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County passes on burn ban; Fire grant funds issued

Gray County Commissioners took no action on a possible burn ban at their 9 a.m. meeting today in the second-floor courtroom of the county courthouse, 205 N. Russell.

"I think we're in pretty good shape right now," said Precinct 4 Commissioner James Hefley concerning any danger of wildfires in the county.

"I agree," said Precinct 2 Commissioner Gary Willoughby.

The last burn ban imposed by county commissioners was adopted last Dec. 15 and lifted Jan. 5.

Amarillo Area Foundation for victims of the March 12, 2006 wildfires has been received by Gray County.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Gerald Wright, who headed a committee to disburse funds donated last year for wildfire victims, said that any wildfire victims who wished to apply for funds as fire compensation will need to submit a new application. Applications for the previous funds will not be reviewed. Wright and his committee will determine disbursement of the \$28,500.

An early voting polling place in

A grant of \$28,500 from the McLean was approved. Early voting cost the county any extra money. is usually held at only one location, in the courthouse in Pampa, but commissioners agreed to allow early voting in McLean only for the May 12 election.

"They felt that if they could have early voting in McLean, they'd have a better turnout," said County Clerk Susan Winborne. "It will only be for this one election."

Winborne said commissioners' approval was required for holding early voting anywhere except at the courthouse, and that having an early voting location in McLean would not

Donley Parts of Collingsworth counties are included in McLean Independent School District, which is one of four school districts in the county having a bond election May 12. The other school districts holding bond elections are Lefors, Miami and Fort Elliott.

Fort Elliott ISD will conduct its own election, while the Gray County clerk's office will conduct the Lefors ISD election and the Miami ISD election for Gray County residents

State Legislature passes milestone

The Texas Legislature has passed a procedural milestone of sorts, according to Pampa's state senator.

State Sen. Robert Duncan, R-Lubbock, who represents Pampa in the state Capitol, said this week that the 60th day of this session passed ast Friday.

The 60th day is a key part of the 140-day legislative session. The Texas Constitution prohibits the Legislature from taking up anything without a majority to do so. Under the constitution, the 60th day is the deadline for filing bills.

From now until the end of the legislative session, it takes special permission of the leadership to file any

He said it's possible for a few more bills to get introduced, but the passage of the 60th day means that a major-

ity of the proposed legislation has been introduced.

"There are 3,977 House bills," Duncan said, "and 1,933 Senate bills."

Between now and the next 45 days, he said, the Legislature will have to hear all those bills in committee and kill them or pass them through to the other side of the Capitol Building.

The key bill is the Appropriations Bill, which sets the state's budget for the next two years.

Each session, Duncan said, the Legislature alternates which chamber will take the lead on the budget. This year, it will be generated by the House where Pampa Rep. Warren Chisum is the chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

When House Bill 1, the budget bill, passes the House, it will be sent to the


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Pitner: PPD had no racial profiling complaints in 2006

In his annual Racial Profile Report, Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner said the Pampa Police Department received no racial profiling complaints or reports in 2006.

Pitner told the Pampa City Commission during their regular meeting Tuesday that the department records every traffic stop with video

cameras in the patrol cars.

"It's our policy that the video cameras run all the time on traffic stops, pedestrian stops and any citizen contact," Pitner said, "and it pays off."

He said he had a complaint Tuesday morning about a stop over the weekend and the videotape supported the officer.

"That's exactly what it's for,"

Pitner said. "It's good for the officer and the citizen."

According to police records there were 4,187 traffic stops in 2006. Some 216 involved African-Americans, four involved people of Asian descent, 3,505 involved Caucasians, 456 involved Hispanics, three involved Native Americans and three involved people of unknown ethnicity.

The state requires that traffic stops be broken down by ethnicity, Pitner said. The data is also broken down

"Each number represents a traffic stop," Pitner said.

Pitner said the data is compared to Pampa's demographics to see if anything appears to be out of line.

The city and school board elections are being combined, but there are no contested races for school


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



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New Braunfels relaxes river rules

NEW BRAUNFELS, Texas (AP) — The New Braunfels City Council decided to relax a slate of new rules regarding coolers, tubes and children's life jackets that were recently passed or considered for local rivers.

The council voted Wednesday to allow tubers to carry up to a 16-quart cooler - which holds 20 12-ounce cans - while floating on the Comal and Guadalupe rivers within the city limits.

The decision revised an ordinance adopted last month that limited tubers on the Comal to one six-pack-size cooler each and those on the Guadalupe to a 12-pack-size cooler.

