# Arlo makes stop in Amarillo

On stage at the Amarillo Performing Arts Center, Arlo Guthrie recounted how his father, legendary folk singer Woody Guthrie, was supposed to have read all the books in the public library when the senior Guthrie was growing up in Pampa.

Arlo talked about his father's habit of writing in the margins of books, arguing or noting ideas and doodling.

"We owe somebody in Pampa a lot of money," Arlo quipped to the delight of the audience.

In their next to the last stop of a nationwide tour, the Guthrie Family Legacy Tour stopped in Amarillo Wednesday night, a stop Arlo said was his first concert in the town.

His mention of his father's experiences in Pampa drew raucous applause from the audience. Although born in Oklahoma, Woody Guthrie came of age in Pampa. He attended Pampa High

School, bought his first guitar and learned how to play it in Pampa and formed his first band in Pampa. He married his first wife here.

The Woody Guthrie Folk Music Center is located in the building on Cuyler that once housed the Harris Drug Store where Woody Guthrie once worked as a soda jerk.

Following Wednesday night's concert, Arlo Guthrie visited with members of the folk music center's board, including Thelma Bray, Tim Justice, Reed Echols and June Thomas, autographing a record cover of one of Arlo's first records.

While Arlo Guthrie performed mostly his songs -- including Alice's Restaurant and The City of New Orleans -- the loudest applause was for a song that he said his father taught him in their backyard when Arlo was a preschooler -- This Land is Your Land.

Pampa's police chief said, but in the past few years it's become more of a problem.

Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner warned the City Commission during a work session Tuesday afternoon that he's having a difficult time recruiting and retaining officers because of low starting wages.

With higher wages being offered by other police departments, Pitner said he's lost some officers to other departments even though they tell him they like working in Pampa. They just can't afford to work in

and perhaps other departments in the city are lagging behind in pay.

"We've gone through one pay increase that was a citywide deal," Pitner said. "We had raises from three percent to 23 percent in different areas.'

But he said he thought the raises for public safety officers were lacking.

"Where it hurt us was over the last couple of years," Pitner said. "We were behind then and when we caught up, everybody else was moving up.'

He said the Pampa Police Department has never been at its full capacity, the number authorized by the city commission, since he's been here. He said it troubles him that he can't bring the department up to full strength.

"When I say full," Pitner said, "I mean within one or two of what we're allocated."

Excluding the major cities such as Amarillo, Lubbock, Midland and Odessa, Pampa is the third largest

But the police department is the second lowest paid in West Texas. The only city that beat Pampa on that, he said, is Levelland.

Pampa has 1.4 officers per 1,000 population.

"We are the lowest in the Panhandle," Pitner said.

City Manager John Horst said that ratio is based on budgeted officers, not the actual number of officers on the force.

"We're running about one officer

# Water district approves Nurses feted variety of agenda items

WHITE DEER The Groundwater Panhandle Conservation District board of directors transferred two well permits, approved two equipment loans, accepted a bid on some tax delinquent property, approved eight drilling permits and announced their college scholarship winners.

At their May meeting Wednesday, the PGWCD board brought three wells recently purchased by the city of Borger under the district's multiple well permitting system.

Borger officials said their city had purchased the wells from Huber. The wells had been permitted at the time they were drilled. Two of the wells were more than 20 years old. Once was drilled about five years ago.

The three wells are on two sections and the multiple well permit approved Wednesday following a

public hearing is simply updating the system, said C.E. Williams, PGWCD general manager.

Borger officials said the water from the wells would continue to go to the carbon black plant in Borger.

The board also approved the transfer of a permit from Brad Smiley to Clint Thomas, clearing up a paperwork error.

Two agricultural water conservation equipment loans, one for \$43,184 and the other for \$42,695, for center pivot irrigations systems, were approved.

The board also accepted a bid of \$4,500 on two tax delinquent lots at Howardwick.

They approved drilling permits for domestic wells or irrigation wells of less than four inches to Joe Meraz in Potter County and Clint Ingram in Gray County and three permits for Randy Stalls, two in Gray County and one in

# **Buzzard concerns delay plans for 'body farm'**

SAN MARCOS, Texas amid concerns that buzzards (AP) — Texas State could endanger nearby University's plan to build the planes.

The university will now scout a new location for what will be only the third body farm in the nation. The school had hoped to begin burying bodies later this

year. By burying cadavers and studying human decomposition, researchers aim to help police better solve questions like time and manner of death at crime scenes.

