More than 10,000 persons in March answered the question of what's for dinner by viewing easy-toprepare beef recipes on the Texas Beef Council (TBC) Internet web page www.txbeef.org.

TBC launched its home page in January 1996 with funding from the \$1 per head beef checkoff program. Its primary objective is to provide consumers with meal ideas and other facts about beef.

Since its eighth month of operation, the home page has averaged about 10,000 users monthly. Altogether, about 200,000 persons have visited TBC's web site.

The main content of TBC's web site is more than 140 beef recipes in both English and Spanish as well as food safety information, nutrition facts and beef industry data. It also links to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association home page as well as related web pages dealing with beef.

Coyotes Tune-up for Regional With Qualifiers Meet in Lamesa

The Coyotes and Lady Coyotes Track Regional Qualifiers headed out to compete in the Regional Qualifiers meet held in Friday Lamesa last evening. This was the last chance for the Borden County tracksters to polish up on their times and distances, and get prepared for the competition at the regional meet to be held week-end next in Levelland.

The ladies ran and threw well and improved themselves in many events against a tough competitive crowd of schools from all classifications. The ladies did a great job rising to the occasion.

Tammy Cooley began the meet with the shot put. She set the tone for the rest of the team by setting the school record again with a throw of 39 feet 1/2 inches. This was good enough to place her third in the meet against ladies from all school classifications. Tammy was the only Coyote to be presented a medal on the stand during the meet, as she received the bronze medal. Tammy's throw is the second best throw in the region right now by only a few inches.

Ky Merritt also threw the shot and tossed it 30'4".

Chrissy Armstrong was disappointed in the discus competition as she threw the disc only 91'6" against a strong wind. Chrissy's best throw is 112' which is also the second best throw in the region this year. So throw a personal best at regional and lets get to state.

Holly Thomas ran the 3200 m. run next and was disappointed when she could not turn in her best performance against a very fast field. Holly could not understand why her legs felt so tired in the race,

maybe it had something to do with the workout she went through during this week of preparation. Next week her legs will feel fresh and she will feel like flying against. Holly's time in the 3200m was 14:37.45. She was determined to do better in the 1600m. run and that she did as she broke her old record and set a new school record with a time of 5:59.36 officially.

Kati Merritt ran the 800m. run in 2:37.45. Like Holly, Kati did not have as fresh of legs as she would like and did not set a personal record, but she will hopefully peak for regional and times will come down.

Crystal Dye set some personal records in the hurdle races. She gets faster each week she runs and she has better form with each week. In the 100m hurdles, Crystal ran a 17.88 and won her heat. In the 300m. hurdles she ran another personal best of 54.95.

The 400m. relay team set a new school record with a time of 52.82. This is the fourth fastest time in the region through the district track meet. Running on this relay was Julie Mayes, Katie Kemp, Shaina Isaacs and Bekah Hensley.



Panhandle Beef Conference

The Panhandle Beef Conference will be held on May 12, 1998, at the Amarillo Civic Center. This year's program will highlight forage management, performance evaluation of cattle, and outlooks for weather and markets.

Cool-season perennial forage production for cattle grazing is a topic of great interest in the High Plains. Dr. Vivian Allen, Texas Tech University, will recap her research and experiences with cool-season forages in the South Plains. area. Dr. Larry Redmon, Oklahoma State University, has planted and observed various cool-season forages in western Oklahoma. The combined observations of these experts will provide some insight for coolseason forage selection and management in the south and north Plains areas of the Panhandle.

Dr. Ted McCollum, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will report on the 1997-98 Ranch-to-Rail North program. Cattle from over 100 ranches in 6 states are enrolled in this year's program. Selecting breeding stock to sustain cow pro-