"It's a reasonable compromise," councilman Pat Wiggins New Braunfels has struggled for years over ways to control

rowdiness on the rivers, which draw thousands of tourists each summer who want to relax — and imbibe — as they float down

But the latest slate of rules divided residents and led to a petition drive that gathered enough valid signatures to force a recall election in May for councilman Ken Valentine, a supporter of the tougher rules.

Senate.

"Our economy is good so our revenues are up," Duncan said, "so that gives us more money to consider in our legislation."

On the other hand, he said, they have to consider such programs as Medicaid and the Child Health Insurance Program, or CHIP, which have substantial needs.

There is also the commitment to fund the reduction in property taxes in 2008 to a cap of one dollar per \$100 valuation for maintenance and operation of the schools in Texas.

"That's a \$3 billion item," Duncan said. "Those are the kinds of items we're looking at in the big picture."

Duncan has filed several major bills, including the Jurisdiction Realignment Bill.

"Basically, what we're doing in that bill is trying to go back and realign the jurisdiction of our different courts and make sure that we're in some sort of uniformity, provide more resources to our courts and provide some sort of complex case panel to assign certain kinds of complex cases to specialty courts," Duncan said.

That would expand the jurisdiction of the Justice of the Peace courts.

He has also filed a bill that would change the way the state funds and manages Texas the Teacher Retirement System.

One bill he has been working on was passed out of committee a few days ago. It is a constitutional amendment and deals with eminent domain.

It would require the Legislature to deliberate on future eminent domain authority by governmental entities in the State of Texas.

"What has happened in the past," Duncan said, "is we create a quasi-public group to solve a problem like a base closure. We routinely have granted eminent domain authority."

Duncan said he thinks the Legislature should debate those and require a supermajority before they could grant eminent domain authority.

In the Senate, it would take 21 votes. In the House, it would take 100 votes.

"It just raises the bar," Duncan said, "and requires the Legislature to have a deliberative debate with regard to whether or not eminent domain authority is appropriate for duly created entities."

Those are part of some 80 bills that Duncan has filed this session.

Beyond those, Duncan

said there are a lot of hot issues now being debated in the Capitol building.

He said the Texas Department Transportation is involved in a hot issue concerning proposed toll roads. A bill has been introduced that puts a moratorium on building toll roads.

"The HPV virus is certainly a hot item," Duncan

Gov. Rick Perry signed an executive order mandating vaccination for young girls against the Human Papillomavirus, which causes cervical cancer. Many in the Texas Legislature say the governor overstepped his authority and this week, the House Representatives passed a bill that would rescind the

The Texas Youth Commission has consumed much of the Legislature's time and attention, he said. There are law enforcement investigations and legislative investigations into the

Subpoenas cleared for attorney purge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Judiciary Committee today cleared the way for subpoenas compelling five Justice Department officials and six of the U.S. attorneys they fired to tell the story of the purge that has prompted demands for the ouster of Attorney General Alberto Gonzales.

The voice vote to authorize the panel to issue subpoenas amounts to insurance against the possibility that Gonzales could retract his permission to let the aides testify voluntarily, or impose strict conditions.

The committee also postponed for a week a vote on whether to authorize subpoenas of top aides to President Bush who were involved in the eight firings, including political adviser Karl Rove, former White House Counsel Harriet Miers and deputy White House Counsel William K. Kelley.

The committee approved subpoena power over key Justice Department officials involved in the firings: Michael Elston, Kyle Sampson, Monica Goodling, Bill Mercer and Mike Battle.

Sampson, Gonzales' chief of staff, quit

this week. Elston is staff chief to Deputy Attorney General Paul McNulty and Mercer is associate attorney general. Goodling is Gonzales' senior counsel and White House liaison, and Battle is the departing director of the office that oversees all 93 U.S. attorneys.

Gonzales has said he would allow the aides still at the Justice Department to testify voluntarily. It was unclear whether Sampson would agree to tell his story without a sub-

The panel also approved subpoena power for six of the eight U.S. attorneys fired since December. The six, all of whom testified last week under oath before the House Committee, are: Carol Lam of California, Bud Cummins of Arkansas, Paul Charlton of Arizona, John McKay of Washington state, Daniel Bogden of Nevada, and David Iglesias of New Mexico.

The subpoenas are a warning to the embattled administration to follow through on promises in recent days by Gonzales and Bush to tell the whole story of the firings, beyond the selected details that Associate Deputy Attorney General William Moschella revealed to the House panel last week.