Texas State's proposed

Highway 21 near the San cages to protect exposed Marcos Municipal Airport. But after meeting with the airport's commission Tuesday, the university quashed the plan out of concerns that buzzards would pose a risk to pilots.

"While the increased risk might be very small, it cannot be completely eliminated, and we cannot go forward with the Highway 21 site," Texas State provost Perry Moore said.

Plans for the site included a razor-wire fence around 17-acre site was on Texas the property, vulture-proof

bodies and a 70-foot grass buffer around the site to absorb rain runoff.

Residents near the proposed site complained about coyotes and diminished property values, but Texas State officials had been unmoved by those concerns.

The nation's two existing body farms are operated by the University of Tennessee at Knoxville and Western Carolina University in Cullowhee, N.C.





# **Brown widows hazard in Louisiana** Internet

NEW ORLEANS (AP) -Louisiana bug experts say the poisonous brown widow spider, a cousin to the wellknown black widow, is increasingly being spotted in Louisiana.

The spiders are generally found in tropical areas but were reported along the Mississippi Gulf Coast last year.

Entomologists with the Louisiana State University AgCenter say the spiders likely migrated from Florida through commercial imports of plants, food, building materials, or furniture.

LSU entomologist Dennis Ring is advising Louisiana residents to wear gloves, longsleeved shirts and long pants

when working outdoors, espe- most often found in areas that cially in areas that don't get a lot of human activity.

Though less aggressive than the black widow, "its venom is more toxic than the black widow's," Ring said. "But it doesn't put out as much venom in its bite."

Ring says the brown he said. widow can grow to 1 1/2 inches long. It is brown or grayishbrown instead of black and has a yellow-to-orange hourglass design on its underside, as opposed to the familiar red hourglass design on the black widow.

It also has black and white marks on the top of the abdomen and often has dark bands on its legs, he said.

# **Education czar to face questions**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Secretary Margaret Spellings says she's prepared to defend her agency from criticism that it failed to address conflicts of interest in the student loan industry and in a reading program for young children.

"Not only are we not asleep at the switch, but we are very much at the helm and managing our business," Spellings said in an Associated Press interview Wednesday, a day before she was to testify before a House committee.

Spellings was referring to a recent comment by New York Attorney General Andrew Cuomo, who said the department was "asleep at the switch" when it came to overseeing the student loan industry.

Cuomo has led an investigation into the \$85 billion industry that has turned up evidence that some colleges received a percentage of loan proceeds from lenders given preferred status by the schools — a practice Cuomo calls "kickbacks."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Cuomo also said some college loan officeretary Margaret Spellings says she's cers received gifts from lenders to encourage them to steer borrowers their way.

> On Wednesday, the House overwhelmingly passed a bipartisan bill that would ban gifts from lenders to schools and impose strict controls on schools that publish approved lender lists to guide students to certain loan companies.

> Spellings said she has asked an Education Department task force to come up with recommendations for new regulations to better protect against conflicts of interest between schools or school officials and lenders.

> The proposed regulations will include a requirement of at least three lenders on any school's preferred-lender list, together with an explanation of how and why they were chosen. The rules also will spell out what is allowed and what is prohibited with regard to inducements from lenders to schools, Spellings said.



# **Cubs' Marquis wins fifth straight start**

Jason Marquis was nearly perfect in his latest stellar start for the Chicago Cubs.

Marquis retired the first 16 batters he faced and finished with a three-hitter to win his fifth straight start as the Cubs beat the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0 on Wednesday night.

Marquis' bid for a perfect game ended when No. 8 hitter Don Kelly slapped an opposite-field single to left with one out in the sixth.

"I knew I had a no-hitter going," he said. "I pitch to contact. Guys are going to find holes. My goal is to win ball games, not throw no-hitters.

Ryan Doumit doubled stretch to start a season. "My delivery is as con with two outs in the seventh ager Lou Piniella said and Jose Bautista singled in

#### the eighth.

"He was mixing his pitches well, getting ahead and throwing all of his pitches for strikes," Kelly said. "That makes it tough to square the ball up.'

Marquis' second career shutout and fourth complete game couldn't have come at a better time for the Cubs, whose bullpen was spent following a 15-inning loss to the Pirates the previous night.

Marquis (5-1), who signed a three-year, \$21 million contract with Chicago in the offseason after he was left off the roster by the St. Louis Cardinals for the final two rounds of the playoffs last fall, is in a midst of his best

tent as it's ever been. I feel like I'm repeating the same delivery over and over again and that's the reason, I really believe, for the success,' Marquis said.

