to the Florida child's irresponsible parents. - JULIE S., ANN ARBOR, MICH.

DEAR ABBY: I am a registered nurse who works with brain-injured adults. That grandmother has every right to be concerned. I recently cared for a gentleman who sustained a serious head injury falling out of a golf cart. He remains very confused and unable to care for himself. The lifelong consequences of head injuries can be devastating -- not only to the victim, but also to their families. - R.N. IN MIL-FORD, N.H.

DEAR ABBY: My son was 6 when he drove a golf cart into a utility pole. Because of the laws of inertia, his little body was not heavy enough to hold him to the seat of the vehicle. He was airlifted to the trauma center for the life-threatening injuries he received to his spleen, liver and pancreas. It was horrible. I nearly lost him. Please, Abby, urge those parents to move the kid out of the driver's seat. - SARA IN FREDERICKSBURG, VA.





ICQ and Yahoo Pager are NOT. interoperable (ie. They don't talk to each other). If you have some friends on ICQ and others on Yahoo Messenger, you will need to use BOTH pro-

grams. Some companies have developed programs that allow people on different systems to talk. The most popular program can be found at http://www.ceruleanstudios.com.

Real-time voice communication, also known as VOIP is really the most exciting of these technologies, though. Essentially, using these programs you are getting low-cost long distance service to anyone else in the world. Of course, like the instant messengers, you and the other party MUST be using the same software to communicate.

My favorite software on this front is Yahoo Voice (http://www.dialpad.com). The program, when running, resembles a cell phone on your screen. After registering, you can use your PC to make a call to another Yahoo Voice user for as little as 1-cent per minute. International rates run around 3-cents.

In order to use voice communication programs, both computers must have a sound card, microphone, and speakers. Fast Internet access is also advised, but not critical. Today's compression techniques allow even slow Internet connections to have good audio quality.

Whether you choose text-only chat rooms, instant messengers, or VOIP software, you'll open a brand new world of communication options. If you use them enough, the savings, in long distance charges alone, will pay for your Internet Access.





Mobile ESPN to relaunch through Verizon Wireless; V Cast cell TV to feature ESPN cable channel

NEW YORK (AP) -ESPN is relaunching its shuttered cell phone service through Verizon Wireless, this time delivering its flashy feed of sports scores, news and video highlights through a top industry player instead of competing for subscribers with its own wireless brand.

The multiyear agreement giving Verizon Wireless exclusive U.S. rights to offer the Mobile ESPN application on its V Cast phones was expected to be announced on Thursday, executives at both companies said on condition of anonymity because the deal had not yet been finalized.

The companies also planned to announce that a broadcast TV service for cell phones that Verizon plans to introduce will feature an ESPN channel with much of the same programming being shown on its sports cable networks. Verizon expects to offer the service over MediaFLO — a separate wireless network developed by Qualcomm Inc. that can broadcast up to 20 TV channels — in at least one market by the end of March.

The Mobile ESPN service, expected to launch in the coming months, is to be included free as part of the \$15 a month or \$3 a day charge for V Cast's assorted multimedia offerings, the executives said.

The Verizon relationship

is the first example of the new strategy that ESPN executives promised last September in announcing they were pulling the plug on Mobile ESPN as a standalone cell phone company featuring its own handsets, calling plans, customer service and monthly phone bills.

That ambitious venture, launched in late 2005 by parent company Walt Disney Co., is believed to have signed up fewer than 30,000 customers despite drawing positive reviews for the sophisticated multimedia application that ESPN created to deliver its popular TV and Web content within the cramped constraints of a cell