San Antonio Express-News on the influx of FCC fines raising more broadcasting questions:

Among the very few obligations broadcasters have to the nonadult audience is a Federal Communications Commission requirement to air at least three hours of educational programming on a weekly basis. The FCC defines such programming as "specifically designed to serve the educational and informational needs of children ages 16 and under."

That allows for some broad interpretation, covering programming as diverse as "VeggieTales" and "Sabrina the Animated Series."

And groups such as the Parents Television Council and the United Church of Christ have long complained that much of what the networks have passed off as educational programming is actually devoid of educational con-

So it came as a surprise when the FCC recently levied a \$24 million fine against Univision for counting "Complices al Rescate" "Friends to the Rescue" as part of its three-hour educational block. The series is a telenovela, a soap opera, that follows the adventures of twin adolescent girls who were separated at birth.

It's good to see the FCC taking its educational mandate seriously. The record fine against Univision should force other broadcasters to take notice.

But given the questionable content of plenty of other allegedly educational programming, the FCC's decision to target the largest Spanish-language broadcaster in the United States and in such a large way is a bit curious.

The next largest broadcast penalty is a paltry \$3.6 million proposed indecency fine against CBS for an episode of the crime drama "Without a Trace."

FCC programming standards should be the same in any language.

Al-Qaida's No. 3 man says he planned 9/11 attacks

Khalid Sheikh Mohammed portrayed himself as al-Qaida's most ambitious operational planner in a confession to a U.S. military tribunal that said he planned and supported 31 terrorist attacks, topped by 9/11, that killed thousands of innocent victims since the early 1990s.

The gruesome attacks range from the suicide hijackings of Sept. 11, 2001 — which killed nearly 3,000 - to a 2002 shooting on an island off Kuwait that killed a U.S. Marine, according to an account released by the Pentagon.

Many plots, including a previously undisclosed plan to kill several former U.S. presidents, were never carried out or were foiled by international counterterror authorities.

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



India: Rebel attacks kill 49 police officers, police say

NEW DELHI, India (AP)
— Communist rebels armed with rifles, hand grenades and petrol bombs attacked a police post in the jungles of eastern India today, killing at least 49 officers, police said.

The pre-dawn attack today was the latest in a series of increasingly bold assaults by the rebels, who have been fighting for more than two decades in central and eastern India's long-impoverished hinterlands.

Equipped with rifles, hand grenades and homemade petrol bombs, the insurgents appeared to have caught the 79 officers guarding the remote post by surprise, Swarnkar said. Another 12 officers were wounded in the attack.

The post is located in the state of Chattisgarh, nearly 930 miles southeast of New Delhi.

Before fleeing with weapons stolen from the police post, the attackers scattered land mines around the area, Swarnkar said. By midday, police reinforcements had reached the post and were fanning out into the jungle to search for the attackers.

Rebel operations have become increasingly bold over the past two years—and increasingly deadly.

In March 2006, insurgents detonated land mines under four trucks carrying villagers in Chattisgarh, killing 25 people. Days later, they seized a passenger train for 12 hours in the neighboring state of Jharkhand — a well-coordinated operation that highlighted their capabilities, even if no one was killed.

Those assaults — and dozens of other attacks — have prompted Indian offi-

cials to describe the rebels, know as the Naxalites for the Naxalbari region where the movement was born, as a major internal security threat.

Prime Minister Manmohan Singh went even further in an April 2006 speech, describing the insurgents as "the single biggest internal security challenge ever faced by our country."

More than 6,000 people — police, soldiers, and civilians — have been killed since the rebels launched their campaign from the southern Indian state of Andhra Pradesh more than two decades ago.

The rebels, who claim to be inspired by Chinese revolutionary Mao Zedong, demand land and jobs for agricultural laborers and the poor.

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
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

Mavericks suffer second straight loss in double overtime

DALLAS (AP) - When the second overtime began in game that already had plenty of thrills, Amare Stoudemire was ready to settle things.

So he went to the basket.

Between points and fouls that got Dallas Mavericks starters disqualified, Stoudemire's strong start got the Phoenix Suns going toward a 129-127 victory Wednesday night in a tense, thrilling game between the league's two best teams.

"He's a great finisher," marveled teammate Steve Nash. "That was quite a performance."

Stoudemire had 41 points and 10 rebounds, and Nash played like a two-time MVP down the stretch. He scored 10 points in the final minute of regulation, capped by a tying 3-pointer with 2.7 seconds left. He finished with 32 points, 16 assists and eight rebounds.