It was the second straight strong effort against the Pirates for Marquis, who limited Pittsburgh to four hits over eight innings a week ago at PNC Park.

Marquis, who pitched a two-hitter against Washington in 2005 while with the Cardinals for his other shutout, got several line-drive outs. First baseman Derrek Lee snared two of them, including a nice lunging grab in the hole to rob Kelly of a hit in the third.

Soriano's leadoff homer extended his hitting streak to 17 games and it turned out that was all Marquis needed.

# Fisher returns to assist Utah in overtime

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) --- Nobody would have faulted Derek Fisher if he had missed Game 2 of the Western Conference semifinals against the Golden State Warriors.

Fisher's 10-month old daughter had just undergone a three-hour combination of surgery and chemotherapy for a potentially fatal form of eye cancer in New York.

He spent the whole day at the hospital and had to fly back to Utah in time for Wednesday's game, which was scheduled to tip off at 7 p.m. MDT. So it would have been understandable if Fisher — the veteran guard that Utah picked up in a trade last summer to add a leader to a young, inexperienced roster — said he just couldn't make it.

Not Fisher.

"There's not enough that can be said about him and what he did tonight," Utah's Deron Williams said.

Fisher scored all five of his points in

overtime of Utah's 127-117 win over the Warriors after missing almost the first three quarters. He didn't arrive until the third quarter and didn't even take time to stretch before coach Jerry Sloan put him in the game.

Sloan, who lost his first wife to pancreatic cancer nearly three years ago, had left one of the 12 active roster spots open when Fisher called earlier in the day to say he would make it if he could. There were no guarantees.

They didn't have to do that," Fisher said.

Fisher's dramatic entrance in the third quarter — going straight from the locker room into the game - his 3pointer in overtime on his only shot of the night and his disclosure after the game about the family illness that kept him from the series opener overshadowed everything else that happened Wednesday.



The extra work Daisuke Matsuzaka put in between starts seems to have paid off.

Unhappy with the way he's pitched from the stretch this season, the Japanese right-hander fine-tuned his delivery and the results showed. He won his third straight decision and the Boston Red Sox beat Toronto 9-3 on Wednesday, sending the Blue Jays to their eighth consecutive loss.

# When it comes to being colorblind, NBA does it the best

This is the time of year the NBA hands out kudos to its players for jobs well done. MVP, rookie of the year, defensive team - more trophies are being passed out than on Oscar night.

Now it's the league's turn to get a pat on the back.

Say what you want about the dress code brouhaha or the study that came out last week suggesting racial bias among referees. When it comes to the touchy issues of race and workplace diversity, the NBA gets it. Better than most.

The NBA got an A- when it comes to the number of minorities and women in top jobs, according to the annual Racial and Gender Report Card. When the season began, 40 percent of the NBA's head coaches were black. It has the only black CEOs and presidents in men's pro sports, and three of its 30 teams have black general managers.

It also has the only black

majority owner in profes- reverse sional sports in the Charlotte Bobcats' Robert Johnson.

"This is something to celebrate," Richard said Lapchick, director of the of Central University Institute for Florida's Diversity and Ethics in Sports, which issued the report card Wednesday.

"The NBA has helped to lay out a roadmap for society," Lapchick said. "We're a sports-loving country. If we can model successful behavior in terms of race and gender in the sports world ... my ultimate hope is that it's going to go the next step and impact corporate America and higher education in America."

It was only a few days ago that the NBA was caught up in a firestorm over an academic study that found evidence of racial bias among the league's referees. Players of every color were quick to say refs weren't biased, with Kobe Bryant even joking he might be the victim of

because he'd gotten most of his technicals from black refs.

The NBA has tried to shout down the study, insisting its own analysis of referees' calls showed no evidence of racial bias. Justin Wolfers, an assistant professor at the University of Pennsylvania and co-author of the study, has been equally insistent that he's right and bias exists.

All of which misses the point.

The study wasn't about fouls or bad refs. Or even about basketball, really. It was about subconscious biases that might exist in our minds, no matter how enlightened we are. It was about the subtle ways we process information, oftentimes without even realizing

It was about what might well be the toughest hurdle to overcome if we're ever going to get to the point where the color of skin mat-

discrimination ters as little as eye color.

"If you think about it, and do a lot, whether it was Magic announcing he was HIV-positive, we always change the debate," NBA commissioner David Stern saic earlier this week. "It gets people to think about that, about whether there is subconscious bias. That's

**OK.**" The NBA and Wolfers probably won't ever agree on whose analysis is right. And that's fine. But they can agree on the larger picture: That we're not yet a colorblind society. No doubt the NBA still

has room to improve. According to the report card, the percentage of women in the NBA office dropped for a third year in a row, and the percentage of female team vice presidents went down,

But at least it's making an effort. More important, it's getting results.