Jerry Stackhouse scored 33 points, his most in three seasons with Dallas, and Dirk Nowitzki added 30 points, 16 rebounds and six assists. He had eight points and seven rebounds in the third quarter, when the Mavs turned what had been a 16point deficit into a 15-point lead going into the fourth quarter.

Phoenix rallied by opening the fourth by making eight straight shots and 10of-12. While that set up Nash's great finish, four missed free throws by Dallas including two by Nowitzki — were equally important.

The Mavericks remained missed 8-footer by Nowitzki shaky at the start of overtime, then Jason Terry scored five points in the final 48 seconds, including a long 3 over Nash with 4.5 seconds to go that the second OT.

for the first time since their 0-4 start. This was their first home loss since Dec. 7.

The Suns have 18 games left and the Mays have 19. The clubs meet again April 1 in Phoenix, with the Dallas leading the season series 2-1.

The top seed in the West is worth much more than bragging rights. In addition to the home-court advantage in every round, there's also a better draw; whichever team doesn't get No. 1 likely will be on course to meet the San Antonio Spurs in the second

No wonder both teams played as if this was more than just another game.

"That was a playoff

atmosphere," Stoudemire said. "Both teams played with high intensity. Both teams were in it until the end. We definitely wanted to win but we also want to improve."

By game's end, these weren't the same Mavericks.

Josh Howard and Erick Dampier fouled out early in the second overtime, Devin Harris was hurt in the second quarter and Devean George missed the game with an

HOUSTON (AP) — Luther Head was never shy about taking clutch shots in college and he's still not afraid to take them in the pros.

Head hit a 3-pointer with 12.2 seconds left and Yao Ming deflected a pass and created a game-sealing steal as the Houston Rockets beat the Los Angeles Clippers 109-105 on Wednesday night.

Elton Brand scored a season-high 37 points for Los Angeles and drove for a dunk with 1:01 left that put the Clippers up 105-104.

Yao was whistled for an offensive foul barreling down the lane, but Brand missed a shot from the wing to give Houston another chance.

Tracy McGrady, who led the Rockets with 21, drew the defense to him and found Head wide open in the corner for the go-ahead 3-pointer.

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

Jackson has his back, but Bryant needs to keep his hands to himself

Phil Jackson doesn't get paid \$10 million a year just to roll out the ball, map out a few plays for the triangle offense, and make sure Kobe Bryant gets to shoot anytime he wants.

He's supposed to win games - and lots of them to keep Jack Nicholson and the rest of the Hollywood crowd from sitting courtside for the Clippers instead.

Lately that hasn't been easy, and even the Zen Master seems to be losing his patience with his team of underachievers.

The Lakers have dropped six straight, including an embarrassing loss (108-72) Sunday to the Dallas Mavericks that must have made even Nicholson cringe. It was the worst home loss in the 47 years the Lakers have been in Los Angeles, and at times it looked like the players were just going through the motions.

So maybe there was more than just a hint of desperation in the air when Jackson went off against the NBA

the other day, accusing the league of engaging in a "witch hunt" against his superstar player.

Jackson hadn't had a good couple of weeks to begin with. The Lakers are sinking close to the .500 mark, and he was so embarrassed about the loss to Dallas that he closed the locker room afterward and chewed out his players.

Then he came to work on Monday and learned the NBA was penalizing Bryant for the third time in six weeks, this time for elbowing Philadelphia's Kyle

Korver in the jaw.

"That's crazy. That's a vendetta. They have a witch hunt going on," Jackson told the Los Angeles Times. "It's nuts. Guys riding somebody. Everybody does that in this league.

"It's just becoming a witch hunt now."

The outburst will likely cost Jackson. He was fined \$25,000 earlier this season for criticizing officiating, and this one will surely be for even more.

It should, though, be money well spent.

Crappie Dock Patterns

You know the local lake that you spend all your time fishing?

The one with all those houses that line the shore the houses with all the boat docks?

Those docks might be clogged with people loading and unloading boats and having all kinds of fun, but some of the best crappie fishing can be found directly below them at almost any time of year.

So what is it about these docks?

It doesn't matter what part of the country you're fishing, if you've got crappie in the water, they're bound be around these docks. Granted, crappie love certain docks more than others (wooden docks seem to hold more crappie than metal ones), but once you figure out which docks they prefer and what kinds of baits and tackle work best around this structure, there will be nothing stopping you from stocking the livewell with big slabs of

The allure of docks as they relate to crappie is that these structures provide the necessities that these tasty fish need to survive.