Despite the "Rooney Rule," there are only six

black head coaches among the 32 NFL teams, and three black GMs. Commissioner Bud Selig has applied similar pressure in baseball and yet there are two, count them, two, black managers this season, and only a handful of Hispanics.

.The NBA has never needed a "Rooney Rule" or its equivalent. Its history as the trendsetter for racial equality is long and consistent. Although it took until 2007 for two black head coaches to meet in the Super Bowl, Al Attles and K.C. Jones faced each other in the NBA finals way back in 1975.

Minority coaches are so much a part of the game these days their race is no longer even mentioned when they're hired and fired. Aside from Minnesota Timberwolves fans and his relatives, who even realized Dwane Casey got canned in January?

Even the controversial dress code was, in some ways, an attempt to make the *her at narmourap.org* 

league race-neutral. Fans were being turned off by the sloppy, urban chic some guys were sporting, much as fans once balked at the hippie look. Problem was, most who favored the hip-hop look were black players.

So Stern slapped a dress code on the league. If a fan was going to dislike a player, it wasn't going to be based on appearance.

"Our special opportunity is that you can talk about anything if you talk about it in the context of sports," Stern said. "We're the place where you engage in that conversation, and I think I'd be worried if we stopped being that place."

Sadly, there's still plenty of conversations to be had. But at least the NBA has the guts to have them.

And for that it should be applauded.

# With a new swing for an ailing back, Ames looks to defend

PONTE VEDRA BEACH, Fla. (AP) -The Players Championship doesn't quite look the same as last year, not with the refurbished Stadium Course covered with Bermuda grass, and the colossal new clubhouse perched behind the 18th green.

Also sporting a different look is the defending champion.

Just by looking at his record, it would appear as though Stephen Ames got caught up in the biggest victory of his career, closing with a 67 to win by six shots over the toughest field of the year. But there's a reason he had only one top 10 the rest of the year, and why he didn't complete a tournament the last two months of the season.

Ames is recovering from back injuries, but a new swing is the reason he believes he can become the first repeat champion at The Players.

"I'm enjoying the way that I'm hitting the ball right now," Ames said Wednesday after playing his final nine holes of practice with Ernie Els. "I'm probably right in the middle of where I need to start playing more golf shots and less golf swing because I've had to

make so many changes in my swing. I think I'm at that verge of turning it into something else, which is good."

He'll find out what kind of progress he has made when golf's strongest field and richest tournament - \$9 million, with \$1.62 million going to the winner - begins Thursday morning at the TPC Sawgrass.

Tiger Woods is among the early starters, coming off a victory last week at Quail Hollow that was his ninth in 12 starts on the PGA Tour. Phil Mickelson has tied for third the last two weeks after switching to swing coach Butch Harmon. Plenty of local support will be there for Jim Furyk and Vijay Singh, who live near the course and practice frequently at the home of the PGA Tour.

Ames is lucky to be making strides toward a full recovery.

After withdrawing from the Canadian Open and American Express Championship, he had an MRI on his back and was relieved to find it was only a muscle issue. But he needed to find a fix, and it turned out to be a familiar figure.

## Police officer not charged after admitting to making pot brownies

DEARBORN, Mich. (AP) — A police officer will avoid criminal charges despite admitting he took marijuana from criminal suspects and, with his wife, baked it into brownies.

The police department's decision not to pursue a case against former Cpl. Edward Sanchez left a bad taste in the mouth of at least one city official, who vowed to investigate.

"If you're a cop and you're arresting people and you're confiscating the marijuana and keeping it yourself, that's bad. That's real bad," said City Councilman Doug Thomas.

Sanchez, who resigned last year from the department in this Detroit suburb, declined comment Wednesday to the Detroit Free Press. Police Cmdr. Jeff Geisinger did not return calls seeking comment.

The department's investigation began with a 911 call from Sanchez's home on April 21, 2006. On a 5-minute tape of the call, obtained by the Free Press, Sanchez told an emergency dispatcher he thought he and his wife were overdosing on marijuana.

"I think we're dying," he said. "We made brownies and I think we're dead, I really do."

Sanchez later told police investigators that his wife took the marijuana out of his police vehicle while he was sleeping. In a subsequent interview, he admitted he got the marijuana out of the car himself and put it in the brownie mix, police said.