Pilings that support docks provide food and cover along a wide range of depths. Grass shrimps, crustaceans and minnows feed

on the small plankton, then crappie feed on them. The older docks have

algae growing on them, which attracts baitfish, and that attracts the crappie. Most importantly, docks

are best when its sunny and hot. Clouds tend to make the cover less important and causes fish to scatter.

The bright sun penetration pushes crappie into the most shaded area under the docks, and it's not unusual for crappie to be on one side of the dock in the morning, and then on the other side later in the day.

The wooden docks just a foot or so above the water is ideal.

The posts and cross-members also provide shade and protection for crappie.

Deeper water, at least nearby, is another key ingredient. Shallow docks may produce during certain seasons, but deep-water structures will hold crappie year

Other than the spawning season, the water depth beneath or at the end of a dock should be at least 6 feet to attract crappie.

Docks and piers in shallower water can be productive providing there is nearby deeper creek channels, which are travel corridors that crappie use to migrate in and out of creek arms as the seasons change.

Also, around most docks there will be sunken trees, brush, stakes and other manmade structures that have been placed in the water.

Many dock owners do this to establish a holding area for crappie and also to hold a larger concentration of fish.

Because crappie are so found in so many places around the country, it seems that people in different places have different ideas on what constitutes crappie tackle. For some, it's simply down-sized bass gear.

But when you target crappie specifically, choose an ultra-light spinning reel and rod, like a like an Abu Garcia Cardinal 100 on a five-foot Berkley Lightning Rod.

Most people prefer 4- to 8-pound test monofilament such as Trilene XL, but let things like water clarity and the structure you are fishing around determine how heavy a line to use.

The last thing you want is to lose a big crappie because it broke the line as it rubbed against the dock.

Many people target crappie using live bait - namely minnows.

Israel not recognizing Hamas, Fatah unity pact

(AP) — The rival Hamas Regev said. "Accordingly, Fatah movements formed a long-elusive unity government today, hoping to hope the international comend bloody infighting and lead the Palestinians out of yearlong international isolation. Israel immediately said, however, that it would not deal with the new government.

Prime Minister Ismail Haniyeh of the Islamic militant Hamas announced the final coalition agreement and platform after months of stop-and-go negotiations. It is to be approved by the Palestinian parliament on Saturday.

The coalition platform posted on Hamas and Fatah Web sites calls for continued observance of a truce with Israel but falls short of Israeli, U.S. and European requirements that the new government recognize Israel, renounce violence and accept previous peace deals.

The new government's platform includes only a vague pledge to "respect" past peace deals, falling short of explicit recognition of Israel.

It also affirms the Palestinians' right to resist and "defend themselves against any Israeli aggression."

While many in the West consider "resistance" to be a code word for violent attacks, Palestinians have a wide variety of definitions that can encompass anything from armed attacks to street protests.

Israeli Foreign Ministry spokesman Mark Regev said his government will boycott the coalition government and encourage other countries to do the same because its program falls short of the international conditions for acceptance that include recognition of the Jewish

Motive unknown in NYC shootout

NEW YORK (AP) — A gunman with a injuries. fake beard and carrying 100 rounds of ammunition fatally shot a pizzeria employee and two unarmed volunteer neighborhood before other officers shot him to death, the mayor said today.

Authorities were still investigating why David Gavin, 32, went into a Greenwich Village pizzeria around 9 p.m. Wednesday, asked for a menu and then shot an employee 15 times in the back before fleeing, Mayor Michael Bloomberg said.

Nicholas Todd Pekearo and Eugene Marshalik, two of the city's nearly 4,500 auxiliary police officers, responded to the shooting and approached Gavin, who crossed the street and fired at them. Auxiliary officers are civilian volunteers who wear uniforms, are unarmed and help

Gavin then exchanged gunfire with uniformed officers, the mayor said. Several uniformed officers suffered minor

Authorities recovered the 9mm semiautomatic pistol Gavin fired, plus a .380caliber semiautomatic handgun in a bag police officers in a trendy Manhattan with the ammunition, Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly said. Gavin shot at least 23 rounds.

"He appeared to be ready to take even more lives," Kelly said.

A worker in a nearby restaurant, Nikola Simic, said he saw police officers swarm toward the middle of the street where the auxiliary officers were slain.

"Then we heard a shooting that was like a good five minutes," Simic said. Police identified the employee as Alfredo Romaro, 35.

Pekearo, 28, was a writer with a book scheduled to be published soon, the mayor said. Marshalik, 19, a student at nearby New York University, had immigrated from Russia, Bloomberg said. The mayor said Marshalik hoped eventually to join the police force.
